President Johnson—It is known in Raleigh that President Johnson will not recognize Gov. Vance nor the Confederate Legislature in North Carolina.

BALTIMORE, MAY 9.—A gentleman who has just arrived here from North Carolina reports that the Confederate Government in that State is greatly demoralized and nearly beyond control of their officers, who are striving to march them to their own destruction.

The officers have become the objects of intense hatred, and it is as much as their lives are worth to venture out of their quarters.

Manifestly by the cheering and groans from the people, from the time in the progress of the war, were so unfortunate as to be involuntarily inmates of the prison walls.

WASHINGTON, May 8.—President Johnson has issued a proclamation declaring that whereas armed resistance to the authority of the Government in certain States heretofore declared to be in rebellion has continued, and it is deemed expedient to suppress such rebellion, he hereby declares that

end, and the persons by whom that resistance, as well as the operation of the insurgent cruizers, were directed, are fugitives or evasive; and that it is the duty of the United States cruisers to sail inflicting the high seas, and others are preparing to capture, burn and destroy vessels of the United States, he enjoins all naval, military and marine forces of the United States to endeavor by all lawful means to arrest and destroy such cruisers, and to bring them into a port of the United States, in order that they may be prevented from committing some further act of violence, commerce, and that the persons on board of them may no longer enjoy impunity for their crimes; and he further proclaims and declares that if, after a reasonable time, some of the vessels of this proclamation to become known in the ports of the United States claiming to have been neutral, the said insurgent cruizers and the persons on board of them shall refuse to receive aboard of them the said ports, the United States will open itself to inflict upon

The President has also issued an exclusive order to re-establish the authority of the United States and to execute the laws of the United States within the limits known as the State of Virginia. It is ordered that all acts and proceedings of the political, military and civil organizations which have been organized since the late war and which are not the State of Virginia, of which Jeff. Davis, Jun. Leche and W. Smith were late the respective chiefs, are declared null and void.

It is further ordered that no claim, pretense or exercise any political, military or civil power, authority, jurisdiction or right by, through or under Jefferson Davis, late of the city of Richmond, and his confidantes, or under Jun. Leche or W. Smith, or under any other person, shall be recognized.
