

Fire department leads the way with 'fog' method

At a demonstration of fire fighting techniques held recently in Montreal West, representatives of the Westmount Fire Department could sit back and smile at what was considered by many of those present as a daring new method.

Being tested was the "fog" method of extinguishing fires, an operation which utilizes nozzles that

Hampstead. During the demonstration, which was scheduled to test the effectiveness of nozzles that shoot the water out in a fine spray rather than a stream, seven houses on Brock and Glencoe Ave., were set afire. The buildings, due to be demolished, were donated by the CNR.

shoot the water out in a fine spray rather than in a continuous stream. The water is pumped out in less volume but at higher pressure.

Westmount, as usual in the "avant garde" where efficiency is concerned, have used the method for the past 23 years.

MORE HEAT ABSORBED

The theory of the operation postulates that small particles of water, effectively spread about, will absorb more heat than the great quantity localized in a heavy stream. As the heat is thus diminished the fire will more quickly die out.

A useful side advantage is the lessening of fire damage to property.

Westmount fire officials bought their first "fog" equipment in 1935. It consisted of applicators for one inch lines and is still used for small fires.

In 1950, a number of fog type branches were purchased to fit one inch to two and one half inch hose. These are now used practically exclusively by the department.

Standard procedure for the firefighters is to enter a building with a one and one half inch fog line backed up, if necessary by the two and one half inch fog hose.

FIRE OUT FASTER

A fire confined to a room or some small area can be extinguished in this manner in less than ten minutes. Even larger blazes are much more quickly brought under control with fog equipment.

To make the procedure even more speedy, the lines are pre-connected to outlets on the pump trucks.

The demonstration in Montreal West completely vindicated the dependence of Westmount on "fog" for its fire protection. Staged by the Montreal West Fire Department, under the direction of C. L. Blickstead, fire consultant, the demonstration, during which seven houses were razed, contrasted the effectiveness of the stream and the spray methods.

The spray, or "fog", won the contest hands down. For almost a quarter of a century, Westmount has helped pioneer a method that is now becoming accepted as the "newest and best" method of fighting fires.

Planning must proceed on metropolitan level Dawson tells Rotary

"Though most of the municipalities adjacent to the City of Montreal don't want a Metropolitan Government, they recognize the fact that some planning on a metropolitan level must be done to cope with the predicted vast increase in urban population during the next quarter century." This was the expressed opinion of Reg Dawson, Mayor of the Town of Mount Royal who spoke to a luncheon meeting of the Westmount Rotary Club Wednesday.

Quoting from the Gordon Commission report, Mr. Dawson noted that, by 1980, Canada's population will have reached 20,000,000 and that three out of every four Canadians will reside in urban communities.

To keep pace with this growth of population, and the anticipated major shift from rural to urban living, Canada's municipalities must embark on large scale developments and improvements.

HOUSING

Housing is a major problem, with an estimated 3,000,000 ad-

ditional units required by 1980. Even now, the strain of building is beginning to wear on the municipalities.

Studies have shown that the average city can support a building rate of seven units per thousand population. This is calculated on the ability of the municipality to provide necessary services for the projects. At present, however, the building rate stands at 12 units per thousand population and indications are that it will rise in

the next 20 years to 15 units.

WATER AND SEWERS

Services such as water and sewers must be greatly extended to accommodate these new homes. In 1980, the Montreal metropolitan area will use two and one quarter billion gallons of water each day compared with a daily use of less than one billion gallons at present.

Expenditures on streets and highways must pass the billion mark each year (they were \$27,000,000 in 1953 and \$148,000,000 in 1957) and road length must be doubled. It is estimated that in 1980, there will be one car on the road for every one and one half persons, almost triple the number of autos now in use.

Public transportation systems must be expanded and improved and greater cultural and recreational facilities must be provided.

METROPOLITAN MONTREAL

In pointing out that suburban municipalities are against Metropolitan Government inasmuch as they wish to maintain their autonomy, Mr. Dawson also noted that some sort of metro-

Stubborn blaze finally quelled

politan organization was necessary and inevitable. In fact, he said, some form of metropolitan government for Montreal would be enacted in the fall session of the legislature.

Metropolitan Government, however, will not be a cure all. It is extremely unlikely that taxes will be lowered since expenses certainly will not go down.

"In fact," said Mr. Dawson, "if we are to be prepared for the tremendous growth in population and if we are to provide the services necessary, municipal and metropolitan expenses must be shared by higher levels of government."

MP promoted to captain

Ottawa — The announcement that Ross Webster, MP for St. Antoine-Westmount, has been made an acting Captain in the Royal Canadian Naval Reserve, has raised the question of whether the promotion was based on political considerations.

"It seems funny to me," one Ottawa observer said. "Webster takes the constituency away from George Marler, and shortly afterwards he gets his four stripes."

There is no political connection — Ottawa style — whatsoever connected with Mr. Webster's new rank.

"I can assure you the Navy is completely uninfluenced by whether a man wins or loses an election," said a spokesman at

National Defence Headquarters.

What the spokesman neglected to mention was that Ross Webster's captaincy does in fact involve a bit of politics — Navy style.

Until this week, Mr. Webster was a naval Commander. At this rank, he has reached the age of compulsory retirement.

But he has only a few months to go until he is entitled to the Long Service and Good Conduct Medal.

A small stratagem has therefore been devised. Commander Webster, formerly C.O. of the Training Station, HMCS Donnacona, in Montreal, transfers to HMCS Bytown, in Ottawa. He becomes an acting Captain, which means that his retirement age is boosted.

Therefore, he can stay in the Navy until he earns the Long Service Medal.

OTTAWA — Although Ross Webster and Egan Chambers represent adjoining Montreal ridings in the House of Commons, and although they actually share the same office, there is a considerable amount of quiet competition between the two.

The basic facts are these: Webster is the MP for St. Antoine-Westmount. Chambers, who was elected by the voters in St. Lawrence-St. George. The Island of Montreal, having swung surprising support behind the Progressive-Conservatives, is normally entitled to an English-speaking Parliamentary Secretary.

Chateau de Ramezay has historic past

Chateau de Ramezay, (a Canadian Historical Museum) was built in 1705, and is located at 290 Notre Dame street east, opposite the City Hall in the centre of downtown Montreal. This fine old castle like building came to life when Claude de Ramezay, eleventh governor of Montreal, laid its first stone. For his home and seat of Government he selected a neighborhood where dwelt Canada's fashionable society. Here he built this solid, unique house giving to his family a picturesque view of the mighty St. Lawrence bathing the noble shores of historical St. Helen's Island. Surrounded by notables, Baron de Longueuil, the Contrecoeurs, the d'Echambaults, the d'Aillebousts and Madame de Portneuf, this home perched atop a small hill, overlooked to the north, the little St. Martin river, and the beautiful gardens of the Jesuit Fathers.

De Ramezay built well, for his walls, still standing in good condition today, were originally made of stone and to a thickness of three feet; his vaults were not only fireproof but also bullet proof. Even the second floor story was made of stone slabs laid on hand hewn wooden beams.

Could these stones but speak they would unfold many tales of dangerous historical travels to Hudson's Bay, the Mississippi, Louisiana, the foothills of the Rockies and to other unexplored unknown parts of North America. "Coureurs de Bois" came

Newman works like a beaver

At 34 outgoing John Seymour Newman, president of the Beaver Construction Company, can be described as an unqualified success.

He is at the helm of a thriving concern operating between Halifax and Winnipeg which already has completed four-year jobs at both Camp Gagetown, New Brunswick, and the St. Lawrence Seaway, and among other

new townsite at Elliott Lake where billions are being spent on accommodation for the miners.

"The place has grown from nothing to a population of 17,000 and in the next 18 months is expected to reach 25,000.

"We have hacked out two neighborhoods out of virgin territory — the wilderness and mountainside. These neighborhoods are towns in themselves which will be grouped into a city and we hope to get the bid on a third one. Each neighborhood has 2,000 homes and will accommodate 7,000 people."

Big sewer

The company is now engaged in the biggest single contract of its history — right through the heart of Kingston, Ontario.

Beaver Construction held 11 of the 14 contracts at Cornwall to move the four towns of Iroquois, Long Sault, Ingleside and Morrisburg for the Seaway.

"At Camp Gagetown we cleared and grubbed, knocking down trees and opening up space for roads, camps and the training area," Newman said. "At Red Lake, 400 miles north of Winnipeg, we completed a town site for gold miners."

Johnny is the son of F. E. Newman, chairman of the board of Musson's Canada Limited, and Mrs. Newman. He was born in Margate, England. His father had stayed in England after serving in the First World War and married there. His father and mother came to Montreal when Johnny was a year old.

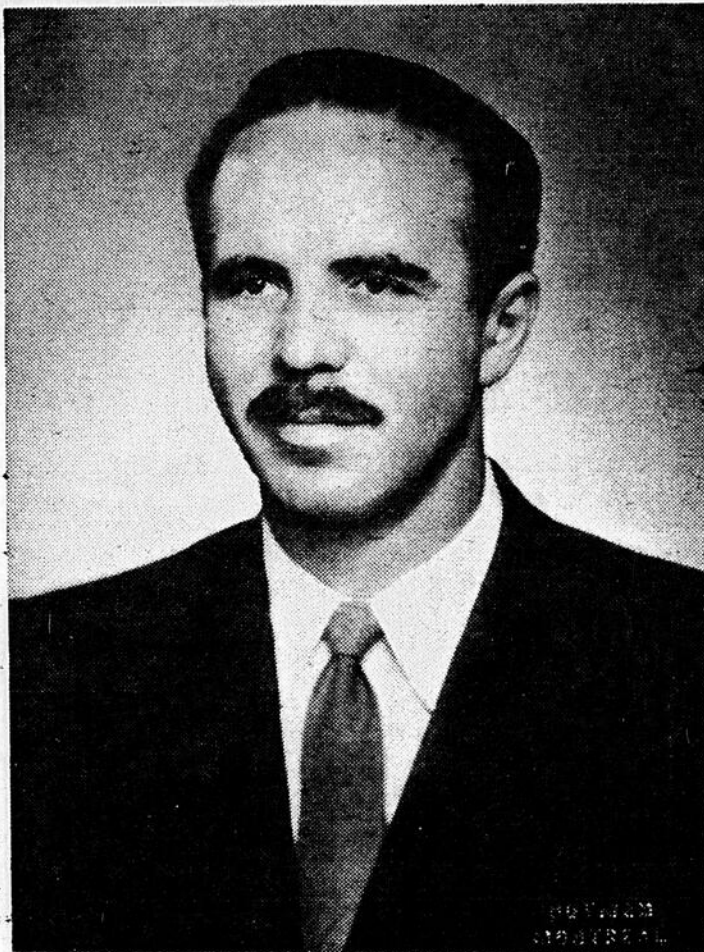
Famous play

Educated in Westmount schools, he drove a bulldozer for a year before joining the army as a buck private. He went overseas as a corporal and was the youngest Canadian to go through Sandhurst Royal Military College, graduating in 1944. At demobilization he was a lieutenant in the Grenadier Guards. After the war he entered McGill. "My most famous or infamous claim to fame is the time in 1949 I was playing senior football for McGill, received a bump on the head, and ran the wrong way during a game with Toronto," said Newman. "They stopped me before I scored for Toronto but I still meet people who call 'Hi, Wrongway'."

In 1951 Johnny married Kathryn Keyes, a secretary at McGill University, who hailed from California. Their five children are Nancy, 6, Peter, 5, Jock, 2, Claire, 1, and Kathryn, 3 weeks.

Johnny is vice-president of the Royalmount Kiwanis Club, a director of the Association of the Help of Retarded Children, a Sunday school teacher at Dominion Douglas Church where for 11 years he was in the Cubs and Scouts and later served as a Scoutmaster.

"I guess I am the dirtiest white collar worker ever," he says. "I find myself in sewers, tunnels, with buildings coming down around me. Most of our work is earth moving, rock work and pipelines. We have seven shovels on the Trans Canada pipe line between Capaskasing to Nippigon . . . After the army it was a short step from tanks to bulldozers and then through to shovels, trucks and other allied heavy equipment. I work with a bunch of wonderful fellows and we all work hard for our mascot, Jo Beaver."

major projects is now engaged in hacking out a townsite in the Canadian wilderness at the uranium centre of Elliott Lake, 600 miles north west of here.

Beaver Construction has three affiliated companies under the same management — Beaver Demolitions, founded six years ago and now the biggest demolition concern in the country; Clanbrock Realities; and Beaver Quarries with 2,000,000 feet of land in the East End. The office is at 6825 Clanranald avenue.

The company employs four engineers in addition to Foot and Newman. They are Arch Savery, who is setting up the new Beaver Quarries; Basil Smith, a civil engineer with a post graduate degree of Quebec Land surveyor; Bonar Lindsay, a mechanical engineer; and John Dow, who graduated this year.

Executive vice-president is Russ Scrim, a former banker. Secretary treasurer is Bernard Lortie, a McGill commerce graduate. Project manager at Elliott Lake is Bill Lothian. He executives are all in their 30's.

him when he is absent from the House, and taking charge of the detail work of the minister's department, as it affects Parliament.

It is, obviously, an important position — one, in fact, which could conceivably lead ultimately to a cabinet appointment.

Egan Chambers has been doing a bit of quiet lobbying in his own behalf — getting to know members of the cabinet on a first-name basis, and so forth.

Ross Webster, in contrast, has been letting his family name, his wealth and his social business connections speak for him. He knows a great many of the

cabinet from previous dealings of one kind and another, and he represents Montreal's most important constituency, money-wise.

The betting here is that if it comes to a choice between the two, Webster will get the nod.

But this raises the question: When is Prime Minister Diefenbaker going to announce the new appointments?

Quite a bit of resentment has been generated within Tory ranks by Mr. Diefenbaker's stalling tactics. He has a stock answer to queries on when he will name the parliamentary secretaries: "Next weekend."

Perhaps, therefore, today or tomorrow will see Webster moving out of his back-bench seat to a more important locale on the cabinet side of the House.

here as did many Indians, some to be entertained, some to be carefully warned lest they scheme dark attack against the French; other savages came to receive presents of friendship or be shown the "great fire" of white man's cannon and to hear its loud "thunder noise".

Through the portals of this Chateau passed all the notables of de Ramezay's age. As Governor then as Commander of all Militia in Canada and later as Administrator of the Governor Generalship, he was wont to entertain many important visitors to Montreal. After his death de Ramezay's heirs sold the Chateau to the "Compagnie des Indes" in 1745, who in turn sold it to the British Government. At this time after the Cession in 1760, this Chateau was used as residence for English Governors and later, General Montgomery occupied it as headquarters for his Continental Army. Benjamin Franklin occupied it too, and persuaded Mesplet of Philadelphia to set up his printing presses in the Chateau vaults. Finally, after becoming the seat of the special Council, established to conduct the affairs of Canada, during suspension of Parliament under Lord Durham, it became a Court House, then a Normal School, and finally it was procured by its present owners, the Antiquarian and Numismatic Society of Montreal. Under their

An ancient fashionable "Caleche" stands beside Montreal's first automobile; early fire-fighting pumps stand in line with canoes of bark and dugouts from solid tree trunks; there are water pipes too, made of hollowed-out wooden logs. The economic evolution of our country can be traced by studying the large collection of money, medals and bank bills, which may be found in the numismatic cabinet. Numerous other relics line the walls, and fill the cases; eloquent reminders of Canada's great heritage.

Big send-off given athletes as they sail for Empire games

THERE were some tears — there were some smiles and the army band music on the wharf sent a funny feeling down your spine and you repeated to yourself that it was "good to be a Canadian."

That's the picture we got as 117 athletes and officials among the passenger list of 1050 left Montreal Tuesday from CPs shed 8 aboard the Empress of England for Liverpool. Some 2500 saw this liner sail.

It was the Canadian contingent for the British Empire Games, who will compete in Cardiff, Wales, July 18 to July 26. With their bright red blazers and the women athletes with their red blazers, white shoes with red trim and their white hats with red trim that supplied the color under a hot sun.

Amateur and professional photographers had a field day

on the sun deck and the parents and friends were also snapping pictures. The athletes were also armed to the teeth with cameras and light meters and not missing a picture that they could put in their scrap book for later years.

When the Empress pulled away from the wharf at noon, Tuesday, friends and parents left behind tried to hold onto the paper streamers as long as possible. If anything, the Canadian team along with the other passengers had a farewell that will long be remembered in Montreal.

For some of the athletes it was their first trip away from home, at least a long trip, the team will be away five weeks, for others it is old stuff. Gerald Gratton, weightlifter, sixth trip, three Olympics and three British Games. Gladys Priestley, swimmer, one time youngest member of a Canadian Olympic team, her fifth.

Miss Priestley earned honors on two Olympic teams and two BEG and on Pan American. But this will be her last for she will be married in February of next year.

The leader of the team, Jack Davies took along his son Bruce and Mrs. Davies. Among the veteran members of the team was George Tully of NDG, who, as a fencer was a member of the Olympic team that took part in the 1936 games in Berlin, and three years later the man who put on the show, Hitler tried to beat the world.

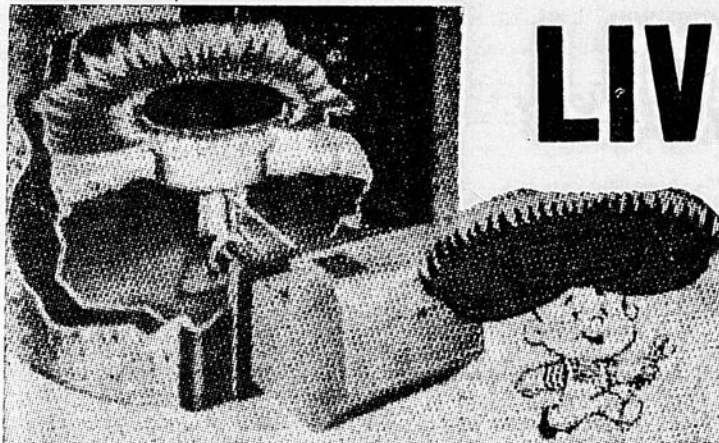
