Sparks from the Telegraph. Denis Florence McCarthy, the poet, is dead.

A revolution has broken out in Hayti against the President.

The Moscow Telegraph has been suspended for four months.

The Vera Cruz, Mexico, Council has prohibited blighting within the city limits.

Two Gloucester schooners, with twenty-two men, have been lost on the George's Bank.

The Manitoba Legislature has been called for the despatch of business on Thursday, April 27.

The Austrian Government intends to protect all its subjects regardless of political or religious opinions.

Of thirteen persons convicted for stealing from the Emperor of China's palace six were beheaded.

The crew of a foreign vessel were attacked by the Islanders of the coast of Corea and two murdered.

The British Government is having four torpedo batteries built for the Dardanelles and the Bosphorus.

Intense feeling exists in southern Manitoba against the present management of the Manitoba & Southwestern Railway.

Attacks upon the Jews in Southern Russia have recommenced in the city of Jersha shops were fired with petroleum.

The firm of Langdin, Shepard & Co., of St. Paul, are preparing to commence work on the 800 miles contract on the Canadian Pacific Railway.

At the Reform convention at Napanee, Ont., D. W. Allison, ex-warden, was nominated to oppose Sir John Macdonald at the coming election.

The Emperor and Empress of Russia will not make a state visit to St. Petersburg, but a grand, customary at this season, nor hold a subsequent reception.

The elephant "Jumbo" was landed at New York in good condition on the 9th, in presence of an enormous crowd. His first act was to drink a quart of water.

The island of Cyprus is to have a Constitution and a Legislative Council, to consist of nine Christian and three Mohammedan members, with six officials and a president.

Lieut. Foxgarden is busy fitting out a North Pole expedition. He is provisioned for six months, and will follow Leigh Smith's track.

One hundred and fifty men employed at the Ontario Rolling Mills, Hamilton, were discharged on Friday, because an employe was discharged whom the men wished to have retained.

The women employed in a number of laundries at Paterson, N. J., struck on Saturday. The strikers took their clothes to the Chinese laundries. The Chinamen refused to accept the work.

The coal companies of Cumberland, Md., will replace three thousand miners, who have been laid off, by the end of the month. The decision is to "boycott" them, and a disturbance is probable.

At the Liberal-Conservative convention for the North District of Hastings, the Hon. Mr. Beaulieu was nominated for the seat of the Commons, and Mr. A. F. Wood for the Ontario Legislature.

The British Ambassador laid the cornerstone of a new English Church at Rome on the 8th, to be named "All Saints." Thirty other English churches are in progress.

The Boston Grand Jury has indicted Fitzgerald, alias Morrissey, on the charge of three cheques representing \$20,000 from Chas. Francis Adams, also for conspiring with two other parties to defraud Adams. Fitzgerald pleaded guilty, and was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary.

The bill of exceptions taken in the Queen case and signed by Judge Cox, makes a printed pamphlet of thirty-nine pages. There are thirty-two exceptions as to matters occurring up to the time the case was given to the jury, and exceptions also as to the rulings of the Court denying new trial and overruling the motion in arrest of judgment.

The amalgamated trades unions of New York, the 7th of March, calling for eight hour labor only, and just and fair compensation for labor. Resolutions were adopted declaring that Arthur, by vetoing the Chinese Bill, ignored the interests of the people, by protecting the Chinese six companies.

REMARKABLE FATALITY. Three Sisters Die within a Few Minutes of Each Other. PHILADELPHIA, April 9.—Last night the young Mrs. Watson, a 52 year old woman, died of a sudden. Her husband, Mr. Watson, another sister, was sent for. Mrs. Watson expired in a few minutes. Almost immediately Mrs. Watson fell to the floor in an unconscious state and died in ten minutes. Her husband had a convulsive chill and died from apoplexy, which ensued, and that Mrs. Watson and Mrs. Smith died from nervous prostration which ensued, attacks of heart disease, or apoplexy. There is no suspicion of foul play.

GORTSCHAKOFF. The Russian Chancellor designs the Minister of Foreign Affairs. ST. PETERSBURG, April 9.—An imperial ukase states that in deference to the wish of Prince Gortschakoff, the Czar has relieved him of the functions of Minister of Foreign Affairs, on account of his shattered health, which has been declining years. Gortschakoff still retains the dignity of Imperial Chancellor and member of the Council of the Empire. On an imperial ukase which was delivered to Gortschakoff the Czar wrote with his own hand, "With sincere esteem of your grateful Alexander." In a second ukase De Giers is appointed Minister of Foreign Affairs.

THE IRISH-AMERICAN SUSPECTS.

The Truth About American Intervention—English Opinion.

New York, April 9.—The Tribune's London special says: The truth about the American intervention in behalf of Irish-American suspects is stated by English authorities to be as follows:—No American, known to be such when the warrant was issued, has been arrested.

The fact of a suspect being American or of foreign nationality, would not have been considered by the Irish Executive to constitute immunity from arrest, if the accused person brought himself within the range of the coercion Act. This act has been administered, like every other act for the prevention of crime, without respect of persons. Every sentence was carefully examined, and the American Minister invariably, pursuant to instructions, lodged in the British Foreign Office a formal statement of the prisoner's claim, together with a request for particulars of the offence and speedy trial. One suspect was released last Autumn. About a month since, the question was brought more urgently before the British Government, Mr. Lowell, in obedience to instructions from the American Minister, advised of all Irish-American suspects. Active negotiations followed. The British Government never admitted nor understood the terms of the agreement, and that had a legal right to interfere. The Government would resist such a claim if advanced. It is believed the American Government expressly admitted that certain persons had violated the law because subject to the same penalty as Irishmen. No English lawyer ventures to assert or admit the right of a foreign government to discriminate between English states or to subject to a different treatment under one and not liable under another, when the American Government urged the release of American suspects on the grounds of expediency and courtesy, the British Government showed an immediate readiness to listen to the various proposals. Suggestions were made on both sides, the British Government insisting on the American Government, who disavowed the first proposal, to treat as a whole what would be satisfactory. Mr. Foster expressed to everybody with whom he conversed, not only a willingness but anxiety to grant releases. The British Government finally agreed to release all who would promise to leave the country. It is believed that it contained itself with a less pledge from some of those who were discharged. All were discharged, including the names of the party, on which the British Government apparently acted on without waiting for American acceptance, occurred before the New York meeting was held, and before the British Government had received the British public fully understands that the Government is not in a position to release any of the party, or any other American. THE RIOTOUS ITALIANS. -FORT PLAIN, N. Y., April 10. -One of the Italian concerned in the riot on Saturday was fatally wounded and ten others hurt. Many officers and citizens narrowly escaped, and several were injured. The trouble is attributed to Rose and Chase, interpreters, and young Chase and his brother, who were given money to buy food for the hungry Italian until the pay rolls were made out, but who, it is alleged, pocketed the money and told the Italians they would get no pay and advised them to kill the contractors.
