ARGUE CONSTITUTIONAL BASIS OF BENNETT'S "NEW DEAL" MEASURES

Hon. Ernest Lapointe Declares Section Governing International Treaties Is Insufficient to Give Federal Government Power to Make Drastic Changes—Mackenzie King Attacks Premier for Alleged Failure to Call Conference with Provinces.

Ottawa, February 9.—Four eminent constitutional authorities waged a battle of precedents in the House of Commons yesterday, although all were agreed upon the immediate question before them—the ratification of an international convention respecting an eight-hour day and a forty-eight-hour week in industry. The issue was on whether ratification of this convention would provide constitutional basis for a bill the Government proposes to pass through Parliament and generally for Prime Minister R. B. Bennett's reform programme.

On the Government side, Mr. Bennett and Hon. Hugh Guthrie, Minister of Justice, were the protagonists of international conventions as a method of giving validity to social legislation which otherwise might be outside the jurisdiction of the Parliament of Canada. On the Opposition side, Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Liberal leader, and Hon. Ernest Lapointe, former Minister of Justice, contended the method was a poor one and the Government should proceed by obtaining an amendment to the constitution, or at least secure an opinion from the Supreme Court of Canada.

The British North America Act, the ancient document which divides the sovereign power of the Canadian nation between federal and provincial legislatures, was the core of the debate as non-legal members of the House listened in silence.

It was agreed the limitation of hours of work would normally fall under the heading of property and civil rights, one of the exclusive preserves of the provinces.

However, under another section of the B.N.A. Act the Dominion Parliament is given power to do all things necessary to fulfill Canada's obligations under international treaties. At the end of the war, Mr. Bennett recited, the safeguarding of the rights of labor was considered of such international importance that it was recognized in the peace treaty signed by Canada. The treaty led in turn to the setting up of the League of Nations and the international labor organization. The latter had adopted the draft convention which the House of Commons ratified last night.

Both Mr. King and Mr. Lapointe approved of ratification, but they objected to the Government's avowed intention of making it the basis of its proposed reform enactments.

As civilization advanced the views of lawyers became different, argued Mr. Bennett. The recent decisions of the highest courts of the Dominion had upheld the right of the Dominion to step into the provincial sphere of legislative action to comply with international treaties, and take control of aeronautics and radio.

The intention of the Government of the British North America Act was stressed by Mr. Bennett to justify his stand. Quoting Privy Council judges, he said in interpreting a statute one should not allow general phrases to obscure the object of the act, which was to establish a system of government on federal lines.

The intention was, he said, "to give to the central government those high functions and almost sovereign powers by which uniformity of legislation may be secured on all questions of common concern." How could the high functions of the nation respecting its obligations to foreign countries to effect limitation of hours of work be carried out, he asked, except by legislation of the Dominion Parliament for all Canada?

A mere assertion of jurisdiction did not give jurisdiction, contended Mr. Lapointe. He drew a distinction between the draft convention before the House and a binding treaty, and questioned whether the section of the constitution dealing with treaties applied in the present case. Further, he argued the Treaty of Versailles expressly made an exception for federal states such as Canada, merely placing upon them the obligation of bringing the convention to the attention of the authorities competent to deal with such matters, the legislatures of the provinces.

"The Prime Minister's broadcast speeches, fine as they were, did not change the constitution of Canada," said Mr. Lapointe. At another point he said if labor was expecting a "new deal" from this move they might get "a misdeal."

The former Minister warned against proceeding in a hasty or unsound fashion. Legislation to endure should be based on solid constitutional foundations. There was also a danger in upsetting established constitutional rights. No class in the country had a greater interest in the maintenance of constitutional rights than labor.

Had due notice been given and a conference of the provinces been called a year or so ago, said Mr. King, the constitutional questions involved could have been solved by agreement. An amendment to the British North America Act could have been effected which would have paved the way for legislation of unquestioned validity. He charged the Government with proceeding in a high handed manner and with neglecting to give parliamentary institutions sufficient opportunity to function.

FERGUSON'S CONDITION MUCH IMPROVED

London, Feb. 9.—Much improvement was shown today in the condition of Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, Canadian High Commissioner in London and former Premier of Ontario, who has been confined to his bed with an attack of influenza. Mr. Ferguson hopes to be up again early next week.

DOES NOT THINK MUCH OF LAWYERS.

Ottawa, Feb. 9.—A. A. Heape, Labor member for Winnipeg North, does not think much of lawyers. After listening to a sharp legal argument in the House last night he told a story. In the 1919 Winnipeg strike, he and six others were arrested and brought before a court. Each of the others was defended by a lawyer and was convicted. The Laborite defended himself and walked from the court a free man, making a vow never to be blinded again by fine legal arguments.

"BANG" PROVED EFFECTIVE

El Reno, Okla., Feb. 9.—While plowing, William Lee McKinstir was annoyed by a flock of crows which flew low over him and cawed incessantly.

For no reason at all, he pointed a finger at the birds and yelled "bang."

A crow fell dead at his feet.

TO CURB UNDUE PRIVILEGES TO NEW FACTORIES

Ontario Premier Announces Agreement Has Been Reached with Quebec to Stop Municipalities Offering Excessive Bonuses to Attract Industries.

Toronto, Feb. 8.—By joint agreement Ontario and Quebec have called a halt to competitive bidding by cities seeking location of factories or industries within their limits, Premier Mitchell Hepburn announced last night.

"Those promoting industries put municipalities and provinces on a competitive basis," the Premier said. "Invariably the promoters offer the argument that unless an Ontario municipality will make tax exemptions, bonuses, free buildings, financial guarantees, the company will seek concession in a municipal jurisdiction in another province."

NOTED LAWYER DEAD

Ottawa, Feb. 9.—M. J. Gorman, K.C., one of the oldest and most widely-known lawyers in Eastern Canada, died here today after an illness of one day.

QUEER HEREDITARY MALADY HAS CLAIMED ANOTHER LIFE

Disease, which Has Already Taken Seven Lives, Starts in Victim's Lower Limbs and Creeps Through Body Until It Is Twisted and Helpless.

St. Clairsville, O., Feb. 9.—Glenn Dietrich, sixteen years old, today was the latest victim of a strange hereditary malady, his physician says will kill his brother, John, fifteen years old, within a year.

Glenn, the second son of Mr. and Mrs. George Dietrich, succumbed to the mysterious disease, died Thursday. Three of his mother's cousins, one nephew and two brothers have died of the disease since 1868. No female member of the family has been afflicted.

Dr. Edward W. Turner says a clinic of fifty specialists once examined the Dietrich brothers and professed themselves baffled. When the boys were five the disease started in the lower limbs and gradually crept through their bodies until they were twisted and helpless.

TEN YEARS' IMPRISONMENT FOR MURDERING CHILDREN

Divorced Woman Cast Two Young Sons into Moscow River Because She Feared Her Fiance Would Not Marry Her If He Learned She Had Children.

Moscow, Feb. 8.—Anna Grigorieva, who cast two young sons into the Moscow River because she feared her fiance would not marry her if he learned she had children, was sentenced to ten years imprisonment today.

Her divorced husband, who was found of the children, reported to the police last June that they had disappeared. The mother told varying stories of sending them to an isolation hospital for scarlet fever, and of sending the children to the country.

Investigation showed the woman took the boys, six and four years old, on a river steamer at night and threw them into the middle wheel.

PRINCIPLES OF FRANCO-BRITISH ARMS ACCORD ENDORSED BY ITALY

Official Communique States that Only Reservation Required to Mutual Aerial Defence Agreements Covers Special Situation of Italian Relationships with Britain—Pact Marks Beginning of Collaboration Among Powers.

Rome, Feb. 9.—An official communique today affirmed the Italian Government's adherence in principle to the Anglo-French agreement reached in London, including the air pact, excepting only the obligations to be assumed by Italy and England toward each other.

"Responsible Italian circles," said the communique, "have followed with great attention the recent conversations in London between the French and English governments, conversations of which the Italian Government has been kept informed."

"These talks in general look with sympathy upon the final communi-

que of these conversations and believe they contain the possibility of an accord with Germany and therefore the beginning of a period of collaboration among the interested powers."

"With regard more specifically to the air pact of mutual assistance, the position of Italy will soon be fixed in the sense of an advance in principle, except to consider the special situation of Italy with regard to Great Britain and vice versa."

"The responsible Italian circles have noted with satisfaction the position assumed by Great Britain with regard to Austrian independence and the Franco-Italian accord of January 7th."

PRODUCTION OF QUEBEC MINES RECORDS GAIN

Gold and Silver Led in Increased Value of Output During Last Quarter of 1934 Compared with Same Period in Previous Year.

Quebec, February 9.—An appreciable increase in the production of gold and silver was shown during the month of December as compared with the preceding month and the corresponding period in 1933, according to a bulletin issued today by the Quebec Bureau of Mines. ROYAL COUPLE ACCLAIMED BY TRINIDADIANS

Duke and Duchess of Kent Today Made Their Second Public Appearance of Their Caribbean Honeymoon—Picnic by the Sea.

Port of Spain, Trinidad, Feb. 9. The Duke and Duchess of Kent, deeply sunburned after a day in the country, were driven through cheering lines of Trinidadians today in the second public appearance of their Caribbean honeymoon.

For a full hour the newlyweds drove through Port of Spain's streets over a specified route in answer to pleas that they show themselves to thousands unable to sight them since their arrival here Wednesday.

Their route through the city's principal thoroughfares was gay with flags and other decorations, and citizens lined the sidewalks several deep to view the royal couple as they went by.

It was the first time the general solitude, driving alone to palm-fringed Manzanilla Beach, where they spent the day swimming and picnicking by the sea. They returned here exhausted to retire soon after dinner.

THREE RIVERS AND COTTON COMPANY CONTRACT APPROVED

Quebec, Feb. 9.—Third reading was given in the Legislature yesterday to a bill of W. Grant, Liberal, Champlain, to ratify a resolution of the City of Three Rivers respecting water rates payable by the Wabasso Cotton Co. Ltd. to the city.

Main clause of Mr. Grant's bill follows: "That the Wabasso Cotton Company, Ltd., came to an agreement with the City of Three Rivers, the agreement being ratified by the council, whereby the Company agrees to pay a sum of \$26,666 as payment for water tax from May 1, 1932 to December 31, 1934, the said resolution fixing for a period of ten years extending from January 1, 1935 to January 1, 1945, the water tax on the company at twelve cents per 1,000 gallons of water it may take from the city waterworks system."

The bill provides also for an annual lump sum payment of \$500 by the company to the city for additional fire protection.

Maurice Duplessis, K.C., Conservative Opposition Leader, objected to the bill because "fifty-three per cent. of industry in Three Rivers already enjoys commutation of taxes and other privileges." His contention was that thirty-five per cent. of small taxpayers in Three Rivers bore 100 per cent. of the total civic taxation.

BELIEVES AVERAGE PERSON USES ONLY TENTH OF THEIR TOTAL MENTAL CAPACITY.

Langhorne, Pa., Feb. 9.—Dr. Temple Fay, professor of neurosurgery at Temple University, believes the average man and woman go through life without using more than one-tenth of their mental capacity.

Even the most brilliant person uses only about one-sixth of his mental capacity, Dr. Fay told a conference at the Woods School on "The Emotionally Unstable Child."

Failure to utilize full mental powers is in no way the result of laziness or sluggishness, he said. Even the best methods of mental training have fallen far short of the goal. If it were possible to perfect a method of training to use the full brain capacity, a race of geniuses would result, he predicted.

SURGEON GIVES HIS VIEWS ON MAN'S "DEATH"

Surgical Processes During Four and a Half Minutes that Life Had Apparently Departed from Human Body Described in British Medical Journal.

Arley, England, Feb. 9.—While market gardener John Puckering looked at death through rose-colored glasses today and regretted that the world-to-come had gone again, the British Medical Journal described the surgical processes during Puckering's four and a half minute departure from "life."

Puckering is convinced he died on the operating table because: "I saw many villagers from Arley. I knew them before they died. They were all happy and I was happy too." He painted a rosy picture of "smiling faces in a bank of hazy shining clouds."

He underwent a serious abdominal operation. The medical Journal declared all those present in the operating theatre believed the patient was dead. Dr. G. Percival Mills said:

"I slipped my hand under his diaphragm and found his heart had stopped. I could feel what appeared to be an empty, flabby heart without a flicker of pulsation. The head had, of course, already been lowered, and artificial respiration started."

The heart was massaged and adrenalin injected directly into the ventricle, the physician related, causing "a faint flicker in the flabby organ I was compressing."

The surgeon hurriedly completed the operation as the heart beat vigorously.

PROPOSAL FOR MARKETING OF JAM BEING CONSIDERED

Plan Submitted to Dominion Marketing Board by Representatives of Jam Manufacturers at Meeting in Ottawa.

Ottawa, Feb. 9.—The Dominion Marketing Board has under consideration a plan to regulate marketing of jam in Canada.

Representing Canadian jam manufacturers, J. T. Crowder, of Toronto, and Ernest Carriere, of Montreal, placed the proposal before the Board yesterday at a hearing in camera. Before a decision is made, the commissioners may hold a further sitting on the scheme.

A co-ordinating committee of the jam manufacturers has been working with fruit growers on the plan, the approval of which would result in the establishment of a local board in Toronto to supervise orderly marketing.

Nine representatives of jam manufacturers, one for consumers, and three nominees of growers would comprise the board.

BAFFLING AND UNSOLVED PROBLEMS FACE Y.M.C.A.

President of World's Alliance of Y.M.C.A. Says "Christianity, in Its Purest Sense, Is Only Solution to Dangers which Confront Us at Present Time."

Toronto, Feb. 9.—Dr. John R. Mott, president of the World's Alliance of Young Men's Christian Associations, here for the annual meeting, says that the Y.M.C.A., with its 11,000 branches and its membership of 2,000,000 scattered over the globe, faces a situation unique in history.

"We are facing the most baffling and unsolved problems the world has ever known," he said speaking at a dinner last night, "and Christianity, in its purest sense, is the only solution to the dangers which confront us at the present time."

Earlier in the day recommendations were advanced that changes be made in the constitution which would permit membership of Roman Catholics and other non-evangelical churches on the boards of directors of local Y.M.C.A. institutions.

PARTY SPLIT AND SUPREME COURT ENDANGER U.S. RECOVERY PLANS

Believed Roosevelt May Take Direct Hand in Congressional Struggle Over \$4,880,000,000 Work and Relief Bill—Announcement of Supreme Court Judgment on Gold Clause Expected Monday—Proposals for Army Air Base at Hawaii Studied.

New York, February 9.—When the voters of the United States sent an unprecedented number of Democratic congressmen and senators to Washington in last November's election, the press of the world chronicled:

"Franklin D. Roosevelt has been given the greatest mandate ever accorded a President of the United States."

Yet today finds the "New Deal" structure Roosevelt would build for the country bogging down on a foundation that is being washed away by cross currents of Congressional controversy.

In addition, the question of what the Supreme Court thinks of two of his vital plans—devaluation of the dollar and the National Industrial Recovery Act—hangs fire.

The wash of Congressional criticism has impeded, or threatened with lengthy debate, these Rooseveltian requests:

A \$4,880,000,000 supply bill to set the work relief in motion as a replacement for the dole. The President asked its enactment by February 10th. It has been materially changed and still is held up by a Senate committee headed by the Virginia conservative, Carter Glass.

A social security programme for old age and industrial insurance. Roosevelt asked its approval by February 15th to permit state legislatures to follow his lead. It has not reached either branch of Congress.

A proposal that the Government be given more control over the Federal Reserve system to provide a form of central banking.

Legislation to curb the operation of holding companies in the utility field which, the Government charges, raise consumer costs unfairly.

Introduction of measures covering the latter two proposals brought hints of bitter conflict in their wake.

QUEBEC COURT JURISDICTION IS CHALLENGED

Right of Montreal Court to Hear Liquor Ring Cases Unless It Can Be Proved Conspiracy Took Place within Quebec Borders Challenged.

Montreal, Feb. 9.—A question of jurisdiction that may prove vital in the charges against residents of British Columbia and the Maritime Provinces accused in the \$5,000,000 liquor smuggling case awaits decision by Judge Jules Desmarais.

The question was raised yesterday by Judge Desmarais himself whether he has jurisdiction to try them until the Crown has shown that they actually conspired within the borders of Quebec Province.

The question of jurisdiction came up when Arthur Swanson, of Dartmouth, N.S., testified as to business transactions with Allen M. Robertson, of St. John's Nfld., in 1931. Robertson was one of the sixty-two persons named in the original warrant sworn out by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, but has not been arrested.

MRS. LINDBERGH AGAIN ACTS AS STATE WITNESS

Mother of Kidnapped Baby Slips into Court Quietly as Rebuttal Witness at Trial of Alleged Kidnapper.

Flemington, N.J., Feb. 9.—Anne Morrow Lindbergh came back to court today with her mother, Mrs. Dwight W. Morrow, who was called as a rebuttal witness for the state in the trial of Bruno Richard Hauptmann. It was the first appearance of the bereaved young mother since she testified on the second day of the trial.

The two women—mother and grandmother of the kidnapped and slain baby Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr.—slipped in quietly after court opened for the twenty-ninth day of the trial.

Louis Bornmann, a New Jersey state trooper, was on the stand to rebut defence witnesses whose testimony was offered to cast doubt upon the state's ladder evidence against Hauptmann.

PROSECUTION WILL CALL TEN REBUTTAL WITNESSES.

Flemington, N.J., Feb. 9.—Mrs. Morrow, mother of Anne Lindbergh, was called to the State's aid today in the prosecution of the murder of her grandson, as testimony in the five weeks' old trial came to a close.

Her appearance climaxed the State's rebuttal plan to blast defence allegations which linked Mrs. Morrow's dead maid, Violet Sharp, and the late Isador Fisch, Hauptmann's erstwhile business partner, to the tragic ransom-kidnapping.

Through its final rebuttal witnesses, the State sought to prove that Fisch was engaged in a financial transaction at a Bronx home the night on which charged witnesses testified they saw some one resembling him in St. Raymond's cemetery, where the ransom was paid.

Mrs. Morrow's testimony, the prosecution believed, was expected to corroborate completely the sharp English maid who committed suicide.

THE WEATHER

PARTLY CLOUDY AND MILD.

Light to moderate snowfalls have occurred in southern Ontario and western Quebec though in other districts of the Dominion the weather has been fair. It is comparatively mild from the Great Lakes eastward and in Alberta with a little lower temperature this morning in Manitoba and southern Saskatchewan. Pressure is high over British Columbia and the northwest states while a trough of low pressure extends southwestward from the Labrador coast to the New England states and a shallow low area centred over Tennessee is moving northeastward.

Forecast: Moderate westerly winds; partly cloudy tonight and Sunday; not much change in temperature.

Northern New England: Cloudy and slightly colder in north portion, preceded by rain in the southeast this afternoon and early tonight. Sunday—cloudy, probably followed by rain or snow.

Temperatures yesterday: Maximum, 32; minimum, 15 below.

Same day last year: Maximum, 15 below; minimum, 30 below.

SPEAKER'S TEA ABOLISHED BY MITCH HEPBURN

Ontario Premier Gives Need for Economy as Reason for Cancellation of Reception After Opening of Legislature—Claims Gold Tax to Form Federal Election Issue.

Toronto, February 9.—Cancellation of the customary reception in the Speaker's chambers following the opening of the Ontario Legislature on February 20th, was announced yesterday by Premier Mitchell Hepburn.

"There will be no speaker's tea," Mr. Hepburn said. "That was cut off in this period of distress with municipalities, we are not going to spend the money involved."

At the same time Mr. Hepburn took the occasion to speak of the position of a Lieutenant-Governor in Canada.

The Lieutenant-Governor is a political appointment," he said. "As evidence you find in Prime Minister R. B. Bennett's discarded minister, Hon. Murray MacLaren, as Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick."

"It is unfortunate that a man of the character of Dr. Bruce—Hon. H. A. Bruce, Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario—is the incumbent of the office when the battle is on. It is a matter of principles, not of personalities," the Premier said, declaring that in order to find a place for Mr. MacLaren, seventy-four years old, the Dominion Government found him a position in his native province.

GOLD TAX TO FORM FEDERAL ELECTION ISSUE

Toronto, Feb. 9.—The Dominion tax on gold will be a prominent issue in the forthcoming Dominion election, Premier Mitchell Hepburn said today.

He quoted statistics of 1934 collections of the tax which amounted to \$4,867,000 and said eighty per cent. of this is collected from Ontario mines.

"We have spent millions of dollars in developing the north," the Premier said. "We have built roads, railways and extended hydro at a terrific cost and when we get the mining industry in a profitable position the Dominion Government invades that gold and collects \$4,867,000 in 1934."

"Eighty per cent. of the gold tax is collected from an Ontario natural resource," he said. "It is going to be a very live issue in the coming federal election."

ONTARIO PLANS TO ASSIST NATIVE TIMBER INDUSTRY

Minister of Lands and Forests Orders Exclusive Use of Cresson Ontario Lumber in All Bridge and Roadwork in North Country.

Toronto, Feb. 9.—Three cresson plants which have been operating on part time for the past year or more will receive a new impetus and the timber industry of the province generally will be stimulated as a result of plans perfected by Hon. Peter Heenan, Ontario Minister of Lands and Forests, it was learned today.

Exclusive use of cresson Ontario timber in all bridges and roadwork in the north will be observed hereafter, and an initial order of 9,000,000 board feet of timber has already been placed.

The timber will be treated with the cresson method, and department officials, after tests, are satisfied that timber so treated may be used as permanent material in construction work.

The three cresson plants are situated at Sudbury, Trenton and Sioux Lookout. Many additional men will receive employment because of the new activity.

Asked if steel concerns would lose business as a result of the Ontario Department's decision to use cresson timber in some instances, Mr. Heenan said that bridges in Ontario had been built with cresson lumber from British Columbia in the past, and tests of his engineers showed the native lumber to be equally durable after treatment.

SOUTH AFRICA'S DEFENCE PROGRAMME UNDER FIRE

Delegates to Imperial Press Conference Told that Civil War Might Break Out Should Government "Rashly" Attempt to Commit Union to Participation in an Overseas War.

Cape Town, Feb. 9.—The defence policy of South Africa, as set forth by Oswald Pirow, Minister of Defence, was under fire today from two sources. Mr. Pirow told delegates to the Imperial Press Conference that civil war might break out should the government "rashly" attempt to commit the Union to participation in an overseas war.

C. F. Stallard, leader of the Dominion party in the House of Assembly, declared that Defence Minister's policy was a repudiation of any policy of co-operation with the sister states of the British Commonwealth which would bring on the head of South Africa the gravest rebuffs of her colleagues overseas.

F. S. Malan, Nationalist member, welcomed the idea of non-participation in a general scheme of Imperial defence, but condemned the policy of internal defence. It proposed to link the defences of the Union with those of other African territories, which would force South Africa into the next war if she was concerned with their safety, he contended.

FEAR IS FELT FOR SAFETY OF CANADIAN MISSIONARY

Norman Johnson Arrested by Bolivian Authorities on Suspicion of Spying for Paraguay in Chaco War Zone.

Toronto, Feb. 9.—Fear is held by Toronto friends for the safety of Norman Johnson, a Canadian missionary arrested by Bolivian authorities on suspicion of spying for Paraguay in the Chaco war zone.

A letter from Mrs. Johnson received here relates that he was arrested for the second time recently at his church in Caraguatanga and forced to accompany soldiers to headquarters in Villa Montes, four hundred miles from his mission.

Since then no word has been received of him and his wife and four-year-old daughter are alone in the little interior village with no whites within miles.

ANNOUNCE "MYSTERY" PLAN TO MANUFACTURE DIAMONDS

London's Diamond Market Healed with Skepticism and Unconcern Today Announcement of Plan Developed by "Mystery Scientist" Who Had "Achieved Success After Working Forty-Five Years."

London, Feb. 9.—Hendon Garden—London's diamond market—heard with skepticism and unconcern today the claim that under a new process it would be possible to manufacture synthetic gems of such quality only the most skilled experts could distinguish them from genuine stones.

The claim was advanced by Victor Jourado, Mayfair antique dealer, who announced he had obtained the right to a process developed by a "mystery scientist" who had "achieved success after working forty-five years."

Hendon Garden dealers who inspected the synthetic stones said they were "very beautiful, finer than paste, but nevertheless, distinguishable as imitations."

ELECTION BRIBERY CHARGES HURLED AT GOVERNMENT

Saskatchewan Premier Charges that \$750,000 Advanced by Federal Government to Department of Highways Before Last Elections Was "Straight Bribe to Go Out and Buy Votes."

Regina, Feb. 9.—A definite charge that the \$750,000 advanced by the Federal Government to the Department of Highways before the election last June was a "straight bribe to go out and buy votes," was made in the Saskatchewan Legislature last night by Premier J. G. Gardiner.

Coupled with this charge was a second one that Hon. Robert Weir, Federal Minister of Agriculture, was using unpaid accounts on work done prior to the election on improperly authorized projects, as material for the coming federal election campaign. In support of this Mr. Gardiner read parts of a letter written to a resident of the Melfort federal constituency by Mr. Weir which he characterized as part of "continuous campaign" now being carried on from Ottawa for election purposes.

REVOLUTIONARY WORKER DIES

Moscow, Feb. 9.—Isaak Minkoff, a member of the Communist Party, died here yesterday. He was forty-one years old. Minkoff was secretary of the Russian section of social democrats in Canada from 1910 to 1915 and engaged in revolutionary work in Philadelphia and New York until 1917, when he returned to Russia.

HULL, ENGLAND, FEB. 9.—Phillip Lancaster, twenty-four year old foreman in a Hull brickyard, lays claim to the title of being the world's champion bricklayer. He laid three thousand bricks in four hours—a record, he says.

In the first hour he laid 908, a little better than eighteen a minute.

DE VALERA TO KEEP SPIRIT OF HATE ALIVE

Relics of 1916 Rising Against British Rule to Be Preserved in National Museum at Dublin.

Dublin, Feb. 9.—An appeal by the government of President Eamon de Valera for the preservation of relics of the 1916 rising against British rule in Ireland and of the subsequent armed struggle including the civil war between Free Staters and Republicans in 1922-23 has brought a remarkable response from the public.

A special section in the national museum at Dublin is to be set aside to house these souvenirs of what has now come to be known officially as the war of independence.

A Catholic nun, who refused to disclose her name, sent in an autographed manuscript of a marching song which she wrote to rouse nationalist sentiment after the rebellion.

An acquisition regarded as precious is a glass frame containing the torn fragments of a letter said to have been found on the floor of the condemned cell in Mountjoy prison after the execution of Kevin Barry, one of the Republican boy-martyrs hanged for his alleged complicity in an attack on British soldiers.

There may be a happy augury in the fact that among the relics presented to the museum is the coat and cap worn by Michael Collins when he was shot dead by Republicans at the outbreak of the civil war.

DENY GUN BATTLE ON BOARD AIR LINER PRIOR TO CRASH

"Amazing Charges" Shooting Affray Took Place in Plane Which Crashed in Syrian Desert.

Amsterdam, Feb. 9.—Royal Dutch Air Liner officials emphatically denied today reports that a revolver battle aboard the airplane popularly known as the "Flying Hotel," preceded the crash fatal to seven men.

The airliner, which finished second in the London to Melbourne Derby, fell in the Syrian desert in December. A dispatch to the London Daily Herald said "amazing charges" that a revolver battle took place aboard the plane were being made in Sourabaya, Dutch East Indies.

**TEN NEGROES KILLED AND
MANY INJURED IN TORNADO**

Thirty-One Houses Razed During Violent Storm that Swept Section of East Texas.

Grapeland, Feb. 9.—Ten negroes were killed and forty were injured last night when an east Texas tornado wrecked a tenant community on the Murray farm, fifteen miles west of Grapeland. Thirty-one tenant houses were razed.

At Nineveh, in Leon county, fifteen other negro tenants were hurt, and tenant houses were wrecked. One tenant was damaged badly and the Storey and Dorsey commissary was destroyed.

Twelve Groveton residents received slight injuries.

Reports indicated that a number of the negroes injured on the Murray farm in Houston county might die.

To make her testimony even more conclusive, three other witnesses were summoned to tell how they accompanied Miss Sharpe to a Jersey roadhouse the night of the kidnapping, March 1, 1932.

The Defence testimony was given to the effect a woman resembling Miss Sharpe was seen carrying a blonde baby from a New York-Jersey ferry that night.

Attorney General David T. Wilentz had about ten witnesses with which to conclude his case late in the afternoon.

Edward J. Reilly, chief of defence counsel, expected to call only one sur-rebuttal witness before closing the door to further testimony.

Prior to conclusion of the State's rebuttal testimony, there was some doubt over the availability of Reilly's desired witness, Arch W. Loney, wood expert at Washington, from whom Reilly had planned to adduce testimony that Hauptmann did not make the kidnap ladder, and that wood from the Hauptmann attic did not go into its construction.

Loney, in Washington last night, wired Reilly he would decline the defence invitation because there was insufficient time to study the wood.

**MRS. HAUPTMANN PONDERS
OVER BALE OF LETTERS.**

Flemington, N.J., Feb. 9.—Mrs. Anna Hauptmann opened the top drawer of her bureau. Inside were bales of letters she has received since her husband's trial began.

"About five of these are from people I know," she said. "The rest are from strangers; and none of them say anything bad to me."

The blonde, weary woman, who is the wife of the man accused of murdering the Lindbergh baby, seemed bewildered that she has been for days, she sat on her bed and said, "I feel 'verlassen'—lost."

"In about three days, this will be over; and then what? I keep saying, 'When Richard is back and we are together'—I don't dare think any more else. What would life be for me?"

CONVICTS MAY HUNT BURIED TREASURE

Carson City, Nev., Feb. 9.—Nevada authorities were considering today a proposal that convicts be permitted to hunt for buried treasure in the hills near the State Penitentiary.

Warden Matt Penrose informed the State Assembly gold bullion was hidden in a hill near the prison following a stage robbery many years ago.

INDIANS TODAY OBSERVED FEAST OF THE WHITE DOG

Descendants of Once-Mighty Six Nations Indians Chanted Their Praises and Gave Names to New Members of Their Tribe.

Brantford, Ont., Feb. 8.—Tradition-loving descendants of the once-mighty Six Nations Indians chanted their praises and gave names to new members of the tribe today as their mystic ritual, the feast of the White Dog, progressed in the old Cayuga longhouse.

It was the second day of the pagan observance, steeped in the traditions of a tribe that once ruled vast stretches of the mid-continent. Tribal Chief Alex Thomas of the Cayugas led the ceremonies on their reserve ten miles from here.

The feast was formerly on the "coldest night." Last night it was only twelve degrees below freezing but the Indians prophesied colder weather before the four-day feast was completed.

BETTER MARKET FOR CATTLE IN EUROPE SOUGHT

Ontario Farmers Study Plan for Co-operative Shipping and Sale of Livestock to Great Britain and the Continent.

Toronto, Feb. 9.—A plan designed to bring about more profitable marketing of cattle in Great Britain and other European countries was before farmers of Ontario today.

The Ontario Export Association produced the plan after a meeting held yesterday and announced farmers from various parts of the province would shortly be invited to meet in various centres for the purpose of discussing and approving the plan.

The scheme, now before the Dominion Government, was drawn up with a view to obtaining control of shipping space on Atlantic boats for Ontario cattle and also establishing their own shipping agent or organization in Montreal or other point of export.

An overseas marketing agency would be established. The directors also proposed to pass a resolution calling meetings in ten counties at which a qualified speaker will explain the scheme and call for discussion of the farmers at the time.

**LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR OF
NEW BRUNSWICK SWORN IN**

Brief but Impressive Ceremony Today Marked Inauguration of Hon. Dr. Murray MacLaren as Successor to Hon. Hugh H. McLean.

Fredericton, N.B., Feb. 9.—Following a brief but impressive ceremony here, Hon. Dr. Murray MacLaren, former Minister of Pensions and National Health, was in office today as Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick. He succeeded Hon. Hugh H. McLean, who will be eighty-one years old next month.

Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, Chief Justice of New Brunswick, administered the oaths of allegiance and office a few hours after Dr. MacLaren arrived from Ottawa by private car yesterday. Especially invited guests had places on the floor of the Legislative Assembly Chamber, while others looked down from the galleries. Later, in the Executive Council Chamber, Premier L. P. D. Tilley and his cabinet re-affirmed their oaths of office.

McIntyre led the upward procession for the week, adding \$2.75, followed by Dome with a gain of \$1.50, Bralorne \$1.15, Little Long Lac thirty-five cents, Lake Shore and Hollinger, fifty cents each and Pioneer, forty-five cents. The suggestion that the sensational rise this week in the price of Sturgeon River gold mines stock and the Wood-brown units, representing shares in the same company, provided the spark that fired the market into new life.

On the industrial board, International Nickel firmed up on good volume and Ford of Canada, Brazilian, the oils and most of the construction issues registered small gains.

Ottawa, Feb. 9.—Subsidies paid by the Dominion to the provinces increased from \$12,496,958 in the fiscal year ended March 31, 1930, to \$13,727,565, for the year ended March 31, 1934, according to a report tabled yesterday in the House of Commons by Secretary of State C. H. Cahan.

They Popped Up; Then Died Down.

The two chief peewees of the City Council had a brief day in the limelight this week.

Alderman Loranger, enjoying more responsibility than he has ever before had in a lifetime, would have the City Council make his Electric and Gas Committee a monopoly for all time. Alderman Dubuc, who has other sons to place in leisure posts, would cheerfully support Loranger; yea, even go farther and pay each alderman \$500 a year, and \$1,000 for the Mayor.

This is not time for any man to sniff at any little windfall which may come his way, but Dubuc stood alone in his willingness, even his cheerful desire to abstract \$6,000 a year from the Public Purse.

Still, and all, if paying salaries to aldermen would assure the City of getting rid of such useless trash, it might be well worth the money.

To be sure, the West Ward League of Proprietors has gone on record as favouring payment of salaries, but since adopting that resolution the West Ward League has peacefully slumbered. As will all who would prey upon the civic purse.

A Lesson From the Liverpool Docks.

There are elementary lessons in politics in the recent Waverley bye-election in England. Young Randy Churchill, twenty-three-year-old grandson of the original Randolph, of Gladstone's day, stepped into a sure-thing election of a Conservative to replace a member elevated to the peerage, and just naturally startled the liver birds in the pool at the confluence of the Mersey. The Labour candidate won, for there are many dockworkers in Liverpool.

Being a great world port the electors of that city think that the majority take a broad world view, and they introduced the issue of the change in the policy of governing India. The objectors may be right. For England is too often wrong when she is persuaded to shatter traditions with some loose screw-drivers of the sob-sister type or female Gandhis. Enough of them followed the Pied Piper of Gandhi to defeat the Governor's candidate.

Yet there does not rest the blame. Usually a bye-election is confined to the care of an organization which might be called "we-don't-it," but who quite as usually fall down on any repeat performance. They are never-did-it when proof of past performance is called for.

The Canada Senate is full of "we-don't-it." Yet we must be fair to Senator Rainville. He is but one of fourteen loud-voiced claimants who, when an amazing turn-over occurred in Southern Quebec in 1930, joined the vociferous "I-don't-it" Club, and laid claim to the spoils. Quite a wise old bird was Rainville. But he is learning that the Senate must cease to be a nest of pirates; the eyes of the public are upon them. These masters of legal subterfuge

got one man off because the prosecutor neglected to put in legal proof that the alleged offender was a Senator. What everybody knows is not legal proof.

When an election "gangs aft aglee" in a Tory hive, as it did in Liverpool, small wonder that the Canadian Prime Minister refuses to accept the assurance of party workers that some member has a sure-thing seat, for in these sort of constituencies are the merry "we-don't-it" boys the most numerous. Even that staunch old Conservative riding of Westmount is being frittered away by the small politicians who live down by the railway culverts.

You never can tell.

Editor's Note Book.

The Quebec Legislature on Tuesday last listened without reproach to some rank heresies from a member named Lamoureux, evidently a person of no importance, for he is seldom heard of. This member from Iberville said there was no chance of a fair deal to French-Canadian farmers from a Farm Loan Board originating in Ottawa, under an English-speaking administration. No one disowned the miserable little beast for his uncalled-for insults.

WHAT EDITORS SAY

FOLLOWS GOOD EXAMPLE

The Prince of Wales has composed a successful march for the bagpipes. Apparently like his grandmother, Queen Victoria, he has a warm place in his heart for the Scotch.

DEMAND FOR NON-PARTISANSHIP IS GROWING.

It is true that this is an election year, but if the signposts be read aright, it is going to be a peculiar election with a breaking away from party moorings and allegiances as seldom, if ever, witnessed before in Canada. There is a growing demand for disinterestedness, the sinking of party in favor of country.

EVERYBODY'S JOB.

Mr. Bennett's earnest reference to the railway problem in his Toronto speech is to be commended. Certainly this is one of Canada's most serious difficulties, and regardless of politics, it should be everybody's job to find a way out, if possible.

WE'RE GROWING OLDER.

The people of Lima, Peru, have been celebrating of late—celebrating the 400th anniversary of their city's founding.

And in that celebration there is a gentle reminder that while civilization on the American continent is an old thing that we usually suppose.

Keeping our eyes within our own boundaries, we generally take it for granted that the traditions of the new world are all very short.

But to go back four centuries into the past is to go back a long way.

When Lima was founded, England's fight with the Spanish armada was still half a century in the future. Shakespeare was not yet born, and Martin Luther was still alive.

A society that can trace its lineage that far back is getting on in years.

Canada and United States may still be youthful; but Latin America is, as human societies go, well along in middle age.

JUST TO MAKE "NEWS."

Just one year ago two reporters in the Capitol at Washington, Ted Lewis and William F. Kerby, were idling away their time in the press room. There was nothing particular happening in the House and "news" was scarce.

They fell to discussing the Vinson Bill, which authorized the building of the United States navy to full treaty strength. As they turned the bill over in their minds they wondered if they couldn't "steam up" some news over it. Then a bright idea struck them.

Why not have a clause in the bill to limit the profit of contractors who would be building warships, not only under the Vinson Bill but for all time to come, to ten per cent? Billions of dollars worth of contracts were to be let and here was a great plan to eliminate the chances of profiteering.

The reporters were in the House but not of it. They had to find a representative right away to take the plan under his wing. There was no time to lose because the bill was almost through. So the two reporters went into the lobby, button-holed Representative Charles W. Tobey, of New Hampshire, and "spilled the idea" to him. Tobey fell for it at once. "Fine," he said, and then the representative and two newshounds drafted an amendment to the bill on a piece of paper out of a notebook. The reporters then returned to the gallery and listened, being the only people besides Tobey "in the know."

There were only ten minutes to go before the bill would have passed. Tobey moved the amendment, and from that moment the fight was on. Vinson himself opposed it; the discussion was carried over for days and it widened to bring in the admirals and President Roosevelt, all of whom opposed it. Tobey made himself a nuisance in the House, and ultimately got his amendment through, with an exception on contracts of \$10,000 or less.

This amendment was possibly the salvation of Tobey, because, although a Republican, he was one of those who got by in the recent electoral landslide, being able to boast that against strong opposition he had forced an amendment through which had saved the taxpayers hundreds of millions of dollars and would save hundreds of millions more in days to come.

As for the reporters they got nothing out of it except a swell story on a dull day for news, and the personal satisfaction of having saved the nation oodles of money. But they should be in the Hall of Fame, where there are many portraits of men who have done much less for the country.

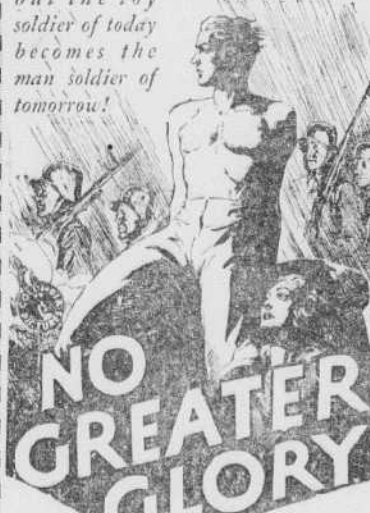

NINE HUNDRED COUPON BOOKS CONFISCATED

Police Hand Latest Racket to
Appear in This District a
Knock-Out Blow.

Promoters of the coupon book
advertising racket paid a visit to
police headquarters on Marquette

and reluctantly handed over nine
hundred "trading booklets" to
Chief H. O. Camirand.

The confiscation of these coupon

DETERMINED TO KEEP "QUINTS" OFF THE STAGE

Ontario Premier Promises Legis-
lation, if Necessary, to Prevent
Quintuplets Becoming a
Vaudeville Feature—Million
Dollar Action Filed Against
Dionne Parents.

Toronto, Feb. 9.—Appearance of
Olivia and Elzire Dionne, parents of
the quintuplets, on a Chicago stage
has drawn sharp criticism from Pre-
mier Mitchell F. Hepburn, of Ontar-
io. He promised legislation, if ne-
cessary, to prevent the quintuplets
becoming a vaudeville feature.

"It is a disgrace; it is cheap, and
we are going to try to save the
children from such humiliation if
possible," the Premier said last
night in reference to the planned
tour of the parents.

"If the American authorities would
allow these people to go on the
stage, we would not permit it in
Ontario."

The question was raised last night
by newspapermen who queried Mr.
Hepburn about the \$1,000,000 suit
he had filed in Chicago yesterday against
the Dionne parents and others, al-
leging breach of contract.

He had no comment on the suit,
but declared "if there is any action
this Legislature can take to keep the
babies from professional, self-seek-
ing promoters, that action will be
taken."

The Government, he said, is going
to protect the children from a stage
tour similar to that planned for the
parents even if this requires an act
of the Legislature. "It is revolting,
disgusting and cheap, and reflects
on the Canadian people as a whole,"
the Premier said.

DIFFICULTY IN PRONOUNCING
"QUINTUPLETS"

Toronto, Feb. 9.—When laymen
pronounce "quintuplets" incorrectly
they can be excused, for Dr. Allan
Roy Dufosse, the man who jumped to
fame overnight through their birth,
erred when referring to his five
famous northern Ontario charges,
the Dionne sisters.

There have been numerous abuses
of the word, among the most com-
mon being quin-triplets and quin-
tup-lets. It was the second form
that Dr. Dufosse used while address-
ing a dinner here last night to
launch a \$500,000 campaign for crippled
children in Ontario.

The dictionary pronunciation of
the word is quin-to-plets, with em-
phasis on the first syllable.

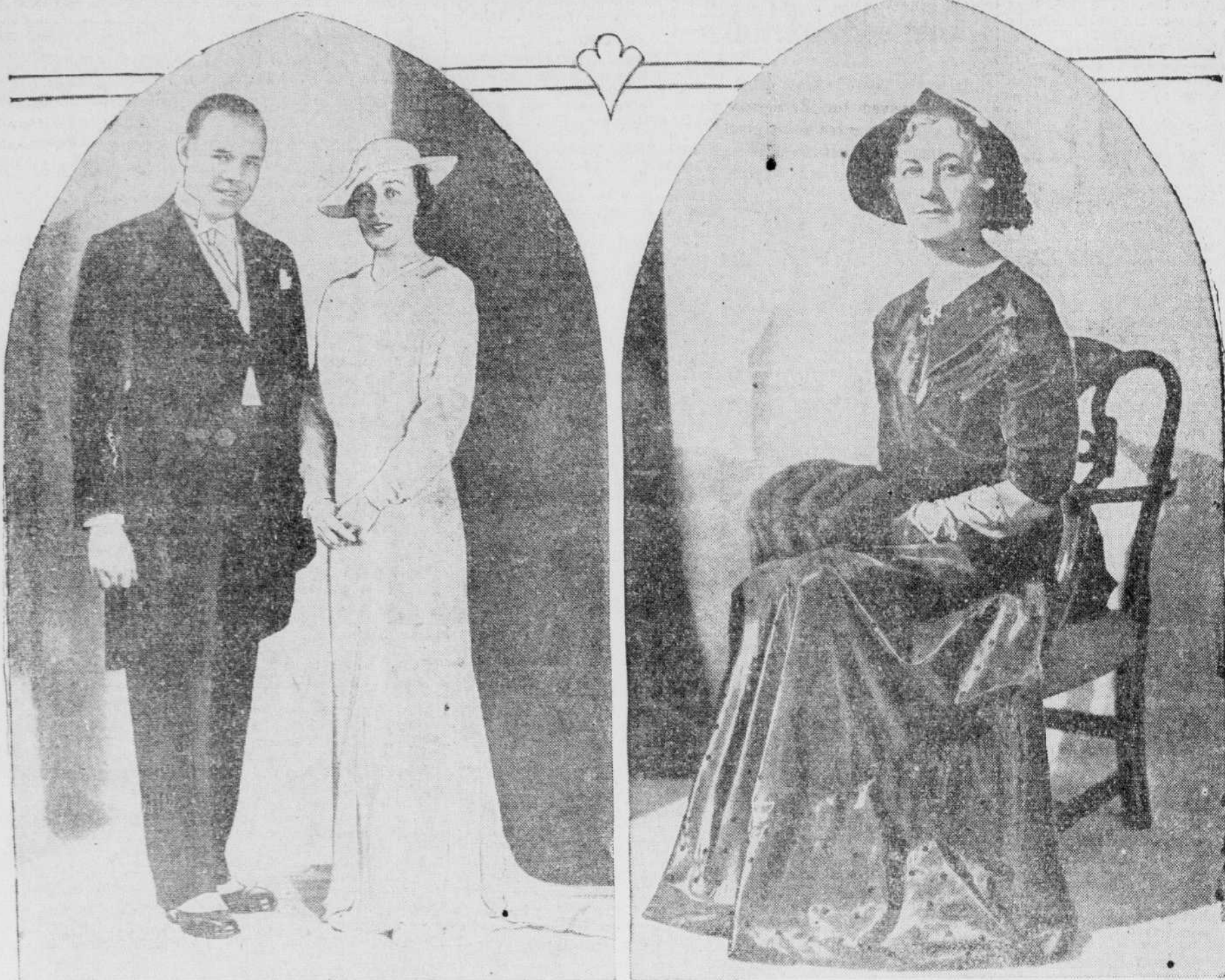

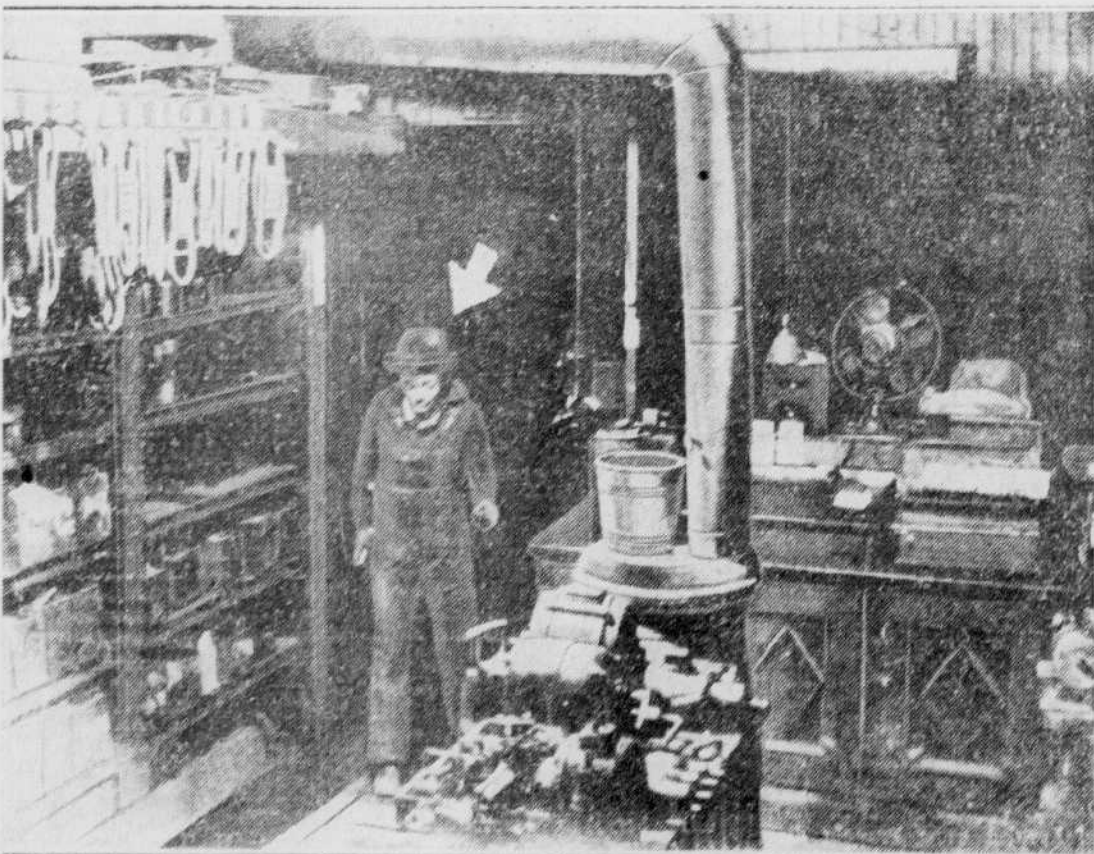

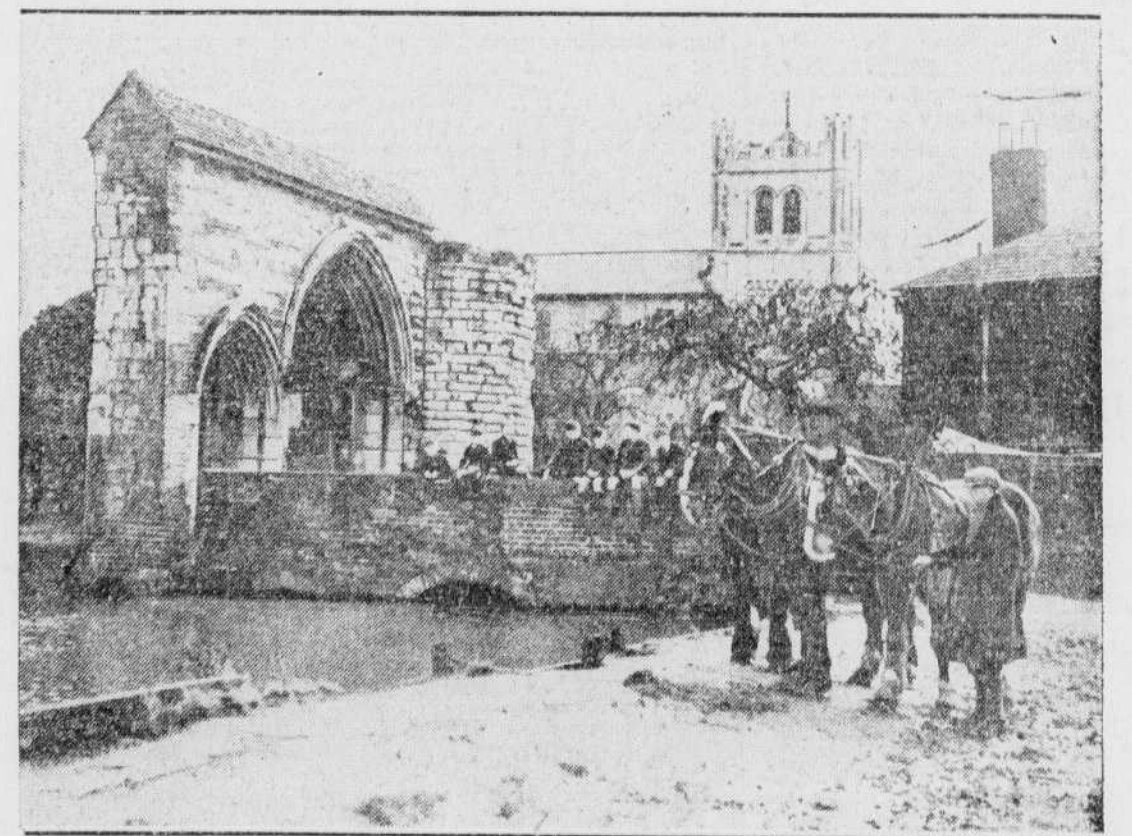
