OTTAWA, May 17.—Mgr. Merry Del Val is now in very poor health, which he says is largely due to his constant change of residence. The Ablegate stated that Toronto is a beautiful place and far surpasses any place he has visited while in Canada. He goes this week to Winnipeg, and on his return to the Capital will, if possible, arrange certain days for the receiving of visitors.

A JUDGE TO BE APPOINTED. OTTAWA, May 17.—It is reported that Mr. D. B. McLennan, C. of G., of Cornwall, is to be appointed to the Chancery Division of the Supreme Court of Ontario in place of Justice Ferguson, who is to be promoted to the Court of Appeals.

THE BEHRING SEA CASE. Hon. Fred Peters, counsel for Canada in the Behring Sea case, arrived in Ottawa on Monday. He is expected to return to the Capital and will lose no time in concluding Canada's reply to the American case, which will be presented at the forthcoming meeting of the arbitrators at Montreal in June. The verbal argument will probably take place at Halifax in August, which will take the proceedings of the tribunal.

THE ENGLISH LUMBER MARKET. The Boston & Weston Lumber Co. have sold their coming season's cut of lumber, fifteen million feet, to J. W. Todd, of Watson & Todd, of Liverpool, England. Mr. Todd says the lumber market in England is good, with every prospect of continuing so. Among other things he said the Queen's Jubilee would tend to improve the market in view of the immense amount consumed in the erection of temporary structures. They endorsed the clause which prohibits the publication of Sunday newspapers, the prohibition of canal traffic and pleasure excursions on Sunday, and also the keeping down of railway traffic on Sunday. The Premier said that he would certainly give his support to the first two clauses of the measure, but that he would not support the third, which comes up in the House, prohibiting Sunday newspapers and regulating that no canal shall be kept open during the hours of 8 a.m. and 10 p.m. on Sunday. Sir Oliver said he would go as far as his leader in the same direction if not further.

"A" BATTERY MEN FOR THE JUBILEE. Kingston, May 17.—Lieut. Colonel Drury has selected the "A" Battery, 4th Field Artillery, R.C.A., who will represent that corps on the Canadian Jubilee Battalion. The names are: Riding Instructor Gimblett, Sgt. Pierant, Sergt. Wanless, Corporal Benson and Br. Stamp.

SUNDAY CARS IN TORONTO. TORONTO, May 17.—The official returns of the election reduce the majority for the cars to 22. The election was held on Friday morning in Association Hall, 586 delegates reporting. A number more are expected and the various trains arriving in the city brought additional delegates, among them being F. B. Sargent, Grand Master of the Brotherhood of Railway Firemen. Nothing beyond routine work was done in the morning.

A SUGAR REFINERY SHUTS DOWN. HALIFAX, N.S., May 17.—The Nova Scotia refinery has been shut down for a few weeks. Before that announcement there was great speculation in sugar, creating a large demand and the refinery was pushed filling orders. The city is now in a state of demand because slack owing to the large stocks bought up previously, and the Nova Scotia refinery will close until those stocks have been reduced and a new demand sets in. The Woodside refinery will be kept running to fill orders.

IMMIGRATION AGENT DISMISSED. Edward Clay, who has been Government Immigration Agent at Halifax for some years, to-day received notice of his dismissal. The new official has not yet been announced.

A HALIFAX DISTILLERY SOLD. Mr. Lawrence A. Wilson, of Montreal, to-day purchased the plant of the McDonnell Distilling Company. The Halifex Distillery Company was capitalized at \$300,000. It is understood that it was sold at a bargain. Mr. Wilson's new company will, he says, be composed of a few Montreal capitalists with half a million capital.

A By-Law concerning the Supply of Water to Bove's Brewery.

Considering that by the Statute of this Province, 60 Victoria, chapter 88, the owner of the Brewery generally known under the name of Bove's Brewery, situated in St. Valier street, in St. Peter's Ward, of the City of Quebec, has been granted permission to lay and maintain a water pipe not exceeding four inches in diameter in the following streets: Grand, Prince Edward, crossing through St. Roch and St. Paul Streets, and Valiere street, in the City of Quebec, to the effect:

Considering that the said permission has been granted by the said law, subject to various conditions, among others, on condition that the works necessary for the laying of the said pipe shall be executed only with the consent of this Council, said consent to be signified by the execution of a By-Law to that effect.

Considering that it is expedient to thus render public the said consent in the manner prescribed by law.

It is in consequence of the above and enacted by the Council of the City of Quebec, do hereby enact the following:

1. The City of Quebec consents that the owner of the said Bove's Brewery shall lay a water pipe in Grand street, from the northern extremity of the said street to Prince Edward street, and in Prince Edward street, from the southern side of the track of the Canadian Pacific Railway, crossing St. Roch street, and then St. Paul street, to Valiere street, and in the said Valiere street to the said Bove's Brewery.

2. In the said streets the trenching for the laying of the said water pipe shall be executed on a line to be traced by the City Engineer and Inspector, or by the Manager of the Water Works of the City and under their supervision and their control.

3. When the excavations for laying or replacing or maintaining said pipe shall have been executed in the said streets, and afterwards filled in, the said trenching shall be the property of the said Bove's Brewery, and the City shall be the owner of the said pipe in as good condition as they were before the execution of the said works.
