GREAT VIRTUE IN "IF!"

SENATORS DAWES, HALE AND COCKERELL DIVERT THEMSELVES IN THEORIZING ABOUT WAR AGAINST ENGLAND AND CANADA.

SOME CURIOUS MENTAL AND MORAL ABERRATIONS OF THE "DISTINGUISHED THREE."

WASHINGTON, June 4.—During the discussion of the Fortification bill in the Senate an amendment to increase the appropriation for rifled sea coast mortars from \$250,000 to \$400,000 gave rise to an argument in which the exposed condition of American seaports was described by Messrs. Dawes, Hale and Cockerell. The latter, commenting upon a remark that an increase of even a fourth class power could levy contributions on the seaboard cities, said that he would like Great Britain to levy a war contribution of even a nickel on New York. This set would be followed by an invasion of Canada and a confiscation of every particle of property owned there by Great Britain, amounting to billions and billions.

CANADA'S FATE. Mr. Hale remarked that the Canadian offset would make no figure in the question, because if there were any hostilities between Great Britain and the United States (which he prayed would be averted) England would assume in advance that the United States would take possession of Canada, and one reason why England might be driven by force of circumstances to exact contributions from sea-coast cities would be because she knew that she would lose Canada. The United States could not recoup upon her by taking Canada, because it was which held Canada to Great Britain was very small anyway. He believed that the annexation view in Canada was certainly enlarging and becoming more powerful, and that Canada would, in a peaceful way, and at no distant day, come to the United States. But if hostilities should occur, the first thing that would happen would be the occupation, overrunning and annexation of Canada by the United States troops, and England's only object to that would be her opportunities on the sea-coast cities of the United States.

A QUESTION OF FINANCE. Mr. Cockerell—What would become of the Canadian bonded debt held in England? I would permit that debt to be held as an obligation to be paid? There are millions and millions of Canadian railway and other bonds held in England, and when we overrun Canada are we to permit these obligations to be outstanding and valid against the United States? Do you suppose that we will not condemn them, that we will not appropriate every dollar of property there without assuming one cent of obligation to anybody?

Mr. Hale—By no means. But I am certain of this, that if Canada comes to us by peaceful processes we will assume her debt. Mr. Cockerell—There is no doubt of that. Mr. Hale—If she should come by war the question of debt, owed not to the British Government but to private individuals, would be a question for negotiation; and it is by no means certain that if the negotiation resulted in the absorption of Canada by the United States there would not accompany that a provision that the United States should assume the debt.

ENGLAND WARNED. Mr. Cockerell—I can say that it is absolutely certain that there would be no such negotiation, and I want England to know to-day that, in that event, we shall take Canada, with all that she has, without any kind of obligation to mortal being, national or individual. Canada knows that as well as we do, and England knows it. The discussion was continued on the general subject of coast fortifications, but without further special allusion to Canada and Great Britain. It was participated in by Senators Cockerell, Dawes, Hale, McPherson, Sherman, Plumb, Dolph, Reagan and Platt. Finally the vote was taken and the amendment was agreed to—24 to 22.

THE NORTH-WEST CONVENTION.

THE KIND OF GOVERNMENT WANTED. MEDICINE HAT, N.W.T., June 4.—The first session of the North-West convention opened at 11 o'clock this morning, at which the following delegates were present:—W. T. Finlay and George McCuaig, for Medicine Hat District; C. G. McCall, A. W. Hamilton, M.L.A., and J. Hollis, for Macleod District; Rev. George Dean, for Red Deer District, and Rev. North Qu'Appelle District. After being formally organized it was adjourned till eight in the evening. At the evening session the following additional delegates attended:—W. Brigham, from Medicine Hat District; M.L.A. Red Deer; W. A. Abbott, Medicine Hat, and J. A. Ross, M.L.A. Medicine Hat District. The formal opening over, the following resolution was moved by Messrs. Hamilton and Ross, and unanimously carried:—

That the number of delegates present and the districts represented do not warrant this meeting in assuming to discuss and deal with, as a territorial convention, public questions affecting the Territories.

A motion to adjourn was then made and carried. A public meeting was then organized at which the following resolution, moved by Messrs. Finlay and Hollis, was carried. It is desirable that a modified form of responsible government be granted to the Territories to the extent, at least, of the governor being placed in the same position as the lieutenant-governors of the provinces in the matter of having to act upon the advice of his advisory council and that the finances of the Territories be at the disposal of the Assembly.

Messrs. Hamilton, Hollis, Finlay, Ross, Abbott, Davis, M.P., McCall and Dr. Best spoke at length to the motion.

A VERY WICKED WOMAN.

HER PLOT TO MURDER A BARK PERMITTEE IN THE STRAITS.

PITTSBURGH, June 4.—Mrs. Sarah Handolph, aged 60, has been arrested at Newcastle, Lawrence county, for trying to induce Captain Kiesinger to kill William S. Foltz, president of the First National Bank at that place, for \$1,500. The woman has served a term in the penitentiary for an unusual crime. Kiesinger also served in the same prison for robbery. Kiesinger revealed the woman's plan to Mr. Foltz, and detectives shadowed her for three weeks, hoping to discover a mysterious third party who was to furnish the money. Kiesinger, in the meantime, pretended to carry out the plot. Mr. Foltz grew nervous and had the woman arrested before the third party was located. It was a cold blooded scheme on the part of the woman, who says she has no grievance against Foltz. Her counsel will enter a plea of insanity.

A MURDER TRIAL.

SUNDAY EVENING DRINKING CAUSED THE CRIME. ST. JOHN'S, N. B., June 4.—The trial of the young men Watts and Gray, charged with the murder of Samuel Torry, was concluded to-day. The jury to-night returned a verdict of not guilty in the case of Gray and of manslaughter in the case of Watts, coupled with a strong recommendation to marry. Watts voluntarily admitted stabbing Torry when there was not a particle of direct evidence against him, and said he struck Torry without thinking of the open knife with which he had been cutting tobacco. Sunday rum drinking was at the bottom of the trouble. Sentence was reserved.

NEWFOUNDLAND FURIOUS.

THE FRENCH OUTRAGES CAUSE INTENSE EXCITEMENT.

THE FRENCH COMMANDER'S STATEMENT.

ST. JOHN'S, N. B., June 4.—The French warship "Indre," Commander Marquis, which was recently reported to have created consternation on the so-called French shore of Newfoundland, is now here. In an interview regarding the reports of his ship's doing, Commander Marquis became very indignant and said in explanation: "The rights of our people on the French shore have been established by treaty and indisputably recognized for two hundred years. These rights include the first privilege of taking fish by our people in the bays and harbors of that coast. When the British fishermen are there at the same time as our people, they must make room for the French and accord to the first chance. That has always been our recognized right, and when a British warship is on the station her commander always sees to it that this is respected. All we have to do is to draw the attention of the British commander on the station to any complaint which we have and the cause is removed. But this spring there happened to be no British warships on the coast, none having arrived when I was there, and consequently, I had to request the British fishermen myself in a few instances to make room for our people. There were at the time probably five hundred nets set to Bay St. George, but I found it necessary only to request the removal of about a dozen of them in order to give the French fishermen a fair chance. My request was promptly complied with as usual, and the reports in such paragraphs as you have shown me."

ARE EXTRAORDINARILY EXAGGERATED FOR POLITICAL OR TRADE PURPOSES.

Our fishermen are only on the shore and exert their privilege for a short time each year; last year about a month, this year only about fifteen days; never longer than two months; only for that time do we interfere with the British residents fishing in every spot of the waters."

"THE MILE IN THE COCAINOT." "What might be the political or trade purposes to which you referred as the cause of these exaggerated reports?"

"Well, I observe in one report that as an alleged consequence of the action of the French authorities, the merchants of the coast are refusing to pay duties on the goods landed there now that the French have taken possession of the coast, and even demand a refund of duties paid by them for many years past. That accounts for the milk in the cocoanut, I think. The merchants of that shore are not in hearty accord with the Colonial Government at St. John's, and I write the people to extremes. These merchants are comparatively few, and the people, though very good hearted and genial themselves, are mostly ignorant and excitable; while they are entirely dependent upon these merchants, who have grown wealthy from their labors, and whose influence with them is almost supreme."

NO TROUBLE YET. "Do you anticipate anything like serious trouble with the English on account of this, or the establishment of the French canneries on the shore?"

"None whatever," replied the commander. "Our relations with the English residents of the coast in question and the people at St. John's have been and are the most amicable. All we ask in our fair rights, which have been freely accorded us in the past. There is really nothing to make a fuss about."

VIOLENT ARTICLES.

HALIFAX, June 4.—Newfoundland newspapers received to-night are filled with violent articles regarding the French outrages at Bay St. George. The St. John's Herald declares that the abduction of a British constable by a French fisherman vessel and leaving him on the lonely Red Island was only the beginning of outrages. It asserts that there was not a French fisherman within two hundred miles of Sandy Point, Bay St. George, the spot where the British were compelled to take up the nets, etc., on the 23rd ult. This seems to refute the statement of Commodore Marquis, asserting that "he simply requested some of the British fishermen to remove some of their nets to make room for French fishermen." Five years past Red Island was only a rocky island, and the French fishing boats were not there. It is sixty miles distant from Sandy Point, has been the only station visited by French fishermen. Even this station is not up to this date occupied by the French this year.

FRENCH INSOLENCE.

The Herald declares that this outrage upon the Imperial and colonial rights was aggravated in the highest degree by the circumstances of insolence and violence which attended its perpetration. "An armed body of French marines," it says, "went in their boats to the place in the harbor of Sandy Point, where the nets of Newfoundland fishermen were set, and there, under the very guns of the British warship 'Pelican,' ordered them to be taken out of the water. Having forcibly usurped Britain's maritime jurisdiction the French next proceeded to assert a territorial jurisdiction, when a fully armed French officer landed at Sandy Point and read to the assembled British citizens a command to take up their gear. These acts of violence constitute such a contempt of British authority as to amount to a declaration of war. Until this moment France never laid up any claim to sovereignty in Newfoundland. They landed their armed marines in order that they might set up an authority to exercise a coercive jurisdiction."

WAR WILL COME.

The Herald goes on to declare that the people must feel that they will defend themselves and any further interference must result in bloodshed. On the evening of the next few days hang the nets of life and death in the colony. If the blood of Newfoundland's sons is spilled, and Britain looks on as the murderer the Herald fears that the long decision of two centuries may be quenched in the bosom of the people.

THE NEWFOUNDLAND LEGISLATURE.

NEW YORK, June 4.—A special from St. John's, N.B., says that in the House of Assembly last evening Mr. Carthy, parliamentary representative of the district of St. George's Bay, question Premier Whiteley in reference to the outrages committed on British residents. Mr. Carthy read a message which he had received from the French warship 'Indre' at St. John's, Bay, wherein he stated that armed French marines went in boats to places in the harbor where British fishermen had nets set and ordered them removed or they would cut them loose, and that a French naval officer, armed, landed at Sandy Point and read a notice to the inhabitants to take up their nets immediately. The Premier admitted having received a telegram from a magistrate at St. George's stating that a French armed officer landed and read a notice to the people, and did not deny that armed marines went through the harbor and ordered the fishermen to take up their nets. The Premier read a letter from Mr. Carthy, demanding on behalf of the people whose nets were removed by the French warship 'Indre,' compensation for the losses which they have sustained by reason of such removal, and also demanding compensation for the losses which the owners of the lobster factories sustain by reason of the factories being closed by order of the British ships of war.

If the Imperial Government is not in possession of the foregoing facts, the blame entirely rests with the Government of Newfoundland. The telegrams already forwarded are true in every particular.

GENERAL.

COUNTRY CURIO. New Orleans, La.—Q.—Could you give a short sketch of Mozart in the Witness? Ans.—Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, one of the greatest musicians the world has ever produced, was born at Salzburg, January 27th, 1756. He was educated by his father, Leopold Mozart, a violinist of high repute in the service of the Archbishop of Salzburg. When only three years old he played the harpsichord lessons of his sister Maria, five years his senior. A year later he played minuets and composed some little pieces. Not long afterwards he attempted to write a concerto. When he was nine he performed before the first time in the hall of the university. In 1768 Leopold Mozart took both his children on a musical tour, during the course of which they played before most of the nobles of Germany. At Vienna little Mozart sang into the Empress's lap and played her heartily. The favor shown him at Court was almost incredible; yet he remained so gentle and docile as ever, and so amenable to parental authority that he used to say, "Next after God comes my father." At every court he visited in the following year's tour he was loaded with honors and presents, and he became an intimate friend of the Emperor's son, who he dedicated to the Queen, and wrote an anthem for four voices "God is our Refuge" in 1780 he was taken by his father to study in Italy, where he remained for two years, taking a valuable diploma at Bologna. After suffering much indignity at the hands of a patron (the Archbishop Hieronymus), he became an intimate friend of the Emperor Joseph, which was received with acclamation. From that time he served the Emperor. In the same year Mozart married the penniless daughter of the prompter of a theatre. This event is called a disaster, but it is certain that the wife helped him in his work, and at night, when he was composing and transcribing, she would tell him fairy stories to keep him awake. In April, 1787, he was offered a salary of 4,450 by Frederick William II, but on the Emperor Joseph's reproaching him, he determined to stay where he was, to starve on a fifth of that amount per year. He died on the fifth of December, 1791. He wrote continuously, almost to the day of his death.

These coins, which were struck in gold, but with legends so barbarous that none of the names of the kings can with certainty be read until that of Silius, who commenced to reign in 845, are comparatively common. It may be inferred then that coins were first minted in Ireland about the beginning of the ninth century. G. A. Ont.—Q.—Would you kindly tell me in your Query Column 1. The value of a postage stamp marked "Natal, Sixpence," with the picture of Queen Victoria on it. 2. Where can I get a price list of the value of old coins? Ans.—1. There have been several issues of stamps in Natal, the latest of which are common. Unless your stamp belongs to an early issue it is only worth a few cents. 2. PAYING AN ANNUITY—EXPENSE OF REMITTING.

"FORTY YEARS A WITNESS READER." Ont.—Q.—I. As executor to an estate in Ontario, out of which an annuity has to be paid, must I be notified before each payment (the parties living far apart) that the annuitant is living, attested being made before a justice of the peace? Payment is during life. The will makes no conditions as to payment; simply, so much as to be paid yearly out of estate. 2. When advised by annuitant how to send the money and how to charge the expense of sending it? Thus if told to send the annuity by bank or mail order after whose expense is it sent to be paid? 3. Where can I get the names of the banks that the annuitant still lives before making payment. 2. Apparently the expense is properly the annuitant's.

A CRIMINAL OFFENCE.

A STRICKER, Ont.—Q.—Am a shareholder and at present suspended stockholder of joint stock company (Ltd.) in Ontario, in going over the accounts of our late manager find some "crooked" ones. 1. We are charged the full amount of one of those accounts, viz. \$125, although I can prove that the actual amount paid in satisfaction was only \$100 owing to numerous reductions. 2. We are also charged in the same account (as mentioned above) with material valued at \$35 that was used in another factory with which we have no connection. I also got witnesses to prove this. This is only one of several crooked accounts. We have no vouchers for the different accounts, but have only our own books. I have sent our company showing the amounts expended by him. Can we take an action for fraud against him? (It is a case of obtaining money under false pretences.) Can we sue him in the matter? Ans.—We would refer you to sec. 53 of the (Dominion) act respecting larceny and similar offences 69 Vict. chap. 104. This section seems to cover the case in hand. It reads as follows: "Every one who, unlawfully and with intent to defraud, by taking, by embezzling, by obtaining by false pretences, or in any other manner whatsoever, appropriate to the matter, or to the use of any other person, any property whatsoever, so as to deprive any other person temporarily, or absolutely of the advantage, use or enjoyment of any beneficial interest in such property in law or in equity, which such other person has therein, is guilty of a misdemeanor, and liable to be punished as in the case of simplicity, and the value of the property so obtained exceeds two hundred dollars, the offender shall be liable to four years' imprisonment."

THE FRENCH IN NEWFOUNDLAND.

Newfoundland is the oldest of British colonies,

for it was discovered in 1497 by Cabot,

the flag of England was hoisted upon it in

1683 by Sir John Gilbert, the first of the

English colonizers of the new era, and at no

time since it was first taken possession of has

it either in law or in fact ceased to be a part

of the domains of the British Crown. The

French fishing rights upon the French shore

of the island are, therefore, based, not upon

either prior discovery on settlement or on

any territorial claim whatever, but solely

upon treaty provisions. During the great

war of the Spanish succession France seized

the British posts on Hudson Bay, and after a

heroic campaign by a French Canadian, se-

cured possession of Placentia, where a fort-

ress was established, and of all but one of the

Newfoundland settlements, but the occupation

of the island was only a partial one. Article

XIII of the treaty of Utrecht, upon which

France's original claims rest, reads as fol-

lows:—

"The island called Newfoundland, with the adjacent

islands, shall from this time forward belong of right

wholly to Great Britain, and to that end the town and

fortress of Placentia, and whatever other places in the

said island are in the possession of the French, shall be

yielded and given up within seven months, from the

exchange of the ratification of this treaty, or sooner if

possible, by the most Christian king, to those

who have a commission from the Queen of Great

Britain for that purpose. Nor shall the most Chris-

tian king, his heirs and successors, or any of their

subjects, at any time hereafter lay claim to any right

to the said island and islands, or to any part of it

or them. Moreover it shall not be lawful for the subjects

of France to fortify any place on the said island of New-

foundland, or erect any building there, besides stages

made of boards, and but necessary and usual for drying

of fish, or to erect to the said islands beyond the time

necessary for fishing and drying of fish. But it shall be

allowed to the subjects of France to catch fish, and to

dry them on land in that part only, and in no other

part of the said island of Newfoundland, which

stretches from the place called Cape Bonaville to the

northern part of the said island and from thence, run-

ning down by the western side, reaching as far as the

place called Pointe Riche."

A BUMPTIOUS RAILWAY COMPANY.

THE ROAD COMMITTEE AND A CANADIAN PACIFIC NUISANCE.

The Road committee, at a meeting yesterday afternoon, Ald. Prefontaine in the chair, opened tenders for a number of sewers and awarded contracts as follows:—Paris of St. Denis, C. Belhomme, \$8.49; Aqueduct, L. M. Donald, \$7.50; Miguonne, C. Belhomme, \$5.45; Felix, C. Belhomme, \$6.95; Guilbault, N. Laporte, \$6.90; St. Paul, N. Gault, \$8.80.

Mr. Hutchison, representing Cote St. Antoine, appeared before the Committee and stated that they wished to make arrangements to connect their drainage system with the city's intercepting sewer as soon as built. A short piece of sewer, in order to make connections, would have to be constructed on city property. Would the city agree to build that and charge it? The Committee decided that it would.

Mr. Joseph wrote that proprietors of a lane in rear of Phillips square were quite willing to pave it permanently provided the city would provide stone blocks.

Ald. Wilson declared the lane an eyesore, it was very dirty and people were complaining. The chairman remarked that a clause in the new charter gave the city full power to force proprietors to pave in such cases. The Committee, however, did not intend acting unless the case was urgent. Left over for the passage of Ald. Stephenson's new by-law on the subject.

Messrs. Curran and Grenier wrote claiming damages amounting to \$20, through having their place on St. James street drenched by a faulty hydrant. Referred to the Water Committee.

The Montreal Blanket Company claimed the value of a carboy of vitriol, broken in carting along St. Patrick street, owing to the horrible condition of the roadway. Ordered to be paid.

Regarding Mr. Grothe's claim for damages by flooding on St. Denis street, the City Attorney sent an opinion to the effect that Cote St. Louis had turned two natural watercourses into the city's drain on St. Denis street without authority; that, if the city was condemned in costs, the damages could be recovered from Cote St. Louis. The claims were accordingly ordered to be sent to the City Attorney, the cases to take their course in the courts.

A claim for \$144 owing to a carriage having been broken on a piece of bad roadway was referred to a sub-committee.

A C. P. R. NUISANCE.

Messrs. W. Ogilvie and others' complaint respecting oil and water dripping through the Mountain street Canadian Pacific bridge was next discussed.

"It's a positive nuisance," said Ald. Wilson. "I have talked with both Messrs. Peterson and Shaughnessy, about it, in fact, I went for Peterson pretty hard. They should be compelled to alter it."

"I have notified the Company," said the City Surveyor, "but it has not done anything."

"It's not fair to the citizens to be getting their clothes soiled," said the Chairman.

"Send it to the City Attorney," said Ald. Dubuc's suggestion, "with instructions to take proceedings."

Milder counsel, however, prevailed, the City Surveyor being requested to send another notification.

The Bell Telephone Company wrote that they desired to place their wires underground on St. Catherine street and asked permission to open the street for that purpose. They were asked to submit a plan of just what subways they wished to construct, with full details.

Mr. S. H. Taylor wrote complaining that Milton street, between Mance and St. Lawrence, had not been opened, and urging that it be done immediately as proprietors were suffering. Referred to the special sub-committee on street opening.

A request to widen Notre Dame, between Frontenac and the Canadian Pacific bridge, was sent to the same Committee.

Mount Royal Avenue proprietors, between Rivard and Heriot streets, asked for sidewalk. They were told to first cede the street to the city.

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

Mr. R. Stanley Bagg's protest against changing the name of "Bagg" to "Prince Arthur" street, was read. Mr. Bagg said his father had owned large estates and given certain streets, and his name should be retained. "He didn't give that street, anyway," said Mr. St. George, "and the people up there want the name changed."

"The street must have one name," said the Chairman. "We might perhaps call some other street 'Bagg,' but this has got to be 'Prince Arthur' from University street to St. Louis square. The City Attorney offers no opinion as to Mr. Bagg's title to call the street after his father. He simply states that he has no facts to form an opinion on."

It was stated that a change in the name would have an immediate effect on the value of properties along the whole line westward, and the alderman, seeing a prospect of increased revenue for the city in the shape of increased assessments, decided to report to Council to change the name of Bagg and Courville to Prince Arthur then and there.

Mr. Grier, lumber merchant, asked for a longer time to deliver tannin chloride for paving. He couldn't get his raft down. Mr. St. George admitted that they were using up the timber in rapid style this spring, but the contract called for it, and it was decided not to give the contractor any more time.

The City Attorney sent an opinion to the effect that if Cote Visitation wanted the city to allow connection with its sewer on Papineau road, the municipality should guarantee half cost. It was decided to make Cote Visitation acquainted with this opinion.

Reports for permanent sidewalks were next taken up. St. Patrick street was recommended for four feet flagging with coal tar sides (same as Sherbrooke); St. Lambert Hill, 12 feet asphalt or cement; St. Catherine (De Lorimier avenue to Papineau road), flagstone, asphalt or cement, full width; do. do. Bierry to Papineau road; Lacroix street, 12 feet (asphalt or cement); St. Peter, six feet, flagstone, flagstone lane, three feet asphalt; St. Lawrence 12 feet asphalt or cement, the present granite block on the east side to be widened to 12 feet throughout; St. Vincent, 6 feet, asphalt or cement; St. Gabriel, 6 feet; Place d'Armes Hill, asphalt or cement (12 feet); St. Theresa, do., 6 feet; Windsor, St. James to Osborne, 12 feet, stone flags with coal tar sides; part of Papineau road, do. Pool street, Cypress to St. Catherine, do. Ald. P. Kennedy wanted something done about Mill street. He was told that the proprietors on each side must petition the Government if they wished the city to take over that street.

Messrs. Lesage, Lacroix, Leprohon and Mathieu, now engaged for two or three years past "temporarily" in the Department, it was decided to place on the permanent staff, the City Surveyor to have a report ready at next meeting to this effect, in order to send it to Council and asked that these gentlemen's salaries be fixed.

A CANADIAN "CYCLONE."

DELLI, Ont., June 4.—The storm of last night was the most disastrous known in these parts for years. Three barns with contents, as far as heard from, have been destroyed, one owned by Matthew Buchner, another by W. W. Clinton, and a third by Peter Kemp.

BROOKLINE, Ont., June 4.—A heavy thunder storm passed over this village last night, and immediately following an unusually brilliant flash of lightning flames were seen issuing from the large tannery owned by Wm. Murray & Co. A bucket brigade was formed and succeeded in confining the flames to the burning building.

Loss, about \$20,000; insurance, about \$10,000. Twenty-five men are thrown out of employment.

PARRY SOUND, Ont., June 4.—During a thunderstorm which passed over this place this evening the house of Joseph McGee was struck by lightning and his little daughter Jessie instantly killed. Another child close by escaped, although for some time afterwards she was affected by the shock. The lightning tore a hole through the roof and smashed the partition.

SCOTLAND, Ont., June 4.—A very heavy rain-fall occurred here last night. The Oakland mill dam burst during the early part of the night and carried away the bridge and about seven rods of the approaches on the highway leading through the village from Brantford and Waterford.

THE POLITICAL CAMPAIGN.

MR. BEAUGRAND AND MR. LAURENT ON THE ENGLISH VOTE IN ST. LOUIS WARD.

On Tuesday evening in St. James' Ward a meeting was held in Mr. Ange's favor, and G. O. Corvair's letter supporting him was read. He claims that Ald. Brunet promises to the workmen that he is not to be depended upon, as he would have no sympathy for them after the elections. Mr. Lepine, M.P., pronounced himself in favor of both of Mr. Ange and Mr. Beland in St. Louis division.

In St. Louis division, Mr. Laurent is working hard and claims that the English are with him. Mr. Beaugrand, the Liberal candidate, also claims that he has the English vote; and refers to his strong temperance principles, and his freedom from race prejudices, as the reason of the English speaking people supporting him so generously. His declaration of principle, however, is that he respects the Liberals in their place and the Nationalists in their place. How he can expect to get the English vote and the National vote also is not explained in the address. The English vote will certainly go for no candidate who travels in the same boat with either Mr. Mercier or the Nationalists. Mr. Beaugrand, on being interviewed, repudiated Mr. Mercier, saying that he is not a Mercier man and that Mr. Mercier would draw him more in the House than a straight Conservative, and that in proof of this Mr. Mercier has put Ald. Rainville, a Liberal, in the field against him in order to break the Liberal vote.

In St. Mary's division a number of Ald. Jeanotte's supporters met last night, at their committee room, corner of Dorchester street and Papineau road, and pledged him their support in the contest with Mr. Beland, the labor candidate, whom, it may be said, is very popular. A meeting of Ald. Jeanotte's supporters is to be held to-morrow evening at 312 Logan street, at which addresses will be given by Ald. Jeanotte, Messrs. Lamarque, Germain and Mr. E. Lavigne.

THE JACQUES CARTIER CAMPAIGN is being vigorously pressed. On Tuesday evening a meeting of English speaking electors was held in the Lachine town hall, at which over 300 electors were present. Messrs. Curran, M.P., and Girouard, M.P., represented the Hon. Mr. Tait.

Mr. Girouard made a vigorous attack on the Government and its representative, Mr. Boyer, and charged the Government with having sunk the Province into debt, and with having time and time again broken their pledges. Mr. Boyer, in reply, held that the Government were not responsible for the acts of political bums, and that they had the interest of the Province at heart.

Mr. Curran, M.P., also denounced the corrupting influence of the Government, and urged the support of Mr. Tait.

HE WILL NOT RUN.

Mr. J. F. Redmond has decided not to take the field in St. Ann's division. Mr. Redmond, speaking to a *Witnes* reporter this morning, said:

Finally said: "I have just made up my mind not to come out. I have already told the labor delegates once or twice before that I did not think I could be their candidate, and to-night I shall inform them definitely that under no circumstances can I take the field. My reasons for so doing are because my health is so shattered that I could not stand the fight. I am only just out of a sick bed where I have been confined for weeks. I am very much pleased by the tokens of confidence that the workmen have reposed in me, and were my health but good I would willingly accede to their demands."
