MURDER YESTERDAY ON BOARD THE "LADY HEAD."

A QUEBEC SAILOR STABBED TO DEATH.

TO THE QUEBEC MERCURY.

Dalhousie, N. B., Oct. 28. The s.s. Lady Head from Quebec arrived here at eight o'clock last night. The purser reports that, while a short distance below Paspébie yesterday morning, two sailors who had been shipped at Quebec for the ship "Irvine," now loading at this port, began scuffling when one of them named Sullivan drew the knife out of the other's belt and stabbed him three times, killing him almost instantly. Sullivan was immediately arrested, and on arrival at Paspébie was handed over to the authorities. The body of the murdered man was also put ashore at that place.

NORTH WESTWORTH ELECTION.

The polling for this constituency commenced yesterday, Mr. McMonie receiving 60 of a majority over Mr. Alexander Brown.

FREE PORTS AND SMUGGLING.

We have to acknowledge the receipts to-day, from W. Spink, Esq., Clerk of Records, of the Reports of the Inspectors of the Free Ports of Gaspé and Sault Ste. Marie. The Return is dated Secretary's Office, 14th September, 1865, and the documents are published pursuant to an address of the Assembly dated 17th August. By this return, we have indubitable proof of the existence of systematic smuggling from the Free Ports, and that it prevails to such an extent that the present means at the disposal of the government officials on either side of the frontiers are not equal to suppressing it.

THE UNION BANK.

It is clear that there is no lack of money in Quebec, when the Union Bank project receives such ready support. Among the stockholders of the new institution are, it is remarked, several directors of the Quebec Bank and the President and Vice-President of the Banque Nationale and the whole of the capital of the Union Bank will soon be subscribed.

THE SAUNDERS KIDNAPPING.

The second jury trial in this matter at Montreal has so far proved a failure, the jurors refusing to agree. Judge Mondelet, however, has stated that the Government is determined to prosecute the offenders and that a new jury will if necessary be empanelled.

THE CONVICT BAREAU.

Up to last evening, no petitions has been sent in to the Executive regarding this man's fate. He is to be hanged on Friday, the 17th November next.

FIRST SNOW AND SLEIGHING.

Since about eight this morning the ground has for the first time this season, been whitened with snow, which has since fallen to the depth of about two inches, and every thing out of doors now presents a wintry aspect. Sleighs are running freely, but a light drizzling rain now setting in, may spoil the roads ere to-morrow.

CUSTOM HOUSE RECEIPTS.

The amount collected at the Custom House to-day was \$1218.51.

The completion of the new jail was a supposed fact on which the public of Quebec was some time ago congratulated in advance by a Grand Jury, who recommended that the prisoners should be removed to it at a period that neither health nor cleanliness, the indispensable condition of health, had received the benefit of the slightest provision in their favor in the new building, and when no means existed of giving the prisoners the advantage of the open air, except setting them at liberty. From this astounding Presentation we can judge of the value of the various condemnations levelled at the Quebec jail, the best prison in Lower Canada and one fitted to be made the model for all prisons to be erected in this part of the Province, but which the selfish interests of individuals eager for a job in the architectural and building lines, has induced Grand Jurors to systematically condemn.

The constant cry against the old jail of Quebec was "want of classification." Now most of the people who raised this cry did not know in the least what it meant; but it was a fine long word, and it was something supposed to have been discovered in modern times; and it was talked of in England, and thought important there, and that numerous and noisy portion of the race of Adam—the human parrots—took up the cry and "want of classification" was permitted to deprive the citizens of Quebec of a prison the best adapted to the wants of their community, it was perhaps possible to conceive or invent. But what of "classification" in the new jail? Why this: In the old jail the prisoners were fourteen in a day room when the room had its complement; in the new they will be twenty-four! The pretended evil for which the old jail was so persistently abused has been all but doubled in the new! It may be asked are there no advantages in the new jail to counterbalance this evil, perhaps it may be supposed it is more secure. Nothing of the sort, but the contrary. Instead of the small yard of the old prison is a very large yard (the size is perhaps an improvement, surrounded by wooden palings which would not keep in a schoolboy, let alone a burglar, and which have been set on fire by loose characters already.

The jail guard has received orders to be prepared to live in the jail, and to this purpose a den of some twelve feet by ten has been assigned to the twelve or fourteen men of the guard. The turnkeys, officers by no means superior to the guard, are to have three rooms each. Each of the prisoners has a sleeping cell to himself, the only undoubted improvement on the old jail, though we freely admit a very great one. Thus the felon in his cell, albeit that cell is far more contracted than it ought to be, is better off than the jail guard who watches over him.

A yard big enough for a Common, with a fence that would not keep in a Shetland pony, and a Canadian imitation of the blackhole of Calcutta to stifle the guard in, these are the conditions of the "new model prison" with all the "new model appliances."

THE FENIANS. RAIDS OR A SURPRISE APPREHENDED IN UPPER CANADA. VOLUNTEER ARMS SHOULD BE SECURED. PASSPORTS AND FRONTIER PATROLS THOUGHT NECESSARY.

The Toronto Leader of yesterday has a long article on the Fenian rumors from which we think proper to make the following extracts:— They continue to perfect their organization and to mature their plans at Philadelphia. Hints have been thrown out in Fenian organs that Canada is the object of attack. According to one account a Provisional Government was to be established by the Fenians in Nova Scotia, and there is much talk about the attention Canada is to receive at the hands of the order. A correspondent of the New York Herald, writing from Toronto, alleges that Fenians are constantly creeping into the Province in numbers not intended to excite suspicion, and that arms in unusual and suspicious numbers have recently been imported. As to the alleged intention of Fenians to point out any considerable number of them in this city. No extraordinary influx of strangers has been noticed, but it is stated that the stealthy invaders remain outside the city. There are all sorts of rumors about as to the intentions of the Fenians with regard to Canada; and though there is no doubt much exaggeration on the subject, it would be well that some precautionary measures should be taken.

A marauding force cannot leave the United States in organized bodies, without the knowledge of the Government; and in that case the American authorities would find it necessary to protect the neutrality of their soil. It follows that if any considerable number of men are to come from the States with hostile intent, they must come as ordinary travellers, and in such numbers as would not excite suspicion. Any great increase in the passenger traffic of the railways would at once be noticed; and if there were grounds of serious apprehension as to the passengers' objects, it might become necessary to institute a stringent passport system. A large proportion of the Fenians in the States probably consists of disbanded soldiers, some of whom has been allowed to retain possession of his rifle on the payment of a small sum, about one-third of its original value. When coming into Canada in the guise of emigrants they could easily bring these weapons with them; but this influx of suspicious characters, accompanied by their rifles, could not be carried to any considerable extent without the fact being known to the authorities. A Fenian organization, no doubt, exists in this Province; but it is difficult to see, without the presence of an extraneous force to give them countenance, encouragement and aid, what enterprise they could venture upon.

There is little reason to fear any organized invasion, though it is possible, the Province may, this winter, be made the scene of some raids in this form. The only other thing to be feared is a midnight surprise by the sudden collection together, of parties who may have arrived in small knots, in union with conspiratorial spirits here. We all know that conspirators are not to be achieved by such means; but banks may be robbed, and other injuries inflicted. Without wishing to overrate the danger arising from Fenianism, it cannot be denied that more or less danger does exist. In this state of things some precautionary measures are called for at the hands of our Government. The first thing to be done is to secure the arms belonging to the volun-

teers, and to place them where they cannot be seized by such an enemy as we are contemplating; for there can be no doubt that the first thing such visitors would do would be to seize upon the arms upon which we are depending for our protection if they were accessible. It will soon be necessary, if it has not already become so, to do more than this. A night patrol could be established in our frontier towns, and means should be concerted by which a general alarm could be given in an instant if it were necessary. The Government is not to be aware of the danger, and it is undoubtable that it takes no measures by which it may be averted.

THE FENIAN CONGRESS. The meeting of the Fenian Brotherhood at Philadelphia has been brought to a close. The newly-appointed members of the Senate as it is called, have gone to New York, where meetings have also been held to carry out whatever designs are contemplated by the body. The Philadelphia correspondent of the New York Herald writes:—"Secretaries of the treasury and of the military department are to be selected. In about a week it is expected all the officers will be at their posts, and then operations on the bond loan will commence in earnest. Specimens of the bonds were exhibited to delegates before adjournment. It is supposed that they will not be ready for general issue before the beginning of November. They are issued in five denominations—10's, 20's, 50's, 100's, and 500's. The devices, vignettes, &c., are tasteful and original."

SENTENCES OF DEATH. IN CANADA. In the Court of Queen's Bench, at Montreal, on Monday, the 2nd instant, in passing sentence of death on Stanislas Barreau, Mr. Justice Aylwin said—Stanislas Barreau, accused of the murder of Marie Louise Sauvage, the jury has declared you guilty, and it is now my duty to pronounce upon you the sentence of death. Your crime is frightful, and your name will long be held in horror. Not until this generation shall have disappeared shall the earth have forgotten you. Brought up by an old citizen who had never done you anything but good, who gave you religious instruction, who prepared you for your first communion, you went to the home of your first benefactor on the Sunday when the family were at mass, in order to steal all the money which you knew was in the house. Possessed by the evil spirit, to conceal your crime you killed the servant who nursed you in a sickness which brought you to the brink of the grave, and who had just brought you something to eat. Unnatural and barbarous man, you have with a six-barrelled revolver, at a moment when she did not expect it, discharged six balls into the body of that unfortunate woman, who could only exclaim "Barreau! Barreau!" and expire. Not content with that you killed a poor little girl, whom you saw born to your master. It was necessary for you to commit a murder to succeed in concealing your crime, and you must kill another servant in the house; but this girl, thinking that her last hour had arrived, had the presence of mind to throw herself behind a table, and after two pistol shots had been fired by you, murderer, Providence, God be praised, saved her, and to your surprise she was able to give at your trial the best evidence of your guilt. As further precaution, you then, after the robbery, set fire to the house. The proof against you is overwhelming, and your crime has completed it. Unhappy man, why did you ever leave your parish and your church, where you were happy, contented, without guilt; why did you allow yourself to be drawn away by the thirst for gain and for dollars? Did you follow the trade of a brigand in a foreign country? Returned to your own home, you have shown yourself corrupted and debauched, a robber, an incendiary, and an assassin. Now, there is no longer hope that you shall remain on earth, your days are numbered; the scaffold awaits to end your existence. But in this awful moment in which you are abandoned by all, there remain to you the succors of religion. Address yourself, I entreat you, to a priest, and I will say to you, that it is only in the name of our Redeemer and our Saviour Jesus, through prayer and penitence, that you have any hope of salvation. Listen to what is written—"Be not afraid of them that kill the body, and after that have no more that they can do. But I will forewarn you whom ye shall fear: Fear Him, who, after he hath killed the soul, hath power to cast into hell; yea, I say unto you, he." (Luke xii. 4, 5, and the same sentiment in Matthew x. 28.)

The sentence of the court is that of the law, that for the murder and felony of which you have been convicted, you be taken to the common goal of the district from whence you came, and be there detained until the 17th of November next, then to be taken to the place of execution, and there to be hanged by the neck till dead; and may the Almighty God have mercy on your soul.

CORPORATION OF QUEBEC. The city Council met last night. Present: His Worship the Mayor (in the chair) and Councillors Henry, Hossack, Dussault, Lemaistre, Lévesque, Lavallée, Bolduc, Roy, Riouffé, Colé St. Michel, Pruneau, Withall, Langlois, B. Wiles, and Alleyne.

The Mayor said that the city account with the Quebec Bank had been settled; and he now held in his hand the new debentures which had been given as collateral security.

Read a letter from Mr. Kly, Secretary of the Police Board, stating that the said Board has resolved that from the 1st May next the police shall not act as firemen.

A letter from Mr. Allard, stating that a company of one hundred men is on the point of being organized for removing furniture and other effects at fires, and praying that the Corporation, assist them with the necessary outfit of ladders, ropes, &c.

A letter from the Secretary of the Quebec Fire Office, reiterating on certain conditions, an offer of \$2000 from the Board of Directors for the purchase of a first-class steam fire-engine.

A letter from the same complaining that the interest due on certain coupons since the 1st July last has not been paid.

A letter from Rev. E. Langevin, Secretary to the Archbishop, stating the terms on which the ground required by the Corporation for the erection of a police-station will be ceded.

Read a letter from Mr. Baillarge, advocate relative to the draft of the water-works by law.

Reports were then presented by Councillor Lemaistre—From the Road Committee, stating that, in consequence of extensive unforeseen works, the sum at the disposal of the Committee is nearly expended and recommending that a further sum of \$6000 be appropriated so as to complete the works for the season.

By Councillor Hanel—From the Special Committee appointed to investigate the complaints made by Mr. N. Pages, Assistant City Clerk against Mr. L. A. Cannon, City Clerk, recommended that Mr. Pages be assigned to some other department in the Corporation, and that the official to whose place he is assigned should be transferred to the City Clerk's office.

Mr. Renaud asked the Chairman of the Finance Committee what had been done with a report which recommended the purchase of a steam fire-engine.

Mr. Hossack said that when his report came up there was barely a quorum present, and as it was a very important matter, it was thought right to defer it until next meeting.

The first order was the third reading of the by-law relative to depositing fifth.

The Mayor said that, owing to the apprehension which was felt respecting a possible visitation of some dangerous epidemic, the opinion was entertained that some place other than that specified in the draft of by-law should be selected for depositing fifth.

Mr. Pruneau thereupon moved to refer back the report to the Committee.—Carried.

The report from the Finance Committee recommending that from and after the 1st November only one copy of each city paper be taken at the City Hall—that the same be filed for the use of Corporation officials—that an order-book for printing and advertising, be kept by the City Clerk—and that no accounts for any such work be paid unless certified by the Clerk and accompanied by the order given for the same, was adopted.

The report from the Finance Committee recommending that £300 be offered Mr. Baras for a lot in Champlain street, for a police-station, was sent back to Committee.—Carried.

The report from the Finance Committee on the letter of the Caisse d'Économie, asking for the interest due since July last—recommending that the said interest be paid, was adopted.

Mr. Withall moved that, in accordance with the new Act, the Mayor, two City Councillors and the Treasurer, be appointed to cancel the debentures delivered up by the Quebec Bank.—Carried.

Mr. Withall and Hossack were then chosen.

Mr. Hossack moved that, with a view of facilitating the proceedings of this Council, a space of time be allowed after "Motions," during which questions may be put and information obtained.

Ordered to stand as a notice of motion for next meeting.

Mr. Dussault moved that the report of the Special Committee on the subject of the complaint made by Mr. Fages against Mr. Cannon be placed upon the orders of the day.

The motion was carried.

Mr. Dussault moved that the report be sent back to Committee.

DEPARTURE OF MAJOR LANGEVIN. On Thursday evening the officers of the Ninth Battalion, "Volontaires de Québec," met at the residence of Major Langevin, for the purpose of presenting him with an address on the occasion of his approaching departure for Ottawa. Colonel Thomson, in the name of the Battalion, read the following address in English, which was afterwards read in French by Captain Dugal:

ADDRESS. "To Ed. J. Langevin, Esquire, Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, late Major of the 9th Battalion, 'Volontaires de Québec,' &c., &c., Québec.

"Sir, The parting hour being at hand, we come to present you our best wishes and bid you farewell.

"The relations which have existed between us during your connection with the 9th Battalion have always been cordial and marked with the utmost courtesy. We feel happy to acknowledge it, and to assure you that we highly appreciate the eminent services you have rendered to our Battalion.

"We regret that, owing to circumstances that you could not control, you should have been compelled to resign the position you held with so much honor to yourself and benefit to the corps, but we hope that some favorable opportunity may yet bring you back into our midst.

"Be pleased then, Sir, to accept our most sincere wishes for your happiness and your welfare.

To which Major Langevin returned the following: "REPLY. "GENTLEMEN—I thank you most cordially for the address you have just presented to me and assure you it is an ample reward for the efforts I have made in order to maintain the Ninth Battalion on an effective footing.

"I am happy to see you have a pleasant recollection of the relations which have existed between us. My constant wish has been that they should be the relations of friends acting for the same purpose, and having the same spirit and object. Thus it is that at this parting hour, when I regret at leaving you is so great, I have the satisfaction to carry away with me the assurance of your esteem and of the wishes you express for my future happiness.

"Nothing, Gentlemen, could rejoice me more than to come back into your midst, as you express it, and see that your wishes on this point will never equal mine. In any case, be your wishes accomplished or not, rest assured I shall ever keep the recollection of your kindness towards me, and of the mark of attention you have just bestowed upon me.

"In so far as the men of the Ninth Battalion are concerned, I am satisfied that they will act in the future as in the past, showing themselves worthy of the confidence of the authorities and of their more immediate commanders, and should circumstances require their presence where they can render more effective service to their country, they will readily follow their commanding officers and render a good account of Her Majesty's ammunition. I thank you once more, gentlemen, for the honor you have done me this evening. I shall not forget it more than I shall forget any one of you."

Major Langevin then invited the officers present to a splendid collation, which was amply discussed. After a few hours agreeably spent together, the officers parted, highly pleased with their host's generous hospitality.

"BUYING AND SELLING."—An over-confiding lassie lately relieved a military man of his obligations to Her Majesty, bought his discharge, married him and started him in business over the river. While in a state of oblivion he forgot his wife and his business and moved off, leaving his bride behind.

OVER THE BORDER.—Rumor has it that a clever watchmaker outside the gate, who deserted his wife to come here from the States, has lately decamped leaving a few worthless traps to satisfy his numerous friends, including the landlord and an obliging host who had trusted him recently with a larger sum than usual.

HIGH PRICE OF BUTTER.—Butter advanced to-day to from thirteen to fourteen pence per pound. Over five thousand packages from Kamouraska, have been shipped from here to the United States markets.

STONE THROWING.—Several stones have been maliciously thrown into the cars of the Street Railway while crossing Crown street of late.

BY TELEGRAPH THIS DAY. (Reported for the Daily Evening Mercury.) FIRST REPORT.—11 A. M. AMERICAN NEWS. THE CURRENCY GOING SOUTH. GRAND SEIZURE AT NEW YORK. STEAMER BLOWN UP, ALL ON BOARD KILLED. New York, Oct. 27.

The Commercial says:—Monetary affairs continue in an unsettled condition; there is a general scarcity of currency, and some of the banks complain of difficulty in meeting demands for legal tenders. There is still a steady outflow of currency to the South and West, where it is only partially set off by the current increase of the National Bank circulation.

The Post Special says, there is no truth in the reports that the Navy Department has ordered a large number of war vessels into commission, on account of diplomatic complications.

George Wagner, convicted of the murder of his wife, last week, was to-day sentenced to be hanged on the 15th December.

The Government has seized a large quantity of alcohol, on account of owners attempting to defraud the Custom House. A number of officials are said to be implicated in the swindle.

Norfolk, Va., Oct. 27. A tug exploded her boiler this evening, was blown to atoms and all on board killed, including Captain and crew and Wm. Patton, agent of the Boston steamers.

RECORDER'S COURT TO-DAY. BEFORE HIS WORSHIP THE RECORDER. Another case of wooden building came up; the Judge ordered the demolition of the house before the 1st November.

Fifteen prisoners were arrayed in Court this morning, for drunkenness, disturbing peace; indecent exposure; throwing dirty water or "slops" in the highway; wishing to be committed for shelter; and throwing snowballs, disposed of as follows, viz:—Eight sent to jail, three fined, and four discharged.
