

AS NEW A BATTLE OF THE LEOPERS

M. Paray-Javal Attacks M. Bertillon's Theory of Geometrical Regularities as Proving Dreyfus Wrote the Bordereau.

Reims, Aug. 28.—When the trial of Captain Dreyfus opened in the Evreux building this morning, Gen. Mercier, who was Minister of War when Dreyfus was first tried in 1894, was present as usual, in the front row of the witness seats, thus definitely settling at rest the reports as to his having fled to the island of Jersey and as to his arrest.

The first witness called to-day was M. Paray-Javal, the draughtsman, whose evidence was interrupted on Saturday by the adjournment of the court. M. Paray-Javal was called by the defence to refute the statement by which M. Alphons Bertillon, chief of the anthropometric department of the Paris prefecture of police, last week attempted to prove that the prisoner had written the bordereau in a disguised hand and by means of a key word, "interest."

With the aid of a blackboard, M. Paray-Javal, at about 6:40 a.m., demonstrated the fallacy of M. Bertillon's calculations and criticized the latter's unfairness in not having had the assistance of the blackboard, proceeded to show the fallacy of the calculations of M. Bertillon and the latter's unfairness in not submitting the handwriting of Esterhazy to the same tests as the prisoner's handwriting.

General Mercier did not seem to be very cheerful this morning. He hardly said a word to General Gouse the whole morning, and during the brief suspension of the court sitting, he and General Gouse and Rogot walked up and down the court yard of the Lycee, greatly engaged in conversation.

Gen. De Bolsfevre was not present in court to-day. He has been absent for the past few sessions, and it is believed here that he is desirous of leaving the sinking ship of the General Staff. The centre of interest in the courtyard was Capt. Frey, instructor of the marine infantry, who testified so favorably to Dreyfus on Saturday, and who, according to reports, he to Col. Maurel, who was president of the court martial of 1894, in a most important feature of the latter's evidence. The captain, dressed in a blue-black tunic, indigo blue trousers, and wearing his five decorations, had pressed around him and shook his hands.

OFFICERS STAND ALOOF. These friends, however, were all civilians. Not a single uniformed officer spoke to him, which is the first fruit of his frankness and is an indication of the termination of the military clique to ostracize him.

When the two first witnesses had testified and argued against M. Bertillon's system, it was the opinion of the sympathizers of Dreyfus that if the statements of the witnesses were correct they had simply pulverized M. Bertillon. The latter wished to reply, but he was prevented from doing so by Col. Maurel, who declined to allow the specialist to go over his evidence again, taking the ground that the trial would never end if every expert did the same.

ADMITS HIS ERROR. M. Lessore's testimony, against Dreyfus, followed, and then M. Paray-Javal, the expert, who had previously declared Dreyfus was the author of the bordereau, was called to the witness bar. His testimony proved to be of the greatest interest, as he came to confess he had made an error and said he was now convinced that Esterhazy, and not Dreyfus, had written the bordereau.

ORPHANAGE ON FIRE CHARGE CONSISTS OF THEM

Two Children and a Nurse Lose Their Lives. BRAVE WORK OF RESCUE, Dominican Sisters in Charge Risk Their Lives in Efforts to Save the Little Ones.

Blauvelt, N.Y., August 28.—The entire group of buildings, with the exception of the hospital, which comprised the Convent of St. Agnes and Orphanage in charge of the Dominican Sisters, situated about half a mile from Sparkhill, were burned this morning, and as far as known three lives were lost. Two children and a nurse, two of whom will probably die.

The work of getting the children out of the building was heroically attempted by the sisters, and these were ably assisted by some nurses and nuns, as well as by some of the older boys. In the meantime the alarm had been spread, and people from the surrounding neighborhood quickly gathered to help in the work of rescue.

Mr. E. A. Mahon was apprehended later on and admitted to bail. The other two defendants are not in town. Mr. Mahon was brought before Magistrate Lafontaine this morning, and remanded until Thursday. Mr. M. J. P. Quinn, Q.C., M.P., appears for the plaintiffs, and Messrs. Hutchinson and Outred for the defendants.

All of the children were taken out alive, but two, Helena Brown, aged 8 years, and Mary Mackin, 7 years old, who died of convulsions after they had been rescued. An aged woman nurse, known as "Jane," who had been in the orphanage for 20 years, is supposed to have perished in the building, where it is supposed her body will be found. All the other children were rescued, and are accounted for. Kate McCarthy, a servant, who is suffering from shock, will probably die, and Therese Murphy, 16 years old, is also seriously injured.

SISTERS DADLY INJURED. Six of the sisters jumped from the second, third and fourth floors of the building, but only one of them was dangerously injured. This is Sister Bertrand, who is suffering from concussion of the spine and consequent shock.

Sister Marie, who, the doctors say, will live, and Sister Catherine, who has a fractured arm, Sister Stella, who has a broken neck, showing wounds, and Sister Josephine, who has a fractured spine, were the only ones who were seriously injured. In all there were 326 children, of whom 69 were girls, who were taken out of the building.
