

NEWS OF THE WORLD CONDENSED.

Five persons committed suicide in Vienna yesterday, making a total of a dozen who have taken their own lives since last year. A farmer named Leary was shot dead by an emergency man named Cordal at Castle Island, Ireland, yesterday in the course of a quarrel.

At the Court Martial which took place at the camp of Sir Buller, who was on trial for calling Crown Solicitor Burke a liar and a scoundrel, and was discharged.

At London yesterday three petitions for declaration of bankruptcy were filed against the Monarch Steamship Company. Mr. Sir John Lubbock, chairman of the company, was appointed receiver until Tuesday next.

The Skitners' company has offered its estate in London to tenants at prices amounting to eight years' rental in each case, and has proposed to settle with tenants for arrears of rent at thirty per cent. reduction.

While a number of billiards were endeavoring to effect evictions at Achill, Ireland, they were attacked by a mob of lawless people. The attempt to evict the tenants had to be given up. Several arrests were made. After the eviction a man named Henry the neighbors maltreated the billiards and the landlady.

At a meeting of deputy lieutenants of County Cork, yesterday, a resolution was passed extending the term of office of the county council to the end of the year.

Secretary Lamont married yesterday to Mrs. William Holt of Macao, Ga.

Slight shocks of earthquake were felt at Sumnerville, S. C., on Tuesday night.

John Beasly, the great American shipbuilder, is believed to be dying in New York.

Weatherly, Stevens & Co. dry goods merchants of Cincinnati, have failed with liabilities of \$155,000.

At Belvidere, N. J., last night, fire destroyed a passenger and baggage car on the Lehigh and Hudson river railroad. Loss \$30,000.

The State of Massachusetts has completed the sale of the Hoosac tunnel, with the accompanying 44 miles of railroad, to the Fitzburg Iron Company.

Large bodies of Federal troops have recently been moved up and down the Mexican frontier, and it is believed that the Federal authorities to be that an outbreak is feared in the western part of the State of Chihuahua, Mexico.

Victor Tard, an old citizen of Medina county, N. Y., died on Tuesday aged 95 years. He was a member of the Continental Congress, and served under Napoleon I. and was general in several engagements, being a participant in the battle of Waterloo.

The Cincinnati and Eastern railroad running from Cincinnati to Portsmouth was sold yesterday by order of the court to the Ohio & North Western railway company for \$1,000,000. This company owned a large part of the line, and the balance was sold to the new company.

There has been the heaviest fall of snow known for years throughout Georgia, Alabama, Virginia and South Carolina. It now lies from one to five inches deep. The port of Baltimore to virtually closed by ice, none but the heaviest steamships being able to get in.

At Rutland, Vt., yesterday twenty boys were coasting down South Main street, on a traverse sled, which had struck the side of a bridge at the foot of the hill, throwing the boys head first into the stream. Nearly all the boys were severely injured, and some of them will die.

Seventy-five tint and line glass manufacturers, representing thirty States and territories, met in Pittsburg, Pa., yesterday, and formed the American Association of Glass and Line Glass Manufacturers. The president of the association was elected president.

There was no discussion upon prices or wages.

Four Mexicans employed on the farm of W. C. Simmons in Cotton Wood, Guatemala county, Texas, were killed on Saturday night, were fired upon by a party of negroes. Two Mexicans were killed and another wounded. The fourth was severely injured, but managed to crawl to a house some distance away.

At Minneapolis yesterday morning the north side of the new addition of Pillsbury's elevator, at the corner of Ninth avenue and Fifth street, fell in. One man was killed and a number of others were injured. The elevator was distributed over the main street tracks, and the building was a mass of snow. The roof which had covered the fall, is still hanging. No one was injured.

The wreck of the Baltimore & Ohio road has been entirely cleared, and the road resumed. The remains of nine bodies which were found in the wreck, were taken out of the water by the tugboat, and are being taken to the morgue. The responsibility for the accident is placed upon Freight Conductor Fitcher, who pulled the train out of the station, and upon the engineer, who was in charge of the locomotive. The father and four children are being attended by five physicians. They are unable to determine the cause of the boiling until a post mortem examination is held.
