

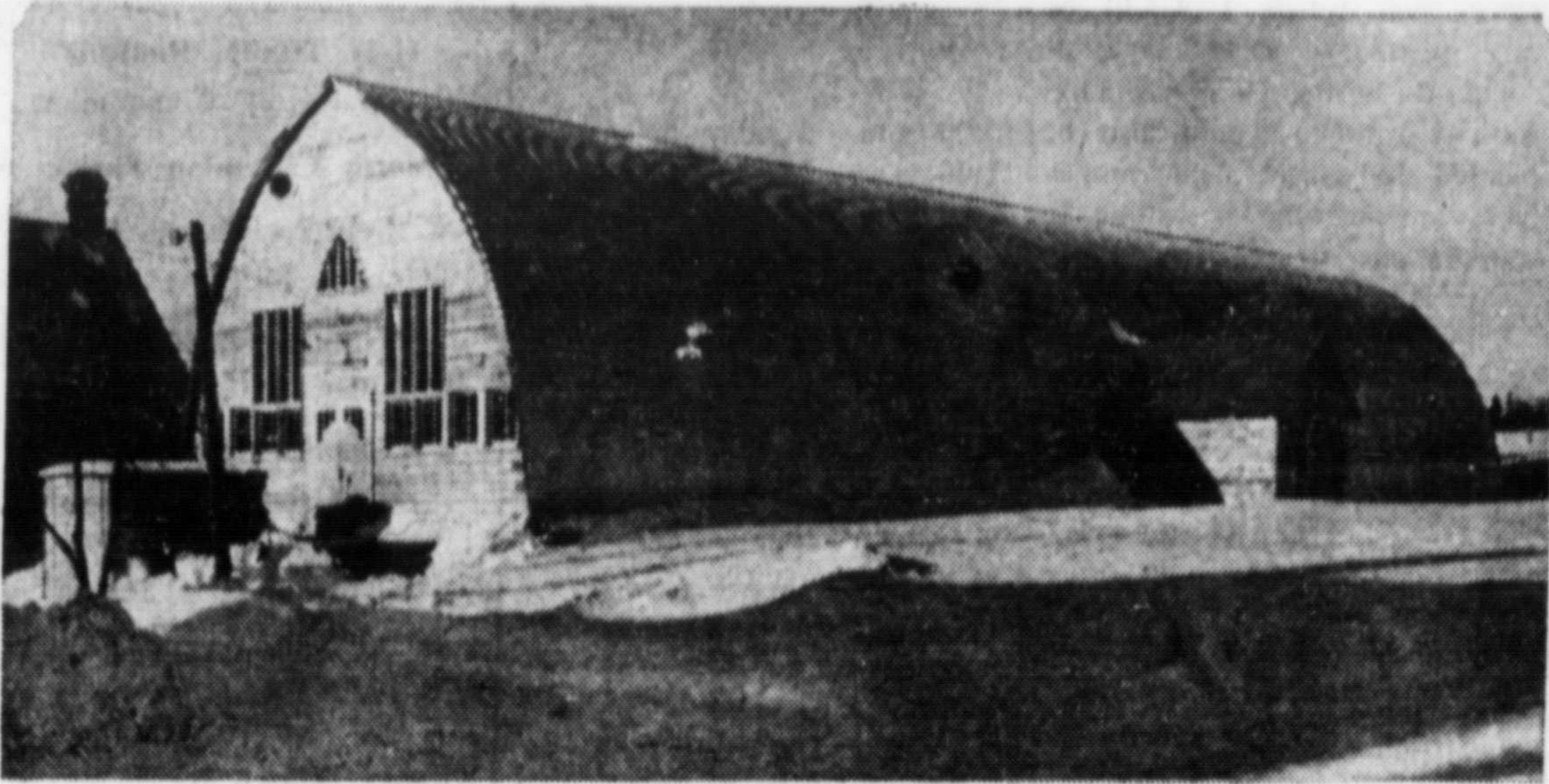

St. Patrick's Day in Vinton will be a double celebration this year. Granted 14 Thousand For Hunting Accident

Clifford Gibson, 61, farmer of Danford Lake, P.Q., in a Judgement rendered by the Hon. Justice Jacques Boucher, J.S.C., on the 22nd day of February 1963, was awarded a total of \$14,293.01 together with interest and costs, for injuries and damages sustained in a hunting mishap.

On November 10th, 1957, about 5:00 p.m. Mr. Gibson was working on his farm in a field close to his house, when he was shot at and hit in the right hip by a shot fired by one Sterling Featherstone, of Richmond Ont., who was then hunting at a short distance from that place with a 16 gauge shotgun.

At the time of this accident, Mr. Gibson was standing in an open field. He claimed that he

did not know of or see anyone hunting in the immediate vicinity, and that he was quite visible to any person in that area.

Mr. Gibson was hospitalized for a period of 8 months from Nov. 10 1957 to June 1958, and submitted to two surgical operations, and to another one in March 1959.

In his Judgement, Justice Boucher, said that he considered Mr. Featherstone's own admission to Mr. Gibson and his wife, to the effect that he was the author of the shooting, was conclusive evidence against him that he was negligent in handling the fire arm which caused the damages. Before the accident, Mr. Gibson was in good health, but due to the injuries he then sustained, he suffered great pains and felt

The head of the animal was sent to Hull, Que., by the Pontiac Health Clinic to be examined, and it was found that the fox was rabid. Mrs. Gasman is the mother of Dr. Henry Gasman of Deep River.

Pontiacs Contest Citizen Shield

The Shawville Pontiacs started out on the Citizen Shield trail last week against Ottawa Kerwins and after two hard fought games are all even at one game each.

Friday, the Pontiacs came out with new heart and at 5:33 of the first Barrie Murray started them on to victory early to

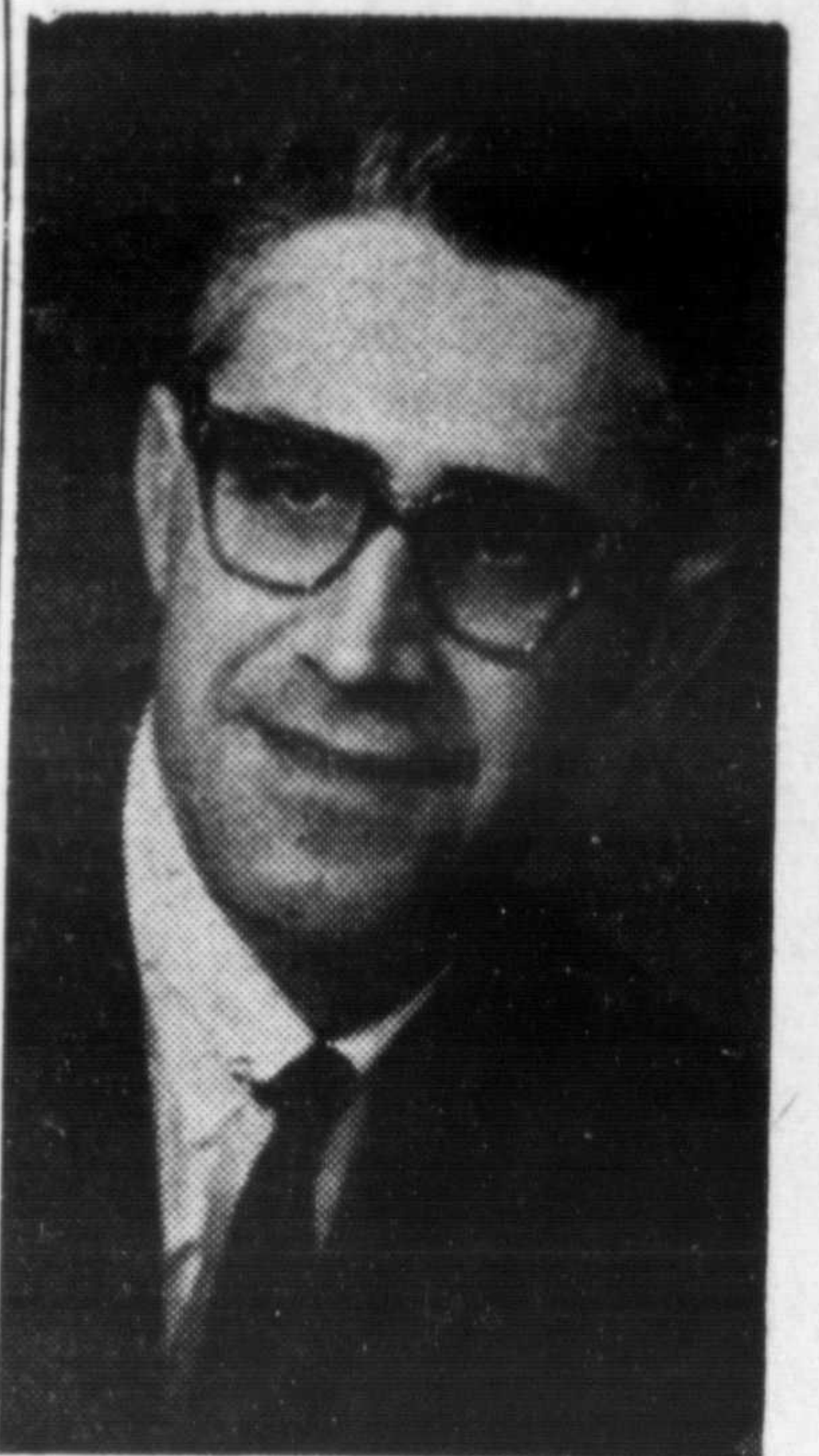

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TOO MUCH MILK

(And one more committee to worry about it)

The farms of the western world are producing more milk than the people can drink and more milk products than we can eat. The situation exists in Canada, too, & it bothers a lot of committees & departments for instance: the Federal and Provincial Department of Agriculture, their various divisions such as Economics, Dairy Products, the Agricultural Stabilization Board, Commodities Division Trade and Commerce Department. Economics Division, Poultry Division, Milk Control Board, Agriculture and Colonization Dept. in Quebec, Dairy Services in Nova Scotia, Dairy Branch in New Brunswick and so on and so on: also non-government groups such as the Advisory Committee on the Agricultural Stabilization Board, the Canadian Dairy Conference Steering Committee, the Canadian Dairy Conference Secretariat, a group of four Canadian Dairy Conference "Rapporteurs" seven Federations of Agriculture, Dairy Farmers of Canada, Co-operative Union of Canada, the National Dairy Council and three Farmers' Unions.

Eighty nine officials representing all these interested groups met in Ottawa last week, having previously written letters to the newspapers stating that the press was not to be admitted to the conference.

After the meeting they mailed out a mimeographed "press communiqué" which starts out "Issues and policy for the dairy industry in Canada were discussed "... etc ..."

What they did actually do, aside from discuss, was to add another group to the above list; another group to interest itself in the problem of the farmer who has more milk than he can sell.

This new group will try to co-ordinate the others and advise them on the subjects of pricing and, price support, export and import policy marketing regulation, quality standard, butterfat content, land utilization, research and promotion, producer information, education and publicity and nutrition.

The new group will be called the Canadian Dairy Advisory Committee and will be composed mainly of members of the various organizations it is going to advise.

One of the continuing studies of this new group will be the question of the need for yet another organization which is being called a "National Agency"

Meanwhile back at the barn, there's milking to be done.

Canadian Recipes

BAKED CONGO STEAK

1½ lbs. round steak
¼ cup flour
¾ tsp. salt
¼ tsp pepper
2 tbsps bacon drippings
1 onion, sliced
1 green pepper, chopped
2 cups tomatoes

Method: Have steak cut 1 to 1½ inches thick. Season flour with salt and pepper and pound into meat with mallet or edge of plate. Brown steak on both sides in hot frying pan. Add tomatoes, onion and green pepper, cover and put in oven to bake for 3 hours at 300° F.

foot ceiling. Vinton's population has always supported a very eager group of dramatic performers and this stage will get lots of use. Dressing rooms will be behind the stage and folding chairs from the old hall will be used for the audience for a seating capacity of about 250.

The opening of the building will be March 17th during the St. Patrick's Day Concert which will be repeated March 18th and as Father May says, "sure and its worth more than that just to see the new hall."

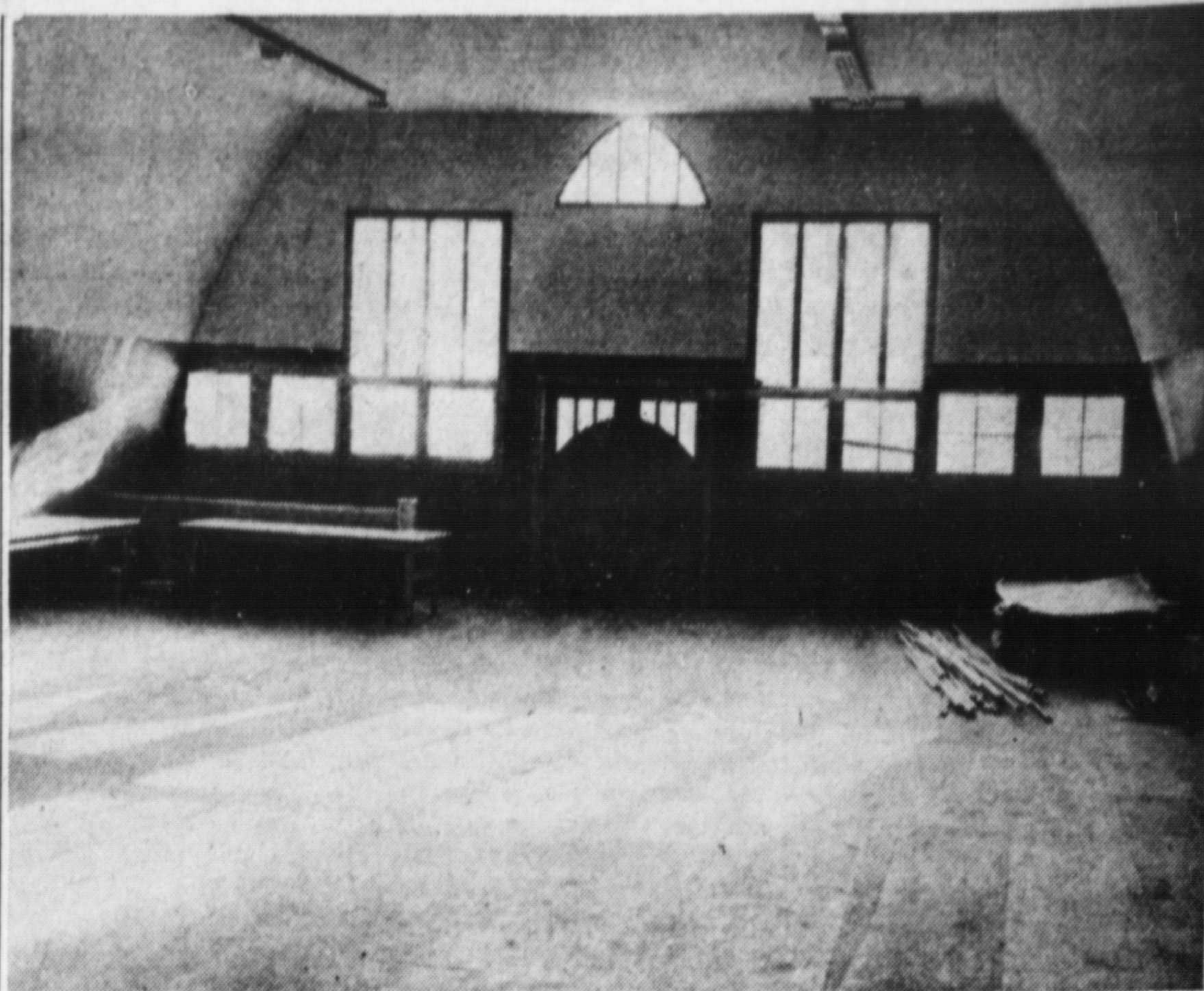

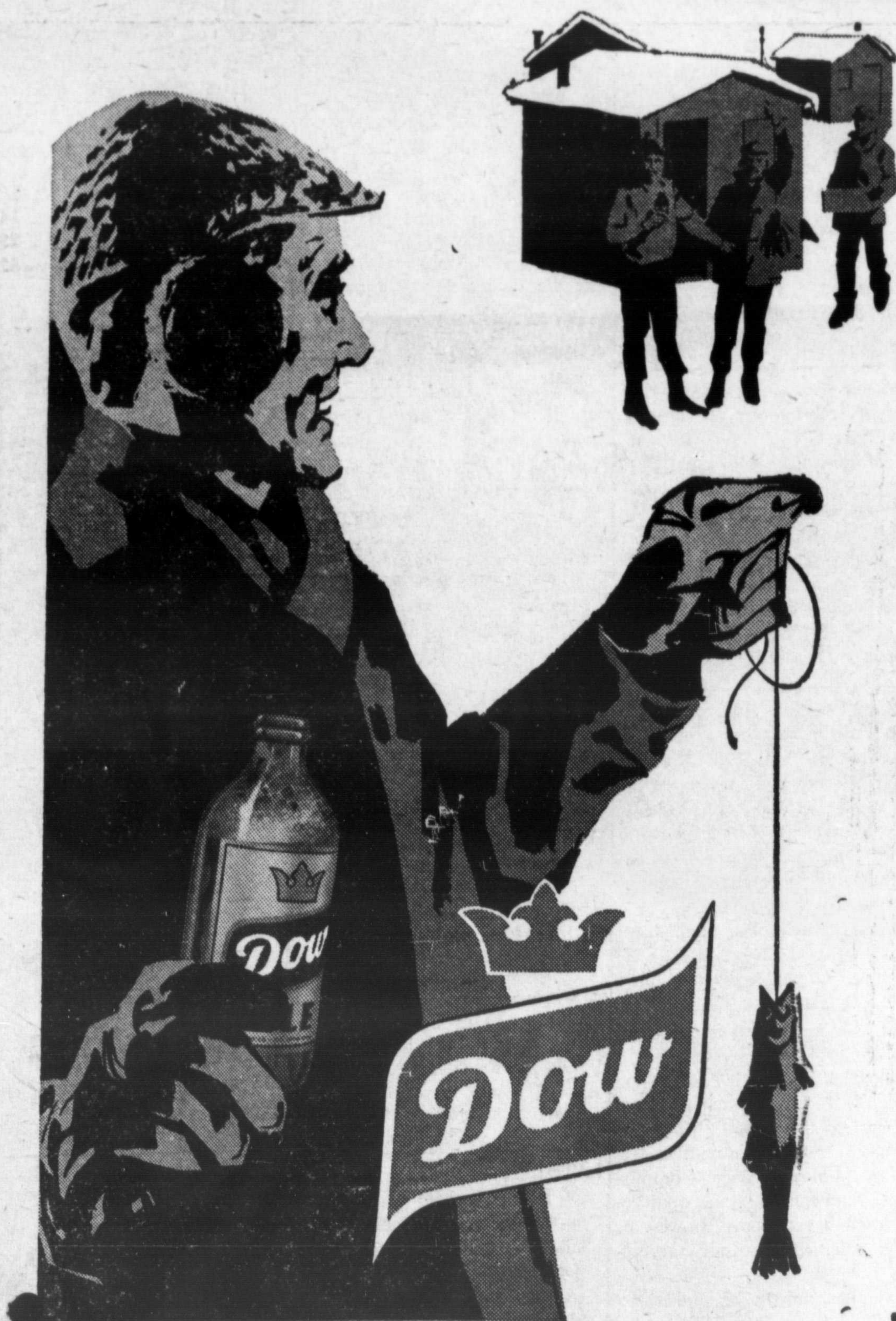
