COURT OF KING'S BENCH.
BIRMINGHAM.

This was an action by Messrs. Birch and Co. bankers to recover the sum of £250 from one of their customers, which they had overpaid in his account under the following circumstances. The had a clerk of the name of Hammond in their house who was an acquaintance of the defendant Vale. he told Vale that he had some money which he would pay into their house to the account of Vale and that he would take a cheque from Vale when ever he wanted money. Having done this, he drew out of the following bank, got a credit upon Vale's account for money which was never paid. Hammond credit in the ledger for payment which he

never been made, and in a contrary, the clerk of the cash book, he called the payment in the ledger which he had previously made, and which was not in point of fact entered in the cash book. If it be was at the ledger, no "omitted to call the payment he had entered, and which did not appear in the cash book. Consequently, the clerk at the other book did not find the error, and the cash balance at time called. Vale finding credit given him in his pass-book which was copied from the ledger, for he same, Hammond told him he paid in to his account, readily gave him the check in the amount; but when the fraud was discovered, Vale had drawn \$200 more than was actually paid into his account. Hammond had done the same with other customers, and had admitted faults to the amount of \$7000. For the Defendant it was contended, that the loss must fall on the Bankers, as it was occasioned by their own servant. The Jury found for the plaintiff \$2000.

The Select Committee of the House of Commons appointed to examine into the state of the Irish trade, have reported, that during the last 21 years the sum of 58,634,135*l.* has been paid for Irish imports for Great Britain, and the average price of the quarters of wheat for that time was but 27*s.* 3*d.* and 6*d.* the last 6 years, 10*s.* 8*d.* This generally directed their attention to the system in which this trade has hitherto been conducted, and they remark, that to increase the requirements to the British market, and to enlarge the Farming Society's demand, they fear a total prohibition of importation will take place in such countries during the last ten years, (thus much still remains to be done).

The import of cattle and sheep from Ireland, however, received an extraordinary impulse during the last five years, (1840-44), and thus the whole importation, while increasing progressively, it had not equalled the seventh of the whole. The value of Irish cattle imported into this country during the last five years, was 6,507,341*l.* Of this sum it is to be derived from Ireland, the Commis-

"The evidence of several persons well acquainted with Ireland, concurs in proving, that its tillage has of late years increased very much, and is capable of being still further increased. The fertility of the soil; the fitness of the climate; the abundance of limestone, the cheapness of labour; and the general convenience of water carriage; together with the progress made in the course of a few years in extending and improving the cultivation of the land, form the most complete proof of the ability of Ireland to become eminently serviceable to this country, by affording to its great manufacturing population, abundance of all kinds of food at moderate prices."

the conversion of a greater portion of agricultural land into small villages, and the adoption of a more improved system of agriculture, the United Kingdom might be relieved from dependence on foreign supplies.

The Committee next turned to consider the two different systems on which the commerce of the country had been hitherto founded. The first system, commenced in the year 1720, and discontinued the importation of grain by high duties, while it encouraged the export. The second system, commenced in 1763, and pursued on the opposite principle of encouraging the import of grain, while it discouraged the export by the removal of the bounties.

The committee, however, drew up the production of various tables, that through the compliance of the former system, the country annually exported grain to a considerable amount, while in consequence of the change which took place in 1795, the rate of things was rapidly altered, and Britain becoming an importing country, a vast empire supplied. The following is the extract from a letter of respectable clergyman in India.

"You will rejoice to hear that the *Inquisition* in Goa was abolished in October last; and is now thrown open to public inspection with all its secret chambers &c.

Famine at Bombay—When the last ships set sail about the beginning of March, there prevailed in Bombay a most deplorable famine. Multitudes were daily, and almost hourly, dropping down the streets and dying, for want of sustenance. This wretched scene was miserably contrasted with the expensive festivity and gaiety that was in tune and order of the day in the best circles of the European inhabitants. The Government (Sir Lya-
