LETTER RATE.

Letters posted in Canada addressed to any place within the Province, pass, if prepaid, for 5 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., but if posted unpaid, such letters are charged 7 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

The Book Post regulations between Canada and England apply to matter between Canada and France.

NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.

Newspapers published in Canada may be sent by post from the office of publication, addressed to any place in Canada, at the following rates, *if paid quarterly in advance*, by either the publisher at the Post Office where the papers are posted, or by the subscriber at the delivering Post Office. To subscribers in the United Kingdom, they may be forwarded on prepayment of the commuted rate applicable to subscribers in the Province, or singly at $\frac{1}{2}$ cent each at publisher's option. Papers by Cunard Mail are charged with two cents *on delivery* for American transit charge.

When the above rates are not paid in advance by either publisher or subscriber, such papers are charged one cent each on delivery.

TRANSIENT NEWSPAPERS.

Transient Newspapers—that is to say, Canadian Newspapers posted otherwise than from the office of publication, and American or British papers posted or reposted in Canada, must be prepaid 1 cent each, by postage stamp, or they cannot be forwarded—but will be sent

to the Dead Letter office and destroyed—except only *British Newspapers* distributed to regular subscribers by Canadian booksellers or news agents—such papers pass free as they would do if received in the Canadian packet mails.

NEWSPAPERS BY MAIL FROM ENGLAND OR UNITED STATES.

Newspapers received from England by the Canadian packet mails are delivered free.

Newspapers from England by the Cunard packet mails are charged 2 cents each on delivery. (This is the American transit charge.)

United States newspapers, brought by mail into Canada, are charged one cent each on delivery.

PERIODICAL PUBLICATIONS.

The rate on periodical publications is, if not exceeding 3 ounces in weight, 1 cent: over 3 ounces 4 cents.

If prepaid by postage stamps from the office of publication, periodicals *published in Canada*, weighing over 3 oz., may pass for 2 cents each.

Periodicals *printed in this Province*, other than newspapers, when specially devoted to education, (both religious and general, to agriculture, to temperance, or to any branch of science, and addressed directly from the office of publication to be transmitted to any post office in this Province, are exempt from charge.

Transient Periodicals—including Canadian periodicals not prepaid the commuted rate from the office of publication—nor exempted by the preceding clause, and all other periodical publications posted in this Province, must be prepaid by stamp, the full rate, at the time of posting.

Periodicals received in the mails from the United States are charged with the rates named in the first clause of this section.

POSTAGE STAMPS.

Postage stamps of the respective values of 1 cent for

newspapers; 5 cents for ordinary Provincial letters; 10 cents for United States rates; 12½ cents for Canadian packet; and 17 cents for Cunard packet, are provided for sale to the public.

Prepayment of postage should be made by means of postage stamps.

PENAL CLAUSES.

The Act contains the following penal clauses:—

To inclose a letter or letters, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, in a Parcel posted, for the Parcel Post, shall be a misdemeanor.

To inclose a letter or any writing, or to make any written marks to serve the purpose of a letter, or to inclose any other thing in a newspaper posted to pass as a newspaper at the rate of postage applicable to newspapers, (except in the case of accounts and receipts of newspaper publishers, which are permitted to pass folded within the newspapers sent by them to their subscribers,) shall be a misdemeanor.

MONEY ORDERS ON CANADA.

All the Money Order Post offices in Canada are authorized to draw Money Order on each other for any sum up to \$100, and for as many Orders of \$100 each as the Applicant may require, upon the following terms, viz:—

MONEY ORDERS ON THE UNITED KINGDOM.

The Canadian Money Order offices also draw upon all the Money Order offices in England, Ireland and Scotland, and the Channel Islands, for any sum up to £10 Sterling, and grant as many Orders for £10 Sterling

each, as may be needed to make up the amount remitted. The terms are as under:—

MONEY ORDERS ON THE LOWER PROVINCES.

The Canadian Money Order offices draw also upon all Money Order offices in Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland. The Orders, like those of the United Kingdom, are made payable in Sterling Money, and for sums up to £10 Sterling. The terms are:—

For Orders up to £5 0s. 0d... ..	25 Cts.
“ over £5 0s. 0d. and up to £10 0s. 0d..	50 “

The money Order Post offices are furnished with Lists of all the Money Order offices in Canada, the United Kingdom, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland, and the Postmasters are instructed to afford every information in their power, in respect of the places upon which they draw, together with any other information relating to such issues as the intending Remitters may desire.

REGISTRATION OF LETTERS.

Persons transmitting letters which they desire should pass through the post as “Registered Letters,” must observe that no record is taken of any letter unless specially handed in for registration at the time of posting. Upon all such letters, with the exception of those addressed to the United States, 2 cents must be prepaid as a registration charge. If addressed to the United States, the charge will be 5 cents per letter. The registry thus effected in Canada is certified on by the United States post office, until the letter arrives at its destination.

In like manner letters addressed to Canada may be registered at the place of posting in the United States, and the registry made there will accompany the letter to the place of delivery in Canada.

A Certificate of Registration will be given by a Postmaster if required.

It must be distinctly understood by parties who avail themselves of the privilege of registration, that such registration, with the certificate and receipt, are merely intended to afford the means of tracing the course of such letters through the post, and of ascertaining their delivery at destination, and will not be held to imply any liability on the part of the Postal department to make good any loss, or alleged losses, arising from the miscarriage of any such letter or its contents. When letters are registered, both the postage and the registration fee must in all cases be prepaid.

The annual issue of licenses commences on the 1st May, the old licenses expiring on the 30th April.

Those who are in possession of certificates for tavern licenses in the country, or of permits from the City

Clerk, in the city, will have the right, on making applications to this office, and on paying the above taxes, for their licenses as heretofore.

Those who make applications for shop licenses will be required as heretofore to produce a certificate from the city treasurer for £2 road tax.

In all cases, the above provincial tax is exigible apart from the impost or tax imposed by the local or county councils.

Persons infringing the law are liable to a fine of \$50, or to an imprisonment of 3 to 6 months in the common gaol of the district.
