CABLE.

STATE OF IRELAND.

LONDON, Sept. 16.—The Liberal press of England insists that the rapidly increasing crime in Ireland, including the killing of Constable Wicelan, who was murdered by the moonlighters, is directly traceable to the Coercion Act. The predictions made when the Act was passed are now being fulfilled, they say, and none but the Government can be blamed. The leaders of the National Irish League threaten to cease their efforts to control the people unless England will alleviate the harshness with which it is now treating Ireland. It is however, a matter of grave doubt if the leaders could now control the wrought up passions of their countrymen. The priests, too, to whom the Irish always have rendered implicit obedience, are losing their influence in checking the people. A crisis seems certainly at hand. Mr. Balfour is at present in Dublin preparing for the siege and the battle, the rumblings of which already begin to be heard, will soon begin in earnest.

THE HANGMAN IN GAOL.

At the Doncaster races yesterday the police arrested a man named Berry, who is a professional hangman. Becoming excited in a heated dispute over a racing matter Berry pulled out a revolver and pointed it at his opponent. He is detained in gaol awaiting the decision of the Home Secretary.

THE KAISER.

STETTIN, Sept. 16.—The Emperor William had a fainting fit after the banquet on Wednesday. On recovering he retired supported by his physicians and valet. He was well to-day and attended the Nobility banquet.

THE LIBERAL AND NATIONAL LEAGUES.

LONDON, Sept. 16.—The Council of the Liberal League has invited the leaders of the Irish National League to discuss the feasibility of starting branches of the Liberal League in Ireland wherever National League branches are suppressed by the Government.

AMERICAN.

EDISON LOOKING FOR GOLD.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 16.—Information has been received here that Thomas Edison, the electrician, will soon build a winter home at the new town of the Rinalito, Butte County, this state. He has been for several years experimenting with a black sand deposit from this county and endeavoring to extract the gold contained therein, and a large laboratory will be built at the Rinalito similar to the one at Fort Meyers, Fla., which has hitherto been his winter home.

DIED AT THE ORGAN.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Sept. 15.—Prof. Edo Rhodius, a prominent musician of this city, died yesterday under most peculiar circumstances. About 3 o'clock he visited Oddfellows' Hall, in the third story of the Lodge building, for the purpose of regulating and tuning the organ. He was alone in the Lodge room, and people in the streets below heard him play two or three airs on the organ. About 5 o'clock one of his friends began looking for him, and traced him to Oddfellows' Hall, which he immediately visited. On entering the room he saw Rhodius sitting before the organ, leaning over a little, grasping a key with his right hand. He spoke to him, but received no reply. Upon closer inspection it was discovered that Prof. Rhodius had been dead fully an hour. The summons must have come instantly, for the dead musician's head was turned with the ear toward the keyboard, as though listening for the false note. Death resulted from apoplexy. Although only 33 years of age, deceased was one of the finest organists in the South.

YACHTING.

SANDY HOOK, Sept. 16.—8:45 a.m.—The "Thistle" is coming into the lower bay. She has her mainsail, forestaysail and one jib aloft and is going through the water very fast. She will go over the course with the "Mayflower" and "Volunteer." The race to-day will probably be to leeward and return.

SANDY HOOK, N.J., Sept. 16, 8:25 a.m.—It blew a perfect gale at this point all night. At three o'clock this morning the wind had a velocity of 25 miles an hour, and it came out of the north-west. It shifted to the west at daylight and fell a trifle. At this hour it is coming out of the west north-west, and has a speed of 20 miles an hour. The chances are that it will continue and that the yachts will sail the first of the trial races to-day.

A BAD ACCIDENT.

A fine little three-year-old girl, youngest child of Mr. Tarte of *Le Canadien*, fell from a window in the third story of her father's office yesterday and sustained injuries which will probably result in her death. But for the fact that her fall was somewhat broken by a sailor of "La Minerve" who happened to be passing in the street underneath at the time, she would have been killed outright.

A SHOCKING CALAMITY.

A horrible accident occurred at La Bonne Ste. Anne during the great ceremony there on Wednesday. The villagers were firing salutes in honor of the Cardinal and Bishops when, owing to the heated condition of one of the cannon used, the charge prematurely exploded, breaking both the arms of a man named Sylvain and so mangled the head of another man named Biledeau that he cannot possibly recover.

Madame Garneau's funeral yesterday was one of the largest ever seen here. All the local ministers, the judiciary and the City Council attended. Sheriff Chauveau, of Montreal, was among the pall bearers.

A MADMAN'S SAIL.

A deranged man named Lizotte, residing at Hedleyville, just outside the city, got possession of his brother-in-law's boat a couple of days ago and started in it to sail for England. When last seen he was off the Montmorency Falls, succumbing before a heavy south-west wind.

OTTAWA, September 15.—His Excellency the Governor-General has been pleased to appoint Thursday, the 17th of November, a day of thanksgiving.

WEATHER REPORT.

METEOROLOGICAL OFFICE, Toronto, Sept. 16, 1 a.m.—A depression is setting in over the North-West, with higher temperature and continued fine weather. In the Lake and Eastern districts the pressure is still increasing; light rain has fallen in Southern Ontario, but otherwise the weather is fine everywhere. TRANSATLANTIC.

Inspector Roughton, of the Kilkenny police, has resigned as a protest against the conduct of the police at Mitchellstown.

The Killarney workhouse has been partly burned. It is suspected the fire was incendiary.

MEETING OF IRISH LANDLORDS.

DUBLIN, Sept. 15.—At a Conference of Irish landlords, held here to-day, resolutions that the present rents prevailing in Ireland are excessive, or that general and reasonable abatements have been refused during times of distress. Rents have not been raised in Ireland during the period between 1840 and 1880, whereas in England, Scotland and Wales rents in the same time were increased 34 and 49 percent.

THE DOMINION CAPITAL. THE FISHERIES QUESTION.

By this week's English mail the Government received important despatches from the Imperial Government relative to the proposed Fisheries Commission. It is understood that negotiations are not sufficiently far advanced to permit of an official statement as to the scope of the commission.

PEACE RESTORED.

Information has been received here that peace has been restored among the Kootenay District Indians, Chief Isadore surrendering to the British Columbia authorities the two prisoners charged with murder, and promising to maintain order in future.

ALL MOONSHINE PROBABLY.

Inspector Inkerman, of Halifax, has telegraphed the Department of Agriculture that he knows nothing about the existence of cattle disease there, which has been reported with much exaggeration in American newspapers.

MORRISBURG, Ont., Sept. 15.—The Dundas County Exhibition, which opened here to-day, was without doubt the best of the kind ever held in this section of the country. By order of the Government the following day the paper issued a formal denial of this statement and offered an apology. It was supposed that the matter was thus ended. To-day, however, it is learned that the German Charge d'Affaires at Constantinople has sent a note to the Porte requesting that a German warship be allowed to pass through the Dardanelles en route to Bulgaria and thus demand satisfaction.

COMTE DE PARIS' MANIFESTO.

CALM VIEWS ON THE MATTER.

PARIS, Sept. 15.—It is reported that the Government is preparing a reply to the manifesto of the Comte de Paris, explaining the policy it intends to pursue in the coming session. The Temps, commenting on the manifesto, says: "The document will have no disquieting influence on the country. It will only excite and embarrass the Right to rapprochement with the Government. It indicates between the Comte's views and the Caesarian doctrine of empire that the monarchy can only be restored through a violent internal crisis and the triumph of anarchy. Republicans whose political experience continues to increase will not affect the monarchy that chance."

THE PANT FOR REVENGE.

DELLIGENT SPEECHES THAT MAY AROUSE TECTONIC IRE.

PARIS, Sept. 15.—At a military banquet given in Toulouse last evening General Breaux, commander of the Thirteenth Army Corps, declared that France now knew her strength, and that she was ready and awaited revenge. M. Coles, member of the Chamber of Deputies, said the recent mobilizing expedition showed that the army was now in a position to give France the revenge for which she impatiently waited. The evening papers endeavor to soften the effects of these speeches, and assert that no importance must be attached to them.

AMERICAN.

A compromise has been agreed upon between the Philadelphia and Reading Coal and Iron Company and their miners. It is the prevailing opinion that the strike will come to a speedy end in other districts.

LEGISLATING AGAINST VERMIN.

A PECULIAR CIRCUMSTANCE.

HELENA, Mont., Sept. 15.—The special session of the fifteenth Legislative Assembly adjourned last evening. Probably never before has it been the case that prairie dogs and ground squirrels necessitated a special session of a legislature, but such was the case in Montana. The Legislature last winter authorized a bounty of 10 cents for prairie dogs and 5 cents for ground squirrels, and to date the territory has paid for 698,971 ground squirrels and 153,700 prairie dogs, or a total of \$50,000. The Bounty Act had exhausted the money in the treasury, and was rapidly running the territory into debt. The Governor, with permission of the President, called a special session and the law was repealed.

THE CONDEMNED ANARCHISTS.

CHICAGO, September 15.—It did not appear when the Anarchists emerged from their cells to take exercise this morning that the fatal news of yesterday had any impression on them. The representative German paper of this city, the Staats Zeitung, which has hitherto been in favor of the execution of the Anarchists, comes out this morning in an editorial somewhat supporting a commutation of sentence.

(Special to the Witness.) KINGSTON, Sept. 15.

AN ANNOYING REGULATION.

Under recent instructions from Washington consular certificates issued at interior ports on merchandise for the United States must be countersigned at the port where the change of

vessels is made. The lumber dealers of Deseronto and points along the Rideau canal are protesting against the annoyance.

THE HAY CROP.

The hay crop of the district is not the perfect failure it was thought to be. It is getting too high to warrant large exports.

DESTRUCTIVE BUSH FIRES.

The bush fires are now doing a great deal of damage. Eganville is surrounded by them, but those at Galvin lake are the most serious. The farmers have been battling against them for days and to very little purpose. Valuable property is being destroyed at Ompah, barns and crops and miles of fencing are being destroyed by the flames.

A GREAT GATHERING ON GERMANIA DAY.

A GATHERING IN WHICH THE GERMAN ELEMENT IS VERY APPARENT—FIFTY THOUSAND PEOPLE PRESENT ON CITIZENS' DAY—BOMB THINGS WHICH PEOPLE ARE LOOKING AT. (From Our Special Reporter.) TORONTO, Sept. 13, 1887.

As anticipated, the official returns show that very nearly 50,000 people were at Exhibition Park yesterday, and nearly as many are there to-day. The majority of those present to-day are from the country, Waterloo County supplying several thousands. These were accompanied by the celebrated Berlin Musical Society's Band, which was listened to with delight.

THE HORSE RING.

perhaps, is one of the most attractive features of the exhibition. Here all day long is a variety of entertainment which fixes a large number to the grand stand seats, and a larger number to standing positions around the fence. There are running and trotting races, and exhibits of stock, interspersed with exercises on the trapeze and other like amusements, while the Royal Grenadiers' Band is almost continuously playing. There are also drill exhibitions, standing team races in which two young ladies compete, and there was advertised a balloon ascension, but the balloon had not arrived on Monday, and to-day it was found that it would not hold gas enough to carry the two daring trapeze artists who were to perform in mid air.

THE ZOOLOGICAL GARDENS.

are also a great attraction. This is the best attempt yet made in Canada for a standing collection of animals. It does not yet compare with the great "Zoo" of London, England, but Ald. Piper is confident that the time will come when its value as an educator will be recognized throughout the Dominion. On Friday he gave some 2,000 free tickets to school children, and it is safe to say that nearly every one admitted a pair of sparkling eyes before the iron bars of the roomy cages at the Zoo. While the specimens of animals are not numerous, they are in most cases very fine.

THE Y.M.C.A. TENT.

is a feature of this exhibition. It stands beside the main building and is a pleasant resort for many tired people who are anxious for a relief from the distractions of Vanity Fair. On Saturday a new institution in Canada called the Bible wagon was on the grounds. It is a beautiful van, in shape something like an ambulance. On its black polished sides are painted in brilliant letters appropriate texts of Scripture. Inside are an organ and shelves of books, principally Bibles, Testaments, tracts and hymn books. At the end is a footboard on which stands the evangelist who addresses the audience he or she may meet on their journey. This wagon on Saturday was in charge of Miss Macpherson and two young men who in a few weeks will be on their way to China where they will engage in mission work. It is proposed to send this wagon throughout the Province and good results are expected therefrom. The Bible Society has a very neat building on the grounds.

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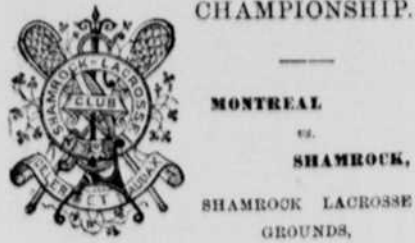
