## Westmount Leads In Real Estate Sales For April

Outremont and Hampstead Trail For Second and Third Places—Number of Big Transactions Boosts Total Values — \$341,655 Involved in Local Sales — Verdun Not in First Three — Westmount Also In Lead For First Four Months.

During the month of April Westmount real estate transactions revealed a phenomenal gain over activities for the preceding month and over the dealings of other suburban municipalities. Figures issued by the Montreal Real Estate Board and based on transactions on the Island of Montreal show Westmount to be strongly in the lead, with Outremont nearly \$100,000 behind for second place and Hampstead in the third place, usually occupied by Verdun.

Twenty seven sales are recorded for April for a total value of \$341,655. Outremont's thirty one sales brought in an aggregate value of \$243,095, and Hampstead records \$98,084 for an even dozen.

During March Westmount fell into third place, the lead being taken by Outremont with Verdun closely behind. These three are, in most months, in the first three places, changing position with each other. Westmount led during February, and dropped to third for March, but has regained leadership with April's transactions.

While Outremont records a larger number of sales, Westmount's fewer transactions involved a greater amount of money. Westmount's sales are usually for a higher individual value than in the other communities.

For the first four months of the year, January to April inclusive, Westmount takes the lead over the other island municipalities, with sixty five sales aggregating \$825,174. Outremont is second with \$736,910, although her sales greatly exceeded Westmount's in point of number, reaching ninety four. Verdun is in customary third place, with eighty five sales bringing in a total of \$419,174.

The inspection was taken by Lt.-Col. B. W. Browne, D.S.O., M.C., in the absence of Brigadier R. O. Alexander, D.S.O., D.O.C., M.D. No. 4, assisted by Lt.-Col. E. L. M. Burns, O.B.E., M.C., General Staff Officer and several other members of headquarters, including Major J. W. H. G. H. Van den Berg, D.S.O., Capt. C. E. Belanger, District Cadet Officer, recently appointed G.S.O. (3) at M.D. No. 4.

There was also a large general public which watched the proceedings, mainly the elementary stages of the new machine-gun form of training, with interest.

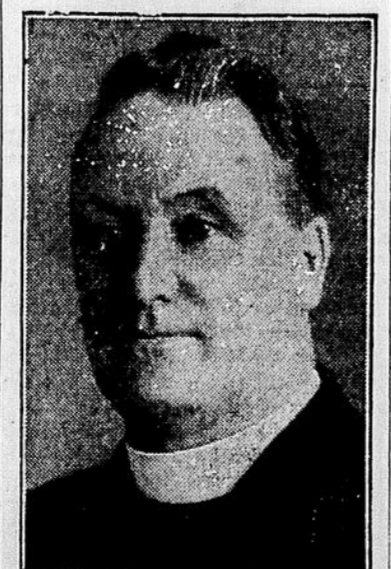

## Rev. Springett Speaks Tonight

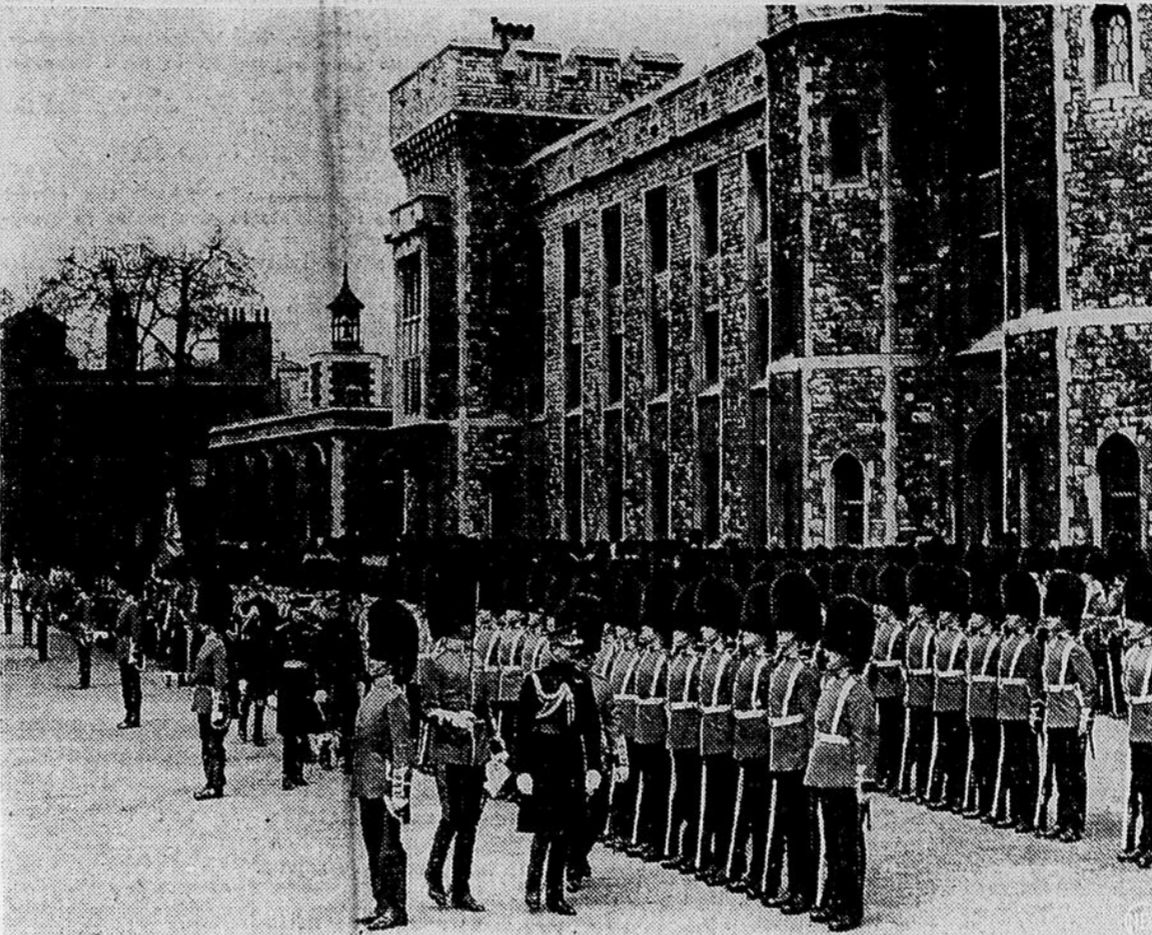

## Local Delegates Attend Canadian Youth Congress

YMCA Group, as Well as Many Individuals and Un-sponsored Young Persons to Represent Westmount Over Week-end

Among the many young people from Westmount who will attend the annual session of the Canadian Youth Congress, to be held in the Plateau School tomorrow, Sunday and Monday, are Howard Matheson, Hoston Scott, Douglas Scott, John Lewis and Jim Patrick. These young men will attend the gathering under the Westmount Y.M.C.A. banner, but a great many from other local institutions, will attend, as will a good number of individuals without group sponsorship.

"Youth Crusade for Peace" is the theme of the session, and represents a concerted movement on the part of young people from all over Canada in the interests of international amity. These young people at their last session united in a clear desire for peace. Since then the drive throughout the world towards war has become accelerated, and the world scene ever more acute. In the firm conviction that they are not the winners, but the chief losers of war, the front-line victims and the future heirs of staggering burdens, the youth of Canada have united in defence of peace.

Registration of delegates will commence tomorrow morning at nine o'clock. The actual Congress will open formally at 1.30, and greetings, reports on the movement and Commission meetings will feature the afternoon. "World Peace" and "Social Justice and Internal Peace" will be discussed.

In the evening an entertainment for visiting delegates will be staged.

On Sunday occupational sub-sections will be held, with a free period to allow delegates to attend church services. In the afternoon caucusing and Commission meetings are scheduled. In the evening the Commissions will meet to discuss their findings.

Monday morning Youth Councils' mutual information sessions will be held, and the findings of the Commissions will be presented and voting held. Caucuses on work of the Continuations Committee will take up the afternoon, and in the evening discussions will be continued. The presentation of Continuations Committee will be held, and the Summary and formal closing will terminate the Congress.

## Brig.-Gen. Smart Is Appointed To Quebec Council

Two Westmount-St. Antoine Residents Honoured at Quebec—Gerard Lemire Named Vice-President of Tramways Commission—Both Appointments Made on Personal Recommendation of William Ross Bulloch

Brigadier-General Charles Allen Smart, former member of the Provincial Parliament for St. Antoine-Westmount division, has been appointed to the Quebec Legislative Council, it was announced Tuesday night by Premier Maurice Duplessis, following a Cabinet meeting at which the Premier stated that this and some other nominations had been sanctioned by Sir Matthias Teller, acting Lieutenant-Governor. It is understood both appointments were made on the personal recommendation of Wm. Ross Bulloch, M.L.A. for St. Antoine Westmount.

The sixty-nine year old veteran of many an election announced his retirement at the Conservative Convention held in Victoria Hall on July 28th last year, just prior to the provincial elections, and gave ill-health as the reason for his dropping out of the political scene, in which he had occupied a brilliant seat for many years. It has been evident, however, that his retirement from the arduous of elections has not indicated a retirement of interest in provincial politics and important matters of public concern; and the news of his appointment to the Legislative Council merely bears out the general impression that the General has maintained a keen watch on the affairs of the province since last summer. His appointment was not unexpected.

"I have come back with the clear realization that the problems which we face in Canada cannot be solved merely by saying that the country is prosperous or by expanding trade. It is highest courage, the grimest determination and the greatest sacrifice if they are to be solved."—Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett.

Fortunately there is no need of sacrifice but it does take courage to put under foot economic ills which one has held for a long time, but which are unsound under the changed conditions which now confront us.

Wars are now entirely economic in their origin. They are as always lost both by the victor and the vanquished.—Barnard Baruch, U.S.A. Financier.

Sir Frederick-Leith-Ross, Economic Adviser to the British Treasury said: "It was not colonies, but economic and monetary policies, arbitrary restrictions on imports and maintenance of an artificial currency level which would place Germany and Italy in inferior economic positions.

Wales has a population of 2,472,377. Nearly one million of the population prefer the Welsh language for ordinary social intercourse.

Money is not indispensable to a community, but is a convenience. The value of a money system does not reside in the money, but in the system—i.e., in the rules which a community makes for counting up its production of wealth and counting out shares to its members.

Rules can be devised so that consumable wealth can be drawn upon as fast as it can be produced, and if under any rules this cannot be done, whereas the community desires to do it, the obstacle lies in the rules, and can be removed by correcting the rules.

The only hope of dealing with the problem of poverty in the midst of plenty is to try to promote an increase of consumption by any and every means, rather than to restrict production. They must pay the consumer to eat rather than to producer to restrict.

Agriculture had been subsidized in the wrong way.—Mr. Boothby, Unionist member for East Aberdeen, in the House of Commons.

The general impression is that Mr. Bennett, indeed, regarded this session as his last; and that, following the Coronation, he will summon party leaders together and signify his desire to retire. Nothing final or definite has been said on the point. Those who might be called upon to assume his mantle are preparing to put their best foot forward when the time comes. There are half a dozen men in the running, it would seem. Usually the indications point rather strongly to one man. Dr. R. J. Manion would be the obvious choice if the Orange Lodge was not such an important factor in the Ontario strength of the party. The same reason, and some others, point against Hon. Maurice Duplessis.

No outstanding Conservative back-bencher has developed in the present parliament. Allan Walsh of Montreal, Howard Green of Vancouver, E. E. Perley of Qu'Appelle, and Denton Massey of Toronto are the more impressive of the most serious contenders in the front benches. Hon. Earl Rowe cannot be counted out as a possibility, nor can Hon. Gordon Harrington. Erick Willis has been mentioned, but one fancies he will have to win his spurs in Manitoba first.

A house-leader, of course, can be chosen without difficulty; and some time might elapse before the party called a national convention for the selection of a new chief. Sir George Perley has always taken Mr. Bennett's place in the House.—Wilfrid Eggleston, Press Gallery Journalist in Huntingdon Gleaner.

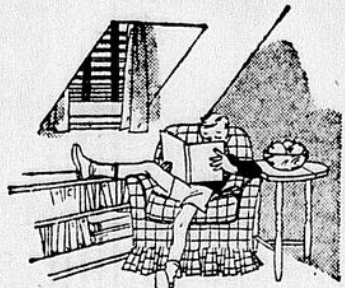

#### Attic Room



Below are a few suggestions which may appeal to you or which may give you ideas of your own. Paint the walls and ceilings a soft, dawn gray, using a quick-drying paint. Color the floor with a rug leaning toward a brown shade—not too light (think of those feet and the condition they may be in at times). Get a bed which sets low off the floor and which has a very low head board. . . . no footboard . . . and stain it a natural wood color. As a coverlet use a rough, heavy cotton of rich marine blue and applique a monogram on the center. There should be a night table by the bed with a lamp easily within reach. No fragile looking lamps for this room . . . one with a loosely woven off-white cotton shade above a blue lacquered wooden base. For a room of this sort the makers of unfinished furniture are friends indeed. Practically all the furniture can be bought in this state and finished to your own taste. A study table, a straight back chair to set before it, a chest of drawers, and quaint book shelves and cases, certainly. Nothing adds so much to the charm of a room as books and a well-lighted, comfortable spot for reading them. And a child appreciates this as much as a grown-up. Have one comfortable easy chair in the room and tailor it fastidiously in yellow hessian plaid in brown. Place gray venetian blinds at the windows, taped in the same blue, and for drapes use the aforementioned rough cotton which was used as a bedspread. And don't forget a wooden bowl of apples placed well within reach of the easy chair. There you have a very first-rate third floor . . . the usual hubbub of the housewife. In fact, you should be downright proud of it.

### National Council Endorses HIP Plan

With the statement that "in the improvement of home conditions lies the solution of many problems now confronting Canadian women," the National Council of Women of Canada has endorsed the Dominion Government Home Improvement Plan. "We are not only willing but anxious to assist our Government to bring to the attention of the public any project which will provide better homes," Mrs. George O. Spencer, President of the Council wrote to the National Employment Commission which sponsors the Home Improvement Plan. "As women and home workers we must accept our full share of the responsibility of the success of this venture."

Mrs. Spencer stated that one of the forces which brought the National Council of Women into being was "an irrefragable protest against indifference to conditions of less fortunate men and women."

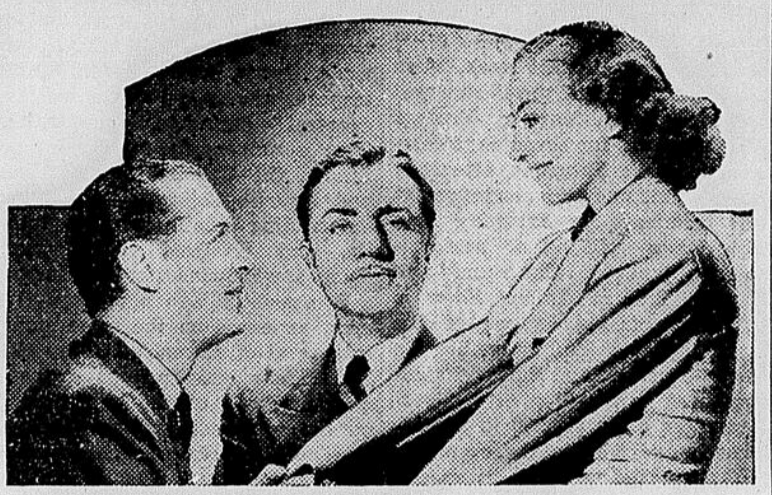

## FULLER DANCING, SINGING, DRAMA SCHOOL RECITAL

Sixth Annual Event Will Be Held in Trinity Hall on Wednesday

The sixth annual recital by pupils of the Fuller School of Dancing, Singing and Dramatic Art will be staged at Trinity Memorial Church Hall on Wednesday. The programme, comprising plays, dances, recitations and songs, by children and adults, promises to be as interesting as it is varied.

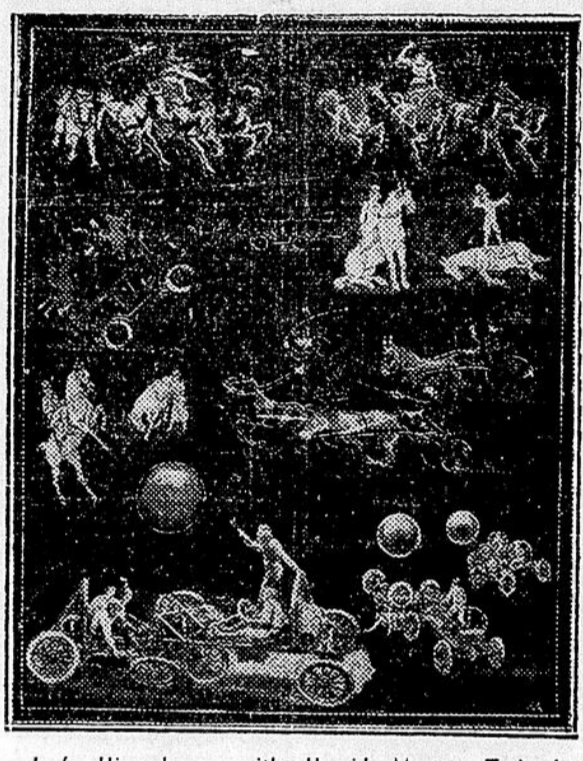
