ANNUAL MEETING OF SHERBROOKE PROTESTANT HOSPITAL

Mr B. C. Howard Chosen President. Annual Report Reviews Year's Operations. New Hospital to be Erected. Proposal to Change Name to Eastern Townships General Hospital.

Several surprises were sprung at the annual meeting of the Corporation of the Sherbrooke, Protestant Hospital held in the Art Hall yesterday afternoon. One was the retirement of Mr. William Farwell from the presidency, another the proposal to drop the word "Protestant" from the name of the hospital and call the institution the Eastern Townships General Hospital or the Sherbrooke General Hospital.

During the past year the donations from the public were smaller than the previous year, and it was felt that this was in a measure due to

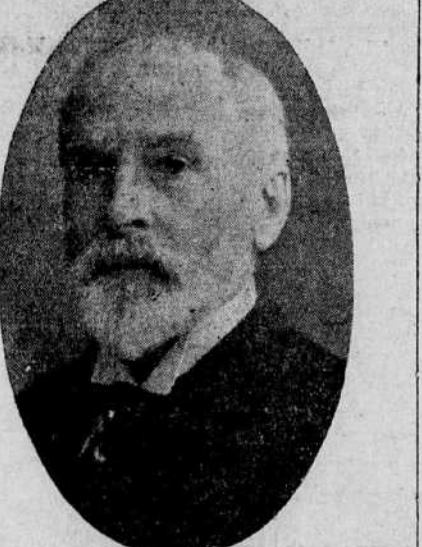


MR. B. C. HOWARD, New President of the Sherbrooke Protestant Hospital.

the delay in erecting the much talked of new hospital. The new officers, under the direction of Mr. B. C. Howard, the new president, will take the matter of a new hospital and other pressing needs in hand at once.

The hospital has now a fund of about \$66,000 available for the construction of a new building, and it is the intention of the officers and governors to decide on plans as quickly as possible.

Mr. Wm. Farwell opposed the pro-



MR. WILLIAM FARWELL, Hon. President Sherbrooke Protestant Hospital.

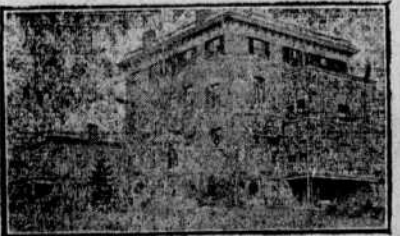
posal to drop the word "Protestant" from the name of the hospital. A vote to test the feeling of the meeting on the matter was taken and his vote was the only one recorded against the proposition.

The meeting was well attended and considerable interest manifested. Among those present were J. S. Mitchell, B. C. Howard, H. D. Lawrence, L. A. Bayley, Jas. Mackinnon, C. W. Cate, W. R. Webster, W. H. Wilson, T. J. Parkes, G. A. LeBaron, N. N. Walley, Dr. Bradley, Dr. Williams, Dr. Mackay, Dr. Farwell, Jos. Rosenbloom, E. C. Goodhue and many others.

ANNUAL REPORTS.

The reports of the year's work were read and on the whole were satisfactory. They are published in full below.

The chairman, in moving the adop-



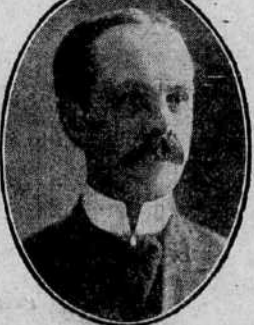
SHERBROOKE PROTESTANT HOSPITAL, WHICH WILL SOON BE REPLACED BY NEW AND MODERN BUILDING.

tion of the financial report, referred to a few matters contained therein. He presumed the corporation had become tired of listening to a reference in the reports that the municipalities had not contributed anything to the funds of the hospital. The best thing they could do was to keep on working for what they wanted and eventually they might get it. Patients were continually being sent up whom they could not turn away, and the cost came out of the money that was collected. There was no reason at all why the municipalities should not come forward to help them in this work. The receipts from the public had been smaller than in the preceding year, but some amounts did not come in until after the books were

closed; these would have augmented the receipts by \$1,000. In the last year's account \$326 was included as proceeds from the charity ball. This and other items which did not appear in this year's accounts would make a difference of over \$1,000, but notwithstanding that, matters had come out in very good shape. Their position stood very well and if the items mentioned were included they would have practically balanced up evenly for the year. The number of days patients were treated were nearly 500 more.

With regard to the new hospital a good deal had been done, although there was not much to show for it—no progress had been made in the building. Mr. Lawrence had prepared plans for accommodating 80 persons, which were very satisfactory, but they had to drop them without asking for tenders, as the cost of the building would have been too great. Mr. Lawrence was now working on other plans which were designed for the accommodation of 60 persons. The funds available in connection with the new hospital were \$56,000.

Referring to the Executive Committee's report, the chairman stated that the cost of living per person had

not increased over last year, which was a favorable comparison in view of the extra cost of living to-day. The hospital and the advantage of as great medical skill as could be found in the largest city hospitals.

Mr. J. S. Mitchell seconded the adoption of the report, which was unanimously agreed to.

Messrs. C. G. Brown, Ald. Ewing and E. J. Page were elected on the board of governors.

TREATMENT OF TUBERCULAR PATIENTS.

Mrs. S. A. Jones asked if anything could be done in the construction of the new building to afford accommodation for the treatment of the first stages of tuberculosis.

The chairman thought it would be impracticable in the same building and asked Dr. Williams to state his opinion.

Dr. Williams did not think it was

at all practicable. With regard to tubercular cases no safe arrangement could be made to treat them under the same roof. They would have to be treated in the same way as infectious cases. It would be an absolute danger to treat them otherwise.

Mr. Bayley advocated the provision of a tuberculosis wing in the infectious hospital.

Dr. Williams replied that at the Civic Hospital one case of smallpox prohibited the treatment of any other case, because the only person in charge was the housekeeper and she had to devote her whole time to that patient. He also criticized the equipment and furnishing of the Civic Hospital.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

Mr. Farwell said he had been chairman for eight years, and after giving much thought to the matter felt he could not be a candidate again. He would like to propose Mr. B. C. Howard, whom he believed would fulfil the duties of the chair in a satisfactory and energetic manner.

This was seconded and carried. In returning thanks Mr. Howard said his election was a surprise to him, and it would be difficult for him to follow Mr. Farwell. He thought every governor should be willing to take his turn as chairman, and consequently they would not expect him to fill the position for more than one year.

Mr. James Mackinnon proposed a vote of thanks to Mr. Farwell, and moved that he be elected hon. president in consideration of his faithful

MONTREAL LADIES GET LARGE FORTUNES

\$1,500,000 Each to Mrs. R. S. Logan and Her Two Sisters

PROVISIONS OF WILL ARE THAT PARENTS MUST NOT GET ONE PENNY.

St. Louis, Mo., February 18.—The will of David P. Ranken, capitalist, filed yesterday in the Probate Court of St. Louis County, leaves the bulk of his millions in stock and realty holdings to three nieces living in Montreal, and Hugh R. Lyle, of 6300 Lindell Avenue, University City.

The provisions of the bequests to the nieces, Annie R. Logan, wife of Mr. R. S. Logan, vice-president of the Grand Trunk Railway, and her two sisters, Miss Mary Ranken and Miss Jessie Ranken, bind them, on pain of losing everything, not to give a single penny of their inheritance to their father or stepmother. In case any one of the nieces gives even the forbidden penny of the millions left them by their bachelor uncle to their parents, and the trustees learn of it, that niece is to be treated as if dead, and her share devolves to her descendants.

The three nieces will receive about \$1,500,000 each. The estate is valued at \$6,000,000. \$3,000,000 is in municipal bonds and high grade stock. The other millions are in real estate in St. Louis and in Ireland. A complete inventory of the estate has not yet been filed.

HIKERS GET A HOSTILE RECEPTION

Suffragettes Rescued From Attack of Small Boys by Cavalry

ESCORTED TO CHESTER, PA. BY STUDENTS AT THE PENNSYLVANIA MILITARY COLLEGE.

Chester, Pa., Feb. 18.—The marching pilgrims bound from New York to Washington in the cause of woman's suffrage, had their first hostile reception since their hike commenced at Leipsville, a small village to the north of this city, late yesterday afternoon, when they were snowballed and almost routed by a crowd of small boys. A squad of cavalry from the Pennsylvania Military College went gallantly to the rescue, put the young opponents of the movement to route, and escorted "General" Rosalie Jones and her army to this city, where they will spend the night.

Prominent women suffragists from Wilmington, Delaware, joined with sympathizers in this city in giving the pilgrims a reception of a nature which did much to make them forget the hardships of their march from Philadelphia.

KNOWLTON HOME MAY NOT BE REBUILT

Society, it is Said, Want to go to More Central Location

BOTH HYDRANTS WERE FROZEN WHEN FIREMEN ARRIVED AT SCENE OF FIRE.

Knowlton, Feb. 18.—(Special)—There is a talk around town that the Home for boys and girls, which was gutted by fire yesterday, will not be rebuilt. It is known that the Society, under which the Home was run, wanted to leave this place about two years ago. The reason given then for wanting to do so was the fact that Knowlton was not considered central enough. The loss sustained yesterday may mean that this place will lose the institution which is so widely known throughout.

It is now learned that when the firemen arrived in response to the alarm of fire from the Home, yesterday they found both hydrants frozen and it was fully fifteen minutes before the water was turned on.

CEMETERY BOARD MEETING

A meeting of the directors of the Knowlton Cemetery was held yesterday afternoon in the County Building. Nearly all the directors were present. Mr. Reid, of Montreal, being here to attend the meeting. The regular routine business was transacted. The by-laws were revised and preparation made for future work.

SHIPMENT OF LIVE STOCK.

Messrs. Currie and Moffatt made a shipment of live stock here yesterday, consisting of 30 hogs at 81 cents per pound; 8 cattle ranging from \$25 to \$50 and six calves from \$3 to \$4.

MAWSON EXPEDITION RETURNS.

London, Feb. 18.—A despatch from Sydney, N.S.W., says that a wireless message has been received there stating that Dr. Douglas Mawson and the members of his Antarctic expedition party are on board the relief ship Aurora. All the members of the party are reported well. The expedition had not been heard from for three months.

WAR NEWS IS VERY MEAGRE

Turkish Government Has Established a Strict Censorship

New York, Feb. 18.—(Special)—A cable to the Tribune from Constantinople says: "Diplomatic circles are keenly discussing probable resumption of peace negotiations between Turkey and the Allies. The threatening relations of Roumania and Bulgaria, with their menace, and the situation existing between Russia and Austria. Operations at Tchaikaldia and in Gallipoli since the re-opening of the war have been indecisive."

MEN HAVE DIED BY HUNDREDS.

Men have died by hundreds on both sides, but the positions of the belligerents remain unaffected. After the late coup d'etat by the Young Turks, Kiamil Pasha was quoted as predicting that when Shoukiet Pasha came face to face with the situation he would want peace just as badly as the ousted Government wanted it. This prediction has now been verified, but although the position of the Turks is not such as to require precipitate overtures for peace, growing tension between Roumania and Bulgaria is causing a lull between Turkey and the Allies.

STRICT CENSORSHIP.

London, Feb. 18.—(Special)—News of operations in the Balkan war is extremely meagre, as despatches from Constantinople are subjected to long delay, owing to the strict censorship established by the Turkish Government. One of the cable companies says communication by its route has been interrupted near Pera. For what reason it cannot ascertain.

200 HOUSES BURNED.

The fire which broke out in the district surrounding the great Mosque of St. Sophia, in Constantinople, yesterday, was extinguished late in the night, after 200 houses and shops had been burned to the ground.

ENVER BEY DENIES REPORT

Berlin, Feb. 18.—(Special)—Enver Bey, Young Turk leader, who was reported yesterday to have been severely wounded by a would-be assassin, telegraphed to some friends here today denying reports, and declaring that he was safe in Peninsula of Gallipoli.

BARBAMONT OF ADRIANOPLE

Vienna, Feb. 18.—A Constantinople despatch to Die Zeit says that Enver Bey was killed by an assassin.

BIG FIRE IN CONSTANTINOPLE.

Constantinople, Feb. 18.—The quarter adjoining the St. Sophia Mosque in Constantinople is burning. A hundred and fifty houses so far have been destroyed.

A heavy bombardment of Adrianople occurred on Sunday. It is said that the situation around Bulair is unchanged. A Bulgarian column is advancing through Belgrade forest, to the west of Derkos Lake, in the direction of Ormanli, and are fortifying the heights west of Sivaskul.

ALLIES SUSPEND ATTACK.

London, Feb. 18.—A Cettinje despatch to the Times says that the allies' attack on Scutari has been suspended until the completion of certain military preparations.

THREE CHILDREN DROWNED.

Seymour, Conn., Feb. 18.—While playing on the honeycombed ice of the Naugatuck River three small children were drowned, the ice giving way beneath their weight.

FEDERAL GUNS INEFFECTIVE TO DISLODGE REBELS IN MEXICO CITY

Mexico City, February 18.—President Madero yesterday received the reply of President Taft to his telegram protesting against possible intervention, in which President Taft assured him that the reports of the intention of the United States Government to land forces in Mexico were inaccurate.

"I never expected anything less than this," commented Madero on President Taft's message. "I regard it as satisfactory and friendly."

The fighting continued throughout the day, but the federal guns were quite as ineffective as ever in dislodging the rebels from their entrenched and fortified positions. Furthermore, the federalists did not show the same aggressiveness which characterized their action in the early days of the battle. This is believed to be due to the fact that they realize

that for the present the Government forces are not of sufficient strength to defeat the rebels.

Both on Sunday and yesterday Madero appeared sanguine of the ultimate success of the federal army. He declared that the outlook was optimistic and that he had been offered support of all kinds. In his opinion Zapata, the guerrilla leader, was not in favor of Diaz in the present movement.

Nearly all the non-combatants have moved out of the real danger zone. Bread and cornmeal are abundant in the Capital and are being distributed among the poor.

DE LA BARRA A CONSPIRATOR.

Mexico City, February 18.—It is reported that Francisco de la Barra will be arrested at the first opportunity for alleged complicity in the rebellion.

DR. FRIEDMANN WILL ATTEMPT CURE

Has Left For New York With Serum For Cure of Tuberculosis

WILL ENDEAVOR TO CURE 95 CASES AND SECURE ONE MILLION DOLLAR FEE.

Berlin, Feb. 18.—(Special)—Dr. Friederich Friedman, whose claims to discovery of serum curing tuberculosis have been much discussed, sailed for New York to-day on steamer Kronprinzessin Cecilie.

He took with him quantity of live germs which he asserts are so efficacious, and it is understood he proposes to attempt the cure of 95 out of hundred cases of tuberculosis test for which a New York banker has offered a million dollar fee if success is attained.

SHACKLETON WILL GO SOUTH

Will Lead Another Expedition to the Antarctic Again

HUMAN LIVES ARE NOTHING IF HUMAN KNOWLEDGE IS ADDED TO.

New York, Feb. 18.—(Special)—The deaths which Captain Scott and four other men met in the Antarctic have no effect on determination of Sir Ernest Shackleton to go south again.

At a luncheon in his honor yesterday on eve of his departure for England, Shackleton re-affirmed his intention of leading another expedition, as there was "still work to be done" in the Antarctic.

"Human lives are nothing," he said, "if by going forth we can add one iota to a sum of human knowledge."

EXPLOSION ON FRENCH DREADNOUGHT

Three Naval Gunners Were Killed and Others Severely Wounded

THE DANTON WAS AT TARGET PRACTICE WHEN THE FATAL ACCIDENT OCCURRED

Toulon, France, Feb. 18.—(Special)—Three French naval gunners were killed and a number of others severely wounded by explosion of three-inch gun on board the Dreadnought Danton, during target practice by vessels of French Mediterranean fleet yesterday.

The Danton put into this port to transport wounded men to the Naval Hospital.

FIVE PERSONS DROWNED.

Philadelphia, Feb. 18.—Traacherous ice caused the death of three boys and two men near this city Saturday and Sunday. Eber Yeager, lock tender at Pawling, lost his life in attempting to save his brother, William. Yeager's wife also attempted to save the drowning men, but was rescued after she had jumped into the deep water.

IRISH TENANTS FOLLOW SUFFRAGETTE METHODS.

Dublin, Feb. 18.—Disgruntled Irish tenants are adopting suffragette methods in a protest against real estate and landlordism. The greens of the Clonmel Golf Links were ruined during the night, and as there are not known to be any suffragettes in that vicinity, blame fell upon the Irish tenants.

COUNCIL HAS APPOINTED ENGINEER TO OVERSEE OUTSIDE WORK

Mr W. H. Beaman, of Montreal, Will Act With Messrs Thos. Tremblay and Andrew Sangster as Civic Board. General Audit of Books of Every Department Will Be Made. Payment of \$100,000 to Jenckes Machine Co. Other Business Transacted.

The regular semi monthly meeting of the City Council was held, last evening, when the following were present: Ald. Jenckes, Thompson, Ewing, Masse, Forest, Prunier and Simoneau. Mayor Hebert presided.

Before the regular business of the meeting was proceeded with Mayor Hebert expressed the regret the Council felt at illness of Chief Davidson. By a resolution moved by Ald. Jenckes, seconded by Ald. Simoneau and unanimously carried the Council placed on record their regret and expressed the hope that he would soon be able to resume his duties.

THAT FAMOUS ASPHALT.

The Secretary read a letter from the Canadian Mineral Co., of Montreal, asking for payment for the asphalt sold the City last summer. The Secretary was instructed to call the Company's attention to the resolution passed by the Council some time ago, informing them that the asphalt could be left on the City's property during the winter, and next summer the Council would decide whether Pioneer Asphalt was the kind wanted or not.

OUTSIDE MAN APPOINTED.

One of the important matters dealt with last night was the appointment of the engineer to have charge of the outside work, and to act with Mr. Tremblay and Mr. Sangster as a Civic Board. Ald. Thompson, Chairman of the Road Committee, brought in a report recommending the appointment of Mr. William H. Beaman, of Montreal, as outside commissioner. The report was unanimously adopted and the secretary was instructed to write Mr. Beaman to come at once. He will be paid a salary of \$1,800 per year.

PAYMENT OF \$100,000 TO JENCKES MACHINE CO.

This matter was brought before the Council by the Mayor, who read a report from the City Attorney on the matter. According to the contract entered into between the City and the Jenckes Machine Company, the City was to pay them \$50,000 when the buildings were completed and \$50,000 when all machinery was installed. The buildings were completed last December, but the payment was not made as the City did not have the money. Now the other \$50,000 was due, and last night the Council passed a resolution authorizing the Mayor and Secretary to borrow \$100,000 from the Canadian Bank of Commerce as provided for by a previous resolution of the Council, and giving as security the bonds of the city.

WILL CONTEST ACTIONS.

A letter was read from the City Attorney advising the City to contest judgement for \$70, in the case of Orford vs. the City. This action was for several trees cut down by the City in order to get through with their wires. Ald. Thompson protested against confessing judgement, and described the action as the greatest piece of imposition he had ever heard of. The trees were not worth five dollars, and he for one would like to see the City fight the case.

CITY AUDIT.

Ald. Jenckes, Chairman of the Finance Committee, brought in a special report providing for an audit of the books of every department. The

object of this audit is to secure, if possible, suggestions by which a better system of office management can be obtained at the City Hall. The report recommended that the firm of Price, Waterhouse & Co., of Montreal, be engaged to do the work. Thirty days will be allowed for the audit.

ALD. THOMPSON'S OBJECTIONS.

Ald. Thompson, Chairman of the Road Committee, asked the Council's permission to correct a statement which recently appeared in the Record. The item in question stated that the Road Committee was spending \$18,000 per year on the roads and there was nothing to show for it. He read a statement to show that twelve thousand dollars of this amount was what could be termed a fixed charge. The amount spent on the roads was actually about seven thousand dollars.

STRAIGHTENING BROMPTON ROAD.

The Finance Committee brought in a report recommending that the Council purchase about two acres of land from the G. T. R., for the sum of five hundred dollars, in order to straighten the Brompton Road, near the G. T. R. and pit. This was a question taken up by the old Council, and recommended by them, so the Council last night accepted the report of the Finance Committee.

WANTS CITY TO PAY \$33.

A letter was read from Mr. F. T. Ansell claiming \$33 from the City, to cover legal and notarial charges incurred by him as a result of the City changing the sidewalk in front of his property, Bowen Ave. Mayor Hebert characterized this demand as "the greatest piece of cheek ever brought before the Council." He suggested that the matter be referred to the Road Committee and City Attorney, which was done.

FREE DRAWING SCHOOL.

The Finance Committee reported on the application of the Council of Arts and Manufactures, asking for assistance for their Free Drawing School in the way of providing a room. The Council voted a sum of \$50 to be used for this purpose.

C. P. R. AND FAIRBANKS BY-LAWS.

By resolution of the Council it was decided to hold a poll on the Fairbanks By-Law on Thursday, March 13th. The C. P. R. By-Law, providing for a fixed valuation of \$50,000 on the Company's property, looks as though it would have a rough and stormy passage. Several members of the Council feel that the Company has not lived up to the verbal promises made when the matter was first brought up, and consequently have no right to expect the City to grant this favor. The recent action of the C. P. R. in connection with the Belvidere Bridge has not improved matters any, and it was felt by the Council that under the circumstances the by-law would be snowed under by the people. It was read for the first time, however, and laid on the table for second reading at a later date.

CITY ATTORNEYSHIP.

The question of a successor to Mr. Panneton as City Attorney was brought up by Mayor Hebert. The Council was practically unanimous in their opinion that Mr. LeBlanc should be retained. The only difficulty was that he was alone, and should be accompanied by the City's counsel would have no one to consult.

It was suggested that Mr. LeBlanc act with Mr. Cate or Mr. Macdonald, also that O'Bready and Panneton be named.

The matter was left over until a later date.

CO-OPERATIVE CREDIT POPULAR IN INDIA

At the conference of officers of co-operative credit societies, held at Calcutta, the president was able to give a very satisfactory review of the progress in the establishment of these societies in different parts of India.

During the past six years the number of societies rose from 843 to 817, and the number of members from 19,000 to 403,000, and this increase although rapid, has been generally speaking, of a sound and definite character, indicating that the co-operative movement has been able to command in a great degree the confidence of the agriculturists who, on a low computation, save 10 per cent per annum on the sums they borrow from the societies, as compared with what they would incur in borrowing the same amount from the money lenders.

The direct financial advantage is not the only benefit ensuing from this co-operative system, for in one district alone the number of civil cases showed a decrease of 1100, a condition of things which the judicial authorities ascribed to the institution of the co-operative credit societies.

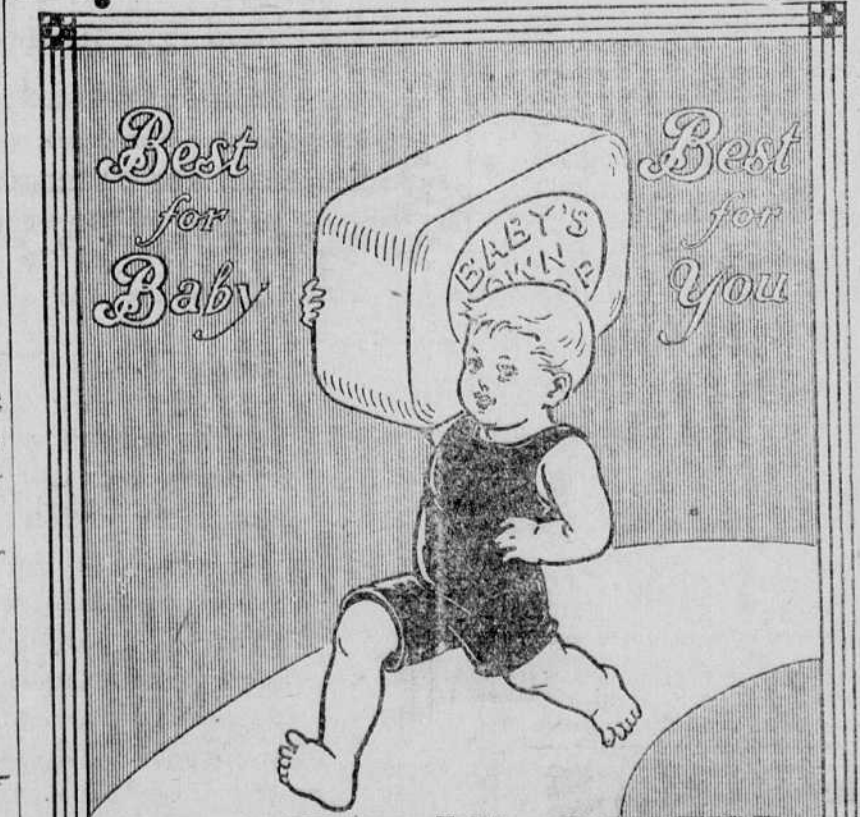

A PERILOUS POSITION

Many Attempts Made on Lives of In-
dia's Viceroy

There is only one case on record of the actual assassination of a Viceroy of India—the Earl of Mayo being fatally stabbed by a prisoner in 1872 during a visit to a convict settlement. The murder had no political motive, but during recent years, as a result of the unrest which followed the partition of Bengal, the life of a Viceroy has been aimed at on more than one occasion.

In November, 1909, Lord Minto was making a tour of India, and during a procession through Ahmedabad two bombs were thrown at his carriage. One was cleverly intercepted by the sabre of a sergeant of the Inniskilling Dragoons; the other hit the umbrella which was being held over Lady Minto and fell harmless to the ground. The culprits were never discovered.
In November, 1910, when Lord Minto was holding his farewell reception at Calcutta, three natives who had got in with forged passes, were arrested on the charge of shadowing the Viceroy. Lord Minto escaped other perils. During the trial of some conspirators in 1908 one of the prisoners confessed that their plans had included a plot to assassinate Lord Minto, Lord Kitchener, and other high officials. The information was afterwards shot dead in his cell by a fellow prisoner.

In November, 1907, Lord Minto was making a prolonged tour, when the officials got wind of a plot against his life, and the Viceroy's tour was cut short. In February, 1909, while his lordship was at Assam for a few days' shooting his train passed a spot where a few hours previously a bomb was thrown at a passing train, and the coincidence gave rise to disquieting suggestions at the time.

Lord Minto's predecessor, Lord Curzon, was also once in peril. During the hearing of the Koltapur bomb case in April, 1911, one of the prisoners confessed that at the Delhi Durbar of 1891 four men were deputed to kill Lord Curzon as he was passing in the procession, but the "courage" of the conspirators failed at the last moment.

Other distinguished Indian officials have been in the course of three years to murder Sir Andrew Fraser, Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal, three bombs were hurled at the train in which he was travelling, and once a native fired at him in a lecture hall at Calcutta.

"Whip" Coined by Burke
The parliamentary origin of the term "whip" goes back to 1769. In that year, writes Sir Courtenay Lytton, "there was a great debate in the House of Commons on the petition against the return of Col. Luttrell of Westminster in the place of Alderman Wilkes, who had been expelled from the House by its order. The king's Ministers made great efforts to bring their followers together from all quarters for this debate. Burke, who took part in the debate, referred to these efforts, and described how Ministers had sent for their friends to the north and to Paris, whipping them in, than which, he said, there could not be a better phrase. The phrase was adopted and recommended by Burke caught the public fancy, and soon became popular."

HUGE SLAV EMPIRE

Ambitious Plan of Franz Ferdinand of Austria

According to the Vienna correspondent of The Paris Journal a friend of Archduke Franz Ferdinand is authority for the disclosure of an ambitious plan of the Archduke's.

In a word, the Archduke aims at the creation of a vast Slav Empire of the south under the Crown of the Hapsburgs.
The new confederation, according to the same authority, is to include the autonomous kingdoms of Hungary, Rumania and Poland, each with its own personal ruler; Serbia, with its frontiers extended, and increased by the inclusion of Slavonia; Montenegro, enlarged by a part of Dalmatia and part of Herzegovina, and the other Balkan states.

Poland is said to have been quick to grasp the plan and has signified unanimous adhesion, and Bulgaria and Serbia are said to be favorably disposed toward the scheme.

Drink and Lunacy

Some idea of the appalling ravages made by the drink scourge in present-day France may be formed by the terrible series of statistics showing the relation between alcohol and madness which specialists attached to the principal Paris lunatic asylums made public.

These figures reveal that since 1868, when exact records were started, the proportion of male lunatics whose loss of reason is caused by drink has increased 14 per cent. to 47 per cent., while on the female side the percentage has risen from less than 2 to 20.

PASS POWER BYE-LAW AT MEGANTIC

GIVES THE MUNICIPALITY THE RIGHT TO ACQUIRE SELL LIGHT AND POWER.

Lake Megantic, Feb. 18.—(Special)—By-Law No. 21 passed by the Town Council at its special meeting held on the 27th January last, in order to exercise all the rights to it granted by the amendments made to its charter by the law 3 Georges V. assented to on the 21st, of December last, that is to say, to acquire, establish, manage and operate works intended for producing light and motive power, by means of gas, electricity or otherwise, for the public needs and for those of private individuals and corporations and adjoining municipalities, and private individuals and corporations within the limits of such municipalities, and to that end acquire, possess and operate any water plant, electric system in operation, property right of way, etc., within a radius of 15 miles from its limits. 2nd., to approve, ratify and confirm the purchase of water powers and all other rights and privileges made by the Town as well as from the Lake Megantic Pulp Company as from the Crown; and the disbursements made and the indebtednesses contracted in connection with the said purchase, and also all the resolutions passed by said council in reference with the acquisitions of said water powers, etc.

The By-Law was submitted to the approval of the Municipal electors and real estate owners, on 15th day of February according to article 5009 following, after the revised statutes 1909 and the pole was not called for by the number of electors required by law.

The town authorities therefore now have full control of these water powers and their disposition.

are looking forward to having this need met in the new wing. The nurses receive a great deal of individual supervision and instruction, making their training in this way, better than in a very large hospital. Through the kindness of the Board of Governors we are able to offer a medal every year for highest general proficiency; the object being to encourage more systematic study and higher endeavor in practical work and conduct.

The Nurses' Home is comfortable and attractive. We have many causes for gratitude, being grateful to the Medical Staff for lectures to the nurses; to the Ladies' Hospital Committee and the Junior Hospital Aid for replenishing of supplies, new equipment, redecorating many of the private rooms and corridors, etc., and for the many kindnesses and encouragement; for donations to the Hospital from time to time and especially at the Christmas season.

A new hospital or addition is greatly needed, more for improved accommodation rather than additional room for patients; an elevator is the greatest need. We should have a Maternity Department, a children's ward, semi-private accommodation for patients, balconies, an up-to-date operating suite and a few more private rooms. It gives me pleasure to commend my assistant, Miss Lamb, and the pupil nurses for their co-operation and conscientious work and the household staff for their faithfulness.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The past year has not been marked by any special work other than General Management.

Your Executive have held their meetings twice a month during the year with good attendance at each meeting and special interest has been shown by its members. The work outlined by this Committee has been to see that the Hospital is going on with its good work and at the same time within the means that are at its disposal, and this I think you will find has been accomplished as you will see by referring to the Financial Statement.

We are glad to state that the cost per person has not increased perceptibly over the cost of last year, which was a very material reduction from previous years, and this in view of the fact of the extra cost of living today, we believe should be satisfactory.

The number of patients that have been treated at this Hospital, although about the same as last year, although more days of service to the patients. While it might seem that with Sherbrooke's increased population it would naturally increase the use of the hospital, but when it is understood that our space is limited and that the private wards are often completely filled and applicants waiting. It can readily be understood that it would be difficult to treat a greater number of patients until our Hospital is enlarged or a new one built.

We still think a new Hospital is imperative and believe that with the funds we have on hand we are justified in proceeding with the erection of a new Hospital this season and would urge strongly, as we have during the past year, that the building Committee lose no time in accomplishing this undertaking.

During the year of our able Assistant Superintendent Miss Walsh resigned her position, which was unanimously regretted by the Committee.

Our present staff is composed of Mrs. Staehler, our Lady Superintendent, assisted by Miss Lamb, a Gold Medalist recently from Stratford, both of which are satisfactory. They are assisted by a competent staff of young ladies nurses of the highest standing, and efficiently trained for this work, an example of which is the graduation of four of them last month, who passed with high honors. In our Medical staff we have as great skill as can be found in some of the larger City Hospitals, this fact has been admitted by out of town Surgeons of high reputation.

The Ladies' Committee as well as the Junior Committee have been, as they always have, a tower of strength not only by their financial support but by their influence with the general public. When it is considered that over eight hundred days of charity nursing has been given by our Hospital it will show to the public the necessity of their aid and support, for which the corporation I am sure are truly thankful.

been the lowest on record except for 1909, when it was \$1.46, the past year being \$1.50; the number of patients were 417 against 414 in 1911; aggregate number of days of patients 7,715 against 7,244 in 1911; operations 254, and in 1911, 228. More complete details will be found in the annual calendar, which will be published in due course and mailed to members and others interested.

The Board cannot refrain from again making reference to the fact that the rural municipalities do not make any provision for the care of their sick poor. They are sent in and are always received and treated, but the cost of some comes out of funds contributed by people who have already other heavy legitimate calls upon their generosity. In Ontario and the West, municipalities contribute yearly a liberal amount. Surely, our Townships, the Garden of Canada, are well able to do the same.

An appeal was made in 1911 outlining a plan whereby each ratepayer would contribute with his regular assessment a small amount which in the aggregate would yield a sum that would place both Hospitals in a good position to meet the numerous calls that are made upon them.

The City of Sherbrooke has set the example. Will not the other municipalities follow?

In the absence of municipal assistance the Governors appeal to the general public for more generous support. The work of management and upkeep of such an institution entails a great deal of work especially on the Executive Committee, therefore, the public generally should give it every encouragement and assistance possible. The Hospital is a very important and necessary institution. It is practically a general hospital, is ideal, all nationalities and creeds alike and every endeavor is made to give the best care possible to every patient within its doors. The Lady Superintendent, Assistant and Nurses are kind and attentive in their duties. The Medical Staff are all men of high standing in their profession, and the location of the Hospital is ideal. The Board, therefore, appeal for the hearty support from the community, even kind words are better than nothing.

It is a matter of regret that it has been found impossible to go on with the erection of the new hospital ere this. Several plans have been made and carefully considered. One plan in particular met with general approval, but the cost would have largely exceeded the funds available, and it was not thought wise to undertake work that would leave a heavy indebtedness to be carried. New plans on a reduced scale and cost are being prepared and it is hoped the work can be put in hand and completed during the coming year.

The Lady Superintendent, Mrs. Staehler, has shown herself thoroughly capable and efficient and is supported by an able assistant and an excellent staff of nurses-in-training. During the year Miss Walsh resigned and the position has been filled by the appointment of Miss Norma E. Lamb, a graduate of the Stratford General Hospital, who is doing very satisfactory work.

The Medical staff and attending physicians are entitled to the highest praise for the skillful treatment of the medical and surgical cases coming under their charge.

The Ladies' Committee still continue their labors in the aid of the institution. During the past year their earnings amounted to \$1,648.43. Out of this sum \$783.51 was used in re-furnishing and renovating the Hospital and Nurses' Home, leaving a balance of \$864.92 in hand. The total amount raised by this Committee to date is \$17,690.

A Junior Hospital Aid Society was organized during the year with a membership of 32 young ladies. Their receipts were \$128.09, which was used to purchase fly screens and new mattresses and flowers sent each week to the patients.

Thanks are due and hereby tendered to H. D. Lawrence, Esq., for the time and labor extended in study and drafting numerous plans and alterations in connection with the proposed new Hospital.

RAYMOND POINCARE IS PRESIDENT

Assumed the Office of Chief Executive of France

CEREMONY ALSO SAW THE PASSING OF FORMER PRESIDENT FALLIERES INTO PRIVATE LIFE.

Paris, Feb. 18.—(Special)—Raymond Poincare to-day assumed the duties of President of the Republic, while former President Fallieres passed into private life. The transfer of office took place in the Elysee Palace this afternoon. The ceremony did not differ in any material feature from the programme followed at previous inaugurations. But, aside from the formal ceremony, the popularity of M. Poincare was evidenced by popular rejoicings throughout the country, the demonstrations being more general and more enthusiastic than were ever before known to mark the advent of a new President in France. The entire country kept a holiday in honor of the occasion. The Government offices, the schools and many places of business remained closed for the day.
