THE DEMERS MURDER TRIAL. GRANT TRUNK RAILWAY. THE RECENT CABINET MEETING. A Defaulting Bank Teller's Plunder—Toronto's Water Supply Condit.

QUEBEC. MONTREAL, Sept. 28.—In the Demers murder trial this morning, Dr. Johnston produced the vertebrae of the neck of the deceased and the Court ordered that he be dissected to ascertain if the spinal marrow had been injured, as claimed by the experts for the defence, which may have caused instantaneous rigidity. Mr. Demers, one of Demers' neighbors, swore that he saw the deceased in her yard shortly after 12 o'clock on the day of the murder. She could have no doubt upon that ground, Demers will not be put on the witness stand to testify in his own behalf before Monday. The trial will end about Thursday next, having lasted five days, the longest yet in the history of the Province.

ONTARIO. ORTAWA, Sept. 28.—Mr. D. Girouard, Q.C., M.P., has been appointed to the Supreme Court in the place of Justice Fournier, who recently retired. It is reported from Victoria, B.C., that the Premier of the International Commission, which is to sit on the sealers' award, is in that city, where evidence will be more easily secured than anywhere else. Mr. P. G. Gaudet, M.P., Battery, Royal Canadian Artillery, Kingston, has been appointed Superintendent of the Carriage Factory in Quebec.

FRANCE. PARIS, Sept. 28.—Prof. Louis Pasteur, the distinguished chemist and discoverer of the Pasteur treatment of the cure of rabies, is dead. He died at his residence at Garches, near St. Cloud. His death was caused by paralysis. BOURGNESE, Sept. 28.—A serious fire occurred in the harbor to-day, destroying sheds, workshops, a large quantity of timber and the roof of a house of construction. All the other ships which were being built were more or less damaged.

ITALY. ROME, Sept. 28.—The Pope held a brilliant reception to-day as an act of the national fêtes. There was a very large attendance. The Pope, addressing the assembly, declared that he was glad to see the reconciliation with Italy, and the rights of the Church had been restored. TURKEY. CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 28.—Seventeen warships have arrived off Lenoze, near the entrance to the Dardanelles. Much comment has been caused by the appearance of the British fleet, which has been made in official circles here.

UNITED STATES. WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 28.—Dr. Stewart, only this morning, was awakened by a noise in his room. He secured his revolver, and perceiving a burglar, fired two shots at him, both shots taking effect. The doctor then perceived two confederates of the burglar outside the house and fired at them, but they made good their escape. The wounded burglar was taken to a hospital where he died shortly after his arrival. Dr. Stewart gave him up for dead. HOLLAND FALLS, N.Y., Sept. 28.—Wm. Doyle and his son James went fox hunting this morning. They lost sight of each other in the brush. Mr. Doyle was shot in the chest. It proved to be his father, whom he shot and mortally wounded. The father died this afternoon.
