France to veto Arab measure?

UK takes first step toward Common Market

GENEVA (AP) — Britain has taken the first step toward membership in the prospering Common Market by winning the approval of her partners in the rival European Free Trade Association EFTA.
Diplomats reported that ministers of the EFTA nations are sympathetic to the view that Britain's troubled economy can be cured if she links up with the 200,000,000 potential export customers of the Common Market.
Britain told the EFTA Friday she would seek alignment with the Common Market, presumably under terms that would not harm the economies of Commonwealth countries and EFTA members.
The other members—Sweden, Norway, Denmark, Switzerland, Austria, Portugal and associate member Finland — approved the move in principle.
Edward Heath, No. 2 man in Britain's foreign office, outlined the British stand to EFTA delegates at a meeting here. They drafted a statement to be issued Monday, when Prime Minister Macmillan will formally announce his government's decision to the Commons.
The Common Market members are France, West Germany, Italy, Belgium, The Netherlands and Luxembourg. They are working toward free trade among themselves and a common tariff barrier against the rest of the world.
Though many Britons feel the nation needs Common Market customers to reverse Britain's unfavorable trade balance, Macmillan faces many potential blocks on the issue.
Elements in his own Conservative party oppose joining the market if it means surrender of any British sovereignty.
The Commonwealth countries are opposed if it means losing their special trade privileges with Britain.

UNITED NATIONS AP — France stood pat today in defying any United Nations attempt to interfere in her dispute with Tunisia as the Security Council neared a vote on the Bizerte crisis.
Speculation mounted that France might break her boycott of the debate and use the veto to block an Afro-Asian resolution accusing her of flouting the week-old cease-fire call in Tunisia.
Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld told the council Friday night he had received evidence during his recent trip to Tunisia that France had violated the council's cease-fire and assumed functions on Tunisian soil "normally reserved to a sovereign state."
U.S. Ambassador Adlai Stevenson conferred for 50 minutes in Paris Friday with President de Gaulle on the Bizerte crisis which has put a strain on the three-way relationship between the United States, France and Tunisia.
Stevenson, chief of the U.S. delegation to the UN, told reporters later he hoped "there will be a mutually satisfactory resolution to this unfortunate affair."
Tunisia wants the United States to make good on its pronouncements of friendship to newly independent nations and back Tunisia's demands that France pull out of her big air base at Bizerte.
The United States has been reluctant to offend de Gaulle at a time when Western unity is vital in dealing with Soviet demands on Berlin.
France has made clear it will not be bound by any decision the Security Council makes on Bizerte.
The de Gaulle government issued a statement in Paris Friday charging Tunisia with trying to obtain through UN intervention what she had failed to get by force after four days of bloody fighting in Bizerte.
Before Friday's council session, Armand Berard, French delegation chief, announced he would not take part in debate on Tunisia. Berard said France was ready to discuss cease-fire details with Tunisia at any time but that Tunisia had failed to agree to such talks.
Berard stayed away from the council chamber, but his deputy, Pierre Millet, showed up and sat silently in his place.
SPARKS SPECULATION
A French delegation spokesman told a reporter "we will vote if necessary," sparking speculation that France might use the veto if it need be to knock down the resolution put in by the United Arab Republic, Liberia and Ceylon.

Gloomy picture

France standing alone

PARIS (AP) — President de Gaulle's France stood increasingly alone today with her long-time North African problems apparently in worse shape than before.
Talks aimed at bringing peace to troubled Algeria, where she has been at war with nationalist rebels for nearly seven years, broke down again over the issue of who should control the oil-rich Sahara—France or an independent Algeria. There was no indication when the talks would be resumed.
Further east, in Tunisia, French paratroopers, ranging out from their base, still held the city of Bizerte against bitter Tunisian opposition.
Across the ocean, the United Nations Security Council was discussing possible further action after France had ignored the council's earlier demand that French troops be pulled back to their original positions inside the base.
The de Gaulle government's attitude is that the Bizerte affair concerns France and Tunisia alone and only they can settle it. The French see Tunisia's new appeal to the Security Council as an attempt to internationalize what they regard as a purely bilateral affair.
BREAK TEMPORARY?
Although suspension of the Algerian peace talks at Lugin, near Lake Geneva, is officially described as only temporary, it has some of the look of a more lasting break.
France is unlikely to come around to recognizing Algerian sovereignty over the Sahara, and the Algerians say they won't talk peace again until she does.
The one bright gleam in a gloomy picture was that both sides agreed some kind of undercover contacts would be maintained.
Louis Joxe, French minister for Algerian affairs and de Gaulle's chief negotiator with the Algerian nationalists, returned to Paris Friday night.

Fallout shelter program planned by Lennoxville

Plans are now underway for a public radiation fallout shelter program in Lennoxville.

Mayor Ernest Gilbey said the project will be discussed at a meeting of Council on Aug. 7.

The proposed shelter program would be large enough to provide a measure of protection for all of the town's 5,000 citizens, the Mayor said.

"Until now we have been waiting for Sherbrooke to give us leadership in matters of civil defence," Mayor Gilbey said. "However, with the world situation the way it is today we can afford to wait no longer."

The Mayor agreed with Mayor Armand Nadeau of Sherbrooke in his claim that the blame for the present state of unpreparedness rests mainly with Ottawa.

But he said that the current situation is of such gravity that if help and leadership are not forthcoming from Ottawa we should take matters into our own hands and do something ourselves.

Mayor Gilbey said that at present the town of Lennoxville has no facilities whatsoever to cope with a nuclear emergency.

He deplored the apathy of people who insist that the Eastern Townships will never be attacked: "Such an attack definitely could come and what's more it could come in a matter of hours."

Asked to assess the situation as far as civil defence in Canada is concerned, Mayor Gilbey replied: "We have reached a point where it is embarrassing to say the least. The only way the situation can be corrected is to jolt them out of their complacency."

Bill cutting tourist \$'s passed by US Senate

OTTAWA (CP) — Subject to dollars have been flowing into (final congressional approval, Canada at a rate which may exceed last year's record spending of \$371,000,000. Boat swamps nuns drown

DANVILLE, Vt. (AP) — Two Catholic nuns drowned Friday when a small boat capsized and sank in Joe's Pond.

The dead were Sister St. Joseph, 69, of Montreal, and Sister St. Pauline, 57, a teacher at Mount St. Joseph's School, St. Johnsbury, Vt.

Two other nuns, also members of the Order of Sisters of the Congregation of Notre Dame, were rescued but taken to hospital. St. Johnsbury with shock. They were Sister St. Raymond of Chicago and Sister St. Edmund, a teacher at Mount St. Joseph's.

The four nuns were in a boat with Mr. and Mrs. John Prevost of West Danville. Sister St. Raymond is Prevost's sister.

Sawyerville's 'independent man' is building a fallout shelter

Armond McBurney is an independent man—he thinks for himself, you might say.
He hates living in the city. He insists his racial origin is Canadian, not Scottish-Irish—to the distraction of the census takers.
And he is building his own fallout shelter.

It's quite a structure. When finished this fall, it will be completely concrete-enclosed, 28 feet long, 12 feet wide and eight feet high.

The ceiling will be a full nine inches thick, reinforced with two layers of steel cable. "Unless a blast hits us almost direct, it'll be hard to shake this," declares Mr. McBurney.

He doesn't underestimate the possibility of having to use it either.

"A nuclear attack is more than a possibility," he says, choosing his words with care. "In my opinion, it's a distinct probability. I'm no warmonger, but I'd say that there is almost a one in three chance of it happening."

"All someone has to do is press the button."

an eventuality, Sherbrooke is situated very neatly between two prime nuclear targets—the Strategic Air Command Base at Plattsburg and the metropolis of Montreal.

Mr. McBurney has put in several years of work on his shelter. Digging the excavation and laying the concrete have been long and arduous tasks.

But he expects things to move faster now—if only because he plans to spend more time at it. The tension in the world today worries him.

"We're living in mighty perilous times," he says. "If you're not prepared, and things break, then you've had it."

Armond McBurney plans to be prepared. Well prepared. His shelter will have its own water supply piped underground from one of several wells near the McBurney home.

Power will be supplied by a diesel generator, thus removing any dependence on the town power lines, which could be knocked out. The structure will also be outfitted with a heating system, for possible winter use.

Food and clothing will be stocked in the shelter. A geiger counter to measure radiation will also be included in the basic supplies.

Most important, the shelter will be in contact with the outside world. This phase of things is right up Mr. McBurney's alley—he is an electronics technician, repairing radios and television sets for a living.

What's more, he is a ham radio operator of 22 years' standing so he will be able to transmit messages as well as receive the news—good or bad—from the outside world.

Building the fallout shelter was not just an eccentric idea. It's more a case of old habits.

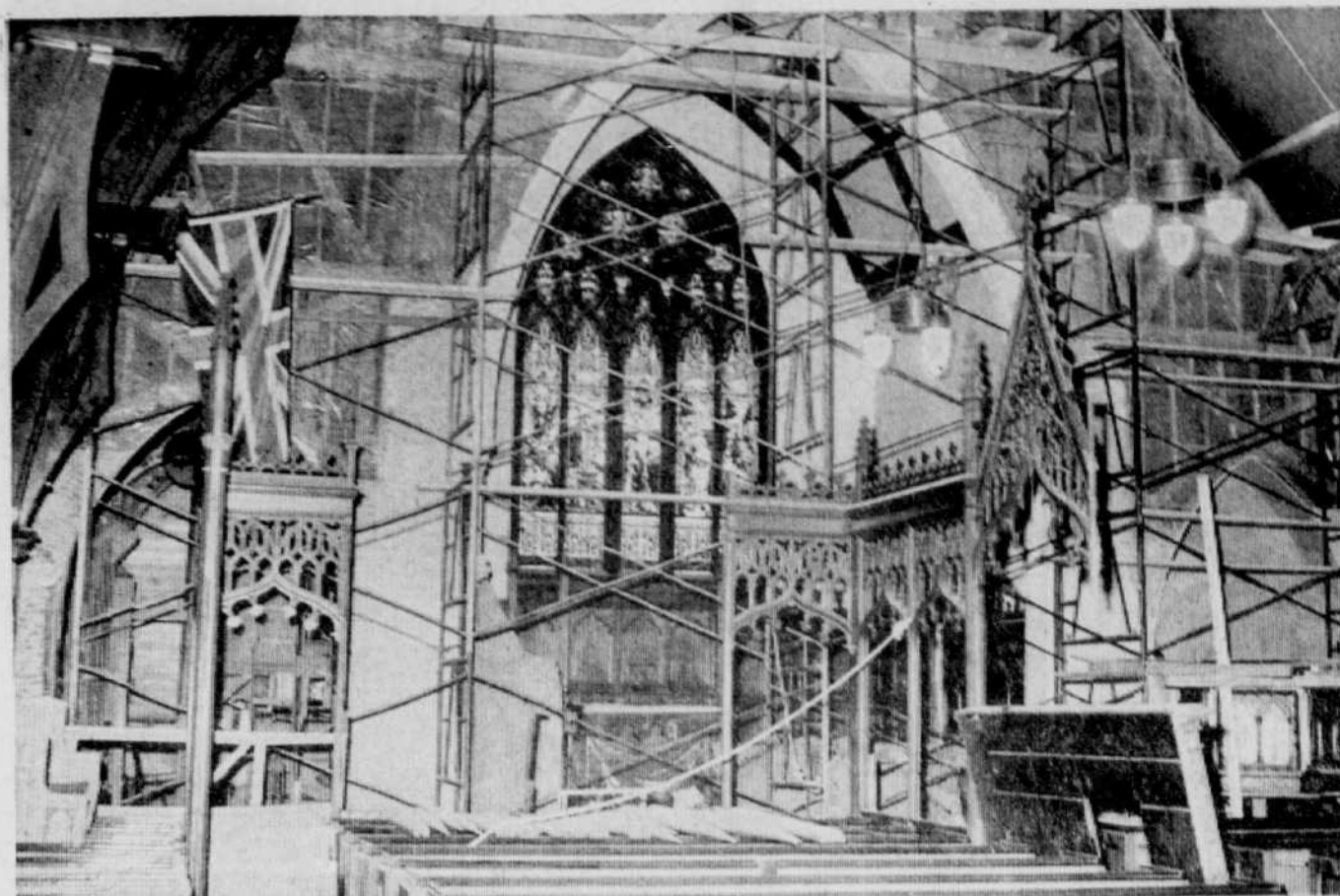

90-year-old Anglican Church in Waterloo undergoes its first major repair program

WATERLOO— (Special) — St. Luke's Anglican Church is faced with major repairs, which have been accumulating over a period of many years. The brick building was completed in 1870 and has stood time with only minor repairs until the present.

Now experts have been consulted and discovered that age has made its mark. The heavy slate roof is broken in some places and its weight is making the building sag. This covering will be probably replaced with black asbestos shingles. The slate has to be removed. The chimneys have to be repaired. These run from the ground up and are unusual in structure. They support the beams of the church.

Architects say St. Luke's is extremely well built and unique in this feature of a central chimney supporting the main arch of the chancel. This chimney divides at the top of the arch and comes down each side, straight to the ground. It has a double flue.

Time and the heavy weight of the roof has caused the building to sag a little and separate from these center chimneys. Water has seeped in and spoiled the plaster used in decorating the walls. The plaster in the chancel has been carefully removed and redecorating has been arranged for. The corner buttresses and outside brick require repair. The flooring is yet to be planned for.

Visible cracks have allowed

water to leak in around the tower. There is a theory that this may have been gradually worsening since the summer of 1925, when lightning struck St. Luke's steeple and set it on fire.

A committee has been formed with honorary chairman, Charles Slack. Tenny Hall is chairman, assisted by Stanley Copping.

Work is progressing satisfactorily. Tom Morgan and his sons, John and Tony are doing the brick work. Duttily from Granby has commenced

the plastering. Fred Marsh is the contractor.

Rev. G. L. Norris, rector of St. Luke's has postponed his holidays in order to supervise and keep in close touch with the work. It is estimated that the probable cost of this work will be in the vicinity of \$25,000.

No services are being held in St. Luke's. Sunday, July 16th, morning service was at Christ Church, Frost Village July 23 at St. John the Divine, Warden and July 30 at South Stukely.

local people whom you have met as they are often interesting subjects.

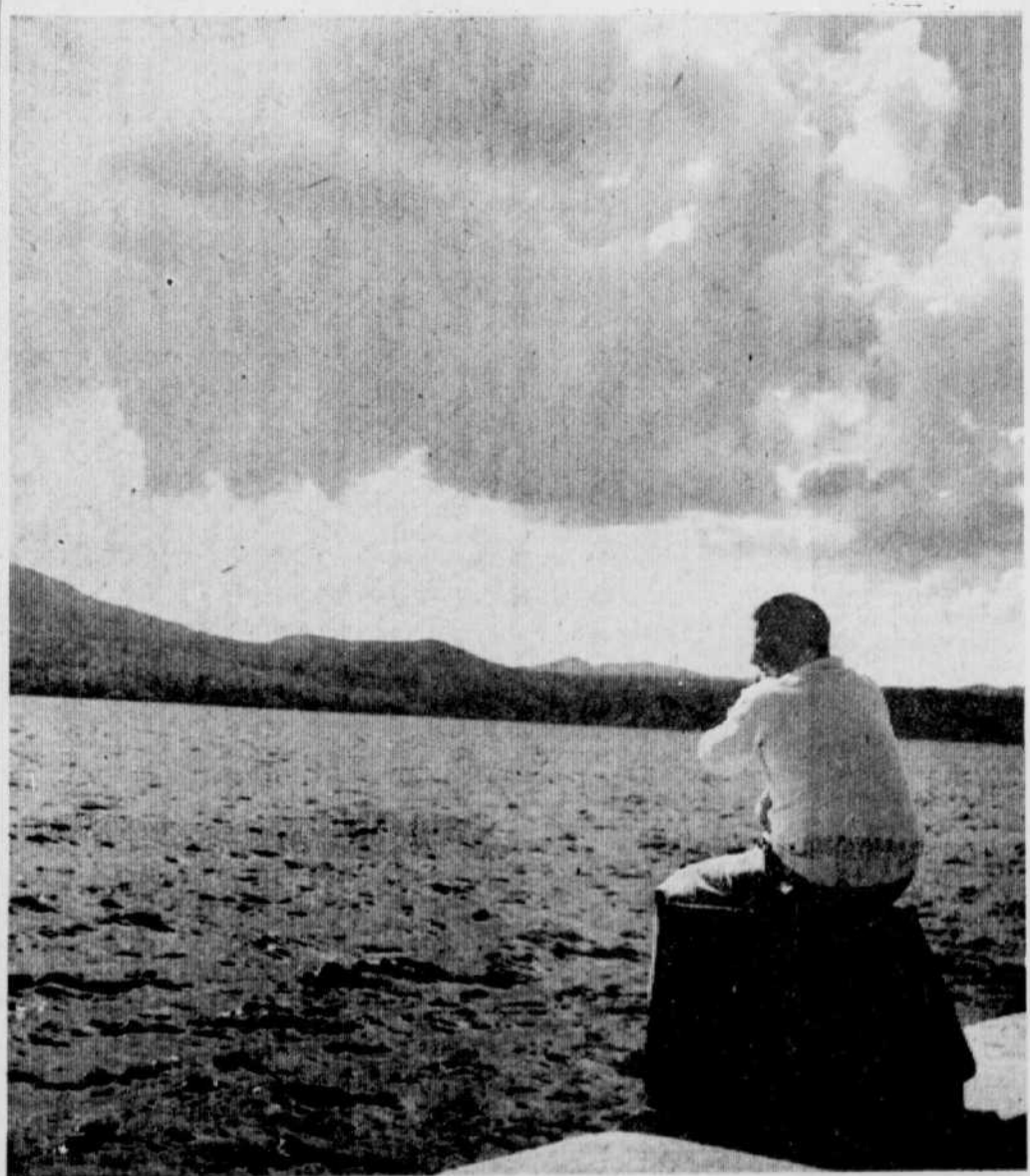
Be liberal with your close-ups. They will give you the chance to relive your summer activities when you see the film next winter.

In good company

A week of world tension has prompted at least one Eastern Townships mayor to seek protection for his community against possible hazards of radiation fallout.

Mayor Ernest Gilbey of Lennoxville assessed civil defence in his town, found it non-existent and "embarrassing" and set about to remedy the situation.

He announces, in a story on Page One in today's Record, that he will propose a public shelter program at the August 6 meeting of Lennoxville Council.

Mayor Gilbey should be congratulated and encouraged to the utmost. But no doubt there are many who will call his proposals hasty, premature and unwarranted.

But let the critics heed the words

of national and international leaders:

Prime Minister Diefenbaker, speaking at Kitchener, Ontario this week: Some people apparently think to build shelters is to encourage war or at least to admit its inevitability. But such an idea is untenable. It is unreasonable to think that if we just sit and do nothing war will be prevented. Canadians must accept the need for civil defence, particularly shelters.

President Kennedy, in his radio and television report last week: Civilians out of the immediate blast area can be saved and protected from fallout if they can be warned to take shelter and if that shelter is available.

Mayor Gilbey is in good company both in his concern over the critical situation of the world today and in the measures he plans because of it.

An impulsive action

The bank manager at Arundel, Que., who shot and killed an armed bandit Thursday is to be commended on his personal bravery.

But should his action be imitated by others?

According to press reports the bank manager, Charles C. Farran, fired on five bandits with a shotgun as they escaped from his branch with \$5,700 from the cash drawers.

Mr. Farran ran upstairs to get his gun as soon as he saw the bandits entering the bank. They fired at him as he did so.

Then he waited patiently until the

five emerged from the bank and got back into their parked getaway truck.

He fired on them from a distance of 20 feet hitting one of them.

Mr. Farran, a war veteran, was skilled in the use of firearms and there was little chance of his shots going astray. But in spite of this his impulsive action posed a threat to innocent passers-by.

The bandits, confused by the gunfire, sprayed a nearby gas station and several parked cars with bullets. A small crowd had gathered near the station but fortunately no one was hit.

East Angus band festival

Everyone loves a parade, and the stirring band music that goes with it.

For the next two days, residents of East Angus, and visitors to the pulp and paper town, will be given ample opportunity to enjoy the color and excitement of both.

The East Angus Festival, with 16 bands from the Eastern Townships area participating opens tonight. A full program of expert band music is planned, most of it for tomorrow afternoon, at East Angus' spanking new bandstand.

In addition to the music and the marching, there will be a "key to the town" presentation tonight, and the crowning of the band festival queen.

It is always encouraging to see gath-

erings of this kind, especially one of such magnitude. The hundreds of people who make up the bands are not professionals, but band-happy amateurs in the sense that while many of them are expert instrumentalists, they play for pleasure and recreation and not to earn a living.

Part of the pleasure they derive from their hobby is the strong "esprit de corps" peculiar to brass band groups; a spirit which will pervade all of East Angus today and tomorrow.

For helping to nurture this spirit, and the love of making music that it accompanies, the organizers of the East Angus festival are to be congratulated, and the visiting bandmen and women heartily welcomed.

Confident of heading New Party

OTTAWA (CP)—Hazen Argue has never been defeated in a personal vote—and he says he doesn't expect to be beaten in the balloting for the New Party leadership next week.

The 40-year-old national CCF leader got set to give CCF Premier T. C. (Tommy) Douglas the battle of his life.

As preparations are made for the week-long New Party founding convention to be attended by some 2,000 delegates, all signs point to a tough Argue-Douglas contest with few—if any—holds barred.

From the political rostrum Mr. Argue is a powerful orator who uses words as sledgehammer blows that can bruise opponents and elate supporters.

He matches his braving style against the nimble oratory of Tommy Douglas, one of Canada's best public speakers, in what observers expect to be a fight that will dominate the New Party's birth.

Mr. Argue will also be matching his youth and vigor as well as his 16-year parliamentary record against that of the 58-year-old prairie premier who left national politics in 1944 to lead the Saskatchewan CCF into provincial power.

If Mr. Argue chooses, the big fight may also revolve around a long-simmering issue of party brass versus the grass roots.

It is no secret that top CCF officers and many labor leaders support Mr. Douglas, while Mr. Argue may choose to stress in-

chinery dealer until the depression knocked the West for a loop.

After two years in a co-operative store, young Hazen headed off to the University of Saskatchewan on money from a bumper crop from the family farm. He graduated in 1944 with a degree in economics.

MP SINCE 1945

A few months later, he was nominated as CCF candidate for Wood Mountain. In the 1945 general election, he went to Ottawa along with 31 other CCF MPs. In the five elections since then, he has been returned to Ottawa—emerging unscathed as the lone prairie opposition MP after the Progressive Conservative election sweep of 1958.

The 1958 election saw the CCF bloc in the Commons reduced to eight MPs—and Hazen Argue, the party's stormy farm critic, was chosen as House leader.

Later, he defied party brass and won a single-handed victory in his fight to be named national leader at the party's 1960 convention in Regina.

Top party officials wanted to let the title—held by M. J. Coldwell, who had retired from politics after his personal defeat in the 1958 election—remain open until the CCF had formally entered into its compact with the New Party.

Mr. Argue disputed this approach. And he won, becoming national leader of a party that was preparing to submerge its existence in a new alliance with labor, farmers and other liberal-minded people.

From that point on, Mr. Argue was in the New Party leadership fight, come what may.

He has made the most of his role as CCF leader in laying the groundwork for his bid for the New Party leadership, contending he has shown his abilities in the House of Commons in the last three years.

As a farmer who still farms, he argues he would be an ideal man to weld eastern labor and western farmers into a united political party. Lately, he has also been directing his attention to ranch—speaking Quebec, Lynda, 14, Gregory, 11, Susan, 7, and Dawn, 5.

OTTAWA — The New Party founding convention is scheduled to get under way sharply at 10 a.m. on Monday, starting five days of six sessions in the livestock arena that functions as a part time national auditorium.

Second in importance only to the fact of the New Party itself is the question of who will lead it. Will the New Party's choice for prime minister be Premier Tommy Douglas of Saskatchewan? Or CCF leader Hazen Argue?

The smart money says Douglas — but the Argue supporters have been raising a lot of dust with charges that their man is not being given a fair shake by what they call the pro-Douglas crowd that organized the convention. They pin the blame squarely on Stanley Knowles, Claude Jodoin, David Lewis and William Mahoney.

Knowles is vice president of the CCF, executive vice president of the Canadian Labor Congress, and chairman of the national committee for the New Party.

Jodoin is president of the CLC, the country's biggest labor organization that is asking all its local unions to affiliate with and support the New Party with votes, dollars and proselytism.

David Lewis is national president of the CCF. Mahoney is Canadian director of the United Steel Workers of America.

These men want Douglas. They want him so badly that two of them, Knowles and Lewis, tried to block Argue's election as CCF leader at last year's CCF convention at Regina. They wanted to limit Argue to leadership of the CCF parliamentary group, presumably to minimize his prestige when he contested the New Party leadership.

The program they have arranged for the New Party convention makes no provision for Argue to report to the convention as CCF leader on his year in office. He is scheduled to speak for 15 minutes Wednesday evening, prior to the Thursday noon voting, but he will be speaking as a candidate for the New Party leadership. He is scheduled to speak Friday morning, after the official birth of the New Party and after the balloting for leader. But he will then be a former CCF leader reporting on a defunct political party.

Knowles' answer is that this convention isn't a CCF convention, and that every effort is being made to avoid giving either Argue or Douglas any advantage.

On Monday, for example, the national committee will occupy the platform in the convention hall. Argue and Douglas are members of that committee. Each will be seated an equal distance from the rostrum—one to the right of Chairman Knowles, the other to his left.

But if 10 o'clock arrives and the chair reserved for Argue is empty, it won't mean the

CCF leader's foes have spirited him away. Only that he'll be making a theatrical entrance as soon as the opening hubbub has quieted. He did this at Regina, and the tactic will bear repetition. Disruption of the convention by a tremendously noisy and enthusiastic ovation would be a demonstration of support and strength that could swing some delegates from the "undecided" category to the "I'm for Argue" group.

Douglas could use this tactic too, but not without risk. For him to get less applause than Argue would be worse than for him to sit quietly on the platform during an accolade for his opponent.

French—his car, carrying the UN flag was stopped and searched by soldiers — and there was no invitation to talk the problem over with French officials.

The upshot? The UN Security Council was called into session for Friday afternoon as Asian and African nations pressed the council to back Tunisia's demand that France pull all her troops out of Tunisia and give up her big Bizerte naval and air base.

BRITISH HIT

Prime Minister Macmillan's Conservative government—determined to check financial ills and strengthen the pound—handed Britons a stiff dose of economic austerity.

A 10-per-cent increase in customs and excise duties and in the sales tax on many items means a higher price to consumers for such things as cigarettes and tobacco, whisky, gin and beer, television and radio sets, sugar, tea and matches. The bank rate also was increased.

International reaction was considerable but Finance Minister Fleming of Canada said the so-called "crisis budget" would have no effect on the Canadian economy.

The Labor opposition in the British Commons ripped into Macmillan and his government, the prime minister being called a "cheat" for his election slogan in 1959 that Britain "never had it so good."

But a Labor censure motion was defeated 346 to 238, with voting strictly along party lines.

CUBAN CAPERS

It was getting to be an old story about commandeered Cuban planes landing in the U.S., but last Monday the process was reversed — a U.S. airliner with 38 people aboard was forced to fly to Havana.

The passengers and crew were returned to the United States but Premier Castro refused to give up the plane—while the U.S. holds some Cuban planes — and another quarrel between the two countries arose.

Meanwhile, a Cuban-born Miami waiter was named as the man who hijacked the plane—he was charged in absentia with kidnapping and other crimes.

CASTRO SPEAKS

Celebrating the anniversary of his 26th of July movement, Premier Castro promised Cuba would achieve socialism through a single party.

Star of the celebrations—apart from the bearded premier himself — was Russia's Yuri Gagarin, the world's first spaceman who is on a triumphant world tour. An air show featured Soviet-built MIG jets, the first confirmation of rumors they had arrived in Cuba.

Gagarin is scheduled to arrive in Nova Scotia next week as the guest of industrialist Cyrus Eaton.

EICHMANN RESTS

Adolf Eichmann's defence and the Israeli prosecution rested their cases, and the Jerusalem court recessed Tuesday until Aug. 3 to give both sides time to prepare final arguments.

The recess came 15 weeks after the former Nazi colonel went on trial for complicity in the deaths of millions of Jews during the Nazi regime.

CANADIAN BRIEFS

Rain came to parts of the Prairies but it was too late to help much of the drought-stricken grain crop. . . . Adding to the woes of Wilcox, Sask., was a fire Monday that destroyed three elevators, four annexes and other property.

Later in the week, firefighters waged a desperate battle in Newfoundland to save the Bonavista Bay logging-fishing village of Indian Bay from a forest fire. Many women and children were evacuated. . . . Louis J. Rasminsky, 53, was named new governor of the Bank of Canada, succeeding James E. Coyne who resigned during a feud with the government. Rasminsky has been deputy director for 6 1/2 years.

The stock market appeared on the road to recovery this week after the drop of the last fortnight.

The industrial index rose more than six points on the week, but volume remained modest. A bright aspect was the setting of a half-dozen or so new highs on the base metals index.

The metals index broke through the "200" mark on Thursday and never looked back. The pace was set by Ventures, Falconbridge and McIntyre Porcupine.

Merger rumors concerning these three ran through Bay Street on Thursday. Despite the announcement by Ventures that there are no current merger plans in the air, all three stocks turned over a large number of shares and prices rose. Ventures traded more than 45,000 shares on the week and rose a hefty seven points.

Groups as coppers, uranums and golds also fared well.

The industrial market's advance was slow but sure. Pacesetting groups proved to be steels, utilities and refining oils and pipe lines.

STEELS ADVANCE

In the steels, Steel Company of Canada and Canadian Vickers both advanced a point or more. Dominion Foundries and Steel also gained more than a point on the week and reached a new high of 61 in moderately heavy trading.

Gains in the utilities were large but confined to selected issues. CPR, Gatteau Power, Northern Ontario Natural Gas and BC Power all jumped 1/4 more.

Interprovincial Pipe Line and Alberta Gas Trunk both gained close to two points in the refining oils.

In the papers, Abitibi, Great Lakes was ahead more than a point.

Western oils moved in a narrow range.

Index changes at Toronto: Industrials up 6.06 to 586.31; golds up 2.44 to 87.97; base metals up 5.42 to 203.80 and western oils up .58 to 91.44.

Index changes at Montreal: Banks up .44 to 65.83; utilities up .1 to 144.2; industrials up .6 to 320.8; papers up 3.2 to 498.3 and golds up .59 to 84.0.

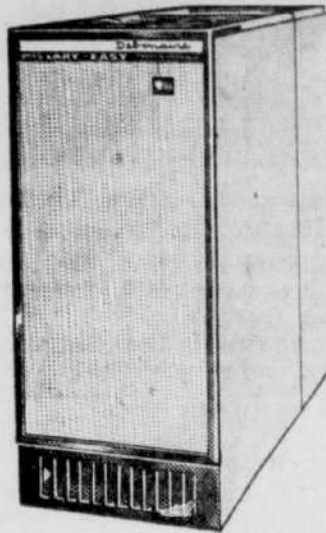

Close to 300,000 Canadian boys and girls are expected to go to camp this summer and as they enter nature's unspoiled domain they will find an emphasis on organization and purposeful activity.

More than ever before camps are going in for detailed and elaborate programs, administered by trained staffs, and many of them now are affiliated with camping associations that exist in six provinces.

Most camping authorities queried in a cross-Canada survey by The Canadian Press seem to feel that the trend to more organized camp life is a good thing.

However, the question has arisen—at least in the West—as to whether the youngsters are not getting a bit pampered in the process.

Grant McKeen, an Edmonton YMCA official, says eastern camps have become too "modern" with running water cabins, extravagant program equipment and specialized leaders.

"We still rough it more in the West," he says.

LEAVE CAKE AT HOME

In Vancouver, Boy Scout commissioner Fred Huish has asked parents not to load junior down with "chocolate cake and extra woolies when he goes to camp."

The case for the defence is put forward by Gerry Wright of the YMCA in Montreal. He says: "camping has gone modern, but living has gone modern too."

"Our youngsters go home to a modern world where the rugged woodsmanship of a Redskin would hardly serve much purpose. On the other hand, individual initiative, co-operative spirit, resourcefulness, emotional stability and sound values can provide mighty weapons."

On the average, the camps for the mentally retarded have one

guideposts to a successful and satisfying life in a modern city. "Comfortable" or "rugged," organized children's camps dot the Canadian landscape from coast to coast this summer. The Quebec Camping Association estimates the total number at about 1,500, with 850 of them in Ontario and 200 in Quebec.

They are operated by churches, service clubs, the YMCA and other private organizations, usually taking their young charges in two-week shifts, and the general price range is from \$5 to \$50 a week.

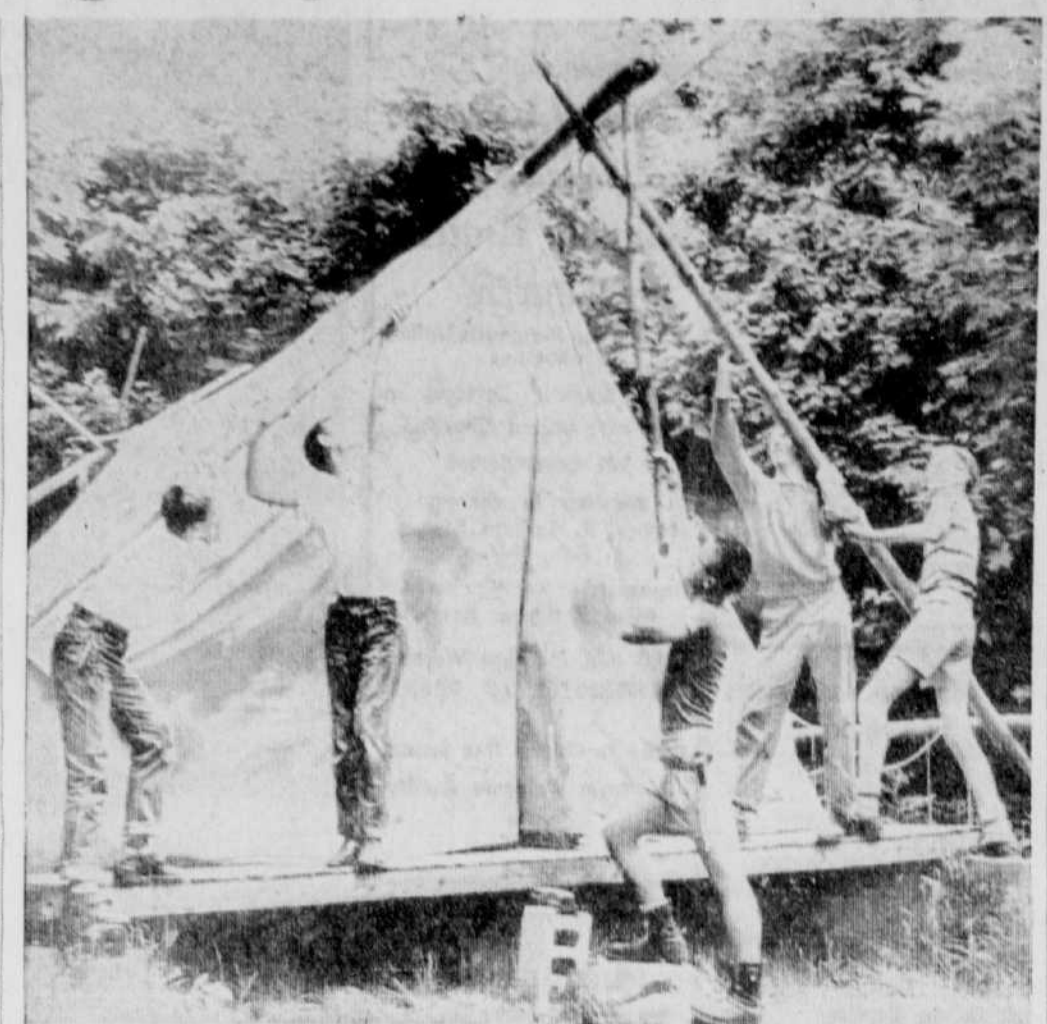
AID POORER CHILDREN
Many cater to children from families in lower-income groups and the camp sponsors either pick up the entire tab or ask only that parents pay what they can.

Precise camp-attendance figures are unavailable because there are no provincial camping associations in Newfoundland, Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick and Saskatchewan and many camps in the other provinces are unaffiliated.

Official estimates of what total camp attendance will be in the six "organized" provinces this summer, at both affiliated and unaffiliated camps, are: Nova Scotia, 5,000; Quebec, 90,000; Ontario, 105,000; Manitoba, 30,000; Alberta, 35,000; British Columbia, 20,000. A salutary development in recent years is the increasing number of opportunities for physically handicapped and mentally retarded children to enjoy camp life.

CAREFUL SUPERVISION
Camps for children who are retarded, crippled or diabetic now exist in nearly every province. They are more closely supervised than other camps, but the principle is followed of putting as many normal activities into the program as possible.

On the average, the camps for the mentally retarded have one

supervisor for every two children and those for physically handicapped one for every five, whereas the normal is one for every 20 to 40 depending on the age of the youngsters to be supervised.

In two of the provinces that have no camping associations, Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick, camping activity is nevertheless widespread.

There are about 80 camps in Prince Edward Island and 3,000 children are expected to attend them this summer. The emphasis is strongly on water sports and hiking.

MANY N.B. CAMPS
There are scores of camps in New Brunswick, mostly on rivers and lakes, but camping authorities in that province declined to estimate the total number.

At least 10,000 children are expected to attend them.

Newfoundland has a number of camps operated or leased by churches, mostly for underprivileged children, and the total expected attendance is unofficially estimated at 1,000.

Among the "organized" provinces British Columbia is the most recent addition to the ranks. The British Columbia as-

sociation says its program is "just getting off the ground" and "it will be years before we march like Ontario, for instance."

One of the country's most unusual camps is the dollar-a-day Camp de L'Amitie (Friendship Camp) on the south shore of the Ottawa River, 30 miles west of Montreal, where 60 to 70 boys—most of them from immigrant families—spend two weeks together in a miniature melting pot. It is run by the New Canadians' service bureau of the Montreal Catholic school commission.

SPONSOR DAY CAMP
Another experiment in camping got under way in southern Vancouver Island. The Victoria YWCA is sponsoring a day camp at Saxe Point, five miles outside the city, for youngsters eight to 11 years old.

Too young to be away from home over night for the normal two-week camping period, the youngsters are taken to the camp daily by bus and taught to identify trees and birds, build bird-houses and tie knots.

An increasing number of camps are specializing in music, drama or other arts. An example is the fine arts camp in Banff, Alta., where children from five to 15 can take classes in ballet, drama, French, painting and singing. It is sponsored by the Banff School of Fine Arts.

Alberta is more noted, however, for the ruggedness of its camp life, which probably is not surpassed anywhere else in the country.

At the province's oldest camp, Keewatin in the Rockies west of Edmonton, boys from nine to 16 are taught the art of survival in the wilderness.

For boys from 15 to 19 the camp stages hikes through the mountains from Jasper and also week-long "voyageur" canoe trips from Rocky Mountain House to Edmonton along the North Saskatchewan river.

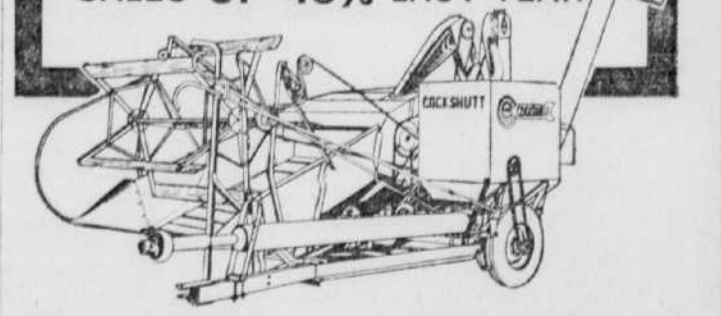

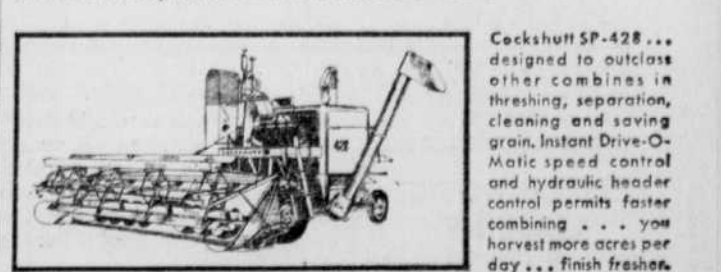

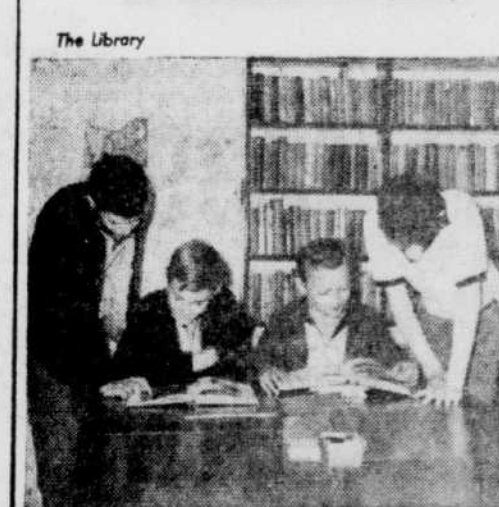

"Pop" by the bag
"A bag of orange pop please." Sounds strange, but bags are indeed being used to package soft drinks this summer.
A new drink called Calypso comes sealed in a sturdy polythene pouch with a sharp drinking straw used to pierce the plastic and sip the beverage. The bag of orange can be comfortably held in the palm of the hand for drinking and it will sit up nicely on a table without spilling.
This revolutionary new package is designed to put an end to the problem of returning "empties" or disposing of cans. The bags can be tossed away like waste paper. There's no danger from broken bottles and a carton of pop-in-a-bag weighs a fraction of the equivalent in bottled drinks.
In the home refrigerator, bags of soft drinks take up little space. They can be frozen as popsicles or packed frozen with a picnic lunch to cool the food and provide cold beverage when thawed.
The manufacturer even suggests popping a Calypso drink in a pocket for refreshment on a summer's walk. A hip pocket should be safe for a man weighing less than 240 pounds. That's the pressure the bag is claimed to withstand without bursting!

Here is part of a long letter from a genuinely worried mother: "I wonder if you can help with an ever-increasing problem we are having with our 10-year-old son? He rebels at my 'bossing' him but he is most irresponsible and I do not know how to help him."

"He wants to do well at school, music, sports etc., but lacks the willpower to make the necessary effort. He does his studying and practising in a rush at the last moment."

"He fights, with tongue and fists, my efforts to keep him clean and tidy."
"At heart he is a good boy and wants to please us. We are really worried about these temper outbursts and his defiance of us."

HARD ON BROTHERS
"Also these scenes are very hard on the two younger boys and they are trying similar behavior. He is very bossy, critical and rough with them. Could this be jealousy?"

This letter describes a situation that is found in many families. The basic problem is the growing independence of the 10-year-old, a perfectly normal and healthy development.

But this young man is struggling for independence without the simple basic skills for handling it. Learning little lessons in responsibility starts early in life, but he lacks this experience as mother has done the managing for him.

He needs help, but the kind of help that places more responsibility on him, helps to develop his ability to handle his affairs and his self-confidence.

A knack with words but no plot

MOTHERS AND DAUGHTERS by Evan Hunter. . . MUSSON BOOK COMPANY LTD. . . \$5.95, 605 pp.

It seems rather incongruous that a book about mothers and daughters should end with a father saying, "Eat your potatoes, son."

Actually I found a great deal, if not of incongruity, at least of frustration, in this book. Shorn of its verbiage, it is nothing but a "slice-of-life" story. And never being a devotee of this type of short story, it is perhaps hardly to be expected that I would enjoy a "slice-of-life" padded into a 605-page tome.

Granted that Evan Hunter has a knack with words; even he has to hang his words on some semblance of plot to keep them from becoming monotonous. And probe as I have done, I can't find even the rib-cage of a plot. For a time I felt there must be some mother-daughter symbolism hidden somewhere in this vast morass of words, but at the end, when a callow seventeen-year-old step-daughter marries a rather precious character twice her age, I gave up trying to find out where the author was heading and why.

However because of its lack of plot, and consequently its lack of rhyme or reason, I still would not want to give the impression that this is a poor book. In many ways it is an absorbing, interesting and vastly readable book. For those who lived through the forties and fifties it will have the charm of reminiscence. For those who like patently uninhibited characters, it will prove satisfyingly shocking. The book has in fact all the ingredients of a best seller, it



may in truth become a best seller, but in this reviewer's opinion that still won't make it an important book. Evan Hunter, I believe planned an important book—but it didn't quite come off.

Perhaps it was because his women, Gillian the actress, Amanda who wanted to be a composer, Julia the matron and Kate the child, were not strong enough vessels for the task he set them. Whatever the reason, although MOTHERS AND DAUGHTERS does

provide the promised panorama of American life in our times, although it does tell the story of four different women seeking happiness and fulfillment as women, it still never becomes more than a rather unpretty "slice-of-life."

Perhaps Evan Hunter's verbiage got in the way of his purpose, whatever happened, this book is a good deal less than its concept promised it to be.

Canadian problems revealed

SOCIAL PURPOSE FOR CANADA edited by Michael Oliver, University of Toronto Press, 472 pp.

This book, as the editor explains in the preface, is an attempt to evaluate the sort of society that is evolving in Canada. He maintains that Canadians are being lulled into accepting a glitter of prosperity which covers "a reality of purposelessness, mediocrity, and inequity." He points out that works of social criticism have been rare in Canada since the 1930's and the time seemed ripe for a new venture.

The book attempts to solve the problems raised in the preface and is quite successful in so doing. The study is divided into four parts, moral issues, social problems, the economy, and politics.

Contributors to the study included eminent Canadian economists, professors, and sociologists.

The various essays point out many of the problems which face Canada and present some possible solutions. Many of the articles point out difficulties which arise because of the division of power between the federal and provincial governments.

Inequalities in educational opportunities, old age security, and the fallacies of democracy are all exposed in this penetrating and well written study of Canada. John S. Morgan's chapter on Social Welfare Services is just one example of clear thinking in a general political and economic fog.

He points out the veterans are the best taken care of and the only group in Canada who get really adequate help from the government. However, he adds that in the case of the veterans it is too adequate. Numerous hospitals and rehabilitation centres are available to veterans but closed to everyone else. While the number of veterans steadily decreases, the number of Canadians in need of this type of benefit increases. Mr. Morgan proposes that the Department of Veterans Affairs should be wound up and its jurisdiction absorbed in a new Department of National Welfare.

The people who contributed to this book are obviously not out to change Canada overnight. The suggestions they make will probably not be adopted and they are quite aware of this fact.

Whether or not any concrete action is taken as a result of this book, the facts are there. The writers who contributed to it leave the final solution up to the government and up to people sufficiently interested in their country. Social Purpose For Canada has, however, done much of the groundwork for them.

VAN NOSTRAND POCKET ATLAS OF THE WORLD — D. VAN NOSTRAND CO. — 98c — 240 pp.

In the publisher's preface to this attractive pocket book it is pointed out that although pocket atlases have been available for some time, this is the first time they have been more than a mere collection of maps.

And certainly this book is more.

It has an index of fifty pages — which alone should give some idea of its great scope. It has full-color ver-

sions of the flags of all independent states in the world and in many cases also provides the coats of arms.

It contains "statistics and information on population, mineral assets, means of transportation, temperature, rainfall and countless other geographic subjects, all in addition to its expected quota of maps."

This book should prove a gold mine of information to the armchair traveller, the student and the actual globe trotter.

Austria coins her culture

Following a precedent set before the Second World War, Austria, in 1955, again began issuing its commendable series of silver pieces, honoring various cultural aspects of the nation.

This latest series of commemorative coins are Austria's first silver pieces since 1938. All are 25 schilling pieces, 30mm in size, except the 1959 which was a 50 schilling piece, and have identical designs on the reverse. "Republik Österreich" with individual shields for each of the nine provinces. Every facet of national endeavor is being covered on the obverse.

The most recent, 1960, com-

an in native garb, placing their ballots in an urn on a pedestal atop the Carinthian shield, encircled by the words, translated, "Carinthian Plebiscite" and "1920-1960."

The 1959 piece portrays Andreas Hofer, the Tirolese patriot who fought for five years to keep Tirol from becoming a Bavarian province. The previous year, 1958, pictures Dr. Carl Auer von Welsbach, the inorganic chemist, who developed the "Welsbach mantle," a light made of incandescent gas-lighting practical, cheap and safe.

The spiritual life of Austria is depicted on the coin of 1957, showing the Mariazell Cathedral. It is a shrine of 1157 in a 14th century church, credited with working miracles, and is visited by 150,000 pilgrims a year.

On the 1956 commemorative coin, the great composer Mozart is honored, that date being the two-hundredth anniversary of his birth; and the coin of 1955 commemorates the re-opening of the Bundestheater in that year, and shows a performer, on stage with curtains drawn aside.

These coins, magnificently struck, portraying Austrian life, have incorporated references to the arts, science, folk-lore, politics and religion. Numismatists throughout the world hope they will continue for many years to come.

Music on Records

FOR LIGHT, PLEASANT SUMMER LISTENING come three new recordings this month from RCA VICTOR. They include a second album of Classical Music for People who Hate Classical Music, the soundtrack of the controversial Italian film, La Dolce Vita, and a set of sea shanties. To take the last first:

SEA SHANTIES — The Male Chorus of the Robert Shaw Chorale, Robert Shaw, conductor (RCA VICTOR mono LM-2551) — The highly-professional, brightly-polished voices of the Robert Shaw Chorale prove they can be slickly folksy, too, in this rousing collection of the world's best-known sea shanties, sung either unaccompanied, or to the twanging of Jack Hotop's guitar. Included in the collection are such time-worn ditties as Blow the Man Down, What Shall We Do With a Drunken Sailor, Haul Away, Joe, Shenandoah and the Drummer and the Cook. The chorus gives a rousing performance of first-class arrangements of the shanties.

LA DOLCE VITA original sound track recording, score composed by Nino Rota (RCA VICTOR INTERNATIONAL mono FOC 1) — This is the first recording of a new RCA Victor label for discs produced by affiliated companies throughout the world. It contains the best music from the alternately damned and praised film depicting the wild, decadent "sweet life" of contemporary Roman cafe society. The music includes la dolce vita theme song and a number of other arrangements, including versions of Arrivederci Roma, blues, Jingle Bells and Stormy Weather. Taken as a whole, the seductive music sets a definite mood; an ominous malaise that has an almost hypnotic effect on the listener.

MORE CLASSICAL MUSIC FOR PEOPLE WHO HATE CLASSICAL MUSIC — Boston Pops Orchestra, Arthur Fiedler cond. (RCA VICTOR mono LM 2470) — Some of the easiest-to-listen-to short works in the so-called "classical" repertoire are included in this second disc designed to appeal to people who say they don't like "classical music." It will, however, appeal even more to those who do like it. The works played are: Herold's Zampa Overture, Grieg's Last Spring, Massenet's Aragonaise, Liszt's Hungarian Rhapsody No. 6, Suppe's Fatinitza Overture, Tchaikovsky's waltz from Serenade for Strings, Brahms' Hungarian Dance No. 6, Weber's Der Freischutz Overture. They also happen to be examples of the kind of music for which the Boston Pops is justly famed, and in this recording, the orchestra lives up to its high reputation.

plebiscite in that year to sever all ties with China and became an independent nation. Mongolia has lately been in the news when Russia pressed for Mongolian membership in the United Nations. Recently it has been reported that President Kennedy is considering official recognition of the country.

A land-locked country between the Soviet Union and the Republic of China, Mongolia is gradually changing from the wild no-madic life which existed long before the days of the fabulous Genghis Khan to one of "collectivizing" of herds and tribes.

Ulan Bator the capital is a modern city of 160,000 people with factories, schools, a railway station and an airport. About one tenth of the population of the country—or 104,000 are attending primary and secondary schools and another 7,000 universities and secondary technical schools. A powerful Russian-built radio station was completed last year.

Recent Mongolian stamps have been quite attractive. The 1951 pictorial set commemorating Mongolia's 30th anniversary as a Communist state featured Chobalsan University, the State Theatre and unusual scenes of the country. The 1958 series showing Mongolian animals have been very popular.



Collecting in the E.T.

Stamp collectors who exchange stamps with some of the countries in the South Pacific will be busy at this time of the year. The winter season in Australia, for instance, means that collectors there are quicker to answer your letters. The exchange of stamps with foreign countries is an excellent way to add to your collection, but it has its pitfalls for the unwary. This was brought to my attention by a collector living in the Townships who had exchanged some stamps with a fellow philatelist long enough to build up confidence, after sending along quite a large selection of Canadian material that catalogued quite high he received in return equal catalogue value but in stamps from Burma and certain other undesirable countries. His complaint to the sender was answered quite truthfully. He had been sent the same value. Collectors would do well to remember that they should specify what they want, and accept those stamps only, and keep the sendings on a reasonable basis. Canadian stamps are in demand and the catalogue values are actually above the selling values. Whereas, certain other countries have high catalogue items which sell for a fraction of the listed values.

The writer has been corresponding with some fellow collectors in Australia and New Zealand and other countries for nearly ten years with satisfactory results, but I have had to learn the hard way. Some nations still have an embargo on the importation of stamps without a licence, should your stamps be seized you have said good-bye to them.

The big news in stamp collecting is the discovery of a complete sheet of the current Canadian three cent stamps with the vertical perforations missing. This is the second major error in Canadian stamps in a comparative short while. The Seaway invert was discovered a few short years ago. A customer at an Ontario Post-office is reported to have asked for a sheet of the three cent stamps (100) and was given this sheet, the buyer was not a collector but he immediately got in touch with a dealer. These stamps are printed in sheets of 400, perforated and then cut into the panes of 100. This being the case there are three other panes, either in existence or destroyed. The other panes could have ended up anywhere in Canada, who knows, maybe you have had one on your mail. It is very possible that the panes have been discovered by postal authorities by this time and removed, but one never knows.

Among the books I have read most recently have been several which have leaned heavily on what I call the "bread-and-butter-and-jam" technique. There appears to be a trend to this method of writing — so far most noticeable among American male writers.

This new trend in writing can best be explained in this way. Some writers give their readers a "plain bread" story. Basic and unadorned, it contains everything that is necessary, but there are no extras. A second group of writers

gives their readers a "bread and butter" story. That is, it too has all the basic ingredients but these writers go on to plump it up with a bit of spicy dialogue and a few colorful descriptions. And finally we have this growing group of writers represented in my recent reading by John Updike (RABBIT), Wallace Stegner (A SHOOTING STAR) and Evan Hunter MOTHERS AND DAUGHTERS reviewed elsewhere on this page who cover their bread and butter story with jam. Gobs of jam. Personally, I enjoy a little jam on my stories. The only trouble is that these writers are acting too much like kids turned loose with a jam-pot. They don't know where to stop. In fact they have gone so far that they are now covering their stories with such layers of jammy detail that a character like Stegner's Sabrina, for instance, can't drive up to a gas pump for fuel without the reader being subjected to every motion of the attendant including Sabrina's "taking the gas card and receipt from him."

Now while it is admitted that these familiar details do immediately put the reader right in the shoes of the character, it is also true that this movement, thought by thought description when stretched to 600 pages can become a little too much. In fact it ends by being such a surfeit of detail that the reader eventually asks himself where the writers is heading. Is he trying to tell a good story or is he merely using a thin story line as a vehicle on which to display his amazing grasp of minutiae. When this happens the author has gone beyond the bounds of reason, much less entertainment, which is supposed to be the main function of a novel. In fact when the reader becomes less conscious of the story than he is of the details of time, movement, dress, modes and manners etc., it would seem that the novelist should give up his claim to being a novelist and pose as the physiographer, physiognomist, psychiatrist, psychoanalyst or just plain historian, one or more of which at least, he more truly is.

Every reader wants the bread of a story. Some also like butter with the bread and a great many like myself, go for bread-and-butter-and-jam. But when so much jam is spread that one can't find the bread, it is time to realize that this trend has, like so many trends in writing, gone beyond the limits of credibility and it is time to call a halt. Detail for detail's sake has no justifiable place in a novel — even if its inclusion makes a minor book look like a major effort.

Fans of John Gunther will be happy to know that another of his "Inside" books is being published this week. 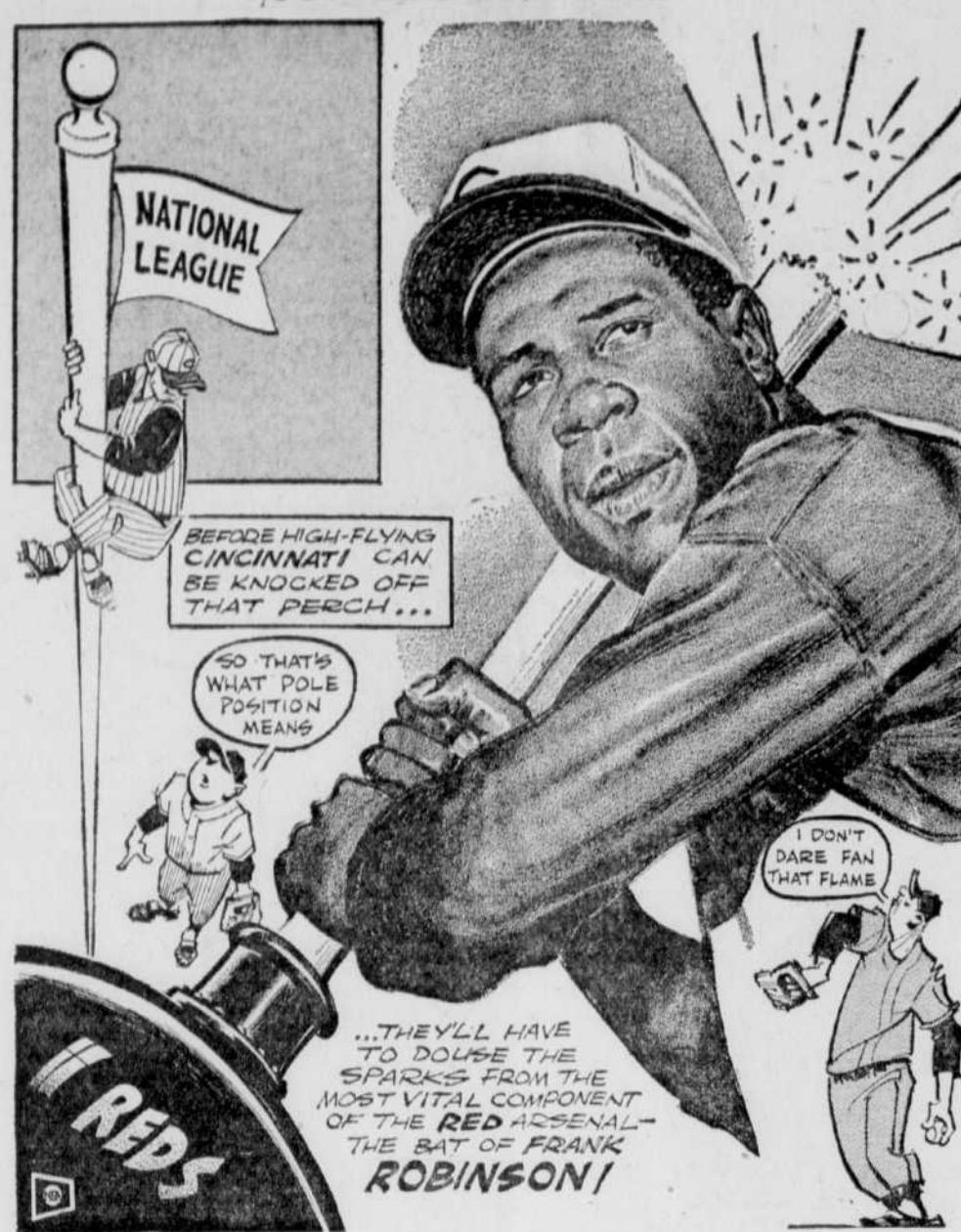

Robinson Clouts 31st Homer Friday In A Strong Bid For Triple Crown As Cincinnati Wins Over Chicago

Outfielder Frank Robinson walloped a pair of home runs Friday in leading first place Cincinnati Reds to a 4-3 victory over Chicago Cubs behind a clutch job of relief pitching by southpaw Bill Henry.

Other National League action had San Francisco playing a two-night twin-bill at Philadelphia, and night games with Los Angeles at Pittsburgh and St. Louis at Milwaukee.

At Chicago, Robinson, making a strong bid for the league's triple crown, accounted for three of Cincinnati's runs while the fourth scored on a homer by Wally Post.

Southpaw Jim O'Toole, reached for a pair of homers by Ernie Banks, gained his 10th victory in 18 decisions but needed help in the ninth when the Cubs came within one run and had the tying run on third with one out.

With one out in the ninth, O'Toole hit Billy Williams with a pitch and pinch batter Ron Santo followed with a triple. Jim Brosnan took over for O'Toole and walked pinch batter Bob Will. Henry then came in and struck out Ed Bouchee and got pinch batter Sammy Taylor to foul out to end the game.

Robinson clouted his 31st homer with a man on in the third off starter Dick Ellsworth and Post followed with his 12th homer for a 3-0.

O'Toole held the Cubs hitless until two were out in the fourth when Banks, returning as a regular only Thursday after being troubled by depth perception in his left eye, hit his 15th homer. Banks cut Cincinnati's lead to one run with another homer in the sixth, but Robinson provided the winning run in the seventh with his 32nd homer.

Robinson, in addition to leading the league in homers, also is tops with 92 runs batted in. His 348 average is second only to Roberto Clemente of Pittsburgh who has a .353 mark.

X-rays showed no break, but Rote had sprained the thumb of his passing hand when he tried to block Henry Janzen.

"I dived at him and my hand hit the ground," Rote said. Agass said Nobby Wirkowski, backfield coach and an 11-year veteran in Canadian football, will take over the No. 1 quarterback slot temporarily.

Orioles' Brown Keeps Increasing Scoreless String

Pitcher Skinny Brown of Baltimore Orioles has the longest scoreless string in major league baseball this season with 23 consecutive scoreless innings and New York Yankees are wondering what happened.

The Yankees maintained their one-game lead over Detroit Tigers in the American League race despite their 4-0 defeat Friday night because Bob Allios hit a pair of two-run homers that gave Minnesota Twins a 4-3 victory over the Tigers.
