NOTICE

TO UNITED STATES CITIZENS IN CANADA.

By the United States Military Service Convention Regulations, approved by the Governor-in-Council on 20th August, 1918, MALE CITIZENS OF THE UNITED STATES IN CANADA, WITHIN THE AGES for the time being SPECIFIED BY THE LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES prescribing compulsory military service, except those who have diplomatic exemption, ARE MADE SUBJECT AND LIABLE TO MILITARY SERVICE IN CANADA, AND BECOME ENTITLED TO EXEMPTION OR DISCHARGE THEREFROM, UNDER THE CANADIAN LAWS AND REGULATIONS. The regulations governing this liability are published in the Canada Gazette (Extra) of 21st August, 1918; copy whereof may be obtained upon application through the post to the Director of the Military Service Branch of the Department of Justice at Ottawa.

UNITED STATES CITIZENS of the description aforesaid who were IN CANADA ON 30th JULY, 1918, HAVE SIXTY DAYS FROM THAT DATE within which to EXERCISE AN OPTION TO ENLIST or enroll IN THE FORCES OF THE UNITED

STATES, or TO RETURN to the United States; and THOSE WHO for any reason SUBSEQUENTLY BECOME LIABLE TO MILITARY SERVICE IN CANADA HAVE THIRTY DAYS FROM THE DATE of the accruing OF SUCH LIABILITY within which to exercise the like option. It is stipulated by the Convention also that certificates of diplomatic exemption may be granted within the optional periods aforesaid. EVERY CITIZEN OF THE UNITED STATES TO WHOM THE REGULATIONS APPLY is required to REPORT TO THE REGISTRAR under the Military Service Act, 1917, FOR THE province or DISTRICT WITHIN WHICH he is, in the manner by the regulations prescribed, WITHIN TEN DAYS AFTER THE EXPIRY OF HIS OPTIONAL PERIOD and will be SUBJECT TO PENALTIES IF without reasonable excuse HE FAILS SO TO REPORT. For the information of those whom it may concern Sections 3 and 4 defining the requirements of registration, with which it will be necessary strictly to comply, are set out substantially as follows:—

REGULATIONS

3. EVERY MALE CITIZEN OF THE UNITED STATES WITHIN THE AGES for the time being SPECIFIED IN THE LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES prescribing compulsory military service, not including those who have diplomatic exemption, WITHIN TEN DAYS AFTER THE EXPIRY OF THE TIME LIMITED BY THE CONVENTION within which the Government of the United States may issue him a certificate of diplomatic exemption, SHALL TRULY REPORT TO THE REGISTRAR BY REGISTERED POST, and in writing which is plainly legible, his name in full, his occupation and the date of his birth; stating also whether he is single, married or a widower; and if the latter, whether he has a child living; also if married, the date of his marriage; and stating moreover his place of residence and usual post office address in Canada; and, if he reside within a city or place where the streets and dwellings are named and numbered, the name and number of his street and dwelling; or if he reside in another place, the lot and concession number, section, township, range, and meridian, or other definite description whereby his place of residence may be located, having regard to the custom of the locality in which he lives; and IF WITHOUT REASONABLE EXCUSE HE NEGLECT OR FAIL TO

REPORT IN THE MANNER and with the particulars aforesaid within the time limited as aforesaid, HE SHALL BE GUILTY OF AN OFFENCE, AND SHALL BE LIABLE UPON SUMMARY CONVICTION to a penalty not EXCEEDING FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS, AND TO IMPRISONMENT for any term not exceeding six months, and moreover he shall incur A PENALTY OF \$10.00 FOR EACH DAY after the time when or within which he should have registered during which he shall continue to be unregistered.

4. EVERY UNITED STATES CITIZEN WHO HAS DIPLOMATIC EXEMPTION, although not otherwise subject to these regulations SHALL WITHIN TEN DAYS after the granting of the same TRULY REPORT TO THE REGISTRAR, in like manner and with the same particulars as required by the last preceding section; and in addition he shall embody in his report a true and complete statement of the particulars of his certificate of diplomatic exemption. NEGLIGENCE OR FAILURE without reasonable excuse to comply with the requirements of this section SHALL CONSTITUTE AN OFFENCE PUNISHABLE IN THE MANNER AND BY THE PENALTIES provided in the last preceding section.

PUBLISHERS MUST STOP PAPER WASTE

FORECAST OF ORDER WHICH WILL BE DESIGNED TO SAVE NEWSPRINT.

An order has been issued in the United States calling upon newspapers to cut down their newsprint consumption from 10 to 15 per cent. Initiation of a similar order in Canada has been given. This will fall heaviest upon Sunday papers and large papers running over fifty columns of reading matter, but all papers will be required to use less paper and eliminate all waste. The provisions as forecasted include, among others:

Discontinuance of acceptance of return of unsold copies.

Discontinue sending paper after three months if subscription is not renewed.

Discontinue giving copies to anybody except office working copies.

Discontinue free copies to advertisers, except one copy for checking advs.

Discontinue all free exchanges with other papers, etc.

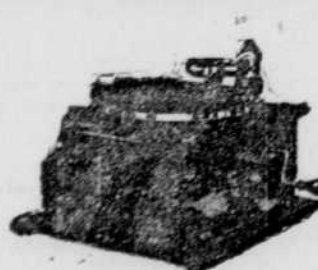
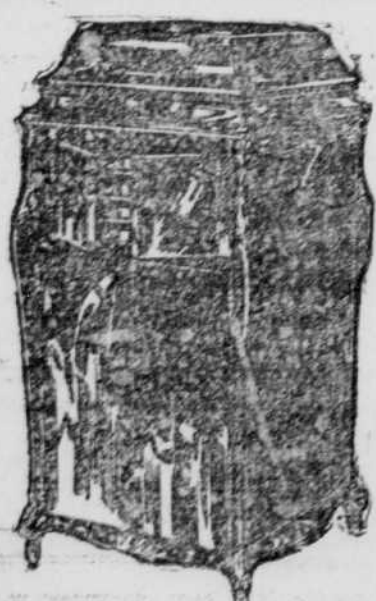

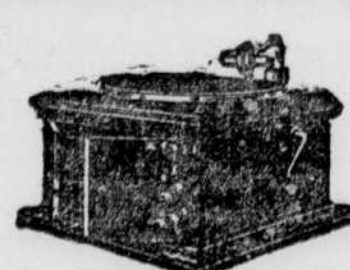

AUTOISTS FACED MANY CHARGES IN LOCAL COURT

Charges Were Laid Against Twenty Six Owners of Motor Cars—Man Who Broke Jail Sentenced to Three Months Hard Labor.

Automobilists played a very prominent role yesterday in the usual little drama which is staged almost daily before Judge Mulvena in the District Magistrate's Court, and as a consequence the sum of \$140 was added to the Government treasury. No less than twenty-six automobilists faced charges of violating various provisions of the Motor Vehicle Act, and of this total number fourteen paid \$10 and costs, six charges were dismissed, two cases suspended, two adjourned, and two withdrawn. The majority of the automobilists who contributed to the Government treasury, rather than through the trouble of appearing in court, settled their cases privately by paying the accustomed fine and costs.

The following is the list of those who contributed \$10 and costs, and the charges that were laid against them—Luderic Charest, Sherbrooke, only one lamp burning at night; Sydney Cloutier, Coaticook, for a fictitious number; W. G. Gagne, Sherbrooke, excessive speed; T. B. Mullins, Magog, excessive speed; Chas. A. Maguire, Sherbrooke, only one light burning; Antonio Latulippe, Victoriaville, one number only; W. H. Gillen, Barnston, excessive speed.

Six Cases Dismissed. The cases taken up against J. A. Barrette, Coaticook, for a fictitious number; H. W. Reynolds, Sherbrooke, only one lamp burning at night; J. O. Royer, Sherbrooke, only one lamp burning at night; Oscar Goulet, Lennoxville, using "cut out" and causing noise; Simeon Charland, Brompton, driving at excessive speed; and Archie L. Duke, Bingham, only one lamp burning at night, were all dismissed by Judge Mulvena.

The cases against Alonza Rand, only one light burning, and John C. Morrison, of Scottstown, for driving at excessive speed, were adjourned until the 25th inst., while the charges against Simeon Charland, Brompton, of only having one light burning at night, and only one number, and Napoleon Gosselin, of Brompton, for driving at excessive speed, were both withdrawn by Bissonnet and Oughtred, Provincial Revenue Collectors, who appeared against the accused in each instance.

Sentence was suspended in the cases of Joseph H. Genest, of this city, who was charged with being only one number, and of Chas. A. Maguire of Sherbrooke, who was charged with allowing a minor to drive his car.

Found Not Guilty. The charge laid against Norbert Foucault of having illicit possession of spirituous liquor, was dismissed. The accused pleaded not guilty of the charge laid against him by Bissonnet and Oughtred, Provincial Revenue Collectors, and after hearing the evidence submitted, Judge Mulvena ruled that it was by no means strong enough to warrant Foucault being found guilty.

Gets Three Months Hard Labor. Ansetine Ouellette, who four years ago made a successful get-away from the Sherbrooke jail after he had served but one day of his thirty days sentence for being drunk and disorderly, will have to serve the remainder of that sentence and also another sentence of three months at hard labor as a result of the judgment handed down by Judge Mulvena yesterday. It will be remembered that while assisting in making some repairs in the jail yard four years ago, Ouellette made a successful dash for liberty. He was only caught this week while enjoying his supper at a lunch cart on Depot Street.

SCHOOL STAFF HAVE SEEN ACTIVE SERVICE

Five Members of the New Staff of Lennoxville School Have Arrived Here from England.

Five members of the new staff of masters for Lennoxville School, formerly known as Bishop's College School, arrived in Canada from England early this week, and spent Tuesday and Wednesday in Sherbrooke with their families. They are now getting settled in their Lennoxville homes. All are graduates of well-known universities, and have not only brilliant records in their profession as teachers, but have served their country in the war.

The Rev. A. J. Agard, M.A., of Trinity College, Cambridge, was three years chaplain of one of the Expeditionary Forces from England.

Mr. P. Patterson Fox, B.A., enlisted with the first Expeditionary Force from Great Britain, and remained at the front until incapacitated for further service.

Mr. Arthur Sneath, B.A., of St. John's College, Cambridge, taught for some years in Cairo, Egypt, besides his English experience.

Mr. C. G. Roach, is a South African War veteran, and after the war went to Oxford as a Rhodes scholar from Natal. He fought in France until Vimy Ridge, when he was wounded.

Mr. G. B. Benson, B.A., of Trinity College, Dublin, enlisted in an Engineering Corps at Vancouver, where he was living at the time, early in 1915. He also was wounded at Vimy Ridge, and obliged to retire from active military life.

SHIP CONSTRUCTION

Canada Has Again Smashed All Records for Wooden Shipbuilding. This Time at Victoria, B. C.

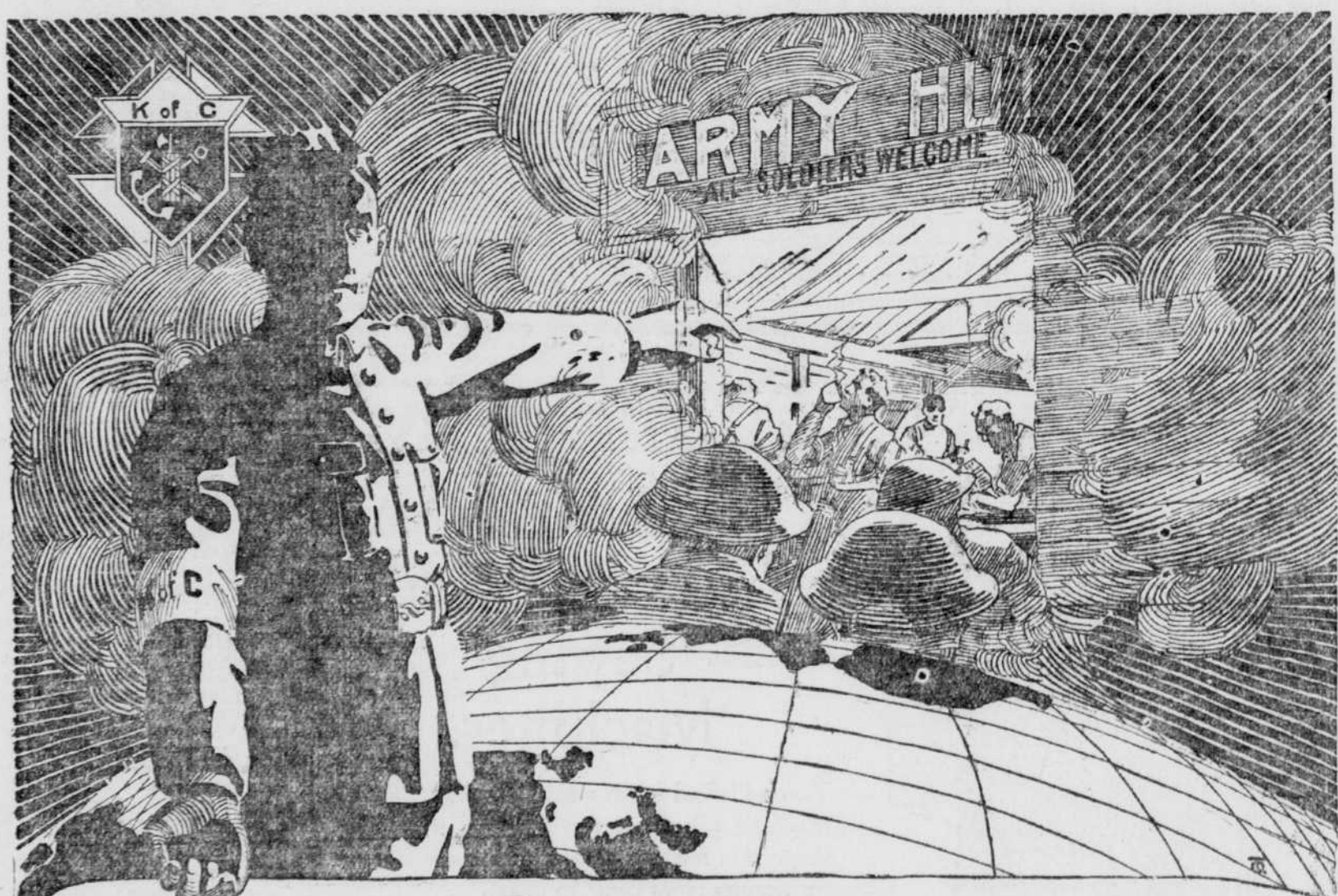

A LECTURE ON Christian Science

by
Charles I. Ohrenstein, C.S.B.

Member of the Board of Lectureship
of the Mother Church, the First
Church of Christ, Scientist,
in Boston, Mass.

Mr. William Clark in introducing Charles I. Ohrenstein, C.S.B., who gave a lecture last night in the Art Hall, on Christian Science under the auspices of the Christian Science Society of Sherbrooke, said in part: "Christian Science is a practical religion. On page 494 of the Christian Science Text Book Science and Health, with Key to the Scriptures, by Mary Baker Eddy, is found this assuring declaration: 'Divine Love always has met and always will meet every human need.'"

Christian Scientists are daily proving the truth of this statement. They know that Christianity is as practical now as it was when Jesus was on earth proving His words by His works, and in proportion to their understanding of the teachings of Christian Science they are able to follow the Master in the way of demonstration.

Mr. Clark will introduce the lecturer of the evening.

Charles I. Ohrenstein, C.S.B., Member of the Board of Lectureship of the Mother Church, the First Church of Christ, Scientist, Boston, Mass., then said:

Probably no idea has been taken possession of the human thought during recent years like that of the need of preparedness, safety, and efficiency; and certainly these factors are indispensable for achievement or success of any kind. Every activity is spurred by this idea. The home, the school, the playground, the factory, the office, all are aflame with it. Preparedness, safety, efficiency may be said to be inscribed upon the mental banner leading all endeavor.

Now, let us look over history, and find its best prepared, safest, most efficient character. Instantly, what name comes to the thought of all? Just one; the name of him who was indeed "armed and well prepared," armed with the sword that was the destruction of every ill, every hardship, every wrong—the sword of Truth that meant life, freedom, peace, to every living thing, peace in all trials, all circumstances, peace that still passes mere human understanding; the name of one who upon sea and land, in turmoil, storm, stress, in contact with depravity, contagion, sickness, calamity, death, demonstration of perfect safety and immunity; the name of one who assuaged all sorrows, healed all diseases, dispelled all sins, freed multitudes, stilled storms, raised the dying and the dead; the name of one whose one—to his enemies—seeming failure was but the forerunner of the crowning achievement of all efficiency—the achievement of the resurrection and ascension, the demonstration for all time of immortality. Would not all in sacred reverence breathe just this one name, the name Jesus of Nazareth, Jesus the Christ?

What gave Jesus the Christ this supreme preparedness, safety, efficiency? Was it mentality, spirituality, or was it materiality, corporeality? Was it not his Christianity, and was not this Christianity his demonstrable knowledge or Science, that is, Christian Science? Either it was such knowledge or Science or it was its opposite, ignorance, superstition, illusive belief. Let those who will take this view.

The preparedness, safety, efficiency of Jesus were the result of his demonstrable knowledge, the Science of being which constituted his Christianity. This Christianity was no mere ceremonialism or belief. It was the science of living and of living more abundantly; the science of health, of peace, of blessedness; the science that made Jesus the Saviour, reliver, redeemer; the science which he came to teach mankind. In words it was the understanding of God, the supreme power that is all good and always with us.

GOD
Must not we then in order to be Christians, to benefit by this Christianity, gain this understanding of God? Must not we ask who or what is this God of whom Jesus had such intimate, exact knowledge or Science? Going to this master law, this master Christian, what do we learn God is? Something different from what was in the beginning? Not at all.

It should be remembered that Jesus did not write; he spoke. He spoke to his own people, the common people, who heard him gladly; and he spoke in their tongue. The only instance preserved to us of what he said in that tongue is in the words which preceded his passing up to the "ghost," the mere semblance of life, which he said he could lay down and could take up again, as he later proved. These words, all will remember, were "Eloi, Eloi, lama sabachthani?" which are translated, "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" The word Eloi, which Jesus used, is the Old Testament Hebrew word for what in English is called God. It means strength, or power, meaning which is entirely devoid of anthropomorphism or corporeality. According to Jesus, then, God was his power, the power upon which he always relied, with which he accomplished everything. Nor did he leave us in the dark as to just what this power is. In speaking to his disciples he said, "Call no man your father upon the earth: for one is your Father, which is in heaven." In other words, there is only one creator or cause, and the universe in cluding man is its product, the product of Eloi, the one and only power.

Again, speaking to the woman at the well, Jesus said, "God is Spirit," which would certainly mean that his power, the only power he ever used, the true cause of all, and consequently the cause of only that which is true, was Spirit or Mind, not matter of any kind or physique. And looking at the teachings of Jesus, looking at his words and at his works—words and works due to, impelled by, emanating from this Eloi or power, Spirit, Mind, or intelligence—are we not bound to conclude that this power, Spirit, Mind, was infinite

Love, and that this divine Love was the very life of Jesus which nothing could destroy and which was able to raise him up at the last day? This one power then, this one Spirit, Soul, or Mind, this one existence or Life, this one reality or Truth, this one infinite Love, this divine Principle, was all that constituted the Saviour who is the same yesterday, today, and forever, "with whom is no variableness, neither shadow of turning," who is with us always. This is just what Christian Science defines God to be, as will be seen from the following passage: "God is incorporeal, divine, supreme, infinite Mind, Spirit, Soul, Principle, Life, Truth, Love" (Science and Health, p. 465).

MAN

Not only did Jesus illustrate, not only does Christian Science teach what God is, but in doing this Jesus illustrated and Christian Science teaches what man is.

Does not the Father want the son to be like himself, and does not a son want to be like his father? So true is this, that right in the beginning we read that "God created man in his own image, . . . male and female created he them." In other words, He created them just like Himself.

Now, how do we know what a man is like? Do we not know it by what he expresses? Was it not the manifestation, the expression of the power, the Mind, the Spirit, the Life, the Truth, the Love, which are altogether good, God that made Jesus the best prepared, the safest, the most efficient, the most able or powerful, the most godlike man that ever lived? Did it not make him so godlike that all Christendom has called him God, worshipped him as God? It has done this, too, notwithstanding the fact that Jesus rebuked the man for calling him, not God, but merely good, saying, "There is none good but one, that is, God." He did this because he recognized, as no one else ever has, that even all that he manifested of God did not begin to express, but only indicated the infinite good that is God. This is shown by the fact that he expected not only the emulation of his example by his followers, but more—"He that believeth on me, the works that I do shall he do also; and greater works than these shall he do; because I go unto my Father," because I illustrate the way, and show, as he again said, that "the Son can do nothing of himself, but what he seeth the Father do: for what things soever he doeth, these also doeth the Son likewise."

THIS TEACHING SCIENTIFIC

That this knowledge of God and of man, the knowledge that was taught, illustrated, and demonstrated by Jesus the Christ, is Christian, all will concede. But it may be asked, is it scientific?

This question can be answered, must be answered in one way alone,—that of demonstration or proof. It was so answered when Jesus did his marvelous works; it was so answered when his disciples or students repeated these works; it was so answered when for over two centuries after them their followers, the early Christians, did these works. It is in this way that for the past fifty years it has been answered and is now being answered. It was so answered when Mrs. Eddy, through the spiritual illumination to her of a Bible text,—through the coming to her of the right idea, the true meaning of this text,—was healed; it was so answered when she, through this true sense of the nature, the presence, and the power of God, healed others, and taught them to do likewise. It was so answered when her students, through the presentation of her teachings,—given to them in the Christian Science text-book, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures,"—reformed, healed, made the abundance of good manifest for others, and in turn taught them to do likewise. It was so answered when this reformed, healed, regenerated, saved multitude established churches and societies of Christ, Scientist, in every part of the habitable globe until it is safe to say that there is no one here who does not know of some one whose life, health, mode of thought, increased usefulness, and freedom from want and woe are due to God, due to this. It has been so answered, and is being so answered here by the fact that this lecture is given to make these facts known; for were it not that some few or many in this community were so benefited, this lecture would not, could not be given, for there would be no one here who would cause it to be given. There is, therefore, abundant proof that this Christianity is Science, demonstrable and demonstrated knowledge. Neither do thinking people deny this overwhelming proof. But the question still remains, How is this accomplished?

Unaccustomed as most people are to any expectancy or direct help from God, it may be said that even after the nature of God and of the true man is indicated there is still skepticism as to whether the benefits experienced by Jesus and his disciples were due to God, due to knowledge or Science of Him. For this reason those cured by Christian Science are assured that they would have got well anyway, or that they had nothing the matter with them. Again, the favorite explanation is given that the drugs which had been taken, perhaps for years and years, without doing any good, had just commenced to work, and so on. If, on the other hand, the case is one of reformation or improved fortune, the assurance is most promptly given that, in the one case, the change would have occurred anyway, and, in the other, that the individual's luck had changed. In other words, the vague religious beliefs that people have entertained, the vague notions they have had of God, and the wrong sense they have had of man, have made them discredit the idea that a genuine, applicable knowledge of God, or the Science of being, exists or can exist. Yet Jesus said that "with God all things are possible."

POSSIBLE TO WHOM?

All will concede that all things would be possible to one having sufficient life to one who could live long enough, and who possessed adequate intelligence, power, love, and opportunity for the accomplishment of them. All will concede that such an one would be thoroughly prepared, completely safe, and absolutely efficient. Adam, for example, if he had lived long enough, if he had known enough, and so on, could have accomplished any of the things that have been accomplished since. But he did not, and others have not. Experience consequently has convinced mankind that all are limited in every way,—limited as to life, and so in vitality, energy, endurance; limited in mentality, which means lack of perception, initiative, will; limited in power, as in capacity, energy, and ability; limited in love, consequently in devotion, incentive, impulse, endeavor, for it is love that is the incentive of all effort and of all achievement; limited in environment, which means opportunity for the employment of capacity, intelligence, will, and so on. Nor is it strange that these limitations are accepted as absolute, final; that they are solid convictions. Are not all taught, and do not all believe that everything is evolved from, is due to, or dependent on matter; that life is organic, physical, inherent in the body; that all the faculties also inhere in it; that intelligence is in the head or brain; strength, power, capacity, in muscles; love in the heart; that environment consists of a material world in which everything is again due to matter and not to God, the primordial essence or substance of all, in whom "we live, and move, and have our being?"

Yet, every little while some one accomplishes something which experience has shown to be impossible. What happens in such a case? A human need cries and cries until some one is awakened to the recognition of the fact that there is altogether enough, intelligence enough, love enough to meet it, and that the opportunity to do so is always at hand. It is not the believer in the disbeliever in present limitations. The transmission of the force of a Niagara by means of a wire, the transmission of messages, even of the human voice, over continents and oceans without wire, the utilization for flight of heavier-than-air machines, are sufficiently illustrative of this. Is not this all answer to prayer? Is it not all the result of appeal? Appeal to what? Appeal to the one only and last resort; appeal to the only power there is, intelligence, Mind.

MAN AND MANKIND

We have seen what was the power, the Life, the Mind, the whole reality or Truth, the Love that animated, enlightened, impelled, capacitated, and enabled the man Jesus. We have seen that it was omnipotence, omniscience, God, and that the expression of this made him the godlike and true man that he was.

We have also seen the kind of power, life, mind, spirit, truth, and love that are expressed or manifested by mankind or a kind of men. We have seen that this power, life, mind, spirit, truth, and love are all believed to inhere in the flesh, matter. Is not this true?

The man whom Jesus presented is spiritual and spiritually minded, the real man. The man that humanity insists upon as real, the kind that is really no man, is fleshly or carnally minded. Yet Christianity teaches that "to be carnally minded is death; but to be spiritually minded is life and peace. Because the carnal mind is enmity against God: for it is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can be. To be the one kind of man, then, is to be the son of God. To be the other kind of man is to be like those of whom Jesus spoke when he said, "Ye are of your father the devil," and the devil he called "a murderer," that which is destructive, and "a liar," that in which there is no truth.

All Christians have certainly called Jesus their pattern and their guide; and he spoke of himself as "the way, the truth, and the life." All Christians are also instructed, "Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus." If this teaching be correct, should not every Christian claim for himself and for others the spiritual power, intelligence, Life, Truth, and Love which constitute the one true good of all, or the one true God, infinite, eternal, indestructible, incapable of impairment, loss, or decay? And should not everyone claim a limited material power, mind, life, truth, love, subject to disease, decay and death? Can one be a Christian without claiming the former and disclaiming the latter?

THE BEGINNER.

Now let us take one who is learning to know this Christ-way, and beginning to walk in it. What effect has this upon him?

He has been believing, like every one else, that he is material, that with his life, health, strength, intelligence, and love all inside of him; that all that he is and all that he has is limited by heredity and environment. He knows it because he has been experiencing it. Of course he is unprepared for any emergency, feels unscientific, is inefficient. It is strange if he is discouraged, perhaps sick, dissipated. Now, the uneducated Christ, the spiritual idea of being, the Truth comes to such a one in Christian Science. He hears, and hears for the first time with this new meaning, that God is the only and all power; that God is all his God; that God is Life, Love, and that God who is all this, is all his God. If he admits this,—and slow or fast, if he ponders it, he is bound to admit it,—will not everything that is right become more and more possible to him, and will not everything that is wrong become less and less dominant over him, and finally impossible to him? Will he not at once be better prepared for every demand upon him, feel more safe, more efficient than before? If he has fallen, will this not uplift him; if he is sorrowful, will this not comfort him; if he is discouraged will this not encourage him; if he is sick, dissipated, will not this ease him until he feels him; if he has been a failure, cannot he with this Christian, this right idea of being rise to success? Let me say that in thousands of instances this has been demonstrated, and examples are not far to seek. The neighbors, friends, relatives of many of you can tell you their experiences, and I am sure you will find them corroborative of this. Neither should these experiences seem so strange after it has been indicated, as it has, what God is and what man's relationship to God is; and I am sure it does not seem so strange as it did that God should comfort the sorrowing, make the weak strong, heal the sick, yes, raise the dying and the dead. But perhaps it can be made still plainer.

HONESTY THE CHIEF REQUIREMENT.

You have all been taught to be

truthful and honest, I am sure. If the temptation came to any of you to tell an untruth, or to take something that does not belong to you, this education, not something inherent in your brain or anywhere in your body, would resist you, and you would not do so. I remember that as a little boy, whenever I touched anything not mine at table, my mother very quietly said, "Heis" meaning that taking things not mine would burn me. Throughout all the years that have gone by, when about to touch things not mine without permission, I have heard that word. Is it in my brain? No; it is in my education. We are the children, not of flesh and blood, but of our education; much of it, the most important part of it, not obtained in the schools, and it is our education that we constantly express, live out.

Now suppose that we not only learn the letter, but become imbued with the spirit of what has been said, and so learn the truth that the kind of God that has been indicated here, is the only God there is; that only he is man, male and female, who is like this God, the reflection or image and likeness of God; suppose when we have done this even in the smallest degree, we always ask of this very primary education, What belongs to us, any one of us, as the image and likeness of God? Could we not thus get correct answers? What, for instance, belongs to the reflection of power, infinite power? Do powerlessness, inability, incapacity? That belongs to the reflection of Mind? Do lack of purpose, lack of will, and ignorance of what we need to know? That belongs to the reflection of divine Spirit, infinite Truth, Love, Life? Do sensualism, untruthfulness, fear, distrust, aversion, hate, sickness, death? Would not the truth about what man is and what he has, be just the opposite of all such claims, and did not Jesus say, "Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free?"

Suppose that the likeness in a looking glass of any of us here was claimed to be unlike us, to lack something we possess, or to possess something we do not, would we not admit the claim? If we did, would we be truthful or honest? Would we not be claiming for it something that it did not possess, claiming a distortion rather than a reflection, a fraud and an imposition as our likeness? Can your image and likeness in the glass have something or take something that you do not have? Can man, then, the image and likeness of God, be different from God? Can he be unprepared for anything, unsafe, inefficient, helpless; can he take a cold, sickness of any kind, and die? Not unless God is and does these things. How truthful, how honest is one then who claims to be man, meaning man as man, and not as God, the image of God, and also claims to be, to do, and to have everything contrary to God? Is he then declaring the truth which alone makes free; is he obeying the commands "Thou shalt not bear false witness" and "Judge not according to the appearance, but judge righteous judgment?"

We all need assurance. All will agree that if God is the Principle, the basic reality of all, claims contrary to Him are not true. Yet these claims, the education of generations upon generations, crowd upon us, clamor for admission at every turn, upon every hand. They assure us at every impact, every contact, that there is danger; danger that we cannot, that we cannot ward off; that cold, heat, dry, wet, everything we breathe, drink, eat, touch, smell, feel, everything we undertake to do, is fraught with danger, danger that we have not sufficient intelligence or power to cope with; that all these things have power over us, not we the power over them. God and grave us and constantly gives us. We have plenty of assurance, our whole education is the assurance of struggle, of strife, of ultimate defeat, disaster, death.

How like "the gentle rain from heaven" dropping upon the dry earth beneath, comes the opposite assurance that "now are we the sons of God," even though this "doth not yet appear;" that as such we are the reflections of God; that because of this we now have just what God has, all that is good and nothing else; that now is all this available to us through being truthful, honest, through not bearing false witness, not claiming any not taking what does not belong to us as the sons and daughters of God, so heirs of God with Christ; by not entertaining, not appropriating in thought, not expressing in word or deed aught contrary to this new, this higher education.

THOUGHT PROCESSES.

If God is the all-enabling power, and God is Mind; the operation of this power must primarily be by way of ideas, thoughts. Who can strain it on out his finger or bend it without thought dictating the action? Who can bend it when thought dictates to hold it straight? Try it. Will the hand not do kind things under the impulse of love thoughts; will it not do cruel things under the impulse of contrary beliefs? Will it not do brave, powerful, steady, skilful, content things under the direction of confident, intelligent guidance, and trembling, weak, inefficient things under the impulse of fear? All have experienced this. Is it not a common saying that one is paralyzed with fear? Do not people die of fear? Does any part of the body not reach by thought, do anything or feel any way? If it does, how do you know it without thought?

The schools are beginning to recognize, and in some degree to acknowledge, that in Christian Science a light has come into the world, but they are not able to see that it is all light, and that in it is no darkness at all. Theology is beginning to teach an incorporeal God, but not one who is the Spirit that is all Love, too pure to behold iniquity, evil of any kind, to cause it or to permit it. The healing arts are beginning to teach that mind is at least in part cause, but without recognizing that Mind is God, good, so never the cause of disease and death, but always the cause of restoration, of health, and of life. They call that mind which is but false education, illusion, suggestion, the ultimate cause of sin, sickness, death. But the human beliefs that still obscure cannot forever hide the true light which shines, and shines unto a perfect day when all shall be illumined by it, and there shall be no darkness, ignorance, illusive suggestion, disease, fear, and so no sin, no disease, no death.

GOD'S THOUGHTS

"And the angel of his (God's) pres-

ence saved them," we read in Isaiah. We are also told that after Jesus had withstood being tempted by the devil, and all should now be able to see that the devil was just what Jesus called him—"a murderer," that which is destructive, and "a liar," that in which there is no truth,—angels came and ministered unto him? What does this mean? Does it mean that corporeal beings with wings healed the people spoken of in the Bible, and ministered unto Jesus?

In the Christian Science text-book, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mrs. Eddy, on page 581, we read: "Angels, God's thoughts passing to man; spiritual intuitions, pure and perfect; the inspiration of goodness, purity and immortality, counteracting all evil, sensuality, and mortality."

Cannot all see how such angels could and did indeed heal the children of Israel, how they could and did minister unto Jesus; how they can heal you and me and everyone, and minister to us all? Have not all of you entertained just such angels, time and time again, unawares? Have not pure, spiritual intuitions, inspirations of goodness, come to you and to all, and have they not been helpful to you? Where did they come from; from your brain, or from anyone's brain? They came from Mind, the Spirit, Mind, God, to inspire, to enlighten you, to bear you up, and to set you up on high. Have we all been inspired then? Of course we have. Have we always heeded these inspirations? That is the question. It is not uncommon to hear that some one is inspired by male or hate. Everyone is ready to credit this, but let some one be said to be inspired by God, who is infinite power, intelligence, Life, Truth, and Love, and derision and reviling are sure to be his lot. Is not everyone inspired with Life? If not, how then does anyone live? Are not all inspired by Mind, Truth, Love? If not, how do you express intelligence, how is it that you are truthful, kind, loving? Does this surprise you? Then let me say that you were inspired before you ever breathed or saw the light of day, and that inspiration is the one essential of existence.

Everyone is most particular as to the air he breathes. No one without absolute necessity would for a moment breathe foul air. Everyone is most particular as to the food he eats, what raiment he puts on, and so forth. How much more particular should all be as to what they are inspired by; for whether the thought that comes to us be good or bad, it is one that comes to us, not one that originates with us, and sooner or later we are bound to express it. It is pure, beautiful, good, true, the thought of health, of life, of immortality, of courage, and of love for all? If so, it comes from the one true source. Bid it welcome; let it abide with you, entertain it, make it your honored guest. It comes from God and is the word of God, an angelic visitant, sent as of old to heal, to minister, to save. Is that which clamors for admission a base, sinister, degraded thought, a thought of want, discouragement, hate, fear, anger, sickness, death? Then bar it out, for it will express itself, bear fruit after its kind. How bar it, say you? By recalling and recalling the thoughts, the angels of God and of His Christ, the truths taught in the Bible by Jesus, emphasized, illumined, and made practical by Christian Science, until these shall be an angelic legion round about you to guide you, guard you, and have charge over you.

How often do we hear the question, How can I help what I think? and

the assertion, No one can help what he thinks. We not only can help what we think, but in order to do better, feel better, be better, we must help what we think, for as a man thinketh in his heart, so is he," and the way that has been indicated, the way that Christian Science teaches, is the only way in which this help can come; the only way under heaven in which men can be saved here, now, anywhere, everywhere, from ills of any and of every kind. It is the only way in which one and all, irrespective of time, place, vocation, circumstances can be truly armed and prepared, can have absolute safety and complete efficiency.

A WORD ABOUT THE DISCOVERER AND FOUNDER

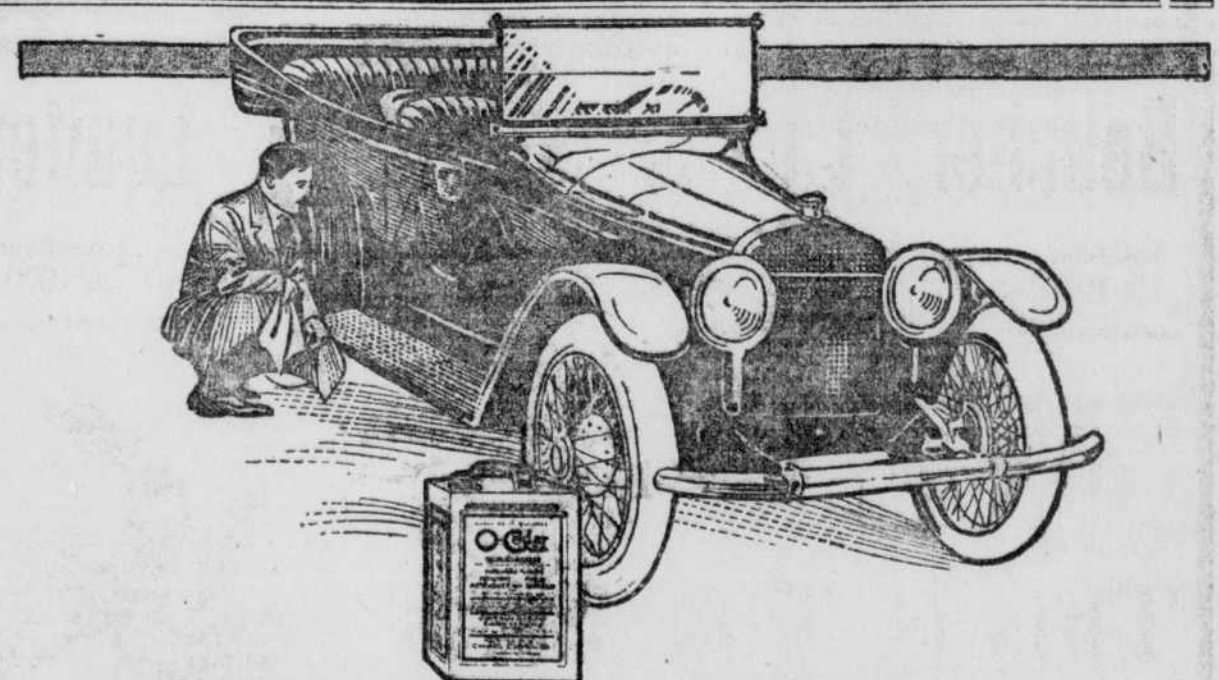

POINTERS ON STORING OF VEGETABLES

While vegetables have been harvested continuously in many gardens in Canada since radishes and spinach were ready for use in early spring, the time has come when the bulk of the crop must be gathered to escape hard frosts.

As beans discolour and mould very readily, it is important to dry them as soon as possible, and to keep them dry. They should be spread out thinly under cover, and turned every two or three days until quite dry. If it is necessary to harvest the plants before they are thoroughly ripe they can be hung up outside until dry, to ripen better than by exposing them to the sun. Even if put into closed boxes without wrapping each specimen, they ripen well.

Frequently cauliflowers are just beginning to head when it becomes necessary to harvest them owing to severe frosts. If the plants are pulled and replanted in boxes in the cellar,

and kept watered, they will go on developing, and one can have cauliflowers for some weeks. Brussels sprouts can also be replanted in this way. Both of these vegetables may, however, be left in the ground for some weeks yet.

If cabbage begin to split and it is not yet time to harvest them, the splitting will be prevented to some extent by twisting the plants so as to loosen them. This checks the flow of sap into the head. If the cellar is warm and dry, and the cabbage have to be harvested owing to the frost, they will keep well for a time outside if covered with leaves.

Where the accommodation is poor, celery may be kept well outside in the soil well into the winter by opening a trench, preferably a narrow one 15 or 16 inches wide, and deep enough so that the tops of the celery will come about level with the surface of the ground. The celery plants are put close together in it, and before there are severe frosts, a thin layer of straw or leaves is put over the top. When the cold weather comes a heavier covering of leaves may be put over, if it is desirable to leave the celery longer, and then twelve to fifteen inches of soil over that. By putting sufficient leaves or straw over the soil again, frost may be kept out, and the celery dug out as required.

In harvesting potatoes, any which show signs of decay should be kept separate from the rest and used first, thus helping to avoid development of rot when stored. Potatoes should be dry when they are stored.

Keep onions dry, spread thinly. Squashes, pumpkins and citrons should be kept in a moderately warm, not a cool, place.

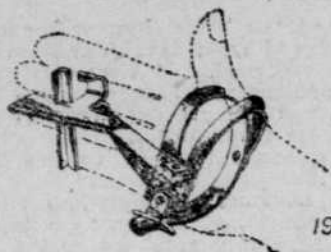

HEADS GRAIN.

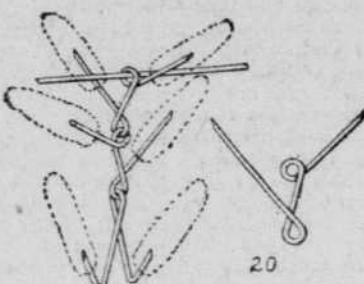
This hand scissors or grain knife is used in heading grain. It is operated by opening and closing the hand, and

FOR DRYING SEED CORN.

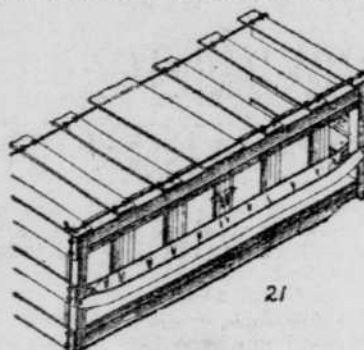
The ears of seed corn held by this hanger dry quickly because they are well exposed to the air. Each section

CULTIVATE TO KEEP WEEDS IN CHECK

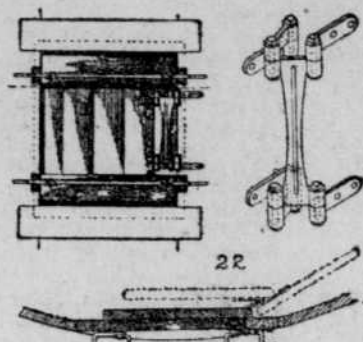
Ploughing of Land in Fall Will
Expose Root Stalks to Frost and
Help in Killing Them Outright.

The ploughing of the land in the fall is desirable as a part of the regular work of the farm, since it enables the ground to be got into proper condition for sowing the seed in spring considerably earlier than would otherwise be the case. But it is perhaps of even greater importance as a means of keeping weeds in check. In case of perennial weeds the mere turning up and exposing of the rootstocks to the action of the frost will serve as a considerable check to the weeds in cases where they are not killed outright. Where it is desirable to collect and burn creeping rootstocks this can be more readily accomplished where the ground has been pulverized by the frost and snow of winter.

In the case of annual weeds, these are of two classes from the point of view of their life history. One group requires a resting period before the seeds will germinate, and this holds good even if the conditions with regard to moisture and temperature are suitable. These normally germinate in the spring of the following year after they are shed, but in many species the germination can be delayed for several years if the seeds are buried to a considerable depth in the soil. This is true of such species as Wild Oats and Wild Mustard. Each time the surface of the ground is disturbed some of these buried seeds will germinate, and if no other seeds are allowed to fall into the soil in the meantime,

SILO HINGE.

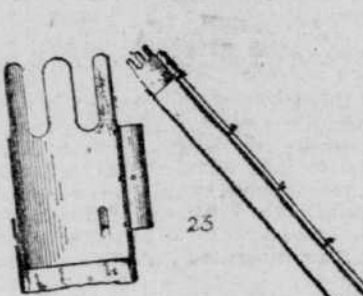
The advantages claimed for this hinge are first, that it is strong and does not permit the door to sag; second, it is outside and therefore is

FRUIT PICKER.

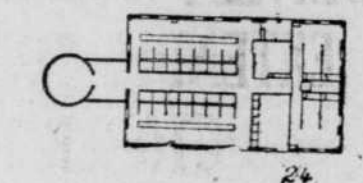
The top piece or crown of this fruit picker is made of sheet metal and the chute is made of cloth. The fruit, separated by the crown, is



checked in its fall by the hand of the operator grasping the chute, and is then dropped gently into the basket.—(Fred J. Slenker, Springfield, Ill. U.S. Patent 1,242,059.)

the ground will eventually become clear of them.

In another group of annual species known as winter annuals, the seeds germinate immediately after they are scattered and pass the winter in the form of a small seedling plant which survives winter under the snow and resumes growth in the following spring. Belonging to this group are the following weeds: Chess, Purple Cockle, Night-flowering Catchfly, Stinkweed, Shepherd's Purse, False Flax, Ball Mustard, Wild Radish, Hare's Ear Mustard, Tumbling Mustard, Peppergrass, Wormseed Mustard, Corn Crowweed, Blue Bur or Stickweed, and Stinking Mayweed. It is in the case of these weeds that autumn cultivation is especially desirable as if they are turned under with the plow and covered sufficiently deeply, very few of them will be able to continue their growth after the snow melts.

MEMBERS OF SYNOD WELCOME GOV. GENERAL

In Reply to Address Presented by
Primate His Excellency Expressed
Confidence in Ultimate Success
of the Allies.

TORONTO, Sept. 19.—In their joint session this morning the General Synod of the Church of England in Canada welcomed His Excellency the Governor-General, and an address was read by the Primate, Archbishop S. F. Mathieson, on behalf of the Synod. In his reply, the Governor-General referred to the work the Synod was engaged on and the great problems which it would be called upon to solve. Confidence in the ultimate success of the Allies in the war was expressed by His Excellency, who also declared that when peace was finally declared a foundation for a lasting peace would have to be laid.

The address of welcome was presented by the Primate, embodied assurance the Synod's whole-hearted and unswerving loyalty to His Majesty the King and of their earnest prayers for unity.

The address also stated that the visit of the Governor-General would encourage the clergy in their work on the great problems before them at the present time.

GERMAN ARMY HAD LOOT CORPS

Sacking of Private Houses and
Public Buildings in Regions from
Which Enemy Has Been Driven
Carried Out With Thoroughness.

WITH THE FRENCH ARMY IN FRANCE, Sept. 19.—Efforts to organize pillaging by the German army and the transportation of loot appear, from official documents and verified incidents, to have been much more effective than the work of carrying out the removal of legitimate war booty during this summer's operations.

The sacking of private houses and public buildings throughout the regions from which the Germans have

been driven has been done with characteristic German thoroughness by specifically detailed squads. Advancing French armies have found intact on the plateaus in the region of Soissons and elsewhere important dumps of munitions which the French had been obliged to abandon in their retreat of last spring.

An order, signed by General von Morwitz, and dated May 28, was found in the pocket of a prisoner. After condemning in severe terms disorganized looting operations by soldiers for their personal account, this document calls attention to the rules established for organized pillaging and sacks that the men of the "loot detachment" bearing white arm badges and special identification cards have the same powers as military police. It adds:

"The chief of these detachments will confiscate estates and drinkables as well as objects of current use that are collected, and keep guard over them until the arrival of the exploitation group."

Quartermasters are authorized by this document to apply to the use of their units a proportionate quantity of booty suitable for immediate consumption and to send the rest to the rear.

FIFTY-EIGHT MISSING FROM TORPEDOED SHIP LONDON, September 20.—A British armed boarding steamer was torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine on September 12, the British Admiralty announced yesterday. Fifty-eight members of the crew are missing.

PEACE MEETINGS IN GERMANY

Thousands Attend Demonstrations in Essen, Cologne and Saxon Towns.

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 20.—Peace demonstrations, organized by the Social Democrats, were held yesterday at Essen and Cologne and in a large number of towns in Saxony, according to a despatch from Cologne to the Dutch newspapers. Thousands of persons are said to have attended the meetings.

Konstantin Fehrenbach, president of the German Reichstag, declared in a recent interview that it was not impossible to hope for an armistice before winter, "despite the enemy's bellicose shouting." The interview was printed in the Rheinisch Westphalian Gazette of Essen.

ENRAGED OVER WILSON'S REPLY

German Press from the Socialist to the Conservative Bitter—Take It that Allies Would Destroy Germany.

COPENHAGEN, Sept. 20.—The German press generally, from the Socialist to the Conservative, regards the American answer to the Austrian peace note, taken in connection with the speech of Foreign Secretary Balfour, as a final proof that the Allies, so the newspapers charge, seek to complete the destruction of the Central Powers and their peoples and the dismemberment of their territory.

The Socialist Vorwarts of Berlin is bitter and pessimistic. It declares that the American answer and the utterances of Secretary Balfour compel the conclusion that the Entente will not hear of a peace by agreement.

HARVEST LEAVE EXTENDED TO OCTOBER 31

Militia Department Has Issued Statement in Connection With the Extension of Time.

(Canadian Press Despatch) OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 20.—The Militia Department has issued the following statement in reference to harvest leave:

Instructions were issued by telegram from Militia Headquarters to all military districts on the 14th inst. October 31st to all men in category "A," "B" and "C" who were actually working on farms and required for the purpose of saving the crops, subject to immediate recall should necessity arise. District Commanders were by the same wire ordered to deal with all cases so as to avoid unnecessary travel and expense. Supplemental instructions were also forwarded to district commanders to notify all men concerned by letter or telegram as circumstances might require in order that it should not be necessary for men to return to their unit headquarters to obtain extension of leave. This extension of leave of absence applied to all men to whom leave had been given to permit them to work on farms whether such leave was granted by Commanding Officers or leave of absence boards. Any man by whom notification has not been received should communicate at once with his commanding officer.

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FORCES LED BY GERMANS DEFEATED IN NORTHERN RUSSIA (Canadian Press Despatch) LONDON, Sept. 20.—In Northern Russia Karelin troops severely defeated forces led by German officers at Ukhtinskaya, says an official statement issued by the War Office today. The battle took place Wednesday.

MR. WILLIAM FARWELL 53 YEARS OLD. Mr. William Farwell, one of the oldest and best known citizens of Sherbrooke, is celebrating today his eighty-third birthday, with a quiet family gathering at his home on Dufferin Avenue.

Mr. Farwell who has spent almost his entire life in this city, has hosts of friends who join in congratulatory remarks, and wish him many more years of peace and happiness.

STEADY THRUSTS BY BRITISH ON ST. QUENTIN

(Associated Press Despatch) WITH THE BRITISH FORCES IN FRANCE, Sept. 20.—Steady thrusts made by the victorious British divisions on the battlefield northwest of St. Quentin gave them additional ground during the night. No heavy attacks were made, but the obstinate German machine gunners yielded a number of prisoners and the exhausted enemy forces sheltered in the Hindenburg main defences were given no rest.

On the right near the junction of the allied armies English and Scottish troops completed the clearance of Holnon village and the nests and redoubts adjoining which had given considerable trouble to the French.

The British troops swept the cemetery at Fresnoy free of machine guns. Fresnoy, a village one mile east of Griencourt, which had been strongly defended by reason of the network of old British trenches was kept under the destructive fire during the night.

The Australians lying north of Fresnoy continued their exploration of the Hindenburg outpost system which they had stormed along the front of their first and fourth divisions.

The recapture of Moeuvres last night completely restores the British line in that section of the Canal Du Nord. The Germans fought very hard for the village. Moeuvres is a solid mass of trenches, and dug-outs covering a square mile of ground. It is a junction of the main and support Hindenburg line and the most difficult obstacle which the British have encountered anywhere in the defensive system. The enemy regards it as the key to the position north of Havrincourt.

Few prisoners were taken. In addition to the guns already reported captured the British have taken two four inch howitzers abandoned by the Germans on Thursday, and two field guns left behind yesterday afternoon.

MUD IMPEDES OPERATIONS OF AMERICANS

(Associated Press Despatch) WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY, IN LORRAINE, Sept. 20.—(11 a.m.)—Continued rain, which transformed everything at the front into a bog, making troop movements difficult, and transport almost impossible, slowed down the activities today. There was scarcely a movement on the ground, not even a patrol operation being recorded.

The aerial activity continued despite the unfavorable weather, although in lessened degree. Some patrols scouted over the enemy lines in the rain.

HUN TRIBUTE TO EFFECTIVE USE OF TANKS

(Associated Press Despatch) WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY, ON THE LORRAINE FRONT, Sept. 20.—A tribute to the effectiveness of the tanks is contained in a German document found in the recovered territory north of St. Mihiel. It referred apparently to the defeat by the British when they advanced on the Hindenburg line before Cambrai. The document says:

The defeat of the second army, according to the report of officers sent by General Headquarters to the combat zone, may be imputed to the following reasons:

"First, that the troops allowed themselves to be surprised by an attack of tanks en-masse and in particular, they lost all cohesion when they were suddenly confronted by tanks coming from behind them; second that in the advance combat zone, as well as in the villages in sectors in the rear, there existed an indefinite position or organization."

STEADY ADVANCE BY SERBIANS (Canadian Press Despatch) LONDON, Sept. 20.—In Macedonia the Serbians have extended their front westward to the Cerna River and it is now 25 miles wide. The total depth of the advance is 15 to 17 miles.

Five thousand prisoners and eighty guns have been captured.

NO JOINT REPLY TO AUSTRIA (Canadian Press Despatch) LONDON, Sept. 20.—The Austrian note inviting the belligerents to a conference not being a collective one, but addressed to each government separately, it is regarded as unlikely that any joint reply on the part of the Allies will be forthcoming. Moreover, it is pointed out, the attitude of the various Entente Powers has been made sufficiently clear by responsible ministers for the European countries, as has that of the United States, by President Wilson.

U. S. LABOR IS WITH ALLIES 100 PER CENT

Mr. Gompers Says No Labor Party in Allied Countries Had Rejected Wilson's Proposals—M. Kerensky Reviews Russian Situation.

LONDON, Sept. 20.—At the Inter-Allied Labor Conference yesterday, Mr. Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, replying to a criticism of Mr. James Ramsay MacDonald, former chairman of the Labor Party, regarding the conference endorsing President Wilson's fourteen points for world-wide peace, declared that not one labor party in the Allied countries had rejected the President's points.

"American labor is behind our Government one hundred per cent., and behind the Allies whatever may be," Mr. Gompers added.

Continuing, Mr. Gompers declared he did not approve the declaration in the committee's report referring to the United States as the only ally which had stated its war aims with clarity. He thought this was an unwarranted criticism of Great Britain, but as the British Labor delegates had not objected to such inference, it was not for him to protest. He favored acceptance of the report, not because he agreed with its construction, but because he considered it the best obtainable from the conference.

The conference was engaged in a discussion of the resolution denouncing Allied intervention in Russia, when M. Kerensky, former Russian Premier, was invited to a seat.

LONDON, Sept. 20.—The War Aims Committee of the Inter-Allied Conference presented to the conference this morning a report recommending that the conference call upon the Government of the Allies to adopt President Wilson's fourteen points in a joint declaration of allied policy.

M. Kerensky said he was not speaking as a partisan or a socialist, but as a Russian making known public opinion in his country. He asserted that Russia had not left the alliance of the Entente, and said he offered once more his testimony that Russia never had recognized the peace of Brest-Litovsk and had never ceased to struggle against Germany.

The former Premier described Russia's sacrifices for the Allied cause. He declared that Russia at one time stood between Europe and collapse, when Great Britain was preparing the efforts of the Russian revolutionaries had allowed the United States time to get ready. The basis of the Allied victory had been watered in Russian blood. Russia had never yet found itself in a state of peace with Germany.

M. Kerensky said the Allies intervened in Russia in response to the call from organizations which represented the real interests of Russia and who were opposed to the Bolshevik terror. He denied that these persons supporting intervention in his country are bourgeois, and said that the bourgeoisie were running a race with the Bolsheviks for German favor. The passage of a resolution condemning intervention in Russia by the Allies could only favor Germany. The only danger of intervention, he added, was the tendency to aid certain private organizations and interests.

M. Kerensky declared that the Allies should give up every relation with private persons or organizations and act with the organized Government in Siberia to end the whole trouble and bring about the regeneration of the whole country in accordance with the plans of the union for the regeneration of Russia.

M. Kerensky said the old Constituent Assembly were meeting secretly in Russia and attempting to create a government for the whole of Russia.

BELGIUM WILL NOT CONSIDER PEACE APPROACH

Foreign Minister Says Germany's Proposals Cannot Be Taken as Basis for Any Serious Discussion.

(Associated Press Despatch)
LONDON, Sept. 20.—The Belgian Foreign Minister, in discussing Germany's "peace approach" to Belgium, declares that the conditions cannot be taken as a basis for any serious discussion.

From the details furnished by the Foreign Minister, it appears that Belgium received no formal proposition directly from the German Government, but that communications came by an indirect channel.

They showed that it was Germany's intention to demand that Belgium bind itself to effect a solution of the language question in conformity with the German imperial policy, which Belgium would regard as an abdication of the right inherent in her sovereignty to solve internal problems in accordance with the freely expressed will of the Belgian people.

Germany would also claim full amnesty for Belgian citizens guilty of helping the enemy's plans, and would thereby, according to the Minister, impose on the Belgian Government an act of submission.

Germany would insist on the maintenance after the war of the commercial treaties previously in force. This, following up the destruction of Belgium's industries by the invader, says the Minister, would insure Germany's economic grip on the country. Moreover, he adds, the pawn theory is not abandoned. Germany would insist upon binding the fate of Belgium with the solution of the colonial question.

Finally, the obligation resting on Germany to repair the damage unjustly inflicted on its victim was not even alluded to. Germany, the Minister points out, would thus be enriched by the pillage of Belgium, whose ruin would be complete.

These indirect approaches made no reference to the eventual suspension of hostilities between Belgium and Germany, nor to the evacuation of Belgian territory.

The Foreign Minister concludes: "The conditions thus set forth overshadow and render sterile the independence of Belgium. They cannot be taken as a basis for any serious discussion. The Belgian Government formulated its programme in its note to the Pope on December 24 last, and published in January, as all the Allied Governments know, is firmly resolved to maintain it undiminished."

EFFORT TO KEEP ALLIED WAR AIMS FROM GERMANS

Order of General Von Hutier Which Has Fallen Into Hands of Americans Shows Attitude of High Command.

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY, ON THE LORRAINE FRONT, Sept. 20.—Efforts made by the High German Command to counter-act the effect of the Allies' endeavors to express their war aims to the German people are evidenced in an order from General Von Hutier, which has fallen into the hands of the Americans. The order, which attacks Lord Northcliffe, follows:

"The enemy begins to realize that we cannot be crushed by his blockade, his superiority in numbers and his force of arms. He, therefore, is trying by trickery and underhanded methods, of which he is past master, to induce in the minds of the German people doubts of their invincibility. He has founded for this purpose a special ministry for the destruction of German confidence. At the head of this ministry he has put the most rough-going rascal of all the Entente, Lord Northcliffe, who has ever been given billions for influencing opinion in Germany and at the front by means of paid agents, assassination of ambassadors, and in all other ways in favor of the Entente methods.

"Aviators are constantly distributing increasing numbers of leaflets and pamphlets. Letters written by German prisoners are falsified in the most outrageous way. Tracts and pamphlets are written to which names of German poets, writers and statesmen are forged. These come from the Northcliffe press, which is working night and day for this sole purpose. His whole thought and aim is to place these forgeries in the hands of the German people.

GERMAN PEACE ASPIRATIONS ARE EXPLAINED

Saxon Foreign Minister Says They are Due to Fear of Collapse of European Kultur.

(Canadian Press Despatch)
AMSTERDAM, Sept. 20.—Speaking at a banquet given by the town council of Leipzig, in honor of Swiss guests, Saxon Foreign Minister D'Eckstadt, spoke of the German peace aspiration as follows:

"The reason for our readiness for peace is not a consciousness of weakness, but a sober recognition of the fact that endless prolongation of the war must lead to a collapse of European kultur. No pan-German politician, let alone any German statesman, has ever revealed in any speech such wild aims of destruction as the official leaders of our enemies have done since the outbreak of the war and are doing today."

PARIS, Sept. 19.—A new loan bill was passed by the Chamber of deputies today by a vote of 382 to 6. The amount of the loan is unlimited. It is at four per cent and runs for 25 years. The Senate later passed the measure by a vote of 220 to 1.

AUSTRIAN OFFER FOR CONFERENCE IS STILL OPEN

Official Statement Issued in Vienna Says Allies Advance Rash Conclusions as to Attitude of Central Powers and Peace.

(Canadian Press Despatch)
AMSTERDAM, Sept. 20.—Despite the apparent rejection of the Austro-Hungarian proposal for a conference of the belligerents to discuss the possibility of peace, that Government's offer is still open, says an official statement received from Vienna today. The statement reads:

"From reports received from abroad, the rejection of the Austro-Hungarian Government's suggestion that a preliminary discussion of the peace question be entered into can hardly be longer doubted.

"The official reply to Foreign Minister Burian's note has not yet been received, and therefore the reason which prompted the attitude of the Entente Governments cannot be discussed at present. Only from Secretary Balfour is an exhaustive discussion of our suggestion available. His arguments show how correctly Baron Burian's proposal judged the situation and that only the adoption of Baron Burian's line of thinking could master the confusion of mind prevailing everywhere until today.

"The peace question as discussed by Secretary Balfour—and the same applies to the debates in the French and American Senates—under the pressure of big catchwords and overmastering passion, can naturally make no favorable progress. Especially regarding Mr. Balfour's speech it must be pointed out that it contains a series of rash conclusions concerning the attitude of the Central Powers toward concrete peace questions, which he could not have arrived at had he entered into a discussion in the spirit of Baron Burian's proposal.

EVIDENCE OF DEBILITY OF ENEMY FORCES

Intelligence Officers of the Allied Forces Estimate that Germans Have Total of 230 Divisions in Field.

(Associated Press Despatch)
ON THE LORRAINE FRONT, Sept. 20.—Further evidence of the debility of the German military machine is shown in a summary of information gathered by the intelligence officers of the allied forces. There are now eighty-seven divisions in reserve, not counting three Austrian divisions in the vicinity of Metz. Of these, thirteen are regarded as fit for an immediate offensive, having had more than a month's rest. The total of German divisions is approximately 230; the average strength of a division is now ten thousand.

ALLIED OFFICERS JOIN THE CZECHO-SLOVAK FORCES

(Associated Press Despatch)
OLOVANNY, Trans-Balkania, Sept. 11.—Allied officers were received here today by General Gaido, the commander of the Czech-Slovak forces fighting on the Volga, who arrived from the west last week.

In company with General Dietrich, the anti-Bolshevik leader in Eastern Siberia, General Gaido gave the Allies a cordial greeting, and asked that telegrams of warmest appreciation be sent to the Japanese minister of war, chief of general staff, and the commander of the troops sent to Vladivostok.

THIRTY PEOPLE KILLED IN WRECK

Two Trains Collided on French Railway Between Dijon and Daroché—Many of Victims Were Children.

PARIS, Sept. 20.—(Havas)—Thirty people were killed and more than a score injured in a collision between Dijon and Daroché yesterday. Three cars, filled with passengers, who were mostly children, returning from their vacations were telescoped. The soldiers lent vigorous assistance in taking out the bodies and transporting the injured in ambulances to a cantonment near the scene of the accident.
