

JEROME GOES TO QUEBEC; THAW HERE INDEFINITELY

Judge Grants Discontinuance of Habeas Corpus. Case Just Where it Was at Beginning. Various Probabilities Discussed. Bail Not Likely. Yesterday a Win For Thaw

William Travers Jerome has gone to Quebec and his mission is to interview Sir Lomer Gouin, Premier and Attorney General, and endeavor to induce him to take some steps to facilitate the deportation of Harry K. Thaw. The former district attorney, was accompanied to Quebec by district attorney Kennedy of Duchess County, New York.

It is said Mr. Jerome hopes to induce the attorney general to bring pressure to bear upon Justice of the Peace Dupuy at Coaticook to take steps to amend his indefinite and irregular commitment. Could this be accomplished the way would be open for the dismissal of the charge upon which Thaw is now held, within a few days. Jerome may, also, hope that the attorney general will see his way clear to exercise authority to quash the commitment immediately and free Thaw which would bring Thaw at once into the hands of the Immigration Authorities.

When William Travers Jerome returns from Quebec, tonight or tomorrow, the next development may be expected.

DEFENSE SITS BACK.

In the meantime, the Thaw lawyers sit back and say, "Gentlemen, it is your move next." With its complex features, this Thaw matter resembles a game of chess. There are still many possibilities. The check mate may be afar off.

WHAT DELAY IS POSSIBLE.

The lawyers on both sides that so far as the continuance of Thaw's stay in Sherbrooke Jail is concerned, his chances are about equal on the following three propositions:

- 1.—A week.
- 2.—A month.
- 3.—Two years.

If the present commitment is amended to a remand, the matter might be concluded in a week, providing there was no appeal or injunction forthcoming from the Thaw lawyers.

In the second place, the Court of King's Bench will open the first of October. The grand jury would no doubt quash the charge upon which Thaw is now held. He would then have to leave the jail and the immigration men would get him.

In the third place, should the provisions of the Ashburton Treaty be invoked a delay of two years is a possibility.

PROBABLE COURSE.

The likely course is that efforts will be made immediately to have the present commitment amended. This may come through the direct intervention of the attorney general, or from Justice of Peace, Dupuy, or possibly through attorney's representative.

The chief error at Coaticook was in sending Thaw to Sherbrooke on a commitment instead of a remand. The forms were kept in two different drawers, and the wrong one was used.

In what way the attorneys for Thaw would resist a move in this direction remains to be seen.

POSSIBLY ANOTHER HABEAS CORPUS WRIT.

There are those who contend that Habeas Corpus proceedings need not necessarily come from the imprisoned individual, but that any person may take steps to have any imprisoned individual liberated.

This suggests a possible line of action.

SAFEST IN SHERBROOKE JAIL.

Ex-Governor Stone, of Pennsylvania, who is here in the interests of the Thaw family is reported to have said, "The best and safest place for Harry K. Thaw at the present time is right here in Canada, and in the Sherbrooke Jail."

YESTERDAY AFTERNOON AT THE COURT HOUSE.

The morning scene at the Court House was repeated in the afternoon, except that there was no outburst of applause. A warning from the Judge was all that was necessary. The immense crowd accepted the ruling and there was no applause at any time.

The photographers were busy and one or two artists sketched the prisoner.

INTERVIEWS ATTORNEY-GENERAL.

Quebec, August 28.—(Special)—Mr. W. T. Jerome, accompanied by Mr. Samuel W. Jacobs, of Montreal, who is representing the state of New York in the Thaw case at Sherbrooke, arrived here last night. They had an interview this forenoon with Sir Lomer Gouin, the Attorney-General, the result of which was not given out. It is understood, however, that representation was made to the Attorney-General to give instructions to have Thaw brought to trial at once.

SENSATIONAL STORIES UNFOUNDED.

Certain newspapermen, after sensational, have sent out exaggerated reports of scenes yesterday. One Boston paper has this from Sherbrooke, "women were crawling about his carriage—many of them threw kisses at him, and others threw flowers."

All this is yellow journalism of the rankest kind and absolutely false as to fact.

That there was a large crowd is a fact. That three lusty cheers were given in the court room is another fact. That public sympathy goes out to the hunted individual is apparently another fact. That a simple warning from the bench was all that was necessary to establish absolute order and decorum is another fact.

Those who viewed the whole scene found it extraordinary, not disorderly. Most of the reports going out from Sherbrooke have been accurate as to news facts. There have been certain journals, however, who have been looking for yellow features. It is stated on authority that one correspondent received instructions to take a column interview with Thaw every day and make it read as though it came from a lunatic. The interview went out daily, though the correspondent did not get an interview with the prisoner for several days.

THAW IS WELL PLEASED.

Thaw was more than pleased with the turn of affairs yesterday afternoon. It is not very often that a person finds pleasure in a ruling which allows him to go to jail in preference to having his liberty forced upon him.

Late in the afternoon he gave out the following statement, expressing his gratitude for the kindness shown him:

"May I acknowledge the fair play accorded by everyone since my arrival in Canada, and express my gratitude for the sympathy shown by the Canadian people in my present struggle to regain my liberty, and to thank especially all the Canadians that I have come in contact with personally. It is much better than I deserve, and entirely at variance with the malice shown in New York.

"It is only fair to make clear that the people of New York are all right; no unfairness can be found in the people of New York. A proof of this was found in the vicious opposition to giving me an honest jury trial shown by the un-democratic Attorney General. He and his pals know that a New York Jury would stand for fair play too."

MR. L. T. MARECHAL HAS ARRIVED

Mr. L. T. Marechal, K.C., one of Canada's best known lawyers, arrived in the city at noon to-day, and it now registered at the New Sherbrooke. His special mission is to represent the immigration authorities at Ottawa. On his arrival here he was met by Inspectors Williams and Reynolds, and after a brief conference with them left for Mr. F. Campbell's office.

When seen by the newspapermen Mr. Marechal would say nothing beyond the fact that he was representing the Government at Ottawa. Until he had gone into the situation more carefully he was not in a position to give any outline of the plans to be pursued by the Immigration Department in the present case.

THAW MAY BE FREE FOR FAIR

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Should the court grant the bail, Mr. Thaw will remain in the city and during the week take in the Sherbrooke Fair.

Rumors to the effect that as soon as he is released on bail he will be taken in charge by the Immigration authorities are heard from the camp of the prosecution. A well-known legal authority, however, stated to the Record this morning that it was his opinion the Immigration authorities could not touch him.

WHAT NEXT?

What will be the next move in the Thaw case?

Up to the present the following moves have been made:

August 17th—Escaped from Mattawan.

August 19th—Arrested at Barford.

August 20th—Writ of habeas corpus served.

August 26th—Writ of desistment served.

August 27th—Writ of desistment granted.

As the defence have made the majority of the moves up to the present, they now state that it is up to those who put Thaw in jail to get him out.

The case is as hopeless a tangle as it has been since the beginning of the habeas corpus proceedings. Those who have predicted that Thaw would be almost immediately deported are beginning to show signs of wavering. In other words, the impression is growing that Thaw will be here "till the snow flies," as one newspaperman expressed it.

JEROME IN QUEBEC

Former District Attorney Jerome and Attorney General Kennedy, of New York, are in Quebec City to-day, having left Sherbrooke for the Ancient Capital on the "Scout" last night.

The object of their visit is to consult with the Attorney General of the Province, or in his absence with the Deputy Attorney General. The New York officials have the impression that Sir Lomer Gouin, who is Attorney General, may take steps to have the whole charge against Thaw quashed, and as a consequence Mr. Thaw would be declared free. This done, it would only be the work of an instant before he would be in the toils of the immigration authorities, and the wheels of the machinery necessary for his deportation to New York be set in motion.

Should Sir Lomer pursue the course above mentioned, Thaw would still be a resident of Canada for a short time. In all probability he would exercise his right to apply for a hearing before an Advisory Board. This would mean a delay of a few days, and after the hearing he would have the right to appeal from the judgment, should it be against him, to the Minister of the Interior.

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THOMPSON CASE FOR TO-MORROW

Question of Thaw's Sanity is Here Involved

THOMPSON MAY BE ADMITTED TO BAIL ON \$500 BONDS.

Now that a halt has been called in the Thaw proceedings, so far as the defence is concerned, public attention is focused on the trial of Roger Thompson, who is in jail on a charge of having aided and abetted Harry Thaw, an insane person, to come into Canada.

Mr. Louis St. Laurent, who has been retained by Thaw to defend Mr. Thompson, arrived in the city yesterday morning, and during the day was busily engaged in the preparation of his case.

The important feature of the case is the question of whether or not the allegation made in the charge that Thaw is insane will have to be proved in the Canadian Courts, and what will be required to prove this. Should the court agree to accept a certificate from the head of Mattawan as proof there will be little to the case. On the other hand, however, it may be necessary to have the fact of his insanity established by medical examination. If this is the case Thaw will be given an opportunity to have a commission make an examination and submit a report. It is understood that Thaw is anxious to have a chance to prove his sanity, and would only be too glad to have this opportunity.

Pending this investigation what would become of Thompson? The court has given him the privilege of providing bail, the amount set being \$500. This may be provided for him. Judge Mulvena, before whom he will appear, is out of the city to-day, but expects to be back to-night.

THOMPSON'S BIRTH STORY NEARLY FITS.

Toronto, August 28.—On instructions from the Immigration Department at Ottawa, an investigation has been made in regard to the statement of Thompson, the chauffeur, who aided Harry Thaw to escape, to the effect that he was a Canadian and the son of a Toronto policeman, and on that ground cannot be deported.

Thompson says that he was born about 24 years ago in Toronto, and that his father, who was a constable on the Toronto police force, died when he was about four years of age. Shortly after, Thompson says, his mother and the family left for New York City.

Would be only 32. The Toronto City Directory for the year 1884 shows that a constable by the name of Mitchell Thompson lived at 14 Oak street, Toronto. The directory for the year 1884 also states that the same man lived at the same address, while the directory for the next year shows that a Mrs. C. Thompson lived at that address.

Thus the directories bear out Thompson's story that his father was a constable, and that he died when Thompson was about four years of age. The only weakness in Thompson's story is that he says he is about 34 years of age, while the register of the Parliament Buildings states that he was born on August 25, 1881, or that he is 32 years of age, and that Monday was his birthday.

MILLER KNEW HIM.

Inspector Miller of No. 10 Police Division, says that he remembers a constable by the name of Mitchell Thompson, who did duty in No. 4 Division about thirty years ago, and who lived on Oak street. This man died in the year 1884, and was buried in the Necropolis. He also states that this man had three children, another point which seems to bear out the prisoner's statement.

Mitchell Thompson did duty with the inspector when he was a constable attached to No. 4 Division.

BLAZE IN LUMBER SHED

Dangerous Fire Near Wellington Street

WEATHER CONDITIONS FAVORABLE AND FIRE WAS PREVENTED FROM SPREADING.

A spectacular fire occurred at about 8 o'clock last evening, near the Grand Trunk track in the rear of the Wellington street buildings.

A large building occupied by Bush Bros. for storage purposes caught fire. It was very inflammable and made a big blaze.

The brigade laid two lines of hose and succeeded in preventing the fire from spreading.

They were aided by the fact that there was no wind and that it had been raining.

The blaze was an extremely dangerous one. It may serve to draw the attention of the city authorities to conditions at the rear of the Wellington street line of buildings. It has long been felt that something should be done to lessen danger of fire in that locality.

The loss, which included mouldings and lumber supplies, will amount to several thousand dollars, partly covered by insurance.

The building was of little value.

THE MEXICAN SITUATION

Congressmen Received Facts Without Making Any Comment

GOVERNMENT PRAISED FOR DIGNIFIED AND PATRIOTIC ATTITUDE ADOPTED TO-WARDS STATES.

Mexico City, Aug. 28.—(Special)—Without comment, Frederico Gamboa, Minister of Foreign Affairs, presented to the Standing Committee of Mexican Congress last night all the facts in the controversy between Mexico and the United States. The Congressmen comprising the committee received facts without comment, other than that indulged in as individuals after adjournment.

Unless there are new developments, it is improbable that discussion even of private character will continue long.

Senator Gamboa insists that negotiations are not entirely concluded but should they be, it is probable that soon the entire affair will be regarded as a closed incident.

Congress men in discussing the notes exchanged freely commended the action of the Mexican Government, and that small portion of the public which is cognizant of character of that action, was loud in its praise of what is characterized as patriotic and dignified attitude of administration.

HUERTA WITHDRAWS DEMAND.

Messrs. F. B. McCurdy & Co. received the following message from their Washington, D. C., Correspondent in connection with the Mexican situation.

"Huerta withdraws his demand that another American Ambassador be sent to Mexico, and is willing that the diplomatic force remain as at present."

The United States Administration is trying to guard against Huerta taking advantage of the opportunity which would enable the Provisional President to resign and afterwards become a candidate for the Presidency.

LIND RETURNS TO MEXICO.

Washington, August 28.—(Special)—John Lind was early to-day instructed to return from Vera Cruz to Mexico City, after President Wilson had received a message from him described as "very optimistic."

While administrative officials were sent as to the next move, the general understanding was that the way appeared to be open for further discussion of the disputed points, such as the elimination of Huerta.

INTERVENTION ALMOST CERTAIN.

London, August 28.—The London morning papers, commenting on the message, are now altogether sanguine of the wisdom or success of President Wilson's policy, but are agreed that it is almost certain to lead to American intervention, therefore indicating that a grave crisis has been reached.

The Morning Post says: "President Wilson will have his hands full if he sets himself up as the censor of morals for the presidents of Latin-America, and if the United States accepts the duty of supporting the duly-elected president, Mexico would be in fact, if not in name, an American protectorate."

IMPERATOR SWEPT BY FIRE

Largest Vessel Afloat Badly Damaged at Dock in New York

SECOND OFFICER SUFFOCATED AND MEMBER OF CREW MISSING AT ROLL CALL.

New York, Aug. 28.—(Special)—The Emperor, the largest vessel afloat was swept by fire early today as she lay in her dock in Hoboken with her crew and 1,131 steerage passengers aboard.

Second Officer, Gobrecht, who led the crew into the hold to fight flames was cut off from his men, enveloped in cloud of smoke and suffocated. His body was found an hour later untouched by fire and brought ashore. A seaman whose identity has not yet been determined, and one of the party who went down with Gobrecht into the bowels of the vessel was missing at roll call, and undoubtedly perished too.

A fleet of fire fighting craft augmented by apparatus on shore surrounded the ship and poured tons of water into her hold. When the fire was checked at 3 o'clock the great vessel had listed fifteen degrees.

BIG CROWD AT BEDFORD FAIR

Attendance Yesterday Was Larger Than on Any Previous Second Day

YOUNG MAN NAMED FAIRFIELD INJURED WHILE ATTEMPTING TO CROSS TRACK.

Bedford, August 28.—(Special)—A banner crowd attended the fair yesterday and caused the gate receipts to exceed those of the second day last year by a few dollars. Only one thing happened to mar the day's sport at about 1 o'clock Claude Fairfield, aged 15 years, of North Stanbridge, attempted to cross the race track in front of a driver who was getting his horse into shape for the coming heat. In doing so young Fairfield got somewhat bewildered and turned to retrace his steps, and by doing so the frame of the sulky struck him in the groin and he was picked up unconscious. A doctor was called and took charge of the case. Last evening he was resting nicely at the home of Mr. Ernest Casey's. There is no one upon whom blame can be attached for the accident but the youngster himself. The management has done everything possible to protect people at the point where Fairfield attempted to cross the race course, and not only a 1's place, but have a number of good men stationed all over the grounds to keep people away from all danger. This is the first accident in many years.

Quite a little excitement prevailed when a corn-popping outfit took fire on the grounds yesterday afternoon. No reason could be given, however. The plant was nearly destroyed, but in a short time the operator was able to continue with his work and was selling to the young boys after a delay of about one hour.

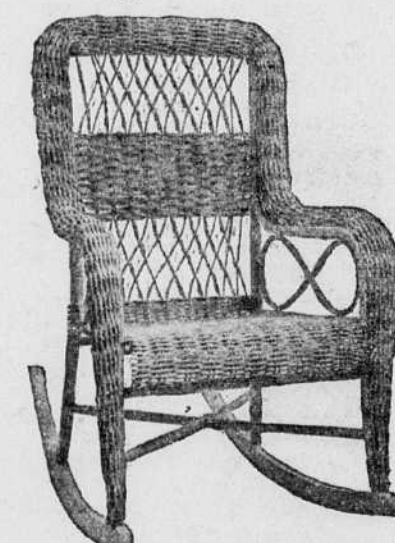

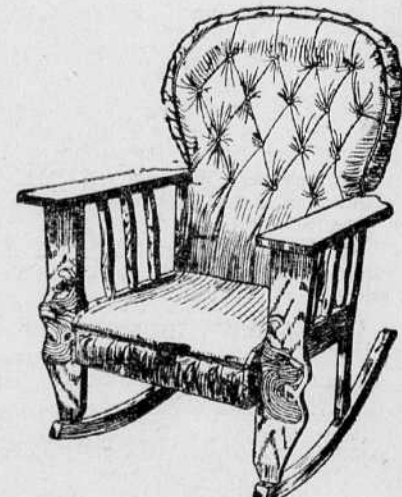

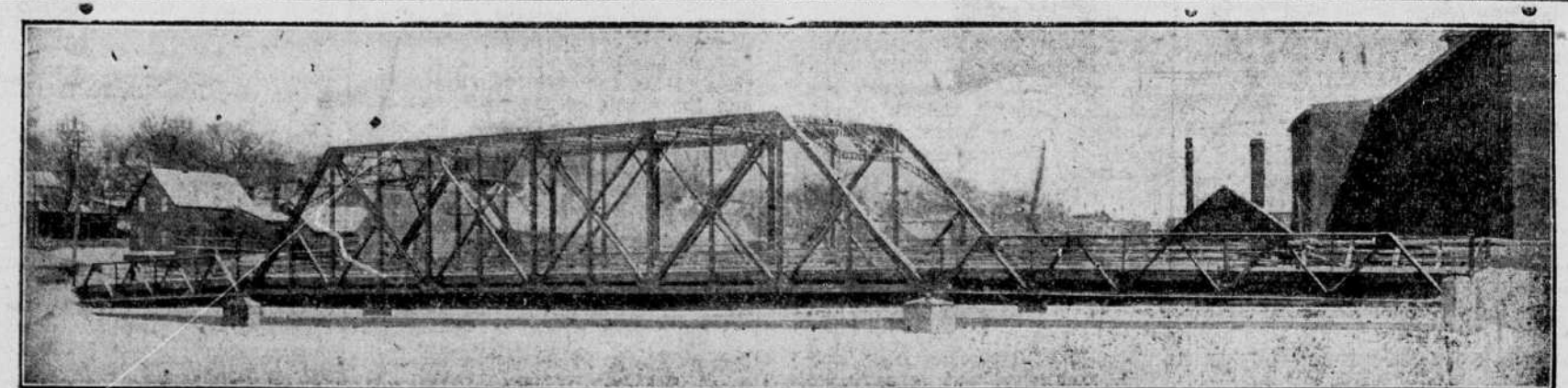

DEATH OF MR. F. VALENTINE LEE, FORMERLY OF SHERBROOKE.

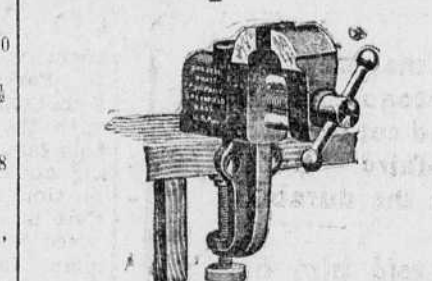

points of view. The attendance was all that could be desired and fully up to the attendance of last year, although the weather was unfavorable in the morning and heavy rain fell. However, the sun came out during the forenoon and in a few hours the race track was in good condition. The three-minute class postponed yesterday, was first called and a good race was pulled off. The judges were early at their work and found all classes well filled.

FINE SWINE EXHIBIT.

Dr. Barton, of Macdonald College, who judged swine and sheep here two years ago, stated that he found a decided improvement in these two sections. He stated that the exhibit of swine was easily the best he had ever seen at a County fair and fit to be shown at any of the large fairs in Canada with good prospects of winning.

THE EXHIBIT OF CATTLE.

Mr. A. Ness, Macdonald College, has had his hands full giving out awards in the cattle section where he found some splendid types of dairy cattle, Holstein and Ayrshire leading with a few Durham and Polled Angus in the ring.

HORSE SHOW GOOD.

There has never been such a fine showing of horses in all classes as was shown this year. Although new stables have been erected during the past two months at an expense of over \$1500, the space is not sufficient and the directors will have this question before them at their annual meeting.

GRAND STAND ADDITION.

A much needed addition to the grand stand was certainly a move in the right direction. The last mentioned improvement cost not less than one thousand dollars. There is no better equipped fair ground in the Eastern Townships than the one owned by Missisquoi County Agricultural Society which consists of 22 acres of land located most conveniently to the railway station and in the centre of the town.

FINANCIAL STANDING.

The financial standing of the Society is good and business is run on a proper basis. A visitor who attended the fair regularly years ago, was present at this fair and expressed much pleasure at the immense improvement shown.

SUGGESTION FROM JUDGE.

Dr. Parker strongly suggested that in future a printed slip should be given to each exhibitor at the time of making his entry indicating the time he is supposed to have his exhibit in the ring. This would throw the responsibility of having animals before the judges on time entirely upon the owners and would also be a great saving of valuable time.

FINE SHOW OF HORSES.

Judging was continued at ten o'clock yesterday morning and was practically completed before the day was over. Dr. Parker, V.S., of St. Albans, Vt., who has acted in capacity as judge of horses for several years at this fair, speaking to the Record, said he found some very fine animals both among the standard bred and draft classes, and noticed a decided improvement since he first entered the show ring in Missisquoi County. Mr. S. B. Fuller, of Woodstock, Ont., for several years connected with the live stock department at Ottawa, who for over 30 years has judged horses from coast to coast, is working in conjunction with Dr. Parker as judge and pointed out some splendid features in connection with the array of horses shown. At this fair, regretting that the farmers did not pay more attention to classification and breeding for a purpose, that is, following some particular breed and have only the best possible. In this respect the Ontario farmers are away head of this province as it is impossible to buy many good horses here of any one breed.

SPECIAL PRIZES

are above average value and brought out a spirited contest. Among the larger prizes offered is that of \$50, donated by the Bank of Commerce for butter and cheese. Among others donating substantial sums for specials are Messrs. W. F. Kay, M.P., J. J. B. Gosselin, M.L.A., F.H. Pickel, M.D., F.X.A. Giroux, K.C., Messrs. Ayr, Burrage, Hunter, Burley, Ford, Thos. Hunter, Baker, Stevens and Currie.

Messrs. L. L. Jenne, Sutton, Teel and Miner, Dunham, are in charge of the refreshment booths, while Mr. Douglas of this place, has the dining room on the grounds.

As usual the afternoon train will be held for a certain time to allow visitors to take in the fair fully.

One could tell that the annual "Cattle Show" was "on" by the noise on the street. Where are our officers?

The C.P.R. held the afternoon train until 4.30 p.m., giving the intending leaving for Farnham and points east and west an hour extra on the fair grounds.

Three-minute class was postponed yesterday on account of unfit track. Several horses had a work-out just the same.

How about Tuesday's gate receipts? Mr. William Brown, the well-known Record representative for Sutton and vicinity, is assisting Mr. Jenne at the caddy booth.

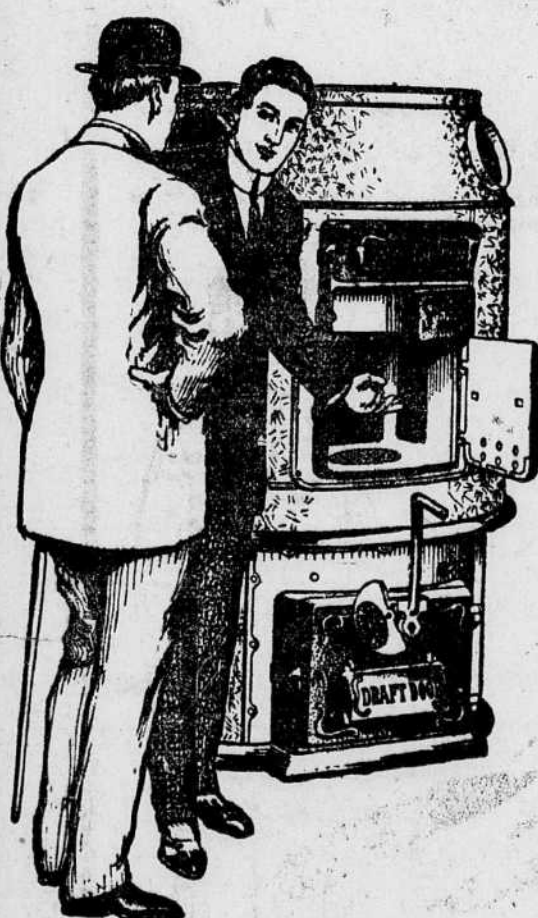

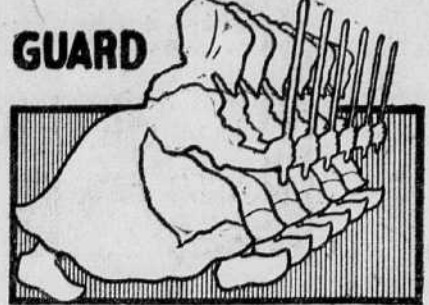

THIRTY EIGHT YEARS SECRETARY TREASURER

Mr. Geo. Sully Has Been
Long Connected With
Bedford School
Board

UNANIMOUS VOTE OF THANKS
EXPRESSIVE OF APPRECIATION
OF SERVICES
PASSED.

Bedford, Aug. 28.—(Special) — A meeting of the Protestant School Board was held in the County Building with Commissioner H. A. Best presiding and the following Commissioners present, Messrs. Walsh, A. B. Foster and P. F. Ewing. Mr. A. T. Gould was also present in his new position as Secretary-Treasurer.

A motion was first put on record recognizing the faithful and untiring services of Mr. George Sully, the retiring Secretary-Treasurer, during the past thirty-eight years he has held office, by an unanimous vote of thanks expressive of the sincere appreciation of the School Commission for his co-operation in the furtherance of educational work in the town of Bedford.

The following accounts were then passed and ordered to be paid: E. F. Currie, plaster and coal, \$74.45; B. R. Stevens & Co., building materials for repairs, \$11.92; W. H. Menard, repairing school roof, \$10; S. Laraway, carpenter work, \$11.25; Nap. Pratt and son, printing, etc., \$73.75. The question of taxes still unpaid came up for discussion and the Board decided that the Secretary-Treasurer should notify all parties owing taxes or tuition fees that the same must be paid within five days from date of notice, otherwise accounts will positively be handed to an attorney for collection.

The following rates will be urged this year for tuition fees, as a coming due and must be collected by the Secretary-Treasurer at the close of each school term: Elementary and Primary grades for the school year of ten months, \$2.00; for non-resident and non-Protestant pupils, \$3.00. Model grades for school term of ten weeks, \$2.00; for non-resident and non-Protestant pupils, \$3.00. Academy grades for school term of ten weeks, \$3.00; for non-resident and non-Protestant pupils, \$4.00. A committee was appointed to see that the school was thoroughly cleaned and ready for the opening on Tuesday, Sept. 2nd.

The chairman and Secretary-Treasurer were authorized to borrow the sum of \$300 to meet outstanding accounts.

In connection with school opening on next Tuesday, from general appearances the coming year should be a banner one for Bedford Academy. The teaching staff should prove to be a most efficient one, comprising as it does all teachers of experience. Mr. E. S. Rivard will be principal again; Miss E. M. Batcheller, model teacher, and Miss Christina Manson and Miss Louisa Stevens, elementary and primary teachers. The school itself has all been renovated during vacation months and is now in a first-class condition and the school board is to be congratulated for their efforts in bringing things to such a satisfactory condition.

CRIMINAL COURT AT SWEETSBURG

Female Prisoner Stole Ring From The Wife Of the Jailer

SUTTON MAN PLEADS NOT GUILTY TO ALLOWING DOGS TO HUNT DEER.

Sweetsburg, Aug. 28.—(Special)—The regular term of the Criminal Court was held here on Monday by Judge Mulvena.

Marie Desjardins, of Roxton Falls, asked for a speedy trial and pleaded not guilty to the charge of having stolen from Mrs. Hall, wife of the jailer, a gold ring of the value of eight dollars, while in jail on another charge.

As she had already been in jail for some time awaiting trial on this charge, she was let off with a sentence of fifteen days at hard labor.

FAILED TO SUPPORT FAMILY. Henri Giroux, of Roxton Falls, pleaded guilty to a charge of omitting to provide for his family, under Article 242 of the Criminal Code, thereby endangering their health.

About six months ago he had pleaded to a similar charge and had been let off on suspended sentence on his promise to quit the use of liquor and to maintain his family. This time he was given two months at hard labor in the common jail.

CHARGED WITH HOUSEBREAKING AND THEFT at Roxton Falls, asked for a jury trial and was remanded to jail.

CHARGED WITH HOUNDING DEER. The trial of Baron Hicks, of Sutton, charged by the game inspector with allowing hunting dogs to roam at large and hunt deer, was fixed for the 9th of September. The defendant had pleaded not guilty at a previous term of the Court, but the trial had been delayed owing to absence of material witnesses.

FINED FOR ILLEGAL NETTING OF FISH

Bedford District Men Came Over to Brompton Laketo Ply Calling

A SQUABBLE AMONG CHILDREN TOOK UP CONSIDERABLE TIME OF THE COURT.

Judge Mulvena dealt with several cases at a sitting of Court here.

Mrs. Cecil Patton vs. Helene Lacombe, a juvenile aged 12 years, having assaulted her little girl, Hazel Patton, aged 6 years, took up much time and resulted in much conflicting evidence. The Court, however, found the weight of the proof in favor of the complainant, but allowed the defendant to go on suspended sentence, intimating that children's quarrels, like the present one, were much better dealt with by maternal discipline than by taking up the time of the lawyers and Court with them.

LICENSE CASE DISMISSED. William Bell vs. Joseph Frechette. The Court dismissed the complaint, holding that By-Law No. 219, under which it was laid, provided no fine for non-payment of carter's license; that the license was merely an annual tax under the name of a license, and involved no special penalty for the failure to take it out, beyond the ordinary civil suit for the recovery of the amount due.

FINED FOR NET FISHING. Albert Patenaude, Hormisdas Simons and Joseph Lapres, all of Racine, in the Township of Ely, District of Bedford, were fined \$18 each and costs, or thirty days in jail each, for fishing with nets in some of the smaller lakes in the vicinity of Brompton Lake, in the District of St. Francis. The suits were taken by E. A. Mountain, fish and game officer, of Danville.

DOMINIONS EXHIBITION

Will be Held in London England, in The Year 1915

LORD STRATHCONA HAS GIVEN A GUARANTEE OF SUBSTANTIAL SUPPORT.

London, Aug. 28.—Arrangements for the British Dominions Exhibition, to be held in London in 1915, are making good progress. The idea is being enthusiastically adopted by many influential bodies. The choice of the year is regarded as appropriate, marking as it does the occasion of the quadrennial conference, the attainment of the Prince of Wales of his majority, and the centenary of the Battle of Waterloo.

The published report of the Empire Trade Commission outlines the object of the exhibition—the taking of stock by the Empire. It is hoped that before the end of 1913 emissaries will start for various parts of the Empire to further the exhibition's interests. An administrative committee has been formed and Lord Strathcona has given a guarantee of substantial support.

Board, Thaw would still have one course open to him, and one which would secure for him a lengthy delay. As already stated, Thaw, as an American citizen, would not have the right to appeal to the Courts from the finding of the Board, as it is possible in the case of a Canadian. This being the case, his lawyers declare that the Immigration Act discriminates between American and British subjects in courts of justice, which in their opinion is a violation of the Ashburton Treaty.

Thaw could make a test case of this and carry it through to the Privy Council. Only those who have been through this procedure know the opportunities offered thereby for delay. And it is delay that Thaw wants. Lawyers for the defence have this matter under consideration and are carefully considering the provisions of the treaty at the present time.

FINDING OF COURT

In granting the writ of desistment, yesterday afternoon, His Lordship referred to the arrest of Thaw, the commitment, the application for a writ of habeas corpus, the granting of this writ, and the serving of it upon the jailer. In the opinion of the Court, Thaw had the right, if he so desired, to regain his liberty by a writ of habeas corpus, should it be found that he was being detained illegally. After having asked for the writ he also had the right to drop his proceedings. To the Court, the Civil Code, and by doing so have the case put back to where it was before the writ was issued. JUDGE WARNED PUBLIC

Before giving judgment yesterday afternoon, Mr. Justice Gloag, made the following reference to the outburst of applause which disturbed the dignity of the Court at the morning session:
"I must say that I was shocked this morning to be a witness of a most disgraceful scene in this Court, and which would give a very poor idea of the dignity with which the sittings of our Court are held, if, instead of being the exception, it was the rule."
"I have long been at the Bar, and I have been some time on the Bench, and I must declare that I have never witnessed such a scene, and I must say that if any attempt is made to repeat the conduct of this morning I will have the guilty parties put in jail if caught in here."

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HAVE RETURNED TO MONTREAL

Messrs. J. N. Greenshields and W. K. McKewen have returned to Montreal. Their return would indicate that they are well satisfied that the prosecution cannot secure Thaw's release for some time to come.

JEROME'S MISSION WILL BE FRUITLESS

According to the views held by Thaw's attorneys, Mr. Jerome's mission to Quebec will be fruitless. In their opinion the Attorney General will not interfere at this stage of the game. When arrangements are being made for the regular trial of the Court of King's Bench, which opens on October 1st, Sir Lomer could instruct the Grand Jury not to report on Thaw's case, as the Crown had decided to drop the proceedings.

THAW TALKS WITH REPORTERS

Owing to the fact that Harry Thaw had to be in court yesterday afternoon, reporters did not have an opportunity to interview him until last night. Noting his beaming countenance, the Record representative asked him if he were satisfied with the progress made during the afternoon.
Thaw—"We have no complaint to make, and on the contrary, the people were very good to us."
Q—"Didn't the reporters ask you for a statement of your appreciation?"
Thaw—"They did more than that. They were going to assist me by each writing a nice statement for me."
Q—"Some of them might be first-rate."
Thaw—"Some or all of them might be better than every effort of my own, but."
Q—"But what?"
Thaw—"Think of how it would sound when I was represented as making a couple of dozen statements in one afternoon!"
Q—"Yes, if some paper printed the whole collection it would look like a cook book, giving various recipes for the same article."

Q—"You mean revise it all?"

QUEBEC MEN BROUGHT TO WATERLOO

Charged With Obtaining Money by False Pretences From Citizens

WERE CONNECTED WITH UNION MACHINERY COMPANY, WHICH RECENTLY FAILED.

Waterloo, August 28.—(Special)—High Constable Boisvert arrived here last evening from Quebec with C. H. Lepage, Ludger Robitaille and H. Tardif, all of Quebec. These men were arrested on a charge of obtaining money by false pretences from a number of residents of Waterloo, in connection with the Union Machinery Company.

The amount involved is said to be \$34,000.
The three men appeared before Mr. J. O. Rockwell, J.P., this forenoon, and were liberated on bail. The amount fixed is \$10,000 each, being one surety of \$5,000 and a personal bond for the same amount.

They were remanded until Sept. 4, when they will appear before Judge Mulvena for preliminary hearing.
The arrival of the prisoners in charge of the High Constable was witnessed by a large number of people. The case is one which has aroused considerable feeling in the district.

His fears were, however, groundless, for, although they noticed the resemblance to Thaw's pictures, and also that the traveller carried a suitcase marked in large black letters, H. K. T., it did not occur to either Mr. or Mrs. Wootten that it might be even possible, that their agreeable chance acquaintance was none other than Harry K. Thaw, of world-wide notoriety.

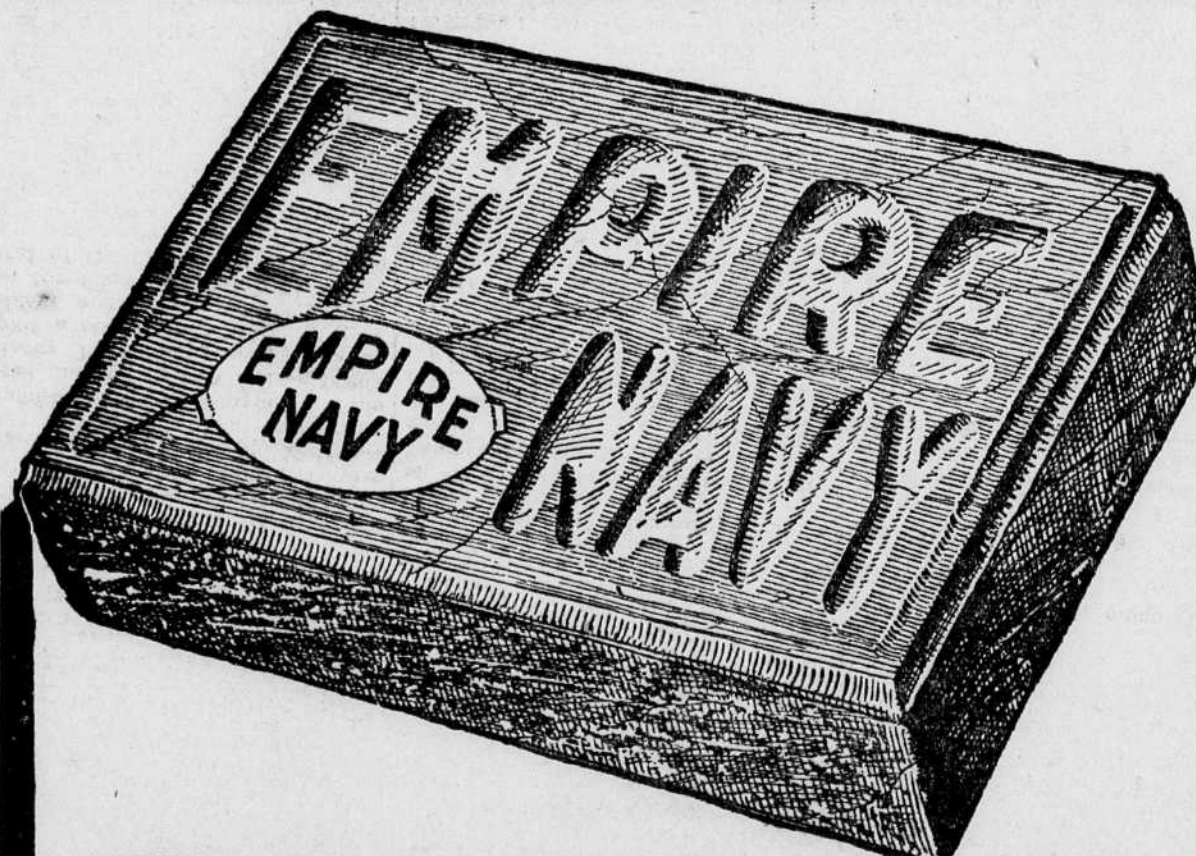
