

# CITY POWER IS BOOSTED

## Council Approves \$126,000

Construction worth \$126,000 — to cover the cost of new primary circuits — was approved by Westmount City Council Monday.

This amount will cover the cost of 22,100 feet of new cable and 28,300 feet of new ducts. The extra ducts will be kept as spares.

The new circuits will all be underground cables, and are part of the plan to eventually provide all parts of the city with dual lateral service.

It is designed to also provide for future requirements, under the plan instigated last year.

These new circuits are designed to relieve the east center sector presently served by number 25 circuit; the northwest sector served by numbers four and six circuits; the southwest sector served by numbers one and two circuits; and the northeast sector served by number 23 circuit.

In order to reduce the expected load at the Glen substation, circuit seven is being transferred from the Glen to Olivier substation by the installation of 708 feet of cable.

The addition of these circuits will mean that 44 additional blocks will have an alternate supply of power, bringing the total number of blocks with dual laterals to 67, equal to 31 per cent of the whole city, general manager T. J. Hughes said.

## Incinerator Is Seen By Group From Sherbrooke

Most cities look for ways to build, but Westmount is becoming famous through destruction.

A delegation of eight officials from the City of Sherbrooke were conducted on a tour yesterday by local personnel — to see the Westmount incinerator.

Members of the Westmount City Council along with general manager T. J. Hughes took the Sherbrooke group around the machinery. The visitors are interested in improving their own system, and were attracted by the low cost of operation here last year.

The Westmount incinerator, one of the "most modern and economical" according to Mr. Hughes, was installed a year ago.

The delegation included Mayor Levesque, aldermen Fortin, Bernard, Thibault, Nicol and Cadorette, city engineer Cote and city treasurer Bachand.

## Rotarians View Dogs At Lunch

Some people go to college for an education — but dogs find it easy to boost their rating by attending obedience classes.

They and their owners gave a demonstration of canine culture that delighted the audience, just as it has many other groups. According to president Frank Mingie, favorite subjects are hospital shut-ins.

He said that obedience training gives command of the dog, though his group does not train the dogs themselves.

"We only teach people to train dogs," he explained.

With Al Sharp "barking" commands, the dog quartet wheeled through a series of commands demonstrating varying stages of training from walking at a heel position to jumping a certain barrier.

The Montreal Dog Obedience Training club, formed in 1948, was the first of its kind in Montreal. It has grown greatly since then, and all training takes place in organized classes.

The Convention theme was: "Building the Citizens of Tomorrow" and the general sessions included such topics as: Camping is Good Business — Trends in Physical Education — Town Hall Meeting on Vocational Guidance — Crafts Are Important — What We Have Learned About Group Methods — Population Trends — Their Implications for Boys' Club — Juvenile Delinquency — Its Implication for Boys' Clubs. Guest Speakers included: Abram L. Sachar, President, Brandeis University, Waltham, Mass.; James A. Wiley, Professor of Education, Boston University, Keneth Benson, Head Instructor Education Craft Shops, School of Education, New York University, N.Y.; Saul Bernstein, Professor of Group Work, Boston University, Jeremiah P. ## Dr. May Winspear Speaks To Campers

Summer camping has helped people to balance the restraint of city life, Dr. Mary Winspear, principal of Weston School, a private school for girls, said Friday.

Persons who did not have a chance to express themselves in an uninhibited fashion as children — and later "let off steam" and generally make fusses at conventions — could gain large advantages through summer camping programs, she said.

Addressing a meeting of young camp councillors at the YWCA under the auspices of the Quebec Camping Association, Dr. Winspear said Canadians should be grateful "camping has such a sound and well based place in our life."

"Perhaps the day will come soon when every child will have the chance to get the benefit of his camping experience, whether his parents have the money or not.

"In the city, it is almost a crime for the child to yell at the top of his voice."

"It's almost lethal for him to run freely in our crowded streets. Camping redresses the balance.

"There are so many people who seem never to have been children, or to have expressed themselves freely. Perhaps that's the reason we see so many adults letting off steam at conventions, so many pranksters and roisterers."

Dr. Winspear suggested that "in our great Judaeo-Christian tradition, we haven't put sufficient emphasis on sheer animal enjoyment, as exemplified by an outburst of hearty laughter."

She said that "an extremely large percentage" of people in our society are "bored from working in dull and stultifying jobs."

Because of this, the counsellors should try to give each child interests he can carry into later life, to offset this condition.

## Lt. Governor and Cardinal Officiate At Villa Maria

His Excellency, the Hon. Gaspard Fauteux, Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Quebec, will officiate at the graduation exercises at Villa Maria Convent on June 21, it is announced. The convent, once the residence of Canada's governors-general, will mark its 100th anniversary as a school by a three-day celebration beginning June 19.

A Pontifical High Mass celebrated by His Eminence, Paul Emile Cardinal Leger on the grounds of the convent will begin the festivities which will be attended by nearly a thousand former pupils from all over Canada and the United States as well as South America and Europe.

The property on which Villa Maria Convent now stands was bought by Sir James Monk, one-time Chief Justice of the Court of King's Bench, Montreal, in 1795. He gave the estate the name Monklands. This land descended through the Monk family until it was bought by the sisters of the Congregation de Notre Dame in 1854.

Monklands was leased to the Crown from 1844 to 1849 as a vice-regal residence and its tenants during that time were Lord Metcalf, Earl Cathcart and Lord Elgin. Monklands figured prominently in Canadian history for it was during his stay there that, despite violent opposition, Lord Elgin signed the Rebellion Losses Bill giving Responsible government to Canada. This action caused crowds of irate citizens to follow Elgin from the Parliament Buildings in Montreal to Monklands, resulting in skirmishes between mobs and soldiers guarding the vice-regal mansion.

Following its purchase by the Congregation, Monklands was renamed Villa Maria Convent and since then five wings were added to the former vice-regal residence to accommodate large numbers of students from all parts of the world.

During the last 100 years, Villa Maria Convent has played host to various members of the royal family including Edward VII as Prince of Wales, King George V and Queen Mary, then Duke and Duchess of York, Edward VIII (Duke of Windsor) as Prince of Wales, and also Queen Marie of Roumania.

Every governor-general from Lord Monk to Earl Alexander of Tunis paid the convent a visit with the exception of Lord Tweedsmuir.

A highlight of the three-day centennial celebration will be the presentation to the convent of an organ donated by members of Villa Maria Alumnae.

## 5 Typical Canadians Attest To Value Of A.A. As 'Cure'

Five Canadians whose experience enables them to speak with authority on the threat of alcoholism held a Loyola auditoriums audience spellbound Saturday night.

It was the regular Saturday night open meeting, usually held in Trinity Memorial Hall.

The five members of Alcoholics Anonymous were:

(a) A young and successful salesman of 24 years of age, who at the age of twenty had already been in sanatoriums twice for the treatment of alcoholism.

(b) A young lady of 26 who due to a broken home had camouflaged her age at 14 to obtain employment and had suffered her first complete alcoholic black-out before she was 15.

(c) A woman in her early thirties who had attended A.A. meeting for seven years with her alcoholic husband refusing to acknowledge that she herself was an alcoholic.

(d) A man in his fifties who had spent his life from an early age as an habitual drinker.

(e) A Korean veteran, who took A.A. to Korea with him, and whose mother is also a member of A.A.

Each of them received a "Birthday Cake" after the speaker of the evening had concluded.

The speaker told how the philosophy of A.A. had made it possible for him to attain sobriety and mature appreciation of life after many years of riotous and self-destructive living. Where he had had no friends, neither sincere friends or drinking companions due to his irrational behaviour, he now had the fellowship of numerous friends. Where he had lived in fear and remorse, he could now face his problems squarely and knew a deep sense of serene well-being. And above all, his marriage problems no longer existed, he said with a grin.

He had joined Alcoholics Anonymous some seven years previously, had suffered only one relapse of short duration during that time. His wife possibly returned the grin from the audience. She had attended meetings with the speaker, her husband, for seven years, before admitting her own problem of alcoholism. She said her greatest difficulty after becoming a member had been in overcoming the resentments aroused by older members refusing to accept her as an alcoholic. It is reported

and should take pride in his membership, rather than feel humiliated. Her "Birthday Cake" was for one year of sobriety — with many more ahead, day by day.

The 24 year old salesman received a cake for four years, and the young lady of 26, now happily married and the mother of a child received a 2 year cake. The middle-aged gentleman celebrated 7 years sobriety.

### Back From Korea

The veteran just returned from Korea said that he had missed the A.A. meetings but that through the New York world central office of the fellowship he had received the names and units of many members, in Korea both in the Canadian army and the American army. He said he had had the opportunity to meet many of them while on leave and the usual A.A. gab-fest would be picked up where it had been left off, just as though they had known each other all their lives.

He further explained that after his mother saw the benefits he was deriving from A.A. when first he joined four years ago, she too had become interested. Through the help they both received, neither mother or son had suffered a relapse during that time. He advised, "Don't let your desires, get ahead of your possibilities. Stick with A.A., go to as many meetings as possible, and help the other fellow." He says that now he is back in Canada permanently he intends to follow his own advice to the letter.

Many army, navy and air-force training centres now have Alcoholics Anonymous groups in Canada, run by the members themselves. The Korean Vet stated that apart from periodic toots on leave, he did not notice any active alcoholism over there, in the Canadian army.

### Eventide Home Fund Attains \$349,789 Mark

Officials of The Salvation Army's Eventide Home Building Fund Appeal today reported that a total of \$349,789.00 has been reported in the drive to obtain \$890,000 for the care of Montreal's older men and women.

Edgar F. Tolhurst, General Chairman, explained that the total asked from the public included the normal budgetary requirements of the Army's Red Shield Services of \$165,000, and that no further financial campaigns were contemplated by The Salvation Army for these purposes this year.

The total received today, he said, was encouraging and reflected the views of the public that the problem of caring for the older people had to be resolved so far as was possible.

"The provision of adequate and modern accommodation for the older people is one that has the sympathy of a considerable part of the population", Sr. Major T. L. Carswell, Campaign Director, said, "however, the Army cannot do the job without the necessary funds, and it is to be hoped that during the next few days, citizens especially concerned over the problem subscribe all they can afford. He pointed out that judging from the letters being received by the Army, the general public recognized the need.

The proposed New Eventide Home aims at providing accommodation for 165 older men and women and apartments for married couples. With building costs at a high level, the project is bound to be a costly one, estimates already indicating that no

less than \$1,100,000 is required. The Army, however, has received a number of sizeable legacies, which have been included, to help provide for the older folks, enabling the Committee to keep the objective down to \$890,000 to build this Home this year.

For verbosity, few surpass Samuel Johnson. He could talk rings round a disk jockey. What he said was worth listening to, though.

Johnson's chatter impressed not just Boswell but a brewer named Thrale who gave him an apartment in his brewery, rent-free. If anything, this added to Johnson's conversational powers. Inspired him to pad out the a's in his famous Dictionary, too.

There's *Alberry* ("A beverage made by boiling ale with spirits & sugar & sops of bread"), *Albreuer* ("One that professes to brew ale") and *Alconner* ("One that inspekte the measures of publick houses"). There's also *Alegar*, *Alchoof* and *Alcknight*, but we won't go into them. Yeast, by the way, was "the spume on troubled waters".

One meaning of ale, according to Johnson, was "a merry meeting used in country places". Why he confined himself to rural locations is not clear. Plenty of "merry meetings" take place in Canadian towns as well, and almost always Molson's is among those present, inspiring conversation as brilliant as you're likely to hear.

Johnson died in 1784, two years before Molson's was born, otherwise he might have added one more definition to "ale". Something like this, perhaps: "A delightful and satisfying beverage, especially when brewed by John Molson. To ensure full pleasure at publick houses and meetings, bring 'Make Mine Molson's' into the talk".

## Bank Of Nova Scotia Opens New Novel Type Of Service

A new type of banking service to provide incentive for saving, with life insurance protection, was introduced in Canada for the first time this week. It was inaugurated by branches of The Bank of Nova Scotia across the country who made available "personal security program" accounts.

From now on p.s.p. accounts will be a standard service of this bank in Westmount and may be opened like ordinary savings or current accounts. Under the personal security program the depositor reaches his savings goal in 50 monthly instalments. During this period his savings goal is protected by life insurance at no cost to himself.

"P.s.p. accounts are based on a simple principle — it is easier to save on the instalment plan and there is a definite amount in mind," explains I. C. Cooper, Westmount manager of The Bank of Nova Scotia. "Personal security program accounts are designed to provide this service. There is the added advantage of having the savings target insured."

Anyone between the ages of six and 46 years can open a p.s.p. account. He decides what the savings goal will be, then contracts to make 50 monthly deposits to meet this goal. In turn, the bank provides the depositor, immediately, with an insurance policy. In the event of death before the goal is reached the depositor's beneficiary would receive the whole amount of the goal, plus interest, to that time.

Five different savings goals are provided under The Bank of Nova Scotia personal security program. These are: \$1,000 by \$20 monthly payments; \$750 by \$15 monthly payments; \$500 by \$10 monthly payments; \$250 by \$5 monthly payments; \$100 by \$2 monthly payments. Once the p.s.p. account is opened, payments are made in the same way a deposit would be made in another type account.

P.s.p. accounts do not provide checking facilities. If for any reason, however, the p.s.p. depositor cannot complete the 50-month program or decides to abandon it, he receives all the money that he has paid in, plus interest, less a charge to cover the bank's services. P.s.p. accounts can be terminated and the money withdrawn by merely notifying the bank.

## Death Of Dean Sinclair Laird

Protestant Education Owed Much to  
Great Scottish Teacher

Many local residents, particularly those associated with education, learned with deep regret of the passing of Dean Sinclair Laird, former head of the School for Teachers at Macdonald College, who died Sunday in his seventy-first year.

Dean Laird, a man of many talents, will always be best remembered for his services to education in Quebec through his work at Macdonald College. In the days when teachers' pay was low, and it was difficult to attract capable young men and women to the profession, he kept our rural schools reasonably well staffed with a short course for teachers that crammed an amazing amount of knowledge into four months'

training. Protestant education owed him a lot.

Born in Scotland, he was educated at St. Andrews University, the University of Grenoble, France, and the Lycee Ampere in Lyons, France. The University of Montreal conferred on him an honorary Doctorate of Pedagogy and St. Andrews granted him an honorary Doctor of Laws degree. He was an Officier de l'Instruction Publique, France.

He was secretary of the Protestant Local Committee of the Strathcona Trust, and served on the Senate at McGill for many years. He was a director of the Société Franco-Ecossaise and a trustee of the Union United Church at Ste. Anne's.

He served on the Protestant Committee of the Quebec Council of Education, the Protestant Central Board of Examiners, Provincial Teachers' Pension Commission, the High School Leaving Examination Board and the Matriculation Board.

He took a keen interest in community affairs, serving for several years on the Ste. Anne de Bellevue Council, where he acted as chairman of the finance committee. He was bilingual.

He taught at St. Andrews, and later at the Dundee Training College. He came to Canada to become associate professor of education at Queen's University and in 1913 was named professor of education and dean of the School for Teachers at Macdonald.

During his tenure at Macdonald, some eight thousand men and women were trained for the teaching profession.

## Another Word About Wheat

There are two very curious cross currents in opinion today. There are those who say the human race will starve itself with over-population of the globe; in fact that there is over-population today, which is aggravated by our failure to move our over-supplies of wheat to the hungry parts of the earth. Depending on this point of view the Canadian Government seems to say: "Let us hold on to our wheat and keep up the price because it represents an enormous reserve of wealth, and we must not give away our wealth." They might add: "We have come to the point where we cannot give it away anyway, for the Pakistan Government two weeks ago turned back the last 3,000,000 bushels of wheat, of a very generous gift of the U.S.A." Perhaps our Canadian Government is right after all.

But there are some things to be said on the other side. In the first place there are millions upon millions of hungry Asiatics, Africans and Europeans. In the second place there are millions on millions of bushels of Canadian wheat going to waste, and there is a new crop coming. In the third place there are thousands of Canadian working men out of work because Canadian wheat is not moving. It affects the railways; the transport

of wheat would have been their big work in the winter. It affects the Great Lakes and Atlantic steamship lines; they depend greatly on the transport of wheat; and not one bushel of the 1953 crop has moved from storage, and not much of it has even reached storage. It affects the manufacturers. Ask the automobile people how many cars they are selling to western farmers. The crop may be worth a billion dollars but until those dollars are actually released the crop is worth nothing. In the fourth place we are trying to make democracy an appealing form of civilization; and we are trying by all the means in our power to check Communism. Yet it is generally agreed that the two supports of Communism are hunger and unemployment. So our Government fails to do the one obvious thing that would relieve the situation. I admit all that the Government has done on a long term basis in the Colombo plan, but the long term plan should not exclude the short term.

The Government is not too consistent. An appeal is being made to relieve the distress of South Korea. The churches are raising funds for the purpose, and the Government approves, and yet the perfectly obvious grant of wheat is refused. Why is it necessary to regard our piles of wheat as sacred things, not on any account to be touched?

The Rooms Registry which is operated by members of the undergraduates' interests committee, headed by Mrs. E. C. Knowles, aided about 400 students in finding suitable accommodations. This committee also arranged for a lecture on marriage as a career which was given by Dr. G. A. Simpson.

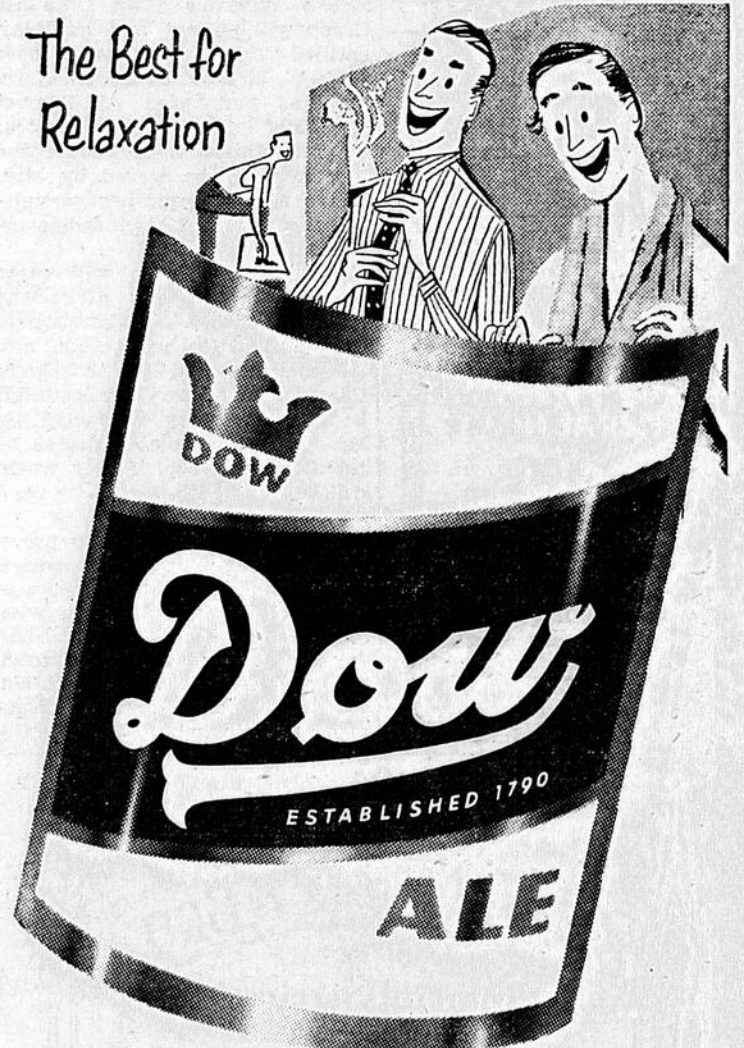

# Molson's Gives Montreal A Mobile Emergency Van

Molson's Mobile Emergency Unit, a unique and modern-as-tomorrow rescue vehicle of gigantic size, has been officially dedicated by Mayor Camillien Houde.

The presentation to the public of Greater Montreal was made by H. de M. Molson, president of Molson's Brewery Limited, in a ceremony held on Sherbrooke street east, in front of the University of Montreal C.O.T.C.

The large vehicle incorporates into a single self-contained unit the power, communications, hospital, and kitchen equipment normally found in three or four separate relief or rescue vehicles. It is capable of proceeding to the scene of a disaster to aid local doctors and rescue workers in providing essential relief services.

### Civic Spirit

In congratulating Molson's, Mayor Houde said that "this project is typical of the civic spirit which has always been so evident among the Molson-family.

"Here is a family which, for more than a century and a half, has been in the vanguard of progress in Montreal and throughout the province of Quebec. One feels that the Molsons really belong among us.

"Quite naturally, there is a publicity aspect to this ceremony. But it is in good taste, as always, since it seems to be a tradition with Molson's to inject something beautiful and something good into their publicity endeavors.

"On this score, I might mention those artistic contests which have revealed to the public many talented young people whose achievements contributed in no small degree to our recognition in the musical field. The returns Molson's may obtain from such public service are well deserved."

Before asking Mayor Houde to cut the traditional ribbon and inaugurate the Emergency Unit, H. de M. Molson, president of the company, recalled that "since it was founded in 1786, Molson's has grown in intimate association with the city, until it is now the largest

single brewery in Canada and the oldest in North America, and the only Quebec brewery owned and operated by people from Quebec."

Mr. Molson also said: "It has always been our policy at Molson's to identify ourselves as closely as possible with the lives of the people of Montreal and of the Province, and the Mobile Emergency Unit we are now presenting is a further reflection of that policy.

### Always Ready

"While we earnestly hope that emergencies such as those of Cabano and Rimouski will be rare, we know from experience that they do occur from time to time. It is on such occasions that the Mobile Emergency Unit could be of considerable help to the City and the Provincial authorities, and to the many agencies like the Red Cross which do so much to relieve suffering. In the field of civil defence, the vehicle might likewise prove invaluable."

The Molson unit is divided into three sections, with electrical and electronic equipment in the front section, first aid facilities in the centre, and kitchen in the rear section.

The three sections are housed in a 42 1/2-foot long trailer powered by a tilt cab tractor. The all-steel vehicle is electrically spot-welded and fully insulated. It was designed and built by Diamond T Motor Truck Co. (Montreal Limited) and is equipped with material purchased from Canadian suppliers.

The main equipment in the front, or electrical, section is: a two-way radio; a public address system for use as an aid in preventing panics, directing relief workers, or guiding people lost in the bush; two 1000-watt searchlights; an Aldis signalling lamp; a 5000-watt generator; a 1000-watt portable generator, and an auxiliary heater. A Bell Mobile Telephone system has been installed in the cab.

The centre, or hospital section, 25 feet long, contains: complete emergency first aid supplies, an operating table, a complete set of standard surgical instruments, 10 folding-type aluminum stretchers, 3 dozen blankets, complete resuscitation equipment, 2 folding beds, 2 folding tables, a supply of drugs and intravenous anaesthetics, and other necessary medical equipment.

The stainless steel kitchen, or rear, section is equipped with a refrigerator, complete cooking facilities and a 200-gallon water tank. Up to 200 cups of coffee per hour can be dispensed from a serving window. In addition, hot and cold full-course meals or snacks can be prepared.

Molson's Mobile Emergency Unit also carries other necessary rescue work equipment such as fire extinguishers, axes, shovels, crowbars, rope, wire, flashlights, flares and portable radio sets.
