## TIPS ON ATTRACTING NEWS INDUSTRIES

At the risks of being repetitious we ask the question: "What is Valleyfield doing to attract new industrial development?" At this point the answer can only be: "Not Much". It's many months ago since the Industrial Expansion Committee has held a meeting and, but for the activities of one member, who takes it upon himself to distribute the very attractive book on Valleyfield put out last year by the Committee, whenever and wherever he can, the Committee might as well not exist. On other hand the Committees' work has been hampered by lack of co-operation from the city council. This wouldn't be so serious if the Council itself had undertaken to be active in this field. We know the contrary to be true. Furthermore, as mentioned some weeks ago (Feb. 11th), the cities' budget this year provides for only \$3,000 for the Industrial Expansion Committee, a cut of \$2,000.

If neither the City Council itself nor the Expansion Committee are able or willing to do anything about Valleyfield's industrial development perhaps the Chamber of Commerce or another group of serious minded citizens should be given a chance.

For the benefit of those who feel, as we do, that industrial expansion is of the utmost importance for Valleyfield and should be undertaken with vigour, we publish the following TIPS on "How to Attract Industry" as formulated by the Ontario Industrial Development Council for the guidance of municipalities interested in industrial expansion and which recently appeared in the Financial Post:

- 1—Recruit a group of citizens who are prepared to work for at least five years on an industrial promotion program. It should be kept as free as possible from political influence.
- 2—Compile statistics and other data on your community. Study and be familiar with the unfavorable conditions as well as the favorable. Endeavor to eliminate, reduce or off-set the unfavorable aspects as much as possible, but never deny them.
- 3—Have all data on sites, taxes, present industry, services available, etc., in a concise form.

It need not be in a glamorous brochure but it should be up to date and factual.

4—Cultivate others who are in industrial development fields such as representatives of banks, government, railroads, etc., and let them know you are working actively.

5—Secure lists of companies in Canada, the U.S. and elsewhere and search through them for the types of industries which would fit into your community.

6—Do not concentrate on "large" industries necessarily. Many small ones are very good prospects and would tend to make industry in your community diversified.

7—Never overlook your present industries. Perhaps you could help them expand by assisting them to secure additional acreage, to obtain new lines of manufacture, to contact some company which can supply them with basic goods or purchase their own products or by-products and so on.

8—Be sure that your area is planned and that the planning is protected by zoning bylaws. Industry hesitates to establish in unprotected areas.

9—Forget about concessions and other similar considerations. A good industry does not want them. It is more important for you to plan your work on the basis of knowing what industry wants rather than on what you think they want.

10—Do not be disappointed if tangible results do not come at once. It is a long-term project and must be well-planned.

11—If you feel you can afford to hire an Industrial Commissioner, give him a free hand. In many smaller communities, however, others such as civic officials, Managers of Chambers of Commerce, and others can do a good job for the municipality.

12—If industries come into your community through agencies other than the Industrial Commission, be happy and be appreciative. It probably happened because your community is geared to a good industrial program and perhaps also your Industrial Commission, without knowing it, supplied the basic, necessary information to them through some other source.

# V'field Denied Place In Basket Ball Play-Offs After Heated Battle For 2nd Place At Three Rivers

— Three Rivers To Play Montreal League Winner —

While the Three Rivers "Radisons" won an exciting final basketball game over a good Quebec Y.M.C.A. club with a 50 to 44 score to take the Quebec Provincial basketball tournament Valleyfield, short two regular players, lost in a "heart-breaker" to Latuque with a score of 38 to 36.

The tournament was played last Sunday at Three Rivers.

With less than a minute to go in the game the Three Rivers team was leading by only 2 points but managed to score two quick baskets to hold their lead. R y and Guy Simard scoring 18 to 16 points respectively were the stars for Three Rivers while Talbot with 15 and Vanesse with 14 for Quebec were outstanding.

Valleyfield minus John Rider due to illness, and Dal Butcher, due to work pressure, lost in a

tough one to Latuque when Roger Ruel scored a long shot in the last ten seconds of play. Valleyfield playing coach T. Coombs was hot in the second half scoring 16 points, however it was not enough. Pierre Robineault and Cliff Dickens scored 5 points each for the local team. Fern Dilabio, Bob Martin and Fred Donald also put in a good performance. Baron, Pelletier and Ruel were best for the winners.

Talbot named most Valuable Player to his team during the tournament played magnificently, scoring a total of 83 points in five games in spite of his small stature.
