NOON TELEGRAMS.

FROM WASHINGTON. Naturalization Treaty with Great Britain—Doings of the High Commission.

WASHINGTON, March 23. The Senate yesterday confirmed the Naturalization Treaty made by Mr. Motley with the British Government.

The British Commissioners met yesterday at the residence of Earl Grey, and in the afternoon they proceeded to the State Department, where the Joint High Commission was held.

At the evening session of the Fenian Brotherhood the Finance Committee reported the results of the financial survey in a satisfactory condition.

Colonel John Warren, a well known Irish-American citizen, imprisoned in Great Britain on account of alleged conspiracy with the Fenians, had an interview with the President yesterday for the purpose of having his claims for damages, which were prejudicial to the Congress, brought before the High Commission.

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APRIL EGRESS.

After routine the debate on Mr. Blanchet's amendment was resumed.

Mr. Gibeault considered that these debates had been long enough in force to rest them, and he held, further, that if the policy introduced by the hon. member for Sherbrooke in 1896, of imposing a duty of 50 cents a barrel on American flour, had been adopted, it would have cost a large later provincial trade, but this was not the question to be considered.

Mr. Cameron (Huron) said the Government were evidently not settled in their policy. He thought that Government should not endeavor to force members in his position to stifle themselves by voting for amendments, both of which they were referred to. He, for one, would not be led into such a course.

He argued that the results of the policy of 1870 had been instrumental in inducing Americans to begin with something like falter to us. He did not give Government much credit for it, but he gave the House and the country credit for its policy.

Mr. Harrison said if it was thought that the policy of the Government would influence the House, he would not be in a position to receive his approval, but he did not believe that it would influence that Assembly any more than a fly on a wheel.

It was the people of the United States who were moving because they felt oppressed, and that was why they adopted this course.

Mr. Blanchet's amendment was then put to the House and carried. Yeas, 103; nays, 28; majority, 75.

The question was then on the amendment of the hon. member for Chateauguay, as amended.

Sir F. Hicks said there appeared to be a misunderstanding on the part of several members of the House with regard to the position taken upon the question by the Government.

The position of the Government was this, and that was the position which they had taken. They deprecated any interference at the present time with the principle of free trade.

At the same time, when an honorable gentleman moved to abolish only a certain portion of the duties—only such a portion as suited certain sections of the country—they thought it well that the question should be put on a broad basis, and that the House should vote on the whole question.

Hon. Mr. Holton said the hon. gentleman had repeated what he had said in the early part of the debate, but he did not think that this subject was before the Joint High Commission. He did not believe that one word had been said on this subject before the Joint High Commission, and he thought it well that the House should be so informed.

A point of order was raised on Sir Francis Hicks attempting to reply, but he was finally allowed to proceed.

Sir F. Hicks—He put it to the House if the hon. gentleman still appeared to him on these points, he would say so. He did not think that he dared not say so, and he continued that in 1874 the very question which had most engaged attention now had been under discussion.

This country had requested a Commission to discuss certain matters in dispute between Canada and the United States, and very much the same state of things existed in 1874 when he went to Washington to represent Canada.

The whole question was one of equivalents. There was not a time when the duties had been reduced, and he thought that the hon. gentleman had referred to the cost duty; since he (Sir F. Hicks) had a telegram from his colleague now at Washington, which stated that the duties would not be removed before December 31st.

It had been urged that it was not expedient to discuss this question during the sitting of the Commission. The principle which the Government had adopted was that just at this present time, when the Commission was sitting, they would not say anything in return (hear, hear, and cheer).

Hon. Mr. Holton said he did not ask the hon. member anything to be added to the House, but to hold advantage to the United States.

Sir G. E. Cartier commented on the motion of Mr. Holton, and charged him with leaving out all designedly, the motion being the same as that which was given by the member for Hochelaga, the object being to obtain certain votes.

Mr. Workman thought that the attempt to catch the votes of a few members by talking about salt, was like the old story of catching flies by the tail.

After some further discussion Mr. Holton's amendment was put and carried. Yeas, 63; nays, 55.

The House adjourned at 12:45.

SIX O'CLOCK. TELEGRAPHIC. BLOODSHED IN PARIS. Scenes in the Streets—Latest Concerning the Rev. Inst.

NEW YORK, March 23. A special from Paris says that the insurgents have been very much irritated by a proclamation that the National Assembly had issued, and had determined to resist it with violence.
