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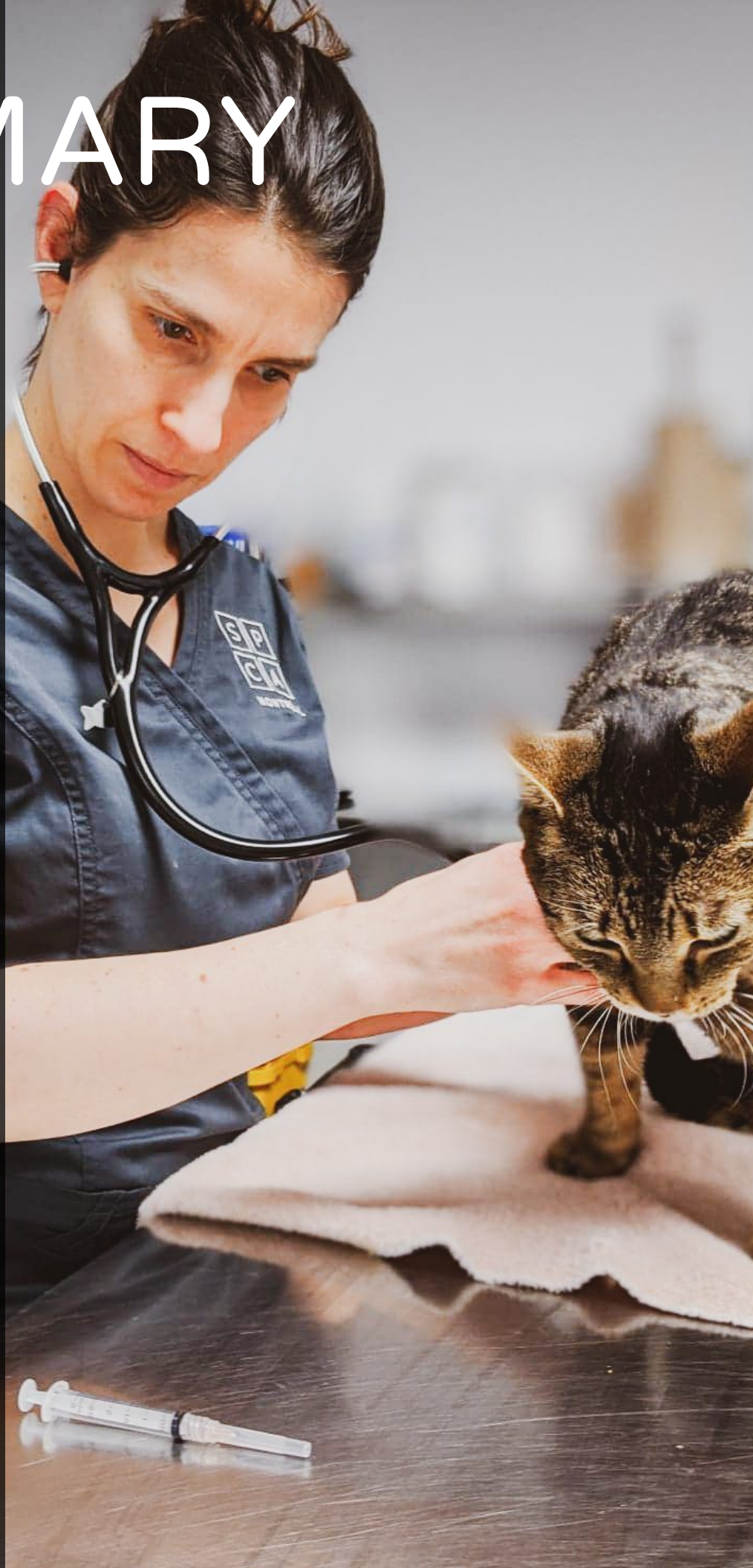
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OVERVIEW OF THE YEAR 2021 : A WORD FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

THE MARY PHELAN NEONATAL PROGRAM

PARTNERSHIP WITH DANS LA RUE

Thanks to donations, we are able to help not only our protégés at the shelter, but also the animals of people who receive services from partners like Dans la rue, an organization that helps youth that is experiencing homelessness or other precarious situations. Dans la rue meets their immediate needs and works with them in developing skills to lead more independent and rewarding lives.

THE MONTREAL SPCA'S ANIMAL ADVOCACY DEPARTMENT

The Montreal SPCA's Animal Advocacy department is responsible for the organization's efforts to strengthen animal protection legislation and public policy at the municipal, provincial, and federal levels. Its mission is to represent and advance animals' interests in the legal and political system, as well as to raise awareness of animal protection issues amongst the general public.

DIRECTOR AND STAFF

Me Sophie Gaillard joined the Montreal SPCA as a lawyer for both the Animal Advocacy Department and the Investigations Division in 2013, after having graduated from McGill University's Faculty of Law and articling at the Montreal office of the Directeur des poursuites criminelles et pénales. In 2018, Me Gaillard was named Director of Animal Advocacy. She was also responsible for overseeing the SPCA's animal cruelty investigations up until 2021. She currently serves as the Director of Animal Advocacy and Legal Affairs.

Me Gaillard also teaches Animal Law at the Faculty of Law at McGill University and, from 2017 to 2020, served on the board of directors of the Animal Welfare Foundation of Canada. In 2018, she was one of the three finalists for the Young Bar of Montréal's "Leaders of Tomorrow" award, in the "Alternative Career" category. Me Gaillard is a frequent lecturer and media commentator on animal law and protection and has contributed to academic publications in these fields. Her work has been profiled in Quebec as well as nationally.

Me Gaillard works closely with our Animal Advocacy coordinators, Émilie-Lune Sauvé and Erin Martellani. She also supervises a number of Université de Montréal and McGill University law students each year.

A FEW OF OUR GREATEST ACHIEVEMENTS

- Participating in legislative consultations on animal protection bills, including by submitting detailed briefs as well as by providing oral testimony at the National Assembly .
- The “Animals Are Not Things” campaign that led to the adoption of a new provision in the Civil Code of Quebec that recognizes animals as sentient beings (art. 898.1) as well as the enactment of the Animal Welfare and Safety Act, the first law entirely dedicated to animal protection in Quebec.
- A successful fight against dog breed-specific legislation at the municipal (City of Montreal) and provincial levels, including a lawsuit against the City of Montreal, lobbying efforts at both levels of government, and extensive public awareness campaigns.
- Lobbying efforts directed at the City of Montreal that led to a ban on horse-drawn carriages and the enactment of the most progressive animal bylaw in the province .
- Organizing the first-ever federal election debate on animal welfare in 2021, in partnership with other Canadian animal protection organizations.
- Organizing the first-ever municipal election debate in 2021 on animal protection.
- The “Fido on the Metro” campaign calling for leashed dogs to be allowed in Montreal’s public transit system, supported by a petition that collected over 16,000 signatures.

In 2021, more than 11,500 animals passed through the Montreal SPCA's doors, met our teams, received necessary care and found a new home, either through our adoption program or through a partner organization.

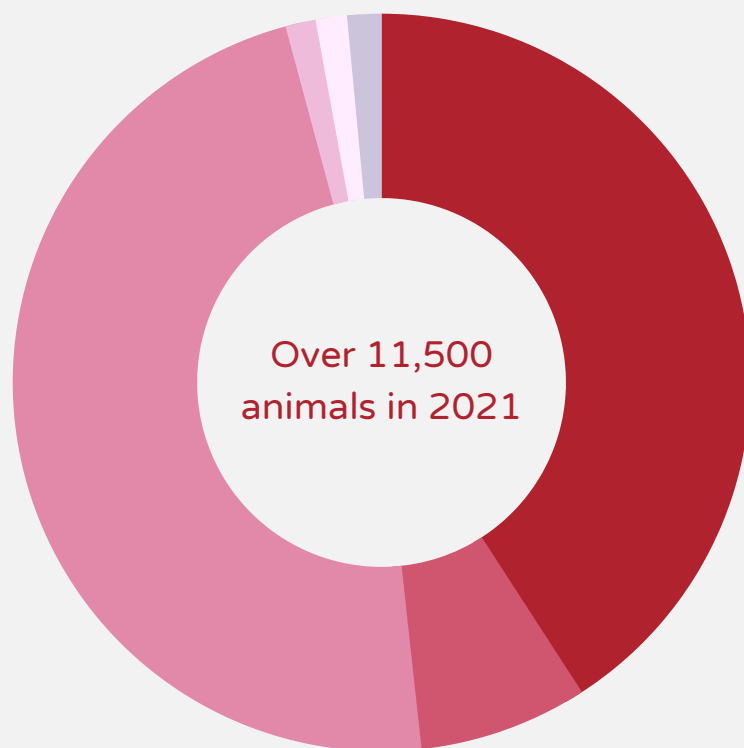

REVENUES AND EXPENSES

The Montreal SPCA is a registered charity that relies heavily on donations from the public to fulfill its mission (2021 contributions: 70.1% of revenues; 2020 contributions: 63.4% of revenues; 2019 contributions: 60.6% of revenues).

Despite the enduring pandemic, the Montreal SPCA has adapted and been innovative in its programs, resulting in an excess of revenues over expenses of \$1,031,989 as of December 31, 2021.

The Montreal SPCA's audited 2021 financial statements give a true and fair view of the organization's financial position and the results of its operations and cash flows (refer to the independent auditor's report in the financial statements on the Montreal SPCA's website). The organization's financial position is very good, with current assets of \$4.6 million (2020: \$4.7 million; 2019: \$4.5 million) and current liabilities of \$1.05 million (2020: \$861,000; 2019: \$968,000).

The Montreal SPCA is extremely grateful to its donors. In 2021, we were able to pursue our mission despite the imposition of public health measures, thanks to the generosity of our supporters. Without all of them, we would not have been able to ensure the well-being of the more than 11 500 sentient beings who passed through our shelter.

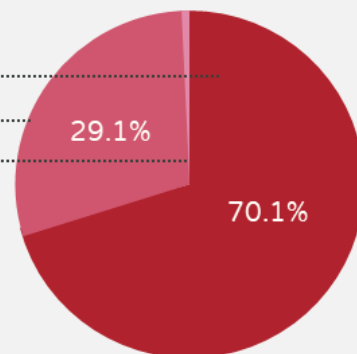

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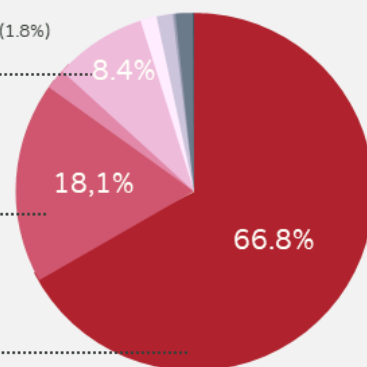

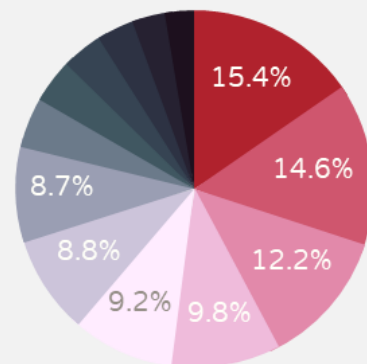

A HISTORY OF COMPASSION

Founded in Montréal in 1869, the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (now known simply as the Montreal SPCA) was the first animal protection organization in Canada. Although we do not know exactly how the organization came about, history shows support from animal advocacy societies in France, England and the United States. During its first year of existence, the SPCA worked primarily to improve the living conditions of draft horses, who were seen all over the island of Montreal at the time. The SPCA then turned its attention to other issues, such as humane dog management, cockfighting and the killing of wild birds. The SPCA has come a long way since its foundation. It is now the largest animal protection organization in Quebec, speaking on behalf of animals wherever there is ignorance, cruelty, exploitation or neglect.
