THE EASTERN TOWNSHIPS AGRICULTURAL EXHIBITION.

The organization whose efforts we are now enjoying the benefits of the Provincial and Dominion exhibitions is fairly entitled at this moment to grateful recognition at the hands of the citizens of Sherbrooke and the residents of the Eastern Townships.

It had long been felt that while the plan of the County shows was admirable of its kind and filled an important place as a purely local exhibition, the townships had made sufficient progress in agriculture and manufactures to warrant a competition at a central point, as between all the local exhibitions.

The subject was favorably commented upon at the annual dinner of the Ploughman's Association of that year, but to Mr. Hall, M. P. for Sherbrooke, is unmistakably due the credit of having given practical effect to the plan, in the first place by arranging the details of the present organization, and more especially, at considerable personal sacrifice, by enlisting the financial support of the undertaking by the present body of shareholders.

In accomplishing this we believe we are correct in saying that Mr. Hall personally visited all the agricultural centres of the Eastern Townships, explaining the details of the project and soliciting subscriptions to membership from the public-spirited farmers.

An idea seemed to prevail that this association was intended to displace the present county show, but the original prospectus as well as the working of the organization show clearly that this was not the object, and is not now intended, but rather to give an additional impetus to these local organizations by furnishing an increased scope for their competition.

The principle upon which the association was formed differed entirely from any previously adopted by any of the agricultural societies of the province. Its main feature may be said to be that of financial responsibility in connection with management, and purely business principles were involved in the subscription of a cash capital to an extent sufficient to secure suitable grounds and erect commodious buildings, the whole under the control of those whose money was thus invested, and free from any outside dictation. The company is organized upon a basis of a capital of \$25,000, distributed among the leading citizens of Sherbrooke and the adjoining townships.
