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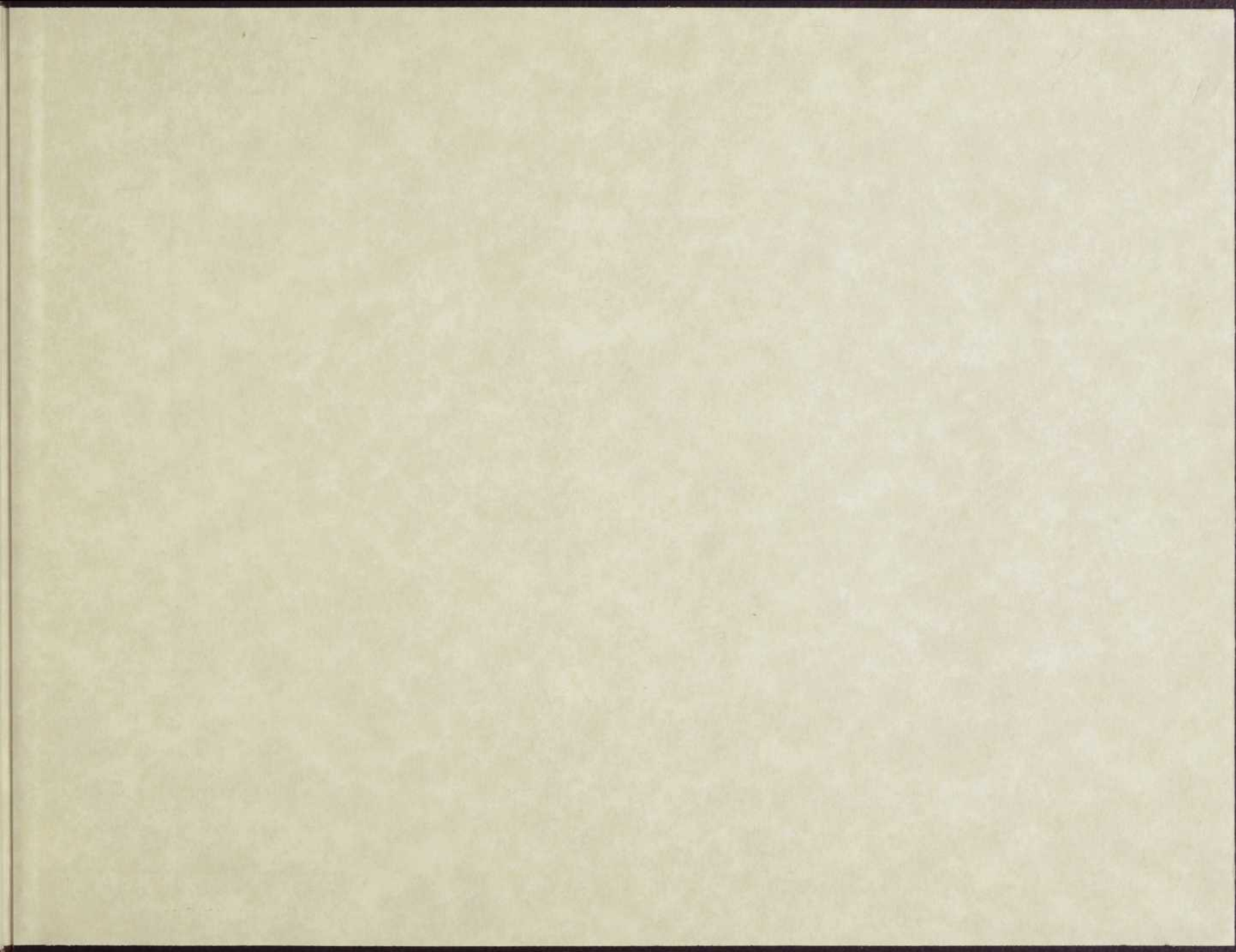
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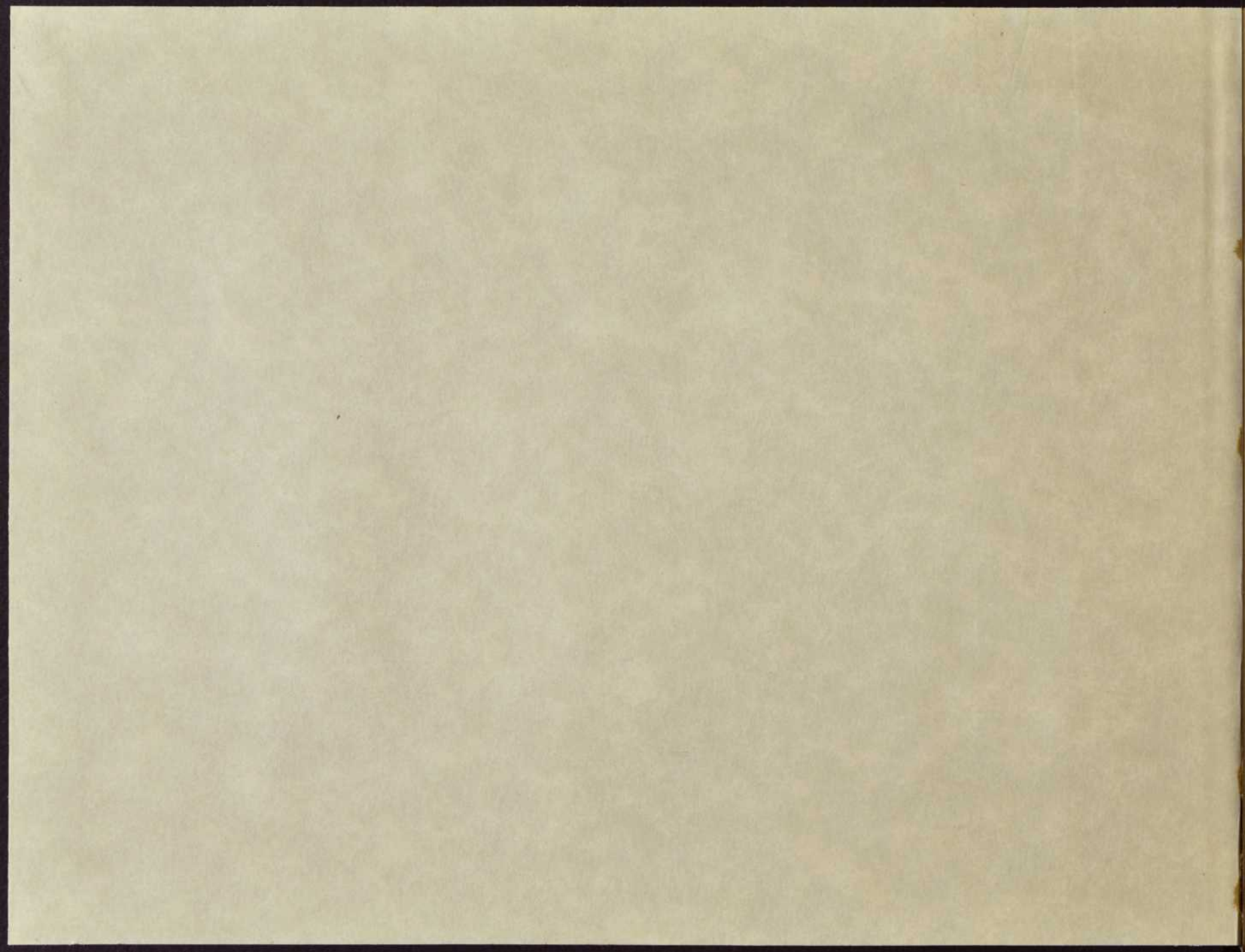

THE City of Sherbrooke, metropolis of the Eastern Townships, is situated at the Junction of the St. Francis and Magog Rivers, the latter of which has a fall of 120 feet within the city limits, and furnishes power for a large number of industries, with excellent opportunities for the establishment of several more wishing to utilize water power. During the past ten years the population has increased from 10,000 to 15,000 with every prospect of a still greater increase during the next few years.

The industries of Sherbrooke are many and varied, among the most important of which might be mentioned the following:—The Paton Manufacturing Co., The Sherbrooke Worsted Co., Adam Lomas & Son and the Magog Woolen Mills, manufacturers of tweeds, worsteds, yarns, blankets, pullman rugs, etc.; The Canadian Rand Company, The Jenckes Machine Company and the Imperial Pneumatic Tool Company, makers of all kinds of mining machinery, engines, boilers, water wheels, hoists, etc.; The Sherbrooke Iron Works, makers of saw mill supplies; The Moore Carpet Company; D. G. Loomis & Sons, J. D. Bush and A. Joncas, sashes, doors, etc.; The Geo. Long Manufacturing Company, one of the finest cabinet making shops in the Dominion; Alex. Ames and The Hovey Bros. Packing Company, pork packers; Walter Blue & Company, wholesale clothing manufacturers; W. R. Webster & Co. and The Sherbrooke Cigar Company, cigar manufacturers; Thompson & Company, bobbin manufacturers; P. Biron, carriages of all descriptions; The Modern Bedstead Company; The Peerless Jewellery Company; The Canadian Fairbanks Company and the shops of the Quebec Central Railway.

Sherbrooke possesses exceptional railway facilities, being on the main line of the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific Railways, also being the terminus of the Quebec Central and Boston & Maine, giving daily connection between all the large cities of the continent. Sherbrooke is also the centre of a fine agricultural and mineral country.

Among the mines might be mentioned The Capelton & Eustis Copper Mines, The Danville Asbestos Co., and the many asbestos mines on the line of the Quebec Central Railway at Thetford, Black Lake and Coleraine. Ordinary iron and chromic iron are also found in large quantities. It is safe to say that if but a fraction of the money that is put into the mineral provinces of the West was spent within a radius of sixty miles of Sherbrooke, the results would more than justify the investment.

Sherbrooke possesses all the features of a modern up-to-date city, with fine churches, schools, hotels, electric light, gas, street railway, hospitals, libraries, Y.M.C.A., daily and weekly papers, fire and police protection, water and sewer systems, and permission has just been granted to a Steam Heating Co. to instal that most modern method of heating throughout the city.

The City Council is composed of keen, wide-awake business men, who are always ready to offer reasonable inducements to any reliable firm wishing to establish here, and will be glad to hear from any firm who may contemplate locating in Canada.

The financial needs of the community are well looked after by the Eastern Townships Bank, which has its head office and one branch here, also by branches of the Merchants Bank of Canada, La Banque Nationale and La Banque d'Hochelega.

In conclusion, the scenery in and about Sherbrooke with its many lakes, rivers, hills and valleys cannot be surpassed, and it well deserves its name as "The Garden of the Province of Quebec."



SHERBROOKE FAIR, the greatest annual public exhibition of the products and progress of this part of the country, is this year given by the Eastern Townships Agricultural Association for the 23rd time. Since the establishment of the association by the enterprise, and harmonious effort of the principal public men and farmers from all portions of the Townships in 1885, the record of the organization has been one of steady advance. This year the fair, which is generally known as the "Great Eastern Exhibition," becomes the "Dominion Exhibition," having been granted the Dominion appropriation of \$50,000 and the Provincial grant of \$5,000 in addition to its annual grant of \$3,000 from the Provincial Government, and \$2,000 from the City of Sherbrooke.

These fairs have grown in fame until the first weeks in September, when they are held, have without further effort been made "old-home weeks" for thousands of Canadians now living in the United States, while they are recognized holidays for scores of thousands in Canada and the Provinces. The attendance has reached from 18,000 to 25,000 a day.

The association was founded in 1884, and was incorporated in 1885. The stock was taken by representative farmers and business men all over the Eastern Townships, and is still so held. The Association has 65 acres of ground at East Sherbrooke, on which—with the many well-designed buildings—more than \$75,000 has already been expended.

Many new buildings have been added to the plant, and most of the old ones have been enlarged or rebuilt. The grand stand, alongside the half-mile track, has been enlarged and now seats comfortably 8500 people. The track itself has been entirely resurfaced, and is faster than ever before, ranking well among the crack tracks of the East. The entrance has been entirely renovated, and a new gate has been built, with a drive-way up through the new land which was taken this spring.

A new dairy products building has been erected, 125 by 50 feet, with rear wing 25 by 40 and a front wing 12 by 40. The accommodation for poultry has been doubled. Handsome cattle sheds have been built, and now furnish accommodation for 1000 head.

The sheep and swine sheds come next, and furthest over are the horse sheds, in a regular, compact village. In all, the arrangements are such that the stock can easily be seen, and this with entire comfort to the most daintily-shod lady.

Three fire stations have been installed, affording ample protection, as they are well scattered about the grounds.

The old dining hall has been converted into a transportation building, for the exhibition of wheeled vehicles of all sorts. A number of smaller dining rooms have been erected with the expectation that the caterers can thus render better service.

A new arts building, in the lower story of which are shown the exhibits of the ladies' department, will also contain the government fisheries exhibit.

The "Midway," whose amusing barkers and cheap shows have come to be so prominent a feature of modern cattle shows, has been moved out into the broader space on the edge of the road at the north end of the grand stand.

The fair will be opened this year by the Minister of Agriculture, Honorable Sidney Fisher of Quebec, who heads the list of patrons. The fair will be visited by the Governor-General of Canada, on Tuesday of the second week.

The President of the Association is Mr. Alex. Ames, and the Honorary President is Dr. P. Pelletier, M.L.A., Mr. C. A. French is the Vice-President and Chairman of the Executive Committee, and Mr. W. M. Tomlinson, Secretary and Treasurer, is the person who has handled the multifarious details of preparation.

The program is the best ever given at Sherbrooke, and is quite the equal of any offered in Canada this year. The entry lists have filled so well that every foot of accommodation for exhibits of horses and cattle, of sheep, swine and poultry, of flowers and plants, of farm machinery and farm products, will be needed.

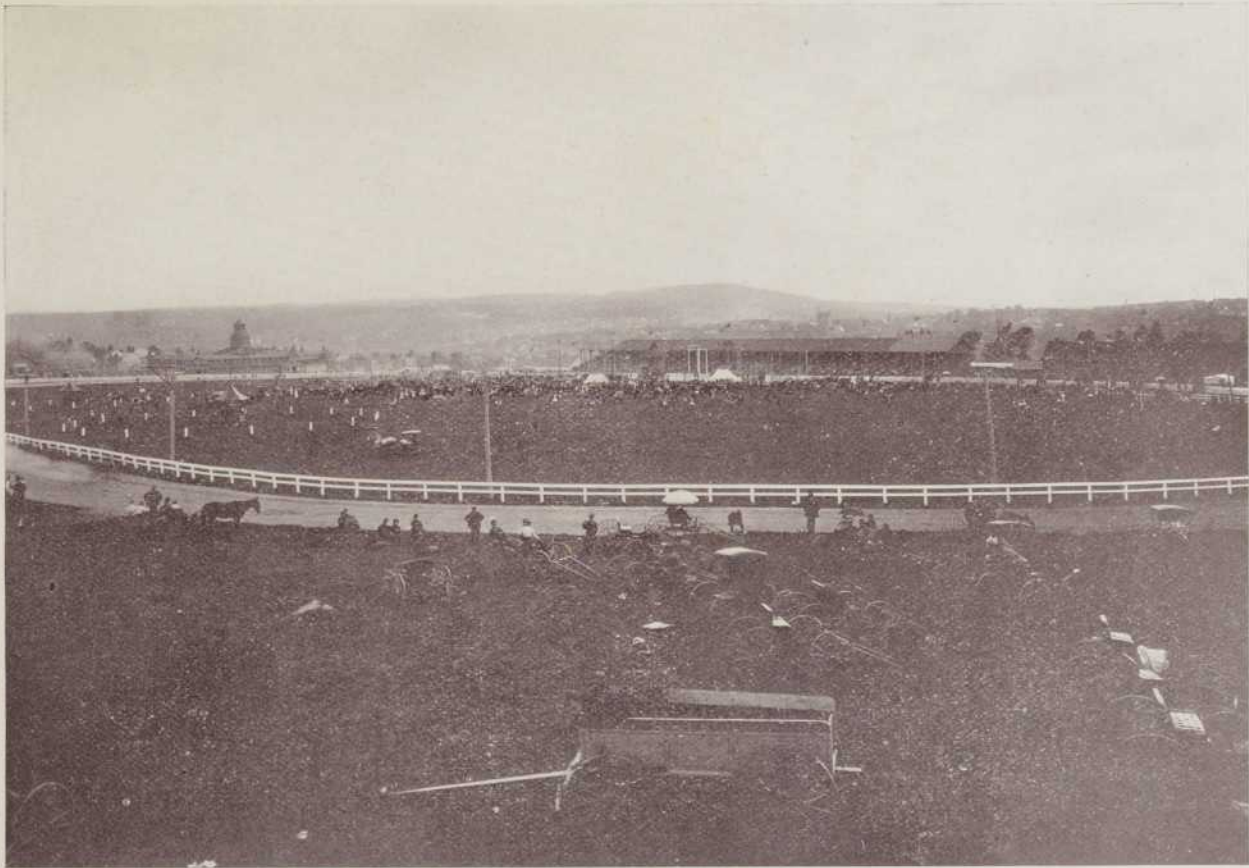
The four stake events promise good sport, and the class races will have some big fields. Horses are entered from as far South as Fall River, Mass., and marks are fairly sure to go. There are prizes in profusion and the Sherbrooke Fair racing is certain to be contested more fiercely than any races on the International circuit this year.

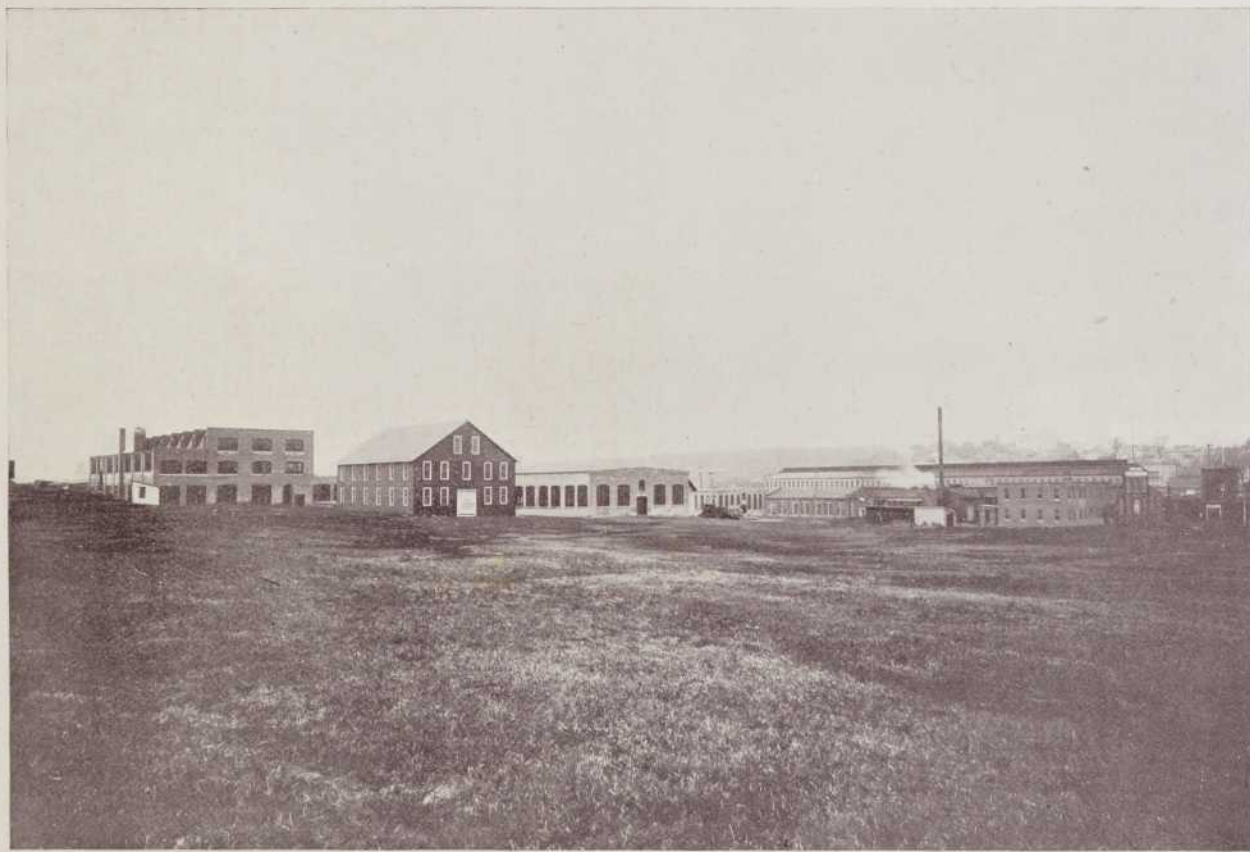

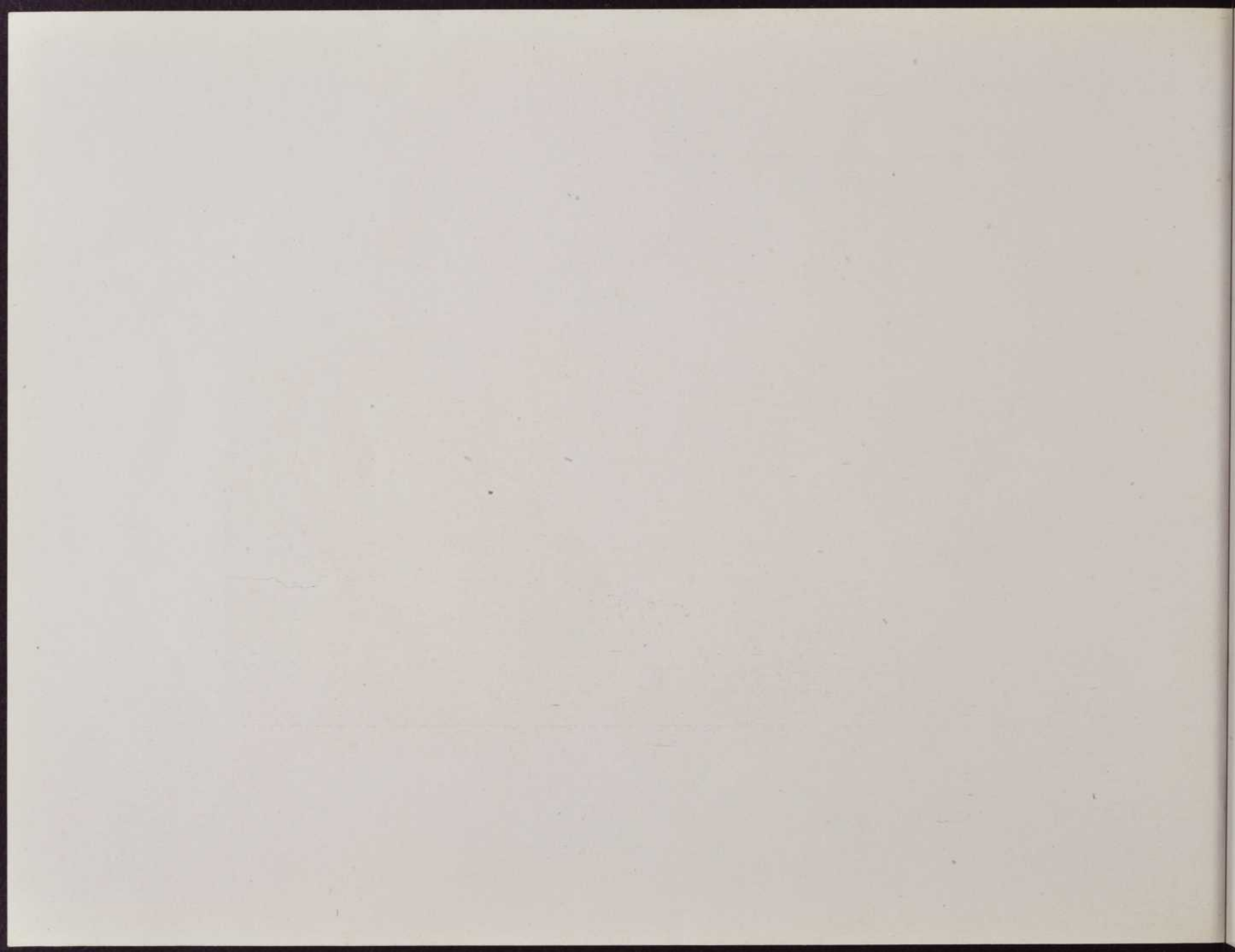


No. 1 FIRE STATION AND EQUIPMENT



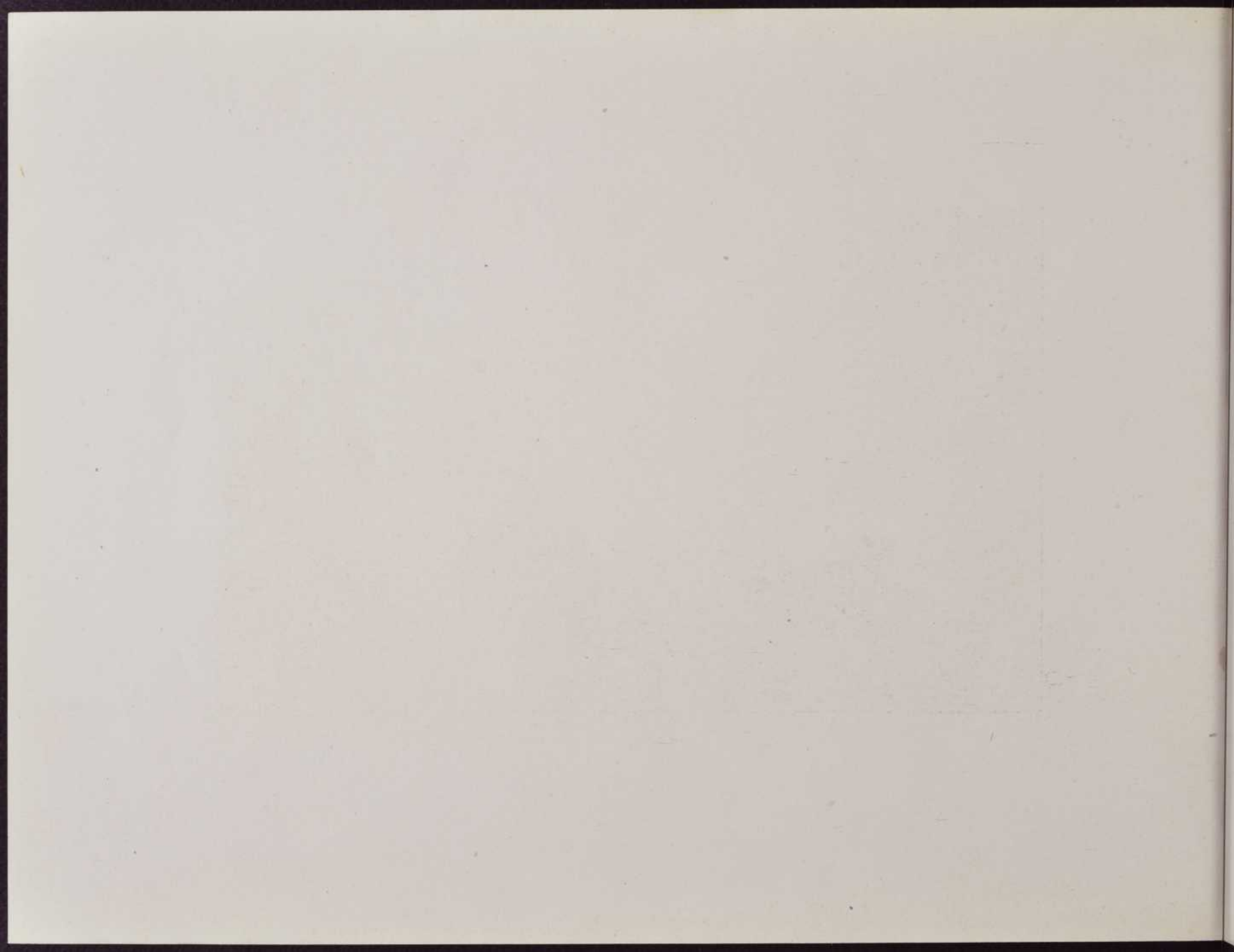

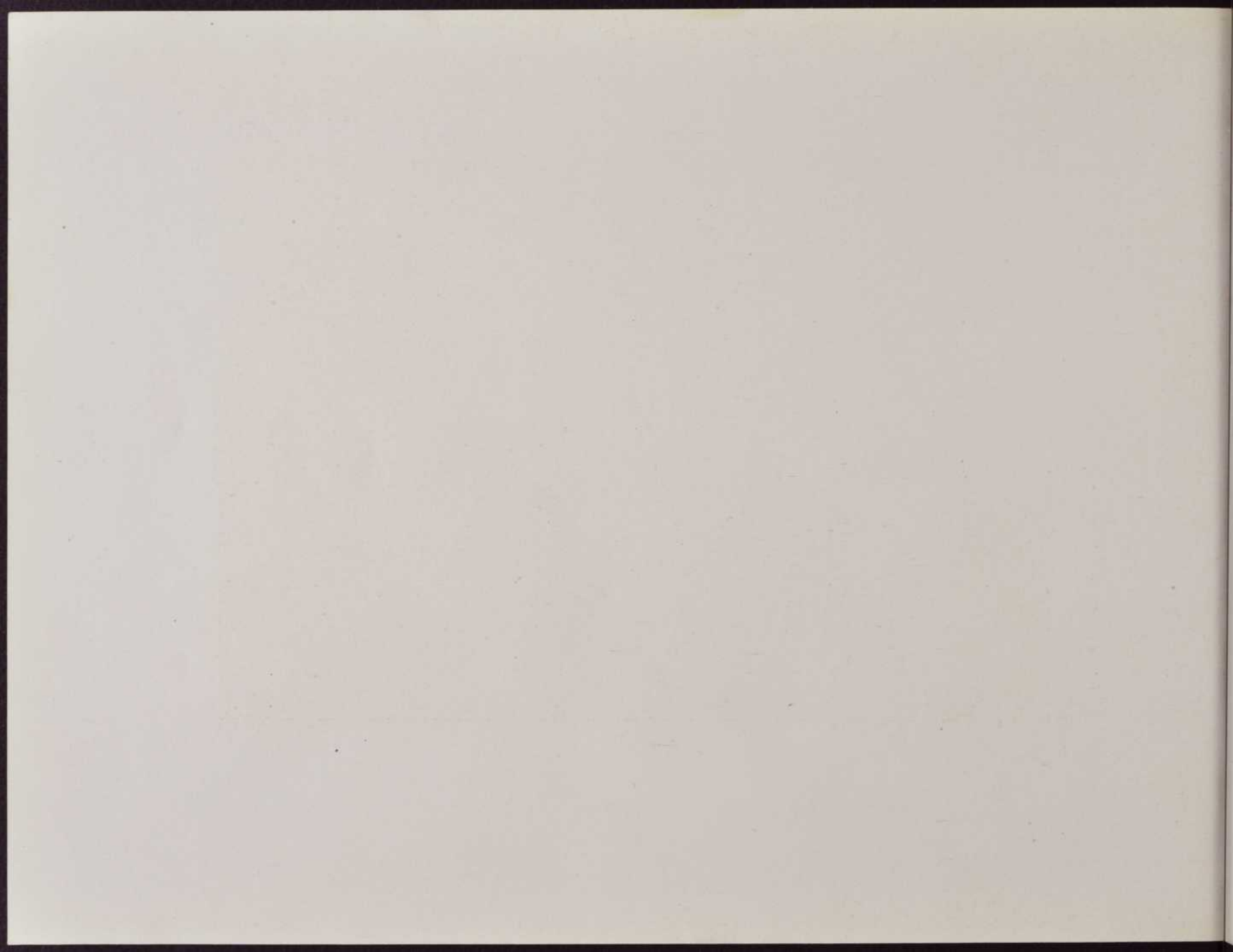


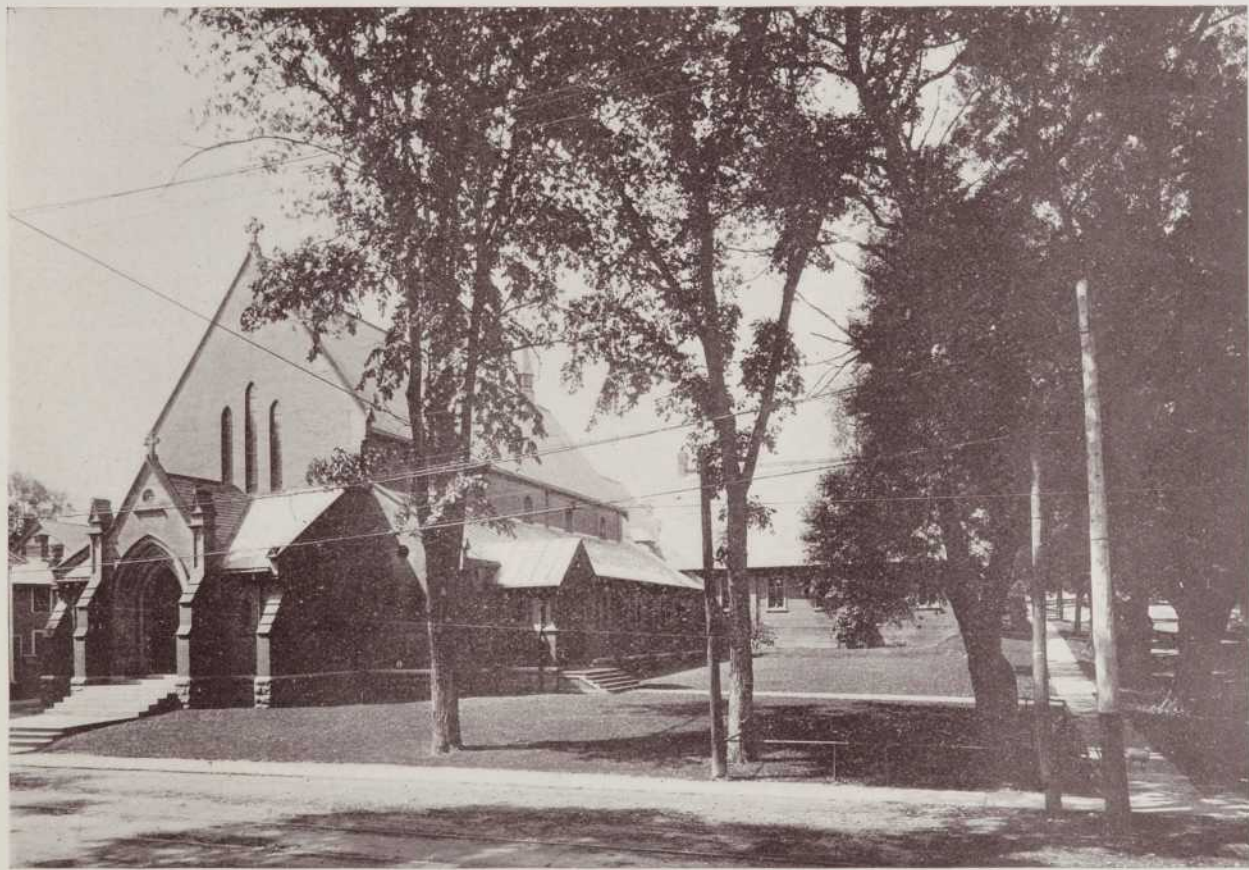
MAGOG RIVER. WATER POWER AT PATON WOOLLEN MILLS



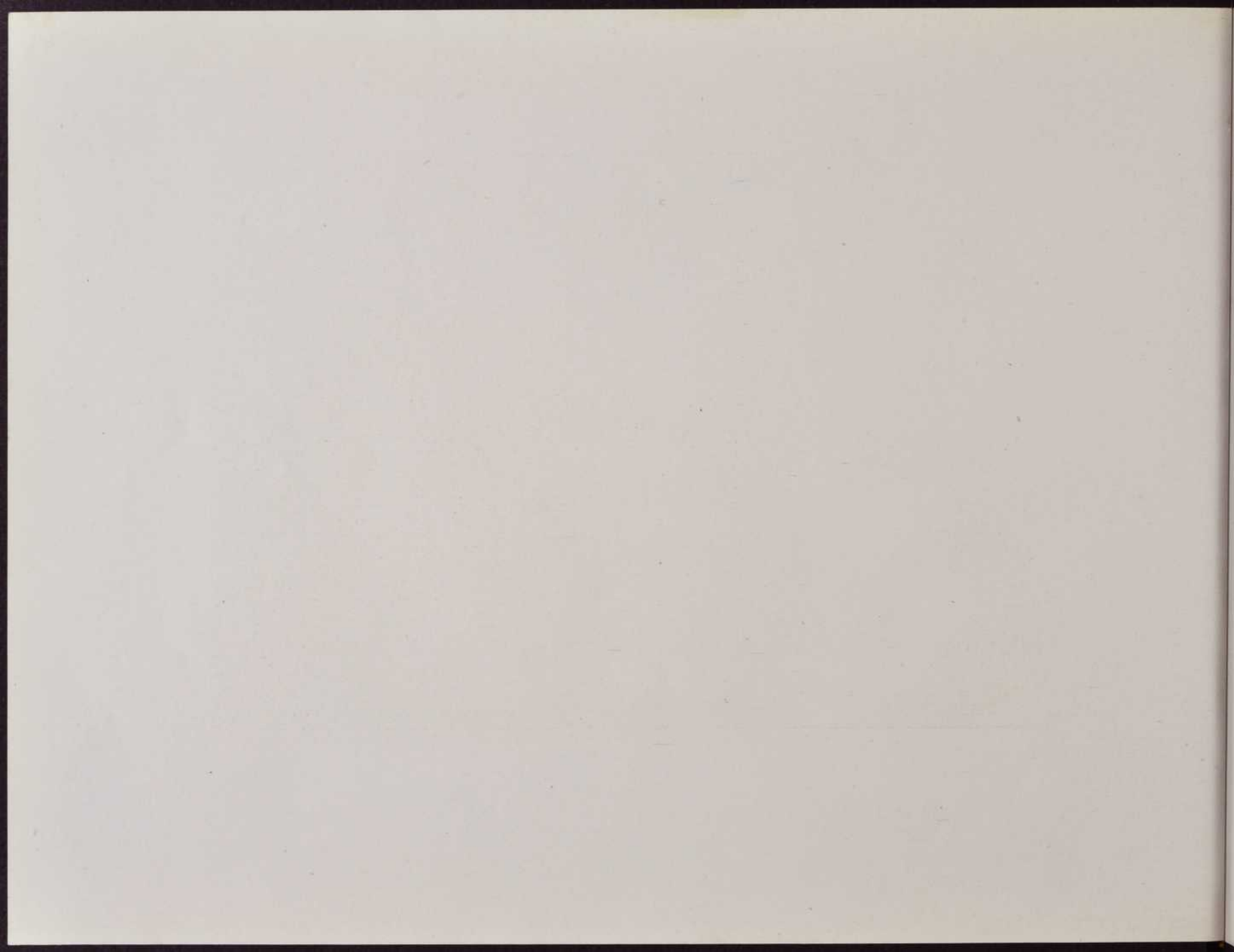


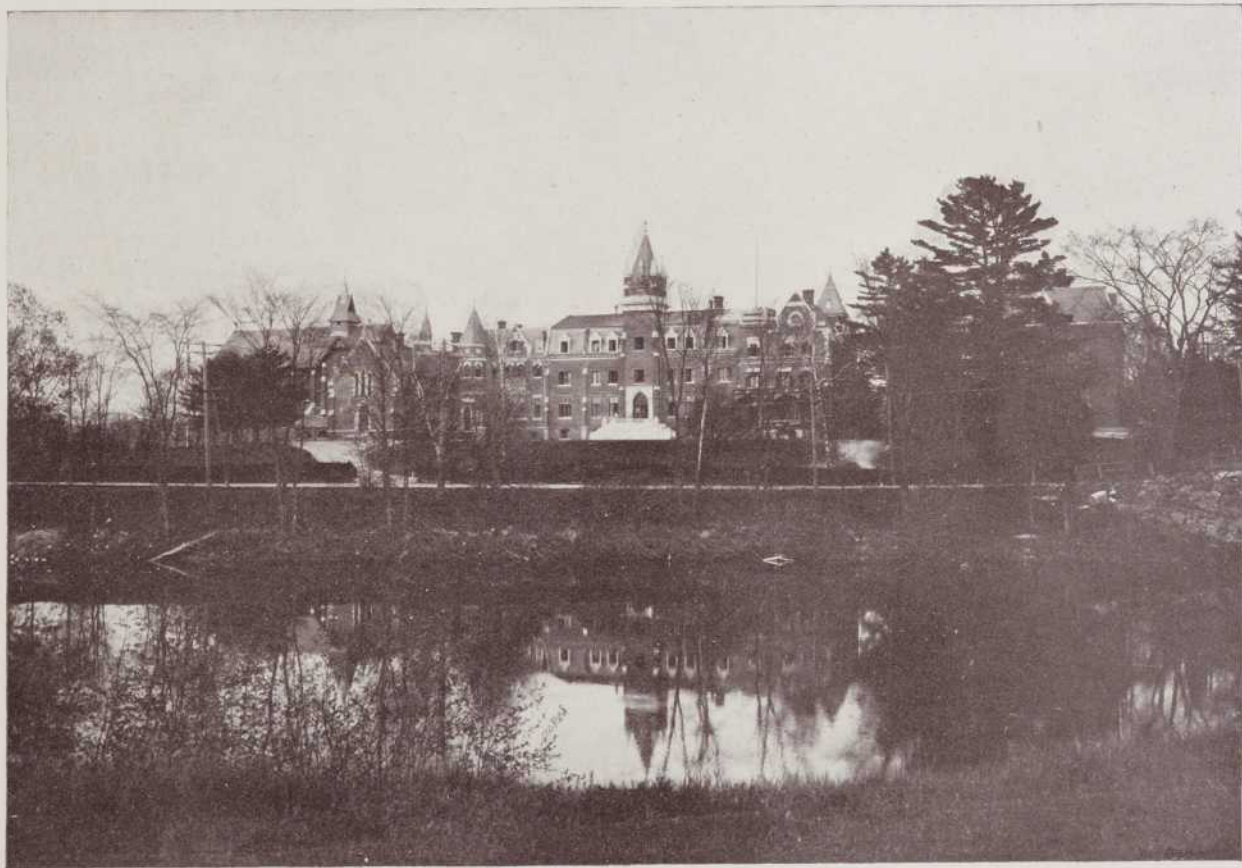
