## Sound Basis Of Assessment Outlined For Public Officials

Mr. Jean Sarault, inspector-auditor of the Quebec department of municipal affairs, on Wednesday night gave a lecture on municipal assessment at The High School, Shawville, to 61 people representing most of the municipalities in Lower Pontiac.

Mr. Sarault took as his text the section of the Municipal Code which states that municipal property must be valued at its real value. Its real value, he said, is the amount that it would sell for.

The speaker devoted much of his time to outlining the basis for establishing a system of assessment which would assess each property in a municipality at its real value, and would accordingly place the fair and proper tax burden on each property owner.

The audience was an interested one, and brought up a running fire of questions as the speaker progressed from point to point.

Objections which could be

raised to valuing property at its real value are: 1. The county council assessment would go up in those municipalities using this system. 2. School grants from the province would go down. Both of these objections are invalid, the speaker stated. At the county level, he said, if the mayors do their job properly, they will equalize the taxes as between municipalities. At the provincial level, a statement to the superintendent of education advising that the municipal assessment had been increased to a real value basis would cause that department to consider the awarding of grants in the light of this information. In all probability the grants would be unaffected by a change in assessment of this nature.

The lecture was given at the request of Pontiac County Council and Ray Johnston and was requested because 1959 is the year of revision of assessments in most local municipalities.

## Heavy Sentence Imposed For Attempted Armed Robbery

Sylvio Vaillancourt of Alouette Island was charged last Friday with attempted robbery with violence while masked, appeared before

Judge Avila Labelle in Campbell's Bay on Wednesday, was found guilty, and has been sentenced to three years in the penitentiary.

At 5 a. m. last Friday Vaillancourt broke into the home of Dosophy Demers, of Demers Centre, an invalid, aged 60, who lives alone. Vaillancourt was masked, was dressed in a lady's overcoat, threatened Demers with a knife and demanded money

Demers seized the knife by the blade, sustaining severe cuts to the hands in so doing and in the ensuing struggle ripped the mask from Vaillancourt's face. He was immediately recognized, and turned and fled from the house. Detective Andre Audet of the QPP was notified, and in company with Traffic Constable Clifford Roman went to Vaillancourt's home later the same morning. They were unable to gain entry to the house peacefully, and were finally obliged to force their way in. Vaillancourt was arrested in the house, and was taken to Campbell's Bay for questioning. Later he pleaded guilty to the charges laid, and was sentenced to three years in penitentiary. This is the heaviest sentence ever recorded at Campbell's Bay since 1952.

Two Pontiac Ayrshire animals have captured top honour in the 1958 "All Canadian" contest according to results which have just been announced.

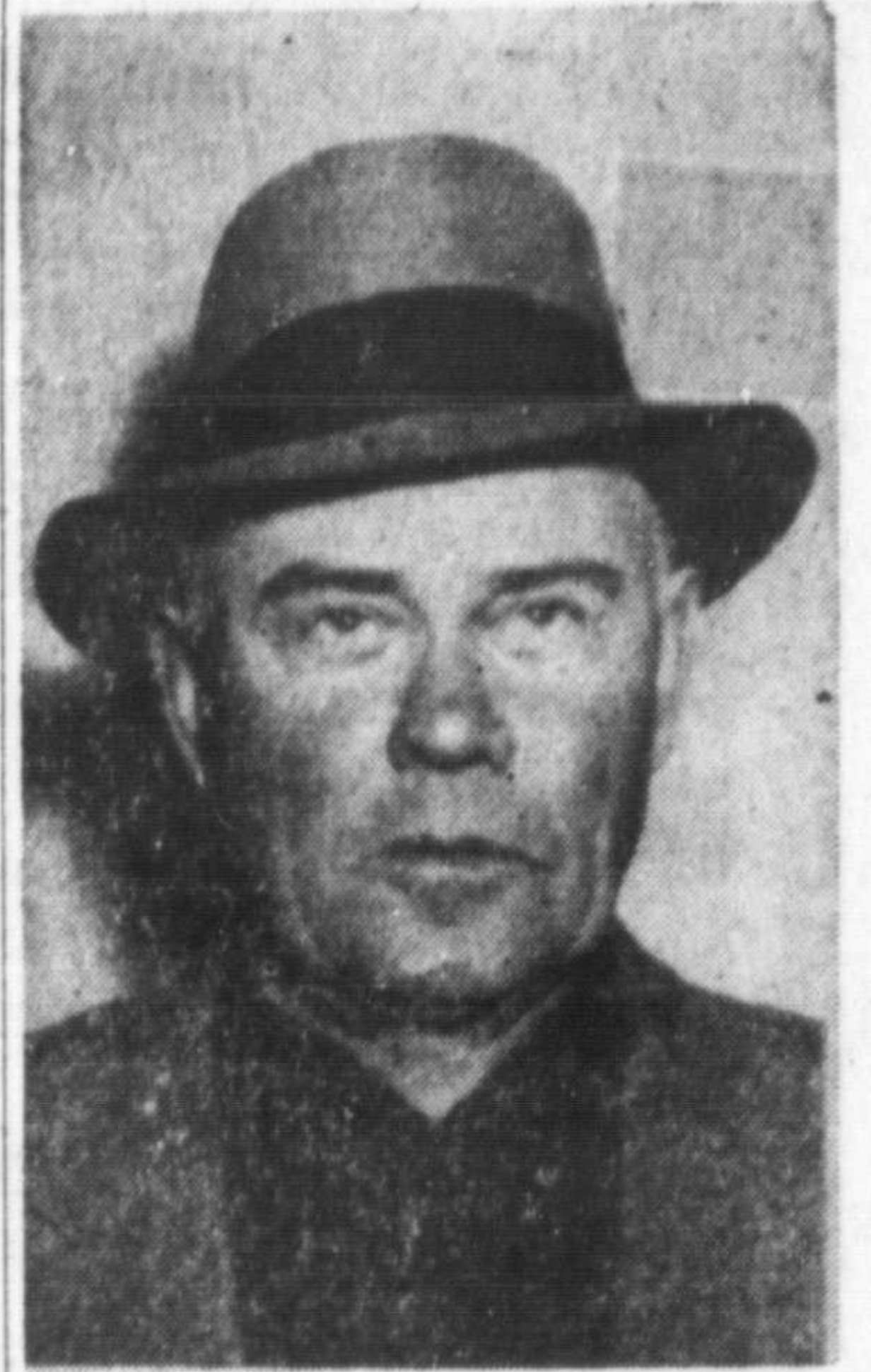
Bonnleshade Dainty Girl has been selected as the 1958 All Canadian Ayrshire cow and Bonnleshade Banner Bearer is the All Canadian bull calf. Both are owned by S. Wyman MacKechnie and Sons, Wyman.

This is the only herd in Canada to produce two All Canadians for last year. To make the feat more remarkable, Dainty Girl was the All Canadian cow of 1957 also.

In this contest, in addition to the two above mentioned classes, four others classes of females and two of males are conducted.

Six animals in each class are nominated by a special committee of independent experts. This is followed by a vote of the fourteen Ayrshire judges of the 1958 major shows from coast to coast. The animals obtaining the greatest number of points in the eight respective classes are declared the winners and named "All Canadian" for the year.

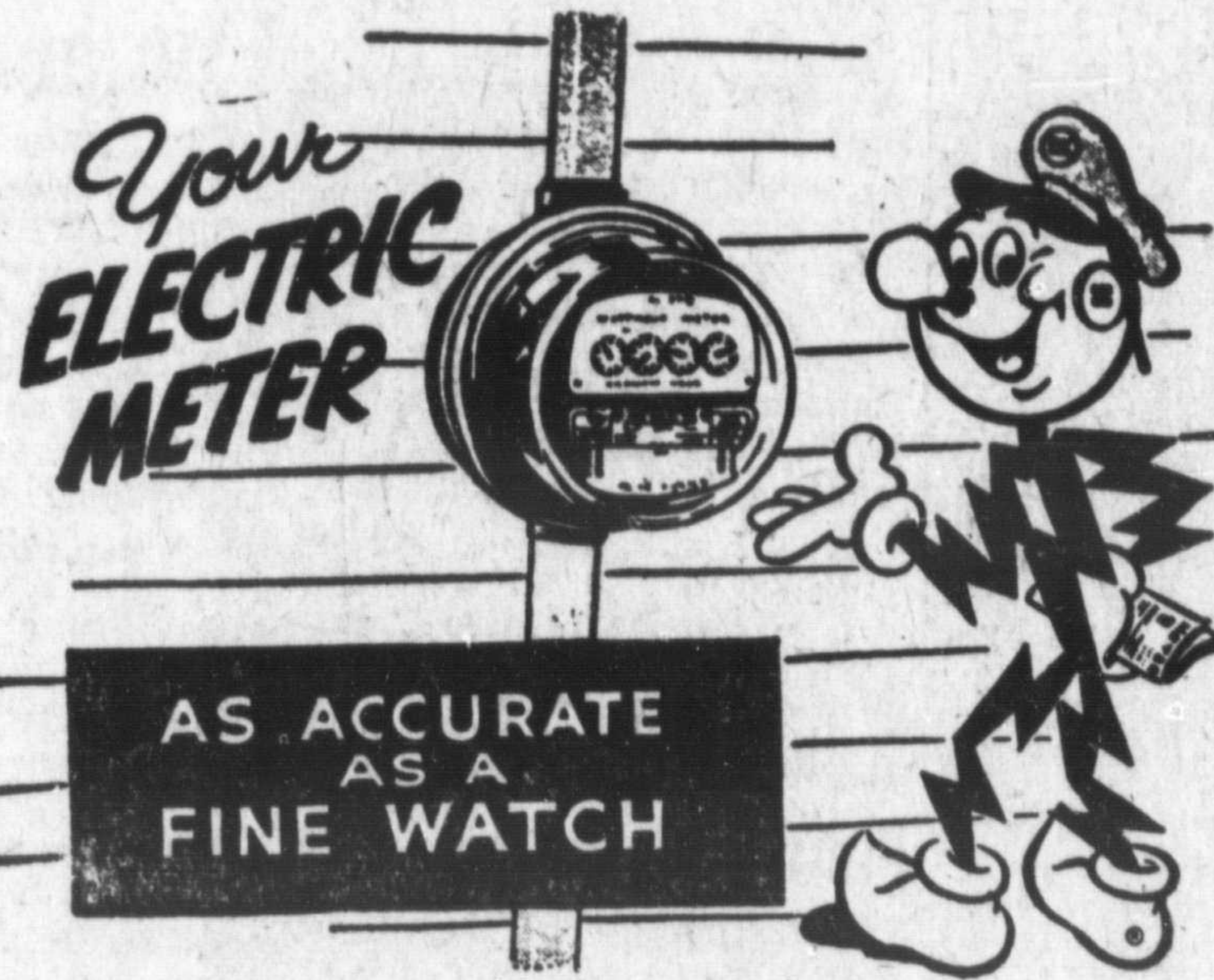


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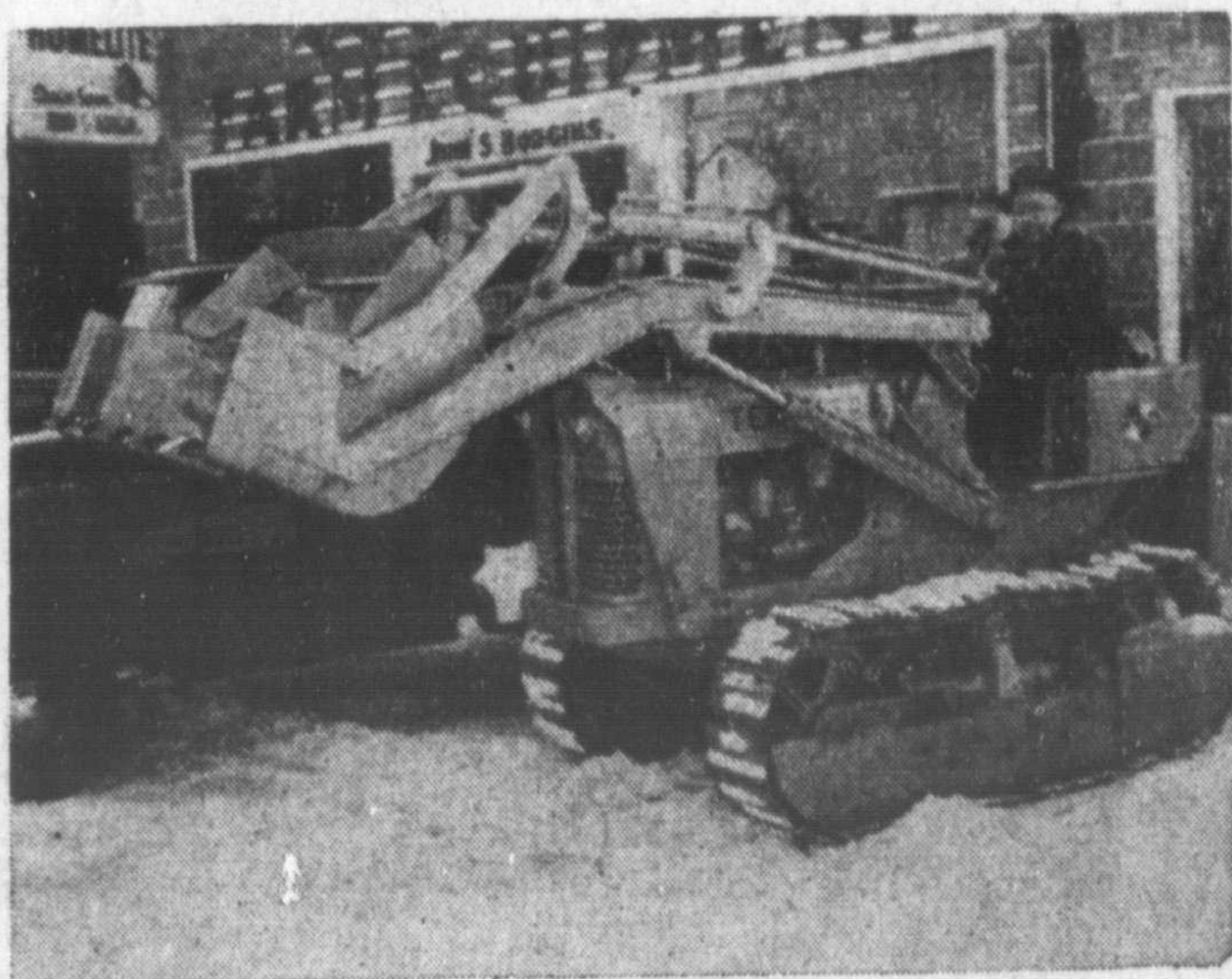

The meeting opened with devotion. Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. There were 12 members and two visitors present. 46 articles were mended.

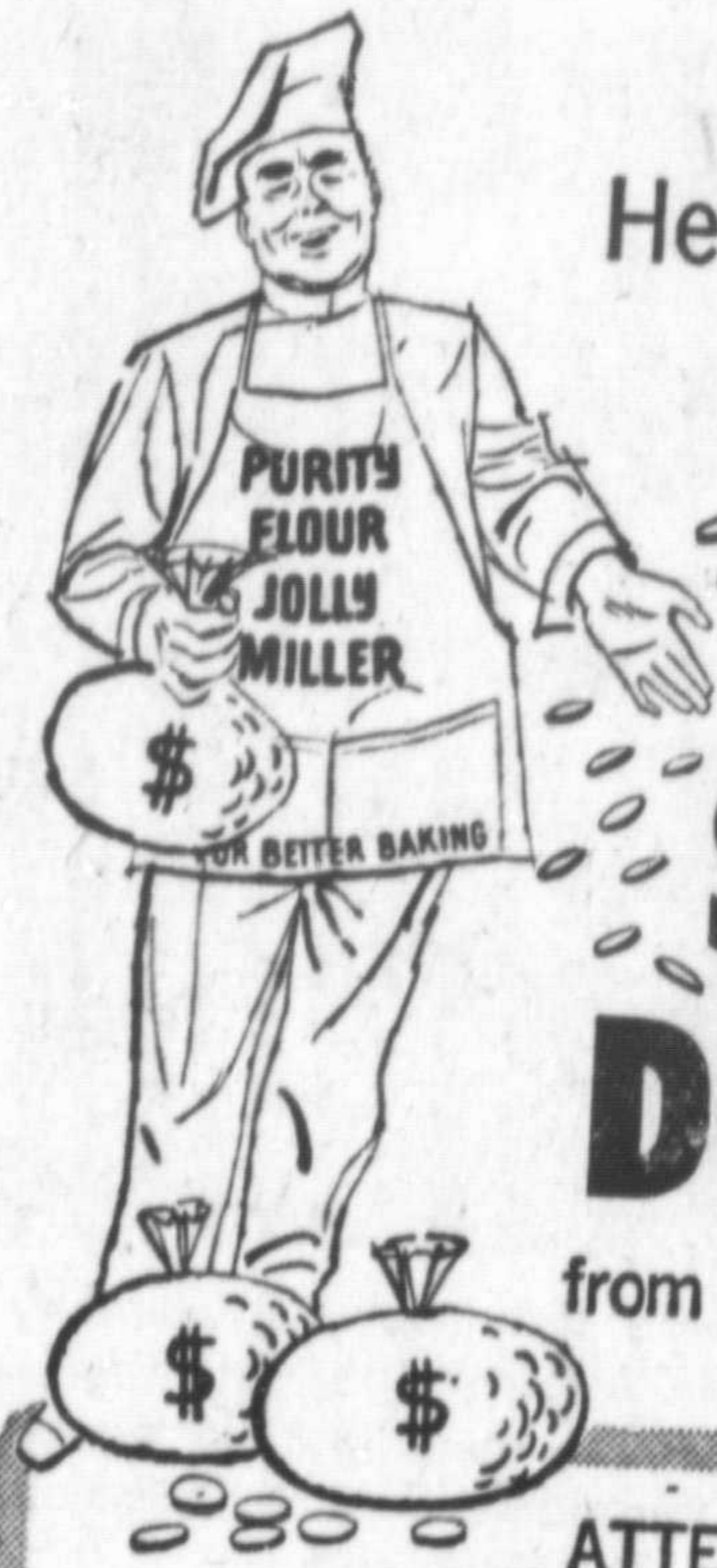
