Air ways

Flying club announces new students' scheme

ANOTHER NEW PLAN: The Montreal Flying Club, in an effort to attract more new members and re-activate some of the older ones, has announced an extensive series of plans for those who would like to learn to fly, and each plan should bring the cost within the reach of practically everyone. The basis of each plan calls for a deposit of \$100 in advance, \$80 of which goes for prepaid flying and \$20 for membership in the club. Then a choice of four subsections can be made, each designed for the student's best advantage.

THE DETAILS: The first plan entails cash in advance, which allows a 5% discount on the total cost. I should mention that the total cost to learn in a Cessna 150, including club membership, medical exam, licence and navigation equipment, is \$571. If the student is under 33, he gets \$100 from the Government, making the total cost \$471. With the discount, the total outlay would be \$447.45.

Plan 2 is similar, only the cost can be paid in blocks of \$100 each over a period of time. The discount is also allowed here.

* * *

OTHER WAYS: The third way is to pay as you go. DOT regulations call for 12 hours dual instruction, 12 hours solo and 11 dual or solo, plus 20 hours ground instruction. Ground school at MFC is free. The student may pay as he learns—cash for each hour as he actually flies it. The final way is a straight financing deal at no interest charge. This way will still take the \$100 advance, but payments for the balance may be spread over 12 months at no interest. This plan does not restrict the student to taking a year to complete the course—he may finish as fast as he wants, but he still has 12 months to pay the tab.

* * *

A COMMITTEE: A 10-man committee has been set up to handle the details in co-operation with Ed Gates, CFI at MFC. Each committee-man will contact a certain group of people who are now members and ask them to bring one new person out for a free demonstration ride with the committee-man or the member, if the latter is up-to-date with his flying. All in all, it seems like a practical scheme.

JOTTINGS: Capt. Mills, president of the Canadian Air Line Pilots Association, is rather angry with press reports regarding a third pilot on TCA's Vanguards. He says some reports have said there was no place on the flight deck for a third pilot and no provision made for him at the controls. Capt. Mills should be amused at such writings—anyone who has ever seen a flight deck knows there isn't an aircraft made with triple controls.

My eager craft through footless halls of air.
Up, up the long delirious, burning blue
I've topped the wind-swept heights with easy grace,
Where never lark, or even eagle, flew;
And, while with silent mind I've trod,

Put out my hand and touched the face of God.

Jack celebrates 90th birthday

Three days after his 90th birthday, well-known Westmount resident John P. 'Jack' Copland is slowly emerging from an avalanche of telegrams, cables, valentines, letters and various other forms of greetings and congratulations.

Mr. Copland, who resides at 106 Arlington avenue, is about as hale, hearty and vigorous as many men 25 years his junior.

And the changes from public horse-drawn vehicles, straw-strewn in the winter, to the modern jet airplane, haven't affected either his daily walk — usually anywhere from one to four miles — or his interest in business and public affairs.

Among these are real estate, in which he has been active for some 45 years; church work (he has served the Erskine-American Church for some 55 years and in 1955 was honored for 50 years service); the Foreign Missions to which he has given a son, the Rev. Bruce Copland of Formosa, and the YMCA, where he is a member of the executive board.

Mr. Copland is a life member of the Montreal Amateur Athletic Association, a member of the Royal Montreal Curling Club, the Canadian Club and the Lac Marois Country Club.

He has also worked hand-in-hand with the Old Brewery Mission for the last 40 years.

Among the special celebrations for Mr. Copland was a Valentine luncheon at the Mount Stephen Club where Guy Tombs, a resident of Westmount for 54 years, was host.

Other residents included Mr. Copland's son, C. L. Copland; a nephew, A. Ogilvy Leslie; Arthur H. Campbell; Rev. Dr. James

S. Thompson, United Theological College; Rev. N. M. Slaughter, Erskine American United Church; Fred G. Hubbard, general secretary, YMCA; Rev. Leon Sanborne, a son-in-law, of Syracuse, N.Y.; and Dr. L. C. Tombs, now of Preville.

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Victoria-Sherbrooke

Pedestrians, motorists must fight it out: Piche

"Pedestrians and motorists must fight it out at the Sherbrooke-Victoria crossing," declared J. Piche, chairman of the WMA traffic committee.

Mr. Piche was replying to a question from a WMA member at the association's executive meeting held Tuesday night in Victoria Hall.

The Sherbrooke-Victoria intersection is considered "dangerous"

to pedestrians crossing on green lights. Apparently, they must watch for traffic on all sides as vehicles make left and right turns.

According to Mr. Piche, the matter had been discussed at City Hall, but no solution was ever reached.

WMA members recalled that special pedestrian signs were once used at the intersection, but proved ineffective.

"They were fine for pedestrians," one member said, "but no good for traffic." Traffic at the intersection was clogged at peak hours, he added.

It was suggested that left-hand turns be prohibited at rush hours, but it was pointed out that traffic would then use residential Roslyn avenue — an "undesirable" thought.

Construction of a safety zone was condemned by the traffic committee chairman on the basis that it offers only "psychological protection" and might be likened to a "cage."

WMA president, Geoffrey Merrill suggested the committee get the City's view on the matter.



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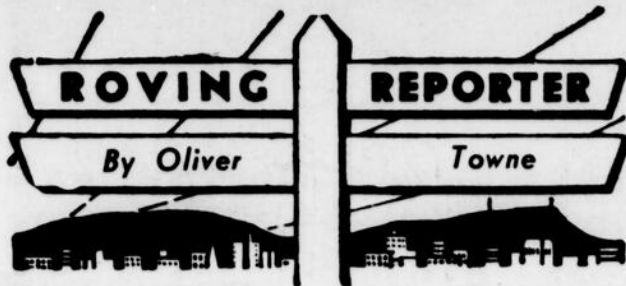

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And lassie
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Now: a practical aid for the housewife

When you can wash a rack full of dishes in two minutes without getting your hands wet, and without electricity, that is revolutionary!

You can do just that with the water powered Two Minute Dishwasher invented by Fred W. Blanchard, 78, a retired engineer and former long-time resident of 28 Stratford road, Hampstead.

The new machine is being offered to the public for the first time by the D.D. Millar Company, 5065 Western ave.

Said Mr. Blanchard in an interview Friday: "I consider the invention of this dishwasher to be my most important achievement."

Mr. Blanchard has 14 other

patents, mostly for valves in use in the railroad industry.

Dishes disappeared

He related how he first experimented with the idea of a water-powered dishwasher 25 years ago. He constructed his original model in the basement of his home in Hampstead out of a washtub, handspray and coat hangers. Mr. Blanchard chuckled, recalling the maid's complaints to Mrs. Blanchard that "her dishes were disappearing into the cellar".

Eventually, he said, he developed a workable portable in the course of his spare time tinkering which has been in daily use in Mrs. Blanchard's kitchen for more than 12 years. Claimed the white haired bushy browed inventor, "It has never needed re-

pairs or replacement of any of its parts in all this time".

Mr. Blanchard demonstrated how the 12 water jets impinging on the rotating dishes at an angle are counterbalanced by a reactionary spray of one to four jets, depending upon the size of the dish load, to maintain a safe speed of 45 revolutions per minute.

He pointed out that there is only one moving part, a ball bearing suspended in oil at the top of the central shaft. The "scrub brush action" of the water jets removes lipstick, gravy and long standing tea and coffee stains in short order and with an efficiency previously unavailable, according to its inventor.

The 200-pound nearly six-footer was born 78 years ago in Bible Hill, Nova Scotia. He received his education as a mechanical

NEW RECORDS

Bartol - Piano Concertos 2 and 3 / Geza Anda, piano / Radio Berlin Symphony Orch. - Ferenc Fricay / Deutsche Grammophon LPM 18611. These two works are chronologically 15 years apart, and are supposed to represent two distinct periods in the composer's life, yet both have a lot in common. They are melodious, full of unorthodox rhythms, and very exciting. The performances by Geza Anda are stunning, and the sound is excellent plus.

Brahms - Quartet in A, op. 26 / Quartetto di Roma / Deutsche Grammophon LPM 18528.

The second of Brahms' quartets for piano and strings is performed with amore by the Rome Quartet who play with such warmth and precision that I am eager to hear any new releases that this excellent group might have in the future.

Weber - Sonata No. 4 in E minor, op. 70 / Invitation to The Dance / Liszt - Sonata in B minor / Leon Fleisher, Piano / Epic LC-3675.

This record combines some of the most popular keyboard works by both composers, and Fleisher's playing is a delight.

Beethoven - Concerto No. 1 in C, op. 15 / Sonata No. 31, op. 110 / Andor Foldes, Piano / Bamberg Sym. Orch.-Ferenc Fricay / Deutsche Grammophon LPM 18636.

In order of composition, this is Beethoven's third essay in concerto form, and is a more mature work than the B flat concerto (No. 2, op. 19) and certainly the one in E flat from 1784. To my mind, the performance recorded here is the most convincing one I have heard. I believe its success lies in the approach to the music; for once this is not treated as "Early Beethoven, in the Mozartean Manner". Side 2 of the record is filled out with a sensitive interpretation of the next to the last sonata.

Gyorgy Sebok, Pianist, in favourites by Beethoven, Hummel, Chopin and Liszt / Select M-298.003.

This recording made in France by the Hungarian pianist includes the famous Mephisto Waltz, 2 other waltzes by Liszt, 2 etudes and two waltzes by Chopin, as well as the lovely Rondo op. 11 by J. N. Hummel. Recorded sound is excellent, and the makers are to be congratulated on appending the playing time alongside each piece, a great help.

Tchaikovsky - Swan Lake Ballet Suite / Sleeping Beauty Suite / Rome Opera House Orch. - Walter Goehr / Harmony HL-7219.

The jacket of this album (with a swan, of course) lists also the Waltz from suite No. 2, which I was unable to find on the record. Goehr is a veteran who has conducted every major orchestra in Europe, and his sure hand is felt in these performances. The Harmony label is Columbia's lower priced one, like Victor's Camden. Like Camden, there are some excellent reissues in their catalog, which we shall be examining in the near future. Surfaces and sound are very good.

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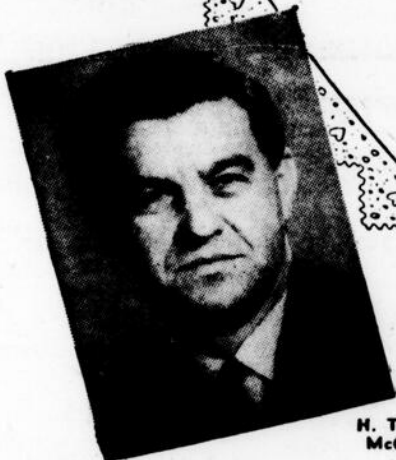

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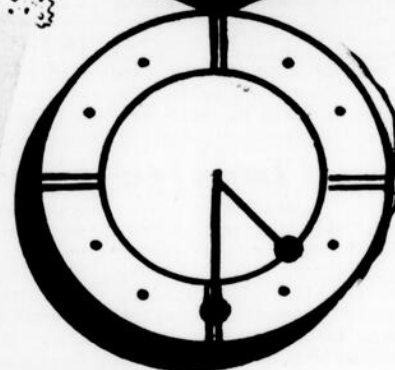

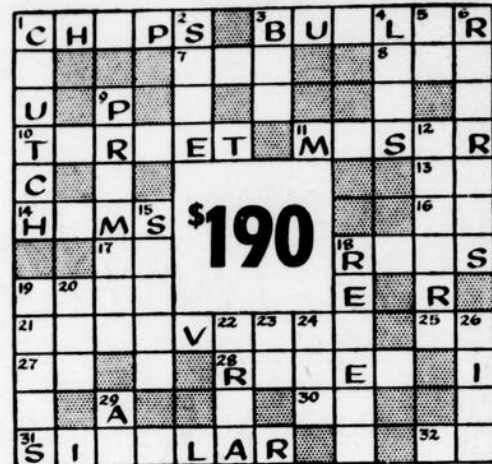

McGill increases scholarships

McGill University will increase the number of entrance scholarships to students entering in September, 1961.

Prof. J. R. Mallory, chairman of the University Scholarships Committee, announced that the Board of Governors and Senate of the University had approved a proposal that the number of entrance scholarships, which last year totalled more than 200, should be increased as much as funds would permit.

"McGill's entrance scholarships," Professor Mallory said, "are designed to enable good students from all parts of Canada to attend the University. It is my belief that McGill now offers the most generous and comprehensive system of entrance scholarships of any university in Canada."

Retroactive policy

At the same time, Professor Mallory announced a major change in policy, which has been made retroactive for holders of University Scholarships during the present session.

The University has decided to return to a system of granting a nominal sum of \$100 to each holder of a University Scholarship as a tangible mark of recognition regardless of financial need. Where financial need does exist, the Student Aid Office is empowered to grant amounts up to the cost of tuition fees, board and lodgings to students who are not Montreal residents.

In recent years, Professor Mallory explained, holders of these scholarships had not received any stipend at all unless they could prove to the University that they were in financial need, in which case the amount awarded had depended on the decision of the Student Aid Office.

"Every High School in Canada," Professor Mallory said, "has been sent a statement concerning the award of entrance scholarships, together with details which govern them."

petent persons engaged in research, and the pace of progress is set accordingly."

Inasmuch as these words are followed by a paragraph beginning, "Applied to the educational arena . . .", I have interpreted the learned Mr. Cochrane as intending these remarks to apply to research generally.

In my humble opinion, the work of Newton, Pasteur, Galileo and the Curies all tend to support the view that competent research is most frequently done by individuals working virtually alone. Certainly, their achievements cannot be dismissed lightly as little intellectual progress. Even, in recent years where teams of workers have engaged in research on a single project together, such as Kinsey, Salk and Goldberger, the project has been sparked by the genius of a single individual.

I do not doubt that teams of researchers can work efficiently and productively but I do seriously question the inference that a sufficiently large number of persons alone engaged in research will ensure progress. I doubt very much that even Mr. Cochrane would, if questioned maintain such a position. I imagine that he would be quite willing to admit that it is not number but quality of researchers that counts and to confess that it is merely lack of thought that caused him to write so carelessly as to be subject to such an interpretation as I have gathered from his column.

What we need is quality. It won't do much good if we have team of sloppy thinkers, would it? Mr. Cochrane should be more careful of what he says.

The first of a series of seminars on research in geology in the Montreal universities and colleges was held Sunday at Loyola College under the auspices of the Montreal Geological Discussion Group.

Dr. P. R. Eakins, of McGill, in his remarks Dr. Gill noted chairman of the group, opened that the copper deposits of North the meeting by introducing Dr. and Chibougamau, and the J. E. He also pointed out that with each step towards solution, the tasks of the prospector, mining engineer and geologist will be made easier and Canada's economy will benefit accordingly.

Economic geologist

Dr. Gill is one of Canada's outstanding economic geologists and an authority on the geology of the Canadian Precambrian Shield. He recently reported on his sulphide investigations to the International Geological Congress at Copenhagen, Denmark.

Other subjects briefly discussed and deferred for later meetings in March and April were: "Investigations of sediments on the floor of Bay Chaleur", by Professor M. Tiphon of the University of Montreal; "Investigations of the relationship of soil mineralogy to frost heaving of railways and highways", by Dr. D. J. McDougall of Loyola College; and "X-ray investigations of the important rock-forming minerals", by Dr. G. Perrault of l'Ecole Polytechnique.

The Montreal Geological Discussion Group is composed of professional geologists working in industry, mining and at Montreal universities and colleges.

A reception and dinner, which preceded the seminar, were attended also by Loyola rector, the Very Rev. Patrick G. Malone, S.J.

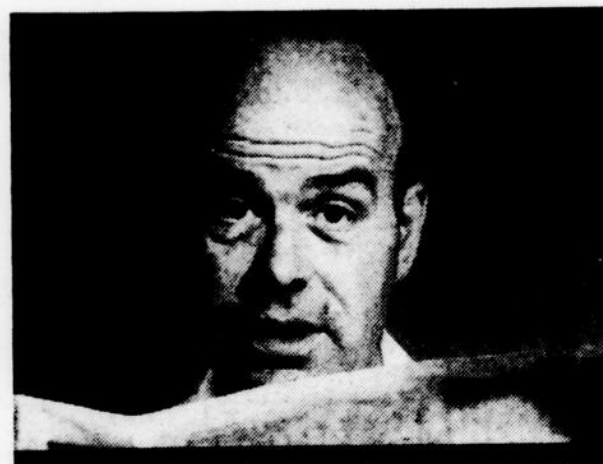
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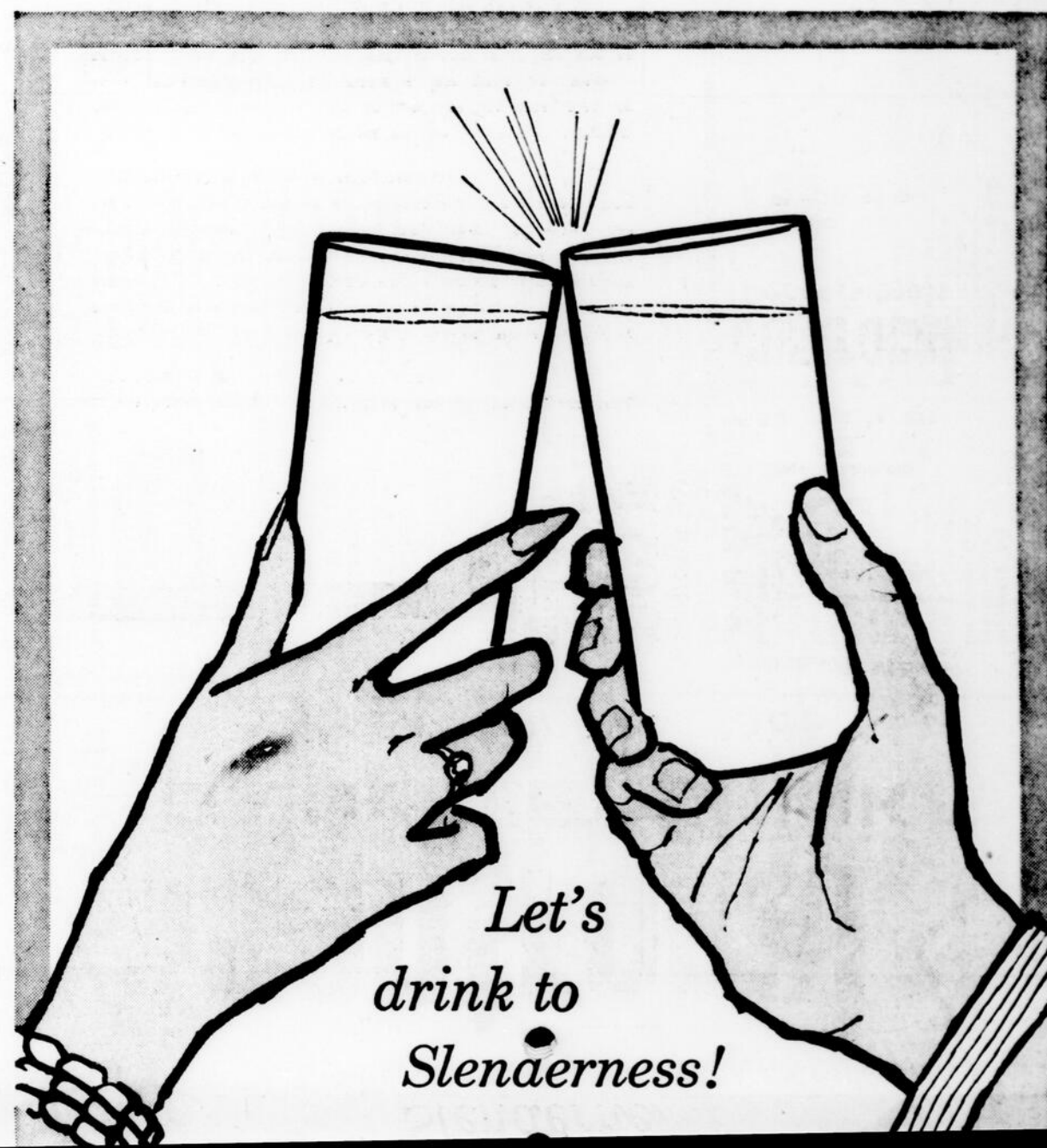

LONDON: The Tartan. Kenneth McKellar with Bob Sharples and his orchestra. TW 91238. We were fortunate to attend Mr. McKellar's most recent concert here last fall, and were again impressed with this handsome Scot's fine stage presence, superb voice and good taste. Originally a leading tenor with the Carl Rosa Opera Company, he has made himself a rightful place as Scotland's ambassador and exponent of its many songs and musical lore. If anything, Kenneth McKellar's voice is stronger on this new disc, and the program a real delight even to these English ears. Bob Sharples embellishes two great songs with bagpipes for real stirring effect: 'The March of the Cameron Men' and 'A Hundred Pipers', and 'The Tartan' and 'The Royal Mile' are also spinetingers. Then there are 'Kishmul's Galley', 'Lochnagar', the inevitable 'Annie Laurie', a delightful little number 'Air Falalolo', 'An Island Sheiling Song' and a beautiful traditional ballad 'The Flowers of the Forest' given a haunting accompaniment with solitary drum and soft pipes. Recommended.

LONDON: Verdi: Aida — High-lights. Tebaldi, Bergonzi, Simonato, MacNeil and The Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra, conductor Herbert Von Karajan. 5568. Verdi's 'Aida' is pretty exciting opera even for an average recording, however this magnificent production brings the listener a real feeling of presence at an actual performance, its richness of sound and well-balanced staging being a technical triumph in the recording field. The great 'Triumphal Scene' is one of the most thrilling things we have heard. The vocal star is Renata Tebaldi, who is excellent voice ably supported by Carlo Bergonzi as Radames, Giulietta Simonato as Amneris and Cornell MacNeil as Amonasro. However, the directors and engineers deserve the kudos, that big scene being worth the whole disc.

IMPERIAL: A Breath of Scandal. Music from the motion picture soundtrack. 9132. The music of this disc is from the Paramount Viennese musical romance starring Sophia Loren, Maurice Chevalier, John Gavin and Angela Lansbury, and as such we expected to hear quite a variety of songs from these people. Although there's plenty of rather pleasant music in the Viennese style, the only vocals are from Mr. Chevalier, and although we are a fan of his, we grew a little tired of hearing him sing the title song four times at various spots on the record with nothing else for contrast.

Some of the plants in the ground
are not bad in themselves: grasses
and clovers are valuable for past-
ure; mustard is wonderful for a
relish; but if you are trying to
grow grain you root them out un-
mercifully. Even a calendula that
has found its way into the mignon-
ette bed must be eliminated even
against our desire for a stronger
color than mignonette.Our Lord in this particular para-
ble did not go beyond the point
of saying that weeds will spoil
the crop. He did not say anything
about rooting them out. In fact,
in another parable He warned us
to be careful in our weeding.Let us see, however, what the
weeds are in our lives, for this
is the time of self-examination.
The first in the list is cares or
the cares of this world. Those are
the things that we worry over in
this civilization of ours — thethings we feel must be preserved
at all cost.A century ago the Southern
States felt that slavery must be
preserved, that the culture of the
South depended of it. Today some
white people feel that the segrega-
tion of white and black must be
maintained. It has become a bar-
rier between them and the Father
of all men, and the sad part is
that they cannot see the barrier.Those are racial barriers, but for
the individual Christian the social
and economic and cultural barriers
are quite as important and sinful.C. S. Lewis illustrates it in Screw-
tape Letters in which the senior
devil Screwtape warns his under-
study Wormwood to take advantage
of all these differences, so that
man may not even want to love
his neighbor as himself. If we are
to take any advantage of Lent and
what it offers to us those barriers
must go.**'One God'

Youthful canvassers will be sought for Red Cross

A financial campaign, that will have the well-being of thousands of Quebec citizens riding on its success, will be launched by the Canadian Red Cross in March. In Montreal and in most communities the opening date will be March 18th.

An army of volunteers will then begin a two-week effort to collect the money earmarked to maintain Red Cross vital services.

The cost of these vital services has increased each year, while the purchasing value of the dollar has decreased. Because of the rapid growth of the population of Canada — two millions in the past seven years — Red Cross services have expanded. Yet, the revenues do not

match the expenses.

This alarming situation causes great concern to Red Cross officers and the vital question of the Quebec Division is not, "How are we going to maintain the existing services?" but "What services shall we have to cut?"

For instance, in 1950, Water Safety courses had been given to 11,800 pupils. In 1960, the number of students was over 25,000.

In 1950, 18 Loan Cupboards operating throughout the Province of Quebec had loaned 6,500 articles to 2,194 individuals. Ten years later, these figures had more than doubled. Some 14,000 articles were loaned to 6,500 individuals in 1960.

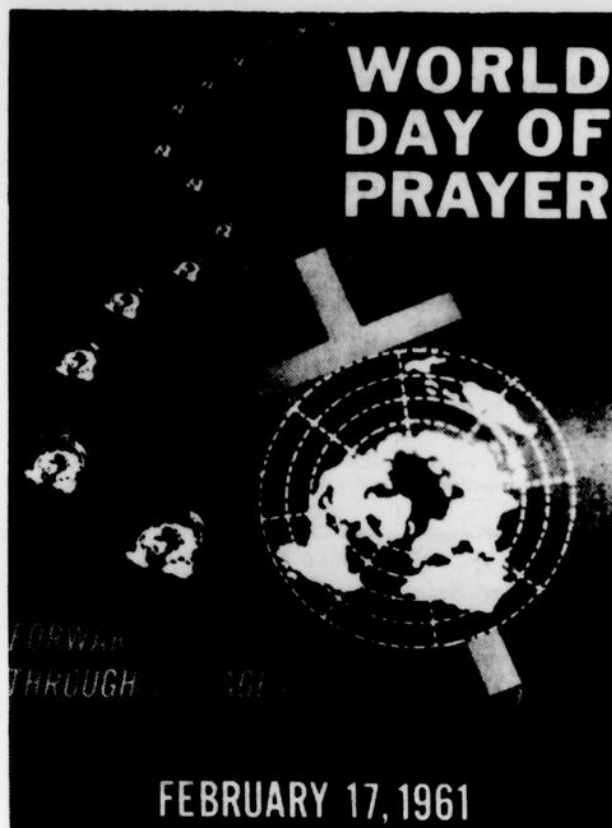

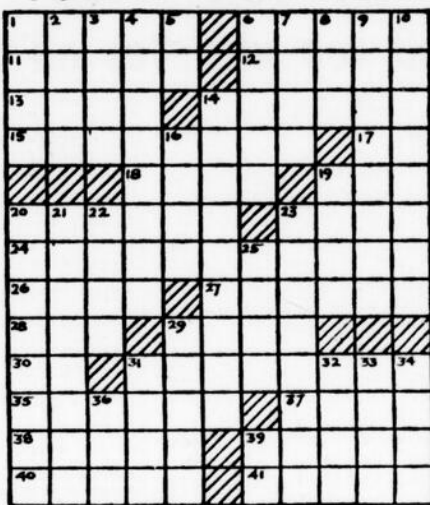

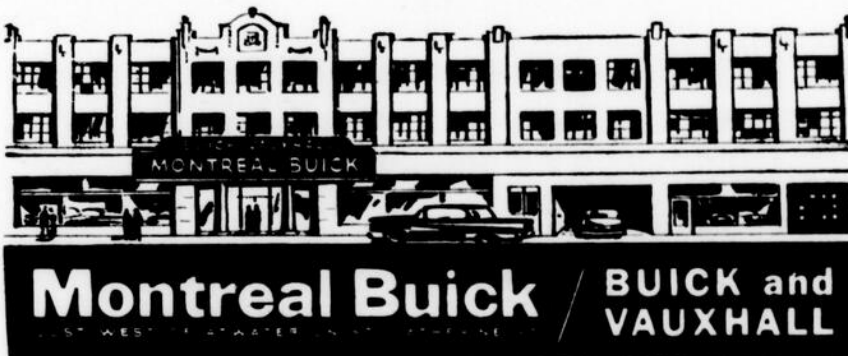
