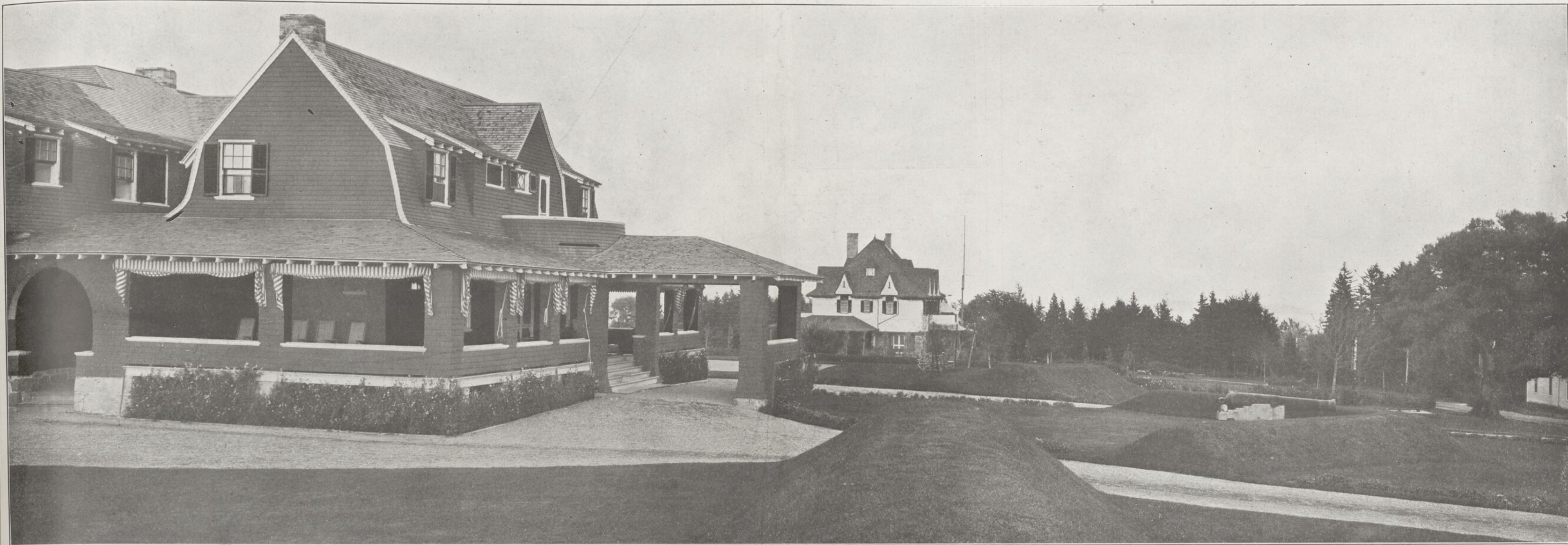


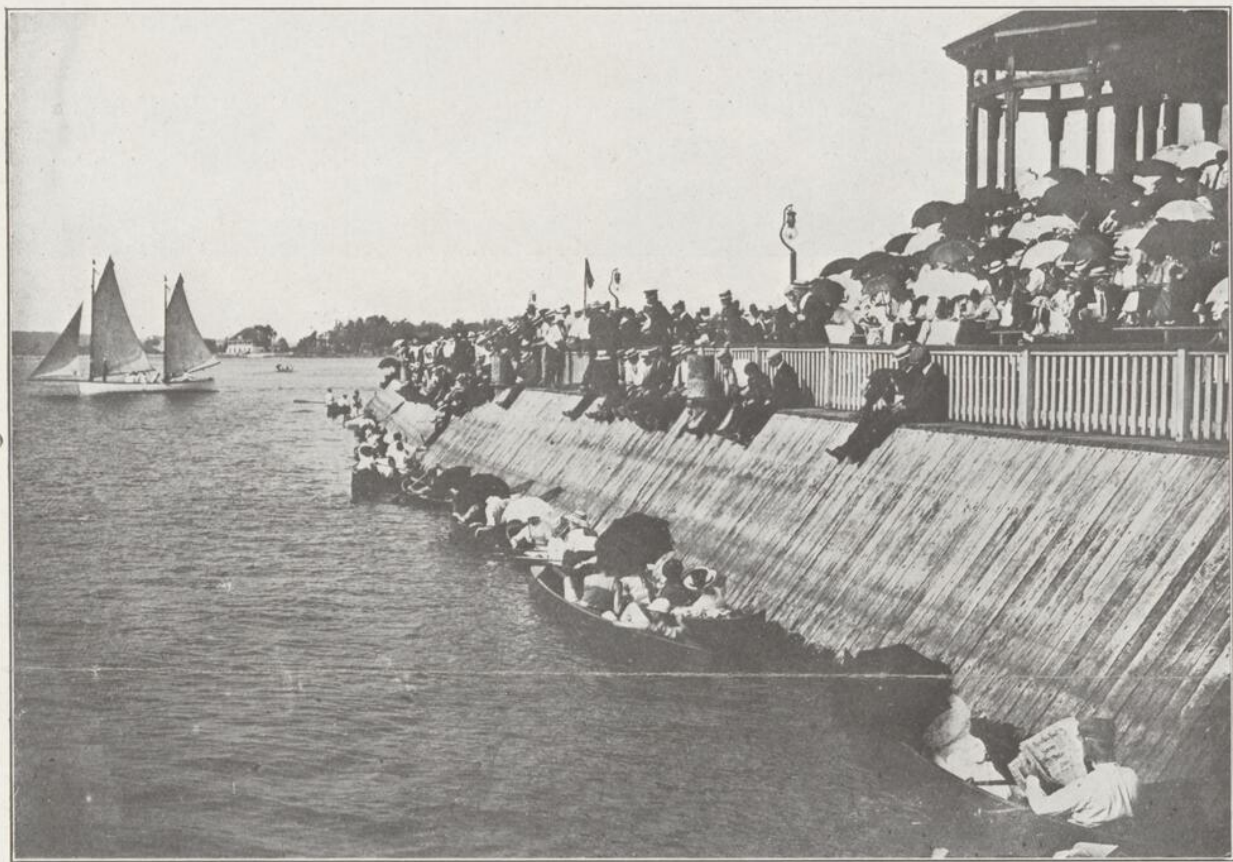
Stately Homes of Canada—Trio of Pictures Showing Country Residences of Montrealers at St. Andrews, N.B.

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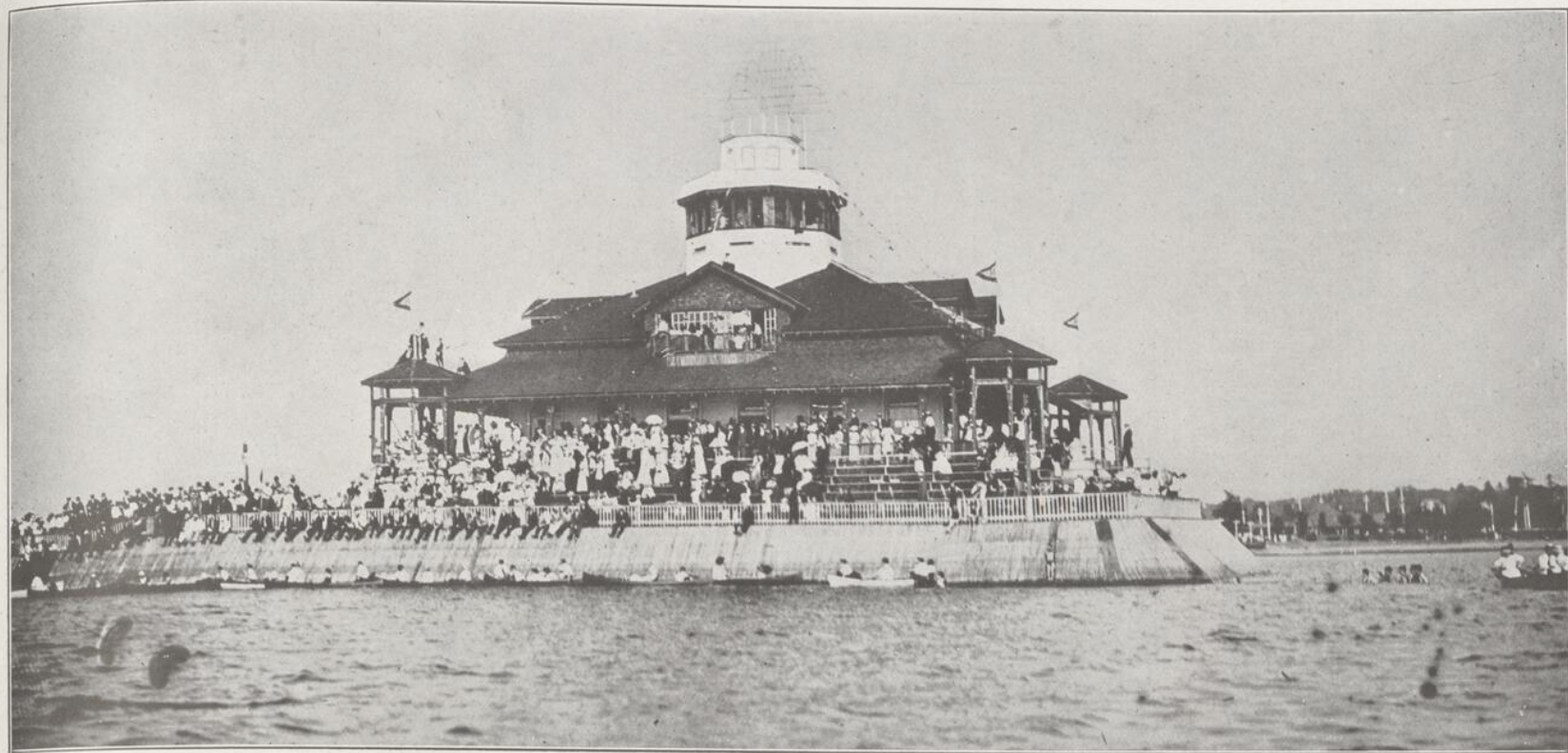

CANADIAN CANOE ASSOCIATION'S REGATTA

THE Annual Championship Regatta of the Canadian Canoe Association, which took place at Britannia-on-the-Bay, Ottawa, on August 5th, was witnessed by fully 5,000 people, the weather conditions being conducive to the gathering of a big crowd. Fully 400 paddlers were present, representing all the leading centres in Eastern Canada. The water was smooth, and as a result several exceedingly fine races were run off—the finishes in some cases being extremely close.

The great event of the day—the half-mile war canoe race—was won by Toronto after a nip-and-tuck race with New Edinburgh. Six crews reported for the race. Kew Beach, Carderville and Parkdale didn't show up, the starters being Toronto, New Edinburgh, Rideaus, Britannia, Grand Trunks and St. Lamberts. Charlie Riddy's Toronto crew drew the inside position, New Edinburgh being next and St. Lambert's fourth, with Rideaus fifth, and Grand Trunks sixth. Bill Brownrigg captained the Grand Trunks, while Horace Merrill was again in the stern for the New Edinburghs. Toronto won this event last season at St. John's, with New Edinburgh second.

HIS MAJESTY'S NEW BRITANNIA.

His Majesty's new yacht, the Britannia, made its first official appearance in the Solent on the occasion of the recent regatta at Cowes. On board the yacht were the King and Queen, the Prince of Wales, the Princess Mary, and several other members of the Royal Family. As usual, the racing was keen, among the entrants being the German Emperor and the King of Spain. For a century or more the Solent has been regarded as the home of yachting, and the name of Cowes is associated with the sport all the world over. Cowes Week, indeed, has always held a high place in the esteem of yachtsmen, as the intermingling of the social element lends a charm to the festival that is wanting at most other regattas. The festival held this year was in every way worthy of Coronation year, for the fleet of yachts assembled in the Roads was probably the largest on record. The Coronation Review led to many yachts being fitted out that would not otherwise have been commissioned, whilst the International Regatta that took place at Spithead on August 7 and 8 brought a host of foreign craft across the seas in time for Cowes Week.

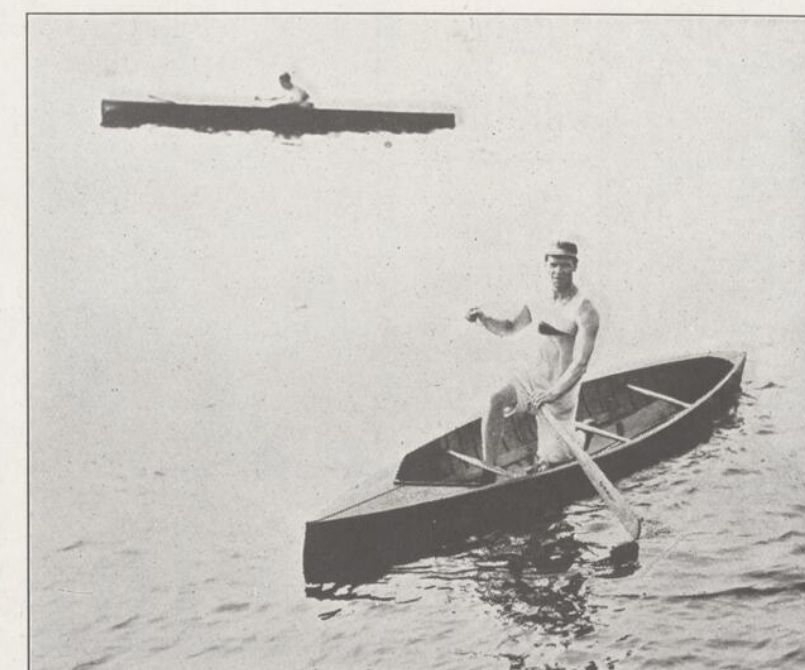

THE LEADERS IN THE RECIPROCITY BATTLE.

The Right Hon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, G.C.M.G., P.C., was born at St. Lin, Que., on Nov. 20, 1841, the son of the late Carolus Laurier, P.L.S., and Marcelle Martineau. He was educated at L'Assomption College and McGill University, Montreal, from which institution he graduated as B.C.L. in 1864, in which year he was also admitted to the Bar. He became a Q.C. in 1880, and entered Parliament in 1871. He was re-elected in 1874, and became Minister of Inland Revenue in the Government of Alexander Mackenzie. He was defeated in the general election of 1878, but was immediately afterwards elected for Quebec East, and was re-elected at the general elections of 1882, 1887, 1891, 1896, 1900, 1904 and 1908. On the resignation of the Hon. Edward Blake as leader of the Liberal party in 1891 Mr. Laurier, as he was then known, was selected to fill the vacancy.

Mr. R. L. Borden was born at Grand Pre, N.S., on June 26, 1854, and began the study of law in 1874. He was called to the Bar in 1878, becoming a Q.C. in 1891. He has had an extensive practice in the Supreme Court of Canada, and has been engaged in several cases before the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council. He was first elected to the House of Commons in 1896, and again in 1900, 1904 and 1908. In February, 1901, on the resignation of Sir Charles Tupper, Bart., leader of the Conservative party in Canada, he was selected to succeed that veteran statesman, a position he has since occupied. Mr. Borden has been President of the Nova Scotia Bar Association. He is a graduate of Acadia University, Horton, and an honorary LL.D. of Queen's University, Kingston. Quite recently he delivered a series of addresses in the Canadian West.

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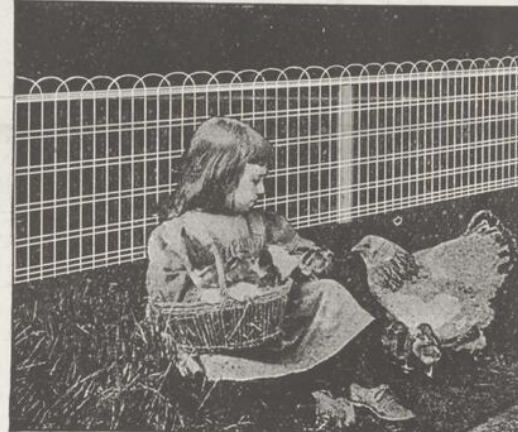
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ORATORICAL BATTLE HAS COMMENCED.

The present week has witnessed the firing of the first shots by the leaders of the Liberal and Conservative parties in the oratorical battle on Reciprocity that is now being waged with almost unprecedented vigor throughout the length and breadth of Canada. The struggle will doubtless prove one of the most momentous in the history of Canada, and with a view to enlightening the electorate with respect to the merits and demerits of the Reciprocity Agreement, a great number of political meetings will be held during the next few weeks. On Monday last the Prime Minister began his tour of the middle and eastern Provinces of Canada, when he left Ottawa for Simcoe, where he spoke on Tuesday. On the same day Mr. R. L. Borden, who is an uncompromising foe of Reciprocity, began, at London, Ont., his series of public addresses. A remarkable interest is being taken by Canadians of all shades of political opinion and of all ages in the present campaign, and a heavy vote is likely to be polled on September 21.

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
