EARL GREY'S DESPATCH. (Copy.) DOWNING STREET, 6th July, 1849.

No. 288. My Lord,—I have the honor to acknowledge your Lordship's Despatches, enumerated in the margin, until it should be in my power to communicate to you the final decision of Parliament on the measure submitted to it by Her Majesty's Government.

The Petition of the Montreal Board of Trade prays not only for the repeal of the Navigation Laws, but also that a fixed duty of not less than five shillings a quarter may be imposed upon wheat imported into this Country from any but colonial Ports, that from Colonial Ports being allowed to enter free from duty.

Looking to the remarkable natural advantages which Canada enjoys, to the great public works by which those advantages have been improved, to the industry and enterprise which distinguish her rapidly increasing population, I can entertain no doubt that now that full scope will be given for the exertion and energy which will be displayed in turning these advantages to the best account, it will soon be proved by the result that the Trade of Canada does not require to be artificially fostered, but that, on the contrary, under the stimulus of free competition, it will rise rapidly to a prosperity far more solid and lasting than that which could be created by any factitious encouragement.

I then remarked to the Doctor, that if the disease were epidemic or atmospheric, or anything else, but infectious or contagious, how it could have been extinguished in about a fortnight's time, when attention to the sanitary symptoms had been given, as by "Domestic Visits, &c." He replied, "That if it were atmospheric, all we could do would have no influence on the atmosphere, and that the most we could hope, would be, by cleanliness, prudence in eating, to diminish or mitigate its ravages, but not to exterminate it, as had been done in many parts of Scotland and England."

At the close of last week, I met the oldest medical member of that Board, at Clapham Terrace, who declared, with much apparent delight, in the presence of a clerical friend, "that the air was delightful and healthy, and that in 48 hours we might expect to hear of no more cholera."
