World News In Brief

Pearl Harbor, Jan. 27.—(P)—The Canadian destroyer *Sioux* arrived here yesterday after five months of patrol duty in Korean waters. She will sail Monday for her home base at Esquimalt, B.C.

Cmdr. Paul Taylor of Victoria said his ship had destroyed nine enemy mines off Western Korea and participated in a number of coastal bombardments.

The *Sioux* was greeted by Hawaiian hula dancers, a United States navy band and the British consul, Geoffrey C. Davies.

Crew members will be given 14 days' special leave when the ship reaches Esquimalt.

Los Angeles, Jan. 27.—(P)—Archbishop J. Francis A. McIntyre of Los Angeles and a well known young priest, Rev. Edward A. Keller, participated yesterday in the weekly meeting of the Los Angeles Rotary Club.

The Archbishop gave the invocation and Fr. Keller, director of the Bureau of Economic Research at Notre Dame University, was the principal speaker.

Their appearance occasioned some surprise amid discussion of the Jan. 11 Papal decree against priests belonging to Rotary or attending its meetings.

Paris, Jan. 27.—(P)—Prime Minister Rene Pleven of France will leave by air Saturday night on his visit to the United States and Canada, his office announced last night.

He is due to arrive at New York at 1:30 p.m. EST Sunday, after stops at Shannon, Ireland, and Gander, Nfld.

The Premier will be accompanied by Gen. Alphonse Juin, Inspector-General of the French armed forces and French representative on the Atlantic Pact Military Committee.

Pleven will confer with President Truman Jan. 28 and 29 and is due in Ottawa by train Feb. 2. He will leave for Paris the following day.

Henri Queuille, Minister of the Interior, will be acting Prime Minister during Pleven's absence.

Honor Heroism Of Waterloo Man

Pittsburgh, Jan. 27.—(P)—Three Canadians, two from Sydney, N.S., and one from Waterloo, Que., were among 12 persons cited for heroism yesterday by the Carnegie Hero Fund Commission.

Herbert G. Piercy, 21, died from suffocation helping to save Stephen Melnick, 23, who fell down a manhole in Sydney last July 11. William J. Graham, 41, was given a citation for his part in the same rescue attempt. Graham was overcome by gas, but recovered.

The other award went to Maxime C. Bergeron, a Waterloo machine operator, who on Dec. 20, in an unsuccessful attempt to rescue Ferdinand Ladurantaye, 26, from his burning cabin.

The widows of Piercy and Bergeron were awarded death benefits of \$80 a month.

United States Renews Call To Brand China Aggressor

Lake Success, N.Y., Jan. 27.—(P)—The United States stood today on its demand for a quick United Nations vote condemning Communist Chinese aggression in Korea, despite a new "peace plan" offered by Canada and Israel.

Backed publicly by President Truman and both Houses of Congress, the United States delegation said it would oppose any substantial changes in its resolution which, as constituted now, tags Communist China an aggressor, asks the U.N. collective measures committee to consider the next step, and creates a three-man commission to seek ways of ending the Korean fighting and achieving U.N. aims in that country by peaceful means.

Both Canada and Israel offered new ideas yesterday designed to bridge the gap between the view of a 12-country Arab-Asian plan for a seven-power conference, including Red China, to work out a cease-fire and decide other Asian problems.

These are expected to be the subject of debate in the 60-country political committee today. If nothing else, this debate will delay any vote until after the week-end.

Sponsors of the Arab-Asian plan held private consultations last night and this morning to work out a way of adopting at least some of the proposals as formal amendments to their own resolution.

Canada's External Affairs Minister, L. B. Pearson, made six suggestions for a compromise. These were:

Temporary Wage And Price Freeze Orders In United States Inflation Battle

Agreement Concluded At Asbestos

(Special To The Record)

Asbestos, P.Q., Jan. 27.—The management of Canadian Johns-Manville Co., Ltd., and the executive of the Syndicat National de l'Amiante d'Asbestos, Inc., and the Federation Nationale des Employes de l'Industrie Miniere, Inc., announced jointly the signing of a Collective Labour Agreement for the next twelve months, i.e., from February 1st, 1951 to January 31st, 1952. The new agreement affects 2,091 employees and provides amongst other items, a general increase of 15 per cent of the 1950 scale of wages, a night shift bonus, a cost of living bonus, an additional paid holiday and an improved employee welfare plan, to be paid 50 per cent by the Company and 50 per cent by the employees.

In addition, in an attempt to promote goodwill and cooperation, the Company agreed to settle, within the next three months, the few cases of workers who have not been rehired or have not been reinstated in their former occupation.

The new labour agreement was signed by the following: Armand Larivie and Raymond Pellerin for the Syndicat; Rodolphe Hamel and Daniel Lessard for the Federation; Karl V. Lindell, J. E. Morrison and C. M. McCaw for the Company.

Others that participated in the negotiations were: O. Champagne, E. Gagne, L. Litalien, F. Champoux, J. B. Rene, J. P. Roy, R. Gagnon, officers of the local Syndicate; Jean Marchand, secretary of the C.T.C.C.; and for the Company, F. H. Molson and P. A. Filteau.

Details of principal changes to the present labour contract can be given as follows:

1. A 15 per cent general increase in wages to be applied to present job and incentive rates, which brings the base labour rate to \$1.09 per hour, or \$52.32 per week. The present average rate per hour will increase from \$1.20 to \$1.28 or \$61.44 per week or \$3,164.00 per year, and the highest hourly rate will reach the figure of \$1.53.

2. A cost of living bonus, to operate as in the past, based on the November 1950 index of 170.7. The bonus can fluctuate up and down but will not go below the index of 170.7.

3. A night shift bonus of two cents for the evening and 3 cents for the night shift.

4. An additional paid holiday, i.e., Labor Day. This makes a total of five paid holidays out of nine holidays.

The agreement was signed following a general meeting of the Syndicate members who gave complete approval of the proposed contract concluded between the Syndicate and Company's representatives.

Delhi or Lake Success within seven days. The United States, Britain, France, Red China, Russia, India and Egypt would be represented.

2. Immediate reference to a group composed of the U.S., Red China and the U.N. Korean commission of the task of arranging a cease-fire.

3. When these arrangements are completed, the seven-power group would consider a peaceful solution of Korean problems including the withdrawal of foreign troops.

4. The group would then proceed to a discussion of other Far Eastern problems.

5. During these discussions other governments would be invited to take part on those sections directly concerning them.

6. The invitation should be transmitted to Peking and an answer requested within 48 hours.

Israel proposed enlargement of the U.N. good offices committee to seek a cease-fire.

Both countries said however, they would support the U.S. demand that Red China be named an aggressor now. India's Prime Minister Nehru has stated that such a declaration would end the chance for a negotiated settlement.

Rome, Jan. 27.—(P)—The Parliamentary Defence committee yesterday approved a bill providing an appropriation of 200,000,000,000 lire (about \$320,000,000) to strengthen Italy's defences. Defence Minister Rinaldo Ossola said the measure had become necessary "owing to the aggravated international situation."

Sweeping Measure Seen as Stop-gap Pending Completion Of Plans for Individual Commodity Controls.

Washington, Jan. 27.—(P)—The United States Government ordered a long-expected temporary freeze of prices and wages last night, then turned today to the mountainous task of making the controls work.

The Office of Price Stabilization, headed by Michael V. Disalle, flashed an SOS to the Federal Bureau of Investigation and other agencies for help in enforcement.

One official said the O.P.S. plans a "ruthless enforcement effort at the outset."

Oddly, at the same time, the O.P.S. enforcement chief suddenly resigned. He is Rear Admiral John H. Hoover, retired naval officer. His reason for quitting was not clear, but another official somewhat hesitantly quoted Hoover as saying he had "completed his job of setting up the enforcement organization."

The twin freezes were welcomed by many men in Congress and in business, but labor leaders raised a big protest over the wage freeze. They want flexible controls that will permit lagging wages to catch up.

The Wage Stabilization Board, which didn't order the wage freeze and took no responsibility for it, renewed its work today on a flexible formula to replace the freeze.

The price freeze does not apply to all prices. A long list of items, including many foods, will still have leeway to rise.

But most prices were frozen at the highest level of the period from Dec. 19 through Jan. 25. Since few things have dropped in price during that period, the general effect is to freeze Jan. 25 prices.

Wages and salaries were simply frozen as of Jan. 25, and no exemptions were listed in the order.

Thus, the Wage Board was under frightful pressure for speed.

Officials believe that the faster the Board completes its general wage policy, the better chance of keeping labor-management peace. Board Chairman Cyrus S. Ching told reporters: "Now we'll be forced to act as quickly as possible."

The price freeze is only a stop-gap, and will melt gradually away as soon as separate orders can be prepared for various kinds of goods.

The only separate orders in existence now are on automobiles and hides, but plenty more are coming. Edward Phelps, Assistant Price Director, said that within 30 days most retailers and some wholesalers will be under new orders controlling their sales margins.

The freeze order does not apply to farm prices of live animals and other raw, unprocessed goods. But certain foods, such as beef, veal, lamb, and pork, come under the freeze—that is, the processor, the wholesaler, and the retailer must keep the price as it is, at least for the time being.

On most foods, however, prices be raised, all the way to the consumer, whenever necessary to reflect a rise in the farmer's price. Some examples: Bread, eggs, poultry, fresh vegetables, peanuts, oranges.

A number of items are specifically exempted from controls, for example, professional fees, insurance rates, freight and passenger rates, utility rates, real-estate prices, and the prices of newspapers, books, magazines, motion pictures, theatre tickets, and advertising rates charged by radio and television stations.

Rents are not controlled under this order, but many areas of the country are still under federal or state rent controls.

Disalle said there are plenty of goods in the U.S. and rationing is not planned in the near future, and maybe not at all.

For violating the price and wage orders, a person can be fined up to \$10,000, imprisoned up to one year, or both. He is also liable to lawsuits.

Favor Gregg For Vacant Senate Seat

Fredericton, Jan. 27.—(P)—Rumors to the contrary, usually well informed political sources here say that New Brunswick's three vacant seats in the Senate will not be filled by the federal government until after prorogation of the 1951 session of the N. B. Legislature.

Despite the recently announced filling of the Newfoundland seats, local opinion leans to the belief that it will be later in the year, at least, before the New Brunswick vacancies are filled.

It also leans to the belief that when the appointments are made one of the seats will go to Labor Minister Milton F. Gregg, Liberal York-Sunbury member of the Commons and New Brunswick representative in the federal cabinet.

Four Freed In Floating Corpse Case

Port of Spain, Trinidad, Jan. 27.—(CP)—Boysie Singh and his four co-defendants, sentenced to death for the "floating corpse" murder here last April, were released by an appeal court here yesterday.

Singh and his friends were convicted of the murder of Phylbert Peyson, whose decomposed body was found floating off the exclusive Bay Shore Yacht Club six miles north of here with his hands and feet bound and his body lashed to a six-foot iron bar.

Peyson's death was part of a scare that swept the Caribbean sea, when 17 fishermen were reported missing at one time, giving rise to rumors that high-speed "pirate" vessels were bringing back the bloody days of the Spanish Main. Most of the fishermen later turned up safely.

The appeal court set the five men free but Singh was re-arrested immediately by a police squad stationed at the prison gates. He was charged with larceny and taken to police headquarters where he was denied bail. No details were given.

The men were arrested in April and faced two trials—the first one ending with the jury disagreeing and the bloody days of the Spanish Main. Most of the fishermen later turned up safely.

The appeal, which lasted four days, saw star witness 14-year-old Mohamed Ali, alias Loomat, a hanger-on at a downtown club owned by Singh. Mohamed said he had witnessed the murder but the court decided his evidence was totally unreliable because he had been arrested as a suspect himself.

Failure To Recognize Red China Flayed By Coldwell

Ottawa, Jan. 27.—(P)—M. J. Coldwell, C.C.F. leader, said last night the new session of Parliament, opening Tuesday, should "condemn" the federal government for "its failure to recognize" the Communist Government of China "long before the Korean invasion."

In a speech prepared for delivery to a public meeting here, Mr. Coldwell said Canada's foreign policy must be subject to the scrutiny of Parliament.

He believed Parliament should commend External Affairs Minister Pearson for his work on the United Nations cease-fire committee, which attempted to halt the fighting in Korea.

"We should proclaim to the world that we will not compromise on the aim of a free and independent Korea, though we shall leave no stone unturned in an effort to achieve this through peaceful means by negotiation," said Mr. Coldwell. "We should work for peaceful and permanent settlement of all other far-eastern problems."

He called for financial and other aid to Asia and said Canada could

Federal And State Heads In Dispute

Sydney Australia, Jan. 27.—(Reuters)—Conservative Federal Ministers and the Labor Premier of New South Wales, James McGirr, have clashed over a federal government proposal to man strike-bound mines with troops and volunteer labor.

McGirr was reliably reported to have refused the assistance of his state police force in crushing the miners' strike, if the federal government insisted on taking such action immediately. Police forces throughout the Commonwealth are controlled by the state governments.

The row blew up over the Communist-led miners' defiance of an anti-strike order issued yesterday by the Coal Industry Arbitrator, F. H. Gallagher.

A complicating factor is the fact that dockers and railmen have also voted for partial strikes in what the government regards as a Communist plot to dislocate Australian industry.

Though they are liable to a fine of \$100 Australian (\$224) or six months in jail, they have declared they will stay away from work one day in every five in protest against an order by Gallagher making the agreed pay increases conditional on 10 full days' work in every 14.

Acting Prime Minister Arthur Fadden and his key ministers came here by plane to confer with the state cabinet because New South Wales is the biggest coal-producing state.

McGirr and his colleagues—mostly former trade union leaders—suggested the federal government should try to win over the Australian Council of Trade Unions, the ruling body to which nearly a union are affiliated.

The state and federal ministers parted after tempers had run high. They left the conference room brushing reporters' questions aside.

Tokyo, Jan. 27.—(P)—A steel-tipped column of two fight-hungry United States corps thrust within 13 miles of Seoul.

A U.S. Eighth Army spokesman called the advance along a 40-mile front through ankle-deep snow a limited offensive.

Already nearly 700 Communists have been slain in two sharp engagements, some with bayonets and rifle butts used as clubs by the United Nations infantrymen. Most of the attackers were Americans.

It was the first real Allied push since Chinese Reds jumped into the war late in November and reversed Gen. MacArthur's end-the-war campaign into a long retreat.

Bombardment warships, convoys of tanks and heavy concentrations of tanks and artillery aided the advance along a line extending eastward from Suwon through Kumyangsang, Ichon and Yoji.

One Allied force driving north reached a hill beyond Suwon and within 13 air miles of Seoul, the burned-out South Korean capital which the Reds took Jan. 4.

The tank-led drive, which jumped off under the eyes of the U.S. Eighth Army commander, Lt. Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, flushed out Chinese and Korean Reds in areas where it was thought they had pulled back.

U. N. forces ran into heavy resistance around Kumyangsang and near Ichon, two of four towns occupied in the first two days of the operation. The others were Suwon and Osan.

Both Kumyangsang and Ichon are in rugged hill country which affords the Reds good defence positions.

Bugle-blowing Reds were repulsed Friday night six miles west of Suwon. Inside the war-wrecked town, Red infiltrators attacked with burp guns and small arms but were driven out.

Another 200 Reds were slain in the Allied occupation of Kumyangsang, 11 miles southeast of Suwon. Navy Corsair planes helped the attackers put down stiff resistance from grenade-hurling communists.

Thirteen miles northeast of Kumyangsang, Ichon was in progress when a fight was in progress three to five miles southwest of that road hub. At last report, U.N. forces were eliminating resistance by two Red battalions.

Warship guns kept pounding away at Seoul's port of Inchon, 20 miles northwest of the allied spearhead beyond Suwon. Thursday night and Friday, the U.S. heavy cruiser St. Paul and two U.S. destroyers shelled Inchon's harbor installations.

Thursday the St. Paul and two Canadian destroyers—the *Nootka* and *Cayuga*—had bombarded the area after silencing Red batteries on the offshore island of Wolmi in a blazing duel.

Allied patrols were on the prowl all across the Korean peninsula. South of Yongwol in the central sector, AP correspondent Tom Stone said the U.N. troops and planes have reduced three infiltrating North Korean divisions by 50 per cent. This force recently was estimated at about 20,000.

U.N. elements occupied Pyongyang, 15 miles north of allied-held Yongwol. Hunter-killer teams reported little contact elsewhere in the central sector where they have pushed to within 33 miles of the 38th parallel beyond Hoengsong. Hoengsong is 34 miles northwest of Yongwol.

Other patrols reported increased activity.

Single Mail Deliveries Are Ordered

Ottawa, Jan. 27.—(P)—The day of two-day mail deliveries to residential districts across Canada is going out within the next month or two. From then on, mail deliveries will be limited to one a day.

For business districts, existing deliveries of three-a-day will be reduced where possible.

The Post Office Department announced yesterday that it has instructed offices across the country to reduce deliveries to one a day as soon as possible, with March 31 indicated as the deadline for the reduction.

Walter Turnbull, Deputy Postmaster-General, said the move, forecast several weeks ago, was in line with the federal government's policy of cutting civil service costs to a minimum.

Home deliveries were limited to one a day during the Second World War. A second delivery was added in 1946.

Mr. Turnbull said some postal employees would have to be let out as a result of the move. The Department has asked its offices to report on savings which could be achieved.

The Department will reduce staff by retiring those employees who have reached retirement age but are still in service, by discharging inefficient personnel and by not hiring any additional help.

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Europeans Keen In Demand For Admission Into Canada

London, Jan. 27.—(P)—Thousands of hopeful Britons and Western Europeans are eagerly awaiting the word that will send them off on a new life of adventure and opportunity in Canada.

They are the advance guard of a growing legion of prospective emigrants who have responded to the Dominion's latest call for settler and manpower reinforcements.

Almost every country this side of the Iron Curtain has contributed its quota to the lengthening waiting line, estimated in excess of 100,000 at present. A large percentage of this number has already been screened and approved by Canadian examination officers but thousands more are queuing up daily at United Kingdom and continental inquiry offices in a scramble to get their names on lists for early sailings.

Here is the latest lineup of possible departures this year:

Great Britain 30,000 Western Germany 25,000 Italy 15,000 The Netherlands 12,000 Belgium and Sweden 8,000 each, France 6,000, Denmark 2,000, and other countries about 5,000.

Many of the candidates are displaced persons from countries under Communist domination. Almost every trade and craft represented although farm workers predominate.

Italy, with more than 2,000,000 unemployed, is sending a record quota of emigrants to Canada.

"Applications to emigrate have increased by more than 300 per cent since last July and we are

Attlee Tells Of Dangers From Russia

London, Jan. 27.—(P)—Harder work and greater sacrifices were urged upon the British people by Prime Minister Attlee last night to speed a new and expanded defence program against Soviet imperialism.

Attlee spoke at a Labor party gathering at Forest Hill, in South-east London, to prepare public opinion for an announcement in the Commons Monday of the new defence program, which may call for spending of up to £5,000,000,000 (\$14,750,000,000) within the next two to three years in support of the Atlantic alliance.

Attlee said he does not believe that another world war is inevitable, "but Russian actions show clearly the danger that the democracies are in if they have insufficient forces."

"No one suggests that the forces that are being collected will be strong enough for an attack on Russia," he said. "They are not being built up for war, but to prevent war. They are intended to act as a deterrent against a would-be aggressor."

One phase of the plan is to call up from 100,000 to 300,000 reservists of the armed forces for short periods of training next summer.

"It will not only demand sacrifice and effort from the country as a whole, but from the individual people in all our varied walks of life," Attlee said. "Our way of life is in danger."

The present rulers of Russia inherited an essentially expansionist tradition of the old Russian Empire and "Stalin has been more successful in his imperialism than the Czar ever dreamed of being," he said.

Attlee said Russia "does not want things to settle down" and, with a powerful army, air force and submarine fleet, "is in a position to threaten the nations that live on the perimeter, outside the Iron Curtain which it has drawn around the countries it has conquered by force or fraud." He estimated Russia has, in all, 2,800,000 men under arms and said "this number could be doubled on mobilization (of reserves)."

"Recent events have brought in new and disturbing elements," Attlee said. "The aggression by communist North Korea, condemned by the United Nations, has the approval of Russia. It has been backed by another communist power, China."

"From the Soviet point of view, it has an obvious utility in diverting forces to the east and in weakening the forces of the western powers in other areas to more immediate interest of Russia."

New Headquarters Being Prepared For Local Aircraft Warning Unit

The Sherbrooke Radar Squadron has recently acquired the J. H. Bryant building located on Depot Street, Sherbrooke, and plans are now being effected to renovate the future headquarters to suit the local needs of the unit. The reconstruction project is being supervised by a staff of permanent force personnel under the direction of Flight-Lieutenant L. J. Nevin, Construction Engineer/Technical of the R.C.A.F. and it is expected that the building will be completely renovated within the near future.

Since its inception in the latter part of 1949, the unit, officially designated as No. 2450 Aircraft Control and Warning Unit, has been expanding steadily. S/L F. W. McCrea, Officer Commanding the unit, has announced that the addition of space and facilities of their quarters will aid greatly in the further growth of the squadron and will permit a larger intake of recruits.

The new headquarters will be fully equipped to train inexperienced recruits in various technical trades. With the present syllabus of training, as it is presently set up, it will be possible to turn out qualified fighter controllers, radar technicians, radar operators, communication technicians, communication operators, operations clerks and teletype operators within a period of one year. Upon completion of a course of training a graduate may either remain with the

Unit or be released to make room for another trainee. In the event of a national emergency the graduate could apply his knowledge either to the R.C.A.F., the Army, the Navy or in some useful capacity in essential industry. Wherever he would choose to apply his training the overall function of the unit, and others like it throughout the Dominion, would have been served. The new headquarters will also be equipped with a synthetic trainer which, in addition to a syllabus of training, will enable student controllers to simulate actual conditions that could exist under enemy bombardment and hostile fighter activity. Upon completion of his course the qualified controller will with use of radar be able to offer navigational assistance to friendly aircraft and direct friendly fighter aircraft to intercept enemy aircraft at a given point and at a given time.

The completion of the new headquarters will represent another important link in the chain of radar stations that are being set up across Canada for the purpose of thwarting possible enemy air attack.

The new quarters, it has been announced, will probably become known as the Air Force Centre since, incorporated in the plans are quarters for the Air Cadets and it is also anticipated that facilities will be made available to the R.C.A.F. Association in connection with their periodic meetings.

Local Decision Expected Upon Rotary Clubs

Vatican City, Jan. 27. — L'Osservatore Romano said yesterday Roman Catholic bishops must decide locally whether to exhort Catholic laity to withdraw from the ranks of the Rotary Club.

The Vatican newspaper said that in some countries, "in practice," Rotary had shown itself to be "tolerant and well-meaning towards religious interests."

The comment, described by the Vatican press office as "an authorized article" and by other Vatican sources as having been prepared by the Supreme Congregation of the Holy Office, which issued a decree concerning Rotary on Jan. 11, reiterated that Catholic clergy cannot be members of Rotary or attend its meetings.

The comment was issued, it said, because of various requests for clarification and because of published interpretations of the decree some of which "minimized" and others "amplified" the import of the decree.

The comment did not detail minimizations or amplifications but said it was "an error" to attribute to Rotary all the qualifications of Canonical Code 681—clerics by the decree—which exerts Catholics to guard themselves from "associations that are secret, condemned, seditious, suspected or that seek to draw away from the legitimate vigilance of the church."

Scotstown Sergeant Services Vehicles Of Famous Regiment

Fort Lewis, Wash., Jan. 27.—In their training area some thirty miles from Special Force Headquarters at this Army Camp, the famed Royal 22nd Regiment this week started out on exercise "Little Joe" which will see the whole Battalion practicing battle procedure and tactics for the rest of this month. The scheme planned by Lt.-Col. J. A. Dextre, of Montreal, is intended to give the Battalion a real test in operational methods and they are living in the open in tactical positions approximating actual operations in war.

For the purpose of the scheme the Regiment has been made up into regular battle echelons and in this manner all the elements of the Battalion are receiving valuable practice in the functions they would have to perform in battle. All rations and supplies are delivered to the unit in the field and the Brigade supporting arms are thus also getting first class benefits from their part in the scheme.

Lt.-Col. Dextre expressed himself as "Very pleased," with the reaction of the men under his command to the rigorous training on the exercise so far, "the soldiers are as happy as children on a picnic," he commented. The noticeable drop in the number of men attending sick parade since the exercise started is as good an indication as any of the high morale prevalent in the unit. Constant practice in taking up defensive positions, patrolling, and Company and Battalion attacking formations over the wooded terrain by night and day will keep the Quebec lads busy during the four week duration of the scheme.

It is intended to end the exercise by an attack on the main camp with the Battalion consolidating on the parade square facing Brigade Headquarters.

Strangers would be well advised to give the "Van Does" area a wide berth for the duration of the scheme since fighting patrols constantly on the move are no respecter of persons and with orders to capture anyone who does not belong to their particular formation

The Commanding Officer had high praise for his company commanders and gives them credit for the success of the exercise so far. They include Major J. Y. L. Dube of Quebec City; Major John H. T. Gauthier, second-in-command of the Regiment of Montreal; Major G. R. Lamothe, Three Rivers, and Major J. M. Richard, of Quebec City.

Sgt. Murdo Morrison, of Scotstown, son of Alec M. Morrison of that town is N.C.O. in charge of vehicle repair for the Royal 22nd and was noticed hard at work on the unit's trucks during the exercise. Sgt. Morrison's quarters are the envy of all his comrades since he has built an ingenious contrivance to heat his tent and the warmth from his oil stove is welcome in the raw wet weather which has prevailed since the start of the scheme. Sgt. Morrison has rigged up an empty oil drum with stove pipes and has a home made pressure oil feed running oil to his stove where it burns furiously, sending out welcome waves of heat. While not considering patent rights on his Rube Goldberg creation, Sgt. Morrison is quite satisfied with the results.

The campaign objective is, as usual, \$12,000 for the district of Sherbrooke and the Eastern Townships. Last year's total was well over \$15,000, and although the drive for this year is not yet under way, the figure of last year may be reached and surpassed. The figure spent in this area last year actually exceeded the complete campaign figure by some two or three thousand dollars, but the deficit was arranged by Sherbrooke's share of the Lindsay fund and the annual prevention grant.

Of the many appeals made annually to the generosity of the citizens of Sherbrooke and the Eastern Townships, the annual campaign for the Institute is one of the most popular and appealing and the work done among the local blind and on behalf of those threatened by blindness is one which should readily commend itself to the generosity of all walks of life.

The Institute in Sherbrooke was organized in 1940, and is now going into its twelfth year of service to the blind. In all these years, the annual appeal has never fallen on deaf ears, and funds adequate to carry on have almost been forthcoming from the generous citizens of Sherbrooke and the Eastern Townships.

Economic Importance Of Industry Outlined By Chamber Of Commerce

A large number of people ask what an industry means to a city, the Monthly Bulletin of the local Chamber of Commerce declares in commenting on the drive of municipalities to increase their industrial potential. Replying to its own question, the Chamber quotes the following figures, many of which are obtained from a review published by the Atlanta, Ga., Chamber of Commerce:

The payroll of one factory employing 150 men supports on the average: 393 occupied homes, 24 additional professional men, 6600 acres of additional farm produce required, 1-22 room school house and 18 teachers, 33 retail stores, 1/2 million dollars retail sales, 320 cars and services for them, 2 1/2 million dollars additional taxable valuation.

The figures as shown above give the impact on the country generally from the provision of the raw materials to the marketing of the final product.

"The direct impact of the same industry on the economy of the town while not so startling as the foregoing is still an impressive array."

But on the other hand, each one of those 150 jobs was rendered possible only through the investment of savings from hundreds of

people. The Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corp. and the Machinery and Allied Products Institute have made a special study of the investments needed to provide one job in industry.

It takes an average of \$10,800 worth of machines and factory building to provide one job in Canada. That \$10,800 has to be saved before it can be invested in those tools for that job.

"The average savings of a Canadian are \$1,120, and that includes his government bonds, life insurance, bank account and everything else. \$10,800 divided by \$1,120, equals the life savings of 9 Canadians to provide each Canadian job.

TURN THIS DOWN HARD

So that we could make new food deals with the British Government in peacetime, Agriculture Minister Gardiner, in Toronto last week, suggested that we might have to amend the British North America Act. If Mr. Gardiner does bring such a proposal before Parliament, it should be turned down hard, the Financial Post comments, continuing:

Any enthusiasm there might once have been for this state trading business, must surely have been quenched by our disastrous experience with the British wheat agreement. Ottawa would be well advised to leave the selling of foods and all other commodities to the regular and experienced trade. To do otherwise is to risk large sums of the taxpayers' money and to discourage any hope of returning to multilateral or free international trade so vital to Canada's future prosperity.

Mr. Gardiner, of course, did not go into details of what would most certainly happen if the BNA Act were revised, and if Ottawa did guarantee to deliver all sorts of food to Great Britain in peacetime. It would mean not only price control for every single product in Canada, but eventually it would mean rigid government control over production and distribution as well. Instead of the individual farmer deciding what he would grow, and where and when he would sell, a board at Ottawa would do all that deciding for him. The temporary or emergency control exercised by the Government during the war would be extended and be made permanent.

Mr. Gardiner merely mentioned that to enter into food agreements with Great Britain, the Canadian Government would have to have the power to enforce deliveries. No government, federal or provincial, he said, under our constitution had that power now and we can thank our lucky stars that none have. No government in any democracy should have that power and certainly not in peacetime.

To enforce deliveries so as to be able to export agreed upon quantities to the British Government, Ottawa would have to step in as it did with cheese, bacon and eggs during wartime and divert from the domestic or any other market a large part, or perhaps, at times, all of our total production. Until the contract was filled no other agency would be permitted to buy and other outside customers would have to wait. The domestic market, of course, would only get the leftovers, provided there were any, and because the Canadian Government would be by long odds the biggest buyer, and for long periods the only buyer, what it paid — or really what the British Government had agreed to pay — would set the prevailing price. From the point of urging farmers to grow this or that commodity which the Canadian Government had pledged itself to deliver, it would only be a little while until Canadian farmers were being told what they could or could not grow.

Canadian farmers will be a good deal less shrewd than we know they are if they step into a mess like that.

"POOR CIRCULATION"

"Poor circulation" is a physical ailment that human beings suffer from, but medical science can do a great deal to rectify that distressing complaint. "Poor circulation" is the most distressing complaint that a newspaper can be afflicted with, and once the disease sets in there is little that can be done to revive the patient. It may die a lingering death.

The Daily Worker, organ of the Communist Party in the United States, is a victim of poor circulation. The editor said so the other day in an editorial. He admitted that the circulation had fallen to a point where the existence of the paper is definitely menaced. He blamed the readers for neglecting their duty in maintaining their subscriptions and getting new ones, and urged each of the survivors to act as carriers and get the paper in his neighbor's home.

The thesis is something new that it is the duty of a reader of a paper to act as subscription agent if his neighbor does not want to read the paper. In this country everybody has the

right to choose his favorite daily, and if he does not like a particular paper he cannot be forced to buy it, or even to read it if his neighbor hands him the paper to peruse for the supposed good of his soul. In Russia, of course, things are different. There are no Liberal, Conservative or even independent papers. They are all of one party, and the working people have to read them or go without . . . not without news but probably without food.

The Daily Worker used to have a circulation of over 40,000. Now it has dwindled to 18,000. That is not much out of a population of 150,000,000 Americans. It looks as if the Communist organ is moribund. Evidently there will be few mourners at its demise. The paper it uses can be put to much better use.

THINK, GENTLEMEN, THINK
The Legionary

The Canadian Legion does not believe another world-embracing war is inevitable. The Legion does believe with the utmost conviction that if there is to be peace, it can only be founded on strength of arms, and that, if there is to be war, it will be inviting disaster not to be prepared for it. The Legion also believes that in proportion to our population and wealth, the present armed strength of Canada is far too scanty to render to our friends and allies the help which they may reasonably expect from us, and without which it is entirely possible that they will not be strong enough either to preserve world peace or to win a world war.

The word "scanty" is used advisedly. Without breaking any security regulations, here are the manpower figures (which are readily available to anybody, including the Russian military attaché in Ottawa) for Canada's armed forces as at December 31, 1950, (and there has been no appreciable change since). The Legionary has ascertained: Active forces—Navy, 10,199; Army, 22,447 regulars, 10,263 Special Brigade, or 32,715 in all; Air Force, 18,865; total active forces, 61,779. Reserve forces—Navy, 4,782; Army, 45,302; Air Force, 3,000; total reserve forces, 53,084; grand total for all forces, 114,863.

It should be pointed out that as far as the reserve army total is concerned it is a "paper figure." It is a well known fact that regiments having the meagre strength of 200 ranks (and there are a great many never have a parade turnout of more than 50—not even on special occasions such as a ceremonial march-past, with His Excellency the Governor-General taking the salute. It is in fact extremely doubtful—though the Defence Minister probably won't admit it—that the Reserve Army has more than 10,000 "effectives" out of a paper strength of 45,000. Accepting the Naval and Air Force figures at their face-value, this means that the total strength of Canada's armed forces—regulars and active reserves—is only slightly over 100,000 men.

Britain, with three times Canada's population, has (and again we are not breaking any security regulations) 800,000 men in her regular forces and 1,000,000 "National Service men" who have received a year's compulsory, full-time training and are now in the reserves—a total of 1,800,000. Moreover, Britain has 500,000 men making munitions now and will have 750,000 by spring.

The present breakdown of the United States forces is not available at this writing, but General Marshall, the Secretary of Defence, has requested—and will no doubt obtain—congressional approval for funds to have 3,465,000 men called up, equipped and trained within the next few months.

Based on the British figures alone, Canada should, on a proportionate basis, have 265,000 men in the regular forces and 335,000 trained reserves, or a total of 600,000. What have we got? A scant 100,000. In addition, to match Britain's defence effort, we should by spring have 250,000 men making armaments.

After studying these facts, after contemplating the critical, near-explosive state of the world, can any fair-minded person conscientiously say that the Legion's Call for Preparedness is unrealistic and extravagant? Can anyone aware of the crucial seriousness of the present situation honestly claim that the battle-wise veterans of the Canadian Legion are going too far in asking for National Registration so that our government may know how many men we have in the various age groups and how they can be most efficiently used? In requesting that our industrial resources be mobilized for defence production—so that our men may have proper arms and equipment if they should have to fight? In proposing that men be drafted through a national selective service plan for training in the reserve forces—so that Canada may at least have the framework of a fighting force with which to help preserve world peace, or if the worst comes to the worst, fight for our country's survival?

DISCOUNTING THE ST. LAWRENCE WATERWAY

While another bill approving expenditures for the St. Lawrence Waterway project has been introduced for submission to the United States Congress, and while sources in or near the Canadian government have advanced the possibility of an all-Canadian waterway, certain United States concerns have taken steps which may be regarded as discounting the possibility that a waterway will be built in the near future. These concerns are three in number. They are all steel industries.

One is the United States Steel Corporation. It has announced that it is building a huge new integrated steel plant—that is, a complete steel works—on a site on the Delaware River, near Trenton, N.J. The second is the National Steel Corporation, which has announced its intention of erecting a mill on the same river, further to the south. The third is a U.S. government-approved steel plant, also complete, given no other designation as to ownership. It is to cost \$250,000,000, and is to be erected in the New London, Conn., area.

Whether or not these three new plants are intended to influence the U.S. Congress in considering the St. Lawrence Waterway project has not been made clear. That might be the intention. On the other hand, the decision to erect them might simply be the result of conviction that the waterway will be further postponed, and the certain knowledge that a closer link must be established with fresh supplies of iron ore to replace the rapidly dwindling resources of the once fabulous supplies of Mesabi ore from Minnesota.

The two greatest potential sources of iron ore now appear to be Labrador and Venezuela. The bleak and river country once described by Jacques Cartier as "the land that God gave Cain" is now known to contain vast iron ore bodies, and if there is no river route for transporting it the next most economical route would be to the New England coast—if there were mills there. The same applies to supplies from Venezuela, over and above the tonnage that could be absorbed by the Alabama steel industry. Apparently, mills will now be built in New England. They will perhaps be more vulnerable to air attack, but they are the only answer, in the absence of a St. Lawrence Waterway. It remains to be seen what effect these announcements will have on the future of that suggested marine passage.



Wanted: Good Neighbors!

As a boy I knew a man to whom we referred to as "Neighbor Lynch." At the corner of our garden he lived and I often visited his home, a typically Irish one with music, dancing, good fellowship, good humor and happiness. Often I trace my admiration for Irish Catholics back to Neighbor Lynch, his son, a gifted lawyer, and his granddaughter, a talented musician who is now a nun.

Early in life then I discovered that a good neighbor is a precious asset. You have, no doubt, made a similar discovery. In fact the story of Canada can be written to the score of good neighbors. For there are millions in this dear land who are willing to help others even though they give not a dollar and say not a word. Let a crisis—a fire, a flood, a death—arise and good neighbors respond magnificently. It is a part of the Canadian way of life to be a good neighbor. We are good neighbors to the people of the United States and have an unforgotten frontier, from sea to sea. As members of the British Commonwealth of Nations we Canadians have a warm, intimate relationship with each member nation. Of the seventy-four countries of the world some fifty-eight are endeavoring to maintain and strengthen a good neighbor policy within the framework of the United Nations. But there are difficulties.

City life does not foster neighborliness. There people do not sometimes know those who live next door. Of this "man swarm" a modern poet penned that he "thought the house across the way was empty; but since yesterday crepe on the door makes me aware that someone has been living there." Then, too, in cities there are, unfortunately, neighborhood "gangs" which, when fanned by religious, racial and class prejudices, can be a source of great trouble.

Refreshing, encouraging and inspiring is it to read of those 133 Jewish War Veterans in New Brunswick, N.J., who substituted for their Christian brethren so that the latter might spend Christmas

at home with their families. Now I wish this spirit were more general and there were less of that all too critical, harping, negative, un-operative fanatical type—the result of narrow prejudiced minds fed on crooked thinking. As alert, progressive, forward looking Canadians we must rededicate ourselves to keeping alive the Spirit of Neighborliness—the spirit which holds the world together. It is God's specific for the prevention and cure of social disintegration.

"MY NEIGHBOR SECOND?" Analyze the "abundant" life as advocated by the Church of God and you will find that it is written to the score of "God first," my neighbor second and yourself last. This is not always the order, is it? Times we find the accent on man. Then, if it doesn't get lost in philosophy, psychology, or social service it may finally get round to God.

The "Divi" order offers us a life based on heroic faith and unwavering love, with the Infinite always taking preference over the finite. God first, man second. When our slack-twisted generation recovers this order we shall find Neighborliness with its spirit of adventure flowering afresh.

Go back to the Ten Commandments (Ex. 20:16) and you will find the old historic word—Neighbor. Look it up! Into the English language, by way of the Anglo-Saxon, that fine old word came, derived from neah, near, and gebur, inhabitant. How far from its initial meaning we have travelled!

"LOVE THY NEIGHBOR?" Continue through the Best of Books—the Bible—and look up the many references to the word Neighbor. I like that command: "Love thy neighbor as thyself." Difficult? Of course! But challenging! Nor are we left to any spasmodic interpretation, for Jesus, in His immortal story named the Good Samaritan, showed what being a neighbor involved. Christ laid down His life for the brethren and showed what "the brethren" meant.

During 1951 then, won't you resolve to cultivate the need of good cheer? It is by far the best gift you can give your neighbor. And it isn't such a difficult thing to do, either, especially if you are in the mood for it. I guess that it is the difficulty—to keep in the mood for it.

THE NEW ORDER FOR 1951
God first, then, your neighbor second, and thyself last is the new order for 1951. This necessitates our applying the Spirit of Christ—the Christmas Spirit—in all its phases throughout all the days in this New Year. All who adopt this rule will be kind in word and deed every day in their endeavor to show that they are their brothers' keepers, and will accordingly acquire freedom from prejudice, greed and fear and actualize the greatest art in all the world—the art of loving one another and living together peacefully, harmoniously, successfully.

No thinking person can ignore the fact that we have "in God," a common origin and share a potential brotherhood in Christ. We are children of God, members of Christ and inheritors of the Kingdom of Heaven. We have, therefore, one Father, God. (Mal. 2:10). Your race, your denominational beliefs, your social position, these matter not. In God we are one. And when we enshrine God as Father we shall love our Neighbor and, in every word and action, reveal the spirit of neighborliness.

Away then with all differences that divide and see henceforth in all those who walk beside us along

in His vocabulary when He gave the Great Commission, the definite command to go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature. (Matt. 28:19).

Every creature then is your neighbor and my neighbor. Every man is a brother. It was said of Sir Walter Scott that "he treated every man like a born brother."

Do we? Every man? Yes, in so far as we are true to the Founder of our faith, Jesus.

Jacoby On Bridge

WHICH SIDE WOULD YOU RATHER BE ON?

"Which would you rather be in this hand, a friend asked me the other day, 'declarer or defender?' Since this particular friend is a rather tricky fellow, I took a second look before I answered. Maybe my readers would also enjoy taking a first and a second look at the hand.

The average player's first thought is that dummy's plays low at the first trick, and East wins with the king of spades. He returns a spade to dummy's ace and dummy then leads a heart. East can take the ace of hearts, if he likes, to return his last spade. But South wins with the queen of spades and gives up a club trick. East gets his king of clubs for the third defensive trick, but then declarer wins the rest.

Therefore the average player says that he wants to be declarer. There's an answer to this choice. Let the average player take the South hand. He plays a low spade from dummy at the first trick, and waits for you to play the king of spades from the East hand.

But you fool him by playing a low spade. Now he wins with the queen of spades and takes the club finesse. You take the king of clubs and return the king of spades to dummy's ace. South can run only eight tricks without touching hearts, but the moment he leads hearts, East can take the heart ace and lead to West's established spades.

Therefore it seems that the defense has the advantage in this hand. However, there's an answer to the answer. Declarer can surely make the contract by playing the ace of spades from dummy at the first trick.

President Campbell To Investigate Brawl

Montreal, Jan. 27. — (P) — President Clarence Campbell of the National Hockey League said yesterday he will be in Boston today and deal with the match-penalty battle staged by Bill Ezinicki and Ted Lindsay.

The two wingmen — Ezinicki of Boston Bruins and Lindsay of Detroit Red Wings — slugged it out in a bloody fight Thursday night during the game at Detroit which ended in a 3-3 tie.

The match penalty is the heaviest a referee can assess and was the first in the N. H. L. in two seasons. It calls for immediate suspension until the League President considers the case.

Johnny Gilbert's Future Doubtful

Pasadena, Calif., Jan. 27. — (P) — Johnny Gilbert, veteran jockey who was severely injured in a spill at Santa Anita racetrack Jan. 4, expects to be released from hospital in about three weeks.

Gilbert, who bopped home his first winner at Winnipeg, suffered a fractured cervical vertebra when his mount, Spinard, collided with another horse that had broken a leg.

Gilbert has regained most of the use of his left arm and partial use of the right, but his riding future is still problematical, physicians say.

Minor Leagues Should Withdraw From C.R.U.

Toronto, Jan. 27. — (P) — Ted Reeve said yesterday in his column in the Toronto Telegram that the minor groups in the Canadian Rugby Union "are suckers to a bit" for the Big Four and Western Conference to withdraw from the C.R.U.

Reeve says minor football in Ontario, Quebec and elsewhere is flourishing "so, why wait to get the boot from the big boys?"

He suggests the lesser C.R.U. groups form "The National League" which will embrace all clubs in Canada with the exception of Big Four and Western Conference teams.

"This would allow the above-mentioned outfit to call themselves The American League and be done with it," said Reeve who added that The National League should not use American imports.

"There is nothing the matter with these fellows, but if they wish to play here let 'em do it in the Big Four and Western Senior League."

He also said if a player jumped from the non-professional National League he should be barred from ever playing in the League again and that no team should be associated in any way with a club in the American.

SPORT SHORTS FROM BRITAIN

London, Jan. 27. — (P) — It took those unpredictable gremlins to get Reg. Lewis, hero of the 1949-50 English soccer season, back into the Arsenal line-up as a regular.

A cruel twist of fate—the sidelining of high-scoring Doug Lishman with a broken leg—brought Lewis' sudden recall. No one regretted the circumstances of his return to the limelight more than Lewis, for it was a similar bad break months ago that shunted him into the reserves.

When Lewis scored the only two goals against Liverpool in the Cup Final at Wembley last spring, he was hailed as a king-pin opportunist and master marksman.

For him the future looked particularly bright.

But in the first practice match of the current campaign Lewis was tackled heavily and had to be carried off the field. His injury failed to respond to treatment with the result he was declared unfit for the opening game of the official season.

Young Lishman was called to fill the gap and did the job so thoroughly that the management declined to disturb a winning combination when Lewis was again ready for action.

Faced with the problem of not being able to find a place in the first team for one of the outstanding players in first division soccer, Manager Tom Whittaker offered Lewis a chance to keep in match practice with the reserves.

Reg. Lewis, however, preferred to act as a reserve with the league team and help with coaching duties.

Loyal To Club
Despite tempting offers from several other clubs, competing for his services in a booming transfer market, Lewis stuck to the gunners with unswerving loyalty.

Then the gremlins struck with every match and setting a hot pace in the goal-scoring races, skidded on an icy patch in a match against Stoke City and was carried to the dressing room with a broken ankle.

Arsenal flourished in a six-game tail-spin and dropped from the league leadership. A hurry-call went out for Lewis and the team started clicking again.

"Until his recall to his old post, Lewis had played only 45 minutes of first-class soccer this season and had not kicked a ball in a football league match."

Lewis, however, is no stranger to the whim of the game. At the start of last season an injury put him out of action and Arsenal lost four of its first five matches. Lewis returned to the lineup and scored nine goals in seven games.

Ben Hogan Forced To Sidelines By Flu

Phoenix, Ariz., Jan. 27. — (P) — Ben Hogan withdrew from the \$10,000 Phoenix Open Golf Tournament yesterday because of an attack of intestinal influenza, and Chick Harbert grabbed the second-round lead with his second sub-par round and a 36-hole score of 133.

The illness brought an abrupt halt to the first 1951 competitive appearance for Hogan, golf's man of the year.

Hogan had taken the 6,698-yard Phoenix Country Club course apart with a six-under-par 69 Thursday to hold a one-stroke lead.

Harbert, a 35-year-old former Ryder Cup player, fired a 67 to go with his 66 for Thursday.

T. J. left him two strokes in front of Lloyd Mangrum and veteran Lawson Little. Mangrum fashioned a 68 today and a total of 135. Little had a 69 and the same total.

Vancouver's Stan Leonard added a 71 to his 70 of Thursday for a total of 141.

Quebec, Jan. 27. — The perennial sports question of the year against experience came into the picture today at the Quebec Province curling championships.

Two rinks, Bourlamaque Sigma—that's youth—and Quebec Victoria—experience—met in the ninth and final round to determine who will represent Quebec at the Dominion curling championships.

With seven wins and one loss, the northwestern rink boasted "one-game edge over the Quebecers."

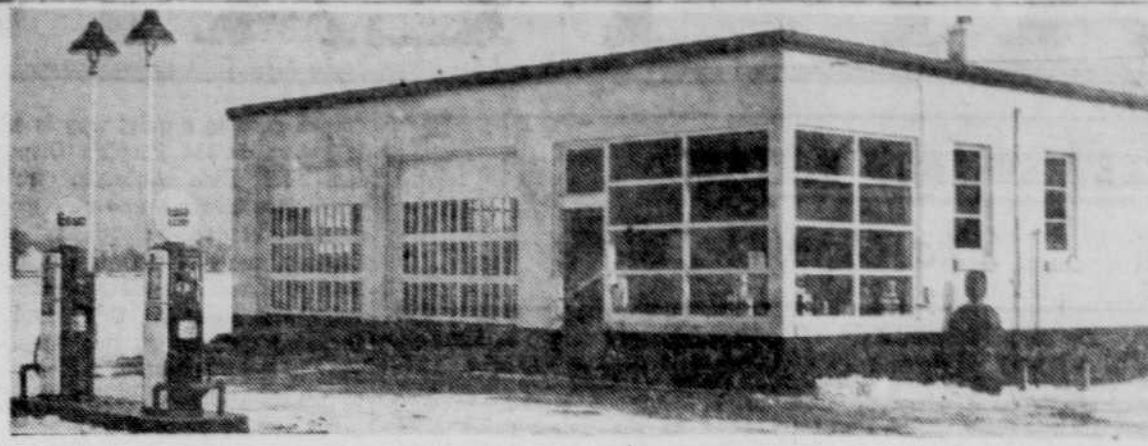

"If we are to maintain our pay-as-you-go policy, if we are to keep inflationary pressure at a minimum, some adjustments will be needed," Mr. Howe said.

He did not disclose what those adjustments will be, but it is generally believed they will include greater clamp-downs on distribution of scarce materials, price curbs on key commodities and higher taxation to deflate purchasing power.

On the whole, however, said Mr. Howe, the outlook for 1951 is one of the continuing economic expansion.

"International trade should be at high levels. Rearmament will tend to decrease exports to certain countries, the improvement in the world's economic and financial position should make possible further reductions in trade discrimination and restrictions."

In 1950, Canada saw a record

year of economic and trade growth. Outbreak of fighting in Korea added impetus to Canadian economic and defence preparedness.

Total parliamentary appropriations for the fighting forces and for arms for European countries brought Canada's military outlays to about \$1,000,000,000 in 1950, Mr. Howe said.

He estimated that before parliament begins considering the new 1951 budget two-thirds of that billion dollars will be spent for munitions and equipment.

Even so, less than 10 per cent of gross national product would be devoted to defence preparations.

"Defence expenditures are not spread evenly over the whole economy but tend to concentrate on industries that make use of such basic materials as steel, Aluminum, Nickel and other non-ferrous metals, creating shortages of materials and services essential to civilian production as well as to defence requirements."

In the post-war expansion drive, Canada has developed new thriving industries devoted to production of electronic equipment, spe-

cial industries machinery, synthetic rubber and fibres which only a few years ago were "either in their infancy or non-existent."

The year 1950 was an example of the tremendous advance. The gross national product, value of all goods and services produced, totalled more than \$17,000,000,000—about 50 per cent higher than in 1945.

Canadians at work totalled more than 5,250,000 with unemployment down to 100,000. Investment expenditure for the year touched some \$3,000,000,000—an all-time high—while total Canadian trade swelled to a peak of more than \$6,000,000,000.

Bad Risk

Hot-Tempered Man Makes Poor Husband Material

DEAR MISS DIX: The man I am going to marry in the near future has a very high temper, which he has never learned how to control. After he has flared up in a rage and said things to me that cut to the quick he is deeply sorry for it. Can you give me any advice in dealing with this problem?

Answer: Only not to marry him unless you have the patience of Job, the meekness of Gerseld and a sense of humor that will enable you to laugh at his tantrums instead of being hurt by them. The thing that counts most in making or marring the happiness of a woman after she is married is her husband's disposition. Personally, I consider a high temper that a man has never learned to control just about the worst drawback that he could have as a husband. No matter how much he loves his wife, it will never keep him from abusing and insulting her when he gets into a rage. It will never make him spare her feelings. She will always go in terror of saying or doing something unwittingly that will rouse the devil in him. A woman can get mighty tired of being on eggs, thinking before she speaks, and having to gumshoe around a man's prejudices lest she bring on a scene.



DOROTHY DIX Of course, high-tempered people always claim that they do not mean what they say in their rages, which is just about as good an excuse as saying you didn't mean to kill someone you stabbed. Also, high-tempered people always think that they have wiped out a wrong by saying they are sorry. They seem to think that obliteration all memory of their unkindness from the mind of their victim.

But this does not happen. The high-tempered say and do the mean things that are in their minds when they let themselves go in their hysterical outbursts and the husbands and wives who have to stand for this sort of treatment soon find their respect and their love gone. I am not denying that many high-tempered people have many fine and noble qualities, but they are poor matrimonial material, and only the foolhardy would risk marrying them.

DEAR MISS DIX: I am an interested reader of your column, but I have yet to be convinced that women, as a class, are physically, mentally, spiritually or intellectually equal to men. I don't think they amount to much.

Answer: Well, perhaps not, but God had to make 'em the poor creatures they are, full of faults and weaknesses, to equal men. What would men do with perfect women? Who could stand it to live with a woman who was a paragon of perfection, who never made a mistake, who never did anything foolish, who would be an awful contrast to a poor, blundering husband?

Certainly nobody can deny your assertion that women are physically weaker than men, but leaving aside the women athletes, who seem to give a pretty good account of themselves, just the plain or ordinary common or garden variety of women seems to be able to stand just about as much exertion as her husband. In the average family Mother works about six or eight hours a day longer than Father does. It is Mother who can stand the long vigils over sickbeds without breaking. It is Mother who can look after the children and take it in her stride, whereas just taking care of them on one Sunday afternoon reduces Father to nervous prostration.

We all admit that in the higher brackets, when you come to the geniuses, men are intellectually superior to women, but taking them by and large on a lower plane, girls and boys and men and women do not seem to differ much in mentality. More girls than boys finish high school and go to college. More women than men keep up with the new books. And when it comes to having good hard, horse sense about the everyday affairs of life, men and women break about even.

I don't know how anybody gauges the spirituality of either men or women, but when we think of all the saints we have known, we can name more women than men.

Maybe women don't amount to much. But who would bear the children, who would make the homes, who would take care of the old, who would comfort the afflicted, who would care for the weak and helpless if we didn't have them? It is a pretty big chore when you come to think of it.

DEAR DOROTHY DIX: Can two people who are very stubborn make a go of marriage?
Answer: Not if they are going to be stubborn about the same thing.

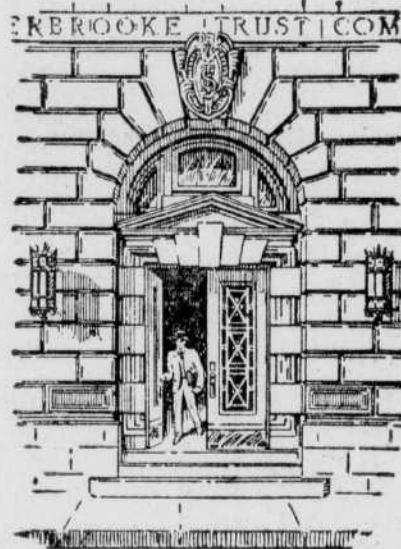

THE WOMEN'S INSTITUTE
What has happened to the country doctor? This question was discussed in the National Farm Forum series on health, as a result of a survey on health services in rural Quebec conducted by the Quebec Women's Institute.

Sherman, chairman of the committee in charge of this project and president of the branch at the time the work was started, states they have not had to ask the public for an assistance, although they often have unsolicited gifts. The property is kept in good condition and there is always a satisfactory surplus of money on hand.

Dr. Raymond Stubbings and his wife, who is also a doctor, have been there for the past three years. They have a heavy practice and are well pleased with the arrangements.

Mrs. Sherman feels such a centre is ideal for small towns and adds, "You have to offer something if you want young doctors to come to the country."

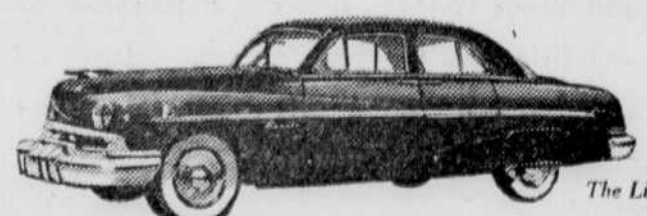


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SHERBROOKE INTERMEDIATES HOSTS TO MAGOG TOMORROW

Mel Ott And Jimmy Foxx Elected To Baseball's Hall Of Fame

New York, Jan. 27. — (AP) — Mel Ott, former New York Giants player and manager and all-time home run king of the National League, and Jimmy Foxx, mighty slugging first baseman of Philadelphia Athletics and Boston Red Sox for nearly 20 years yesterday were elected to Baseball's Hall of Fame by the Baseball Writers' Association of America.

Ott, 41 and Foxx, 43, are the 89th and 90th players to have their names enshrined in Cooperstown, N. Y., home of the Hall of Fame. The last player thus honored was Charley Gehring, former Detroit Tiger star second baseman who gained it in 1949.

Ott was named on 197 of the 226 ballots cast. Foxx received 170 votes.

Oddly enough, both came up to the major leagues the same year, 1925, and both began as catchers. Foxx went back to the minors for a year of seasoning but came back in 1926.

He pounded big league fences for the next 20 years. When he called it a career at the end of the 1945 season, he had accumulated 83 home runs to lead second only to the immortal Babe Ruth.

Ott spent 22 consecutive seasons with the Giants. Switched to the outfield by John McGraw, the lit-

tle Gretna, La., larriper, developed into one of the finest all-around outfielders the National League ever knew. He also spent parts of several seasons at second and third base.

Ott was manager of the Giants from 1942 until the middle of the 1948 season when he was replaced by Leo Durocher. In addition to his 511 homers, most ever hit by a National League player, he holds the league record for most runs scored, most runs batted in, most bases on balls, most long hits, most total bases and flock of others.

Selections were restricted only to those who performed during the years 1924 through 1949.

Waner, "Big Poison" of Pittsburgh Pirates in the late 1920s and 1930s, ranked third behind Ott and Foxx. The former National League batting champion polled 162 votes.
