

# Westmount plans clean sweep of chimneys in '86

WESTMOUNT intends to start off 1986 by making a clean sweep of chimney safety in the name of fire prevention.

All chimneys in the city now will be swept annually without direct charge to property owners as a service paid from the municipal budget and contracted out by tender at an estimated cost of \$20,000 to \$25,000.

The announcement was made by Mayor

Brian Gallery recently following a decision by city council at its last meeting in general committee Dec 17.

The updating of chimney-cleaning operations results from difficulties encountered by the city's licensed chimney sweep in collecting fees from homes left unattended during the day.

Before the changes can go into effect, probably by the end of next month, according to city officials, certain by-law changes will have to be made and tenders called.

Westmount regulations require the chimney flues be swept annually.

Under the old system, the city attempted to assist property owners in this area by

licensing a chimney sweep to clean chimneys from the inside of all homes at a cost to residents of about \$4 per flue.

Although the system worked well in years gone by, explains Fire Director Timmons, who is responsible for supervising the operation, the chimney sweep has been unable to find many residents at home during visits in recent

## Meeting on MUC plan here Feb 4

Westmount citizens are being reminded that they are welcome to present briefs on the final version of the MUC's master development plan at the special public consultation meeting taking place at city hall Feb 4.

The final draft, adapted by the MUC Nov 21, was circulated in summary form to all households in the MUC last month and is now being submitted to public opinion at 14 consultation meetings across the MUC.

The Westmount meeting is scheduled to start at 8 pm.

Since MUC rules will apply at the meeting, any bodies planning to submit such briefs must register at least 10 days before the meeting, according to Robert Wilkins, city clerk.

It means that 10 copies of the brief must be presented to the MUC's secretariat of commissions at 280-3460 by Jan 24, he noted.

Briefs should be no longer than 10 minutes in duration, otherwise summaries should be made.

## Smoking crackdown set Feb 1

FEB 1 is the crackdown date for the no-smoking by-law Westmount enacted Oct 7, city officials said this week.

Summaries of the new regulations and stickers were mailed out at the beginning of the month to some 1,100 commercial establishments and occupants of other public buildings in the city.

"We're giving them 30 days and then cracking down," said Bruce St Louis, the city's director of services for the city.

The ban applies to all non-residential buildings, including municipally owned buildings such as the MUC police station.

The by-law is to be enforced by police, public safety officers and the city's board of inspections, he said. Meetings are to take place within the next week with Police Director John Dalzell and PSU Director Richard McEnroe, he said.

Although the by-law was enacted three months ago, enforcement by the city has been awaiting arrival of the order of 2,500 no-smoking stickers from the Ottawa offices of Fire Prevention Canada (Fiprecan), Mr St Louis told THE EXAMINER Tuesday.

The order was obtained at a cost of \$250 c per sticker. A quota-tion of th expected

shortly and to be available at city hall.

Under the no-smoking by-law, smoking is prohibited in the following locations:

- Public areas of commercial buildings, such as public areas for the purchase of or waiting for goods and services;
- Public halls, auditoriums and theatres unless being used for a private function;
- Elevators; and,
- All hospitals, schools, nursing and convalescent homes, senior citizen residences, day-care centres and nurseries, except in certain designated areas;

In addition, all restaurants with a seating capacity greater than 15 must reserve and designate 25 percent of seats for non-smokers.

No-smoking signs must be posted in prohibited areas.

**Tenders, by-laws on council agenda**

City council will consider tenders for the purchase of a new snow blower as well as other vehicles at its statutory January meeting, which is to take place Monday at 8 pm in city hall.

The meeting's agenda also includes approval of purchase for electrical transformers and motor oil.

Council is also expected to adopt two by-law amendments concerning the downzoning of properties at the Glen, district C2A. City officials said several changes are expected in the final versions.

They would include increasing the maximum elevation from 190 to 195 feet Westmount datum, permitting establishment of a seniors' residence on the Pom property,

deleting the prohibition of habitable rooms below grade and a slight change in the proposed building line for one area.

Other items on the agenda by press time yesterday were:

- The transfer of funds from contingency to insurance accounts in the 1986 budget to cover increased insurance premiums;
- Adjustments in the 1985 budget would transfer funds from the snow removal account to street cleaning, to cover the rental cost of a replacement for the cleaner damaged in an accident, as well as the transfer from snowcleaning accounts into vehicle maintenance for additional snow truck rental costs;

**Chronic blood shortage postpones Davis surgery**

Westmounters are being asked to donate blood to help alleviate a chronic shortage in Red Cross supplies since a heart bypass operation for the city's director general has had to be postponed.

Mayor Brian Gallery made the appeal as surgery scheduled yesterday for Frank Davis, the city's top paid official, was postponed at the Royal Victoria Hospital owing to a shortage of blood.

"It is important that citizens mention the name of Mr Davis and the Royal Vic when they make their donation," Mayor Gallery told THE EXAMINER.

A hospital spokesman explained that the current blood shortage has resulted in the postponement of some elective surgery and that a general appeal has been made to all patients to recruit donations of

blood from families and friends.

"The Red Cross allocates blood from its bank on a priority system so it might be to the hospital's credit to have recruited donations," explained Pam Pavlik, of the public relations department.

Snow crews also were kept busy over the holiday with continuing snow flurries. High winds, which knocked down a tree Friday, preceded the first major snowstorm of the winter Saturday and Sunday.

As the holiday season gave way to more normal times Monday, the feast of Epiphany, Westmounters threw out Christmas trees, cleared snow, shovelled cars out of tow zones and returned to work and school.

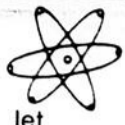
Public safety officers said the battery of a brown Honda had exploded after the cables shorted out and melted. The car had to be towed away.

## Former city councillor, wife killed in fire at Magog home

A memorial service will be held tomorrow at St Matthias' Church for former Westmount alderman Leeds Maclear Nelson, 73, and his wife, Alice Mitchell Nelson (née Rorke), who died early Saturday in a blaze which destroyed their retirement residence at Lake Memphremagog.

Officials of the Sûreté du Québec in Sherbrooke continue their investigation of the fire, which levelled the two-storey home. An electrical source is suspected, due to the suddenness with which the structure was engulfed.

Mr Nelson served on city council from 1971 to 1975, including 10 days as acting mayor in March 1975, following the death of mayor Paul Ouimet.

Mrs Nelson was active with several organizations, including the auxiliaries of the Montreal Children's Hospital, the Montreal General Hospital, the Shriners Hospital and St Matthias' Church.

While on city council, Mr Nelson was chairman of the subcommittee on the city's 1974 centennial celebrations.

Prior to his election to council, Mr Nelson served as president of the Westmount Municipal Association (1968-69) and as chairman of the Protestant School Board of Westmount after six years as a member of that body.

Mr Nelson attended Roslyn School, Westmount High School and McGill University, where he graduated in 1934 with a bachelor of commerce. He earned his accountant's accreditation in 1937 while working with McDonald, Currie & Co, which later became Coopers, Lybrand, Laliberté, Lanctôt. He retired as a senior partner in 1974.

#### Sold home

The Nelsons were longtime residents of Roslyn avenue until they sold their Westmount residence in mid-1984 and moved permanently to their summer home at Lake Memphremagog.

Canadian Welfare Council. He was a past president of the Roslyn Home and School Association, the John Howard Society and the Fossils Club of Montreal. Mr Nelson served as a lieutenant in the Canadian Army during the Second World War.

Former Mayor Donald MacCallum said Tuesday his former council colleague "made a major contribution to the community and served gracefully and calmly during the time of Mayor Ouimet's death."

"I knew him well and respected him very much. He was a good man and good citizen who was dedicated to everything he took on."

Mr MacCallum attended Westmount High with Mr Nelson in the 1930s.

Mayor Brian Gallery, who was elected to Westmount city council following Mr Nelson's term, recalled that "he worked hard and diligently for the citizens of the community. We regret very deeply the loss of Mr and Mrs Nelson, particularly in this tragic way."

The Nelsons are survived by three daughters, Sherrill Musty of Burlington, Vermont, Holly Haber of Westmount and Jane of Montreal. Also surviving are four grandchildren, Andrew and James Musty and Carrie and David Haber.

A memorial service will be held at St Matthias' Church, tomorrow at 2:30 pm. Donations may be made on behalf of Mrs Nelson to the Tiny Tim Fund of Montreal Children's Hospital and on behalf of Mr Nelson to the Canadian Heart Foundation or the Butters Foundation, 109 William street, Cowansville, PQ, J2K 1K9.

## 'Stolen' dog caper ends at CSPCA

A stolen dog caper Sunday afternoon ended happily at the CSPCA shelter when the Westmount setter was reunited with its owner.

The story, according to public safety officers, began on de Maisonneuve boulevard between Prince Albert and Claremont avenues when three persons in a silver-colored car were seen picking up Toby, the canine in question.

Toby's owner, a resident of Prince Albert, who had been clearing snow at the time, whistled in vain for the dog to return.

When the animal failed to show, he reported the alleged theft to public safety officers who suggested he report the matter to police and check the CSPCA.

Police said the dog had been turned in at the animal shelter by a woman who had found it alone on de Maisonneuve and feared it might have been in an accident.

### Leeds and Alice Nelson

WELL-deserved tribute is to be paid tomorrow afternoon in a memorial service at St Matthias' Church to Mr Leeds Nelson and his wife Alice. They died tragically last weekend in a fire which destroyed their retirement home near Magog.

This popular couple personified the kind of Westmounters in whom we always have been able to take great pride, blending business or professional accomplishment with devoted service to the community.

Over a considerable number of years Mr Nelson, supported by Mrs Nelson, provided sound leadership here, first in the Westmount Municipal Association of which he was one of its most competent presidents. He belonged to that seemingly natural progression from the WMA to city council, in which he freely provided the traditional Westmount unstinting service as alderman.

He held the important portfolio of commissioner of finance, bringing to bear his professional wisdom as a senior partner of McDonald Currie, now part of the worldwide Coopers & Lybrand chartered accountancy firm.

He bridged three mayoralties of this city,

the McEntyre, Ouimet and MacCallum eras. The rotational office of acting mayor found him effectively Westmount's chief magistrate over the several months between the time Mayor Paul Ouimet was stricken and died in early 1975. He did not seek the chief office himself; rather, Ald Nelson followed through the arrangements of this difficult period, overseeing a fine civic funeral for his late colleague and then the installation of his replacement by another, Ald Donald MacCallum, our longest-serving mayor.

Ald Nelson was thorough, painstaking and considerate in all his dealings. There were countless persons who had reason to be grateful for the time and attention he gave them without fanfare but there was the unsought cumulative effect of assuring that he would be well and fondly remembered.

It may never be known just how Leeds and Alice Nelson went in the small hours of last Saturday morning. All who knew them will pray that the end was swift and painless and be glad that it took place in the country home they loved and that neither must mourn the other.

*NO one will suggest that this week's major snowstorm was a bed of roses for anyone, least of all the Westmount public works department. We think the department has been doing a good job, within the cost restraints imposed by city council. However, we also would suggest not as good a job is done here as Mayor Brian Gallery suggested on the local CBC TV news Monday evening. There must have been numerous citizens wincing as they viewed the backdrop of a privileged Westmount street, pristine clean, as His Worship uttered his boosterism words... while the viewers had difficulty negotiating their own streets. Comparisons can be both good and bad: we drove across well-cleaned lower N.D.G. Monday morning into a Westmount which was pretty messy by comparison; yet another of our staff said downtown Montreal was a disaster. But again, St Henri and Pointe St Charles also are reported to have shown up Westmount. There are several Westmount places which can be counted upon to look good fast after a storm: around city hall, Victoria Hall, the conservatories and the Public Library. Strangely, however, one would think the police-fire station and the Public Security Unit headquarters also would receive early attention, if not out of civic pride then for practical reasons. They didn't...*

### Gulf case is Tory test

THE word "Gulf" epitomizes the contention between unemployment and efficiency, between the economy of the marketplace and state intervention, between the post-

industrial age (whatever it eventually may be called) and the kind of society in which present older generations grew up and many, in places like Westmount, pros-

### Council question limits called 'intolerable'

Sir: I have just completed the reading of your newspaper — nobody can live without it.

The statements by the mayor about the radical exit at the last city council meeting by Allen Nutik — "Rules are rules and we must carry on" — are rather KGB-style expressions. It is an insult to the small group of citizens who attend the monthly meetings to be restricted to two questions per person. I did not go to this meeting because of such an intolerable decision by the mayor and council who had pledged more open government.

What do we get instead? Higher taxes for our old folks' modest homes. Where should they go when they cannot afford those houses anymore? Should they live on cat

pered handsomely. The word refers, of course, to the Gulf Canada Ltd oil refinery in Montreal East, sold with Ottawa's sanction to British-owned Ultramar Canada Inc which is pursuing its announced intention to close the big, modern complex because, it says, there is an over-capacity among refineries in this part of Canada.

The "gulf" between the opposing contentions increasingly is pervading our lives insofar as we follow and are sensitized to currents in the politics of the country. Clearly there was a mounting sense in the nation in 1984 that we must get back to the more conservative practices of an earlier era. This was reflected in the chucking out of the interventionist Liberals and a generous vote for the Tory avowal to return to an economy motivated by the private-sector and to slash public deficits and public debt.

It passes strange that we have the spectacle of some Tory MPs, including an on-the-way-out-anyway cabinet minister, professing opposition to their own government's implementation of the very policies upon which they were elected. It is more than conjecture that these protestations are more for purposes of posing as champions of their east end Montreal electors than for any basic disavowal of party or principle.

What's really at stake here is national rather than local interest.

Loss of jobs, whether in Montreal's industrial areas or elsewhere, of course should be the chief human concern. However, it is broadly recognized that over-spending government has squeezed and discouraged private-sector growth, the real creator and preserver of jobs. Too much of our stultifying debt has been piled up by well-meaning but mostly ill-fated attempts to promote or maintain that which is not supportable by the economy.

If, for example, there is not the market to justify continued operation of the Gulf refinery, it is folly to go on running it. If government should intervene to do so, we substitute a new burden on the taxpayers for whatever would have been the cost to the operator.

Canada already has rather handsome (and therefore expensive) safety nets in place for those who become unemployed in this kind of situation. Whatever the ups and downs of the popularity polls, it is safe to say that the country is behind the government in bringing down expenditure, specially expenditure which has no long-lasting benefit to anyone.

The more government interferes with the natural processes of commerce and industry, the deeper government becomes mired, the more people become dependent upon government rather than themselves, and the worse trouble we are in.

It is all very well, and even understandable, that those affected should appeal to the government for aid. But in the Gulf situation it is pursuing the very kind of policy upon which it was elected. It must be hoped that Mr Mulroney has the will-power to stick to his guns and not give in to special pleadings.

### Global perspective on trade

YOU can bet that the trade negotiations with the United States will capture a lot of media time and space in the coming months. I continue to be concerned about the polarization that seems to be taking place, but I am beginning to think it is inevitable on almost any controversial issue. Argument becomes displaced by prejudice.

This week, the North-South Institute added an important dimension to the debate, pointing out that the talks with the United States should "be part of, not instead of, a new round of worldwide non-discriminatory trade liberalization through the GATT."

If the focus is purely on the Ottawa-Washington dialogue, we may indeed sacrifice the global perspective, which is where Canada's long-term interests lie. The Macdonald Commission made it clear that multilateral trade is always to be preferred, but the current environment points to a comprehensive trade agreement with the United States as a first priority. That should not preclude the pursuit of multilateral options within GATT at the same time and I presume that is what the government has in mind. However, the spokesman for the institute suggested that a battle is shaping up within the government between "brash bilateralists" and those who see the global GATT approach as in our best interests.

If such a tug of war emerges within the government while a pitched battle is waged without between proponents of freer trade on the one hand and supporters of protectionism on the other, we will all be the losers.

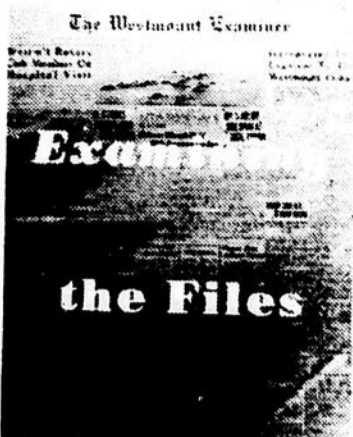
### Minister's tour continues

LAST week, I described a part of the mandate of the minister of communications. In this issue, I would like to continue the sketch of my responsibilities. I have been going through an intensive course on the subject myself in the three weeks or so I have been a minister.

The two sectors I mentioned last week were, first, telecommunications/information processing, and second, government information. The third sector, called policy and development in communications, is the most diverse and the most complex. Whereas the first two sectors involve delicate co-ordination and negotiation within government, the third sector involves an extraordinary variety of players from the federal government and foreign governments to Bell Canada and IBM to community radio stations and fledgling software companies.

The policy and development sector promotes the development of communications infrastructures and communications industries in Quebec: television, radio, the press, cable distribution, telecommunications, information-processing. The means adopted are many and varied, including subsidies (eight separate programs), regulation (independently at the Quebec level, by the Régie des Services Publics, and through joint jurisdiction with the federal government and the CRTC), public-private planning on a sectoral basis (eg the future of French-language television), international agreements (eg cable technology) and by the direct management of public enterprise (eg Radio Québec).

The Commission on Access to Government Information is (somewhat like Radio Québec, but more so) an autonomous agency which reports to the National Assembly through the minister of communications. Its job is to referee disagreements between public bodies and citizens regarding access to documents and the privacy and accuracy of personal information in public sector files.

Forty-five Years Ago  
January 9, 1941

"While nothing is definite until nominations close at noon on Monday, indications were stronger today than ever that the present Mayor and City Council would be returned to office by acclamation in the forthcoming municipal elections. The Westmount Municipal Association, in a formal statement, has endorsed for re-election Mayor Walter A. Merrill, K.C. who is concluding his first term as Chief Magistrate of the City, and the present members of the aldermanic body. If a civic poll is necessary, it will be held one week from the date of the deadline for the filing of nomination papers on Monday."

Thirty-five Years Ago  
January 5, 1951

"The Boy Scout Association has launched a three-year plan for the further development of Canadian Scouting. Jackson Dodds of 58 Belvedere road, Westmount, Deputy Chief Scout for Canada, in making the announcement on Monday, outlined the program to be known as 'Plan Achievement.' It calls for active participation by the 115,000 members of the association in Canada and requires every Cub pack, Scout troop and Rover crew to set targets of accomplishment for themselves. It is a challenge to the boys and leaders to 'help themselves' to make progress in scouting."

Twenty-five Years Ago  
January 6, 1961

"Mr Jean Drapeau's astonishing proposal to annex Westmount (and 31 other Island municipalities) into the embrace of the City of Montreal was greeted here with a solid wall of opposition and undisguised hostility, the EXAMINER survey disclosed this week. There was not even one opinion which favored Mayor Jean's suggestion. Replies of 'definitely not' and comments which threw Montreal's Mayor into a notoriously unpopular light were, for the most part, common opinion. Mayor Drapeau's proposal had, apparently, hit Westmount residents in their pride. Statements such as 'I'd rather die first!' and 'We live in Westmount because it is the way it is' and 'We'd lose our Garden City' give one the opinion that pride will pose an able and aggressive antagonist to the mayor's plan."

Fifteen Years Ago  
January 7, 1971

"Two young Bathurst, N.B., men are in custody today and a purse-snatching nipped thanks to quick action of three Westmount public works officials yesterday. The three men in a city vehicle at midday spotted a woman on the east side of Park Place chasing a youth north from St Catherine street. They joined the chase. The youngster, age 16, dropped the purse which he had grabbed moments before from the woman, a resident of Melville avenue. While Frank Marrone, a technician, retrieved the handbag the other two, Assistant General Superintendent Ray Paradis and Engineer Fred Caluori, caught up to the fugitive, and called police."

Five Years Ago  
January 8, 1981

"Is firefighting next on the list of municipal services to be contracted out to private enterprise, along with snow removal and garbage disposal? Such a move is one of the recommendations contained in a 'sensitive' report concerning the future of firefighting services in Westmount and its five municipal mutual aid partners, sources have revealed. The report, now in the hands of city officials, follows a survey conducted last year by an Arizona firm of fire consultants."

# More house sales registered in October, prices slip

A resurgence in the volume of Westmount residential property transfers registered during October is coupled with a slight decrease in prices, according to an EXAMINER summary.

The 36 registered sales of one- and two-family dwellings is up from 26 in September and the figure bucks the usual trend of declining sales toward the end of the year.

October prices dipped slightly from levels recorded in September

registrations, down to an average 31.7 percent more than valuations from 33.3 percent.

In October, two houses were sold for the second time this year, each of them at a considerably higher price.

One of the two, a Grenville avenue home, changed hands twice in October, the price being \$35,000 higher in the second sale.

The sale of a home at 61 Summit

crest was registered in October at \$380,000; the same house sold for \$325,000 in June registrations.

Although month-to-month changes in the average price of Westmount properties in 1985 include ups and downs, prices generally have been increasing since March, when registered prices were the lowest of the year.

### Average dwelling

The 1985 valuation roll shows an average Westmount dwelling to be worth \$178,445 for tax purposes. Had the sale of such a home been registered in October, its price likely would have been in the \$235,000 range.

The average price in October registrations was \$248,792, which indicates that homes slightly above the all-Westmount average dominate the October transfers.

The highest declared price in an October transfer was \$475,000, which was paid for a home on Delavigne road.

A home in the 500-block on Lansdowne avenue sold for the lowest October price — \$100,000.

Markups in the October transfers range from 18 percent below valua-

tion to 77.8 percent above, the average, as noted, being 31.7 percent.

Even when unusual sales — those showing the highest and lowest prices and markups — are excluded from the figures, the average Oc-

tober markup is unchanged.

Other properties in the October transfers include three condominium units: one on Claremont avenue; another on St Catherine street; and a third on de Maison-neuve boulevard at Victoria avenue.

The sale of a triplex on de Maison-neuve boulevard was the only other residential transaction to be registered.

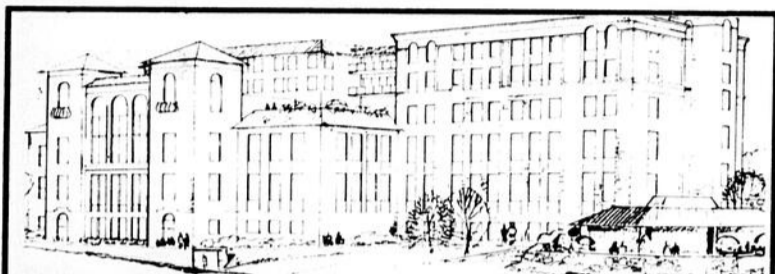

## New sergeant, new shifts for public safety officers

Gregory Cockerell has been promoted to the rank of sergeant in Westmount's Public Security Unit following a reorganization of the force's shift schedule Jan 1, it was announced Monday.

The departure Friday of Sgt Brian Claman now leaves a vacancy among supervisory personnel.

Ross Sheppard, an administrative officer with the city's public safety department who formerly worked in the city's Stanton street office, also has taken up duties in the security unit's Hillside avenue headquarters.

The new year has also brought

physical changes to the force with the completion of the two-office addition to the headquarters.

## Snow removal crews attack first deluge

City snow removal crews were out in force this week, clearing away the aftermath of the winter's first heavy deluge.

According to a Westmount public works official, the most recent dump of over 10 cm arrived as removal crews still were tackling the previous week's instalment.

"It will take a couple days before we can really take a good bite out of it," the public works official said Monday. "Once major arteries are plowed, we do the side streets and then begin loading."

A total of 25 pieces of snow removal equipment and 40 workers at double time were deployed on Sunday, the peak of the downfall. Some seven vehicles were involved in 'casting' snow from streets onto the front lawns of Westmount homes.

Mayor Brian Gallery estimates Sunday's operation cost the city \$25,000 out of the total 1985-86 snow removal allocation of \$2.2 million.

To date general road and sidewalk conditions have been merciful to Westmounters. There has been none of the heavy plate ice that plagued motorists and pedestrians last winter.

The city's salting program has been successful in keeping roadways and intersections clear of deeply entrenched ice, the works official said.

## New Year fire:

# Hot butter on stove chars Dodge kitchen

**THE new year got off to a popping hot start for one Westmount family who experienced a kitchen fire New Year's night after a pan of butter being melted for popcorn ignited on an electric stove.**

It had been left unattended during a game of Trivial Pursuit, according to Andy Dodge, owner of the three-storey house at 331 Lansdowne avenue.

Westmount's first fire of 1986, which broke out about 8:30 pm, caused no injuries, fire officials report.

They said it occurred while firefighters were busy on another call nearby, at 4800 de Maisonneuve boulevard, for a defective alarm. Mutual aid fire crews from Côte St Luc and Outremont had been summoned.

Although the kitchen fire was confined to the stove, cupboards and countertop, their replacement as well as soot damage throughout the home "will cost in the thousands," said Mr Dodge, a real estate consultant.

### 'Soot everywhere'

"The soot just went everywhere," he said. Walls, carpets and cupboards have to be cleaned and some ceilings may require painting."

As a former reporter for THE EXAMINER, Mr Dodge noted that he had written many times about grease pot fires "but it's always the same story — you think it could never happen to you."

The fire occurred, he said, when the butter, which had been left unattended while melting in a small saucepan, boiled over and ignited.

It spread to four oven mitts hanging nearby and then up the cupboards.

The fire caused bedlam, he said, when it first was discovered by the family's 13-year-old son, William.

"As soon as Willie screamed, the smoke detectors started going off, one after the other, as smoke started filling the stairwell," recalled Mr Dodge. "It's difficult to remember the exact timing because there was such bedlam."

The "great thing," he noted, however, was how well his eight-year-old daughter, Alice, followed certain fire safety points she had been taught.

### Closed door

"As soon as she saw the smoke, she closed the door to her bedroom and put her bathrobe against the crack."

As he called the fire department,

## Former church flooded after pipe bursts

A burst pipe in the roof of the former St Andrew's Church, now a section of Selwyn House School, sent water leaking into lower floors Dec 28, fire officials report.

years.

Under the new system, he says, the contracted chimney sweep would clean all flues, at least from the outside, and no longer would need to contact residents for payment.

Problems regarding chimney sweeping have been under study by the city during the past year since it has been suspected that many chimneys have not been cleaned (see story Aug 25, 1985).

Statistics in 1984 revealed, for example, that of approximately 4,565 buildings in Westmount, a total of 3,476 had chimneys swept leaving 1,089 uncleaned.

Specifications for the service call for the chimney sweep to put 48-hour notices through mail boxes or slots asking residents to close fireplace dampers in preparation for the cleaning.

Should no one be home when the sweep calls, flues would be cleaned from the roof, although "whenever possible, chimneys are to be swept from the base," Dir Timmons says.

### Notice provided

When the work is completed, a notice asking residents to remove soot from the base of the furnace flue would be provided.

"Very little soot should be noticed once the chimneys are swept every year," Dir Timmons points out.

By the end of the first year, the city also expects to have an up-to-date inventory of the number of flues in the city.

The chimney sweep changes have been encouraged by Alderman Rhoda Vineberg, fire commissioner, who told THE EXAMINER the city intends to monitor very closely the performance of the chimney sweep.

"The contract will be very specific, allowing us to cancel the service at any time should the work not be up to our standards," she said.

The fire director will be given authority to check equipment, supervise the contractor and terminate the contract for "poor workmanship."

Chimneys are to be swept between March 1 and Dec 31, 1986.

The city's chief concern is that

every flue be swept each year in the name of fire safety, she said.

Although the previous system relieved the burden of chimney sweeping from the city, in cases where residents were out when the sweep called, they were forced either to call in a sweep at a cost of about \$50 or risk a fire.

The anticipated cost to the city is considered worthwhile in terms of public safety in that it ensures that all flues are swept, she said.

One disadvantage to the new plan is that fireplaces and flues would not necessarily be inspected at the base, where defects might be detected.

As a result, the fire chief has recommended that follow-up

appointments be made in cases where the absence of residents restricts cleaning to the outside.

The new Westmount procedures have been modelled on those followed in Outremont, Dir Timmons pointed out.

A survey of other communities reveals that among those paying for chimney sweeping operations from the general tax fund are: Outremont, Côte St Luc, Dollard des Ormeaux, Pierrefonds, Beaconsfield, Dorval and Lachine.

Municipalities where the resident pays are: Montreal, Town of Mount Royal, Hampstead, Laval, Longueuil, and Montreal West.

Ville d'Anjou has no city chimney sweep.

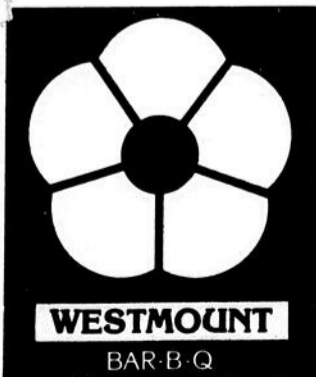

Exhibition at Galerie Optica:

## Diana Gubbay explores arches in sculpture, ink

Former Westmounter Diana Gubbay plans to be in Montreal Saturday for the vernissage of an exhibition of her recent drawings and sculptures at Galerie Optica, 3981 St Lawrence boulevard.

In church portals, garden gates and other arches, Ms Gubbay looks for symbolic qualities, finding barriers, thresholds and passages. She says the arch can represent the transition "from one phase of life to another."

"That's why I'm drawn to it."

Three distinct sections of the exhibition present arches in different forms, exploring "what can be distilled from an architectural form."

In a group of small-scale sculptures, arches in brass, copper and other metals are supported by "open columns" of loosely coiled galvanized wire.

Larger arches in another group have been formed in stiff honeycomb cardboard, a material Ms Gubbay says is used by few artists. "I happen to think it's a very nice material," she says, noting that the

sculptures might later be developed in other materials, perhaps wood or sheet metal.

The third section of the exhibition is a series of 40 ink drawings on rice paper, in which the arch takes on gentle curves and other anthropomorphic features.

'More like people'

"They end up looking a little more like people, creatures," says Miss Gubbay of her drawn arches, contrasting them with the rigid cardboard and sturdy metal of her sculptures.

The exhibition comprises work of the last year, according to Ms Gubbay. None of the work has been seen in Montreal before; the cardboard sculptures are on view for the first time.

In sculpture, Ms Gubbay always has worked in architectural themes. "I'm my mother's daughter," she laughs.

Windsor avenue resident Aline

Gubbay, an author, teacher and photographer, wrote a book on buildings in Montreal and co-authored another on Westmount buildings.

Ms Gubbay credits her mother with having stimulated her interest in architecture. "She helped me to become aware of buildings."

Ms Gubbay, who attended Roslyn and Westmount High Schools, has lived in New York City for the last eight years. The large, active art community in New York "can feed you, but it can also overwhelm you," Ms Gubbay says.

Studied at Dawson

She studied at Dawson College and completed a two-year craft program at Sheridan College near Toronto. "I used to be a potter," she says, adding that she taught at the Visual Arts Centre on Victoria avenue and at John Abbott CEGEP in Ste Anne de Bellevue.

She studied at Concordia University for two years, completing a fine arts degree at the University of Toronto.

Ms Gubbay moved to New York in 1977, completing an MFA degree there in 1983.

Now 30, she does freelance work in artistic fields, including flower arranging, in addition to sculpting and drawing on her own.

In September 1984, Ms Gubbay married Hank Benson, a financial analyst from Rhode Island, in a Westmount wedding.

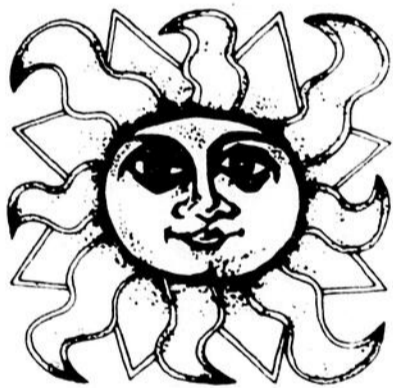

leader Claude Ryan (a closet separatist who one year previously told Quebec citizens to vote for and elect the Parti Québécois). If that's the logic of the Liberals, then God help us!

And yet, one must give credit when credit is due. Mr Bourassa returned from a self-imposed exile, got himself re-elected as leader of the Liberal Party, and in short order, reorganized the party, leading it to a landslide victory over the PQ. Nonetheless, the personal defeat in his own Bertrand riding (which had just recently elected him in a by-election), says more than the 249 votes that defeated him. It reflected a deep-rooted reservation that permeates this province with a sense of distrust concerning his ability to govern Quebec and to lead it out of its current doldrums.

No matter how one cares to rationalize this confused and topsyturvy Quebec political scene, the facts remain irrefutable. Mr Bourassa was first elected premier of Quebec at the age of 36. He was a product of the "don't trust anyone over the age of 30 generation," very idealistic, but lacking a modicum of any experience of note. His campaign slogan was "100,000 new jobs."

But, blinded by idealism and inexperience his government declared Quebec to be a unilingual French province, and soon thereafter engineered the legislation of Bill 22. The practical and inevitable consequence was the loss of 200,000 jobs in Quebec and starting the greatest exodus of Quebec citizens in the history of Canada.

This, of course, laid the foundation for the ultra-nationalist PQ to sweep into power, completing the process already set in motion by the Liberal government. Now, Mr Bourassa claims vindication of his previous actions by virtue of the latest victory of his Liberal Party with a 99-seat majority in the National Assembly.

But, for Mr Bourassa to regain any credibility and trust with the Quebec citizenry, and to erase the element of distrust or reservations that haunt him, he has a long bill to fill that requires good economic acumen and political will. Above all it requires a demonstrative show of humility and honesty. Mr Bourassa, now 53, has surely matured since his first term in office.

The following agenda is imperative for Mr Bourassa to realize his election platform:

1) He must swallow his pride, rid himself of his arrogance, and subtly

admit that he had been wrong in his intellectual assessment of Quebec during his first premiership — admittedly, difficult for a politician, but candidly necessary.


2) Mr Bourassa must be re-elected in a hasty by-election in a safe Liberal riding, probably (and ironically) in a predominantly English speaking riding. Governing from the outside-looking-in is for all intents and purposes impractical and virtually impossible and ineffective.

3) He must give the province back to the people who elected him; he must lead them, not dictate to them. He must let Quebec people "be" rather than mold them into an amorphous glob. The "majority-minority" concept must be repudiated. If 5 million Quebec citizens cannot tolerate or compete with 900,000 people comprising hapless immigrants and generations-old Anglo-Saxons, how can Quebec compete with 20 million other Canadians, or 250 million people to the south of us.

4) He must place high priority to the abolition of the "language police" (Office de la langue française), a government agency that has transformed Quebec into an intimidating quasi-terrorist state reminiscent of the infamous Spanish Inquisition.

5) Finally, as an economist, Mr Bourassa must gradually phase out Bill 101. Surely, he must understand by now the deleterious effects

of that Bill on Quebec's economy — the flight of head offices; the brain drain; the loss of jobs; the flight of capital and financial institutions; the divisiveness; and, to mention once again, the massive exodus of Quebec residents; Quebec's shameful immigration record over the past 15 years; the lack of foreign entrepreneurs coming into this province.

Surely, he must realize by now that diversity, cultural pluralism enriches and enhances the economic vitality of any environment by fostering competitiveness and ingenuity.

All told, Mr Bourassa has his work cut out for him as leader of his new government. He must not allow his heart to lead his head. This agenda may appear to be politically risky (some may say suicidal), but I suggest that it would only be a transitory and salutary phenomenon. Any factor that will result in a resurgence of Quebec's economy, with greater industrialization minus all the repressive and restrictive overtones of culture that impede economic growth, will by far exceed the political risks involved. The 20 percent increased cost of doing business in Quebec would rapidly diminish.

For the first time in Quebec history we have an entire generation that is not only literate but adequately educated and sophisticated. Quebec has matured. Let the people of Quebec now develop their individual initiatives, incentives and convictions without the heavy hand of clergy or government interference constantly directing them. Such a program will surprise the severest of skeptics with a surge of economic progress never before dreamed of in Quebec's 300-year existence.

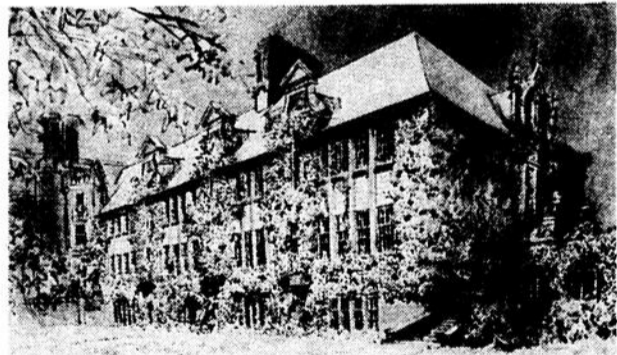

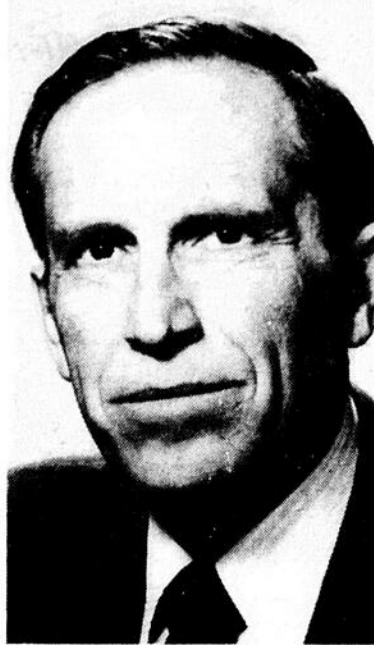

## Order of Canada honors awarded three residents

Two Westmounters, both physicians, have been elevated to companions of the Order of Canada, the highest honor bestowed on Canadian citizens.

Dr Phil Gold, a world-leading cancer researcher, and Dr Maurice LeClair, chairman and chief executive officer of Canadian National Railway Co, both were officers of the Order of Canada prior to the year-end appointments.

Another Westmounter, Dr Samuel Freedman, also an eminent cancer researcher, was named an officer of the order.

Dr Gold, 49, is the co-discoverer of the carcinoembryonic antigen

which resulted in the development of the first practical test for bowel cancer. The test now is routinely used for cancer detection.

In more recent research, Dr Gold headed a team that discovered antibodies which can detect and identify specific types of cancers within the human body.

The most recent distinction adds to some 15 other honors and awards conferred upon Dr Gold over the past 20 years. He has lectured widely, including visiting professorships in Massachusetts, New York and Venezuela. A chair in cancer research has been established in his name at the Weizmann Institute in

Rehovot, Israel.

Dr Gold currently is physician-in-chief at the Montreal General Hospital. He is married to Evelyn Katz and the father of three children.

Dr LeClair, 58, capped a distinguished career in medicine and in the senior public service with his appointment to the head of CN in 1982. He is a specialist in internal medicine and former dean of the faculty of medicine at the Université de Sherbrooke and vice-dean of the faculty of medicine at the Université de Montréal.

He has served in the federal posts of deputy minister of health and

Among Dr LeClair's other involvements are service as a director of the Clinical Research Institute, as a member of the Canadian American Committee and as a trustee of the Manning Awards.

He has received honorary doctorates from McMaster University, the Université de Sherbrooke, and McGill University. He is a commander of the Order of St John and a knight of the Order of Malta.

Dr Freedman, 57, a graduate of both Roslyn School and Westmount High School, is one of Canada's foremost immunologists and is credited with a major cancer research breakthrough in association with Dr Gold.

His career as a teacher and administrator is distinguished, as

well. He now is vice-principal academic at McGill University and senior physician in the clinical immunology and allergy division of the Montreal General Hospital.

He is the recipient of several awards, including two recognizing his achievements in association with Dr Gold. A chair at the Weizmann Institute also has been endowed in his name. He is married to Norah Lee Maizel and the father of four children.

All three Westmount appointees received their medical degrees at McGill.

Altogether 71 Canadians were recognized by appointments to the order. The most recent round of appointees will be presented with their honors at a ceremony to be presided over by Gov-Gen Jeanne Sauvé later this year.
