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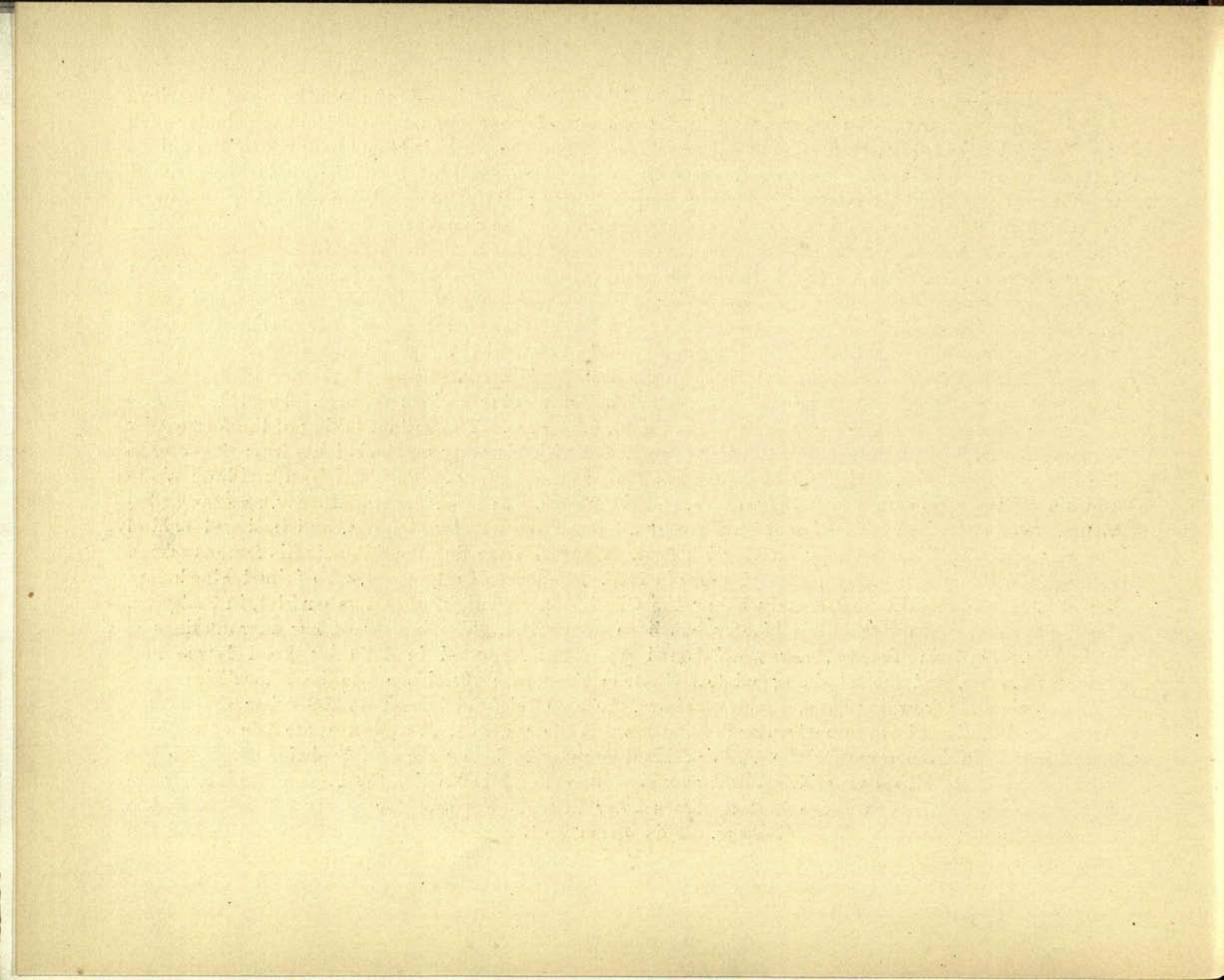
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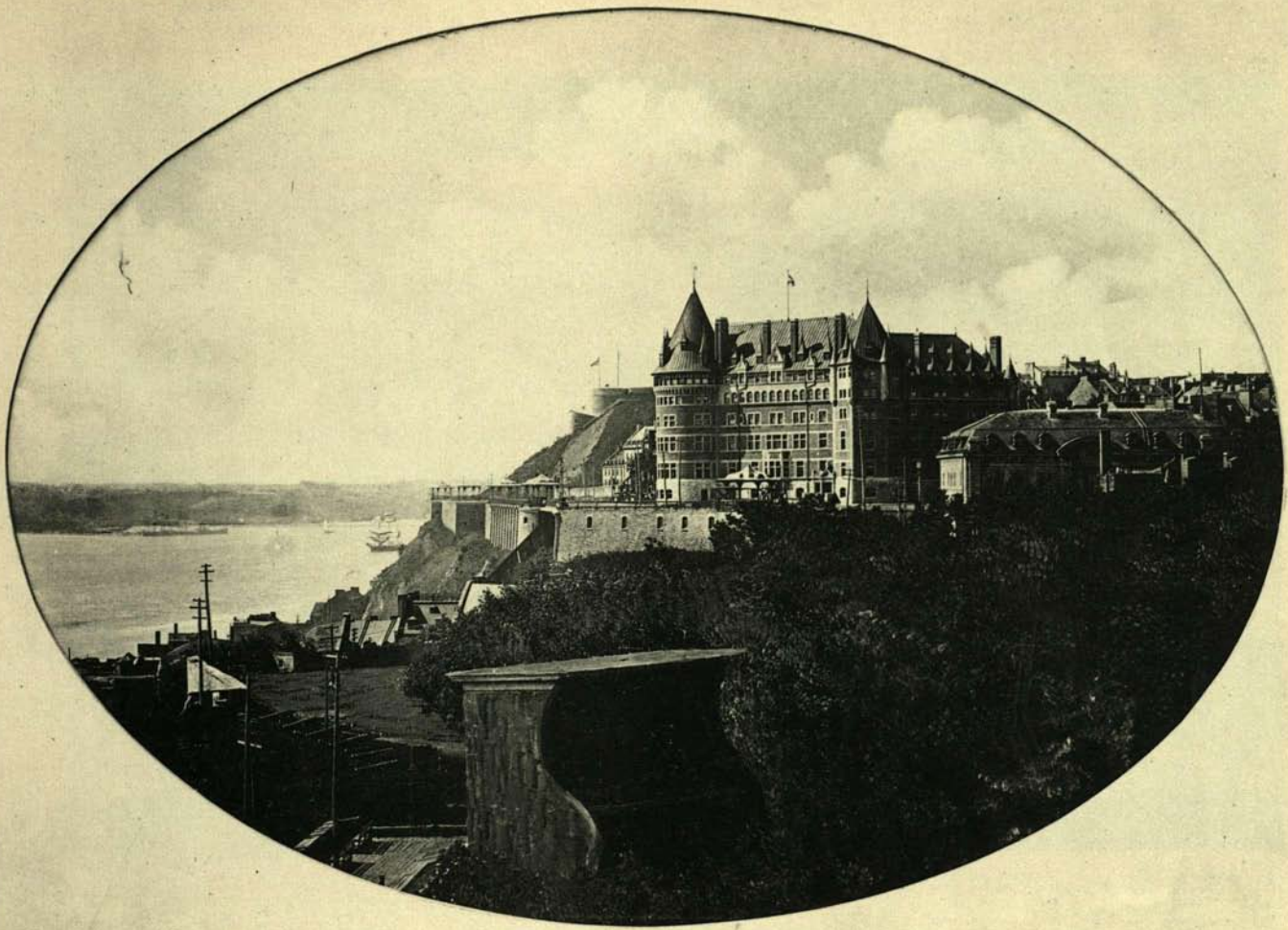
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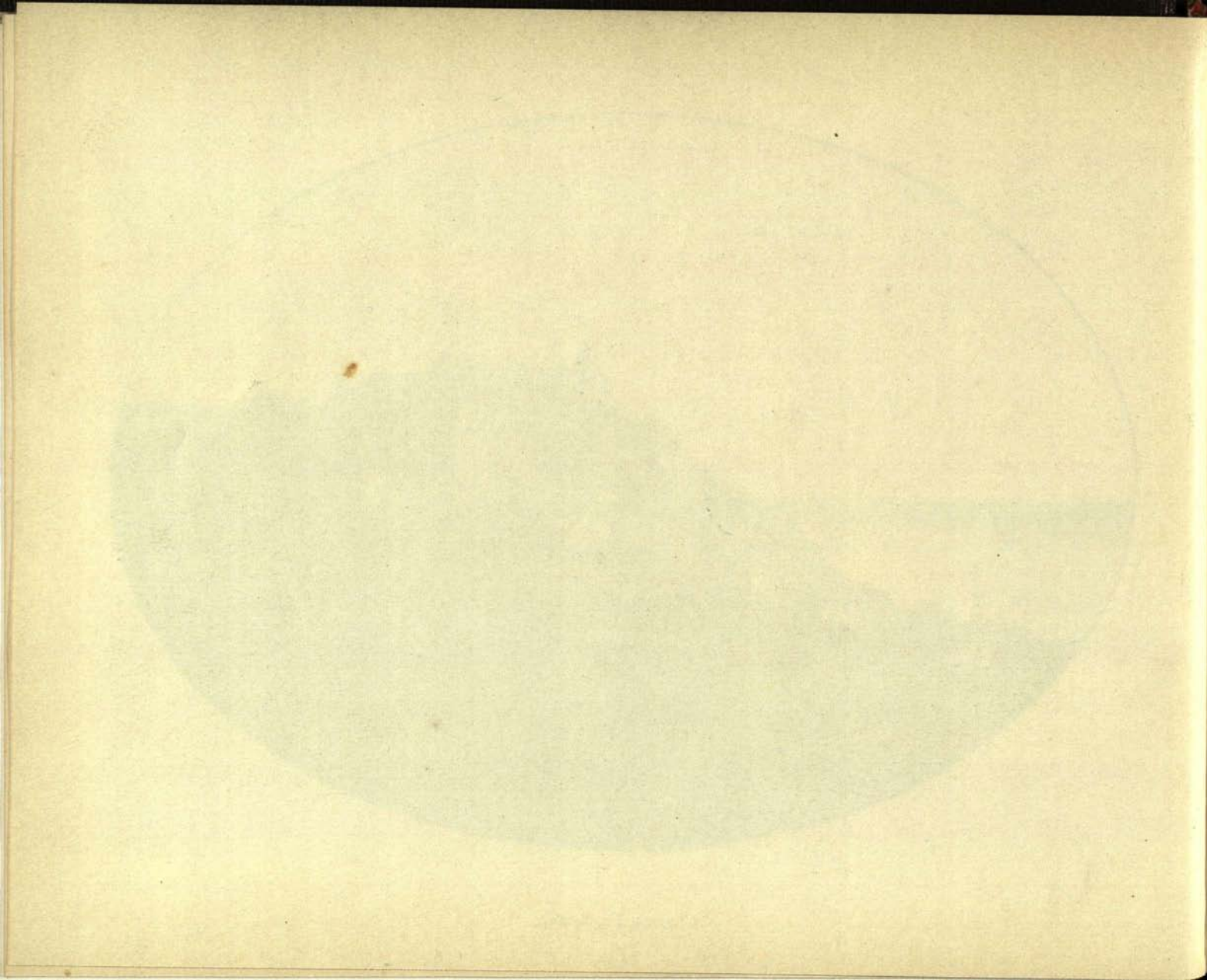
QUEBEC—the walled city of the north—the Gibraltar of America—is the storehouse of American history. Around its old churches, fortifications and other monuments of the past, cluster such a stock of legendary lore and historic memories that the very air seems haunted by the spirits of dead saints and heroes. Beecher described Quebec as “a small bit of mediæval Europe perched upon a rock and dried for keeping.” Charles Marshall says: “Unexampled for picturesqueness and magnificence of position on the American continent, and for the romance of her historic associations, Quebec sits on her impregnable heights a queen among the cities of the New World.”

Stadacona, the Indian village that formerly occupied a part of the site of Quebec was first visited by Jacques Cartier, the discoverer of Canada, in 1535. The real founder of Quebec was Champlain who, in 1608, established a fort and trading post here. In 1629, it was captured by Sir David Kerkt, but restored to France by the English three years later. In 1690 and 1711, two unsuccessful attempts were made by English fleets to capture the city. In the first, Sir William Phillips, Governor of Massachusetts, was defied by Count Frontenac and retired without doing serious damage. In 1711, the fleet under Sir Hovendon Walker was wrecked in the St. Lawrence. The gallant taking of the fortress by General Wolfe, who under cover of the night scrambled with his army up the heights from the river to the Plains of Abraham, occurred in September, 1759. In the sanguinary fight which ensued both Wolfe and his gallant opponent, General Montcalm, lost their lives. In 1760, General Murray, who succeeded Wolfe, was defeated on the Plains at St. Foye by a French army under DeLevis, and besieged behind the city walls until relieved by an English fleet. General Benedict Arnold made his famous march through the Chaudiere valley against Quebec in 1775. General Montgomery, who joined him before the city, met his death immediately below the Citadel on the night of December 31st, in that year. During the last century Quebec's history has been uneventful. The beauty of her surroundings is matchless. Dufferin Terrace, her world-famed promenade, opened in 1879 by Lord Lorne and Princess Louise, and the adjoining palatial Chateau Frontenac Hotel are the best localities from which to view the frowning Citadel fortress above, the bold heights of Levis on the other side of the stream, and the broad expanse of water looking towards the sea, with the picturesque Isle of Orleans stretching down from opposite the Falls of Montmorency to below the saintly shrine of the miracle working Ste Anne. That magnificent background of blue mountain skirting the north shore is a portion of the famous Laurentian range that stretches away towards the pole for nearly 200 miles, and is traversed by the Lake St. John Railway. This opens up a veritable sportsman's paradise and the grandest scenery of Canada's wild northern country, the annual Mecca of thousands of American anglers and tourists, many of whom return to Quebec from romantic Lake St. John, the home of the ouananiche or fresh water salmon, by way of the mysterious Saguenay.





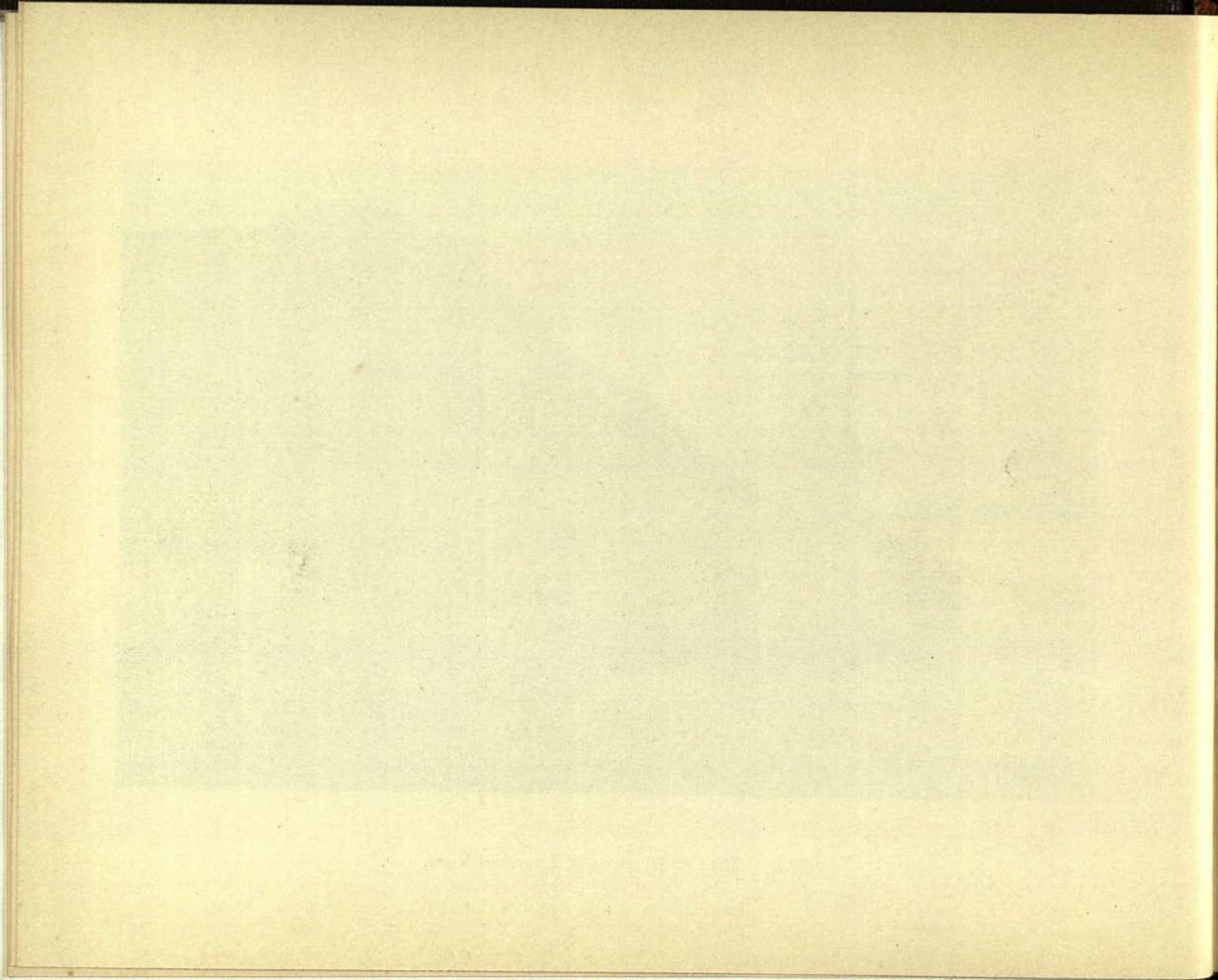

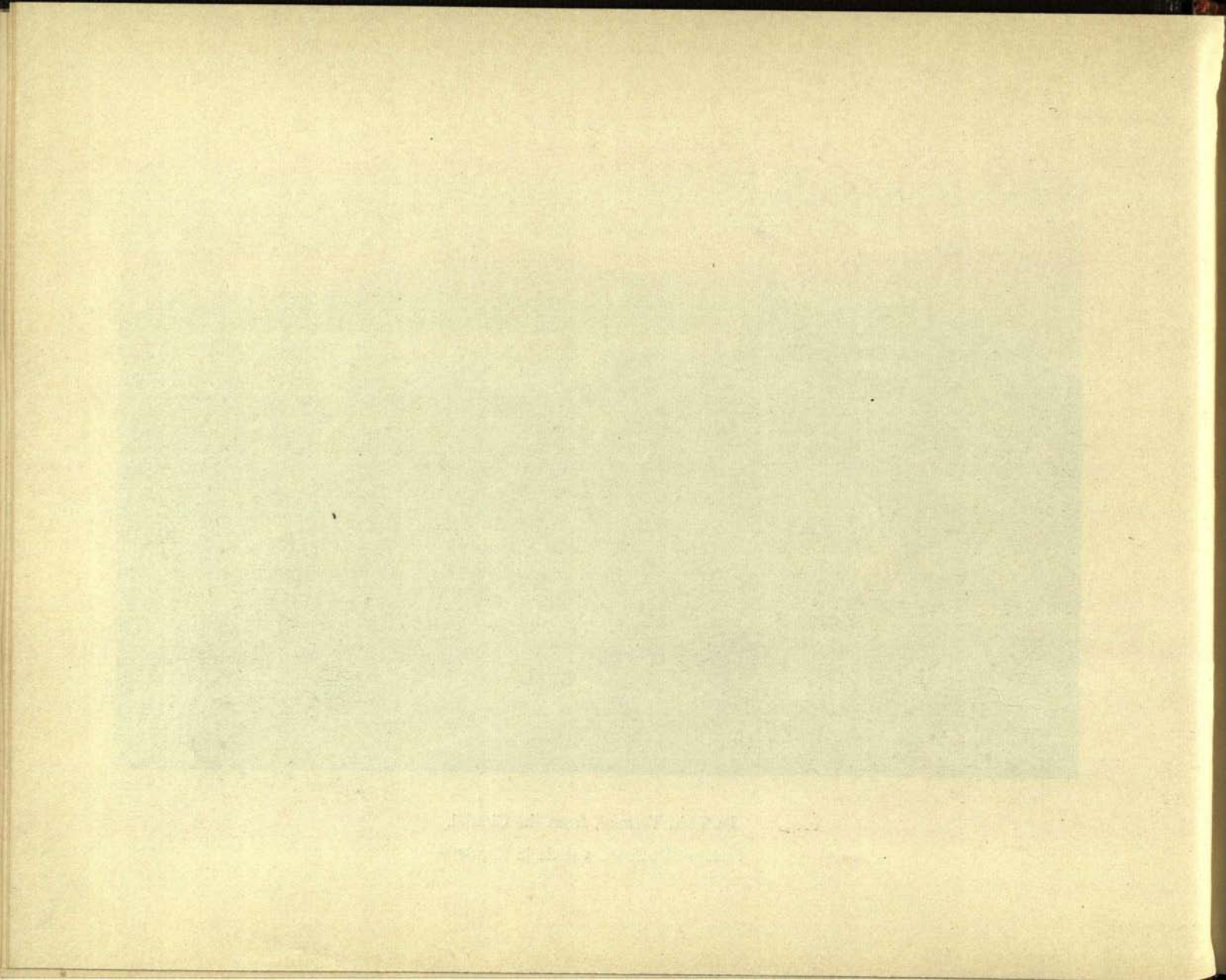

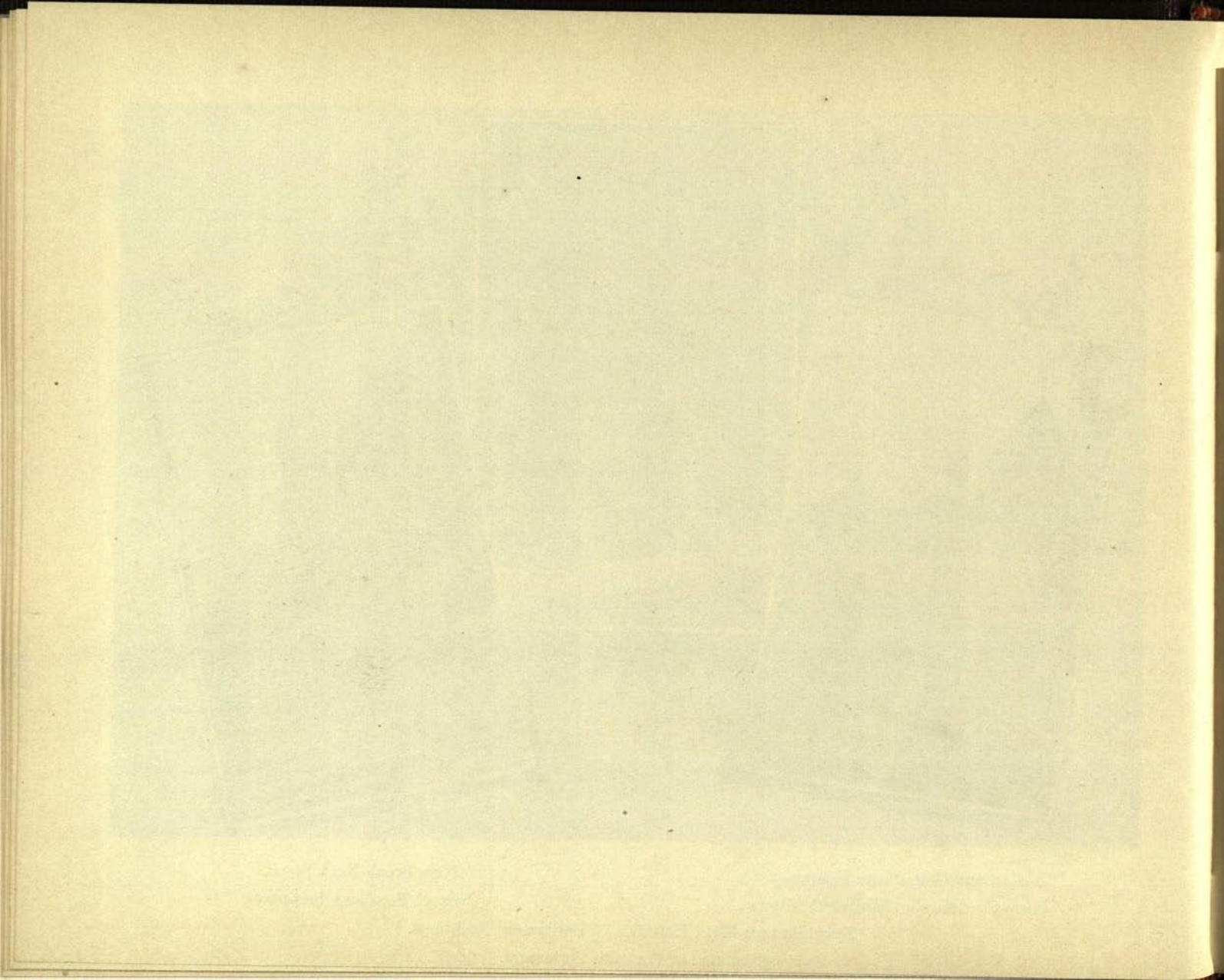

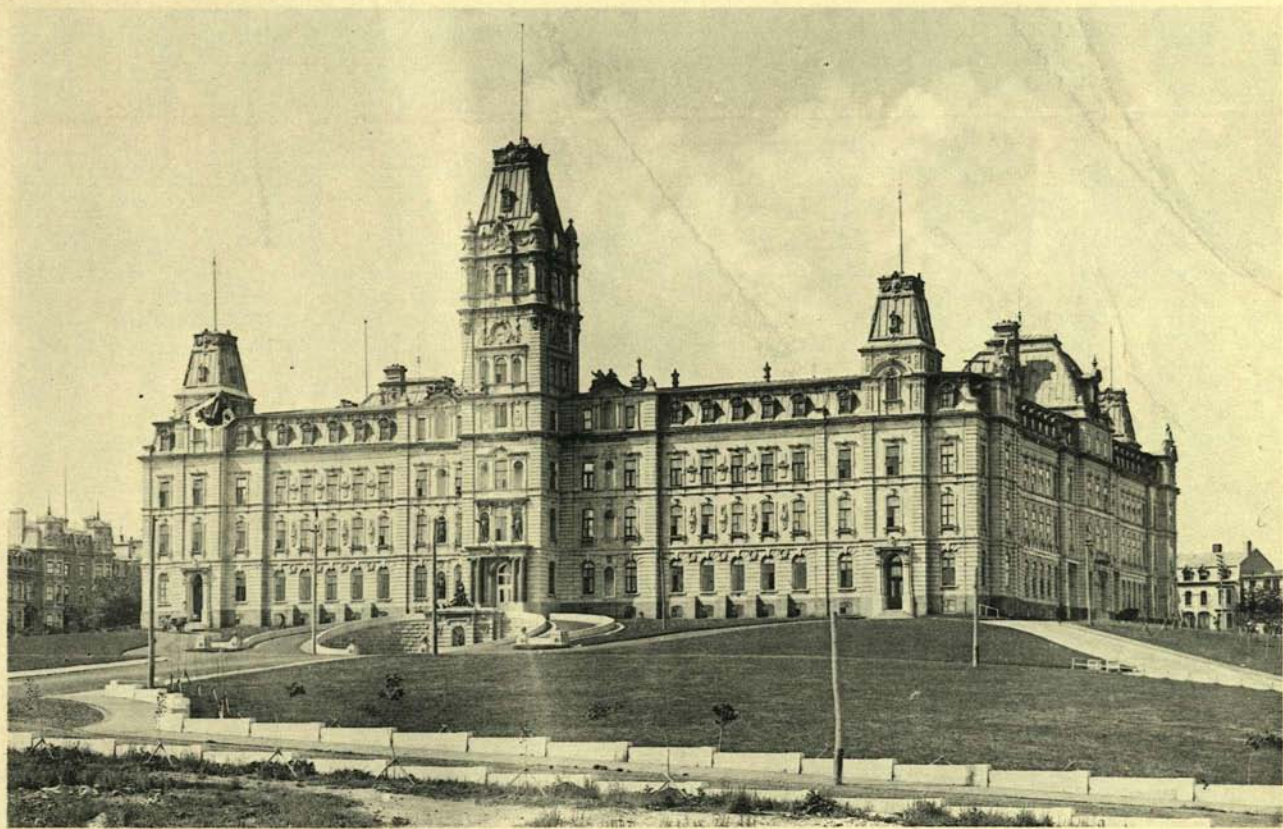

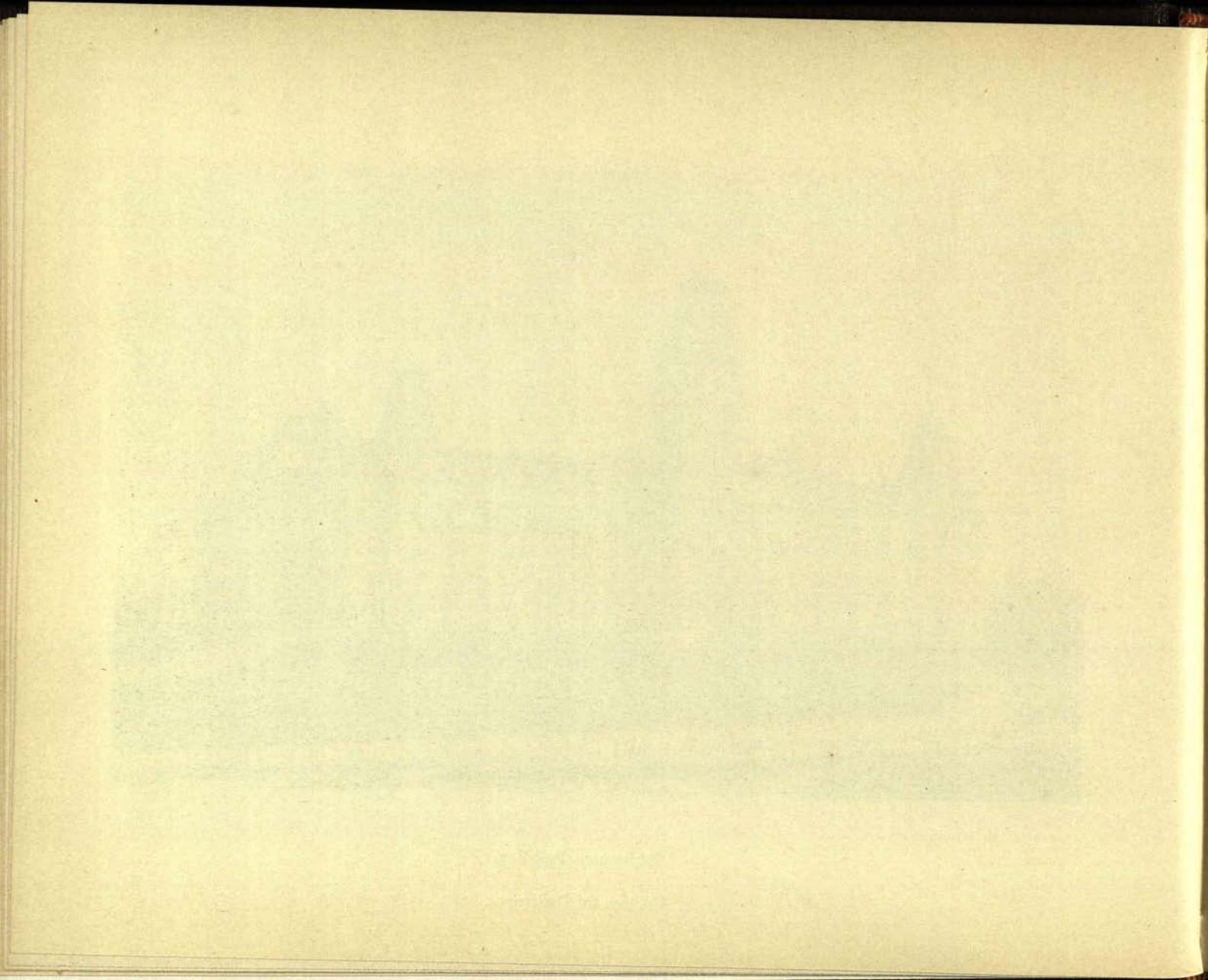

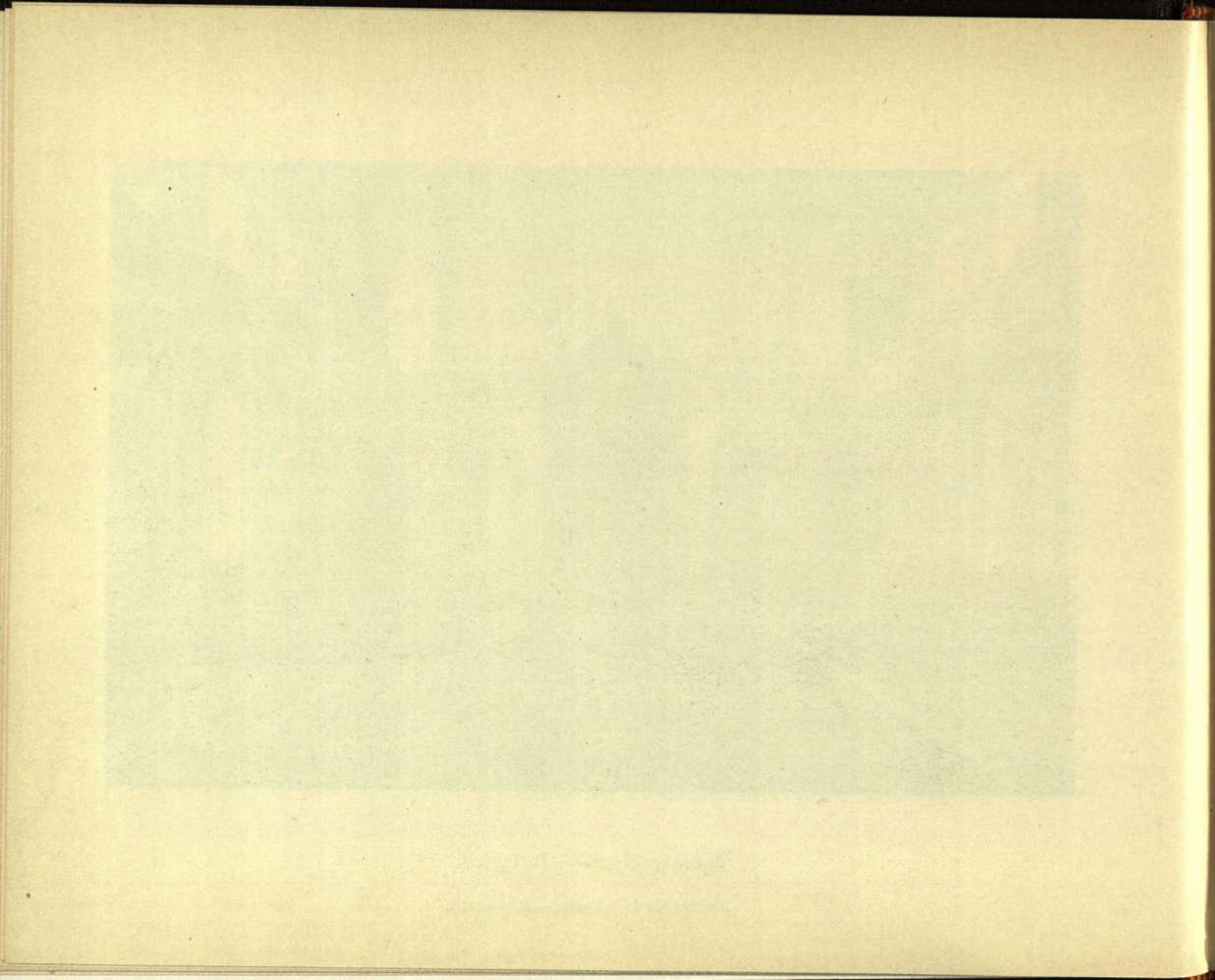

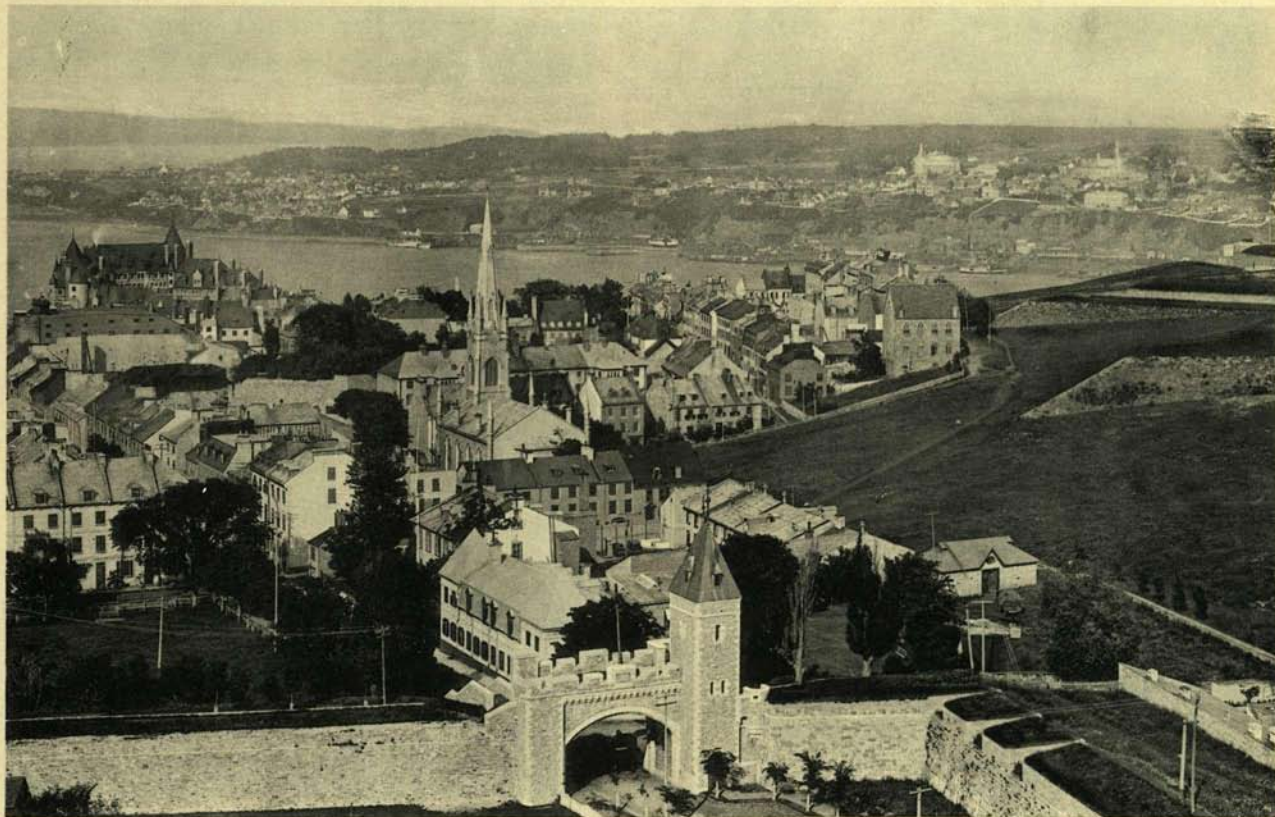

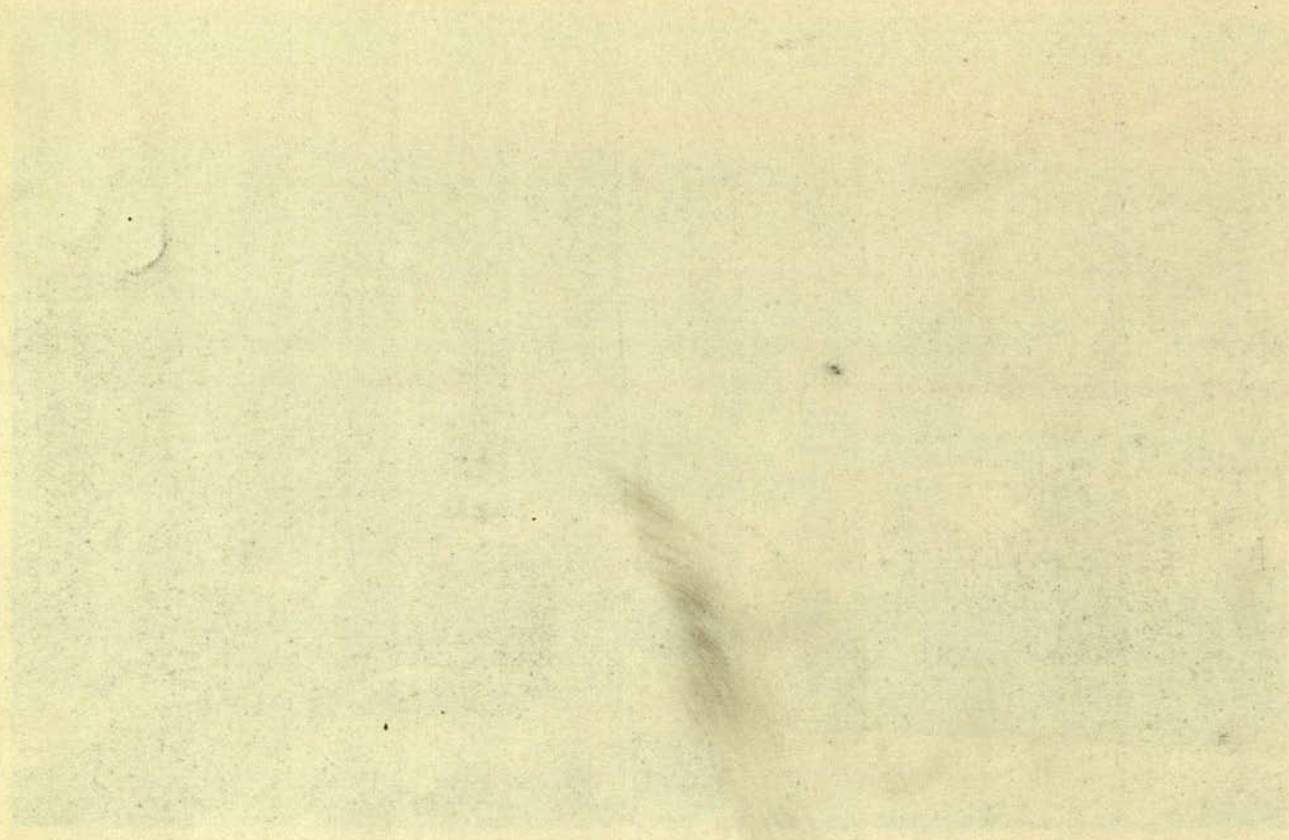

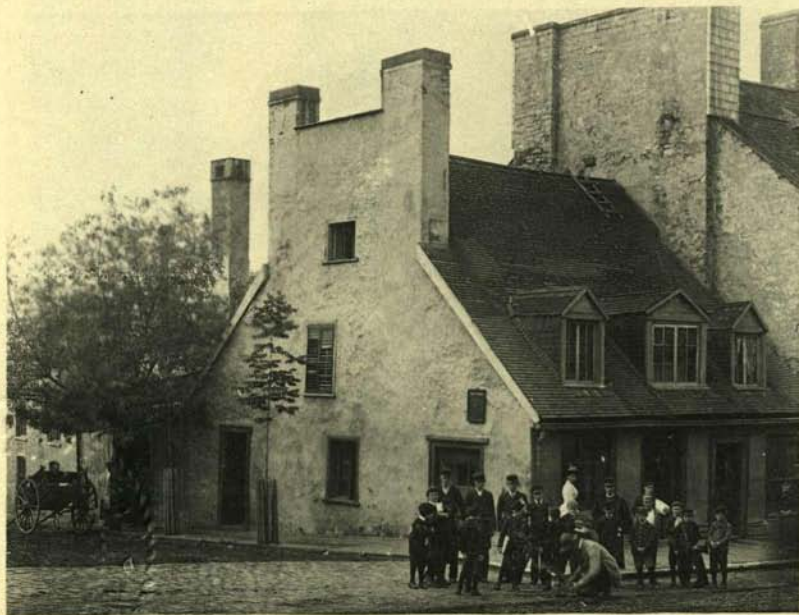

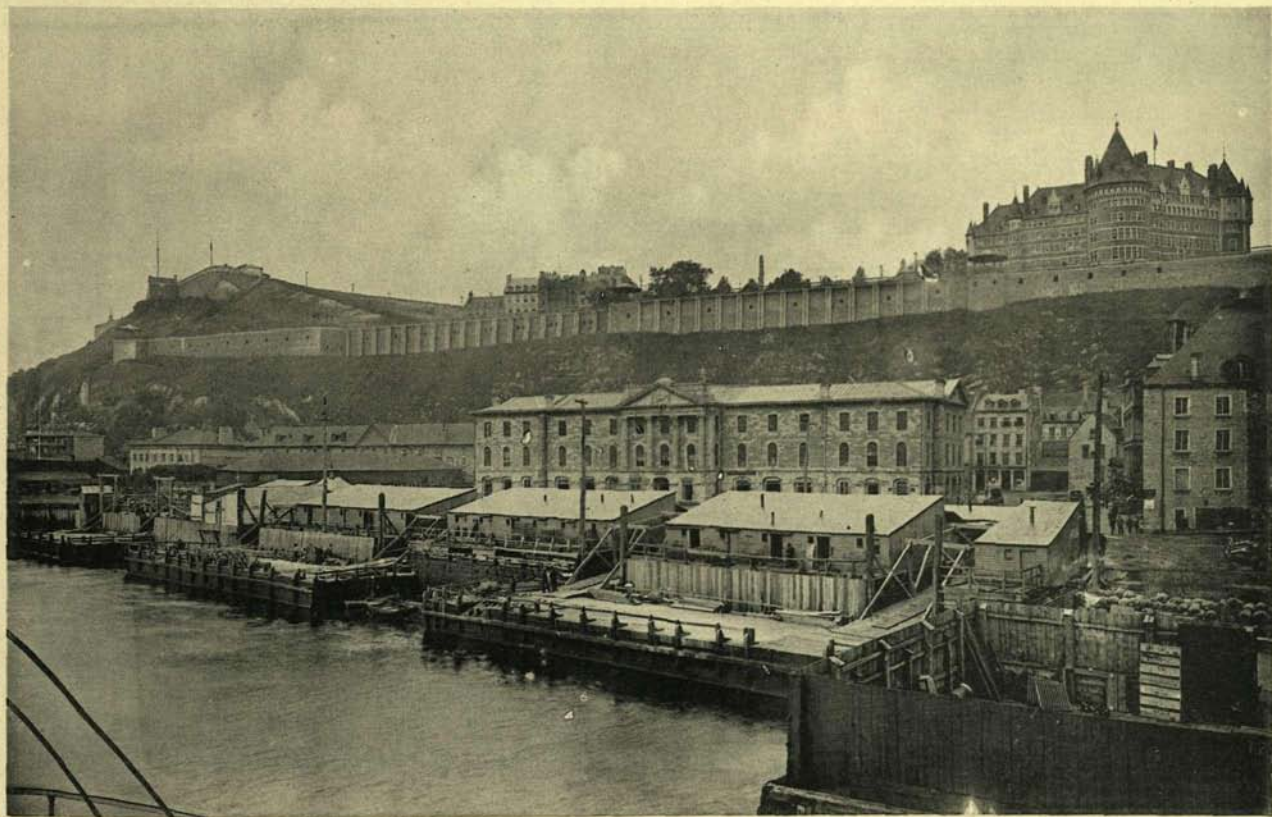

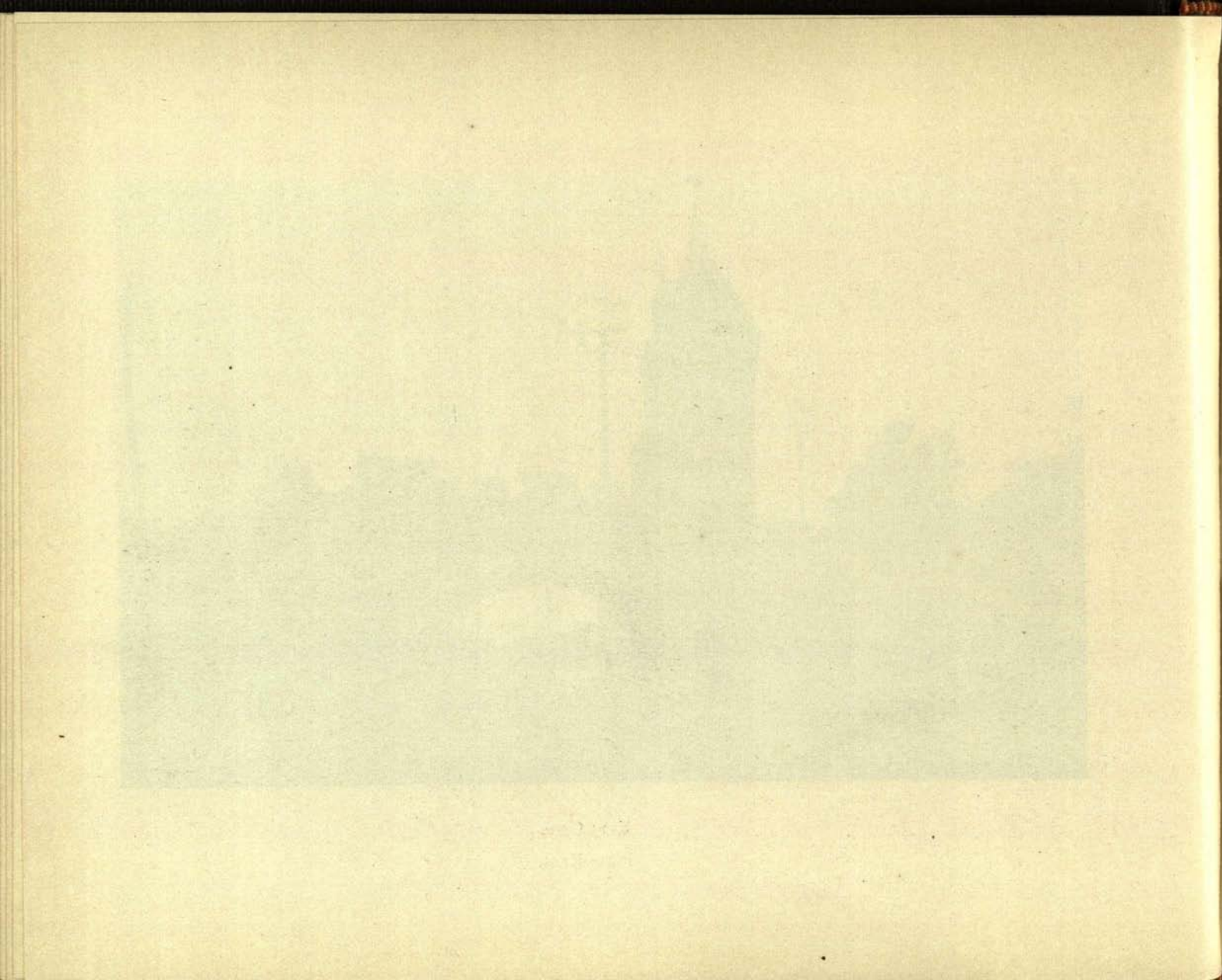


Champlain Market, the Citadel and Chateau Frontenac.

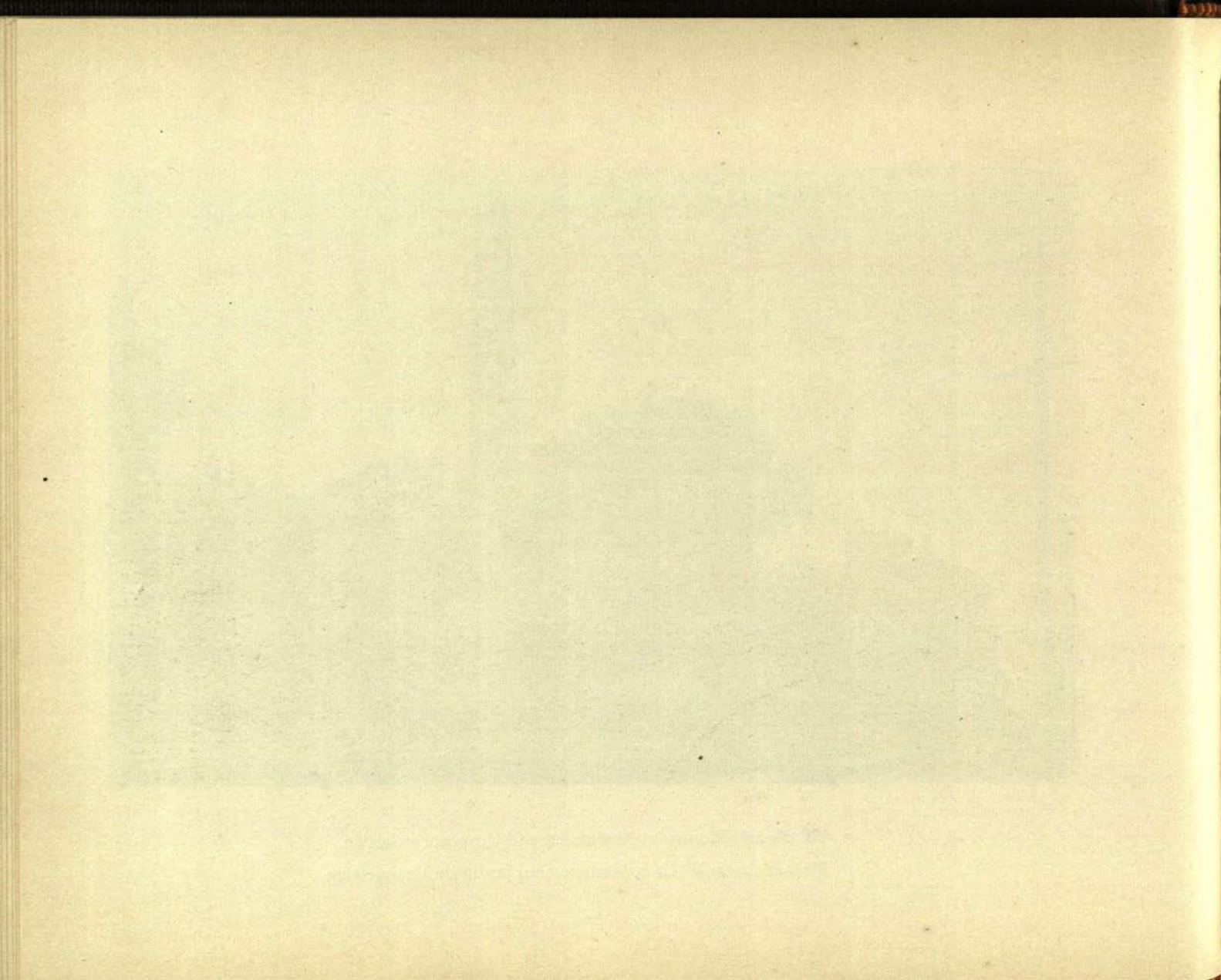

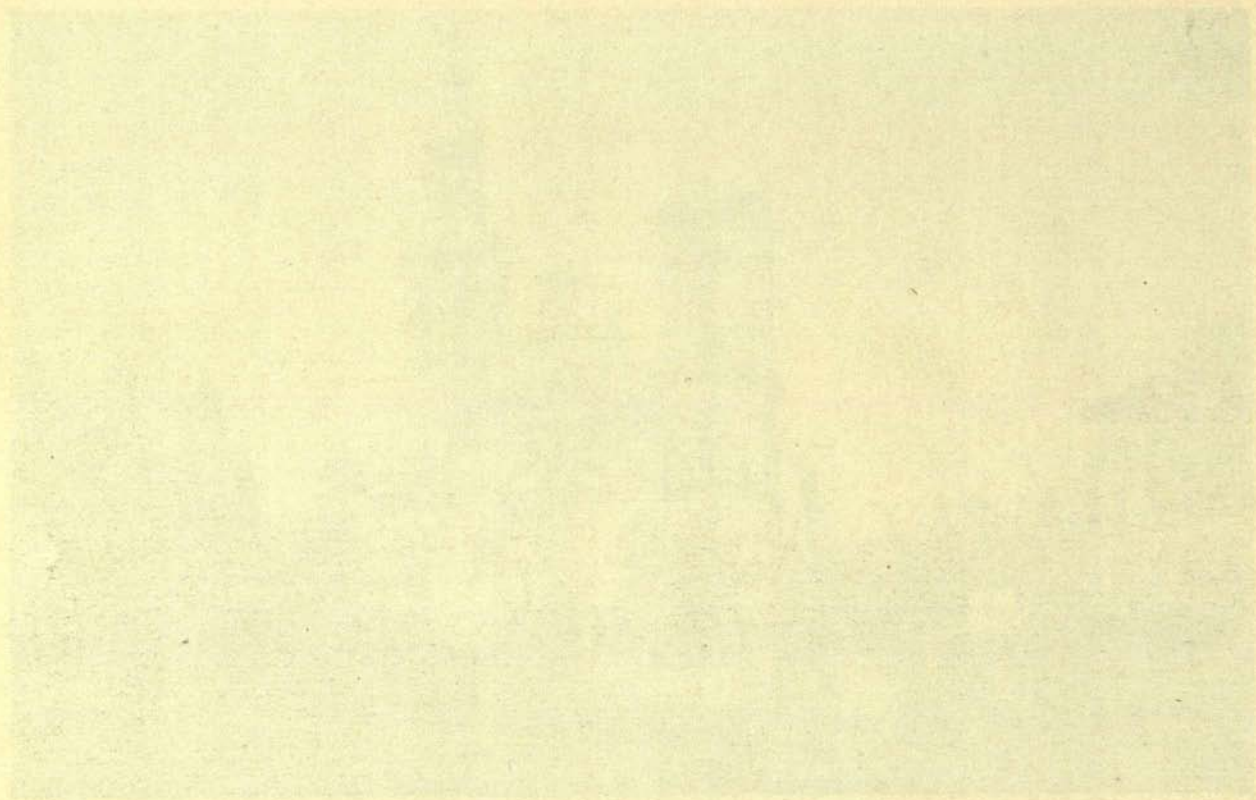

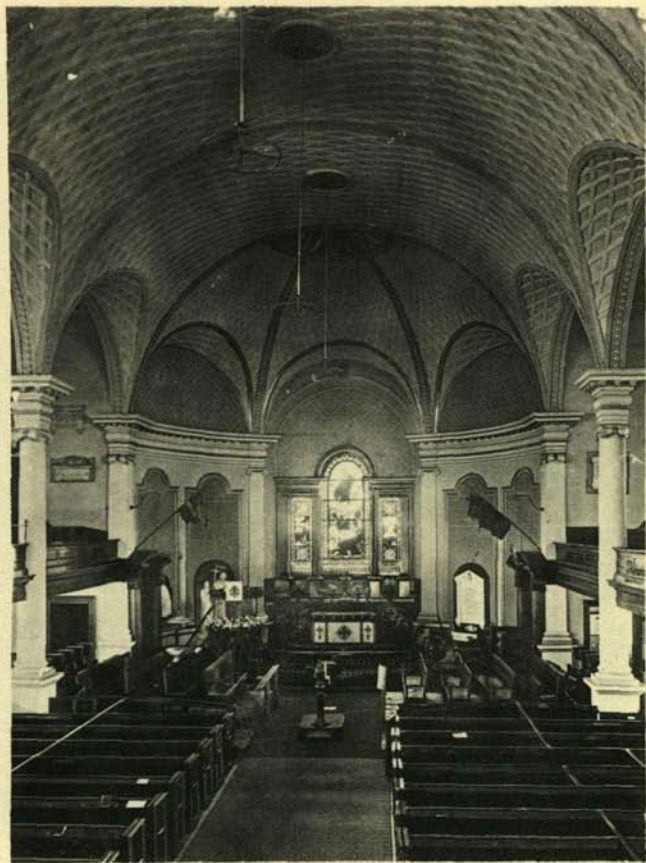

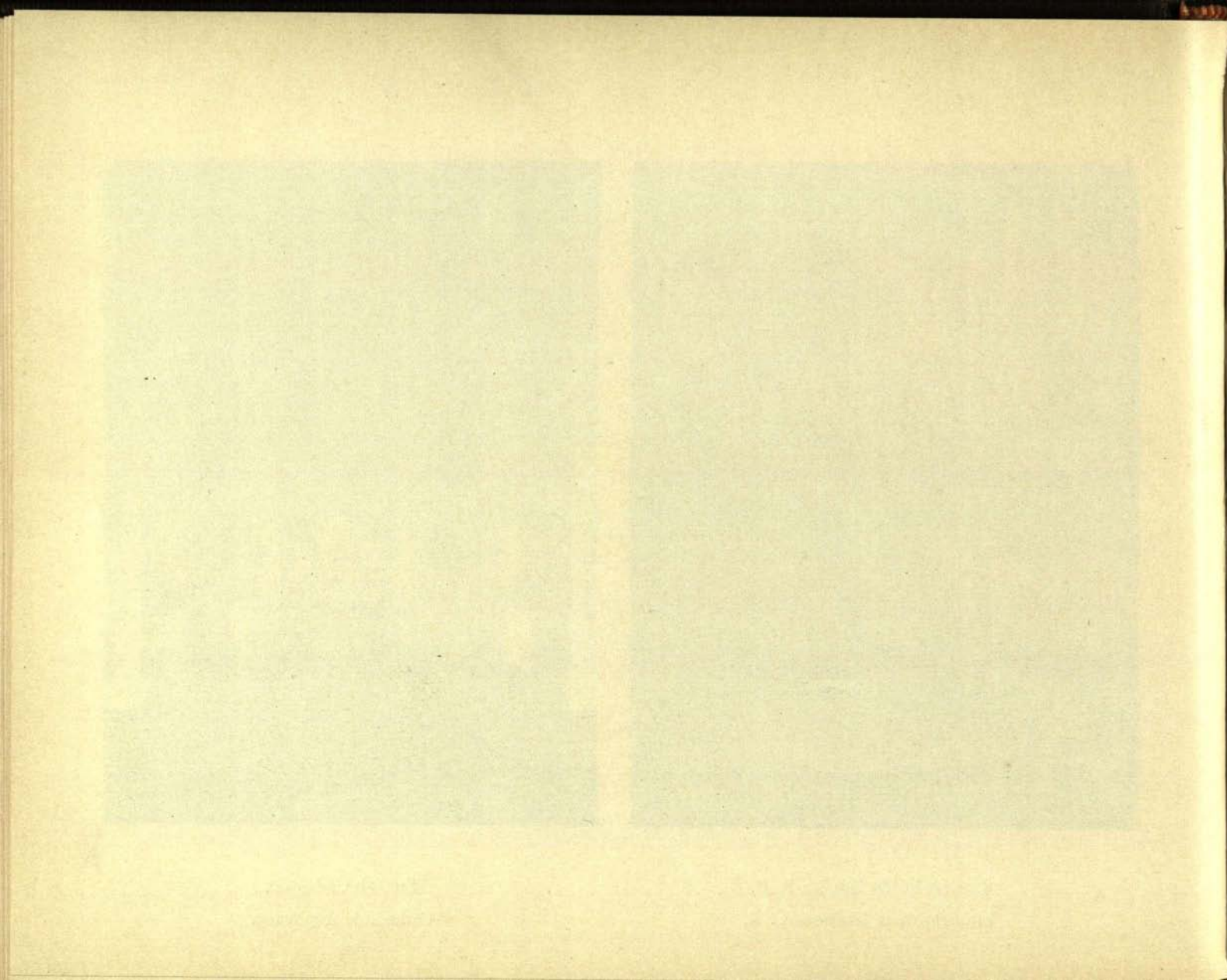

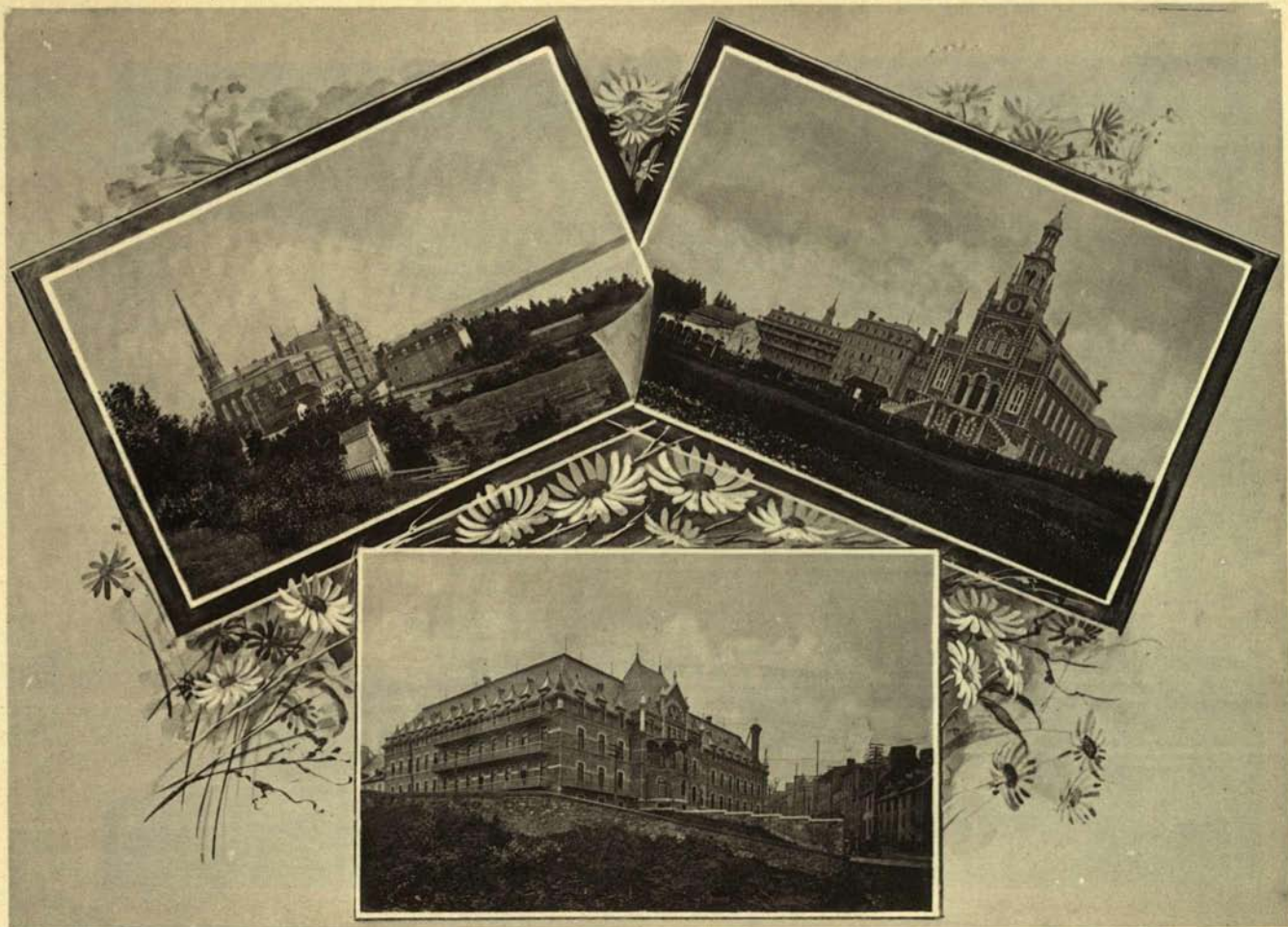
