LATEST FROM NEW MEXICO.

FORT NO. 10 CAPTURED.

LATEST MARKETS.

St. Louis.—The correspondent of the *Republican*, under date of Fort Union, New Mexico, 18th ult., says Col. Slough's Colorado Regiment of Volunteers, 950 strong, arrived there five days ago. The effective fighting force now here is 1400 men, sufficient to defend the depot against any force the rebels can bring against us. We have stores enough to last our troops three months. This fort is the strongest on the Western frontier. It is 570 feet square, with parapets 7 feet high and a ditch 8 feet deep and 5 feet wide. It contains well stocked magazines. Ordnance for the works has been received and will probably be mounted immediately. At latest advices Col. Canby was still shut up at Fort Craig, 250 miles south of here, and the Texans 2400 strong were at Albuquerque with 20 pieces of artillery, about half way between here and Fort Craig.

Other accounts state that the rebel Colonels Steele and Taylor, with 1800 Texans, were advancing on this fort. The Texans hold Santa Fe where they had organized a provisional government, with General Pelham as Governor. If a forward move can be made without risk to this depot, it will be done, and an effort will be made to relieve Colonel Canby and thus reclaim Santa Fe and Albuquerque. Colonel Slough is the next in rank, and is in command here, while Colonel Canby is penned up in Fort Craig.

Kansas City, March 31st.—Advices from Fort Union, state that the main body of the Texans were encamped at Albuquerque, 60 of them had arrived at Santa Fe. It was reported that Colonel Canby had captured a team of 60 waggons and 400 Texans. Communication between Santa Fe and Fort Union has been cut off. An advance will be made on the 22nd by the troops at Fort Union, assisted by two small batteries, when it was expected that communication with Fort Craig would be restored. The Post Office effects at Santa Fe have been removed to Fort Union.

Louisville, April 3rd.—An intelligent gentleman who left Memphis a week ago, reports that General A. Sydney Johnson said the Federals could outflank him in any position he might take, and therefore fortifications were useless. General Johnson says, the only chance for the rebels is an open fight in the field. Our informant thinks Corinth is their chosen place. He further said the rebels had about 50,000 troops on the line between Memphis and Huntsville, Ala., which were being reinforced, and it is supposed that they now number from 50,000 to 65,000. The rebels are prepared with tar and resin to burn Memphis when compelled to evacuate. The most prominent citizens of Memphis say they would yield forthwith if they could be assured of the immunity of their property from confiscation by the Federal Government.

The following despatch has been received at Washington :—

U. S. Flag Ship Benton, off Island No. 10, April 2.

To The Hon. Gideon Welles.—Last night an armed boat expedition was fitted out from the squadron and land forces at this point, under command of Col. Roberts of the 42nd Illinois; at midnight they reached the upper or No. 10 fort, and pulling directly on its face carried it, receiving only the harmless fire of two sentinels, who ran on firing their muskets while the rebel troops in the vicinity rapidly retreated, whereupon Col. Roberts spiked the six guns mounted in the fort, and returned with his boats unharmed. The commanding officer represents all under his command from their coolness and determination as ready to perform more hazardous service had it been required to the fulfilment of the object of the expedition.
