

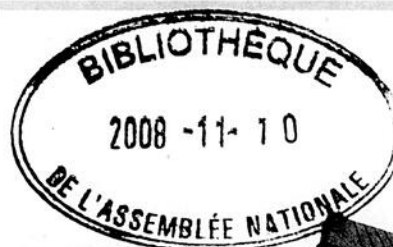

No consultation on arena project until funding confirmed

There will be no further public consultation on Westmount's arena/pool project until the City of Westmount can determine exactly what funding will be available from other levels of government and other sources, Mayor Karin Marks said last week.

Westmount plans to spend an as-yet-unspecified amount rebuilding the municipal pool and arena

complex, although the cost could be \$25 million.

The provincial government is expected to provide a significant amount for the project, but so far nothing has been confirmed. A subsidy application made by the City to the province anticipated the work starting in April 2009, with September 2010 given as the completion target date. The arena/pool complex was built in 1957 and has long been on a list of municipal buildings slated for renewal.

Last Monday, during city council's monthly meeting, Patrick Barnard of Melville Avenue asked Marks whether she had a contingency plan in case government funding did not come through or fell short of expectations.

"Have you prepared a plan in order to meet the capital costs that you think are suitable if government funding isn't as abundant as you hoped?" he asked.

Summit residents shaken by Halloween vandal attacks

Members of a Summit Crescent family are feeling a bit shaky following paintball and pellet gun attacks on Halloween night and the following day, which damaged their kitchen window.

"Between 6 p.m. and 8 p.m., it was yellow paint," Hilda Prastalo told The Examiner, describing the paintball attack on her home. "I thought it was eggs, but I washed it that night and it was all gone the next day."

"But then the next day, on Saturday

around one o'clock, I heard this bang, bang, bang. I went upstairs because my husband was there doing some repairs. I thought it was him. And then I went in the kitchen and I noticed all bullet holes in the window and about five kids outside.

"One of them was a neighbour's kid. And, of course, when they saw me they ran away. I had no proof of who did it, so I called Westmount Public Security. They said it's vandalism, and I would have to call the police. I called the police at the Westmount station on Stanton. They said to call 911 in case it was urgent, so I called 911, but they

said it's not an urgent thing since the kids ran away anyway. There's nothing we can do. They told me to go to the station and fill out a report, so that's what I did."

On Sunday, Mrs. Prastalo spotted a group of youths approaching her house and confronted them — but they denied responsibility for the attacks.

An attempt was made by the Prastalos to clean up the yellow paintball residue that splattered on the side of their house, although some still remained. The window's double-thickness thermal glass was cracked in several spots. Projectiles, which could have

been fired from a high-powered air rifle, left deep impact marks in the glass, although the family couldn't find any the pellets.

The fact that paintball weapons and pellet guns are so readily accessible to teenagers leaves Mrs. Prastalo feeling insecure. "Even if we replace the window next week, it might happen again," she said. Although she filed a report with the police, she says she remains less than impressed with their response so far.

Calls placed to Westmount Public Security and Station 12 police were not returned by the Examiner's deadline on Tuesday.

Côte St. Antoine homeowner protests pole in yard

An official with Hydro Westmount was expected to meet this week with a Côte St. Antoine Road homeowner, who has objections to an electrical utility pole being placed on his property.

Paul Glassman, whose heritage home occupies a lot at the corner of Lansdowne Avenue and Côte St. Antoine, told The Examiner he doesn't want the pole.

Glassman's objection is based not only on the fact there are already two poles in his yard, but that the third one would be placed in front of his home at the end a short driveway.

"It would also have a supporting cable, which in itself is dangerous because kids always cut through our property and postmen cut through," he said. "When you're not expecting a pole and you're not expecting a cable, what you will be expecting is accidents."

One of the alternatives Hydro Westmount might offer is to relocate the overhead wires underground. "It's a possibility that was brought up by the director," added Glassman. "I don't have any great objection in principle to that. It would depend on how they do it and who pays."

According to Pierre Dubé, director of Hydro Westmount, the poles on the property now "are feeding most of the citizens on Lansdowne. I think there are six or seven on Lansdowne and one on the corner on Côte St. Antoine, and unfortunately in the aerial network there, there is a pole missing."

"We are trying to place the last pole, and there is a neighbour there ... who already complained to us because she said, 'Hey, how come I have wires coming on my roof and

they are feeding my neighbours from my roof?"

"She said this is not normal. I agreed it is not normal. So we're trying to find a solution to rectify that and place the famous last pole that should have been there."

Dubé said the electric hookup, which meets safety standards but is not up to modern electrical protocols, dates back about 50 years.

"We are trying to find any other solution than placing a pole on the property of Mr. Glassman — but the thing is there is a garage there which was constructed right over the line, which is not accepted as normal anymore, so I'm not able to pass on the other side of the land."

"I explained to Mr. Glassman that presently the only technical solution that we

think we are able to do is the one that I would have to place a pole on the corner on the west limit. I want everybody to be satisfied."

Demands by residents to municipal officials to relocate utility poles are not unusual, says Westmount director-general Duncan Campbell, who dealt with similar requests when he was director-general of Town of Mount Royal.

Winning conditions

There are still quite a few federal election posters yet to be removed from poles in this community, and already Premier Jean Charest is champing at the bit to call a provincial election — and who can blame him?

Yes, in what would certainly be the envy of countless Third-World countries where democracy is the stuff of science fiction, we will be called to the polls once more before Christmas. This is either good news or bad news, depending on what side of the political fence you happen to sit.

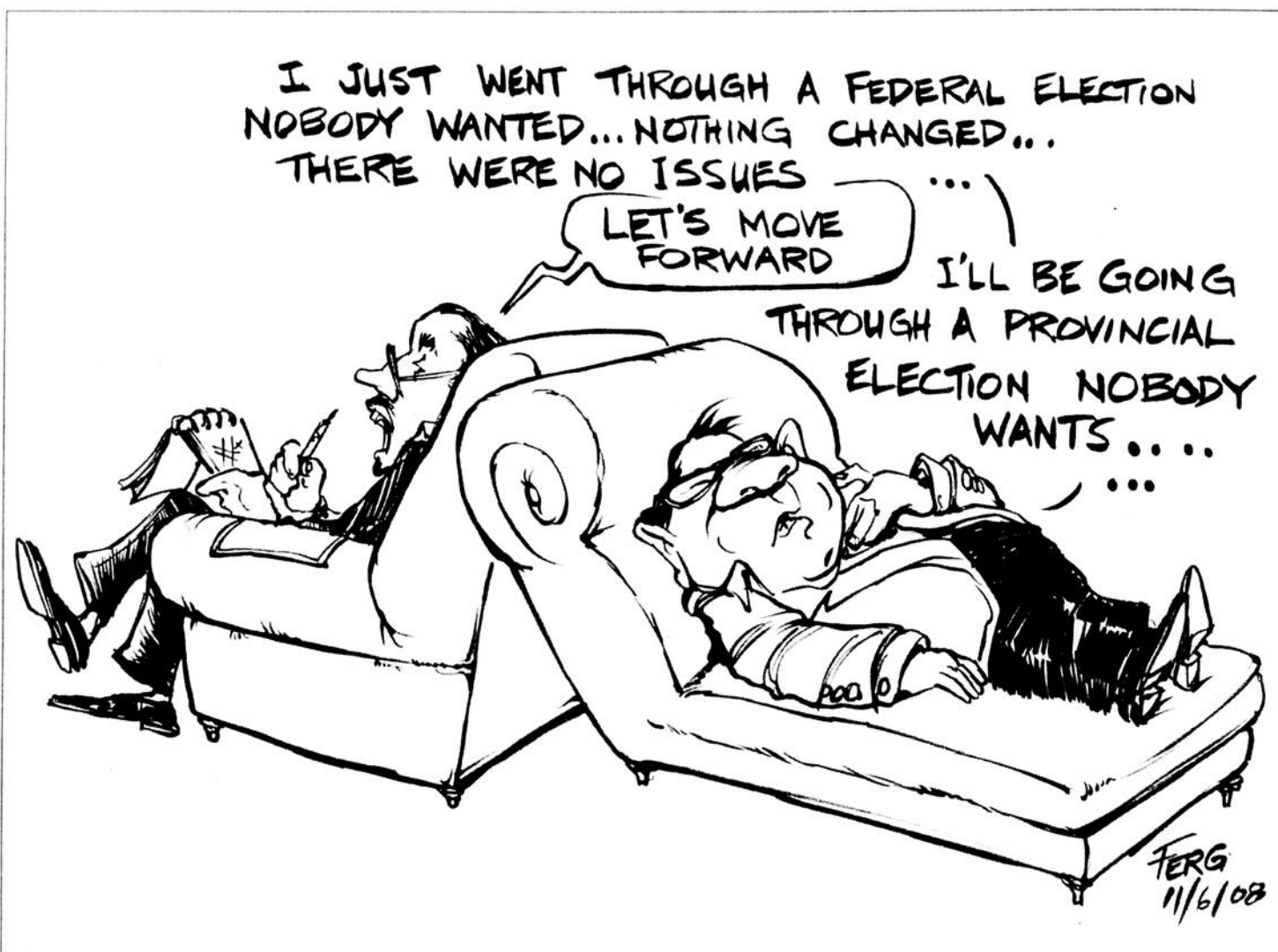
The time is right, Mr. Charest believes, for the ruling Liberals to improve their lot in the National Assembly by capitalizing on their current popularity and gaining a few more seats, thus hoisting them up to the status of majority government.

Needless to say, the Liberals' two most formidable foes, the Parti Québécois and the Action Démocratique, have both soundly condemned the very idea of an election, ostensibly to keep politicians focussed on a much more important issue — the faltering economy.

But you don't need a degree in political science to see through that canard; it's really a matter of the public opinion polls, which currently favour the Liberals. The PQ has always advocated the idea of acting under "winning conditions," but now it's the Liberals' turn to take advantage of that philosophy and really dig in their heels in Quebec City.

You have to admire the Liberals' strategy — waiting for the Nov. 4 resolution of that huge distraction south of the border, then sandwiching an election campaign into that snug period between now and the holidays. Their opponents are quick to point out that people do not want to be bothered with politics during the festive season, especially after getting such heavy doses of it over the past few months (or year if you count the much more prominent Hillary-Obama-McCain saga that has dominated Western culture) and will likely express their dismay in the voting booth. This is indeed an empty warning, for Quebec's provincial political battles are taken seriously by its citizens, few of whom would cast their ballot based solely on their frustration at being called out to the polls on a snowy day or in the middle of Christmas shopping.

But if the all-important opinion polls are indeed accurate, and they usually are, Mr. Charest is right in striking while the "winning conditions" are in his favour. He may be criticized for stooping to the PQ's level in doing so, but if it means finally leading a majority government, it is something that has to be done.

Fifty-Five Years Ago
November 6, 1953

BROADWAY BOUND: "For the third consecutive year, 40 members of the Westmount High School Current Events Club left for a visit to the United Nations in New York. Departure time was 7:30 a.m. Thursday, and the group arrived at New York late in the afternoon. Program called for them to check into the YM and YWCA's, then see Times Square and Broadway at night. Friday morning they visited the UN Assembly and ate lunch in the UN delegates' dining room, where they were addressed by members of the Canadian delegation. The afternoon calls for a tour of the UN buildings and possibly attendance at a committee meeting. In the evening most of the group have tickets for popular shows."

Twenty-Five Years Ago
November 10, 1983

GALLERY VICTORY: "Westmount chose Brian. The 49-year-old publisher who served on city council for eight years as alderman, Brian O'Neill Gallery, Monday won the first mayoral election held here in 56 years as 33 percent of the eligible voted. His opponent, Allen E. Nutik, polled 30 percent of the votes

cast, which he claimed as a victory for citizen opposition. The mayor-elect will be sworn into office Monday at the inaugural session of the new council along with eight new aldermen. Six also were elected Monday: Sally Aitken, Phillip Aspinall, Paul Fortin, Ian McPherson, John Shingler and Peter Trent. Peter Duffield and Joan Rothman had been elected by acclamation a fortnight earlier.

Neighbours appeal demolition of Côte St. Antoine Road home

A Côte St. Antoine Road couple have renewed their appeal to Westmount city council's demolition committee to block a permit to tear down a neighbouring house.

Yuri Arutyunov, the current owner of 310 Côte St. Antoine, has applied for permission to demolish a 1960s-style bungalow currently on the lot. He plans to replace it with a new 2.5-storey, single-family dwelling, whose architectural features match those of the surrounding neighbourhood. Janet and Jean Philippe Aubert of 316 Côte St. Antoine Rd. are contesting the project.

Two years ago, when the Auberts first appealed, they claimed that the house, which was proposed then, would affect their view of King George Park and reduce the amount of natural daylight falling on their property. They were also preoccupied by a proposed driveway that would have run alongside their

home, and the infringement of their privacy by a proposed roof-top terrace.

During a public hearing last Monday at city hall, which was attended by several neighbours who share the Auberts' concerns, Adam Borowczyk, the architect who

produced the latest plans, said he was aware "there was opposition ... Basically nobody likes changes and we tried to think of and respect the problems of the neighbours."

"I believe that the impact is very marginal on your property," he said, maintaining that the new house would not significantly obstruct the Auberts' view of the park. Its roofline also matches the height of nearby houses. He said their privacy would also not be compromised, "since we have a pretty large distance between those two buildings," and a landscaped privacy screen would also be created.

Addressing the committee, Janet Aubert contrasted the well-organized nature of the architect's presentation with the reality she said that she and her husband

would have to endure if the house is built.

"It is not all fine, because of the fact that we really do not have sufficient evidence that we will have access" to light, she said. "That is why we bought the house ... What initiated that move was the perspective that we had."

While concerned about the new house's potential impact on the surrounding neighbourhood, she said she approved of the design. "This house would be absolutely marvelous if it were elsewhere, no question about it," she said. "I have no problems with the fine job that you have done here. But here within this reference it does not work, and it is causing clear, unadulterated negative effect to the people around. It's not usual that the people from the sides come to this meeting to speak out."

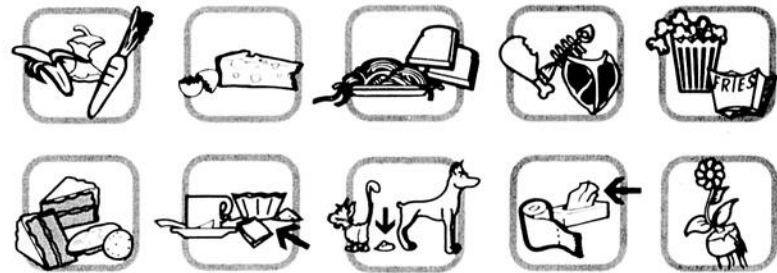

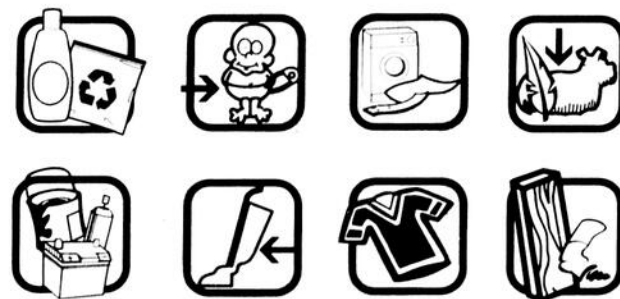

Meals on Wheels: When a hot meal can make a world of difference

When people generally think of Meals on Wheels, what comes to mind? Cold slop? Frozen Swanson dinners? Whatever you consider, I am sure it likely isn't good. Well, there's a Meals on Wheels in our midst that is not only a godsend to senior shut-ins and individuals who are otherwise in need, but delicious, too.

I know that I've written you about Congregation Shaar Hashomayim previously and I am doing so again, because their Meals on Wheels program is far too incredible to be kept hidden away. About 42 years ago, the church system started delivering meals to

needy individuals and several years after that, 37 years ago, the Sisterhood of Shaar Hashomayim seized upon the concept, accepting the offer of Fanny Aronoff and Connie Solomon to begin the delivery of hot, kosher meals to recipients in need. In recent years, as the population ages, these meals are more necessary than ever: the Shaar's Meals on Wheels coordinator, Rhonda Herman, told me that more than 4,000 "hot, nourishing and tasty" meals are cooked, packaged and delivered annually, Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays... and you do not have to be Jewish to receive them.

The Shaar is one of five Jewish institutions (and the sole synagogue) to deliver kosher meals under the auspices of the Cummings Centre for Jewish Seniors, the others being the CCJS, Jewish General Hospital, Jewish Rehabilitation Centre (Laval) and Maimonides Geriatric Centre. Your local CLSC or a related professional, such as a social worker, decides whether you meet the qualifications. The Shaar's meals are paid for on a sliding scale, with each one costing a maximum of \$6, this for a hot, three-course meal! Gift bags are also included twice annually, for the Jewish New Year and on Passover, filled with holiday goodies.

Sylvia Schneiderman, a past Shaar president, is Meals on Wheels chairman, assisted by longtime volunteer Judy Caplan, a past president of Sisterhood. "Our recipients are people who really count on us and they hail from all economic backgrounds... financial status does not come into play here," Schneiderman said. "But for us, the biggest challenge is finding volunteers to handle all facets of the program."

Meals on Wheels runs a weekly deficit, I learned, and receives no government funding. So, without volunteers, there would be no program and 40 recipients at present would be living on just frozen dinners... or worse.

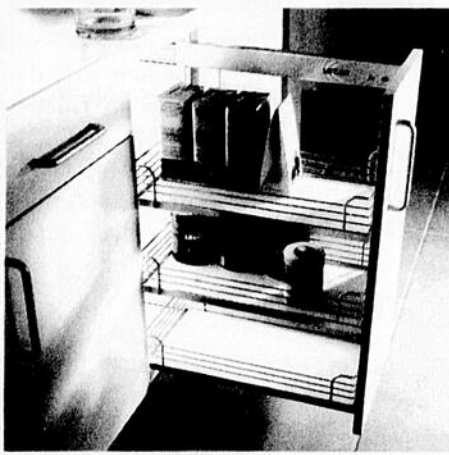

This is the time of year that volunteers are needed the most, with many of the regulars off to warmer climes during the winter months. Students as young as elementary school age are also welcome and often help to meet their scholastic obligations regarding volunteerism, a great concept for all ages. And, again, you don't have to be Jewish to cook, package or deliver hot kosher meals to those who rely on them so desperately. "Our people are often the sole connection recipients have with the outside world," Schneiderman pointed out. "The work makes the heart glad."

Marks replied, "We do not have a contingency plan, because until we know what funding is available, that's going to have some impact on what we do ... So it's not as though it's going through come hell or high water. It is something that citizens will have a say on."

Marks said the City is currently looking at the development of a preliminary plan.

"That will then come with an idea of what that's going to cost. Then we will try and gather information as to what we will get from the grant, and then we will see what portion is left for the City to pay, the impact on residents, on taxes, on our debt — and that's the point at which we will provide that information to all residents and then hear from them on what it is they would like to do."

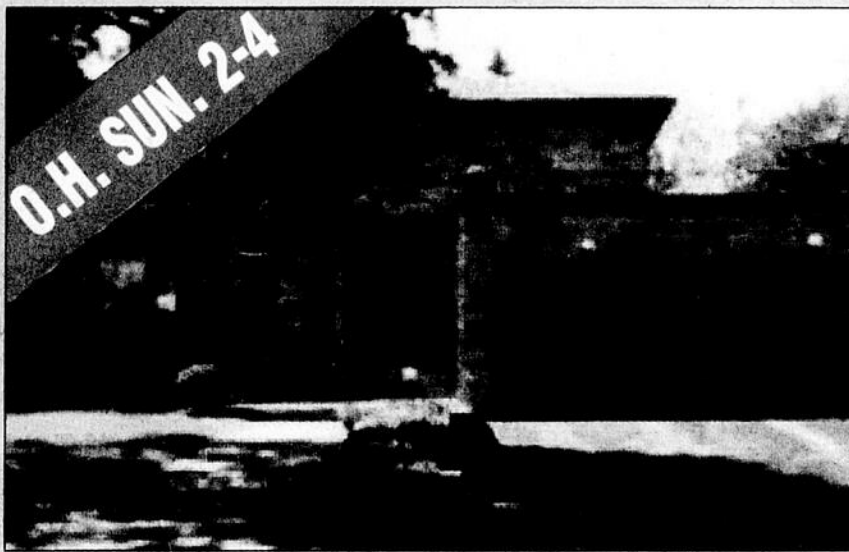

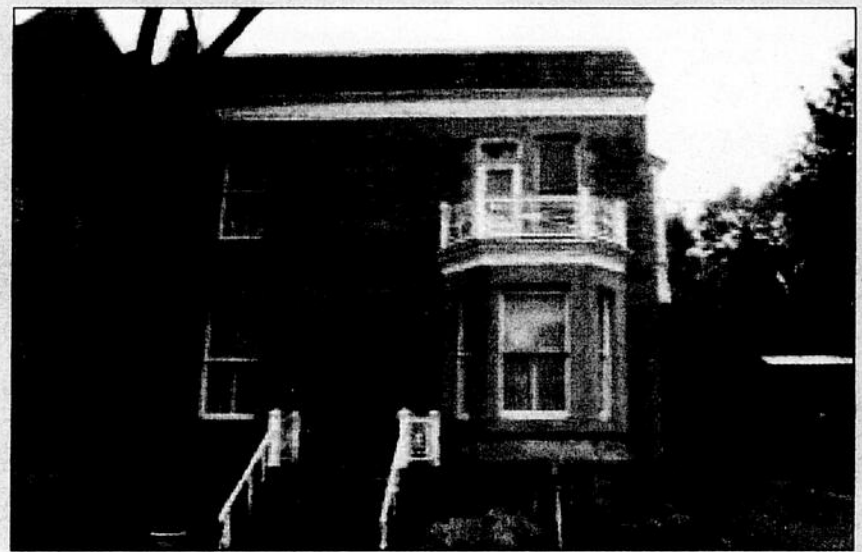
