### Resident Complains New Zone Rule is Dangerous

Acting on a complaint received from a Westmount citizen regarding the new regulations permitting automobiles to pass on either side of safety zones; The Examiner contacted Police Chief R. A. Byford as to whether any complaint had been received by the police department.

Chief Byford said that to date no complaint had been received and that he thought that the new rule was working out very well and had had the effect of speeding up traffic on Sherbrooke street.

The person who complained stated that he found it quite hazardous to cross at Greene and Sherbrooke street; as in addition to having to watch traffic coming both ways on Sherbrooke Street, it was also necessary to keep an eye on cars coming up Greene Avenue. For elderly persons, he said, the situation was particularly difficult and he was fearful that there might be a fatality at the Greene Avenue corner as a result of the change.

The same informant also had another complaint and that was that on several occasions he has noticed three or four cars lined up on the street car tracks waiting for the green light, with the result that when the light changes the street car is held up in getting away and consequently loses the light which means more delay for the tram passengers. He thought that motorists should use a little consideration and pull over to the side as on some occasions the outside lane was not being used.

### Roslyn Ave. Scene Of Car Collision

Henry Bateman, of 3080 Linton Avenue parked his auto at 649 Roslyn Avenue May 23 and went into the house only to hear a loud crash a few moments later.

On returning to the door he was greeted by the sight of his car entangled with another, belonging to Malcolm Lefcort, 641 Roslyn Avenue.

A lady witness said she had seen someone inside the car a few seconds prior to the accident and that this person had leapt out and dashed away.

### Child Under Car Suffers Injuries As Auto Starts

In the act of retrieving a stick from beneath a car belonging to J. W. Belcourt, of 43 Barat Road, five year-old James Snook, of 4152 Sherbrooke Street West suffered injuries Friday when the owner started to drive his auto away.

Mr. Belcourt told the police he couldn't see the child when he got behind the wheel of his car but jammed on his brakes when he heard a scream on beginning to move away. The child was taken to the hospital and held for further examination of a possible fractured collarbone.

### Greene Ave. is Changing Old Time Look Vanishes

Greene avenue is fast undergoing a face lifting and will soon rank as one of the major shopping streets in the west end.

Two new stores are presently being constructed just opposite John Watson, Plumbers. One of these it is understood will be occupied by Demers' Grocery with the other earmarked as a restaurant.

May's Ladies Wear and Accessories will move into their new shop just opposite the Avenue Theatre within a few days. Clifford's Market operated by Mr. Townend will take over the former Maison Douville store next to Gatehouse.

Former residents would scarcely recognize the old time residential street if they were to visit the new Greene Avenue with its Avenue Theatre, one of the latest in the metropolitan area, Steinberg's Mammoth groceries and Gatehouse's modern meat market with individual cold storage locker space.

The smart dress shops, sporting good stores and other business establishments lend an air of great prosperity to Greene Avenue.

It is understood that Victoria Avenue is also due for the new look and that it will be widened in the near future to permit of easier traffic handling at the corner of Sherbrooke.

Steinberg's will have an entrance on Victoria in the L shaped store to front on Sherbrooke and Victoria adjacent to the new City and District Savings Bank.

### Vision Blocked, Driver Claims, In Auto Smash

An auto driven by Jack Goldstein, of 8518 Biram Avenue, collided with a car driven by Dr. Estrada Roberto, of 1416 Guy Street, at Atwater Avenue and Dorchester Street, Saturday.

Mr. Goldstein told the Westmount Police he failed to see the other vehicle prior to the accident due to a truck obscuring his view. Dr. Roberto told police that he stopped behind this truck and started to make a left hand turn thinking the way was clear.

### W. George CFCF Pleads Television Cause at Rotary

Television, W. V. George, of CFCF, told the Westmount Rotary Club would add a magic window out of which millions would be able to see a new world.

Mr. George was speaking to the Westmount Rotary Club about television, touching on the current "fuss about Mount Royal" he said he was unable to make no head nor tail of it.

He argued that the mountain park was set aside for the pleasure of the citizens of "this community". While thousands made little or no use of it, thousands more were unable to enjoy its beauty.

"Surely no one would wish to deny others limited to the four walls of their room the benefit television would bring them."

Touching on the subject of the projected television must be stated one would be insufficient to carry the channels of companies other than CBS and that it would be necessary to build another to house the rest.

The City of Westmount he said had been approached a year ago on the matter of erecting a mast on Westmount Mountain by CFCF and was turned down flat.

Mr. George said he thought civic authorities had been afraid it might be the first step in commercializing the area.

CFCF had at that time offered to combine a beautiful public rest station with their relay station at their own cost if they were granted permission to build. There would have been space to house roads department equipment as well.

The speaker revealed Montreal could have had television in 1938 and in 1948. "We will have it a year from the time CBC is authorized to mount its transmitters on Mount Royal.

"You can be sure television will be an important element in your life," he prophesied and cited instances such as the Kefauver trials in the United States, sessions of the United Nations and a speech of Winston Churchill, all televised, that enabled millions of citizens to witness events of national importance.

"Nor is (television) powerful in spite of itself. There is much tripe, much stuff in bad taste. We need only to be selective, each selective for himself.

"Please do not let me be selective for you, or visa versa. It is all too easy to emulate the Pilgrim Fathers who came to this continent so that they might worship as they pleased and make everyone else do the same."

Mr. George stated television would be a source of intellectual family evenings spent around the set. Shakespeare by Evans would rally the family. Hansard in the making by Mr. Kefauver would interest everyone.

"He is a dull sod who does not seek new paths in familiar places, whose intellectual curiosity is not stirred by a little knowledge."

Norman Millington welcomed and introduced the visiting Rotarians. The speaker was introduced by Robert Edwards and thanked by Harry Griffin.

## G. P. Smith Will Recall Former Athletic Heroes

G. P. Smith, who will commence a series of articles next week, the author of this series has been actively connected with sport as a professional, coach and physical

director since 1905 when he started his career as coach of McGill wrestling and at the opening of the new M.A.A.A. Club house he acted as their coach as well.

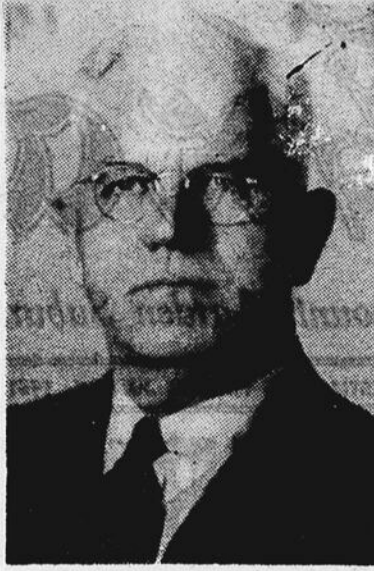
In 1913 he was engaged by the Westmount School Board to take charge of the Phy. Training in their schools and to be in complete charge of all sports. During his tenure his football and hockey teams were successful in winning 38 football championships, 40 hockey championships and on two occasions bringing his senior H. team to the semi final for the Memorial Cup, playing against the Juniors 1923 Owen Sound team of that year and the following year beating all local opposition and being finally eliminated by the Sons of Ireland team of Quebec after playing a 90 min 2 all tie and going into a second game which was won by Sons of Ireland in overtime by 1 goal.

His teams won many city championships in Senior, Inter, and Junior Interscholastics and McGill wrestlers won their share of Intercollegiate titles, likewise M.A.A.A. wrestlers won Dom. titles.

He continued his coaching at McGill concurrently with W.H.S. for 28 years.

He retired from W.H.S. in 1945 after 32 years, then went back to M.A.A.A. retiring in 1949.

## E. F. Walter Dies At Summer Home

Ernst F. Walter, a governor of the Montreal General Hospital and well known wholesale merchant here for many years, died suddenly Friday at his summer home in Stoney Lake, Ont., in his 88th year. His residence here was at 626 Victoria avenue.

A funeral service was held on Tuesday in the chapel of Jos. C. Wray & Bros., Mountain street. Rev. John Peters, pastor of the German Lutheran Church, officiated. Burial was in Mount Royal cemetery.

Born in Goerlitz, Germany, in 1863, Mr. Walter received his early training there before coming to Canada in 1887. Six years later he formed the wholesale firm of E. F. Walter Company, Reg'd, now E. F. Walter, Ltd. In 1891 he married the former Bertha Lech of Peterborough, Ont. She died three years ago.

Mr. Walter was active in summer sports in his younger years, and was a charter member of the St. Lambert Country Club. He also was interested in canoeing, and was a keen gardener.

His only son, Arthur William Walter of Montreal, was with him at the time of his death.

Mr. Walter is survived by three grandsons: Kenneth E. Walter, Arthur R. Walter and Donald Walter, all of Montreal.



## Unity Boys' Club News

With the end of its first season of the Unity Boys' Club activities I started to delve into what I may have slipped up on. One was an event, which I feel very important to members of the club.

Early last fall I remember writing a paragraph at Mr. Moss' request saying that any club member who was interested in taking piano lessons should apply at the office. Mr. Moss told me at the time that if a sufficient number of boys and girls were interested he would be able to acquire a volunteer who would give regular lessons every week.

Eighteen turned up, and Miss Daisy Peterson, a pupil of Paul de Marky and an Associate of the McGill University Conservatorium undertook to teach them. Miss Peterson is a very competent teacher. Rules were laid down that pupils must take a half hour lesson each week and put in a two hours of practice each week.

The club notified these youngsters that, if they did not have a piano at home, they could do their practicing on the piano which had been donated to the Unity Boys' Club. Miss Peterson gives two and a half hours of her time every week to the task.

Now, the interesting thing is that only three of these eighteen "pianists" had ever had any music lessons before, but Miss Peterson is so proud of the progress made by her classes that she will present them in a Beginners' Concert Friday evening, June 8, at 8 p.m. Parents of the pupils have been invited.

I know little about music but I felt that the Unity Boys' Club and Miss Peterson were making an outstanding contribution in their community, so I took the liberty of contacting Thomas Archer, Music and Drama critic of The Gazette. Here is what he wrote to me:

"Anything that adds to the cultivation of performing music by young people nowadays is of the utmost importance to the community. Montreal, like every big city on this continent, is highly professionalized in music. We have our symphony orchestras, our musical clubs and our community concerts, but the danger is that we are apt to forget that the future must be cared for. We are constantly in need of young musicians to take the place of those who are bound, sooner or later, to retire.

"That is one point: Another is that making music, singing or playing an instrument for yourself, is, in the long run a much better way of understanding and feeling this most wonderful art than what the radio or the phonograph can give you. These mechanical means are an invaluable adjunct to music, invaluable as a help to learning it. But writing and performing music, no matter how simple and unpretentious the effort may be is far more important.

"To one who attends week in and week out the high priced professional concerts we have annually in Montreal music unpretentiously made by people for their own enjoyment, with no thought of personal gain. This is like the Koh-in-Noor Diamond, hard to find. We found it recently in a concert given by Lewis Elvin and his High School Orchestra at the Plateau Hall.

"And now we have the news that the Unity Boys' Club, among its manifold activities, has not only thought of music but has built up a class within the past year which is prepared to give a recital during the coming week. "Hats off!" This is paraphrasing Robert Schumann who thus greeted the young and unknown Chopin."

## Funeral Service For J. Graham

A funeral service was held Saturday for James Graham, of 2290 Melrose Avenue, former grocereria proprietor in Westmount and the North End, at the D.A. Collins Funeral Chapel.

Conducted by Rev. Clifton J. MacKay, minister of Know Crescent and Kensington Presbyterian Church, the service was attended by many friends and relatives.

The funeral was held from Collins to Mount Royal Cemetery where interment was held. Mr. Graham died suddenly at home May 24.

A resident of N.D.G. for the past 10 years, he emigrated to Canada from Ireland 41 years ago and was married to the former Nellie Cameron at American Presbyterian Church, in 1917.

For many years Mr. Graham was proprietor of James Graham Groceries, at the corner of Metcalfe Avenue and St. Catherine Street, Westmount. Later he moved to the North End where he set up business at 143 Fairmont Avenue.

Retiring from the grocereria business 10 years ago, he went to work for Canada Car and later British Metal Corporation.

Mr. Graham was a member of long standing of the AF and AM, St. Lawrence Lodge No. 14. He was also a member of the Orange-men and for many years a parishioner of Knox Crescent and Kensington Presbyterian Church.

Surviving are three sons: James, of North Bay, Ontario; George and William; two daughters, Mrs. Frederick Rose and Miss Marjorie; two brothers, Alec, of Ireland, and William; three sisters, Mrs. Alec Martin, Mrs. James McLean, and Mrs. Wilson, all of Ireland; and a grandson, James.

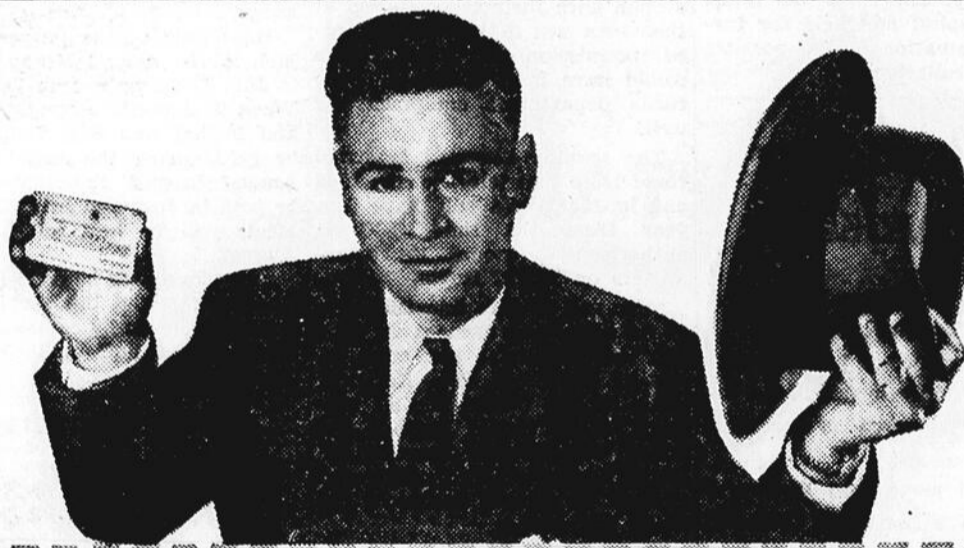

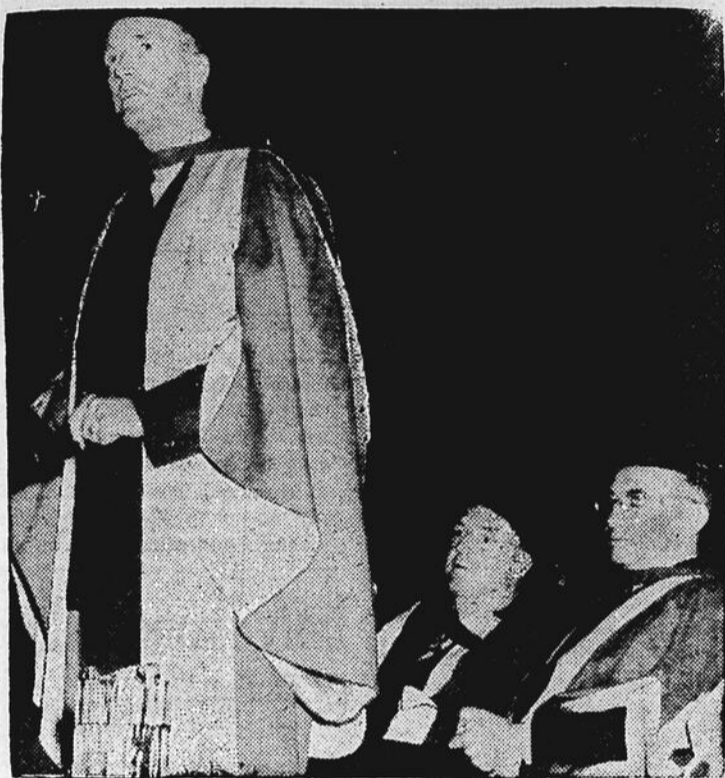
## Unity Boys' Club Carnival To Open With Big Parade

## Burnside Opening May Be Decided

Westmount may soon have another artery to get to uptown Montreal if the Executive Committee of the City of Montreal decides at its meeting on Monday to go ahead with the extension of Burnside.

It is understood that the City Planning Department has given its blessing on starting the extension work at Mountain street. This would then line up with St. Luke street and Western avenue to create an East-West artery parallel with Sherbrooke street.

The original plan, now about 20 years old, was to extend Burnside westward from Stanley to Guy and have it link up with St. Luke and Western. However, before the city could take steps, expensive buildings were erected in the path of the projected street, westward from Peel, and no civic administration since has felt that it would be wisdom to expropriate these buildings.

Thus the new plan is in the nature of a compromise. Burnside, if the Executive approves, will stop at Stanley and continue again at Mountain, leaving the section of buildings between unmolested.

## R.M.R. Staged Colorful Display Here on Tuesday

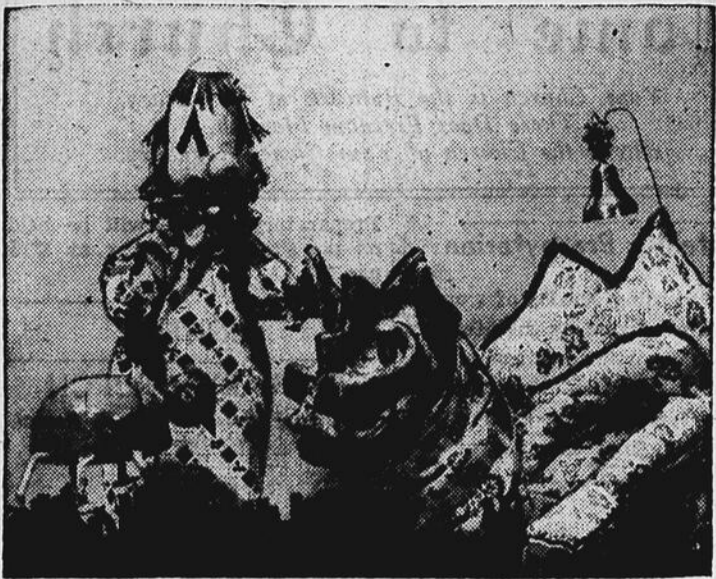

**Brig. Gauvreau Claims Defence Plan Completed**

Brig. J. Guy Gauvreau, D.S.O., E.D., A.D.C., metropolitan co-ordinator of Civil Defence told a meeting of representatives from 15 municipalities including Westmount in the metropolitan area held in Mont St. Louis College last week, "we now have a definite plan, and we also have a policy. We will need however, a sufficient budget to go ahead with our plans."

Montreal area's civil defence organization has reached completion of its preliminary stage and all that is needed to carry out the required budget is an adequate budget Brig. Gauvreau said.

Present were the needs of the various civil defence sections and a group of "special" advisers.

The co-ordinator emphasized as a primary need of the organization "the recruiting and training of 60,000 volunteers, men and women" and termed one important aspect of the civil defence planning "the education of the public in the value of civil defence and in the protective steps to be taken in an emergency."

In this respect, he added, a "sustained program of information and propaganda is contemplated."

"The tasks ahead are tremendous, and they are unprecedented, but they will be performed if the means at our disposal are adequate. As for the co-operation of the public, it can be counted upon as a certainty," Brig. Gauvreau said.

He explained that itemized budgets have been drawn up by each civil defence section, and that overall estimates had been submitted to the control committee. The estimate will be presented to federal and provincial authorities, he added.

Among problems still to be met, he said, were the training of rescue teams, traffic control, decentralization of public services, emergency hospitals and casualty clearing stations, a plan for the evacuation of the injured, camps for the homeless, stores for food, medical supplies and essential

**Local Men Serve On Catholic Drive**

The Federation of Catholic Charities and St. Mary's Hospital will seek \$563,000 in a combined drive to be held here Oct. 15 to 29 it was announced by Merlin W. Donald, chairman of the joint advisory committee.

At the same time Louis P. Beaubien, general chairman of the campaign, announced that the campaign executive had been completed and workers were being recruited. He said the combined appeal was sponsored by the permanent campaign advisory committee of the federation and by St. Mary's Associates.

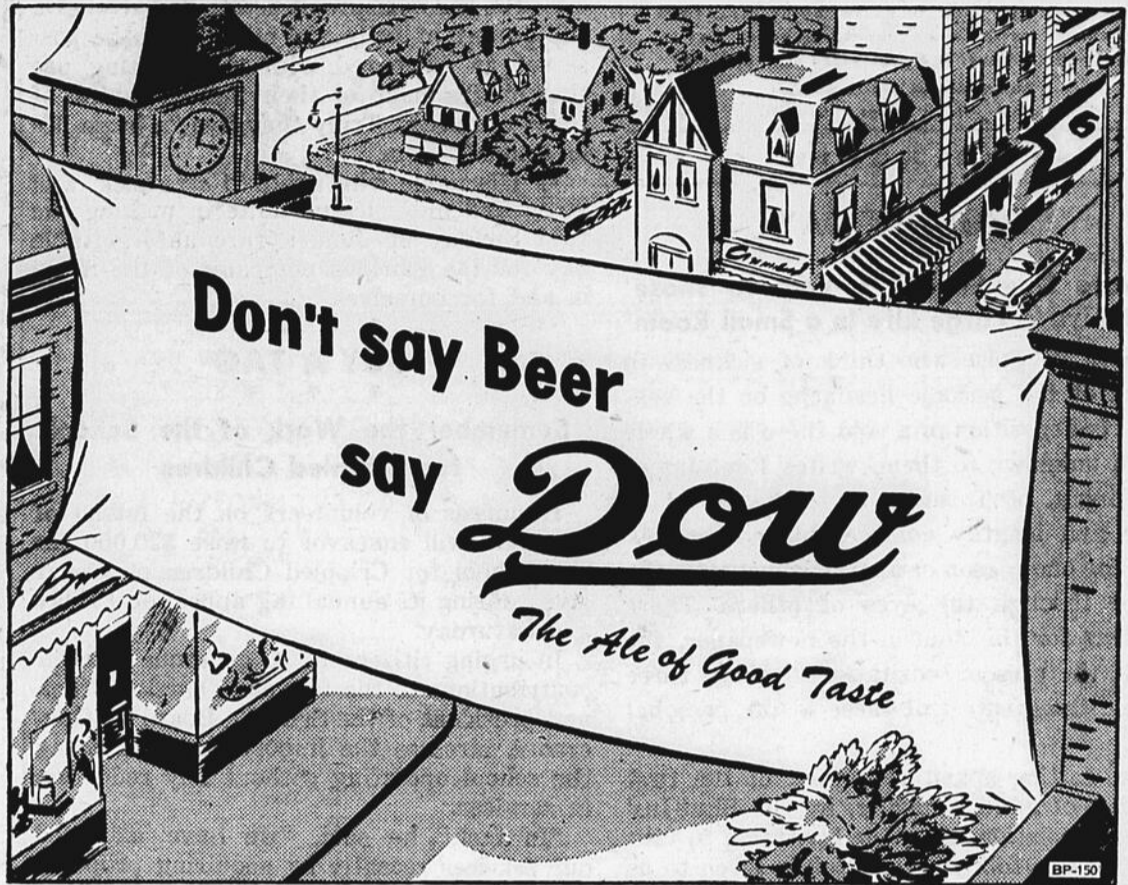

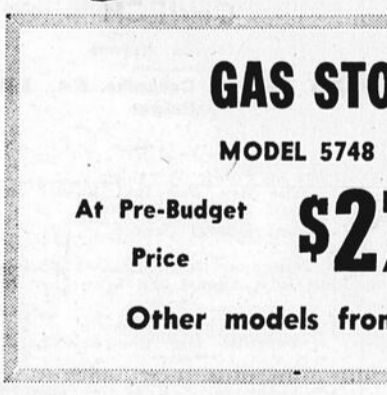

It is the world of close and lengthy confinement where folk who for one reason or another must view the world through the eyes of others. There remains for the shut-in the newspaper, the radio, the personal visitation — these three — and the greatest of these is the personal visit.

The setting apart, therefore, of the first Sunday of June, annually, by the Shut-Ins' Day Association when the invitation to visit at least two folk who are sick is given to us is of more than ordinary significance. Not that one should ever feel he has discharged his full obligation by such observance once a year. It is but a token of our recognition and remembrance of the Shut-in at all times.

Furthermore let no one think that by making such visits we are conferring a favour upon those visited. In a very real sense just the opposite is true; they present us with a privilege; invariably they render us a service. There is no greater corrective for our distorted vision and false sense of values

than to talk with one who has made and continues to make the skillful adjustment to the restraint and restriction that is the normal life of the Shut-in. Anyone who has had the close friendship of one of these has experienced the enlargement of his own life. One comes to realize how feebly he exercises the full measure of health and strength, full powers of body and mind which he possesses as compared with the amazing use that others make of their limited capital of these resources. Truly they live "a large life in a small room."

In His name who said: "I was sick, and ye visited me" let us unite in making the first Sunday of June a rare unforgettable day for the glorious company of the Shut-in and for ourselves.

C. A. C. Reports

... APPLE JUICE AGAIN ... THE WESTMOUNT BRANCH ...

Women everywhere are very much inclined to stick to old patterns in their shopping habits. About two years ago the Canadian Association of Consumers received requests from many housewives, that apple juice should be fortified with Vitamin "C". In consequence C.A.C. made representations to food processors and

several of these did place a vitamin re-inforced apple juice on the market. However, sales of the new product were disappointing. Perhaps the labelling was not sufficiently distinctive or the slight added cost of the fortified juice may have told against it. Whatever the cause the demand did not, to the processors at any rate, justify its production.

Apple juice is a good Canadian food which, with the added vitamin "C" content gives it value as a substitute for citrus fruits — oranges and grapefruits — when prices are high, while many families enjoy it at all times. If you cannot find this fortified juice on store shelves today ask yourself if you have been partly the cause of its disappearance.

Bearing these facts in mind, Mrs. W. R. Walton, Jr., National President of the Canadian Association of Consumers, made an address in Saskatoon recently in which she urged homemakers to patronize the merchants who try to fulfill their wants. It was most important, she pointed out, that if women requested certain types of goods, that they should back up their requests. The goods that sell are the goods which the merchant re-orders, so if you find that our Canadian apple juice with added vitamin "C" will fit a place in your budget and on your table, why not ask for it as consistently as you do for your special brand of soap or tea. Fortunes are spent in advertising certain products and in leading women shoppers to buy them. Let us show also that there are some products which we will buy because we asked for them and not just because they were sold to us.

Your reporter had the pleasure of attending a meeting of the C.A.C. Branch formed by members of the Westmount Women's Club. This Branch has doubled its membership in less than a year and on Tuesday afternoon the members met at the home of the Branch President, Mrs. J. Weir Brown. Activities of their Branch and many consumer problems were discussed. Guest of honour for the occasion was Mrs. H. E. Vautelet, C.B.E., Provincial President of Quebec. She outlined the growth and aims of C.A.C. in Canada with especial reference to the successful system of Branches now established in Quebec.

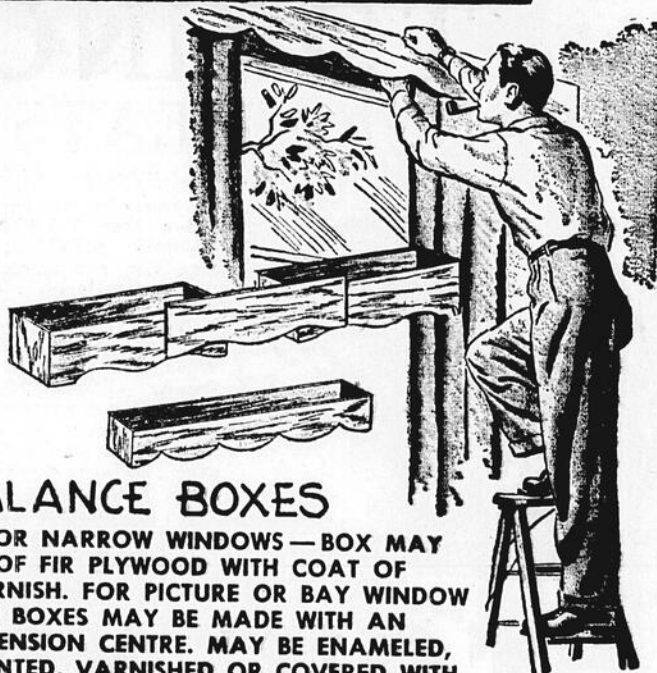

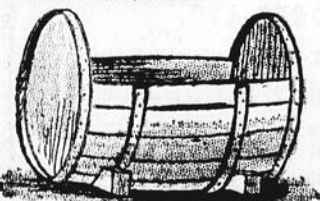

**Dr. Marcotte Addresses AHRC: Groups, Dental Clinic, Formed**

The Association for the Help of Retarded Children held its third and closing public meeting of this season last evening, at 8.15, in the Foyer of the Montreal High School. The guest speaker on this occasion was Dr. J. E. A. Marcotte, Psychiatrist to the Board of Health of the City of Montreal. His subject was "Behaviour problems in the retarded child."

Dr. Marcotte is Professor of Mental Hygiene in the University of Montreal, Psychiatric Consultant to the Children's Memorial Hospital and Psychiatrist to the Centre D'Orientation. Part of his training in this field was in Boston, Massachusetts, and he is a member of the American Association of Mental Deficiency and of the American Psychiatric Association.

The steering committee's most recent developments consist of the ground work on district groups, Dr. Copnick's Dental Clinic for Retarded Children, and the special names committee.

**District Groups**

An understanding of the problem of Retardation immediately points up the vast benefits to be derived from discussion and sympathetic personal contact among those affected by it. While public meetings do this to some extent, smaller localized groups allow for more extended and closer relationships. This is the first and foremost function of district groups. Mrs. C. M. Dupuis, in charge of these groups, is now working with seven volunteer leaders from seven districts: Lachine, Mrs. A. C. Ross; Verdun, Mrs. M. Emberg; Snowdon and N.D.G., Mrs. L. H. Hall; St. Lambert, Mrs. J. Phelan; St. Laurent, Mrs. H. Krausser; Westmount, Mrs. A. S. Noad; North End, Mrs. S. Sofer.

These groups will remain active during the summer, and it is hoped they will enable members to function more directly in the business of their organization, as chapters.

**Dental Clinic**

Dr. Copnick has a record of about 15 years' standing, during which he cared for the teeth of retarded children. He shows spontaneous and profound understanding in the matter of dealing with

the children. Parents who have grappled with the problem of tooth care for their retarded children for a long time, return with sincere and enthusiastic praise of the Doctor's methods.

**Special Names Committee**

Doctor Marcotte has accepted the leadership of a special names committee. At the committee's last meeting on May 7, Dr. Copnick spoke so convincingly from his own experience on Service Groups and the help they so willingly extend, that he was immediately joined by volunteers, Mrs. G. # Hon. D. C. Abbott Reports Surplus For Fiscal Year

Hon. Douglas C. Abbott, Finance Minister and member for St. Antoine-Westmount, aiming for a surplus of \$30,000,000 in the current fiscal year, reported Friday that in the first month of the year his surplus amounted to \$121,500,000.

But, he said, the figures for the first month cannot be "taken as indicative of the probable result for the fiscal year as a whole."

"April is always an abnormal month as a large portion of the expenditures made during April are attributable to the previous fiscal year and are charged to

that year in the government's accounts."

Revenues amounted to \$218,300,000, an increase of \$52,200,000 over the corresponding month of 1950. Expenditures totalled \$96,800,000, an increase of \$8,800,000.

Mr. Abbott's report showed that defence expenditures were \$5,540,000 higher than a year ago. They totalled \$25,646,243 compared with \$20,101,340.

Expenditures of the newly created Defence Production department appeared for the first time and amounted to close to \$300,000. A sum of \$68,000 was earmarked for general and administrative expenditures and \$200,000 for capital assistance to defence industries.

Family allowances at \$26,274,134 showed an increase of more than \$1,000,000.

On the revenue side, income tax collections amounted to more than \$70,000,000 compared with \$49,000,000 in the corresponding month of 1950. Corporation income tax collections were up to \$59,600,000 from \$38,127,000.

The yield from custom and excise taxes was \$69,000,000 compared with \$41,000,000.

In his budget speech, April 10, Mr. Abbott estimated his year's revenues at \$3,730,000,000 and expenditures at \$3,700,000,000. This would give him a surplus of \$30,000,000. In 1950-51, he estimated he would end the year with a surplus of \$15,000,000, but finished with a surplus of \$203,000,000.

# Tenants Advised Landlords Must Receive Notice

Local tenants who plan to apply to the Rentals Administration for extension of their leases must first notify their landlords that such an application will be made. This is pointed out in a tenants' guide to the Quebec Rent Control Law issued by the Montreal Tenants' Association.

A registered letter stating one's intention to apply for an extension must be in the hands of the landlord not later than July 31. The application for prolongation of the lease must be made to the Rentals Administration during the month of August.

Clarence Rosenhek, legal adviser to the league, said: "If (the tenant) fails to take either of those two steps, he loses his rights under the rentals control law and may be evicted."

The Montreal Board of Trade in a bulletin to members, summarizing the regulations, says:

"If such notice is not given it is presumed the tenant will vacate the property on July 31, 1951."

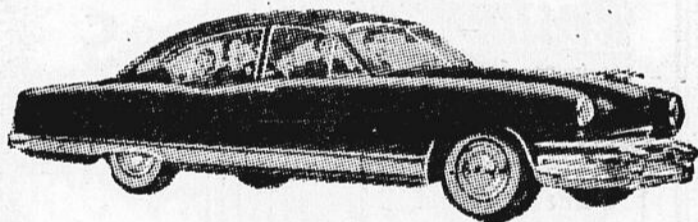

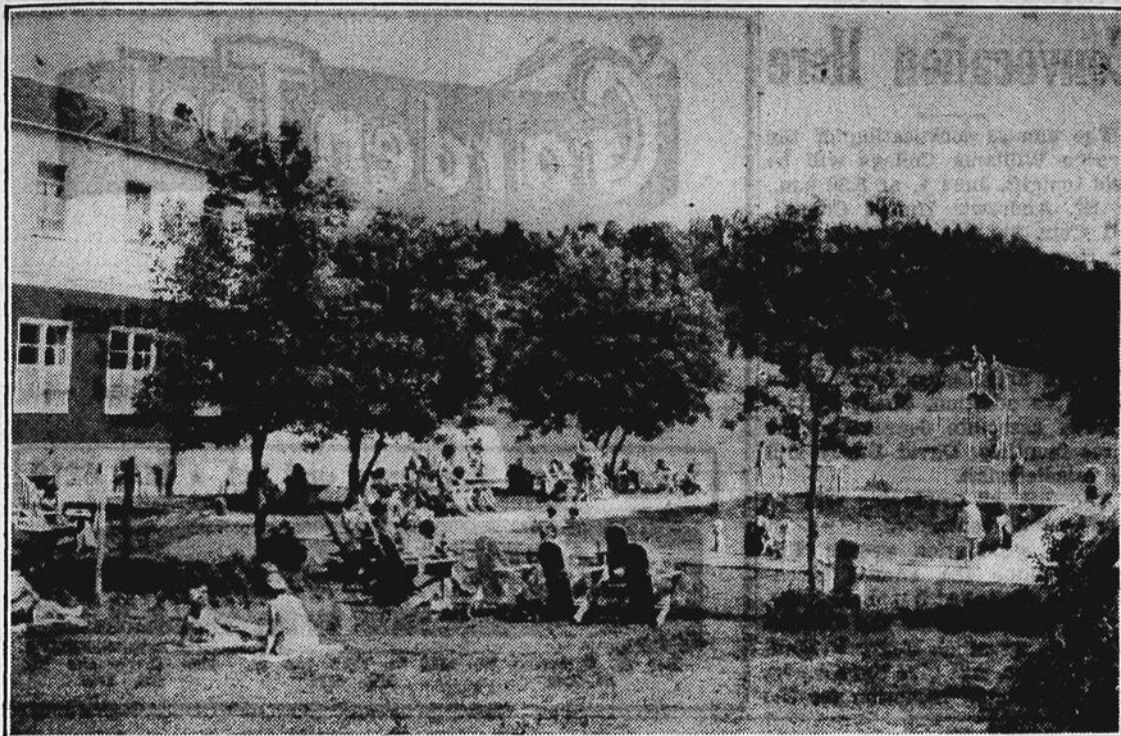

program of remedial exercises where such are proposed by the Student Health Service."

All first year students will be given a physical ability test and a swimming test early in the year.

On the basis of the tests they will be placed in four categories. The first group, above the minimum physical standard, will be allowed choice of activities; the second group, below minimum standard but physically fit to par-

ticipate, will be given a "special conditioning program"; the third group will consist of those fit for limited activities only and the fourth of those excused from all activity by the student health service.

The course will be compulsory only for freshmen, each of whom will be required to "provide himself, or herself, with two sets of gymnasium outfits and one pair of gym shoes."

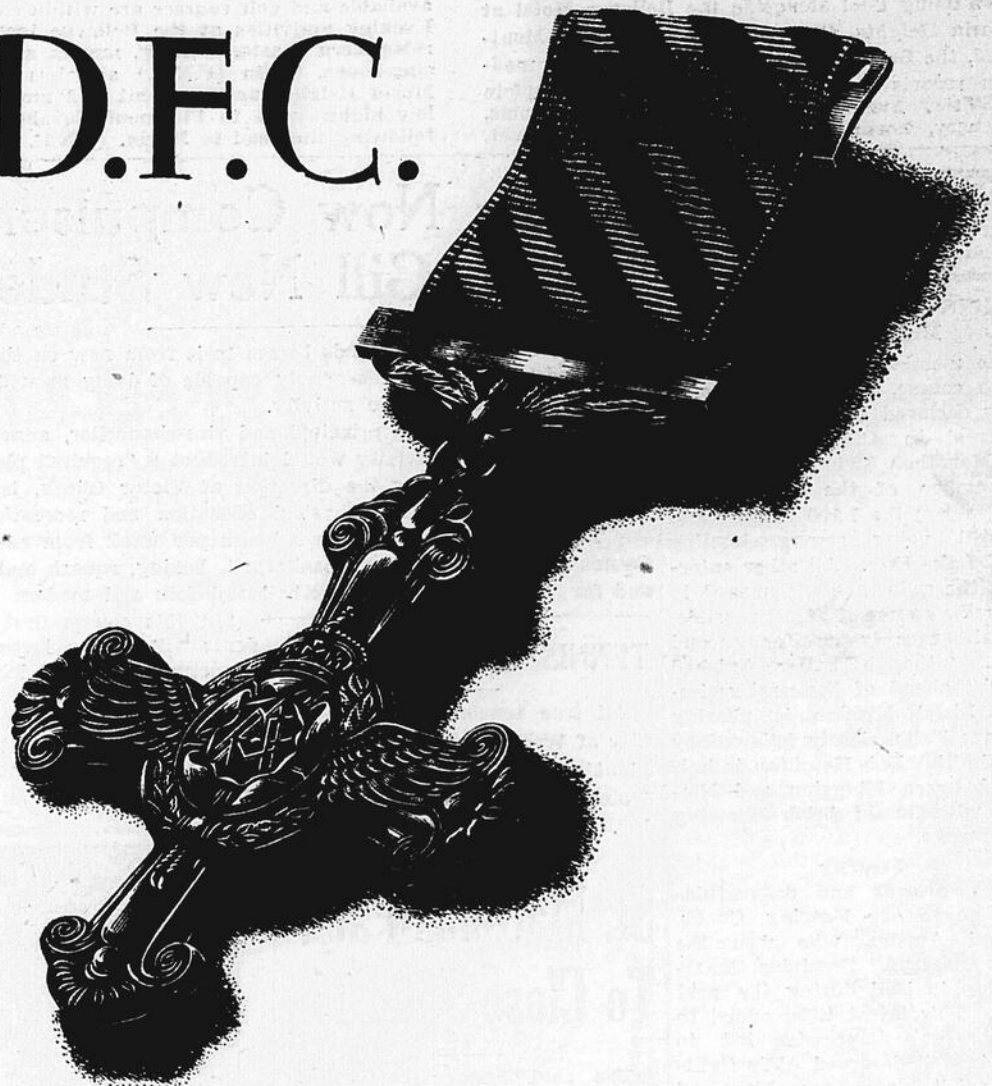
