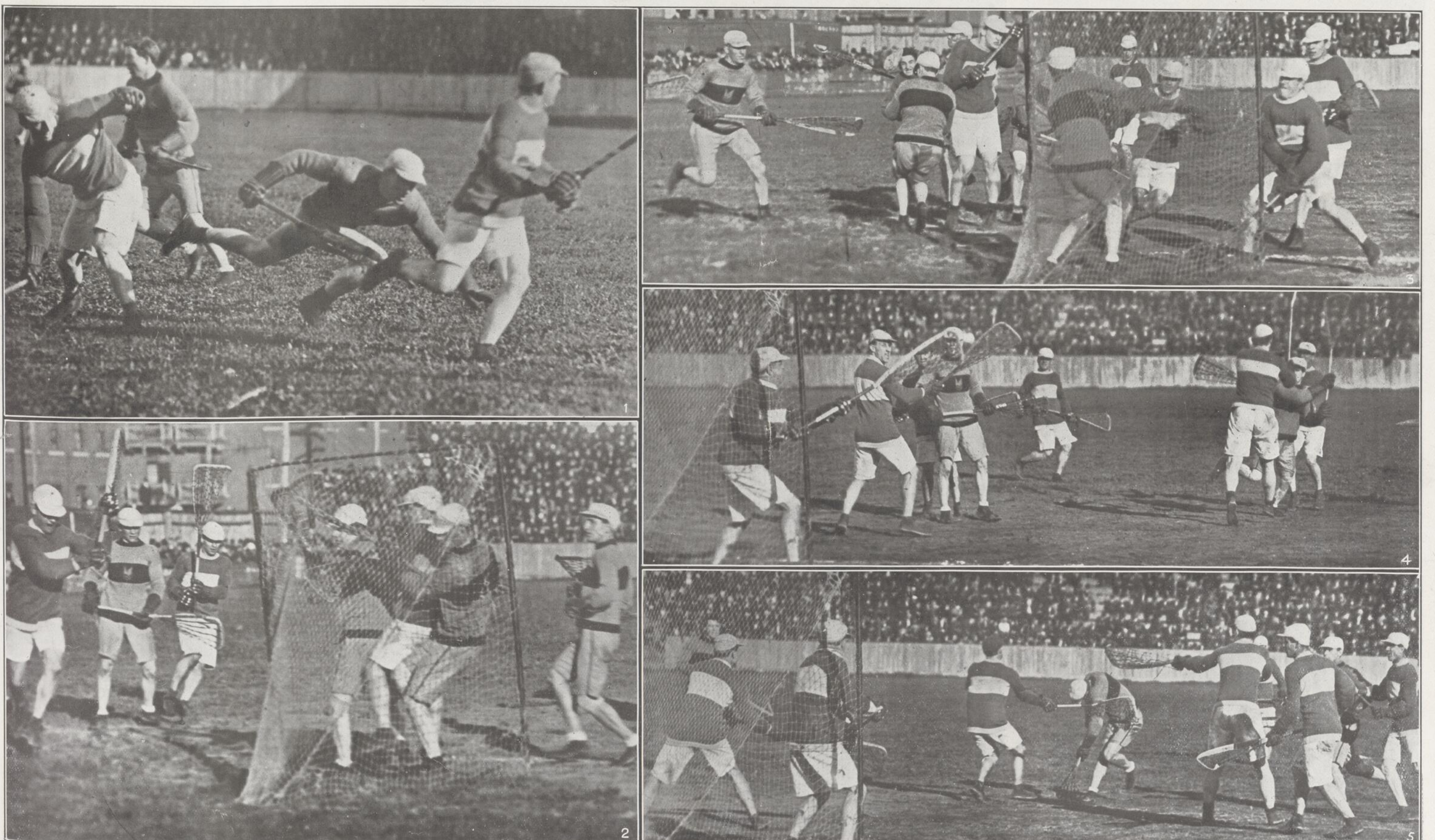


## Blue Bonnets Race Meet Has Proved One of the Great Attractions of the Old Boys' Re-Union

## Pictures Showing Intensity of Struggle Between Montreal and National for Lacrosse Supremacy



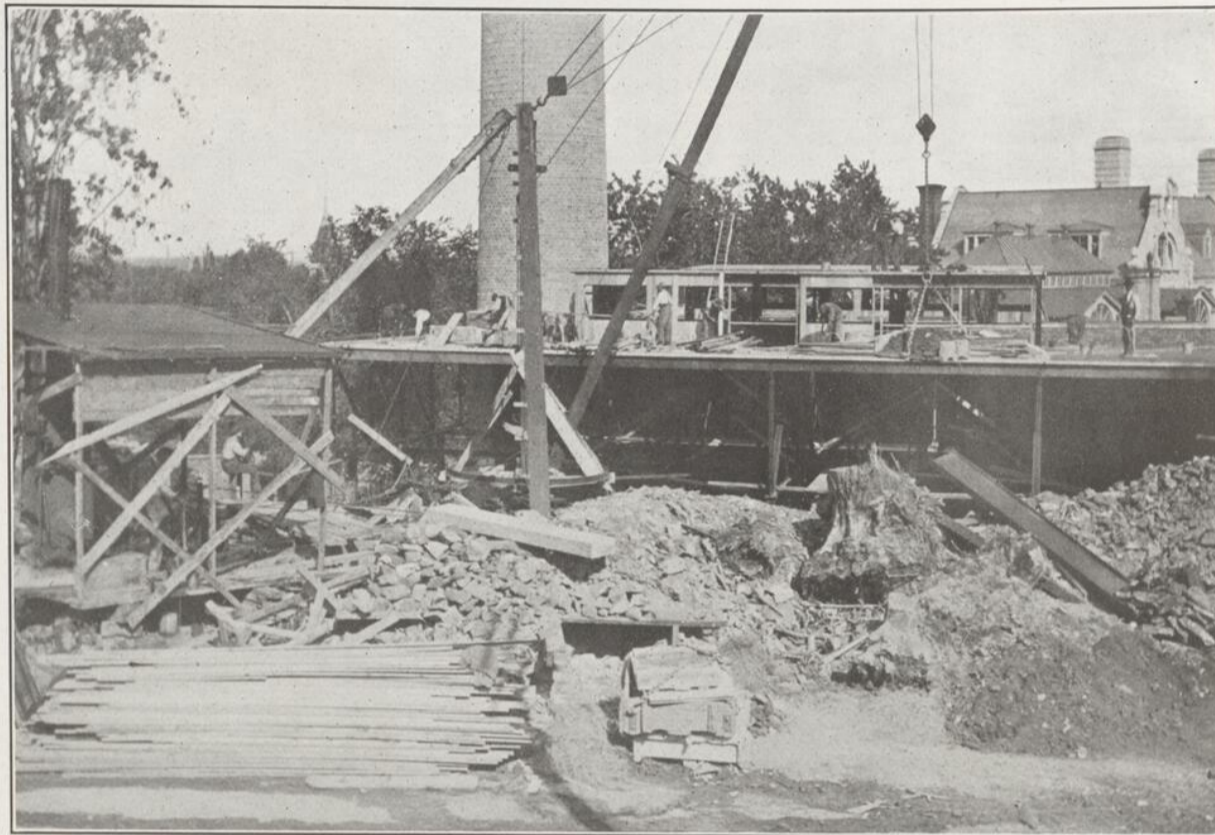

OLD HOMERS WILL SEE MANY CHANGES AT MCGILL.

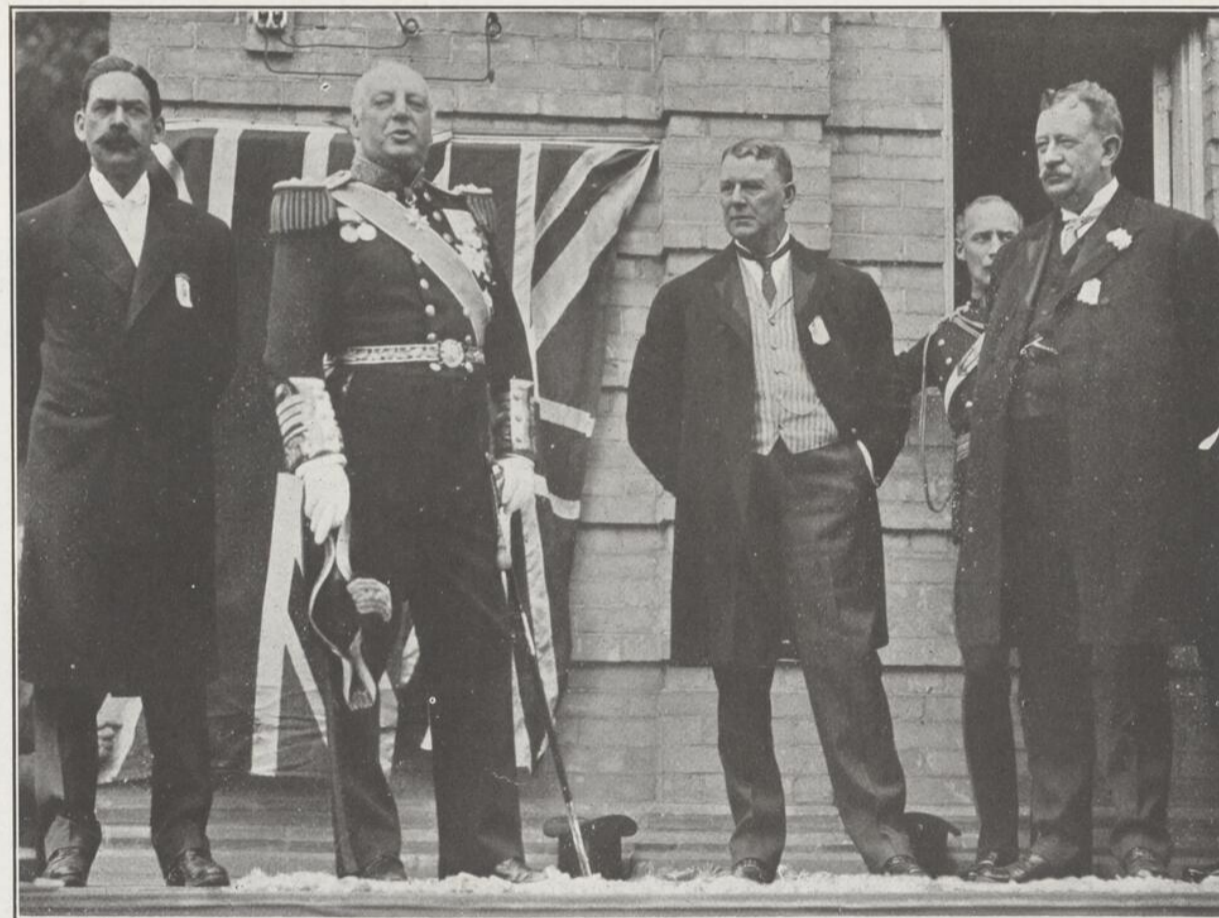
IN no section of the city will Old Homers see greater changes on the occasion of their present visit to Montreal than in the precincts of the McGill University Buildings. During the past few years, since the disastrous fires of 1907, the construction in the vicinity of the University, to the casual observer, has appeared to be little better than a chaos, a jumble of buildings being located here and there in the grounds in a haphazard way.

without regard to proportion or beauty. But to those who tried to see deeper than the surface of things, a different impression has been conveyed. Through all the seeming chaos and confusion a definite system has been followed.

Not the least of these improvements is the construction of a central power-house from which light, heat and power will be transmitted to all parts of the University. This will greatly conduce to the economical maintenance of the University, for the necessity of receiving light and power from outside

sources and of having furnaces in each of the buildings will be done away with. The system of heating is very similar to that which was installed at Queen's University, Kingston, a few years ago, but will be operated on a much more economical basis. At Queen's the steam is driven through pipes from the power-house to the various buildings, but under such low pressure that there is a considerable heat loss due to condensation.

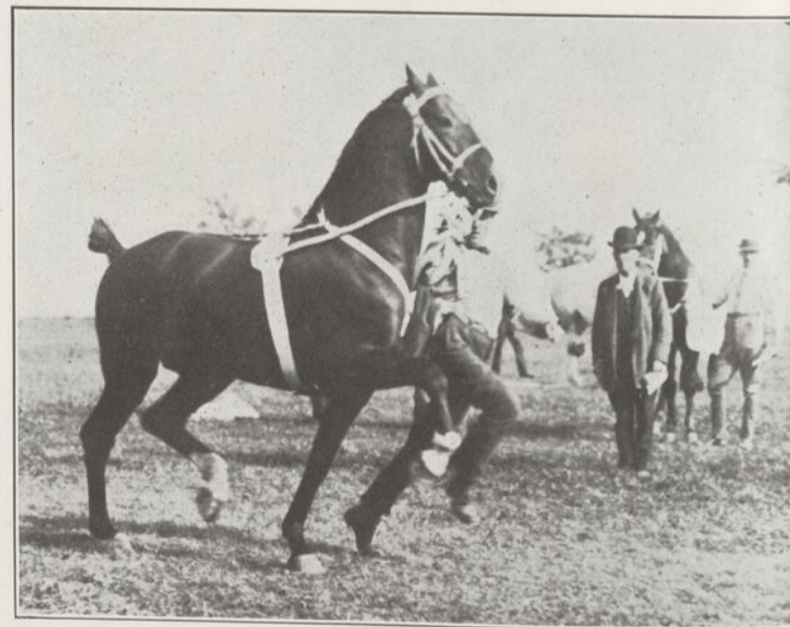

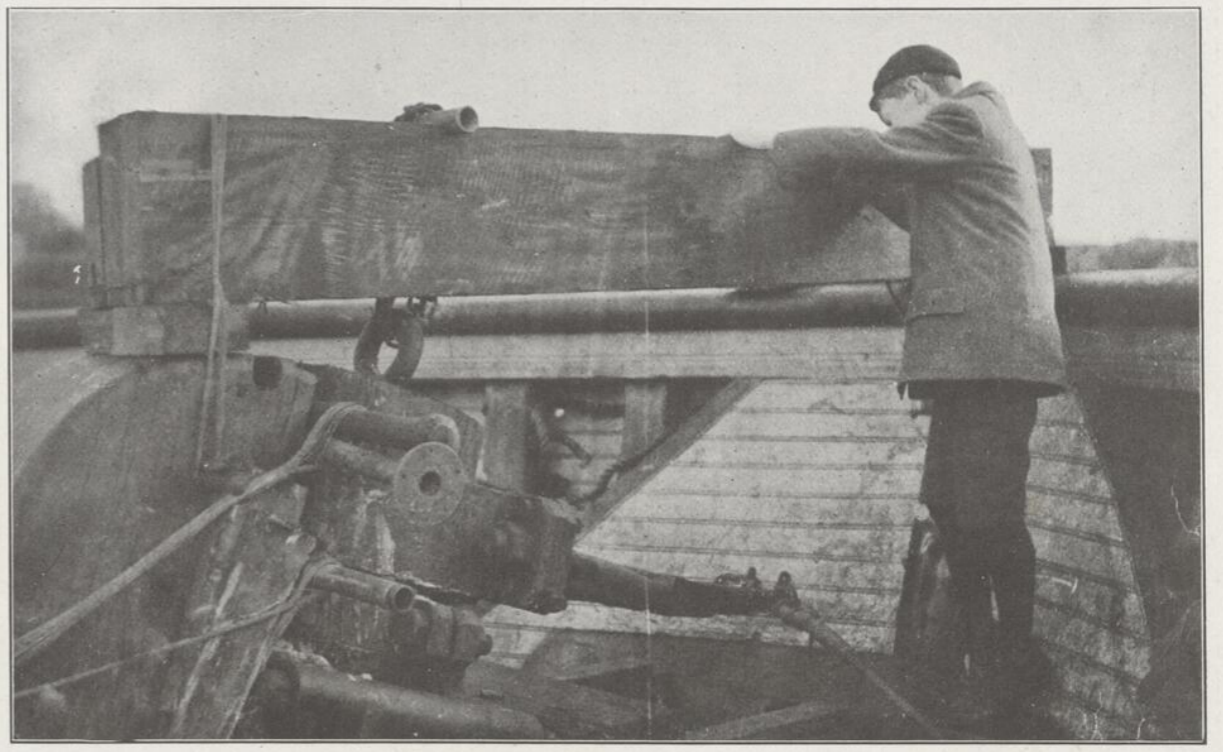

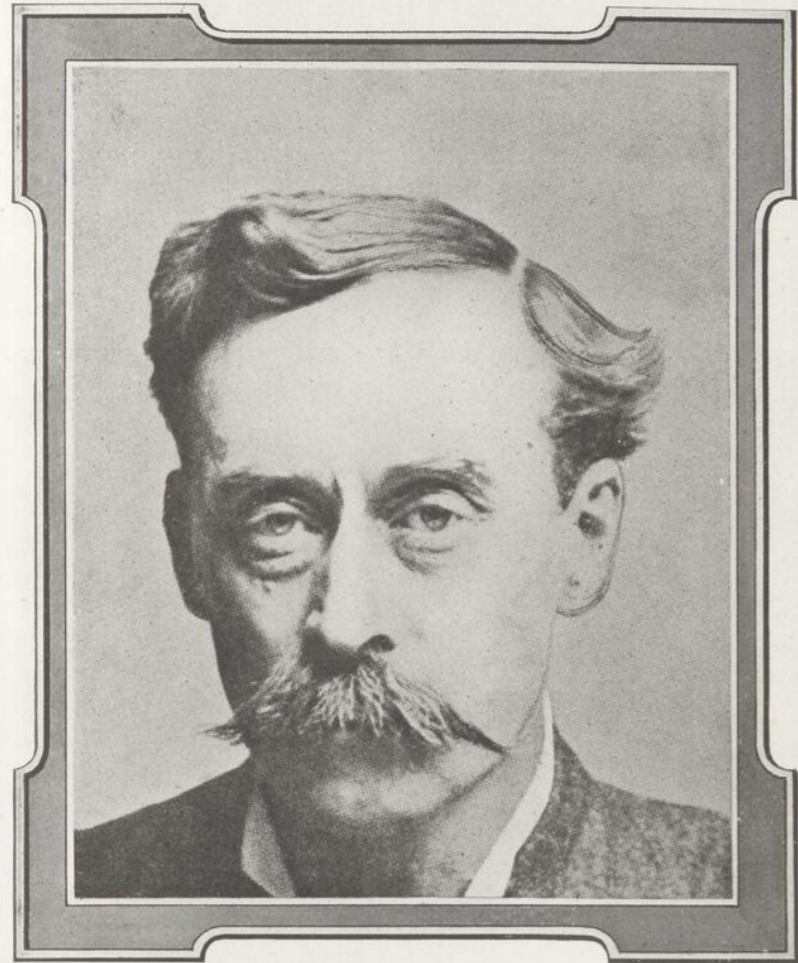

COMMANDER PEARY, WHO HAS JUST RETURNED FROM THE NORTH—He has disputed Dr. Cook's claim of having been the first at the Pole, and claims that honor for himself.

"How would the mariner's compass act when the true north had been reached?" An officer on one of the steamships in the Harbor of Montreal explained the matter to a Standard representative as follows:—

"There was an old myth among sailors that a vessel with an iron hull could not sail over the magnetic pole, but would stick there as do iron filings around the poles of a bar magnet. This theory was exploded in June, 1831, when Captain James Clark Ross located the magnetic north pole, and found its position to be 75 degrees 05.3 minutes North latitude, and longitude 96 degrees 45.8 minutes West Greenwich.

"Approaching the magnetic pole, the compass would become more and more 'sluggish,' or rather fickle and fitful, and over the magnetic pole would point any and every way, and would be of no more use than an unmagnetized piece of iron or a needle made of brass. The force exerted by the earth as a magnet upon a compass needle becomes less and less as the magnetic pole is approached, and at this singular point it vanishes entirely."

"Well, if the compass became useless at that point, what would be the next thing to do?"

"Magneticians," replied the officer, "have an instrument known as a 'dip circle,' that is a magnetized needle which swings freely in a vertical plane on a horizontal axis. At the magnetic pole the dip needle would stand exactly vertical. As an explorer proceeded north the north end of the compass needle would tend to dip towards the earth. This dip is overcome by the use of a small weight fastened on the south arm, and this weight can be slid into the position necessary to overcome the force which dips the north arm downwards. To sum up. At the magnetic pole the compass is valueless, the dip needle stands vertical, and astronomical observation proves the magnetic pole. At the true pole the compass would be the chief guide back to civilization, and astronomical observation would fall to point to some definite direction."

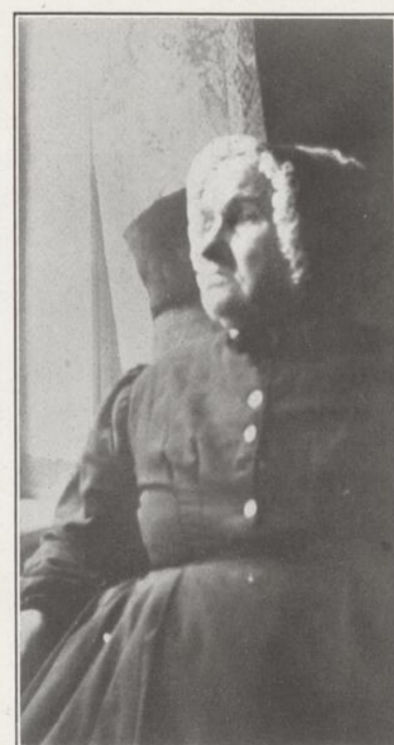
