ARMED EUROPE. An article which is sure to attract a very great deal of attention, throughout the world, appears in the current number of Blackwood's Magazine, from the able pen of that distinguished soldier and strategist, General Sir ARCHIBALD ALISON, whose reputation as a writer on military subjects, is one of the best in England. General Alison has seen much service in various parts of the world, and more than once has commanded Her Majesty's forces in difficult and hazardous campaigns. The General takes a survey in his magazine article of the vast armed camp in Europe, and he draws from the spectacle a conclusion which everyone will admit is not far-fetched, but is, on the contrary, fully justified by the facts. That Europe is on the eve of a great and general war none can doubt. The strain on the nations which is caused by keeping up this tremendous armament has already lasted longer than most people expected, or even dared to think would. It cannot continue very much longer. These countries, as the essayist points out, are maintaining armed forces out of all proportion to their resources and population, and the consequent strain upon their monetary system and industrial population is ever increasing, and must sooner or later become unbearable. The nations are living in a state of constant preparation for instant war. Europe is now divided into two great Alliances, France and Russia composing one, and Italy, Austria and Germany composing the other. The Russian army, on the peace footing, consists of about 977,500 men, divided into twenty-one army corps, with four independent cavalry divisions, and thirteen brigades of rifles. The army corps itself usually consists of two infantry and one cavalry division, with corresponding artillery—and numbers about 23,000 men in peace and 40,000 on war establishment. Of this immense force the distribution by localities, is, roughly speaking, nearly as follows:—In the Warsaw, Wilna and Kiev districts, about 200,000 men; in the Moscow and St. Petersburg districts, in reserve to the above, 284,500 men. In the Odessa district, holding the Crimea and watching Turkey, 80,000 men; in the Caucasus district, opposed to Turkey in Asia, 50,000 men; in the whole of the Transcaucasus, opposed to Afghanistan and China, 51,000; and in the fortress of Vladivostok, on the Sea of Japan and on the adjacent Chinese frontier, 12,000 men. When mobilized for war and all the reserves called out, Russia can put into the field an army of 2,722,305 men, 680,000 horses and 6,420 guns. Sir ARCHIBALD says: "Russia is straining every nerve to mass every possible man of her huge army on her Polish frontier, so as to be able, in conjunction with France, to crush Germany, even though aided by flanking Austria and distant Italy." The author considers that "it was a grave mistake, when the

treaty of 1856 was torn up at the London Conference of 1871, that the European Powers did not insist upon opening both the Straits to the shipping of all nations during peace, instead of carefully closing them, and thus shutting up the lion and the lamb together in the dark waters of the Black Sea." In the Black Sea, Russia now has six sea-going iron-clads and two more in course of construction, two circular iron-clads, useful for defensive purposes, and seven cruisers. In the Baltic she has nine iron-clad battleships, nine cruisers (with two more in course of construction), and two rams—all iron-clads. Of course, Russia will not move without France, and France is not ready. The General says that her system of fortifications, constructed to protect her Capital, and to cover every approach to it, is unequalled. Paris itself is surrounded by a new series of powerful detached forts, so far thrown out in advance of the old ones which covered it in 1870-71, that, until they are broken through, even modern rifled ordnance cannot touch the town. Moreover, every line of rail converging on the Capital from the eastern frontier is blocked by powerful fortresses, and new works, or forts d'arrêt, so as to be useless to the enemy until these have been successfully reduced. It is thus impossible—even after our great defeats, like those in front of Metz, or at Sedan—to rush the Capital before the whole military power of the Empire has had time to be massed for its defence. Her system of railways and her arrangements for rapid mobilization are now nearly as perfect as anything can be, and are fully equal to those of Germany. Forfeverish warships just as well prepared. Her army on a peace footing total, 623,755 men, 2,808 field guns and 121,924 horses. In war, all reserves called in, it becomes: Infantry, 1,783,391 men, Cavalry, 317,245 men, Artillery, 429,581 men, all others, 185,356,—a grand total of 2,715,576 men, 4,500 field guns and 800,000 horses. In war, France and Russia would have 5,437,971 men, 9,290 guns and 1,480,000 horses. Germany's army at peace stands 592,869 men, guns 2,622, horses 119,944. In time of war, 2,441,436 men, 4,428 guns and 522,126 horses. Austria in time of peace has a total of 290,146 men, 996 guns and 53,356 horses. In war she has 1,590,819 men, 2,136 guns and 291,870 horses. Italy's forces available in peace are 247,228 men, 858 guns and 51,894 horses. Her war footing is 1,909,021 men, 1,620 guns. A reliable account of the number of horses employed by Italy in war would not be ascertained. The Triple Alliance has a total force in peace of 1,139,243 men, 4,476 guns and 235,194 horses, in war time, 5,941,276 men, 8,134 guns and 813,996 horses. The Dual Alliance has in peace 362,000 men under arms more than the Triple Alliance, but the latter in time of war has the inferiority of 503,000 men. On the whole, however, General ALISON says they are very evenly matched, though the central position of the Triple Alliance, the numbers of which are all in touch with one another, ought to give it a certain advantage over the Dual Alliance, who are separated from each other by the whole breadth of Germany, and are nowhere in touch. No allusion is made to "the naval results which this great contest will involve. The paper is a most valuable one, and should be read by all thoughtful men.

Buying and Selling Land in Australia. In New South Wales the transfer of landed property has been made extremely cheap and simple by means of the Real Property Act, familiarly known as the "Torrens Act," from the name of its author, Sir R. E. Torrens, who at one time represented Cambridge in the British Parliament. The Act, which was introduced into the colony in 1862, has been largely availed of since it came into force. The chief advantage gained by those bringing properties under the Act is that from the moment the land is registered, and a certificate granted, the title of the person holding the certificate becomes indefeasible, unless it has been fraudulently obtained. Provision is, however, made for error in transfer, by which persons might be deprived of their rights, and the remedy is that the transfer be made to the wrong person, the holder of the certificate cannot be dispossessed of his property unless he has acted fraudulently. To indemnify the Government for compensating persons who, through error, may have been deprived of their properties, an assurance fund has been created by a contribution of one-half penny in the pound being levied on all property brought under the Act. This fund, at the end of 1892, amounted to over \$117,000, and is a gratifying proof of the value of the Act, and the facility of its working, that scarcely any withdrawals from this fund have been necessary. The approximate value of land brought under the Act to the 31st December, 1892, was 17,191,500 acres, the value of the same being estimated at \$35,572,138.

At the Parliament House. Only One Session on Saturday. Canada for Canadians. Important Speech by Mr. G. W. Stephens. TOO MANY LAND SURVEYORS. Registrars and Registry Offices. A QUESTION OF PRIVILEGE.

PRSS GALLERY, PARLIAMENT HOUSE, Saturday, Dec. 23rd, 1893. In the Legislative Council to-day, the four bills respecting Lunatic Asylums were read a first time, and the second reading fixed for Tuesday next. The bill of the city of Quebec passed its second reading, and was fixed for Private Bills Committee for Tuesday. In connection with this last bill, we believe that a special meeting of the City Council has been called for Tuesday next, to take into consideration the amendments made to the Bill in Committee of the Whole with respect to Water Rates on Charitable Institutions.

IN THE HOUSE. This morning, Hon. Mr. Taiton asked permission to introduce a bill to admit graduates of the Royal Military College, Kingston, to the study of land-surveying without preliminary examination on the same footing as the students of other colleges. He said that the College gave its students a good course and should have this privilege.

Mr. Stephens thought that it would be advisable also to insert in the bill a clause giving those who had passed through the college courses the preference in cases of Government situations, etc. He said that something must be done for our young men, and that they should be encouraged to go to other countries where they found better employment and better pay. In England, India, the United States and other places graduates from Canada's Military College and other scholastic institutions are found occupying some of the highest positions, while here they are found doing menial work.

He thought that positions of emolument in the gift of the Government should be given to the best of our young men, though at present it is not done. THE ADMISSION TO THESE PROFESSIONS a more difficult instead of an easier matter, as is the present position. There are too many in the profession already, said the Hon. Commissioner of Crown Lands, and out of over 200 land surveyors in the Province there are about 70 who are absolutely without work except for small country jobs such as brought them little or nothing. He had had opportunity for seeing this since he had been Minister of Crown Lands, and he could say that if he had granted all the requests for work addressed to him both by surveyors and by members of the House, he would have had to pay for work to the extent of about \$100,000 a year. The Province had been already surveyed many times and there were now 7,000,000 acres of land in the Province, and he was stating that they did not obtain work they could not leave the country and go with their families to other countries. He, however, could not give any material assistance, though it always pained him to have to refuse applications for work coming from men who were anxious to do it.

The Hon. Mr. Taiton followed in a few remarks, stating his inability to go so far as to insert such a clause in the bill. Mr. H. B. Biggell moved the House into Committee of the Whole on the three following resolutions, all of which were adopted and read for the first time, the second reading being deferred until the next meeting of the House, namely, those respecting the public debt and respecting certain licenses and taxes, of which a synopsis was given in this morning's CHRONICLE.

SECTIONS AND TRANSFERS OF PROPERTY, which read as follows:—Resolved, 1. That on the sale, transfer, assignment or exchange of immovable property within the Province, except in cases of donation in the direct line, descending and ascending, or of exchange, there shall be levied and paid a tax of one cent per dollar upon the value of such immovable property, according to the value shown by the valuation which value shall be the bona fide value; but that, if such value is less than the municipal valuation for purposes of taxation, the latter shall be taken.

Resolved, 2. That all transmissions, owing to death, of the property in usufruct or enjoyment, of moveable and immovable property of the value of all liabilities to the following taxes, calculated upon the value of the property transmitted, after deducting debts and charges existing at the time of the death: 1. In the direct line, ascending or descending; between consorts; between father or mother in law and son or daughter-in-law; in estates of value which, after deducting debts and charges existing at the time of the death: (a) Does not exceed the sum of three thousand dollars, no tax shall be exigible. (b) Exceeds three thousand dollars, but does not exceed ten thousand dollars, one per cent. (c) Exceeds ten thousand dollars, but does not exceed fifty thousand dollars, one and a half per cent. (d) Exceeds fifty thousand dollars, but does not exceed one hundred thousand dollars, two per cent.
