

Graham Gould Named By Government



Lawyer Contests Westmount Riding In June 20 Vote

Graham Gould, well-known local lawyer, member of the firm of Vien, Pare, Gould and Vien, has been named government candidate in the provincial election which comes to a climax with balloting on June 20th.

Born in this district in 1914, and always a local resident, Graham Gould was educated at Argyle School, Westmount High School and McGill University, where he obtained his law degree in 1942.

With the Navy during World War II, he served for three and a half years as a lieutenant on escort duty.

He was admitted to the bar in 1946 and practiced with the firm of Foster, Hannen, Watt and Stikeman, later opened his own law office, before joining his present firm.

A member of the University Club, he is on the board of management of the Westmount Y.M.C.A., and has taken an active part in Red Feather and Catholic Charities Campaigns.

While at McGill he was prominent in athletics and is remembered as an active member of the university football team.

A member of the Church of England, he is married to the former Yvonne Costello and is the father of five children.

In opening his campaign Mr. Gould pointed particularly to some of the outstanding achievements of the provincial government of the National Union, which has conducted the affairs of the province for the past dozen years. Particularly he stresses achievements in

health, education, social welfare, finance, development of natural resources.

He has opened a committee room in Victoria Hall.

Local Student Will Attend European Seminar

Marie Senecal, 336 Redfern, Westmount, an arts student at the University of Montreal, will visit Europe this summer under the auspices of the World University Service of Canada and attend that organization's Seventh International Seminar in Germany.

She will sail from Montreal on June 12 aboard the Greek Line passenger ship Neptunia with 37 other students from universities across Canada. They were selected from more than 300 applications on the basis of academic ability, maturity and qualities of leadership.

The students will travel in five groups, each with a qualified faculty leader, to one of the following strategic areas of Europe: Germany, Greece, Spain and Portugal, the U.S.S.R., and Yugoslavia.

Organized jointly by the Canadian and German Committees of World University Service, the seminar will also be attended by seventy students representing some thirty countries in Europe, Africa, Asia and the Middle East.

Canon H. L. Puxley, president of the University of King's College, Halifax, has been appointed director of the seminar which will be held at Tutzing, near Munich, Germany, from from July 20 to August 19. Puxley will also act as leader of the Canadian delegation.

The seminar staff will include Father Adrien Arseneault, St. Dunstan's University (P.E.I.) Miss Jane Farquharson, University of Toronto; Professor Terence Penelhum, University of Alberta, and Professor Jacques St. Laurent, Laval University.

Two-Way Wrist Radio 'On The Way'

The progress of 20th century electronics "from cat's whiskers to the moon" was outlined for Westmount Rotary club Wednesday by Nick Nixon, sales manager of ROA Victor, Montreal.

Mr. Nixon described how development in this field of science hinged upon the invention of the tube, and the development from it over the years of the miniature transistor. "The kingsize tube evolved into the miniature and that is the secret of many recent electronic innovations."

"The old tube", he went on, "remarkable as it was, was heavy, complicated in structure, rather expensive to assemble and power-consuming. It took time to warm up, had a life limitation and was very fragile."

The transistor, on the other hand, has proved to be a tremendous advance on this. "It lasts longer, only fails gradually and not instantly as in the old tube. It needs no warm-up period, consumes little power, and allows greater versatility in electronic design."

The amazing transistor has opened the way for unparalleled inventiveness. Scientists could now get down to the job of simplifying television sets, perfecting guided missiles for peaceful purposes controlled by electronic devices, building electronic brains — the celebrated calculators.

"There is two-way wrist radio in the offing, as well as tape recording of television programs which can be played back immediately."

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Law of God Brings Peace Lecturer Says

"True enjoyment, happiness, and peace of mind are gained through love for God and respect for His Law," said James Harry McReynolds, C.S.R., of Dallas, Texas, to a large and attentive audience in Montreal High School Auditorium on Tuesday evening last, in the course of a free public Lecture on Christian Science.

"Permanent peace will be found to be practical," he said, "when we come to have faith in God, divine Love, and are willing to exalt and uphold peace

instead of half-heartedly supporting it."

Currently on an extended tour as a member of the Christian Science Board of Lectureship, Mr. McReynolds was speaking under the auspices of First Church of Christ, Scientist, Montreal. Taking as his theme, "Christian Science: The Way of Obedience to Divine Law," he stressed that Christian Science is based on the Bible, and that "we are assured in the Bible that it is not only possible, but that it is our duty, to know Him; and, further, that nothing but blessings result from this understanding."

"The same healing Christ which enabled Jesus to prove that health emanates from God and is wholly dependent upon Him is present now to reveal to mankind the fruits of obedience," he declared.

Stressing the need for awakening to the ever-availability of God's saving health, the speaker described health as a spiritual quality of God, not dependent upon material heredity or environment. "Health is just as much a part of man as any other divine quality," he declared. "Man," he said, "is no more separated from health than he is separated from God."

"Spiritual sense gives one the desire to be obedient to the First Commandment, with the result that he is guided in his activities and has the support and protection of unerring Mind, God," said the speaker.

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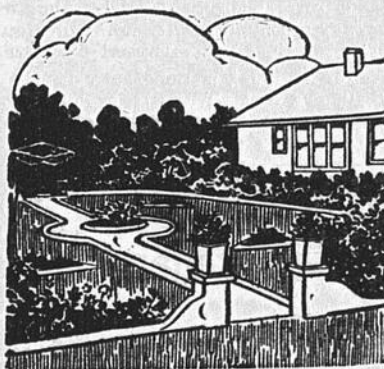
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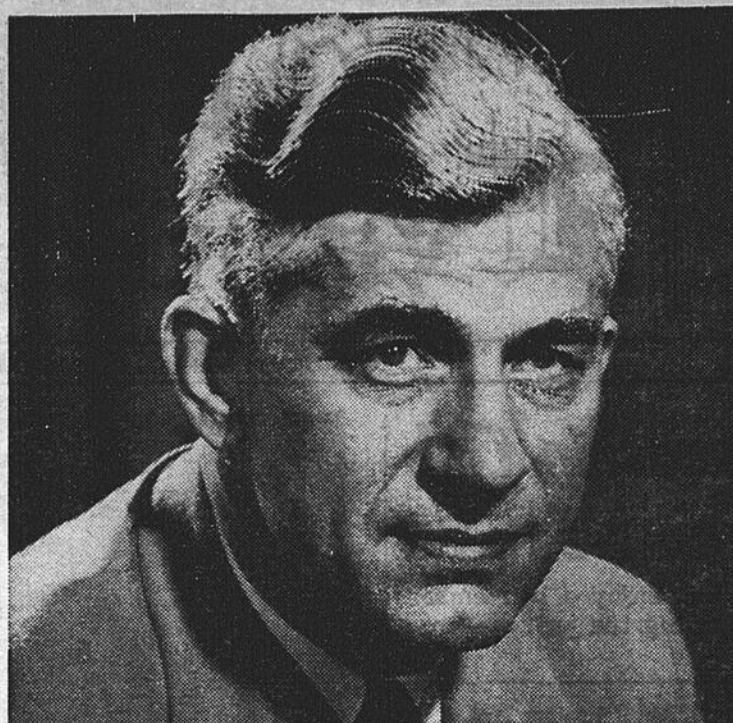

diately and need not be developed, as in recording by film. This in turn opens the way for portable tape cameras."

But probably most spectacular of all was the conquest of space. "And here," Mr. Nixon explained, "where a million pounds of rocket propulsion force is needed to push just 50 pounds of equipment, the weight of the scientific equipment we want to place, say, on the moon is very important. The transistor has enabled us to make machines to do the same job as the old tube mechanisms at one fifth the weight. So you can imagine what a boon this is to the space scientists who have to worry about their weights."

More than anything else, he concluded, the transistor and the new avenues opened by it, prove once again that nothing is impossible for the mind and hand of man.

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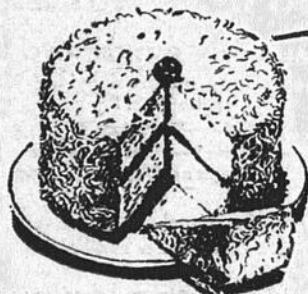
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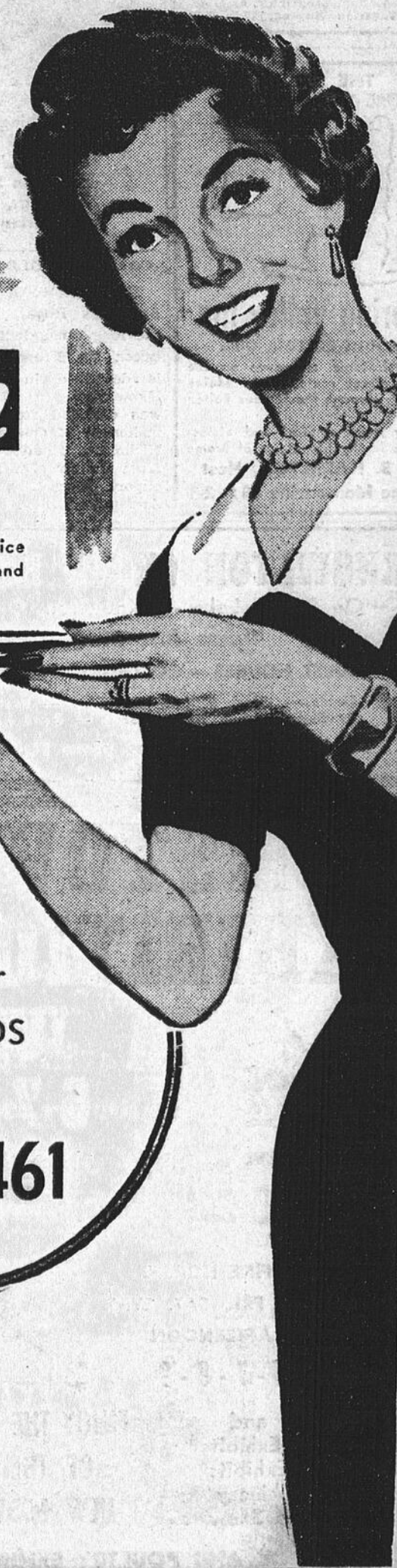
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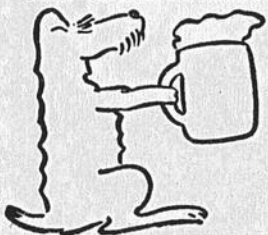

Rose Goldblatt Premieres Isadore Freed Piano Suite

The first performance of the Suite for Piano, written last summer by the American composer Isadore Freed, and dedicated to the Canadian pianist Rose Goldblatt, will be presented on the Sunday morning Recital of the CBC Trans-Canada network this coming Sunday morning, June 3rd, with Miss Goldblatt herself as the soloist.

Dr. Freed was invited to spend several months at Yaddo, the camp that has been established near Saratoga, N.Y. by an American foundation, to provide leading creative artists with facilities for undisturbed work in inspirational surroundings. It was here that he wrote the piano suite, along with five other major works. Miss Goldblatt's many premiere performances of contemporary music have included two other works by Dr. Freed, presented at the American Music Festival in New York City some time ago.

Rose Goldblatt's program for this June 3rd broadcast will open with a sonata by the 18th century English composer Thomas Arne, followed by the Suite for Piano by Isadore Freed, and will end with the Impromptu in B flat, opus 142 no. 3 by Schubert. It is of special interest that Miss Goldblatt's performance of this same Schubert Impromptu brought her to Dr. Freed's attention during another broadcast some dozen years ago. He wrote expressing his appreciation of her playing, at the same time offering some of his own music for her consideration. This started a musical friendship that has flourished in the intervening years, culminating in the dedication to her of his latest piano work.

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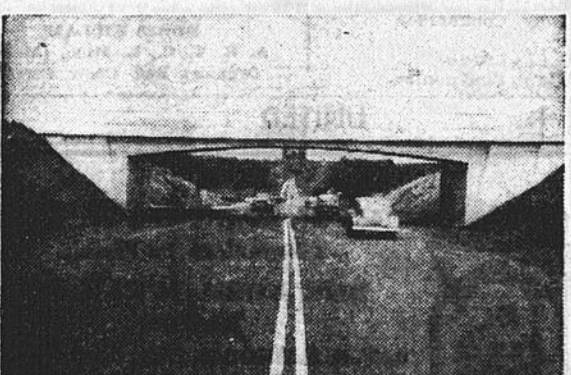
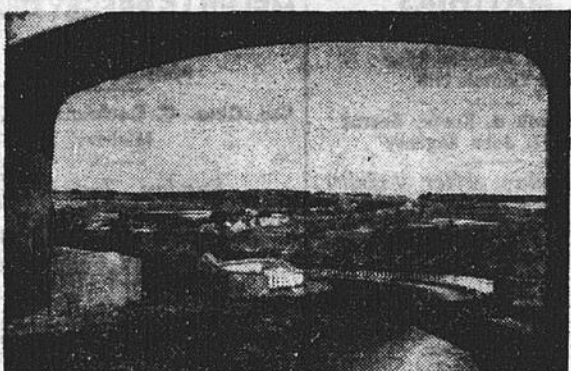

FORGES AHEAD IN ROAD BUILDING

In 1936 Quebec's whole road system was 30 years out of date. There was not one good road between any two important centers. Even the Montreal-Quebec road sadly needed rebuilding, and was notorious for its many dangerous rail-road grade crossings.

The Duplessis government rebuilt this Highway (No. 2) and abolished 14 of these "death traps".

Today, Quebec has roads extending 42,578 miles of which 25,794 miles—over half the total—are completely cared for by the Province.

7,961 miles of road have modern asphalt or cement surfaces.

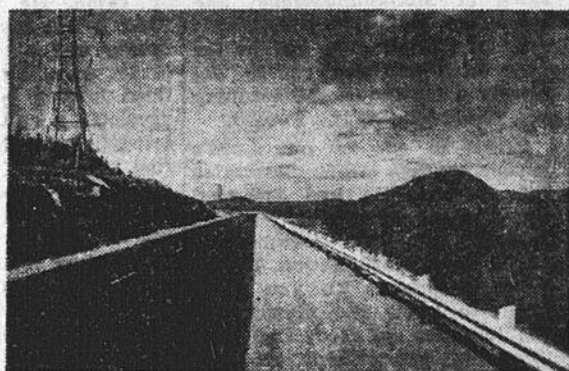
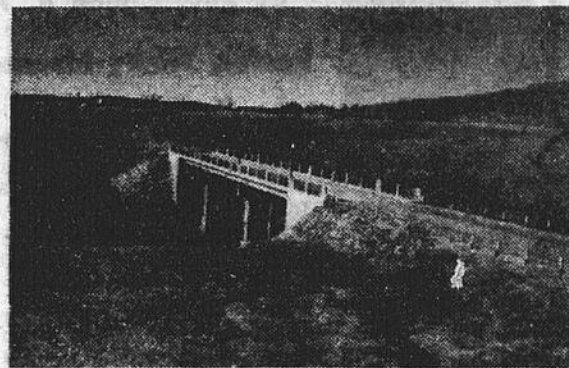
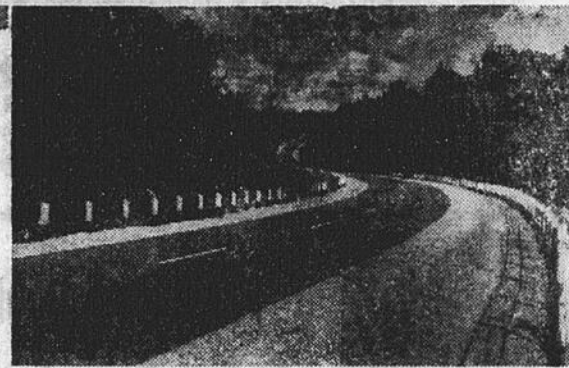

Faith and Doubt VI

Rector, Trinity Memorial Church

The second source of criticism comes from equally sincere people who stand entirely apart from the Church. They range all the way from Adolf Hitler to H. G. Wells, and from Buddhists to Jehovah Witnesses. Their criticisms are due in part to their refusal to recognize Jesus Christ as the supreme revelation of God, and in part to their absorption in the world around them.

As long as men stand outside the church they cannot understand it. You may say the same of Mohammedanism and Buddhism. But it is particularly true of Christianity, for in the case of Christianity it is not simply a matter of the teaching but even more of the Person.

There is one of our Lord's harder sayings which illustrates the problem. He had delivered the Parable of the Sower and presently the Twelve came and asked for an explanation. He replied to them: "To you it is given to know the mystery of the kingdom of God; but unto them that are without, all these things are done in parables: that seeing they may see, and not perceive; and hearing they may hear, and not understand; lest at any time they should be converted and their sins should be forgiven them." That is a hard saying and obviously it is not the whole reason for the parables, but it is a real one. It is the reminder that as long as you stay outside of the Kingdom you are not going to understand it. Our Lord compared the Kingdom to a city set on a hill, that is, in the full view of the world, but at the same time separated from the world by its walls, its way of life its peculiar worship and even its language. The world goes by but the life of the city goes on in its own way.

Its way of life is the way of a family, with the mutual consideration of the members for one another. And the common idea of the members is that God is the Head of the family and that He is to be approached through His Son Jesus Christ, who is Elder Brother to all in the family. That is worship, for worship

is simply the fact that we recognize in God supreme worth or value. He is the Absolute First in our family. Further, the family has a peculiar language of its own. You may have noticed how a large family does develop a peculiar dialect. If you bring in a stranger he will often find himself at a loss to understand the allusions and cross-references in the flow of conversation. One member starts to tell a story and there is a burst of laughter before the story is well begun. The others all know the ending and the story does not need to be told. The outsider is still an outsider. But he may be adopted into the family and he begins to understand it.

Perhaps that is the reason also that some of those who are inside are at a loss. They have been so concerned with the world outside that they have forgotten the language of their own City of God. How many of us for example, are at home with such words as repentance, conversion, faith, grace, sanctification? Perhaps if we were more at home with our own proper language we should not be afraid of such facts as miracles the Fatherhood of God, the Divinity of Jesus, the Communion of Saints, the Resurrection of the Body, and the Life Everlasting. If we are by the Grace of God within the City, let us enjoy the full privileges of the City without questioning every fact in it.

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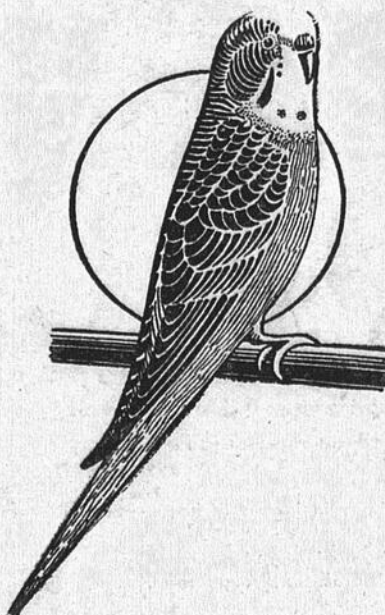
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Mrs. J. Savoy Elected President Of Mtl. Soldiers' Wives' League

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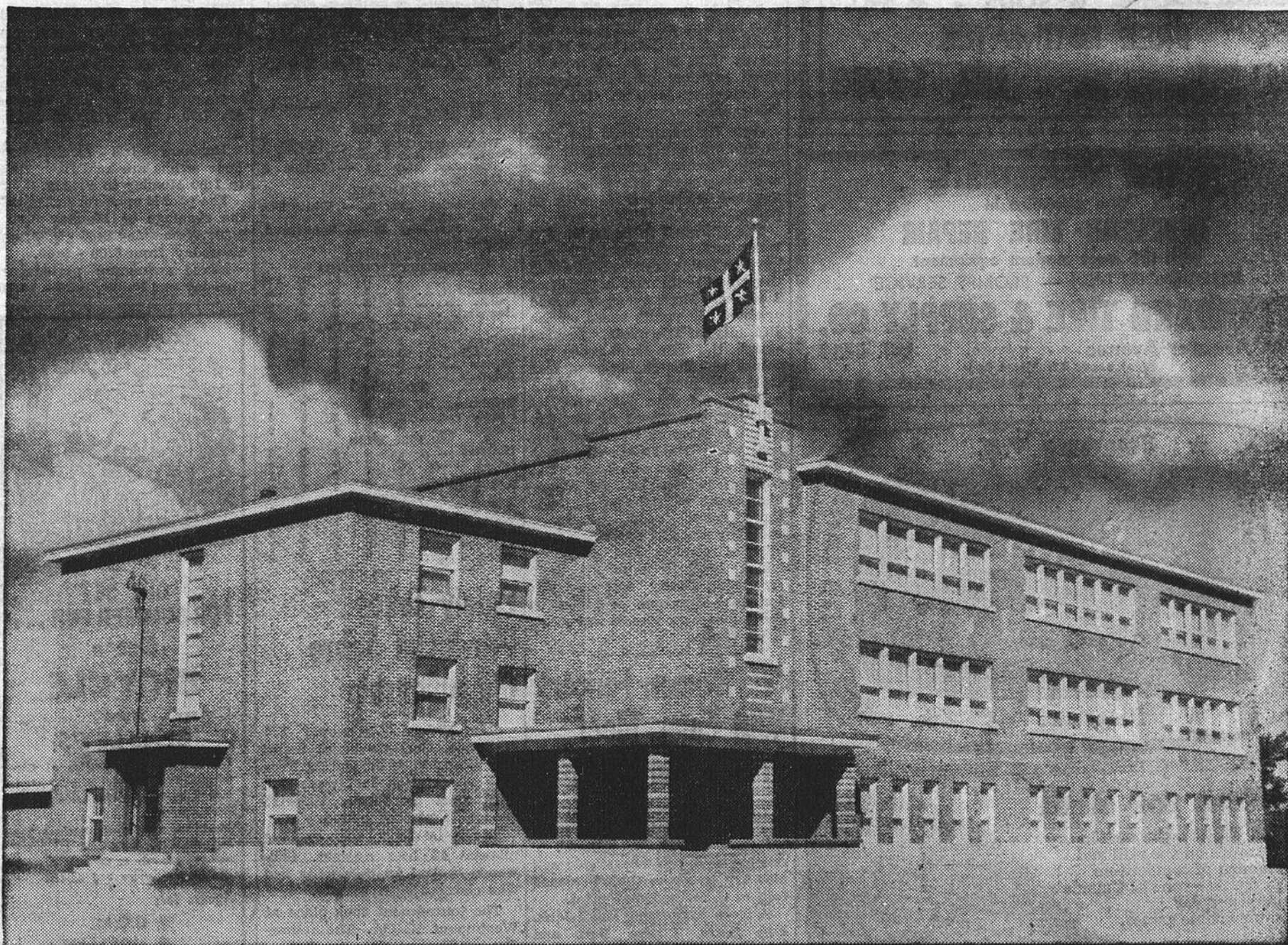
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Lions Orioles, Red Sox Gain Early Lead In LL

of four hits and tied the count, making the score 7-all going into the last inning.

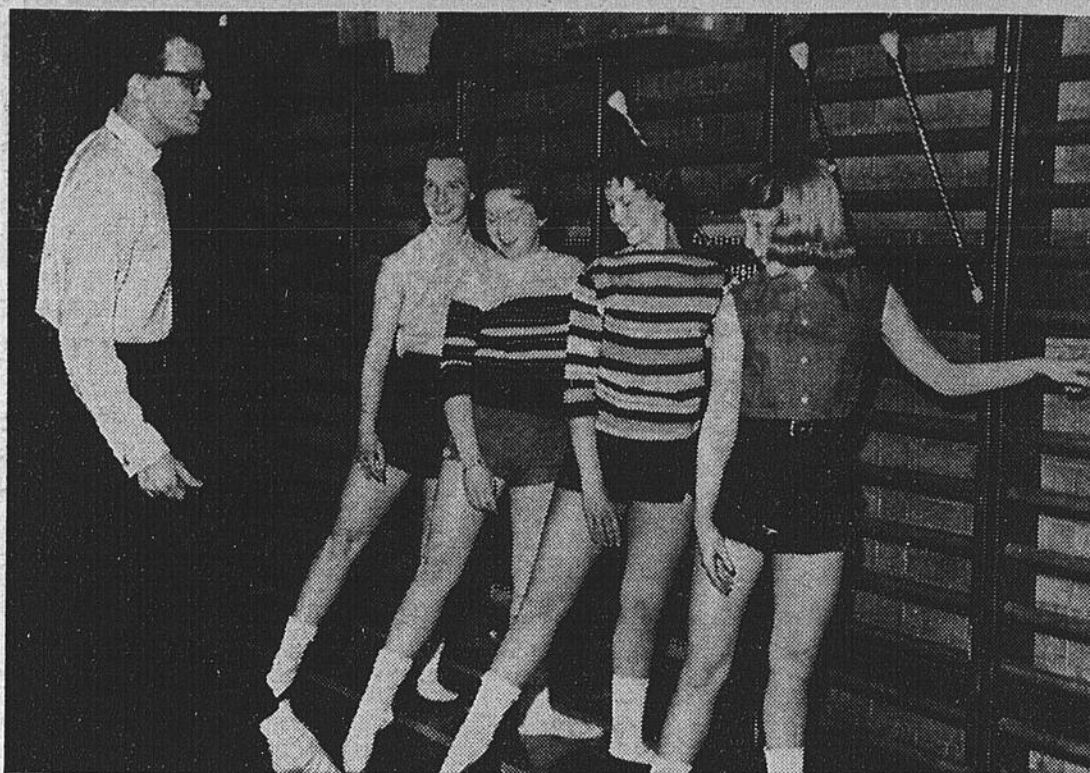

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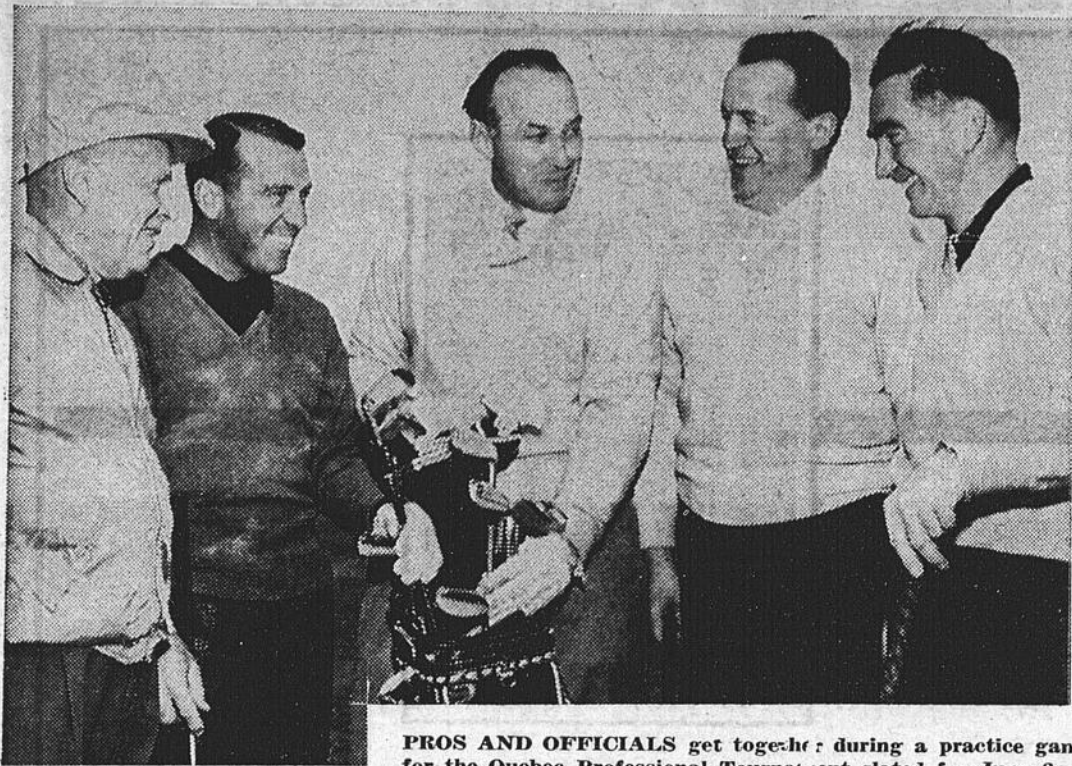

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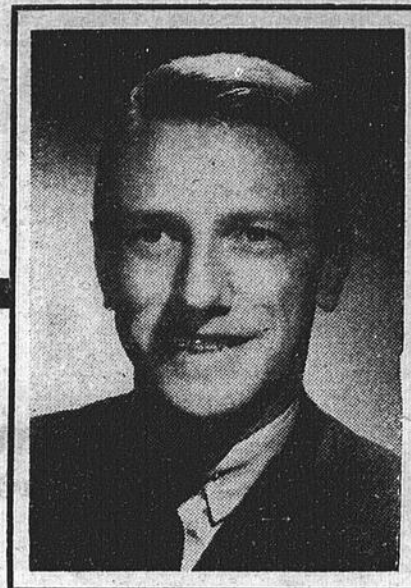
