

# Remembrance service on Sunday afternoon

Westmount's annual and traditional commemorative service to mark Remembrance Day and the dead of the First and Second World War will be held Sunday afternoon beginning at 2.30 o'clock.

The service will be held as usual at the Westmount War Memorial in front of the City Hall on Sherbrooke street and the memorial service will be conducted by Capt. The Reverend J. N. Doidge, of St. Matthias Church, chaplain of the Royal Montreal Regiment.

The Regiment will march to the ceremony from the Armoury on St. Catharine street and music for the march and the service will be supplied by the band of the RMR.

Service will commence with the singing of 'O Canada' which will be followed by a hymn 'O Valiant Hearts'.

Following the reading of the Scripture, there will be prayers for those who paid the supreme sacrifice, for a spirit of dedication on the part of the living, for the Queen and Common-

wealth and for peace and brotherhood among nations.

Following the Lord's Prayer, in which the assembly will join, wreaths will be laid at the base of the Cenotaph by representatives of The City of Westmount, the various military units, special ladies committees, civic organizations and societies and by private individuals.

Then will follow the second hymn of the service "Abide with me" following which there will be the sounding of the Last Post, two minutes silence and Reveille.

The service will conclude with the singing of the National Anthem.

Saluting base for the March Past will be at the intersection of Cote St. Antoine Road (north side) and Stanton street.

# Happy days here now says Finance-editor

Quebec's separatists may well become — in 20 years — the most conservative of small-'c' conservatives in Confederation, Westmount Rotarians were told Wednesday, and the economic facts of the province may well be the factor that does the trick.

The speaker was John Meyer, financial editor of The Montreal Gazette, and he told Rotarians that financially things are good in the province of Quebec, have been good for the past two or three years and will remain good for a few more.

"As a mater of fact" he said, "even in 1968 there will be considerable employment cleaning up after the World's Fair."

Statistics, he said, are still hard to come by in Quebec province, but he believed that one could see the signs of prosperity all around "in the new buildings, the new mills, the new plants."

Listing factors that he felt helped to boom the economy, he spoke of new developments by pulp and paper, and particularly by the automotive industry and the steel industry.

That the provincial government was taking a hand in financing the auto industry's expansion

here and the steel complex, he did not find out-of-the-way, although he expressed the belief that in both cases the government would bow out, when the operations became self-supporting.

Many English-speaking residents of the province, he said, were disturbed by the Lesage Government's accent on and reliance on planning when that government first took power in 1960.

However, he lauded as one of the best signs for the future the fact that just this week an announcement had filtered into the press which indicated that the government's first 5-year economic plan was destined for the shelf — because the government apparently realized that the initial planning was not realistic in the face of the economic facts.

An 11-year-old boy was slightly

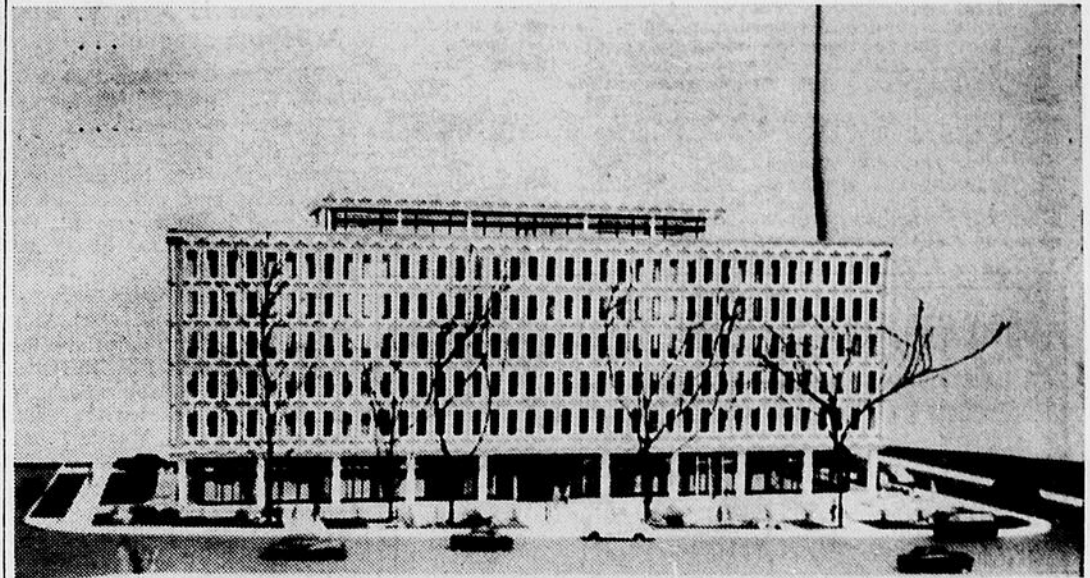

## WESTMOUNT LIFE INSURANCE BUILDING REPORTED GOING AHEAD 'ON SCHEDULE'

Work on the six-storey Westmount Life Insurance Building at Sherbrooke and Mount Pleasant avenue is going ahead on schedule.

"We began pouring the roof this week," a spokesman for the builders and owners, David

Bloom & Co., reported to the Examiner. "We'll start pouring the curtain wall the first week in December."

Mechanical, plumbing, and heating work is in progress on the site, he said. The office building will be ready for occupancy May 1, 1965 as scheduled. Architects for the build-

ing are C. Kahn and Kotansky.

Demolition work on the site was begun in April after City Council approved the re-zoning of nine Sherbrooke street properties covering the entire Mt. Pleasant - Elm block. Principal tenants of the building will be the Westmount Life Insurance Company.

# Important money is tied up as 2 projects are delayed

Important money is tied up in Westmount while two major projects hang fire — Westmount Plaza at Atwater and St. Catherine, and Westmount Centre, in the

Greene-Western-Wood avenues vicinity.

Both projects are hung up by injunctions and building has been stopped on the two projects for almost a full year.

In the case of West End Plaza, Judge Bousquet gave lawyers for each side a period of three weeks to present written opinions.

He will then take them 'en délibéré'.

In Westmount circles, however, a decision is hoped for as soon as possible.

In the case of the Westmount Centre, where a technicality in the length of time given by the city in advertising the governing by-law threw matters awry, it is believed that the owners will bring a redrafted and improved presentation before the council before the end of November.

 at new Selwyn House**

Enrolment at Selwyn House has nearly doubled since the school moved into its new quarters, the old Westmount High, in 1961. J. B. Bourne retiring chairman of the board reported at the schools annual meeting.

**Backler  
 acting  
 mayor**

Alderman I. S. Backler has been appointed Acting Mayor of the City of Westmount for the months of November and December.

The appointment was one of several items dealt with at the November 2 meeting of the Westmount City Council.

Approved was a by-law to meet current expenses and other expenses of the City for the fiscal year 1965, and to levy the school tax, imposed by Provincial statute for the fiscal year 1964-65.

A total of \$31,120 was passed to provide for labor and material not covered by the initial contract for the renovation of Westmount Park. The money is for additional work and material required to complete Phase one.

"We had 265 boys when we moved, now we have 405 which is very nearly the capacity we've set of 425," Mr. Bourne stated in his report.

The school policy puts the emphasis on individual attention in small classes and a larger enrolment would endanger this, he said.

The last two years of high school were added to the curriculum when the school moved to Cote St. Antoine Road and the first college entrance class graduated last year.

"Now we will give consideration to including senior matriculation in the curriculum," Mr. Bourne said explaining the school's expansion plans.

The teaching staff has been increased by three masters including one French specialist. R. A. Speirs, headmaster reported. This brings the total staff to 20 plus one part-time.

Selwyn House's first French grammar school was held during the past summer with 75 pupils attending for three weeks. "It was very successful and will be continued next summer," Mr. Speirs said.

**'Mums' bloom in Fall show**

With Alderman Fred Gross as master-of-ceremonies and Mayor C. H. Drury and Hon. Richard Hyde, speaker of the Legislative Assembly, sharing the podium with him — Westmount officially launched its annual autumn chrysanthemum show Wednesday at the tea hour.

Yesterday the general public turned up to see the masses of blooms—some 3,850 plants in all — and both groups termed the show 'excellent'.

At the tea-session at Victoria Hall prizes were presented in the annual gardening competition. Winners were:

Mayor J. S. Cameron Trophy: St. Paul's Academy; R. Panel-Raymond Trophy: Roslyn School.

1st prize, Leigh Davidson, Roslyn School; 2nd prize, Ellen Gould Westmount Park School (Room 306); 3rd prize, Lucia Amodei, St. Paul's Academy; 4th prize, Martin Cukierman, Westmount Park School (Room 306); 5th prize, Claude Bacon, St. Leo's School; Special prize, Cathy McMaster, Westmount Park School.

The trophies are awarded on the basis of the number of plants given to each School, the percentage returned for judging, and the general condition of the plants.

St. Paul's Academy received 55 plants, returned 28, in good condition for 51%; Roslyn School received 136 plants, returned 68 in

good condition, for 50%; Westmount Park School received 196 plants, returned 20 in good condition, for 9%; St. Leo's School received 117 plants, returned 8 in good condition for 7%. Total

plants received by schools was 504, total returned was 124.

## WE SAY Reflections 1914-1964

SUNDAY afternoon under leaden autumn skies Westmount will bow before the Cenotaph to mark Remembrance Day — 50 years after the start of World War I and 25 years after the start of World War II; truly a moment for sober reflection.

Hymns will be sung and prayers offered and wreaths will be laid, as they have been annually since 1918 when on November 11th, "at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month" the Greatest Conflict the world had ever known came to a halt.

Yet, by 1939 — just a quarter of a century later — death was again reaping its war-toll over the world in another Greatest Conflict and for the same avowed purpose: to make the world safe for democracy.

Sunday afternoon — in the two minutes silence between the sounding of the Last Post and the challenge of Reveille — many will doubtless ask themselves "What has been accomplished?"

Reading the world news, listening to the irrational claims of the Goldwaters of the world, and even some of our own local maledictions, we might well wonder.

Sunday — if the Better Way is to be approached — may all everywhere marking the great Remembrance determine in solemn vow to do whatever possible to aid in the true spirit of brotherhood.

There is no other way — no easy route to peace among mankind.

## YOU SAY Lauds Westmount street-cleaning

Sir: I want to pay what I believe is a well-earned tribute to the Westmount street-cleaning department.

Going outside of the municipality after Hallowe'en night, I noted that many sections still suffered from small loose candies on the sidewalks and roads, as well as from peas in the gutters, doubtless the result of the traditional pea-shooters fray among Hallowe'en merrymakers.

These made for poor footing, and I narrowly escaped a serious tumble.

## 25 Years Ago in The Examiner Thursday Nov. 9, 1939

Twenty-five years ago Westmount was preparing to mark Remembrance Day while her sons were engaged in a new fight for freedom.

J. Arthur Mathewson, K.C., a life-long resident of Westmount, was sworn in as the new Provincial treasurer. He was elected in the neighboring division of Notre Dame de Grace. Mr. Mathewson's appointment was expected, but some surprise was expressed that Gordon Hyde, elected in Westmount, was omitted from the Cabinet.

In appointing Mr. Mathewson to the important portfolio, Premier Godbout followed the tradition which decrees that a French Catholic will be premier, and an English Protestant his chief associate. Next to the office of Premier, the Treasury is the most important of the entire slate, being the Provincial equivalent of the Federal Ministry of Finance, the Examiner story said.

The Right Rev. Arthur Carlisle, Bishop of Montreal, addressing the Rotary Club of Westmount, said Remembrance Day was meant to recall the heroic sacrifices of the millions who gave their lives in the Great War.

If all the men who gave their lives marched in columns of four abreast, it would take five days and five nights for Britain's dead to pass, seven days and seven nights for France's, 10 days and 10 nights for Germany's, and 14 days and 14 nights for Russia's. That meant 36 days and 36 nights for the steady marching by of the army of dead alone, Rev. Carlisle said.

"There is only one call that comes from Remembrance day," he said, "and that is the call to peace. It is hypocrisy for us to bow our heads silently in honor of the dead if we do not do all in our power to make war hereafter impossible."

The League of Nations may have been a wonderful instrument, if it had been backed up by the enthusiasm of the rank and file of the citizens of the land that originally brought it into being. There must be a personal effort to bring about peace, he added.

## Re-examination urged for older drivers

MANY older motorists who are seventy or more years of age are still good drivers and are careful and reliable. But at this age, their reactions may be slower, their sight less keen and their hearing less acute.

For their own safety and their families' sake, they would be well advised to take a re-examination for driving perhaps annually. When a long trip is necessary, the older person should have a qualified driver with him to take turns at the wheel.

Fast travel is not for the older driver, who is usually mindful of speed limits.

## Your MP reports from Ottawa

OTTAWA—One hundred and eighty days of sittings had elapsed, by end of last week, since we opened this second session of Parliament. And while quite a number of those days were devoted to the study and approval of many pieces of important legislation, a record-breaking portion of our time was taken up by delaying tactics on the part of the opposition.

Out of those 180 days, we have spent 25 days looking at interim supply — bills that give the government the required funds to pay its current expenses. And here, it is interesting to note that for all of the nine sessions that took place between 1956 and 1962, it only took the House 24 days to pass interim supply! During the 1959 and the 1962 sessions, it was disposed of in two days.

Now, it is of course, the responsibility of the House to examine government spending. But a full opportunity to do this series when each department of government brings in its estimates for approval. So far this year the House has given final approval to the estimates of eight departments and has started studying those of nine other departments. Only six departments have yet to introduce a forecast of their spendings. All of this has amounted so far to 50 days of work for the Members.

The 25 days spent on interim supply covered a wide range of topics — with the C.B.C. a prime target. The case of Hal Banks was another favorite subject, as were special complaints of specific immigration cases,

eastern farming, the Canadian participation in the Olympic Games, the film entitled "Mr. Pearson", the Quebec Eskimo population, unemployment, mental health, veterans hospitals, ground transportation to air terminals and a host of other matters. In many cases, the grievances were aired for days on end, interrupting all other work in the House, as the Opposition delayed the passage of interim supply to the last deadline — the time at which the government would have had no other recourse than to call for the dissolution of the House . . . and an election.

Many of these grievances are genuine and important, but the proper time to bring them up is when the department concerned has its estimates studied for approval. So far this year, interim supply has been used primarily to prevent the government from proceeding with such important measures as redistribution — the reshaping of Canada's electoral map.

One major metropolitan newspaper said last week that at a time when the government lacks a clear majority in the House, the opposition, perhaps inevitably, makes the most of its unusual powers. It is clearly evident that it does, but I do not agree that this should be inevitable. Surely, the first duty of every Member of Parliament is to work in the best interests of all Canadians and a Member hardly serves this purpose when first and foremost he thinks in terms of his own political advantage. On that basis, it is difficult to explain how a job that was disposed of in a total of 24 days for nine sessions should have taken 25 days so far in the current session!

## Nine new ballets

In a burst of artistic creation, the company of Les Grands Ballets Canadiens will bring nine new ballets to its repertoire, which already boasts over fifty works, when it makes its first appearance of the new season at the Comédie Canadienne, from November 11 to 15. One of these will be "Variations for Four", with choreography by the great Anton Dolin, newly attached to the company on a permanent basis as artistic advisor, since last summer.

The director of the company, Ludmilla Chiriaeff, will bring an impressive complement of thirty-four dancers, with full orchestra, headed by Canadian stars Anna-Marie and David Holmes, with the return as guest artist of Margaret Mercier, and the addition of the renowned French dancer and choreographer Daniel Seillier.

In addition to the "Variations for Four", the eight other new works include:

"Fête Hongroise", a classical ballet with choreography inspired by the Hungarian dances by Brahms, which will have its Canadian premiere in Montreal on November 11.

"Trapeze", which Daniel Seillier had created for the company of the Marquis de Cuevas. As performed by its creator and Margaret Mercier, it depicts the

close friendship between partners in a trapeze act, interrupted by the proverbial lovers' triangle which ultimately leads to death under the circus tent.

"Medea", with an electronic score by Georges Savaria, and choreography by Brydon Paige. It will be the first such ballet introduced here by Les Grands Ballets Canadiens.

"Espagnola", again conceived by Brydon Paige who, in a classical style, has captured the essence of the Spanish dance of the 18th century, on music by E. Granados and J. Jimenez.

"Le Corsaire", a pas de deux by Marius Petipa, on music by Drigo, which Anna-Marie and David Holmes performed with the Ballet Kirov, in Leningrad, and which revives the grand Russian tradition of the last century.

But the Reverend Mr. Love is not at all ready to write "finis" to his work. "I hope I may still be of some service to The Church" he told The Examiner yesterday.

Born in Ontario, and educated in Quebec Province at the University of Bishop's College in Lennoxville, Mr. Love took over Westmount in the month of November in 1943, just 21 years ago.

In the past two decades he has seen many and important changes in the immediate area of the church at the corner of Dorchester and Atwater avenue, and in the congregation.

In 1943 the stately three-storey brick and stone residences along Dorchester, running west from Atwater were still in their prime — and it was a regular Sunday morning sight to witness members of many prominent local families wending their leisurely way towards St. Stephen's for the formal and lengthy worship of the day.

But progress has waved its wand — and much of the area around St. Stephen's has been laid waste, some for parking lots and some for steel and cement structures that spelled the end of an era.

Only Saturday afternoon the ladies of St. Stephen's held their annual sale of needle-work and baked goods, catering to each other and a small circle of friends who annually look forward to this tie with by-gone days.

And as they chatted at the tea-tables, the conversation drifted at times to the changes in and around St. Stephen's.

It would be correct to say there was an air of uncertainty. No successor to Mr. Love has as yet been appointed.

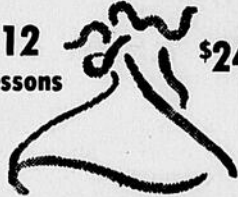

## Oral School for Deaf opens 1964 campaign

How can children who have never heard the human voice be taught to talk?

Mr. D. Ling, principal of the Montreal Oral School reports that most deaf children have the ability to hear some sounds when properly reproduced and amplified. This is known as residual hearing.

Taking part in the schools program to provide maximum use of this residual hearing is Westmounter Heather McCollm, of 337 Selby street.

Like her fifty classmates, Heather, will progress until she is able to enter a normal school.

The sole reason for the existence of the 14-year-old Montreal Oral School for the Deaf is that some day children born deaf will talk fluently. Students who attend the Oral School will

not be restricted to sign-language, or mouthing words in a monotone voice.

To do this the school needs public support. It requires approximately \$1,200 per annum to educate each deaf child, exclusive of the cost of accommodation.

This year the campaign of the Montreal Oral School runs from Nov. 2 to the 16th. The aim is \$50,000. Sixty-seven per cent of the school's yearly income must be obtained from this drive.

Ninety per cent of the school's yearly budget goes to pay the trained specialists employed by the school. In addition to providing class rooms in the Iona avenue School, the Protestant School Board of Greater Montreal makes a per capita grant for each child of normal school age in its jurisdiction.

This, together with nominal fees from parents, is the only assured revenue of the school. Specialized equipment which is in daily use has been mostly donated by various organizations. The school receives no aid from the government.

The school, in addition to its specialized program, also makes sure that the children follow the same curriculum as hearing students in other schools. Education at the Oral School enables the students to transfer to regular classes as soon as possible, Mr. Ling said.

Sixty-two per cent of the deaf children of English-speaking parentage in the province are enrolled at the Montreal Oral School. In the fourteen years of operation the school has sent out eleven children who are presently continuing their education throughout normal school systems.

These graduates are living proof that deaf children can talk and hold their own, thanks to the Montreal Oral School for the Deaf, Mr. Ling concluded.

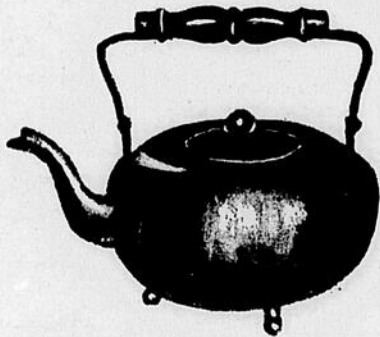
