Personal Intelligence.

Blaisy Bégin, of Châteauguay, and Principal Rouleau, of the Normal School, landed in New York yesterday en route home from their European tour.

Lieut. Kenneth Campbell of the 6th Dragoon Guards, now on the West Coast of Africa, has, by last mail, been suddenly ordered on special service to Coomassie in Ashantee.

Mr. Day, Superintendent of Education in Cleveland, Ohio, paid a visit to the Central Academy on Monday last. He expressed himself as agreeably surprised with the perfection of the business system of that institution.

Messrs. Arthur Delisle, M.P., P. V. Savard, M.P., Hon. Thos. McGreevy, M.P., Lavergne, M.P., Hon. Fra. Langellier, M.P., His Worship Mayor Fremont, M.P., and Dr. Guay, M. P., have left for Ottawa to attend their Parliamentary duties.

Mr. John Buchanan, student of Divinity, Morrin College, was elected among other students of Celtic literature, an honorary member of the Ontario Society of Glasgow University, at the annual meeting held in the University building April 3rd. The late Rev. Dr. Norman Macleod was the founder of this eminent society, and many of the members hold the highest positions in the church, and other learned professions at home and abroad.

Tempered With His Correspondence.

Favors Grand Jurors.

At the Wentworth Assizes, Judge Armour, in replying to the presentation of the Grand Jury, gave distinct views in favor of the Grand Jury system.

To Be Disinterested.

Mr. Pilet, Advocate, of Montreal, who is now in town, expects to obtain from the Attorney-General, in the course of the next day or two, an order for the disinterment of the body of Romé Lamontagne, who was buried in the jail yard of Sherbrooke after his execution. The body is to be handed over to his relatives to be interred in consecrated ground.

They Do Not Want Sunday Parades.

Military parades on Sunday come in for the strong condemnation of the Protestant Ministerial Association of Montreal. According to that body, our gallant volunteers, when marching to church on Sunday, attract the ladies and ladies from the Sunday School and Bible class, and such conduct is no longer to be permitted if the Protestant Ministerial Association can prevent it.

Canadian Commemorative Tokens.

Mr. E. W. McLachlan, the author of many valuable papers on medals and coins, publishes in neat pamphlet form, (W. Drysdale & Co., Montreal), an interesting and curious catalogue of the metal commemorative tokens used in the different Presbyterian churches in Canada. The list is very complete and the notes are of much value and interest. The introductory essay is most instructive.

The Steamer "Quebec."

The steamer "Quebec" of the Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Company which arrived here yesterday morning from Montreal on her first trip of the season, has been much improved during the past winter, and since the addition of new feathering wheels, has ceased to have any vibration in the water on her runs. At almost all the parishes on the way down from Montreal to Sorel, the "Quebec" was saluted with bonfires, &c., and was kept busy replying to the salute by means of her steam whistle. She left on her first trip of the season to Montreal last night, with a full passenger list and a large quantity of freight.

Lord Dufferin.

Mr. Geo. W. Small gives an excellent little sketch of Lord Dufferin's character in the following paragraph of his gossip to the New York Tribune: "Lord Dufferin is a man with many titles to regard, and one of them is that he knows his own mind. He has opinions and the courage of his opinions. There has been a discussion lately—there is a discussion very often—on the question of whether Greek or Latin, but especially Greek, might not be left out of modern education. There have been letters on both sides of this question; from people of eminence who advocate and from people of eminence who oppose the nineteenth century heresy of extinguishing the classics. But nobody, I think, has spoken out exactly as Lord Dufferin speaks. He says: 'I cannot conceive the meaning of the term education if either Greek or Latin is to be excluded.' It is well said. The men of science and the men who call themselves practical may rage, but they cannot mistake the value which which belongs to such a declaration as that, coming not from a professional scholar, still less from a pedant, but from a most accomplished and genial man of the world."

Summer Rates of Freight.

While summer railway rates of freight have been enforced since the first of April from Montreal West, and since the 15th of April from Quebec West, which discrimination is not unreasonably considered unfair towards Quebec, yet the Intercolonial Railway still sticks to its winter tariff. This statement is corroborated by the following letter, which was recently received in reply to a communication from the Quebec Board of Trade.

INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY OF CANADA.

Office of the General Freight Agent, MONTREAL, N.B., 14th April, 1891.

N. LEVASSER, Esq., Secretary, Quebec Board of Trade, Quebec, P.Q.

DEAR SIR,—I have to acknowledge receipt of your esteemed favor of 10th instant, respecting putting the summer rates in force. I beg to inform you that these rates are usually put in force about the beginning of May. I find that in 1889 and 1890 they took effect on the 4th and 5th May. I will have the tariff prepared as soon as possible, so that these rates may be put in force a little earlier this season.

We fail to see any reason why changes in the railway freight tariff from winter to summer rates, should not take effect on the same date all over the Province.

A Canadian Heroine.

The name of Laura Secord is well known and dear to all Canadians familiar with the early history of Canada. It was she who, in June, 1813, at the risk of her life, rendered a service which resulted in the surrender of an American force of 650 troops to a scanty force of 50, consisting of Canadian militia and Indians, commanded by Lieut. Fitzgibbon. The victory of the battle of Beaverdams followed, and later, the final and decisive battle of Lundy's Lane. The grave of Laura Secord is situated in the cemetery
