At The City Hall.

Several Cases of Typhoid Fever.

AN ENQUIRY WILL BE MADE AS TO THE CAUSE.

The regular monthly session of the City Council was held in the Council Chamber on Monday evening, there being present His Worship, Mayor Belanger in the chair, and Councillors Cate, Fortier, Olivier, Worthington, Caron, Codere and Jenekes, W. B. McCaw acting as secretary.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

The Fire Department reported having received three calls during the month, all of which were for small fires with slight damage.

The police report showed forty-six arrests during the month, thirty of which were for drunkenness. The report also stated that during the month the annual exhibition was held, and the attendance was the largest of any previous exhibition that good order was maintained throughout the week, and although the light-fingered gentry were in attendance only three cases of lost money were reported to the department.

The Health Committee's report showed that there were fourteen cases of contagious disease in the city, ten of which were typhoid fever and four of scarlet fever, one of the latter being complicated with diphtheria.

During last month there were twenty-eight deaths in the city, being four less than the previous month and twelve more than the corresponding month of 1899.

Councillor Cate asked the Health Committee if anything had been done to trace the cause of so many cases of typhoid fever in the city.

Mayor Belanger said there had not been anything done to his knowledge.

Councillor Worthington said that it seemed to him that the Council should appoint a Committee of medical men to investigate the matter.

Councillor Cate said that he understood there were a number of new cases and he thought it would be in the interest of the city to have the matter thoroughly investigated.

Councillor Worthington said he understood some laid the outbreak to the water, but as there were a number of cases outside the city limits it did not seem likely that these cases were due to any such cause.

Mayor Belanger said there was a Health Committee, of which Chief Davidson was chairman, and he was sure if the Health Committee requested him he would make a report on the matter for the adjourned meeting.

The Secretary read a letter from Mr. W. M. Tomlinson, giving a statement of the money expended in permanent improvements upon the exhibition grounds, which amounted to nearly \$3,000, and asked that the Council pay the annual and special grants to the Association as soon as convenient. Upon motion the Mayor and Secretary were authorized to sign a check for \$2,000 in favor of the Association.

A letter was read from Mr. H. R. Fraser asking the City to take over the Band Stand on Portland Square, at a cost of \$875, being the value placed upon it by Mr. G. Bryant. Referred to Finance Committee.

The Mayor read a letter from Mr. H. F. Forester, of the Thos. Forester Co., Montreal, in which he stated: "We are representing a large English firm who are desirous of opening a branch factory in Canada. They would employ fifty hands for a start and pay splendid wages. We have been asked to locate a site for them and we wish to know what concessions Sherbrooke would be willing to allow as to bonus, taxes, etc. The proposed factory is for the manufacture of wire and wire specialties. The letter was referred to the Finance Committee."

Moved by Councillor Fortier and seconded by Councillor Codere, that inasmuch as the Council had already granted a sewer for Jubilee Street, the Sanitary Committee be directed to carry out the work at once, upon a right of way being obtained.

The Council then adjourned until Tuesday next, the 9th inst.

The Shortness of Life.
What always strikes one so forcibly is, I think, the shortness of human life, compared with other works of nature. The longest life—how short it is! And half of it one can hardly call life, being spent in sleep, which is not real existence.

A French preacher I heard once brought the shortness of life strongly before me by relating in his sermon how a saint, in olden days, wishing to impress on himself the rapidity of life's race, when he came to years of discretion, placed 80 marbles in a glass jar, each marble to represent a year of human life, taking 80 years as an outside limit very far exceeding that. Then, taking another glass jar, from the first one he took the number of marbles representing the years he had already passed, and placed them in the empty jar, and then year by year extracted a marble from the other, till, more rapidly than he could have dreamed, the two jars contained 40 marbles each. Then still more swiftly did each year seem to speed away, and what had so short a time before been the full jar became the nearly empty one, till three, two and then only one marble remained, and life, which had looked so long at starting, had swiftly and silently melted away.—C. De la Warr.

Surgeon-Major Worthington's Good Work

The special correspondent of the Montreal Witness, with E. Battery R. C. writing from the Convalescent Home, East Cowes, Isle of Wight, pays the following high compliment to Surgeon-Major Worthington:—

"Your correspondent was forced to return to De Aar, where he was received by Surgeon-Major Worthington and Dr. Whitton, who treated me with kindness and sent me to the hospital on the morning of May 12. I should like to add a word concerning these gentlemen, for although we were without a physician on the march from De Aar, these men, who remained here for a time, did everything in their power for those who required their assistance. Not only did they do all that they were expected to perform in a professional way, but they treated their patients with consideration and kindness. Let there be 'honour to whom honour is due' and it is known as widely as possible that we were very fortunate in having the services of so genial and competent a medical officer as Surgeon Major Worthington, who, by the way, saw active service in Canada at the time of the North-West rebellion in 1885. During that campaign he served as hospital sergeant, fulfilling similar duties to those performed by his popular assistant, Dr. Whitton, in the present war. Neither of these men, however, has been with E. Battery since we left De Aar, so far as we know."

Major Worthington was called to duty at Bloemfontein, and Dr. Whitton received the appointment as civil surgeon in the hospital at Campbell. His friends and the public generally will be gratified to learn of this appointment, for it is a recognition of merit by the imperial authorities, in a devoted loyal Canadian. But whilst we congratulate him on his advancement we hope that it will not mean that Canada is to lose his services as a resident. Doubtless, inducements will be offered to him and many others, to get them to remain in South Africa.

He Crushed the Hecklers.
The man who asks questions and insists on their being answered is a familiar presence at all party meetings. He is known as the heckler. The speaker is not allowed to disregard him. If a statement is disputed, it is the orator's place to make it good. Any member of the audience may rise to his feet and shout out a contradiction whenever he feels like it, and by the custom of English public life the speaker is expected to make some reply on the spot.

Mr. Chamberlain was always a dangerous man to cross in debate, but the personal feeling against him was so bitter for years after his withdrawal from the ranks of the separatists that many an unhappy man was driven to tilt against his shield. It was dangerous to watch Mr. Chamberlain's handling of the situation. He would pause when the interruption grew serious and give the heckler a chance to make himself well heard. "Now if you will allow me I will ask that gentleman to get upon a chair that we may all have the pleasure of seeing him." A dozen anxious hands would hold the objector in to welcome prominence. "Now, sir," came the clear, passionless voice, "will you kindly speak up? I should be sorry if any one missed what you have to say."

The heckler, now quite unnerved, would stammer out something, and Mr. Chamberlain, listening with a malicious smile, would quietly readjust his eyeglasses and, turning to the audience, fling out a reply—cool, cutting and decisive.—Sydney Brooks in Harper's Magazine.

CANADIANS WILL COME DIRECT TO MONTREAL.

Ottawa, Oct. 2.—The following cable was received from the High Commissioner's office in London to-day:

"London, Oct. 2.—Papers state from 300 to 400 men of the first contingent sailed from Capetown on Sunday on the transport Idaho, direct for Montreal, calling at St. Helena."

BADEN POWELL IN COMMAND OF POLICE.

Pretoria, Oct. 1.—General Baden-Powell has arrived here to take command of the police in the Transvaal and Orange River Colony, where it is proposed to maintain a force of 12,000 under him.

GUNS AND AMMUNITION.

London, October 1.—A despatch from Lord Roberts, dated Sunday September 30th, says:

"Rifle troops in the Bethlehem District have recaptured from the Boers a mountain battery gun lost at Nicholson's Nek, and also 65,000 rounds of Martini Henri ammunition."

POWERS MAY AGREE

WASHINGTON DESPACHES SAYS AGREEMENT IS IN SIGHT.

Washington, D.C., Oct. 2.—Favorable news has reached Washington from the European chancelleries indicating that a complete agreement as to China is within sight. The agreement will be on the basis of the propositions laid down by Secretary Hay in his note of July 3, and the subsequent notes treating of that subject. The accord of Russia with the United States is more complete than was anticipated at first, and the reports show that all of the European nations probably are placing themselves in position to take advantage of the opening made by the United States and soon will be ready to begin negotiations for a settlement with the Chinese Government. The Russians already have given notice of such purpose, and while the text of the French note on this subject has not reached the State Department, the officials are satisfied that this is correct, reported and that France, like Russia, is ready to negotiate at once.

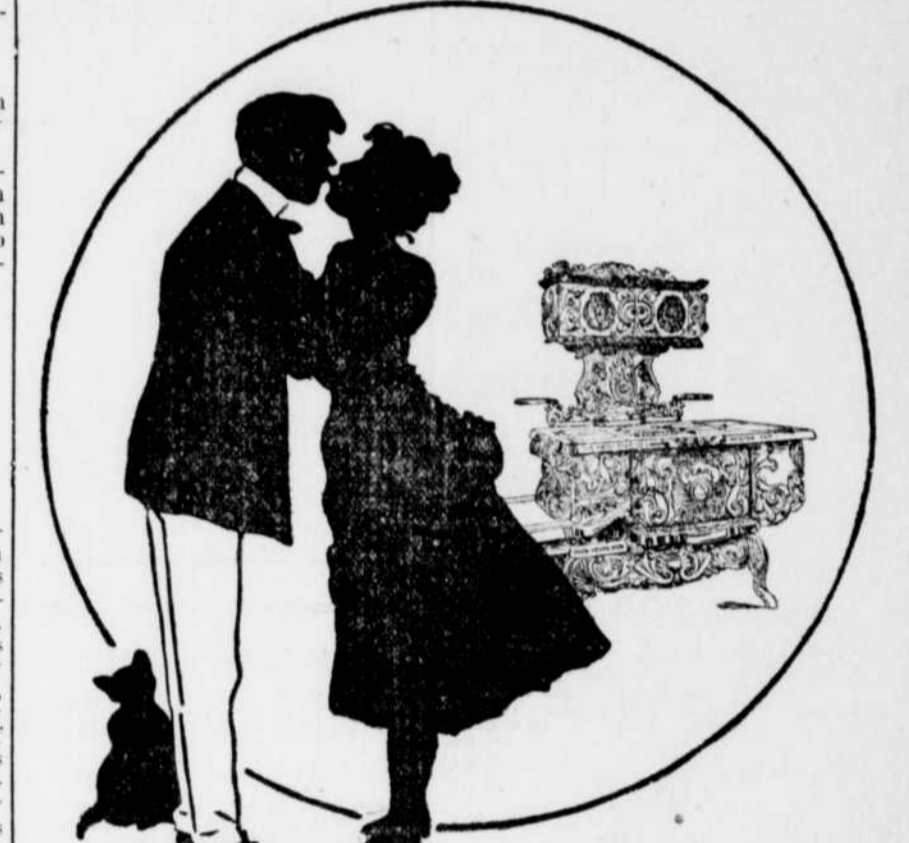

Ottawa, Oct. 1.—Mrs. James Moran, a widow, of Fallowfield, lost two children and her home by fire on Friday afternoon. Court of Queen's Bench. Several True Bills Returned. NO TRUE BILL RETURNED IN NORTH HATLEY CASE.

GRAND JURY'S LABOURS FINISHED. RECOMMEND BUILDING OF NEW COURT HOUSE AT ONCE.

The third day of the Court of Queen's Bench opened this morning at ten o'clock, Mr. Justice Lemieux presiding.

The first business was hearing the Grand Jury make its report. Through their foreman they reported true bill against Bennetts for having burglars tools in his possession and also with having explosives on his person.

The Queen vs. Bilodeau, offence, shop breaking and theft. True bill. The Queen vs. Lauzon, offence, wounding with intent to maim. True bill.

The Queen vs. Martel, offence, false pretences. No true bill. The report of the Grand Jury was read by the Clerk of the Court Mr. DeLottinville, and was as follows:

The grand jurors for the District of Saint Francis at the present term of the Court of Queen's Bench represent (1) That they tender their thanks to His Honor Mr. Justice Lemieux, the presiding Judge, for his clear and able charge and the Court officials for their courtesy.

(2) That they regret that a new Court House has not been built in Sherbrooke. The necessity for its construction becomes more apparent as the years roll by.

(3) They would inform the Court that they have visited the jail and find it in good order and condition. P. P. BALDWIN, Foreman, for self and fellow jurors.

His Honor then addressed the Grand Jury. He said that they had discharged their duties in a comparatively short time, with tact and ability.

His Honor rendered judgment on the motion presented to the Court on Monday by Mr. H. B. Brown, on behalf of the Peoples' Bank of Halifax to have the money taken from the Danville bank robbers and held by the High Constable, returned.

Mr. J. S. Broderick then moved that the prisoners, E. Lauzon, Bilodeau and Levin be arraigned. On the charges being read over to them they all tendered a plea of not guilty.

The case of Lauzon was fixed for to-morrow. The case of W. T. Roberts, charged with bringing stolen goods into Canada, was begun last evening and is proceeding this morning.

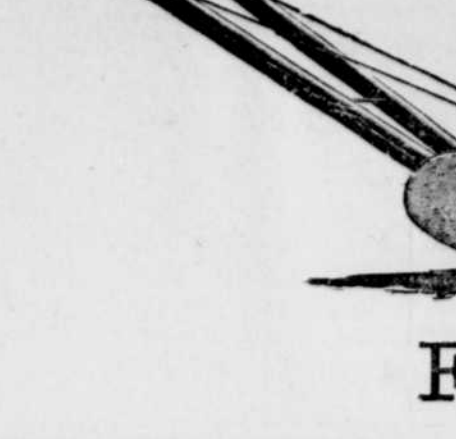
