THE AUSTRO-HUNGARIAN CRISIS.

Escape and Re-capture of an American Murderer.

OPERATIONS AGAINST CABUL TO BEGIN IMMEDIATELY.

Yellow Fever in Madrid.

GREAT BRITAIN.

LONDON, Oct 3 - Peter Freeman, the self-confessed murderer, from Bull River, South Carolina, was again before the Bow Street Police Court today.

The Marquis of Lorne and Princess Louise sail for Canada on the 14th instant.

The Manchester Guardian's Vienna despatch confirms the report that the Emperor accepted the resignation of the Hungarian Minister of Finance; the other Ministers will only withdraw their resignation upon the acceptance by the Government of the following conditions -

The issue of a joint Austro-Hungarian loan, and the reduction of the army in Bosnia, and the abandonment of the occupation of Novi Bazar; the latter condition has been already accepted by the Emperor.

The Austrian Cabinet oppose a joint loan, which would reduce the Austrian credit to the same level with the Hungarian; therefore the conflict between the two cabinets is imminent.

A despatch from Kaniata states that the movement against Cabul begins immediately.

A Simla despatch reports no commotion has yet been received from the Amer.

The natives are bringing down word that the Amer. is collecting his forces from all quarters to oppose the advance of the English.

The Telegraph says Minister Layard is expected to arrive in England at an early day to consult with the Government on the British policy in the East.

A despatch from Pesth says - It is believed Her Majesty will be asked to form a provisional Cabinet to act until the opening of Parliament.

A Madrid despatch says considerable alarm has been caused in that capital by 30 cases supposed to be typhoid fever, and the epidemic is spreading.

The Glasgow Bank lost £2,250,000 to four firms; the reputation of one or two of which has been anything but good.

The opinion expressed by bank managers is that a more radical course of re-organization is required for the Glasgow Bank.

The bank, it is estimated, will show a deficit of three million pounds, which, to the knowledge of the shareholders, is the maximum loss that the dividends had been increased.

According to a Berlin newspaper, Professor Feder Mott, geographer, committed suicide in consequence of domestic troubles; his father and brother died in the same manner.

AUSTRIA.

VIENNA, Oct 3 - The Cisleithan Ministry, which tendered its resignation in July and has since only held office pending the decision of the Emperor, declared yesterday, that having to prepare the budget for the Reichsrath, it was unable to consent to Count Andriassy's views respecting the means of raising funds for the Bosnia occupation.

The Emperor, it is reported, has in consequence with the Hungarian crisis, commenced with the Hungarian crisis.

FRY, Oct 3 - At a council of the Hungarian Ministers, today, all resolved to support Her Majesty, and signed their resignations.

YELLOW FEVER.

Fifteen Thousand People Prostrated in New Orleans.

New York, Oct. 3 - 139 p.m. - Telegrams from New Orleans say a panic prevails there. Fifteen thousand people are prostrated by fever.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 3 - From noon to six p.m. 15 deaths are reported and 187 new cases.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 3 - Seven new cases and one death; and two with black vomit.

THE GREAT BOAT RACE.

Our readers will doubtless feel interested in perusing the report of the great international boat race of yesterday, as detailed in the telegraphic despatches from Lachine received by us every few minutes during the day, and published in another column.

As the appointed hour for the race drew near yesterday, the indications of the contest taking place were anything but favorable.

About three o'clock a violent rain storm accompanied by lightning occurred, which finally passed over, however, leaving a slight ripple upon the water, which shortly before five o'clock was considered in a sufficiently favorable condition for the race to be rowed.

The contest was undoubtedly an even and closely contested one, the official decision of the Referee, Sheriff Harding, according to him, the Canadian champion by only half a length.

The result proves undoubtedly that Courtney is an excellent man, and but very slightly the inferior of Hanlan. So far as can be judged by the report of the race received by us, there appears no reason to suspect other than that the contest was a fair one throughout and that both men used their very best endeavors to avoid disappointing their friends.

It remains to be seen, however, whether Courtney's friends take this view of the case, for a very large section of the American press including the New York Herald, whether convinced of not of Hanlan's superiority, appeared to anticipate the success of the Canadian champion, and did not fail to hint very broadly that if Courtney was defeated, he must be in a position to clearly prove that it was not through any fault of his own.

It is of course a matter for Canada to congratulate herself upon, that the championship of the New World for sculling is now in the hands of one of her own sons.

Certainly there is no country that should be more favorable to the development of muscle and powers of endurance than this Dominion.

The excitement in this city yesterday afternoon with reference to the result of the race, as soon as it became known that it was to take place, was indescribable.

Crowds of men surrounded the office of the Chronicle and through the street in front of our bulletin board, devouring with avidity every item of news from the scene of the contest.

After his successful return from the scene of the contest, and after the men had started and intelligence of their progress was received at intervals of every few minutes, the excitement naturally became more intensified, and when at 5.40, the final news of Hanlan's victory was announced, an enthusiastic burst of applause occurred, which marked the gratification caused here by the success of the Canadian champion.

THE 'TARIFF QUESTION.'

The great question of Protection, re-adjustment of the tariff, or incidental Protection, whatever it may be named, having been determined upon by the people of this country in so marked a manner recently at the polls, it would be well that the subject be thoroughly and dispassionately discussed until the meeting of Parliament.

Business men should meet together and consult as to the best course for the Dominion to enter upon, and the advice of the most eminent men of commerce will no doubt be sought before the Government will determine their precise policy.

From day to day, during the period which has elapsed since the general elections, we have carefully placed before our readers in concise form, the comments of the leading English and American journals upon the tariff policy to which the successful party in the late electoral contest stands committed.

In giving publicity to the arguments employed by the press of the leading nation upon each side of the Atlantic, our object has been rather to throw all possible light upon the intricate problem about to be entered into by the people of Canada, than to support one side only of the important trade question, about which so many different opinions are advanced.

It must be borne in mind in computing the value of the press utterances in England and the United States upon the Canadian tariff question, that those countries are not disinterested spectators of our tariff changes.

They see in the National Policy an avowed intention to protect to a certain extent home manufactures, and they know that in proportion as we produce at home, we diminish the volume of our imports.

Especially is this true of the United States, which has long been a slaughter market of Canada for its surplus manufactured goods, but now anticipates such a readjustment of the tariff as will effectually shut out this kind of business.

The American press in consequence is, of course, very dissatisfied therewith. That this view of the matter is not a mere prejudice, is shown in the strong denunciations of the despatches just taken by the people of Canada, and it is not remarkable; but the Americans most assuredly can have no right to complain of the decision arrived at by our electorate.

At the very worst this country will be followed, at the respectable distance it is to be hoped, the example set by the United States in their tariff legislation. It is scarcely probable that the new Parliament will frame a tariff nearly so high as that of the United States, and while their tariff remains so much higher than ours, it is difficult to see how they can have any possible ground of complaint or remonstrance against us. Their own tariff is, of course, framed to meet their own special wants; it may not be the very best that could be devised in the interests of their country, but in the opinion of their leading and representative men, it is so, and they have a perfect right to enjoy that opinion and to shape their tariff legislation in accord with it.

The very same thing may be said of the English tariff, which though differing very materially from that of the United States, has similarly been framed according to the views entertained by the legislators of the land of its actual necessities.

Each of these countries asserts its right to frame a tariff for itself according to the best lights it possesses.

Canada has asserted her right to do the same thing, and in doing so, being a self-governed country, has infringed no right of theirs.

This protection will now have a fair trial soon evident. The action of the National Policy have offered it, and the people have accepted it. It is unquestionable that there is a widespread feeling throughout the country in favor of a change in the fiscal policy of the Dominion, and the result of the late elections shows very conclusively that a readjustment of many items of the tariff is expected.

There is not much doubt that the vital interests of a country are at stake, when a vast majority of the people express a desire for an important change such as they have every right to demand. In all considerations of this matter, it should be distinctly remembered at the outset, that the question is purely and simply one of trade.

The electors have constitutionally asked for a trial of the protective system, or at least for a re-adjustment of the tariff; and being the absolute masters of the situation, they are entitled to and will no doubt be accorded their request.

No upholder of the constitution can properly place any obstacle in the way of a fair trial of the proposed changes, and if the result of the test proves to be as encouraging as its advocates have claimed for it, the country and the electors will have cause to be congratulated upon the course adopted by them.

LORD DUFFERIN'S LAST 'AT HOME.'

There was a very large attendance yesterday afternoon at the 'At Home' held by His Excellency the Governor-General at the Citadel.

Amongst those present were the principal local dignitaries, leading citizens and their families, together with the Admiral and officers of the fleet.

Altogether it was a most brilliant and successful affair, and will long be looked back to with pleasure by those who took part in it.

WE learn that the Quebec Government, actively carrying out the policy of retrenchment, has reduced the expenditure in the Inspectorate of Prisons by \$2,000.

Under the old regime there were three inspectors of Prisons, two of whom were paid with salaries which in the whole amounted to \$5,200.

For the future these officials are reduced in number to two, and their aggregate salaries will be \$3,200.

The Heriot says - "It is expected, also, that a further reduction in the charges of this department will be made in the way of travelling expenses to the extent of at least \$1,000 a year, owing to the smaller number of officials on the road.

The expenditure of a single Inspector last year nearly amounted to that sum. The present officers are Dr. MacIntyre and Mr. Smith; Dr. MacIntyre having been appointed in the place of some of the old incumbents of the office, because it is deemed essential to have a medical man on the Board."
