

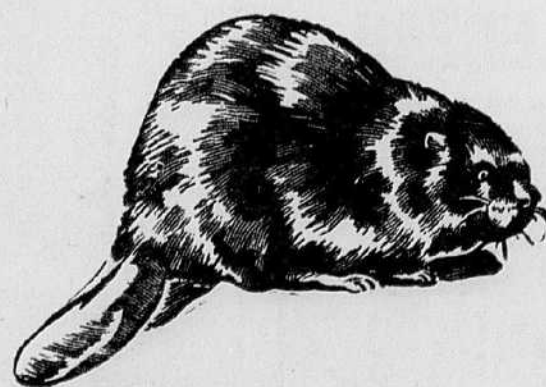
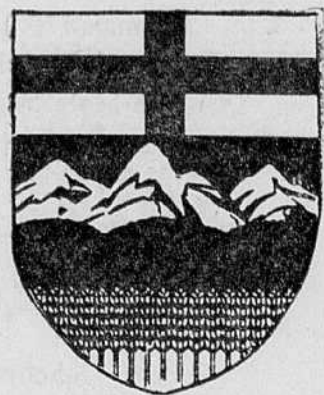



By Miss Isabell Menzies At Stanstead**

Stanstead, July 29 — On Saturday, June 19, the Border Business and Professional Women's Club enjoyed a buffet supper and evening meeting at the home of Miss McIntosh, Stanstead, when guests of the club were Miss Isabel Menzies, vice-president of Canadian Federation, Miss Bessie Milford, president of Sherbrooke B. & P.W. Club, and Mrs. Victoria Plow of the Montreal B. & P.W. Club.

After supper, prepared by the Misses McIntosh and Miss Ruth Wing, everyone walked through Miss McIntosh's garden, admiring one of Stanstead's beautiful sunsets.

A brief business meeting preceded Miss Menzies' address. Officers for the coming year are: President, Miss Elsie McFadden; vice-president, Miss Mae Bean; secretary, Mrs. Alice Merriman; treasurer, Miss Ruth Wing.

Miss Menzies, who was introduced by the president of the Border Club, gave a very informative address, with real Scottish conciseness and good humor. She pointed out that the Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs is international in scope, including, Austria, Australia, Belgium, Canada, Cuba, Denmark, Finland, France, Great Britain, Holland, Italy, New Zealand, Norway, Philippine Islands, South Africa, Rhodesia, Sweden, United States, Switzerland and West Germany.

The president of International Federation is Dame Caroline Haslett, D.B.E. of Great Britain. The last International Federation Convention was held in Stockholm, Sweden in the summer of 1933.

Canadian Federation started in 1931 with five clubs. In 1931 there were nine clubs and in 1933 there were 1470 members. In 1933 there were 160 clubs, with 6500 members. There are clubs in every province of Canada, Ontario and British Columbia have the greatest number of clubs. Quebec Province has five clubs; Montreal, Quebec, Stanstead (Border Club), Sherbrooke, Three Rivers. The Border Club was founded in 1937 and at that time was the only Business and Professional Women's Club belonging to both the

Canadian and the American Federations.

The Canadian National Federation Convention is to be held in Toronto this summer. In July 1935, both the International and Canadian Federation plan to meet in Montreal, with at least 1300 delegates.

In affiliation with United Nations, the Federation of Business and Professional Women is working to better the status of the women of the world legally, educationally and socially in the home, in business, in professions, in all places of employment and in public life.

At present, Canadian Federation is urging government legislation to provide "equal pay for equal work" in all provinces.

Federation includes many women of outstanding ability. An organization of such magnitude can accomplish great things if women will be brave enough to assume the responsibilities of public office, if they will use their votes wisely; and if with faith, high

ideals and friendship, they will seek the common good of women, and all mankind, throughout the world.

At the end of her address, Miss Menzies entered with great animation and humor into a very lively period of discussion and anecdotes.

Miss Elsie McIntosh thanked the speaker, Miss Milford and Mrs. Plow also spoke, thanking the club and their hostesses.

The meeting closed with presentation of a club emblem lapel pin to Mrs. Amaron, a charter member of the Border Club, who is going to Ontario and will be greatly missed here. The presentation was made by Miss Menzies.

The September meeting place of the club will be announced later.

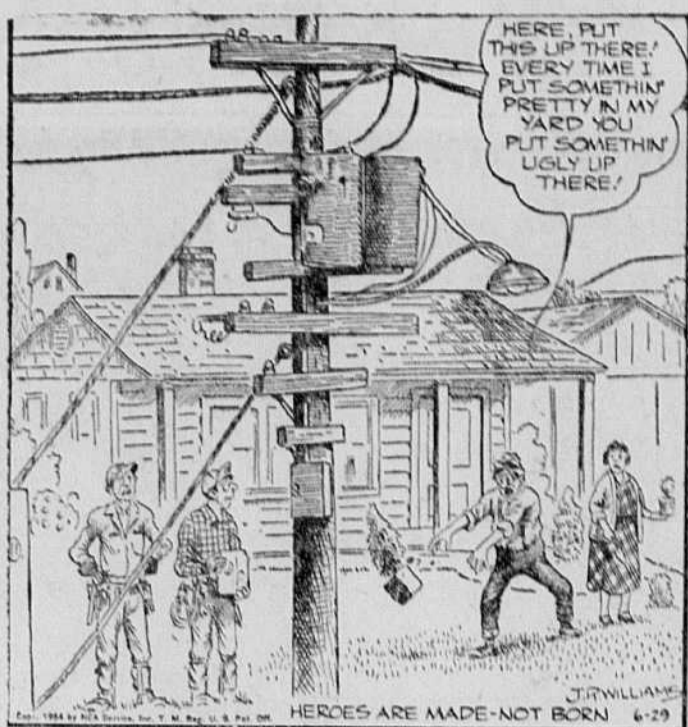
The singing of O Canada terminated the concert, which was under the musical direction of Jean R. Rousseau.

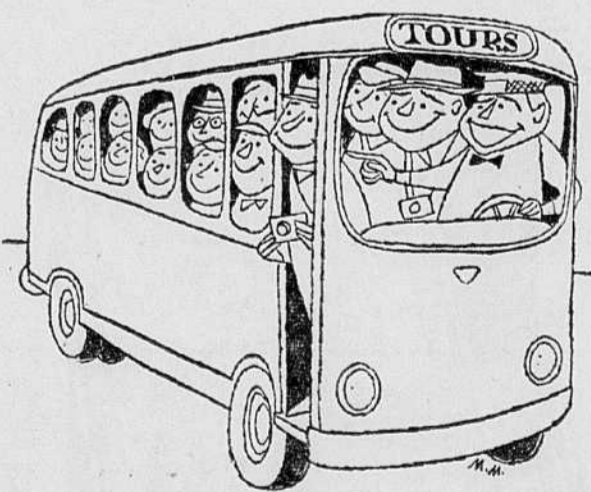

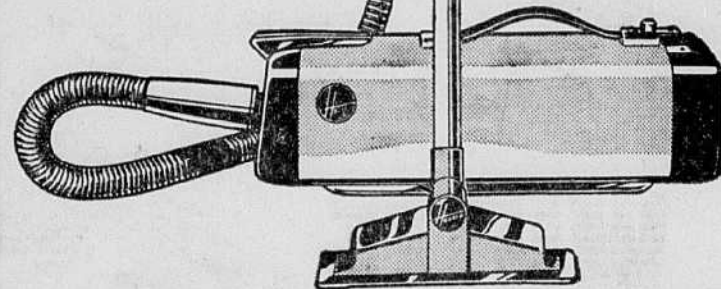

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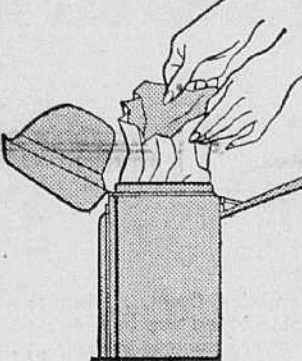
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### National Picnic Planned By W.I. At East Clifton

### Collars, Sleeves Biggest Interest In U. K. Fashion

London—Moderately-priced winter fashions styled for markets at home and abroad have been unveiled in the seventh Fashion Fortnight, the first sponsored by British manufactured without government aid.

The event, inaugurated in 1948, attracted hundreds of buyers from around the world. The top designers who cater to the higher income brackets will show their wares in late July.

Biggest fashion interest of the Fortnight's displays lay in the huge cape collars and outside sleeves shown in loose and fitted coats. Most collars came below the shoulders, following the recent spate of cut-away necklines. They range from choir boy numbers, consisting of Peter Pan collars of fur set against mandarin neckbands of coat material, to cape styles almost waist deep.

Tailored winter suits with classic lines had Quaker collars tipped with fur and fur-topped slit pockets. Many were buttoned from jacket neck to skirt hem and worn with matching swagger coats having straight fullness and big sleeves tucked into narrow cuffs.

Sleeves widened from raglan shoulders to end in folds of material tucked into deep tight cuffs. Some trimmed down batwing shoulders until they seemed too narrow for the deep collars.

Squared collars, rounded or pointed collars were trimmed with beaver or persian lamb. One loose coat in parchment white wool, buttoned from pocket height to throat, had a persian lamb collar in donkey brown coming almost to the waist.

Coat styles were fitted princess lines with full swirling skirts, fitted to a Paris-style corset waist or loose, straight and buttoned to the throat. Wrap-around tent coats are out and belts almost at a premium.

Many princess coats are buttoned only at the waist. A black barathea with flouncing lines had deep, square collar covered in white ermine. Ermine extended down front labels that stretched to a double-breasted waist fastening.

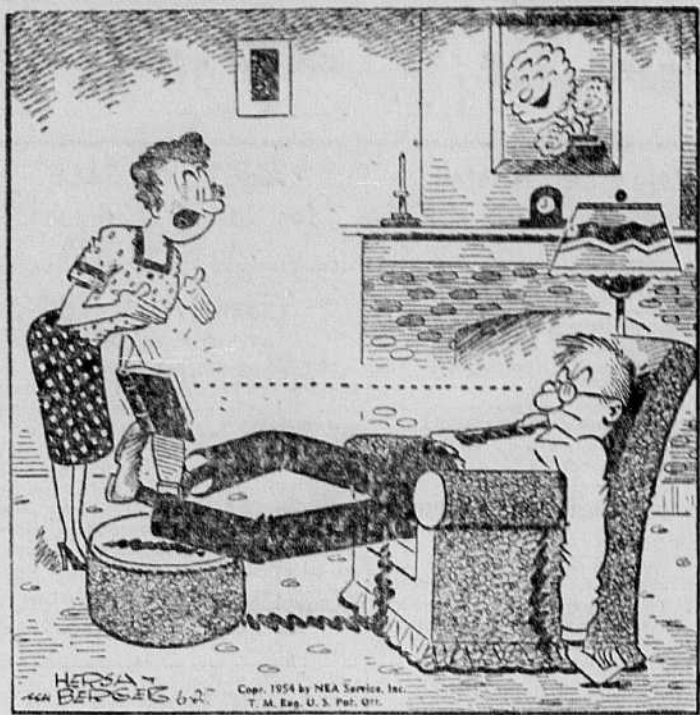
White arctic fox trimmed the front and collar of a loose coat in white and gold tissue lame with deep dolman sleeve. Many cheaper coats were trimmed with fur fabrics.

The most striking models were pony- and leopard-printed pile fabrics in black and white, styled in princess lines. These fabrics also had effective and warm linings.

Materials were light and not as hairy as last winter's. No velvet was used, even for trimmings. Soft suede took the place of velvet trimmings. Colors included sapphire and turquoise blues alternating with light browns and winter whites. Rough tweeds were at a minimum and came in grey mixtures.

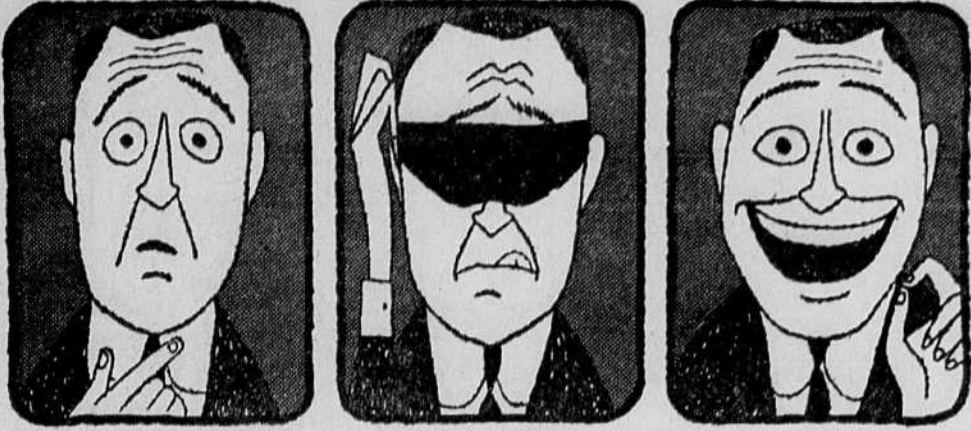

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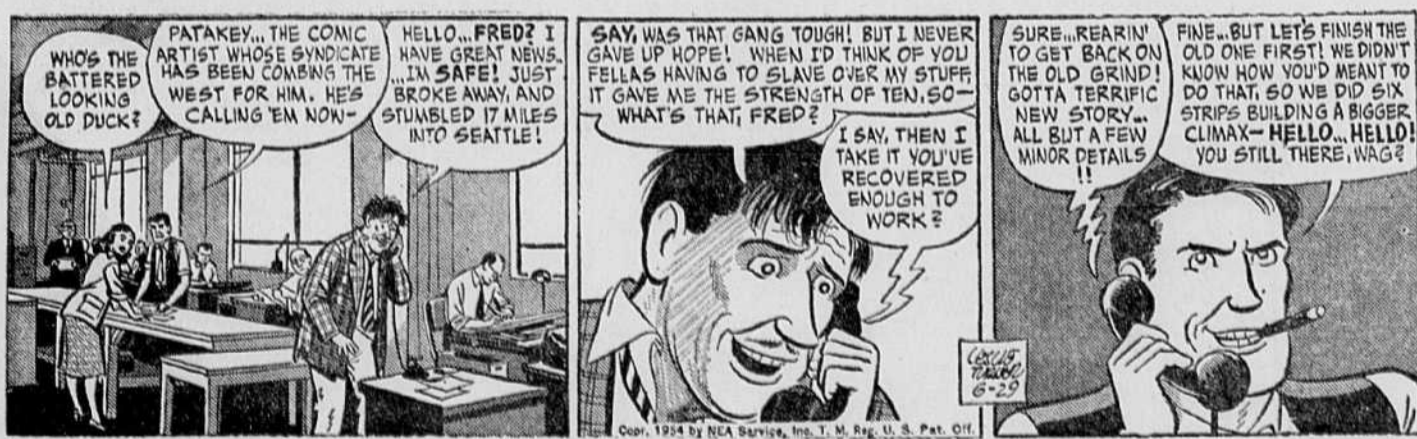
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
