OPPOSITION MOVES TO STALL PIPE LINE

Liberal Leader Says Politics Being Played In Education System

COURVILLE, Que. — (CP) — Liberal leader Georges Lapalme last night accused Premier Duplessis of playing politics with education and pledged a system of statutory grants to school commissions if his party is elected June 20.

Mr. Lapalme, speaking in this Quebec county centre seven miles from Quebec City, said the Union Nationale government "has enslaved school commissioners with its discretionary grants."

World News In Brief

LONDON — (AP) — Sir Leslie Plummer, Labor member of parliament, charged Thursday Arab states are boycotting British firms that have Jewish directors or do business with Israel.

He asked the government for action "to stop this interference with the legitimate rights of British exporters."

GAZA — (AP) — An Egyptian military spokesman charged that two Israeli planes violated air space of the Egyptian-controlled Gaza strip Thursday.

The spokesman said one plane flew over Beit Hanoun, northeast Gaza, and the other circled the Khan Yunis area, south of Gaza.

Egypt protested to the mixed armistice commission, the spokesman added.

MONTREAL — (AP) — Thieves smashed a hole in the rear wall of a department store warehouse in suburban Verdun Wednesday night and carried off a steel safe containing \$16,000 in cash and cheques.

Police said the theft occurred at a building owned by Simpson's Montreal Limited.

Toronto — (CP) — Two municipal leaders today predicted boycotts and car pools would be set up in outlying Toronto areas to protest against Toronto Transit Commission fare increases.

The TTC Wednesday night announced it would hike its fares. Central zones fares would be increased five cents to 15 cents cash or four tickets for 35 cents.

HOLLYWOOD — (AP) — The movie industry Wednesday night honored one of its most universally beloved members actor Jean Hersholt.

Most of the big names in Hollywood turned out to pay tribute to the one-time Danish immigrant whom many regard as the industry's greatest humanitarian.

OTTAWA — (AP) — Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery today said he prefers to wait a while and judge the Russians by their deeds and not by present smiles.

Arriving here by air for an informal visit, he told reporters "the smiles that are coming from the Kremlin today are all right but what of their deeds?"

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — (AP) — One convict was reported killed and several injured today in a riot at the state prison at Raiford, Fla.

Governor Leroy Collins said he had been informed in a telephone call from Warden Dewitt Sinclair that the riot is under control and that no outside assistance would be needed.

Fires Hit The West

NORTH BATTLEFORD, Sask. — (AP) — Prairie fires raged out of control today in Saskatchewan and Alberta.

One of the worst fires in the district's history was reported spreading rapidly across the Sweetgrass Indian reserve, 20 miles west of here.

RCMP said the blaze was fanned by 35-mile-an-hour winds. Clarence Bogart, elevator agent at nearby Prongue, said many farm buildings had been destroyed and hundreds of acres of farmland burned.

In Alberta, settlers' brush fires were out of control over large tracts of land in the Buck Creek, Alder flats and Berrybrook areas, 60 miles southwest of Edmonton.

"The few school commissions which stood up against Union Nationale directives have paid dearly," he said.

He charged that Premier Duplessis has concentrated "on the dead things of education—like bricks and stones—while ignoring the living part—the children."

"During tours of the province I have been told again and again by heads of school commissions and mayors of municipalities that it is impossible to operate under the system of discretionary grants that now exists. School commissioners are forced to beg before their members of the legislature, before cabinet ministers and before Mr. Duplessis himself to obtain enough money to provide proper educational facilities."

"In Ontario they have taken politics out of education. Each school commission gets a statutory grant according to the number of children in its schools. I can see no reason why the same thing can't be done in Quebec."

Mr. Lapalme also hammered at the premier's labor laws, in this community where reside many of the 1,500 striking employees from the nearby Dominion textile plant at Montmorency Falls.

"The existence of the labor movement in Quebec is at stake under the Union Nationale regime," he said. "Each session Mr. Duplessis introduces a batch of new laws aimed at tightening the vise on the unions."

He also rapped intervention by provincial police on strikes in the province during the last 10 years. "You have a right to strike when you feel conditions are not right," he said. "This is not a privilege."

"I can never understand why provincial police intervene when people are only exercising their rights."

Russian Churchmen Repay Call

NEW YORK — (AP) — Religious traffic between Russia and the United States became a two-way street, starting today.

Five Russian Baptist leaders, in the first such mission to the U. S. since 1906, were due to arrive at the invitation of major American Baptist bodies.

They'll be repaying a call. U. S. Baptist leaders were guests in Russia last August.

Today's delegation is the curtain-raiser for a more widely representative Russian religious party coming next month.

This second nine-member group, led by Metropolitan Nicolai of the Russian Orthodox Church, will include high-ranking leaders of all major bodies of religion in Russia.

They are due June 2 at the invitation of the National Council of Churches, which includes 30 church denominations with 35,500,000 members.

The larger Russian deputation also will be returning a visit made to their country by national council leaders early this year.

The visits mark the first direct contact between organized Christianity in the U. S. and Russia since before the Communist revolution of 1917.

Both Russian delegations will visit churches, seminaries, schools and other religious centres across the U. S.

Settle Wage Dispute But Strike Continues

MONTREAL — (CP) — Federal mediator H. Carl Goldenberg settled a wage dispute early today after marathon negotiations — but a Great Lakes shipping strike continued just the same.

In an unusual twist, the mediator managed to solve the deadlock between the Seafarers' International Union (SUI) and the Association of Lake Carriers without ending the strike that resulted from their wage fight.

Mr. Goldenberg and representatives from the opposing sides met at intervals all day Thursday and resumed discussions Thursday night, ending in pre-dawn hours today when the mediator called it quits until this afternoon.

Although the SUI and the association had reached a basis of agreement, the over-all dispute — and strike — remained unsettled because of unresolved deadlock between the owners and two other unions.

The complicated issue resulted from the fact that the two separate unions conducted negotiations jointly with the SUI, which called a strike of unlicensed seamen against two Great Lakes shipping lines May 10, taking more than 60 ships out of service.

The separate unions — the Canadian Merchant Service Guild and the Association of Marine Engineers — did not join the strike directly but representatives took part in mediation negotiations that began May 10, the same day as the strike.

The some 1,000 members of the two unions, comprising deck officers and engineers, supported the SUI in the walkout, but officers in negotiations here said they did not themselves declare a strike.

A confused situation developed when shipowners pledged a united front against the SUI strike, and a spokesman declared that "not a propeller will be turning on the Great Lakes at the end of this week" unless the strike is ended.

It was unofficially estimated that some 120 ships — counting the some 60 strike-bound vessels — now are tied up between St. Lawrence river ports and the Lakehead.

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1 Heavy Smoker In 11 Expected To Die Of Cancer

LONDON — (Reuters) — Two British doctors said in the British Medical Journal Thursday that one heavy smoker in 11 can be expected to die of lung cancer.

They added that on the basis of "accumulated evidence" they believed there was a "chance and relationship" between cigarette smoking and lung cancer though statistical evidence did not provide solid proof.

The two specialists, who answered questions in an article in the medical journal are Prof. A. Bradford Hill, professor of medical statistics at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, and Dr. R. Doll, member of the statistical research unit of the British Medical Research Council.

The British Medical Journal, in an accompanying editorial, said doctors now face the responsibility for leading a fight against the smoking habit.

"Unless some new facts come to light the medical profession in its exercise of preventive medicine, must use its influence to change a habit now firmly ingrained in this and other countries," the editorial said.

One Missing, Two Injured In Explosion

MONTREAL — (AP) — One man is missing and two others were critically injured early today as the result of an explosion that ripped through a storage building belonging to Molson's brewery in east-end Montreal.

The brick building, with a height equivalent of about 13 storeys, contained fermenting tanks in the upper floors and grain storage bins in the lower section.

The explosion was believed to have come from an ammonia tank in the upper part of the building. Walls were torn out on all four sides. The top quarter of the structure was blown out on one side and debris was scattered for hundreds of feet in all directions.

About 15 men were working when the explosion occurred and all but one is accounted for. Chiefbrewer Paul S. Cheese, who was seen near the ammonia tank a few minutes before the blast, is missing.

Critically injured are foreman Real Dufour and another unidentified worker.

All But One Accounted For

Fear Spectator Has Deadly Rocket Warhead

OTTAWA — (AP) — Some souvenir-hunting spectator to Tuesday night's tragic air crash at the Villa St. Louis nuns' rest home may have a death-dealing rocket warhead in his possession.

That was the fear expressed yesterday by the Air Force, one of whose Ottawa-based CF-100 jet fighters crash-landed onto the home at Orleans, Ont., killing 15 persons.

The RCAF said all but one of the explosive heads of the rockets aboard the plane had been found, all unexploded. The missing warhead would be "highly dangerous if mishandled," the air force said as it made a plea for its return.

As RCAF debris crews continued to clear the fire-blackened rubble at the crash scene and

discover more remains of those killed, the defence department began a study of what compensation should be paid the Roman Catholic order of the Grey Nuns of the Cross.

The order ran the \$1,000,000 convalescent home which was demolished by the fighter's crash. Among the 15 victims were 11 nuns, a priest, a laywoman cook

and the two-man crew of the fighter.

Meanwhile, RCAF aircrew officers expressed the opinion that through some unknown cause the fighter's pilot, FO. Wm. Schmidt, 25, of Medicine Hat, Alta., and Creston, B.C., and his navigator, FO. Kenneth Thomas of Niagara Falls, Ont., may have been unconscious or dead when the plane began its fatal plunge from 33,000 feet.

They suggested there may have been some kind of internal explosion in the ill-fated craft or that the crew was affected by a failure of the plane's oxygen system. At 33,000 feet—more than six miles up—airmen can lose consciousness and succumb in a matter of a minute or so from lack of oxygen.

At Vancouver, the mother of the dead pilot, Mrs. Jessie A. Schmidt, was quoted as saying her son had a heart condition when he was a boy. An RCAF spokesman said, however, that Air Force medical checks are most stringent and no one with a heart condition would be permitted to fly.

Requiem Mass was to be celebrated today for Rev. Richard Ward, naval and convent chaplain killed in the crash, by Archbishop Maurice Roy of Quebec, primate of Canada and Roman Catholic bishop ordinary to the armed forces.

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May Force Extra 2 Rounds Of Debate On Controversial Bill

OTTAWA — (CP) — The opposition has made two moves which, in the absence of further government closure on debate, could stall passage of the cabinet's pipeline bill beyond the June 7 deadline.

John Diefenbaker (PC—Prince Albert) Thursday moved to sidetrack to a committee the government bill to provide heavy financial aid to the Alberta-Montreal natural gas pipeline project of Trans-Canada Pipe Lines Ltd.

CCF leader Coldwell added a rider that the committee consider public ownership of the \$375,000,000 project.

Both motions — amendments to the government motion that the bill's principle be approved on second-reading vote — open the way to possible extra two full rounds of debate on the legislation.

The government Thursday gave no indication of when it may use again the long-dormant closure weapon employed early this week to choke off preliminary debate in two days.

Trade Minister Howe said Thursday the government's decision was to use closure only if there was evidence of obstruction. It had been employed early this week after five previous votes on procedural points forced by the opposition.

Today's sitting is the second day of debate on the bill to lend Trans-Canada up to \$80,000,000 to cover 90 per cent of the cost of the Prairie section of its 2,200-mile line. The bill would also set up a crown corporation, with federal and Ontario government financing, to build the \$118,000,000 northern Ontario section and lease it to Trans-Canada.

If the Prairie loan is not approved by June 7, Trans-Canada is released from its undertaking to complete the line to Winnipeg by Dec. 31. If the advance, at five-per-cent interest, is not repaid by April 2 the government can take over the project.

Mr. Howe, opening debate Thursday, asserted that the pipeline will be under Canadian control.

Replying to previous opposition criticism of financial domination of Trans-Canada by American interests, he said the line will be on Canadian territory, under Canadian law and subject to regulations by both the provinces and the federal board of transport commissioners.

"Let us not worry too much about Canadian control," he said. Mr. Howe read into the record letters from Ontario Treasurer Dana Porter, Alberta Premier Manning and Manitoba Premier Campbell.

All urged a speedy start on construction. Mr. Howe said the government feels it has a responsibility to help find an outlet for Alberta gas because of the federal Canada-first policy on use of the country's energy resources.

Mr. Diefenbaker made a sharp attack on Prime Minister St. Laurent as he criticized use of closure.

The Conservative member asked Mr. St. Laurent why he had not spoken "to explain why the rights of Parliament are being flouted away."

The prime minister was "afraid of the truth — afraid of an election." He should put "this ramshackle caricature of a nation" on the map.

19 Injured In Montreal Train Crash

MONTREAL — (AP) — Nineteen persons were slightly injured last night when a Canadian Pacific locomotive backed into a standing passenger train in Windsor station.

Six received hospital treatment but none of the injuries were serious. Most were shaken up by the impact.

The accident occurred at 10:30 p.m. when the locomotive, its speed apparently underestimated, slammed into the 16-car train No. 21, due to leave for Toronto 45 minutes later.

Train damage was confined to coach couplings. But the impact threw bags and boxes helter-skelter, and shattered window partitions in the first two coaches.

A CPR doctor, assisted by staff from the Montreal General Hospital, set up a first aid station in the rotunda to deal with cases of shock and other minor injuries.

All the hospital cases were expected to be released today.

Fire Cross Burned For Priest

NEW ORLEANS — (AP) — An eight-foot fiery cross was ignited late last night on the grounds of the residence of Most Rev. Joseph Francis Rummel, Roman Catholic archbishop of New Orleans, who has been criticized for his stand against racial segregation.

The wooden, gasoline-soaked cross was propped against a fence in front of Notre Dame Seminary which adjoins the archbishop's residence.

Firemen, summoned by a passing motorist, quickly put out the blaze.

Some Roman Catholic groups in the southern states have been critical of the archbishop since he issued a pastoral letter three months ago condemning racial segregation as "morally wrong and sinful."

Earlier this month he ordered the Association of Catholic Laymen, Inc., which advocated racial segregation, to disband or face excommunication. The group said it would appeal the archbishop's order to the Holy See, highest body in the church.

The burning came on the second anniversary of the United States Supreme Court decision outlawing racial segregation in public schools.

Seek Miners Trapped At Sudbury

SUDBURY, Ont. — (AP) — Rescuers dug at tons of fallen rock at a nearby International Nickel Company mine today in the ever-dwindling hope they might find two trapped miners alive.

Crews of 25 men, working in shifts around the clock, labored a half mile below the surface, where the two miners were buried Wednesday.

The body of a third miner was recovered Thursday. A fourth man in the shaft when it caved in escaped.

The known victim is Anicet Lemire, 39. His body was sent to St. Bruno, Que., where his widow and seven-year-old son live.

Earl Barker, 36, and Franz Lukanz, 41, an Austrian immigrant and father of one child, were trapped inside.

Little hope is held for their survival because of the nature of the cave-in.

West Scientists Are Impressed By Russian Lab

MOSCOW. — (AP) — Russia Thursday opened what has been its top-secret atom-smashing laboratory to visiting Western scientists.

"Anyone seeing it would be bowled over," said Dr. Louis Alvarez, nuclear scientist from the University of California.

American and British scientists were taken to the plant of vast circular rooms 90 miles north of Moscow where the Moscow canal joins the Volga.

There for the first time they saw the Soviet Union's huge synchrocyclotron. They also saw a new and even more powerful machine which will produce 10,000,000,000 electron volts. It is scheduled to go into operation this year.

"They are doing absolutely first class work," Alvarez said. "It was an extremely impressive visit."

Wildlife Hereabouts

SPRING MIGRATION OF BIRDS IN FULL SWING

No bluebird holds quite the same position in the eyes of the confirmed birdwatcher as the first one he sees in any season. Bluebird season after bluebird season, year after year, many thousands of birdwatchers keep lists of "first dates" of the migratory birds of their various districts. Even the veteran ornithologist, Arthur A. Allen, of National Geographic fame, recently retired from Cornell University, still keeps such lists, as do various others of professional or near-professional status.

Early last Sunday morning as the sun brightened the shallow bank of fog that covered the west side of Lake Massawippi and shone on the hills along the east side, revealing patterns and tones suggestive of autumn, but much more subtle, eight birdwatchers, ranging from young to not-so-young, set out from North Hatley to see what was new for 1956, some adding "first dates" to their lists, some learning how to recognize our common birds, some to add "lifers" (birds they had never seen before). All had an opportunity to become familiar with some of the songs, which are so strong at this time of the year and which often beckon to an unfamiliar species. Such was the field sparrow, whose clear, ringing song may be heard commonly in Southern Ontario, but whose presence in this immediate area had not been detected hitherto by the local fraternity of birdwatchers.

As we paused to spot grosbeaks and thrushes and to separate the sparrows by their songs, we finally became aware of the presence of a black-crowned night heron, sitting quietly in an elm tree at the water's edge. Smaller than the well known great blue heron (or "crane") of the district, this heron, over two feet in length and with a wing spread of about four feet, is a common coastal resident from Massachusetts southwards and has a range extending from Manitoba to South America. It is seldom seen in this area, however, although it nests on certain islands in the vicinity of Montreal. Pure white below and dark above, it does most of its fishing at night. The very old belief that the night heron can throw out from its breast a light, which attracts fish to their destruction, persists to our day but no scientist has ever been able to verify this claim.

Some members of the party continued with a second installment of birding in the afternoon and before the day was over at least sixteen "first dates" had been added to some 1956 lists. By the end of the day it could be determined that at least ninety-three species of spring migrants have entered our immediate area since the end of February, though many are still to be heard from.

Loons are on the lake, pied-billed grebes ("hell-divers") at the edge of the marsh and bitterns "driving stakes" throughout it; many ducks continue to loiter on their way north while the black ducks, at least, have gotten down to the serious business of raising families, and the osprey soars over the water, occasionally plunging feet-first for fish.

All the species of shorebirds, woodpeckers, swallows and sparrows that return to breed in this area have already done so but representation of various other groups of birds is not yet complete. With reluctant spring finally with us and deciduous trees in bloom and leaf, the diminutive warblers will arrive in quantity during the next few days and spring bird watching will approach its zenith.

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Hundreds In Final Tribute To Noted Local Physician

Associates in the medical profession, former patients and citizens in all walks of life joined yesterday afternoon in paying their final tribute to Dr. William Warren Lynch whose funeral service was held at St. Peter's Church.

Dr. Lynch, who practised medicine in Sherbrooke for over 50 years and became one of the outstanding surgeons of the Eastern Townships, died at his home on Bank street on Tuesday afternoon following an extended illness. He was 80 years of age.

Among those attending the funeral were a group of active and non-active nurses from the Sherbrooke Hospital, where Dr. Lynch was chief surgeon until his retirement in 1948, and most of the present medical staff of the hospital.

The honorary bearers were: Senator John Hackett, Montreal; representing George Drew; Hon. Justice Gordon MacKinnon, Montreal; Hon. George Foster, M.L.C., Montreal; Col. William Leggett, Montreal; Dr. C. A. Peters, Montreal; Dr. C. L. Brown, Ayr's Cliff; Col. A. A. Munster, Sherbrooke; H. B. Fletcher, Sherbrooke; and Dr. T. J. Wells, Lennoxville.

The bearers were: Harry Blue, Milton Buzzell, John Black, Evans Joslin, Guy Bryant and Dr. T. J. Quintin.

Born in Knowlton in 1876, the son of Hon. Justice William Warren Lynch, Solicitor General of Quebec from 1879 to 1882, and later a judge of the Superior Court, and his wife, Ellen Florence Pettes, Dr. Lynch was educated at the Knowlton Academy, the Collegiate Institute, Montreal, and McGill University. Canadian Play By Toronto Club Wins Favor At Drama Festival

"Teach Me How To Cry," a Canadian play by Patricia Joudry, won high praise last night from adjudicator, Madame Francoise Rosay, when presented by the University Alumnae Dramatic Club of Toronto, the fifth play of the Dominion Drama Festival.

Winner of five awards in the regional festival of Central Ontario, this play will undoubtedly claim some of the prizes on Saturday night for the high caliber of its production and for the merits of its individual actors. There were a number of moving performances, indeed, Madame Rosay declared as she began her adjudication, "It's getting more difficult every night."

The play sets a strange, wistful, almost sad atmosphere. Said Madame Rosay, "I read it and I loved it and I saw it tonight and I loved it again. It is poetic... moving."

It is a story of a small town girl who is lonely and frightened and suffers because she is not like the others. Her mother is mentally ill, a result of being deserted when a young woman, unmarried and with child. She has escaped into a world of her own and is nurturing her child in the same fear and distrust. The girl meets a boy at school, a boy who has courage and determination to face the problems of life.

His own home life leaves much to be desired, his mother is unhappy and dissatisfied with her state. She longs for the finer things in life, a "culture culture," but she is married to a boor of a husband who is an unsuccessful salesman and will never be anything else. Luckily this atmosphere does not weigh the boy down and he succeeds in bringing the girl out of her shell and giving her the courage she needs.

The staging of this play is rather unique. It is presented on a trilevel stage, the lower level being imaginatively divided into two roofs belonging to the two families. Only one section at a time is used, this being divided off by the lighting, which, by the way, was expertly handled. The curtain was never closed between scenes or acts.

Suzanne Finlay and Les Lawrence handled the principal ingenue roles of Melinda Grant and Will Henderson with sincerity and understanding.

Miss Finlay, who won the best actress award in her regional festival, played the suffering girl with conviction. The adjudicator suggested however, that it would give more color if she was "less aggressive" at the beginning, if she would let it grow as her confidence grew, and also that there should have been some difference when she was with the boy, "more the child."

Mr. Lawrence was told that he looked too much the man and not enough the boy of 17. In spite of this, his scenes with the girl were a joy to behold.

Phyllis Malcolm Stewart as Mrs. Grant was called "wonderful" by adjudicator Rosay but was advised to be a "little more soft... you don't want to suffer, so you run away". At the beginning it was "sometimes aggressive, run away more", she said.

played by Hugh Watson and Edith Orde Tuft, both interesting character studies, although it seemed that Mr. Watson was inclined to overdo at times in his effort to play the "boor." His actions were sometimes superfluous.

Molly Golby and Ray Butryn deserve mention for their ingenue bits. Others in the cast included: Eleanor Beecroft, Irene Mloszewska, Helen Dunlop, Douglas Ney, George Luscombe, Frances Halpenny and Elizabeth Beattie.

Leon Major was director of this Thursday night presentation which played to a nearly full if not completely full house. It seems that even those at the back heard every word which is quite an accomplishment for the Toronto group. Since nothing more could be done to the auditorium, it seemed to be up to the actors, and the group proved last night that it was possible.

Horror From The Sky

Through the last war, the full horror of a city being bombed was missed by the vast majority of Canadians.

This week's tragedy of a jet plane crashing into a nuns' rest home near Ottawa brings home the grim impact of what modern weapons can do. The jet plane amounted to a high explosive bomb as it rocketed into the peaceful building, killing indiscriminately here, passing by others there.

It will be difficult for the Air Force to discover the cause of this crash because of the extent of the destruction. While it developed that the plane's mission was a fruitless

one, nobody should suggest that our skies should not be well-patrolled.

That tragedy should strike so viciously against people who seemed to deserve it so little sparks straws and melancholy coals. But the faith which was held by these nuns will surely strengthen their grief-stricken relatives and friends.

The Bible, as always, holds the answers:

"The souls of the righteous are in the hand of God and no torment shall touch them." Book of Wisdom 3:8.

"And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God." Romans 8:28.

U.K. Trade With Red China

No real assessment of Britain's unilateral decision to expand her trade with Red China can be made until it is clear what type of shipments she intends to make and what benefits she gets in return.

A fairly good guess is that the British government, although under great pressure from business interests, has no intention of going far enough to stir up a hornet's nest in the United States.

Britain has been pressing for months for relaxation of the American embargo list. Sir Anthony Eden was promised a review when he visited Washington in February. It has been slow.

Now London plans to take advantage of an agreement of the China committee, composed of NATO nations plus Japan, which permits a country to take exceptions to the embargo list provided the committee is notified.

The United States maintains a complete embargo on trade with Red China. In addition, she has maintained a list of materials which may not be shipped by countries which accept mutual aid funds from her.

Several countries have been trying to get this list whittled down at least to the point where restrictions

will be no greater than against Russia and her European satellites.

Because of the U.S. Battle Act, which authorizes the president to withdraw aid from any violator, most of the countries cannot act unilaterally. Britain, no longer an aid recipient, is not subject to that restraint.

Britain's relations with the U.S., however, go far beyond technical agreements and alliances. It is a free, working, affiliation, and more important to both than any of the individual issues about which the two countries sometimes disagree.

Britain realizes that it is hard for the Washington administration to ease up on politically unpopular Red China in an election year.

At the same time she is fighting inflation at home, trying to increase exports and cut down imports. She also is trying to preserve the stability of Hong Kong, which depends heavily upon trade with the Chinese mainland. She wishes to keep contact with her old business connections in China against the day, which she believes will come, when full trade can be resumed.

Nevertheless, you can expect her exceptions to the embargo list to turn out to be reasonable, contributing only very indirectly if at all to the Peiping regime's ability to make war.

The Governor-General's attitude on the circular letter from the Dominion Drama Festival president, advertising Calvert whisky, is understandable.

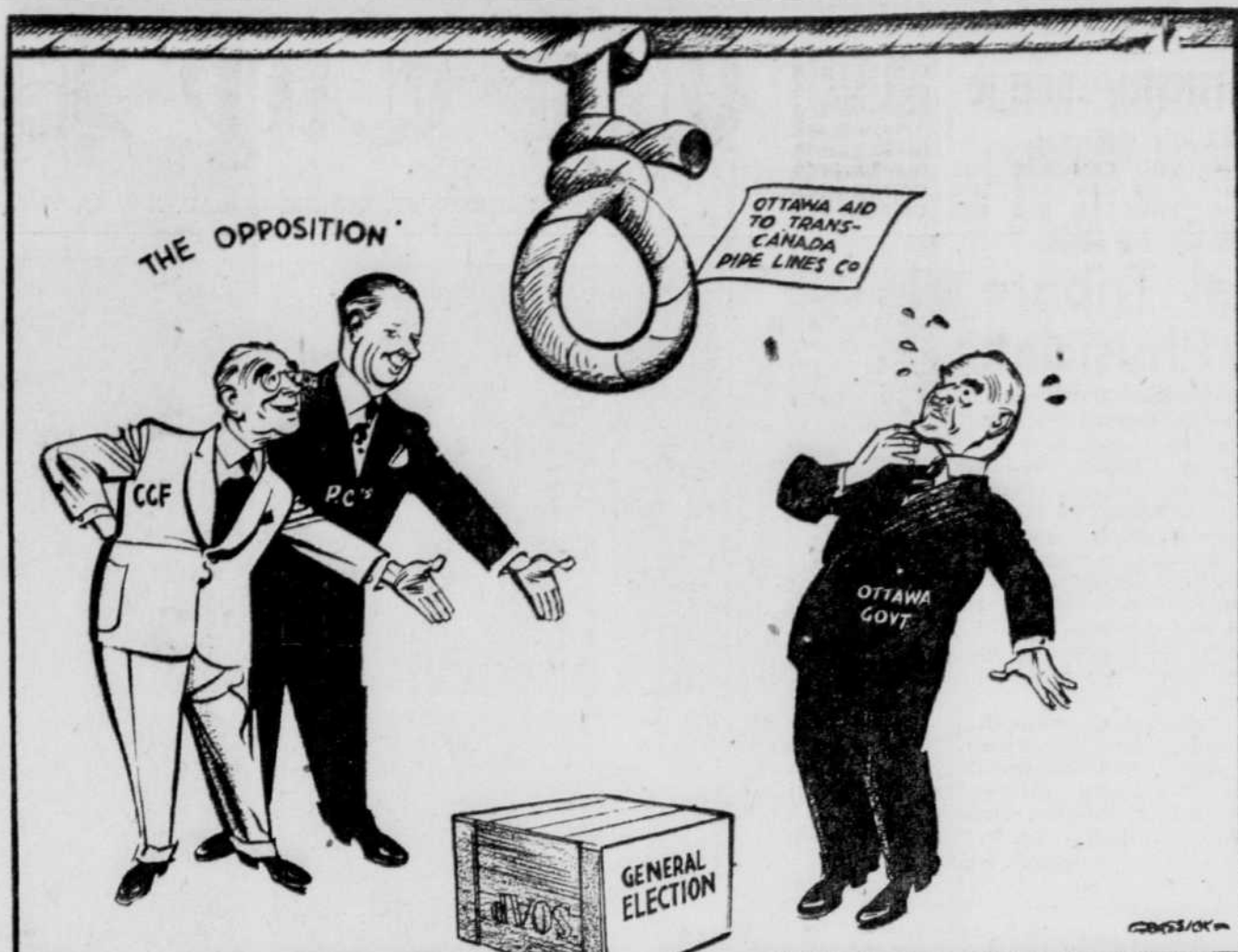
Writing such a letter on Dominion Drama Festival stationery was an error on Mr. Ongley's part.

TAKEOUT BID MISSES GAME

South made 11 tricks with the greatest of ease in today's hand. Then the arguments began. South wouldn't feel so happy at game in clubs if West opened a spade, was one opinion. Who cared about South's happiness, North wanted to know. Just let him take the diamond finesse and he'd make five clubs even if West opened a green suit.

While this pleasant little argument went on, the players overlooked the important details. How should South bid to reach a game contract, and which game contract should he reach?

To begin with, South should respond to the takeout double with a bid of three clubs instead of a mere two. A takeout double promises a hand of greater strength than a minimum opening bid. Therefore the responder can afford to invite game if he has about eight points with good distribution.

As most experts play it, South can force to game by bidding the opponent's suit. In this case South would bid two hearts with about another king. A jump response in a new suit is highly invitational but not completely forcing. North would pass three clubs if he had a very light takeout double. He would accept the invitation if he had sound values for his double.

In this case, South would bid three clubs, and North would have a problem. If North bid four clubs, South would bid five. If North made the somewhat delicate bid of three diamonds, South would bid three no-trump. In either case, however, South would get to a sound game contract. The important thing was to begin by bidding three clubs.

West North East South
1 Club 1 Spade Pass ?
You, South, hold:
Spades KJ-6-2, Hearts A-K-9-7-4-2, Diamonds Q-8-5, Clubs 0.

A—Bid two clubs. You expect to show the hearts and raise spades, thus asking North to go to slam if he can control the unbid suit, diamonds.

No Speed On This Highway

(Winnipeg Tribune)

For the past thirty years or more, there has been talk of a highway across Canada. Many speeches have been made by politicians deploring the loss of national pride and prestige resulting from the lack of a road link between the Provinces. They bemoaned the fact that motorists had to travel on U.S. roads to get from Eastern Canada to Western Canada.

In 1949, after much prodding, the Federal Government agreed to assist on a 50-50 basis with the Trans-Canada Highway. The ineffectiveness of this scheme is shown by the fact that to date only 1,500 miles of the 5,000-mile road have been constructed to approved standards, 1,545 miles are still unpaved and there are 185 miles on which there is no highway of any kind.

This after decades of talk.

Now the Federal Government is trying another scheme to speed up construction. It is offering to pay 90 per cent of the cost of constructing "approved" gaps up to 10 per cent of the total mileage of the highway in a Province. The Ottawa Government hopes this will get the gaps closed by the end of 1960.

If free enterprise moved that slowly in getting necessary jobs done, there would be a great howl go up from Ottawa to have the Government take over.

Instead of a program to create a national road network, the Federal Government hopes to get a single road across the country finished after five more years. This is disgraceful.

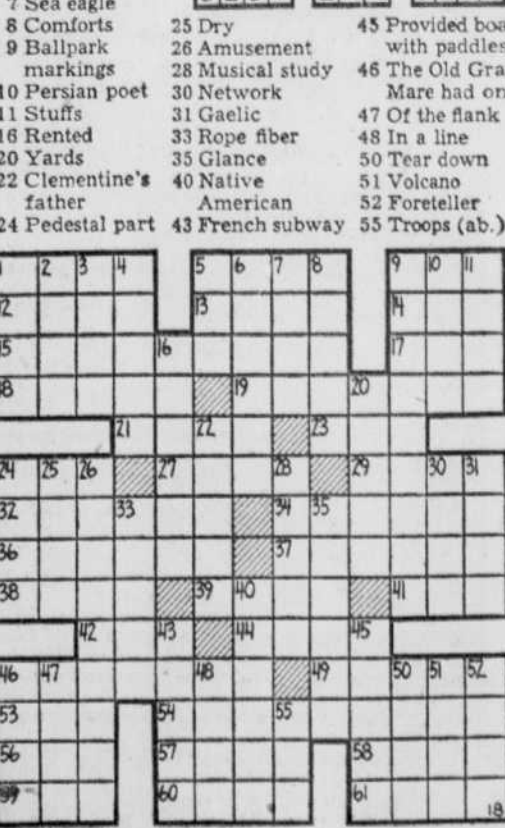

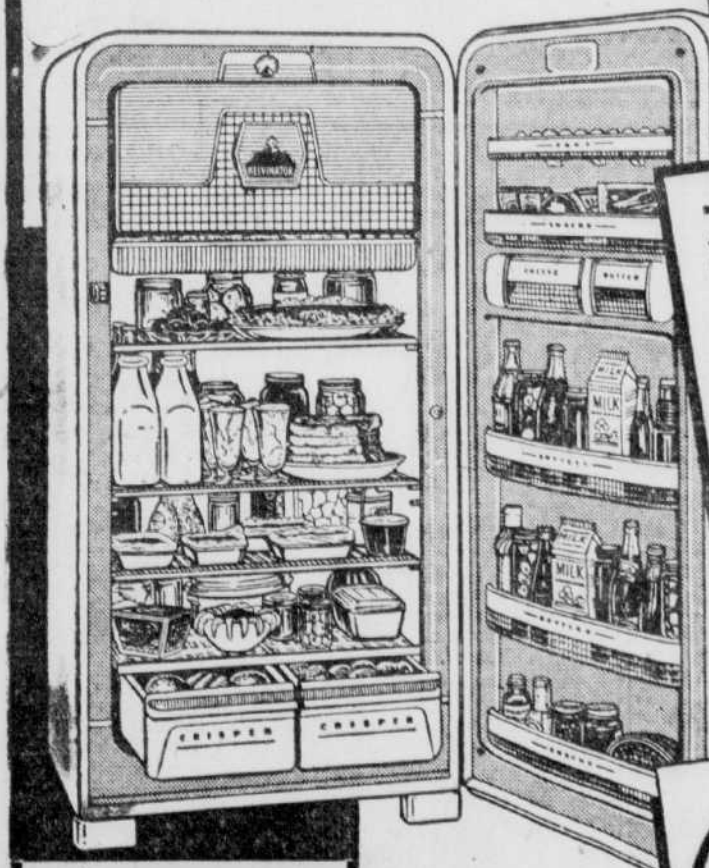

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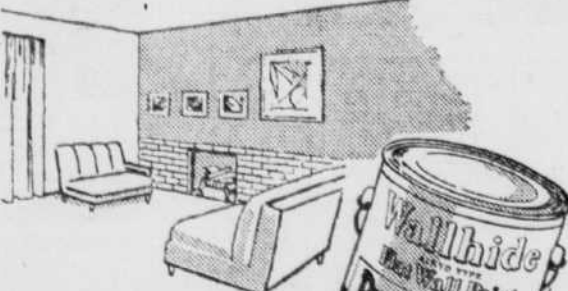
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Women Could Adopt Some Of Men's Ways

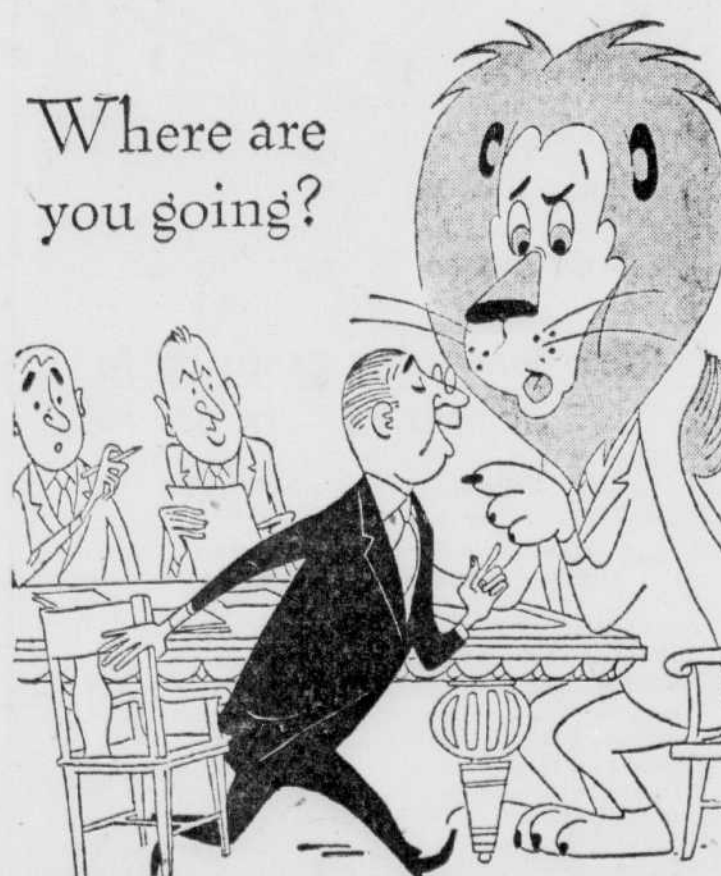
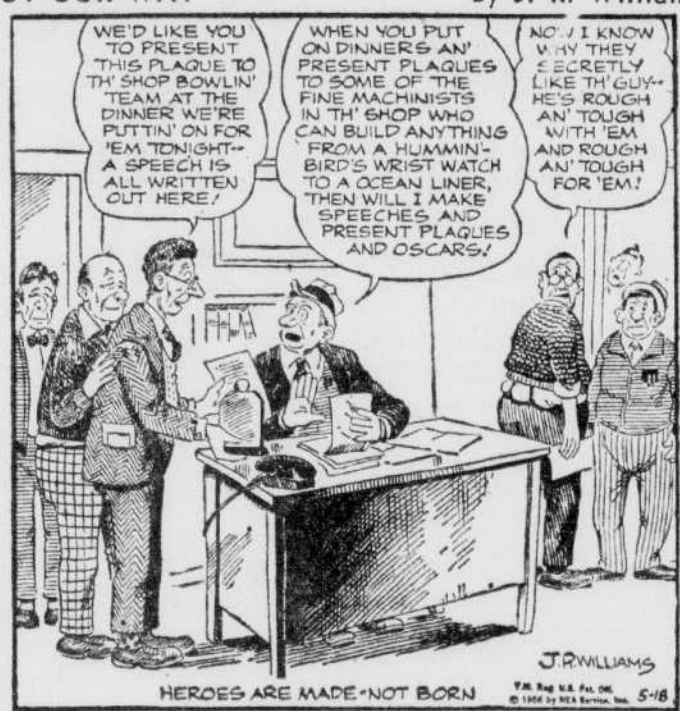

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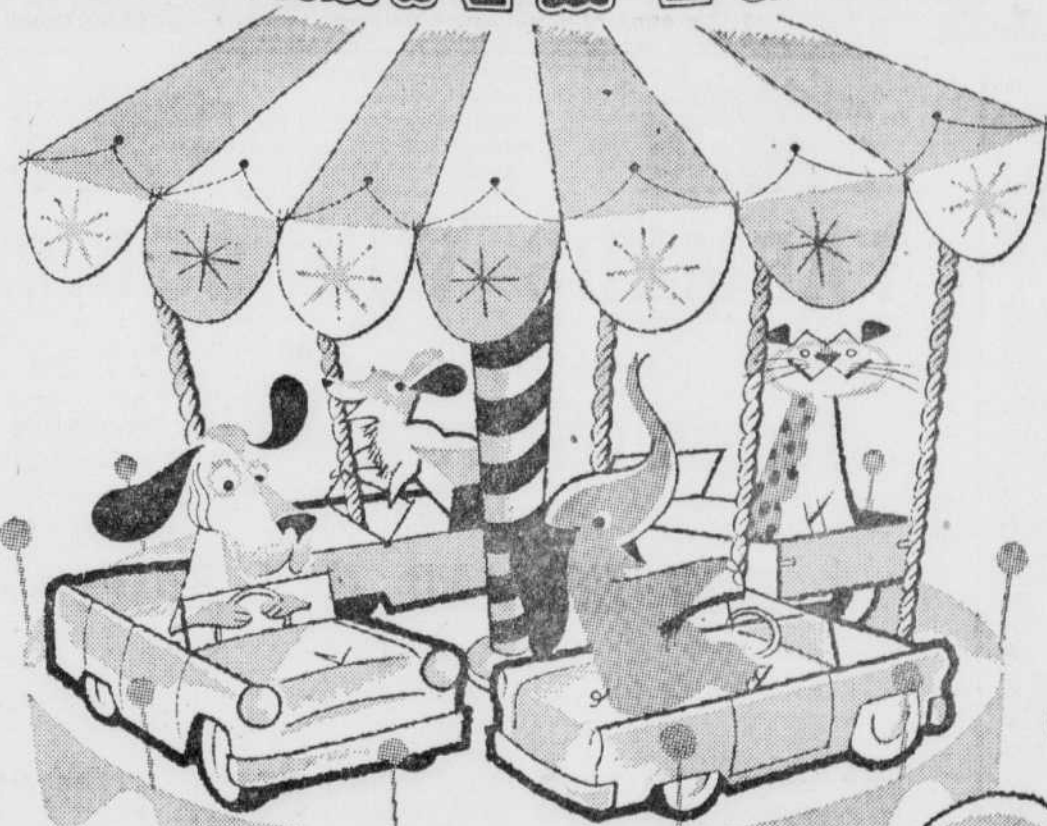
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Eaton Cemetery Secretary Ends Lengthy Service

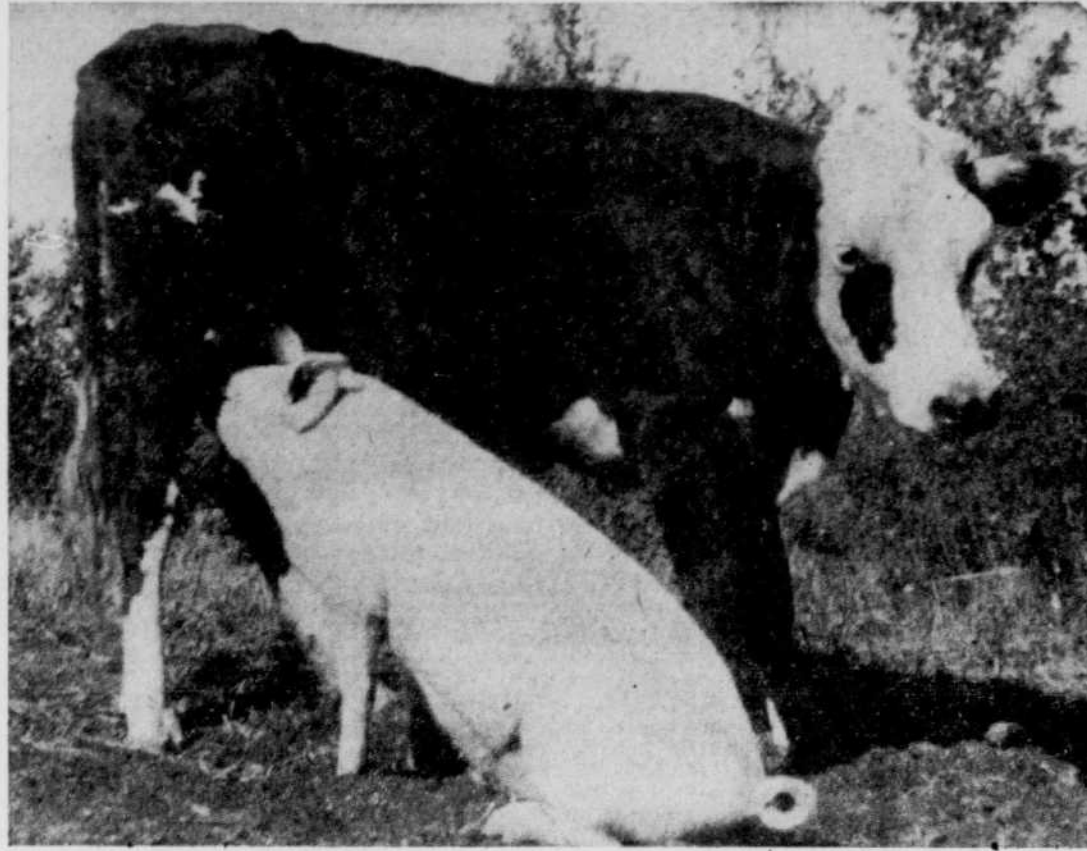

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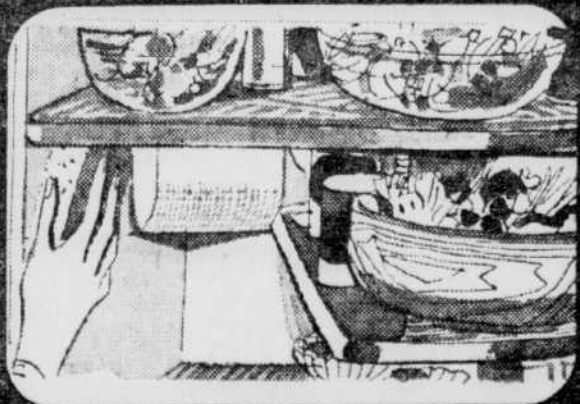


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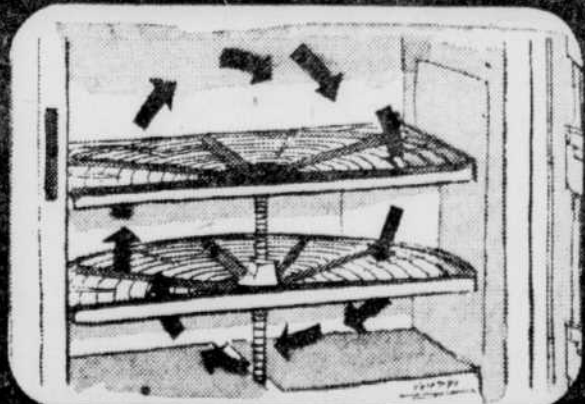


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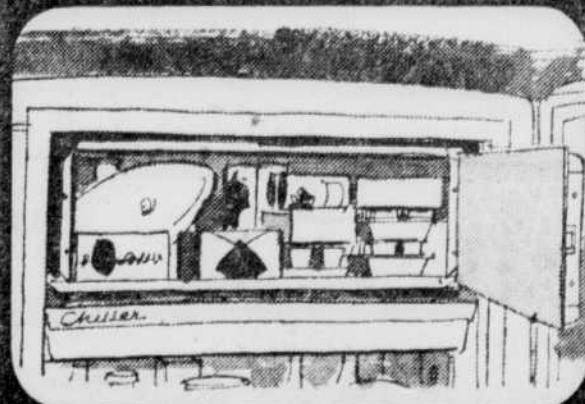


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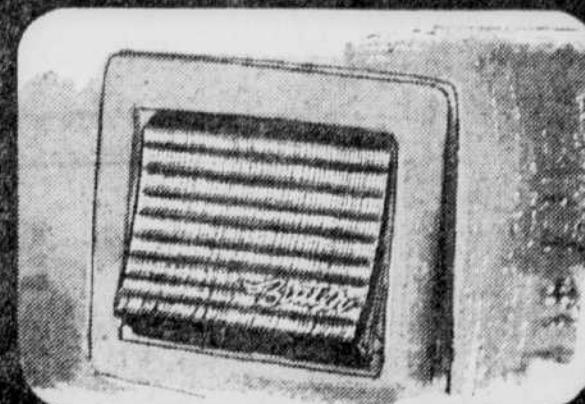


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Middleweight King, Sugar Ray, Favored To K. O. Olson In Title Defence

It begins to look more and more as if the two major league pennant races will be three-team affairs with the other clubs good enough to keep the leaders on their toes.

In the National, it's Milwaukee, St. Louis and Brooklyn. In the American, it's New York, Cleveland and Boston — although the Red Sox may hold only a halfshare of the third contender's entry along with the Chicago White Sox.

The Braves, with Warren Spahn looking like his old self and Hank Aaron finally belting the ball, retained their slim edge over the Cards by thumping the New York Giants 7-3 Thursday night while St. Louis, loaded with four of the NL's top hitters, put down the Philadelphia Phillies 5-4. Brooklyn wasn't scheduled.

In the only other NL game, Chicago's Cubs finally won on the road, knocking over Pittsburgh 4-1. It was the Cubs' first success away from home in 11 tries.

The New York Yankees upped their AL lead, snapping the White Sox six-game winning streak with ridiculous ease 10-3 while left-hander Whitey Ford won his sixth straight without defeat. Boston closed to within a halfgame of the third place White Sox by battering Kansas City 6-1 in the only other game played. Second place Cleveland and Washington weren't scheduled. Detroit and Baltimore were rained out.

Spahn, who tops active National League hurlers with 186 victories, won his third straight against one defeat this season with great control. He did a near-perfect job of scattering eight New York hits and didn't walk a man. Two singles in the third cut his scoreless string at 21½ innings and Don Mueller followed Willy Mays' double with a home run in the ninth to manufacture New York's

China Clipper Signs Contract With Eskimos

EDMONTON — Normie Kwong, the China Clipper who was voted Canada's outstanding athlete of 1955 in the Canadian Press poll, has signed his contract with Edmonton Eskimos for the 1956 Western Interprovincial Football Union season, the club announced Thursday.

Kwong, said to be the highest-paid Canadian player in football, first came to Eskimos in 1951. Terms of his new contract were not made public.

The Calgary-born fullback had his greatest season in 1955, establishing three conference records in rushing and being named the outstanding Canadian player of 1955. He has seen action in five Grey Cup games and has been a member of three championships—once with Calgary and twice with Edmonton.

His overall offensive record in five years with Edmonton shows he has carried the ball 4,434 yards—more than 2½ miles.

Hayes Jenkins Turns Pro With Holiday On Ice

MINNEAPOLIS — (AP) — Hayes Alan Jenkins, world and Olympic figure skating champion, has gone professional to star with the internationally-touring show "Holiday On Ice."

The 23-year-old Colorado College student, tops in men's figure skating for the last four years, declined to disclose terms of the contract he signed Thursday. But a show spokesman said Jenkins will get about \$1,500 weekly for summer appearances this year and in 1957.

Quebec Pros Will Be Out To Prove They Are Better Than Their Ontario Confreres In Dow Tourney June 8

"The calibre of professional golf in Quebec is now much better than that in Ontario. Our boys should prove this by winning the forthcoming interprovincial team match hands down."

This strong statement, which could raise a few eyebrows in Ontario, was made in Montreal today by John C. Costigan, honorary secretary-treasurer of the Canadian Professional Golfers' Association of Quebec and tournament chairman of the forthcoming Quebec PGA championship.

Commenting on the unique team playoff between winners of the Quebec and Ontario PGA tournaments, both scheduled for June 8 with the team match to be played two days later, Costigan said Quebec golfers had consistently racked up better records than their Ontario counterparts.

"All Ontario has to brag about this year is Al Balding, who admittedly has done well on the winter circuit across the border. But the Quebec boys will be led by Stan Leonard and Pat Fletcher, and that should put the icing on the cake."

The Quebec and Ontario PGA tournaments will each carry a \$3,500 purse and the Dow Trophy. The Quebec championship, a 36-hole medal play affair open only to Quebec pros and Class "A" assistants, will be played at Marlborough, while the Ontario tournament, open to pros and B-1 assistants from that province, will

be held at Credit Valley in suburban Toronto.

Two days later, on June 10, the eight low finishers in each tournament will compete in an interprovincial team match scheduled for Marlborough and carrying an extra \$2,500 put up by Dow Brewery.

Costigan and other Quebec PGA officials said the addition of Leonard and Fletcher to an already well-balanced team boasting such established performers as Jules Huot, Jack Kay, Bill Kerr, Stan Horne and Jack Archer, made the Quebec pros overwhelming favorites to win the interprovincial team match. The three Dow tournaments will carry a total of \$9,500 in prize money.

"Some of our younger pros have improved their play considerably in recent years, and any one of them might make a name for himself in the forthcoming tournaments," reported Jack Archer, a member of the tournament committee.

Besides Costigan and Archer, other members of the Quebec PGA tournament committee are Jules Huot, defending champion and present holder of the Dow Trophy, Stan Horne, Jim Swarbrick, W. Gorman Kennedy and J. Paul Bertrand.

BALTIMORE — (AP) — How far and how fast Needles will have to come in about the last quarter of a mile in order to catch the leaders seems to be the main question hovering over Saturday's \$100,000 Preakness.

It is being taken for granted that the Kentucky Derby winner will be at the tail end of the probable eight three-year-old starters through the early stages of the 1 1/8-mile race.

The Pimlico Barn strategists, and that includes the handlers of Needles, figure that Calumet Farm's Fabius, D. G. Arnstein's Eiffel Blue, W. E. Britt's No Regrets and Winding Way Farm's Golf Ace will be leading the way. The debate is over how fast they will be going when they hit the stretch and how far Needles will be behind.

"If that Fabius gets out in front by four lengths and still is going in the stretch, he's going to be hard to catch," said Dave Erb, Needles' jockey.

Needles made up close to five lengths on Fabius in the last half mile of the Derby two weeks ago. But the last turn is tighter and the stretch considerably shorter at Pimlico than Churchill Downs. In the bargain, they have a sixteenth of a mile less to go.

Also, jockey Willie Hartack on Fabius had to move into the lead after three-quarters of a mile which was sooner than he had planned because the pace was so

Will Go After Quick Knockout In Rematch; Gate Receipts Expected To Reach \$175,000; Both Are Ready

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Middleweight king Sugar Ray Robinson, the dancing man who proved fighters can come back, goes after another quick knockout over Carl (Bobo) Olson tonight as he defends his reclaimed title against the former champion.

Although Robinson has been installed as favorite, most experts feel his best chance lies in a knockout during the early rounds.

The outdoor battle scheduled for 15 rounds or less starts in Wrigley Field here at 7 p.m. (10 p.m. EDT) and will be televised, with southern California blacked out. Gate receipts were expected to be in the neighborhood of \$175,000 with an additional \$75,000 for radio and TV rights. Each fighter collects 30 per cent.

The heat wave which gripped Los Angeles in midweek broke Thursday with cloudy weather and possible sprinkles expected tonight. Wet or dry, the bout is scheduled to go on, with a canopy over the ring if necessary.

Robinson's knockout punch turned out the lights for Bobo in the second round last Dec. 9 at Chicago as the Harlem dandy took back the crown he had given up with a retirement announcement 31 months before. That was when he embarked on a professional dancing tour.

Robinson, 35, and Olson, 27, have met three times with Bobo drawing a blank. He lost twice by knockouts and once by a decision.

This time there's a feeling that the longer the fight continues the greater the chance of the younger, body-socking Olson.

Sugar Ray maintained, however, "I have never been in better condition for a fight in my life. I have trained to go 15 rounds if I have to, but I will try to trick Olson into an opening so I can score an early knockout."

The contest marks another chapter in the lives of a couple of guys who fought their way out of poverty—Robinson from the slums of Harlem, Bobo from the back streets of Honolulu.

Each will collect 30 per cent of the net gate and the \$75,000 television rights, and each will be gambling against possible oblivion in the fight game.

Robinson first won the title in 1951 from Jake La Motta. He lost the crown and won it back the same year in matches with Randy Turpin of England, and in December 1952, he retired.

Olson took undisputed claim to the crown when he whipped Turpin in New York in 1953.

Use Shots You Can Make

Percentage golf is not so much the science of playing shots you can make as it is of playing without the shots of which you are incapable.

Learn to know the shots you can't play, and forget about them.

For example, I have never aimed at the pin with anything longer than a niblick, yet I have seen 90 shooters go for it with a brassie.

Confine your learning to that which you can use on the course. Forget the intricacies of the hip action, the time to uncork the wrists and all the other complicated phases of the swing that actually have nothing to do with hitting the ball.

Years ago golfers found it necessary to have a different technique for each club. They played punch shots, push shots, fades. With the precision clubs manufactured today, the lofts uniformly graded and the shafts equally tempered, there is enough variety already built into the clubs.

The average golfer is not likely to be confronted with a shot which cannot be handled simply by hitting the ball straightaway. (NEA)

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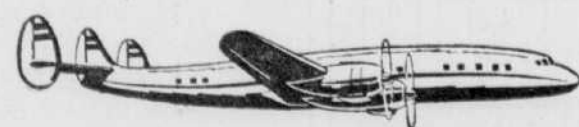


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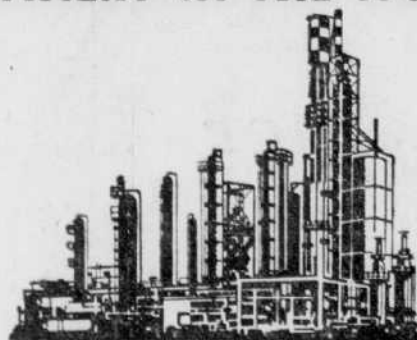
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
