CHARGES FOR STORAGE IN THE CUSTOM HOUSE STORES,  
QUEBEC.

*Act 10 and 11 Victoria, Cap. 31.*

*Section 30.*—All charges incurred on goods for landing, cartage, storage, unpacking, repacking, weighing or guaging, paid, in order to carry this act into effect, shall be at the expense of the importer of such goods.

One package, at least, in each invoice to be opened, or more if necessary, and in case of suspicion of fraud the whole to be opened.

The dues according to the annexed tariff, are to be charged and collected for goods, &c., stored or taken into the examination warehouse at the port of Quebec. All unclaimed goods are to be sent to the examination warehouse, and goods will be received on storage from the parties who may wish it.

Parties can either insure their own goods against loss by fire, or can have the value of the same covered, by duly notifying the officer of customs of their wishes in that respect, and paying the cost thereof.

And for the encouragement of pilots who shall distinguish themselves by their activity and readiness to aid and assist any ship or vessel in distress, and in want of a pilot, &c., to be paid extra on award of the Trinity House.

Pilots carried to sea by stress of weather are allowed £6 sterling per month, and provided with a passage back, over and above pilotage due them. The wages above to be paid up to the day the passage is provided, or that the pilot may choose to accept of a sum of money in lieu of such passage.

There is also a good number of small craft employed in the transport of supplies—chiefly flour—to the Gaspé fisheries and the lumber establishments in the Baie-des-Chaleurs. A considerable quantity of the fish taken at these fisheries comes to Quebec ; but it is chiefly the fish that is taken in the latter part of the season, when it is too late to dry them for a foreign market—they are then barrelled and brought to Quebec.

INLAND NAVIGATION.

There has been a great increase in this trade. Of two articles alone—railway and pig iron—over fifty thousand tons were imported into the Western States, in 1851, by the St. Lawrence—nearly the whole of which was shipped from here to Kingston, and there transhipped—mostly into American vessels—thus increasing the freight of these heavy goods by the serious charge of transhipment. The truth is, that this trade is of such recent date, and has sprung up so rapidly, that we have not, as yet, a sufficient number of suitable vessels to perform the work; and by an extraordinary interpretation of the Navigation Laws, American vessels are prohibited from coming to Quebec, while they are permitted to come to Montreal—thus, in our opinion, by an unjust restriction, Quebec is deprived of an immediate means of forwarding these heavy articles direct to their destination, until a suitable class of vessels could be built to compete with our American neighbors, which would tend to reduce the freight to the lowest minimum, and thereby secure to us a carrying trade that must be of importance to the shipping interests of this port; but unless it can be done at a very low figure, the chances are that it will be diverted into another channel.
