Quyon's 54th Fair was a fantastic success

We often hear the old cliché, "bigger and better than ever" applied to events like country fairs. Well, this year it would be no exaggeration if applied to Quyon Fair, and I have seen all fifty four of them. Everyone who was there agreed that it was the best crowd for at least twenty years. And no doubt about it, a crowd helps to make a fair.

The reasons: a hard working president, Ken Bronson, secretary Gene Huckabone and staff, a diversified president and of course, excellent weather, that always helps. There were the usual important items. The special Clydesdale Day for the Province of Quebec on Friday, Provincial Percheron Day on Saturday. A few new cattle exhibitors, the annual Quyon Cal Club Show, the excellent flower exhibit in the main hall. The Pontiac Women's Institute exhibits upstairs as well as all the other attractions in the ladies department.

But there were some new things such as the spectacular horse show Friday night, notably the roadster class, as good as one might see at Ottawa or anywhere else, won by an old Quyon boy, Royce Stephens, now living in Smiths Falls.

Also the ball games for which Quyon is becoming famous. The excellent card of horse races on Saturday with a purse of \$2500, much of it made possible through Loto Quebec.

An interesting class on Saturday was the one for gentlemen over 70 driving roadsters, indeed some were over 80. All driving like veterans, which indeed they were. Noticed among the competitors were Alex Davis, Fred Hutchison and Sherwood Henderson, all of Quyon and Claude Elliott, Lawson Corrigan and Harper Rennie of Shawville. So good were all these drivers that the judge could not make a decision and awarded each one a red ribbon.

The fair was brought to a climax Saturday night with the currently popular tractor driving competitions. Some of these machines were conventional machines, some were the modified contraptions with up to 16 cylinders which in order to be started had to be pulled at high speed but once going belched fire and brimstone like a turbo-jet and could pull anything with two ends to it. A few of the competitors were local boys but several machines came over 100 miles with two or three of these motorized giants hauled on huge floats.

Amusement opportunities at the fair were not neglected. The midway was larger and better patronized than has been the case for several years. The UCW was kept busy serving excellent meals in the hall from breakfast until late at night, while the Agricultural Society ladies looked after the demand at the outside booths.

All in all, there was something for everyone. At a fair that spells success.

St Mary's Teachers College Reunion

Saturday, July 27, marked another special occasion in Chapeau's Centennial program. Approximately one fourth of those graduates who attended the school opened as Ecole Normale in 1940 and closed as St. Mary's Teachers College in 1969, returned to their Alma Mater.

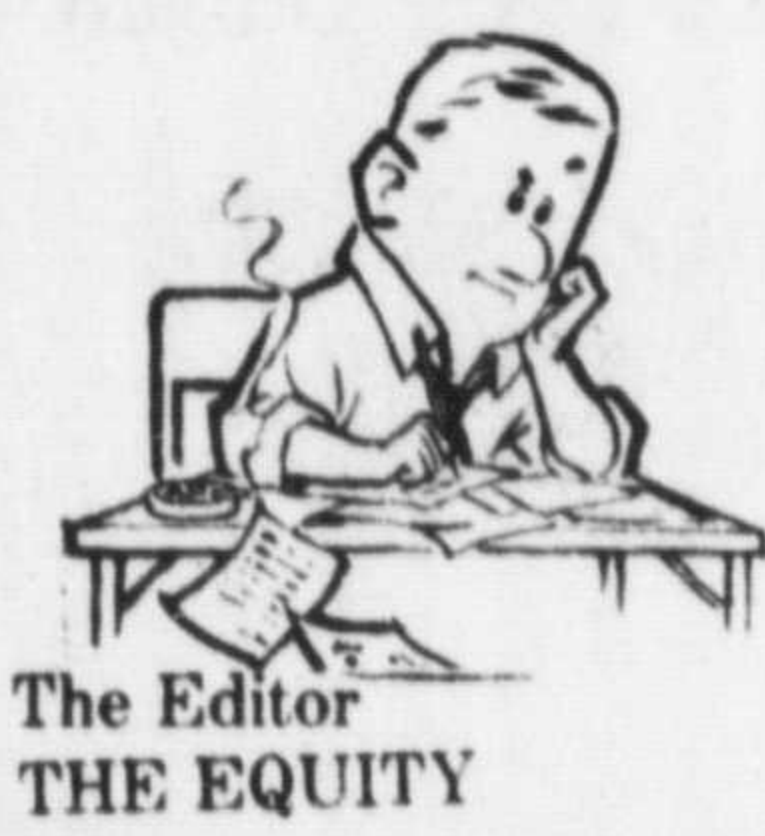
Vacation Bible School

IT SEEMS TOO BAD!

The Opportunities for Youth people come up with excellent projects, for instance the *Historical Record* which was amalgamated for Clarendon, Thorne and Shawville during two summers in 1972 and 1973. The six projects being carried out this summer throughout the County are also of considerable value and interest too but at the moment our attention is drawn to the historical work done by that Shawville group.
 The reason we are reminded of this is that today, as has happened from time to time, someone was interested in referring to the records preserved in that particular collection.
 We might recall that the students involved went to considerable lengths to collect material from old scrap books, attics and cellars, account books, newspapers, daily journals and diaries about the early days of Clarendon, Thorne and Shawville, and their finished product was about sixty very full binders of notes as well as photographs, source material and a collection of taped interviews with elderly citizens, some of whom have since passed away.
 All this material was placed for safekeeping in a special room provided in Shawville Town Hall and is under the protection of the Municipal Secretary Treasurer.
 In spite of the precautions some of this precious material is no longer in the collection. To begin with the index which was the product of many hours of laborious study is missing. Also volumes 3, 5, 23, 54, 56, 57, and 59 of the bound works are gone in their places. Photographs which will never be replaced are gone.
 It is very likely that whoever has this material is using it to compile a book or other creation about the early days of these communities - and we are very much in favor of any such endeavour. Also we wouldn't want anyone who is using the material to feel bad about having borrowed it - but we feel that it would be appropriate for whoever has it to notify the Town Clerk, Mrs. Evelyn Dale, of the whereabouts of the documents. In this way, if anyone else would like to look at them they could go to where they are and do so.
 Hopefully the missing material is not far from its home base. Hopefully the borrower or borrowers will either return it right away or notify Mrs. Dale, and also hopefully, the material will henceforth be kept in its proper place for the use of historians and researchers from now into the future.
 The historical background of this area must not be forgotten. The students who tried so hard to preserve it for future students should not have done it all to no avail. Everybody who sees their collections will realize that it would be a terrible calamity if it just disappeared gradually because people forgot to return it.
 The original intent was for the material to be used only in the room provided by the Municipality. For this purpose the students built a special shelving arrangement and desks and chairs for the use of researchers. Because of crowded conditions in the Municipal Library the room has had to be used for an overflow of books which have no room on the shelves and must be kept in cardboard boxes. This is too bad and suggests to us that the whole problem of the Library should come under Council consideration. But we digress. The problem of the disappearing historical documents still remains.
 Let's get those volumes back - right away!

 On Sunday from ten to five the exhibitions and folk singing continued.

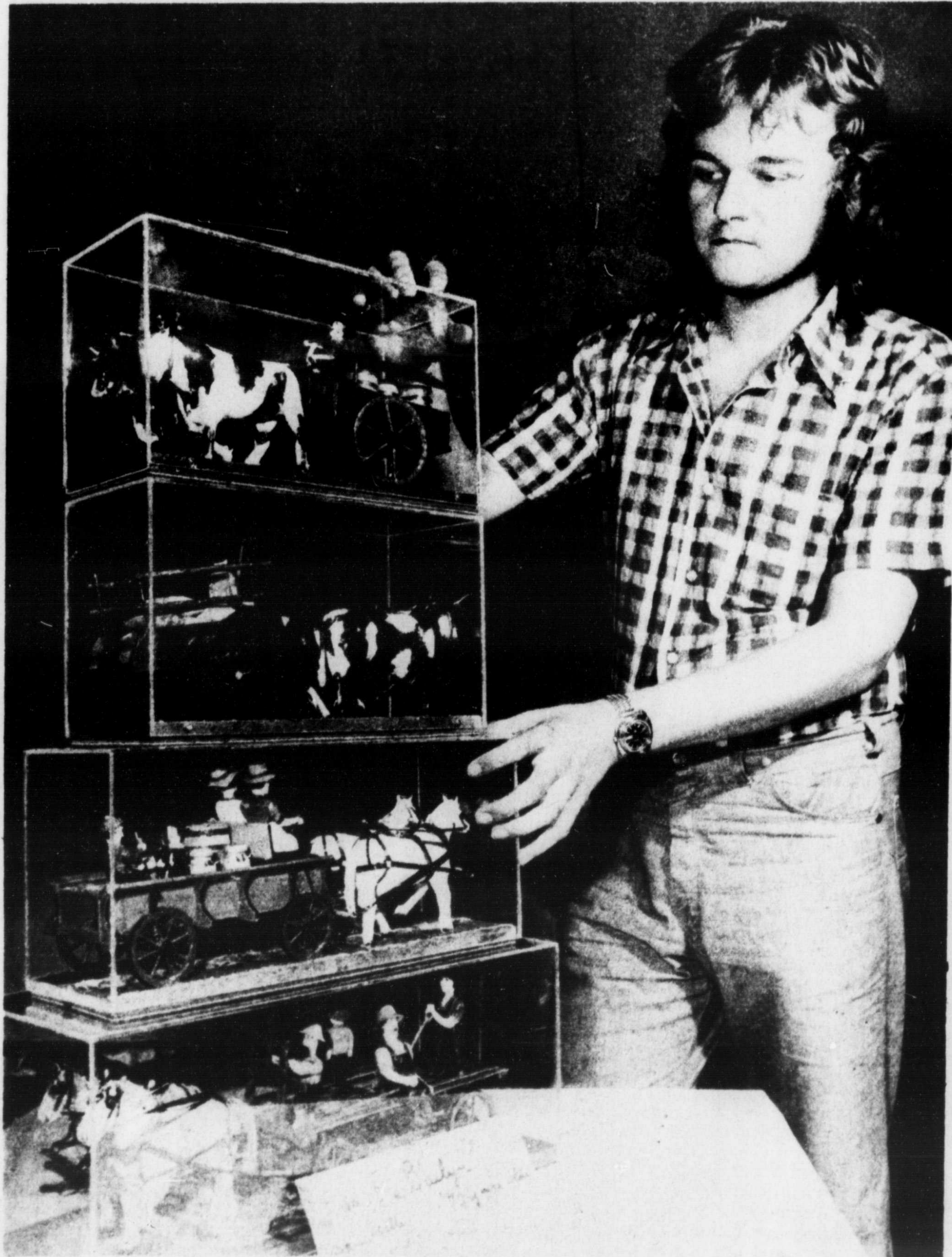


Elke and Robert Wills and their baby Alexander from Charteris. Artist Elke displayed several of her paintings at Vinton.

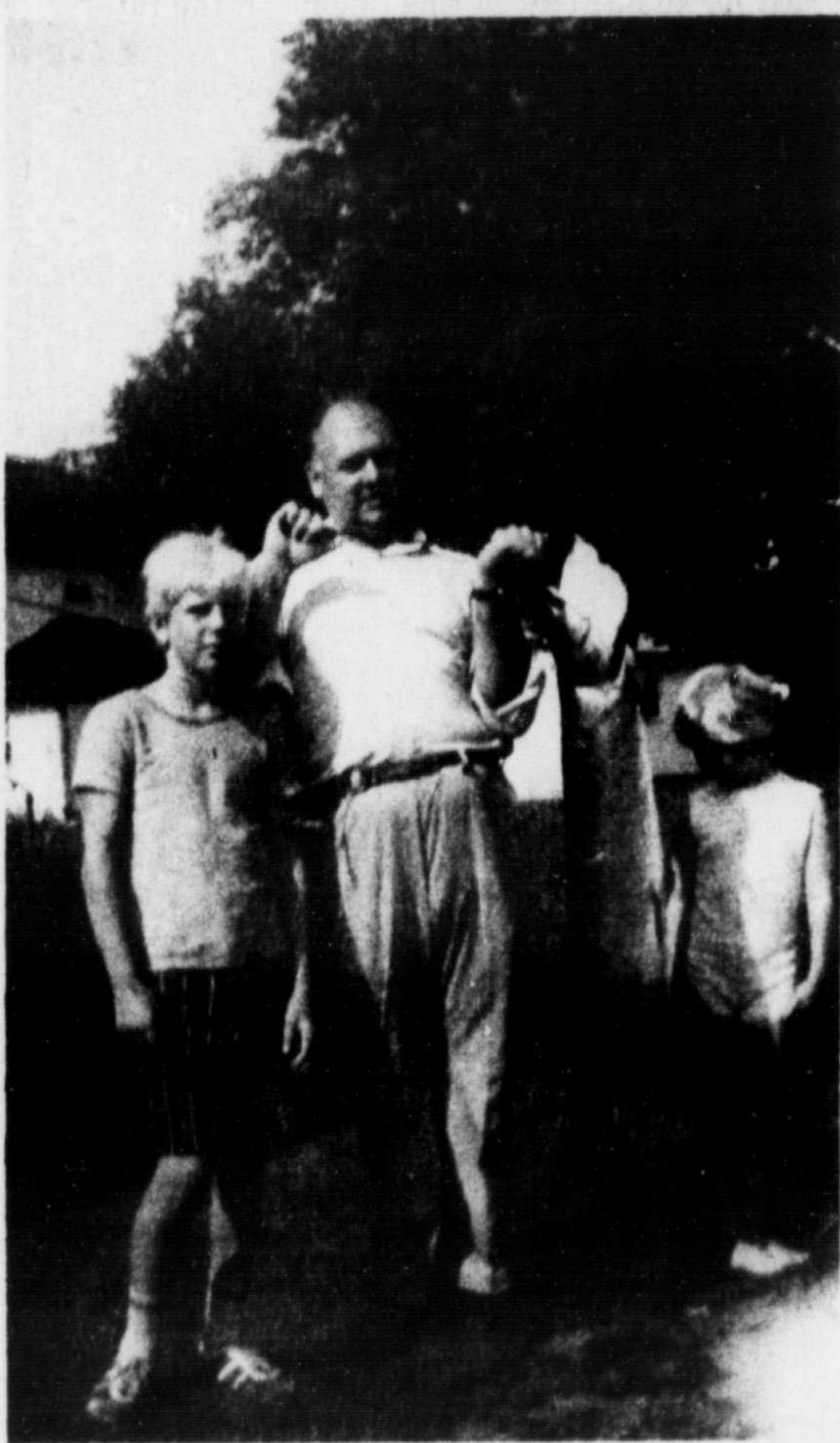

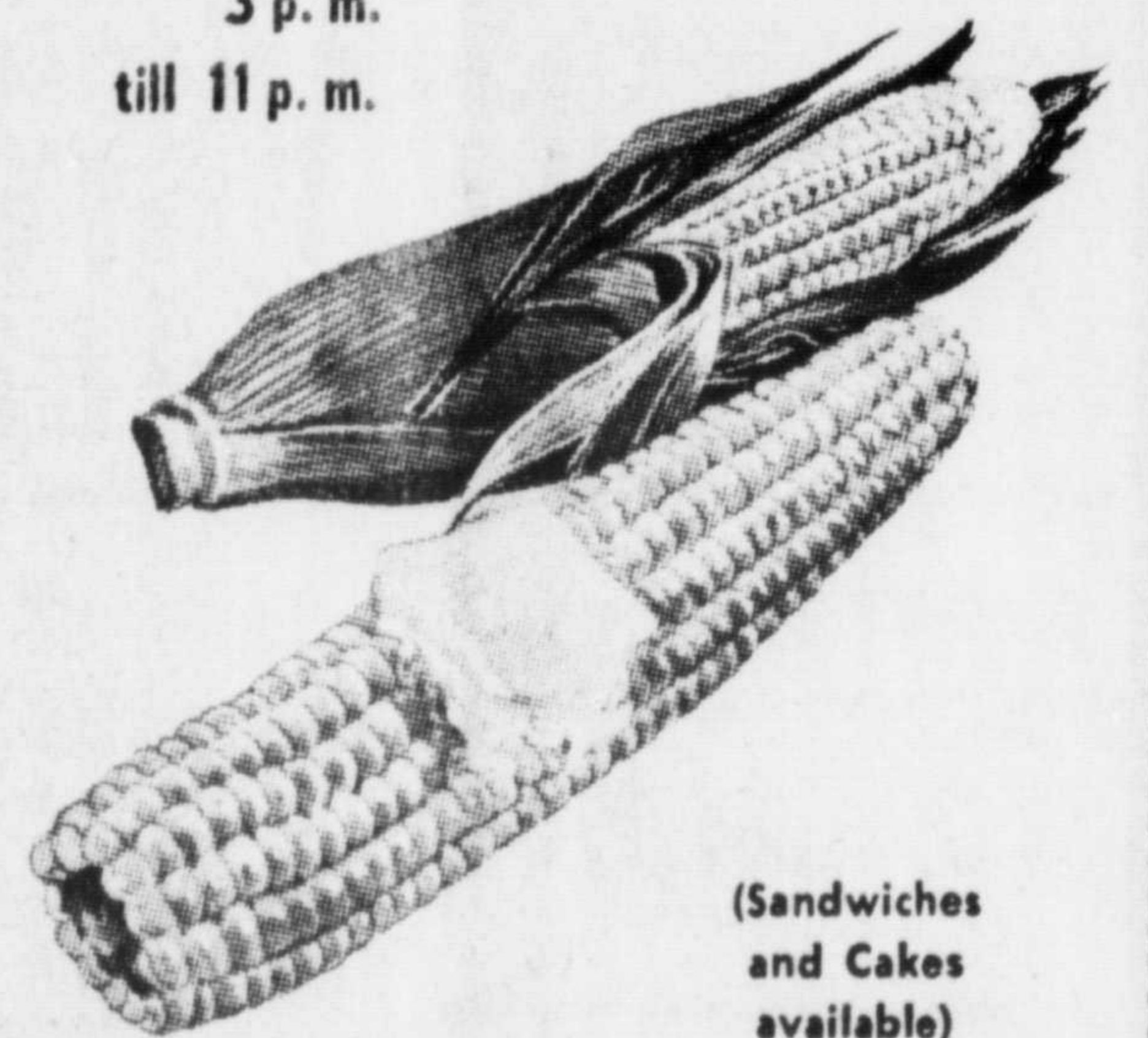

Food Sense in Canada - NO NONSENSE

Warning: Heed Mealtime Storm Signals

Anytime of the year it's the time to look for storm signals in the health field, lagging appetites and table-time temper tantrums are family storm warnings.

When mealtime music becomes a chorus of "NO's!" from the small fry, parents and oldsters would do well to read between the lines.

Joan Fielden, Nutrition Consultant to the Bakery Foods Foundation of Canada says, "Youngsters and appetites are easily parted — a fact to remember when emotional problems are allowed to invade the mealtime atmosphere. Wise are the parents who encourage their children to bring problems home for discussion — but the dining room should never be turned into a family court. Any emotional upset — excitement, disappointment, anger or fear — will play havoc with normal digestion."

The child who comes to the table excessively hungry and tired, often becomes discouraged and does not enjoy his food. Preschool or school age children, constantly on the go, should be encouraged to rest quietly a few minutes before eating lunch or supper. Between-meal or after-school snacks help to control hearty appetites and avoid the danger of "over hungry" indifferences at mealtime. A cheese or peanut butter sandwich of enriched white or wholewheat bread, a glass of milk or some fruit, provide nutrition between-meal energy.

The all too familiar "won't eat it" temper can be lessened or avoided by offering new foods one at a time. A small token serving of the new, with a well liked familiar food, will often be accepted without notice or comment. As the child grows older new foods or new ways of serving old favourites, help to keep mealtime interesting and pleasant.

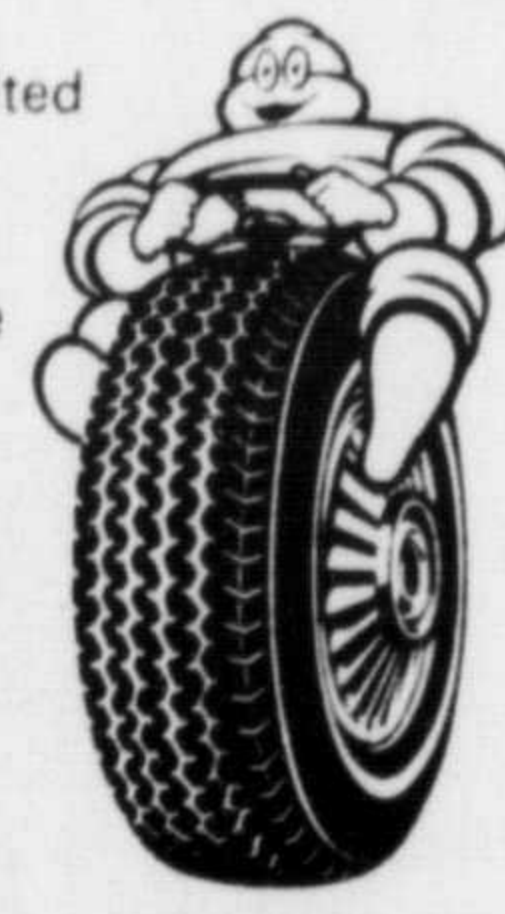

CATCHING UP

We've been away for two weeks which went by very quickly but upon our return there was a mountain of mail waiting for us to go through. Some of the information included in this pile of paper, which hasn't been used in the regular news columns of this issue, includes the following:
There is a regulation of the Health and Welfare Council of West Quebec (CSSSO) by which complaints against any of its hospital or social service agency can be heard and acted upon. The only requirement is that the complaint be in writing, addressed to the CSSSO, 675 St Joseph Blvd, Hull, Quebec, and signed. The handling of complaints is set down in "Reglement Numero 3" and although it can be slow, it is at least thorough and does give the general public an opportunity to criticize the establishments, with a view to constructive improvements as well as better understanding all around.

Also, there has been a slight increase in the incidence of detected rabies in Quebec this year, especially in Gatineau, Dorchester, Papineau, Beauce and Lotbiniere Counties. Financial compensation to farmers for animals lost to rabies has amounted to \$30,000 last year, being \$500 each for cattle, \$300 for horses, \$100 for sheep, swine or goats. They didn't GIVE ANY FIGURES FOR Pontiac.

NOTICE TO THE RATEPAYERS QUYON AREA
I
When the Aylmer School Commission took over the ex-St. Mary's School Commission of Quyon, this said Commission had a deficit.
Bill 27 specifies that such a deficit be reimbursed by the ratepayers of the territory concerned. Therefore, the Aylmer School Commission imposed a special tax for the Quyon territory only.
Certain ratepayers of the ex-Quyon School Commission abjured and declared themselves ratepayers of the Protestant School Commission in order to avoid paying this special tax.
II
Article 54a, c.s. states that such a special tax is imposed and collected in the same manner as the regular school taxes, which means that it is levied against the immovable property.
III
This special tax was imposed on September 26th, 1973, for the school year 1973-74. Since, at that time, the ratepayers were supporters of the Catholic School Commission, their abjuration cannot be retroactive and they cannot be exempted from paying this special tax. They owe this special tax to the Aylmer School Commission.
IV
The ratepayers who abjured will have to assume the special tax for the term prescribed even if they do not have to assume the regular school tax for the following reasons:
(a) When the inadmissible expenses were made, these properties were under the Catholic School system;
(b) When the special tax was imposed, these properties were under the Catholic School system.
V
In accordance with Article 237 c.s., this additional special tax (Art. 54a) is equivalent to a mortgage against the property.
