DRIVE AGAINST DIPHTHERIA IS NOW UNDER WAY

City Stages Campaign Along with Other Centres in Province

Along with other centres in the Province of Quebec, Westmount is this week conducting a special campaign against diphtheria and the following statement was issued yesterday by Dr. F. M. A. McNaughton, medical health officer for the city:

For several years the Westmount Health Department has distributed a pamphlet on the prevention of diphtheria and has received good co-operation. There are still, however, a number of parents and guardians who have neglected this duty to their children.

Diphtheria is still a real danger to life and health in the city and country as is shown by the large number of cases and deaths recorded each year.

During the past three years, over 8,000 cases of diphtheria have occurred in Canada, with over 800 being fatal.

The following is the brochure issued by the Health Department on "Diphtheria and How to Prevent It":

Diphtheria continues to be our most dangerous contagious disease.

It has the most insidious onset of all diseases of childhood—without rash or sudden high fever to alarm the parent.

It may develop in the nose or throat, and not be noticed until too late for treatment.

The mortality is greatest in children under school age.

"Diphtheria carriers" are the chief spreaders of the disease. A "carrier" may be your maid, landlady, or any visitor. Many parents' feel safe, since there is no toxin for treatment.

Reasons for prevention rather than treatment of diphtheria:

1. Antitoxin may be given too late.
2. Laryngeal diphtheria may be fatal before treatment can be given.
3. Nasal diphtheria may be mistaken for a cold.
4. Diphtheria may cause paralysis or heart disease.

Vaccinate Against Diphtheria
Permanent protection can be had by specific vaccination. All children should be given the inoculation as soon after 6 months of age as possible. Many cities, as large as this, have exterminated diphtheria by this method. It is safe—and causes no suffering.

Clifford A. Smith was re-elected chairman of the board of management of the Westmount Y.M.C.A. at the annual meeting held on Friday evening. The program of the branch during the past year was featured by war work, Mr. Smith reported, and one of the most important phases was physical fitness.

The physical fitness training was under the direction of Murray MacFarlane, a graduate of Springfield College, Mass. Mr. Smith said, and included getting overweight and underweight men into condition for service in the armed forces. Special gymnastic classes were also provided for men already in uniform.

During the year more than 50,000 members of the armed forces made use of the "Y" facilities, a popular feature being the weekly Saturday night dance. Once a month a Sunday luncheon was held for servicemen.

The regular work of the different clubs was continued with success. Among the clubs were the Hi-Y Club under P. Wearing, adviser, with D. Phillips, president; the Girls' Hi-Y Club under Joan Hurst; the Hi-Y Grads under Gordon Mackay; Hi-Y Girl Grads under Ruth Johnston; and the 3 F Club under Edward Smee. The Rink Dinks Neighborhood Club for boys in the Greene-Selby streets district, gave valuable service by giving boys outside athletics and general counselling.

The financial report showed a credit balance of \$33, for which Mr. Smith paid tribute to E. I. Taylor, executive secretary.

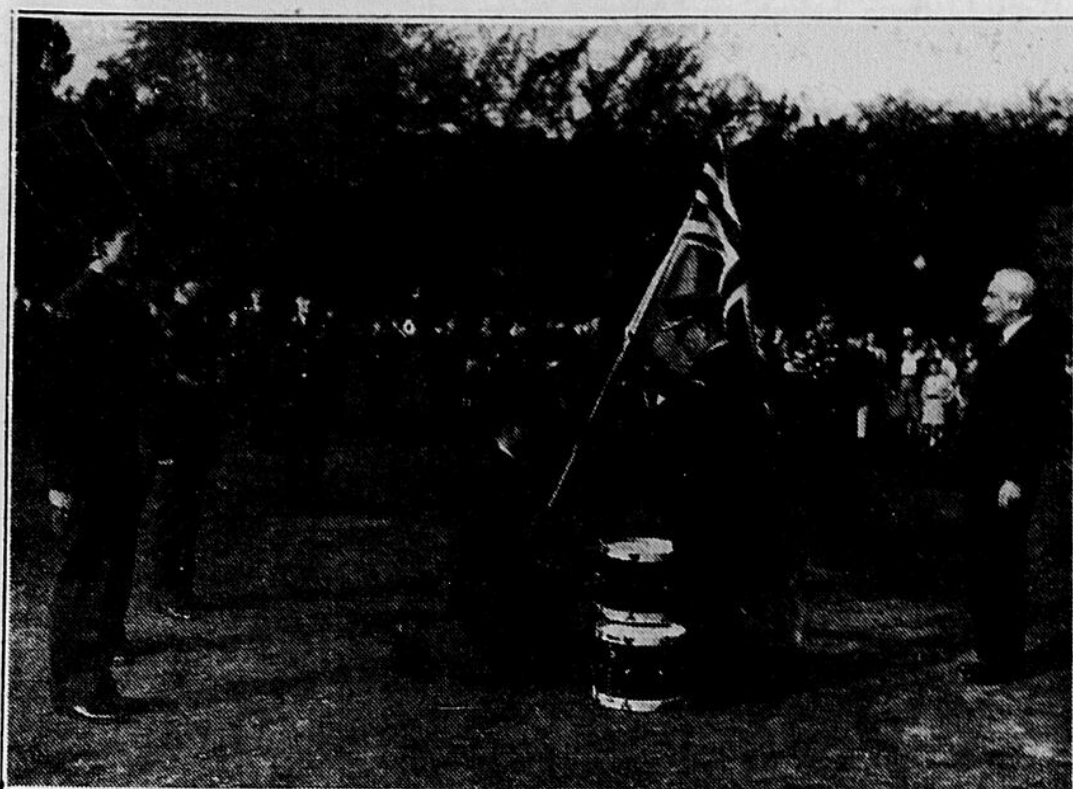
G. Young Elected Y.P.U. President

PAUL BILLING NEW PRESIDENT OF ART GROUP

Reports Read at Annual Meeting Show Independent Association Had Good Year

At the annual meeting of the Independent Art Association held last week-end, reports read showed that the last year proved a successful one. The membership was doubled, the annual juried exhibition was larger than the previous year, when nearly 100 exhibits were shown, including oils, water-colours, pastels and sculpture. A well attended evening reception in Victoria Hall was held for the opening of the exhibition.

One of the directors, Orson Wheeler, A.R.C.A., S.S.C., was elected a member of the Sculptor's Society of Canada this year. A new venture was the "one man" show held in the association's studios, when approximately 65 paintings by one member were exhibited. It was also reported that the studio work continued during the winter months, with evening and afternoon sessions, when various types of models were provided for drawing and painting.

It was announced at the meeting that the annual exhibition will be held early in November in Westmount. During the summer and autumn, outdoor sketching groups will be formed. The first to be held this week. It was also reported that a sum of money had been collected by the association for the Queen's Canadian Fund, through a donation of a painting by a member.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, Paul Billing; vice-president, Mrs. E. J. Mullaly; honorary secretary-treasurer, Nesta Low; with an executive composed of Mrs. George Allan, Orson Wheeler, A.R.C.A., Stanley B. Wilson.

After the business of the meeting a talk was given by Professor R. R. Thompson, showing the development of landscape painting in Europe. He said that, "When a landscape was first inserted into a picture composition, it was used as part of a background for the figure or portrait of the painting. Titian then combined both figure and landscape equally in his compositions. Later gradually, this changed and the landscape predominated, figures were used, but inconsequential and very diminutive, until finally landscape painting came into its own, accepted on its own merit as such. Many painters, such as Gainsborough, painted portraits for a living, and landscapes for their own pleasure, as there was no demand for any other type of picture at that time by the public, but figure work in some form or other, the art patrons having their vanities flattered by portraits of themselves, and likenesses of their families perpetuated."

The slides illustrating the speakers' views showed many of the great masterpieces of Titian, Canaletto, Rembrandt, Cromer, Corot, Turner, Gainsborough and VanGogh. The speaker was thanked by the retiring president, S. B. Wilson.

Harry H. Andrews Is Laid To Rest

Final tribute was paid to Harry Herbert Marsden Andrews, of 440 Mount Stephen avenue, at a funeral service held in St. Matthias' Church yesterday afternoon. Mr. Andrews, for the last 12 years an employee of Messrs. C. E. Robinson and Company, died at his residence on Sunday. He was 75 years of age.

A resident of Westmount for nearly 50 years, he was a life-long member of St. Matthias' Church. In his younger days very active in sports, he was at one time captain of Montreal lacrosse team, president of the M.A.A.A. hockey club, and later president of the Westmount Amateur Athletic Association.

Mr. Andrews is survived by his wife, the former Elizabeth Randolph, four brothers, Alfred, of Montreal; Philip, St. George Stanley, and H. P. Andrews, all of New York, and one sister, Mrs. J. W. Brighton, of Montreal. Also one son, Randolph, a daughter, Mrs. Sydney Dunford, and five grandchildren.

Cancelled Stamps Asked By V-Bundles For Britain

Cancelled stamps of one, two and three cent values, Canadian and American are sought by V-Bundles for Britain, British and British Empire stamps will also be welcomed. These are sold by the pound to dealers and the proceeds turned over to the fund. The address is 4141 St. Catherine St., Westmount.

The following appeal to the people of Canada, entitled "Roll Out the Rubber," has been made by the National Salvage Campaign which is the parent movement of the local salvage committee:

"No more important task faces any voluntary organization than the rubber salvage program. Remember you and I and the people of Canada must produce 50,000,000 pounds of salvaged rubber to meet our war requirements. As you know, the gas companies and tire dealers have agreed to act as receiving depots for the collection of this essential material. But, perhaps the people of your community are not aware of this means of collection. Please tell all your friends, and have them tell their friends that these collection points are available.

"Everyone realized that old rubber tires are the chief source of reclaimed rubber poundage. Because this is so, however, many ignore other sources that must be tapped if we are to meet our quota. Don't let your eye glide casually over that old door mat or bathing cap when you are looking for rubber. Slickers, rubber heels, bathing caps and bathing suits, rubber-tired ash trays, hot water bottles, hockey pucks, football bladders, rubber grips and exercisers are other articles that should be brought in by the thousand."

The use of rubber is essential in the manufacture of equipment for mechanized warfare. Unlike most other products, it does not deteriorate with use and when re-processed becomes as good as new.

There are, however, certain articles containing rubber which are of no value in war production and residents are asked not to collect rubber hose, rubber boots, etc. In such articles separation of the rubber from the cloth and other materials used has been found to be impractical.

City officials pointed out yesterday that residents were co-operating fully in the campaign and feel assured that it will be a marked success. They urge that all residents search their homes thoroughly for unwanted rubber goods. In instances where particularly large amounts of rubber are recovered the city will send a special truck for its collection.

WOMAN IS INJURED BY FALLING SHUTTER

A shutter which became loose and fell from the window of a property at 4175 St. Catherine St., struck a woman passing on the sidewalk and caused injuries to her left temple, at 6.15 p.m. last Thursday.

The woman, who requested that her name be withheld from publication, was taken to the Homeopathic Hospital by Sgt. Frederick Porter in a police radio car, and treated for head injuries. The property is owned by H. Weinfield, of 440 Elm avenue.

Bicycle Strikes Open Door Of An Automobile

IMMUNIZATION

Diphtheria Immunization Week is being observed throughout the Province of Quebec this present week.

The Westmount Health Department is doing its utmost to make this campaign a success. This is a dreaded disease that medical science has been able to prevent by means of toxoid treatment.

The need of this Campaign is obvious when we know that within the past three years there were more than 8,000 cases of diphtheria in Canada, with some 800 deaths.

To show the careless attitude of some parents and guardians towards their children is the fact that 500-600 children in our Westmount schools have not yet been protected. This does not include many pre-school children who have still been neglected.

In many of our large cities that have made a thorough campaign of toxoid treatment, no cases of diphtheria have occurred for years.

Diphtheria occurring in our army camps shows that adults should be treated by Schick Test and immunized if found positive.

The time seems to have arrived when a law should be passed, making it compulsory to have toxoid treatment given to all children on entering school in the same way as varioloid vaccination is now necessary.

CANADA RECOGNIZED

Canada's inclusion on the Munitions Assignment Board of the United Nations gives recognition to her importance in one major phase of this war. It is a graphic indication of the truly remarkable development of this country in a largely unfamiliar role.

The Dominion had not, until recent months, been looked on as an important industrial country, in comparison with Britain and the United States. She had more or less generally been assigned the role of a supplier of raw materials to those equipped to turn out the

finished products. She has now progressed far beyond that status.

The striking title of "Arsenal of Democracy" has been bestowed on the United States, but she cannot lay sole claim to that distinction. Canada has come to the point where she must be recognized as a major factor in turning out the finished goods necessary for waging war, and our representation on the Munitions Assignment Board is a sign that other nations recognize that fact.

EXCEEDING SPEED LIMIT

To conserve gasoline, the Government some time ago decreed a speed limit of 40 miles an hour throughout Canada. Many motorists, perhaps the majority of them, are co-operating loyally and patriotically; but there are a large number who are not. A visit to the new Trans-Island boulevard last Sunday confirmed that the majority of cars on that thoroughfare were exceeding the limit by a considerable margin. There is only one way to deal with this situation—a drastic check-up by the police. This is wartime, and those who won't co-operate should be handled without gloves.

HOUSES FOR SOLDIERS' FAMILIES

Couldn't some means be found to quit arguing about homes for soldiers' families and get the houses instead of the debates? The families cannot live on discussions, no matter how intriguing those talk-fests may be.

Our men are overseas defending this Dominion. Is it too much to suggest that homes be provided for their families, while they are away? The wives are ready and willing to pay reasonable rent. All they want is somewhere to go, if they have to leave their present residences. It is rather strange to have everyone making such an effort to provide homes for war workers, when the families of the soldiers, who are the greatest of all war workers, are not given consideration.

HELP SPEED VICTORY

Few aspects of our war effort are more important than the Red Cross now conducting a drive for nine million dollars. Every Canadian is urged to contribute. Every dollar donated will bring victory a little nearer. Residents of this locality will, we know, again help liberally. We have never let a worthy cause down—never failed to do more than our share when a charitable or patriotic appeal is made to us. And this is an especially worthy and patriotic cause. If you have not already contributed, do so without delay.

FINAL TRIBUTE PAID TO LATE A. B. VINEBERG

Kensington Avenue Resident Was Connected With Clothing Industry For Many Years

The funeral service for Abraham Benjamin Vineberg, of 252 Kensington Avenue, was held in the William Wray chapel on Monday afternoon, followed by interment in Shaar Hashomayim Cemetery. Mr. Vineberg, who was connected with the clothing industry in Montreal for many years, died at his residence on Sunday. He was 62 years of age.

Mr. Vineberg was of Lithuanian descent. He founded the Vineberg Pants and Sportswear Company of which he was president up to the time of his death. Mr. Vineberg took a prominent part in civic affairs, and was a charter member of the Masonic Lodge of the Covenant as well as being a member of the Shaar Hashomayim synagogue. He was a governor of the Jewish General Hospital and the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies.

He is survived by his wife, his two sons, Henry and Joseph, two brothers, Saul and Albert Vineberg, and one sister, Mrs. Leah Wexler, of Lynn, Massachusetts.

In Which Subjects of General Interest Are Discussed

Unlike the Conservative government of Sir Robert Borden, which finally forced through overseas conscription after much bitterness and some rioting in the last war, Mr. King could not be accused of tactlessly offending French susceptibilities. There were no such blunders as the sending of a Protestant pastor to take charge of recruiting activities in Quebec. But the stubborn, deep-rooted opposition of the French masses to compulsory military service outside this hemisphere was not to be broken. Mr. King's French ministers were repudiated overwhelmingly by the "No" majorities in their own constituencies.

Perhaps Mr. King's political difficulties have been enhanced by the outcome of the plebiscite. But his decision to hold it can only be redounded to his credit as a sincere democrat and a political leader who respects his pledged word. He has been under strong pressure to treat his anti-conscription promises as so much campaign oratory, to jam through a conscription measure without consulting public opinion. His decision to consult the people directly is a welcome rarity in an age of dictatorship and of steadily growing concentration of executive power, even in democratic countries.

An R.A.F. Wing Commander, who withheld his name, in a recent article entitled: "Target For Tomorrow" began as follows: "When you look into the dead, unrecognizable face of a friend, when you attend the memorial service or funeral of your eldest son; when you wonder how your fiancée died—not you ask yourself, 'What are we fighting for?' "In the last war we used to talk of building a world fit for heroes to live in. This time let us cut the talk and simply get on with building a world fit for everybody to live in. It is simple. It must be done."

It is interesting to note that President Roosevelt in his first message to Congress on the Four Freedoms that are to be the basis for a new world order, included "Freedom from want—everywhere in the world."

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He makes some good suggestions.

The more practical census taker now proves that these were wasted tears. The Indian is on the increase. He has a higher birth rate than the white brother. Medical care to the Indian is reducing the white man's diseases—tuberculosis, venereal diseases, trachoma—which proved more fatal to them than to us and caused a high rate of mortality in the past.

Today there are 335,000 Indians in the United States, Navahos, Sioux and Apaches being most numerous. The co-operatives are giving the Indian a new sense of purpose.

LAST RESPECTS ARE PAID LATE CAPT. R. KANE

World War Veteran Was For Many Years Official Of Quebec Liquor Commission

Friends and relatives paid final tribute to Captain Roderick A. C. Kane, of 3194 Westmount Boulevard, at a funeral service held this morning in St. James Cathedral. Interment followed in Cote des Neiges Cemetery. Capt. Kane, a veteran of the Great War and for many years an official of the Quebec Liquor Commission, died at his home on Monday following a lengthy illness. He was 66 years of age.

Born in Montreal, Captain Kane was the son of the late Robert Kane, a native of England, and his wife, Harriet Courtenay, member of a prominent Montreal family.

During the last war he went over to England with the 244th Battalion, under Colonel Fred McRobie, then transferred to France, where he was paymaster with the 24th Battalion. Captain Kane became associated with the Quebec Liquor Commission upon its inception, taking over the post of assistant to the chairman, which he held until illness forced him from active business more than a year ago.

A member of various local organizations during his lifetime, Captain Kane was for many years a member of the St. James Club and the Forest and Stream Club.

A bachelor, he is survived by one sister, Miss Harriet Kane, also of Montreal.

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"Cupboard Quislings"! Is that too hard a name for people who selfishly lay in unnecessary stocks of clothes or food, or other goods for fear of shortages?

No! The name is not too hard, even though it may be earned through thoughtlessness. For in reality they are doing, in a petty, mean way, what the Quisling does in the open.

Anyone who buys more than is necessary for current needs—

Is breaking his country's law for personal advantage.

Is betraying his loyal neighbours and those who are not so well off as he.

Is, in effect, depriving our fighting men of the munitions and supplies they must have to defend us.

Is hindering our war effort and helping our enemies.

Loyal citizens avoid putting unnecessary and abnormal strains on our factories. In time of war, loyal citizens do not spend one dollar more on civilian goods than is absolutely necessary for current needs.

The law provides for fines up to \$5,000 and imprisonment up to two years for hoarding; and hoarding is just another word for unnecessary selfish buying.

In cases where it is advisable for you to buy in advance of your immediate requirements—such as your next season's coal supply—you will be encouraged to do so by direct statement from responsible officials.

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HEATING EQUIPMENT MUST BE PROTECTED DURING THE SUMMER

Combining patriotism, practical efficiency and comfort, Canadian home owners who clean up their heating equipment and guard it against rust and corrosion this summer will be making an important contribution to the nation's war effort. With little effort and at very small cost they will be helping to conserve fuel for more important wartime needs, will eliminate the need for elaborate equipment repairs or replacements and, at the same time, will assure themselves of warmer, more comfortable homes next winter.

It's a real fuel economy to clean your furnace and keep it in repair. If you're careless with your heating plant, you're likely to waste several tons of coal in a single winter. Now more than ever it is important to conserve fuel in view of wartime transportation difficulties. The warning to "clean up now" is a timely one with annual clean-up campaigns under way across the country.

Arrange for Repairs
If your stove, furnace or boiler need repairs, arrange for them now. Don't wait until fall to order needed parts—they may take a long time to procure.

Use paint, grease or oil to coat the parts of your heating equipment likely to rust and deteriorate during summer idleness. Rust and corrosion cause more damage to heating plants than almost any amount of use. Clean the equipment thoroughly before coating with protective covering.

If your cellar is unusually damp and heating equipment rusts rapidly, build a fire occasionally during the summer months. This will inhibit spread of rust.

The smoke pipes of idle coal-burning furnaces and stoves tend to rust through quickly. Take them down, wrap in newspaper, and store in a dry place until they are needed next fall.

If necessary call in a qualified furnace cleaner. His bill will be smaller than the one you'll have to pay if your equipment deteriorates during the summer.

Don't smile pityingly when you see a friend carefully saving a torn envelope or a tiny piece of cardboard. Don't tell him he resembles Mr. Caspar Milquetoast, of cartoon fame—because he has more sense than that. He merely realizes that the salvaging of paper is not a fad and not a pastime cooked up by the government to make idle women think they are helping the war effort—it's serious business.

The overseas journal of the British Broadcasting Corporation, "London Calling," reprints radio speeches, reports interviews and tells many vital and interesting facts. A recent issue describes "The Greatest Salvage Drive in History," conducted in England. You may have heard some of these details over the radio in the BBC North American series, but they bear repeating.

"Anything made of paper or cardboard is a potential weapon of war," claims the article, and goes on to list the uses of such salvage.

Did you know that one old envelope—the one your friend carefully saved—will make a cartridge wad? One newspaper will make an aero-engine dust cover; six will make an interior component for a mine. Six old books, they tell us, will make a mortar shell carrier; six old bills, a washer for a shell.

So, set aside a special box, or several of them, for salvage at your house, and make it your business to see how much you can save in the way of old and new papers. It may sound like a fairy tale, but it's true that the King and Queen save paper as scrupulously as their poorest

subjects do; this is the year 1942, when anything and everything can happen. Those who live in Buckingham Palace are apparently much more careful about paper salvage than several Montrealers we can think of. Remember that cartridge wad!

Apple pie and cheese have gone hand in hand for years, but we wonder if you have tried mixing the cheese right in the pie crust, and baking it into the pastry? You mix grated cheese with the flour and other ingredients; and when you serve the pie, the tang of the browned cheese crust blending with the sweet spicy apples is nothing short of beautiful. You'll have to experiment with this, and make your own rules and measurements to suit your family's taste, because pastry is a personal matter. Suffice it to say that, when you've got it where you want it, you'll be a pleased woman.

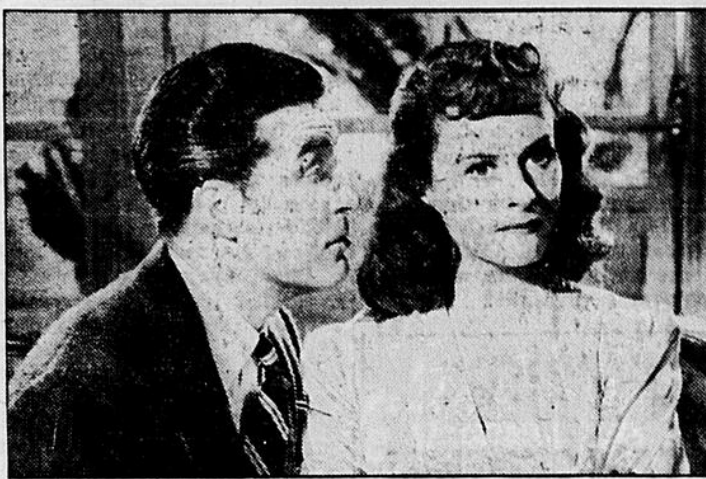

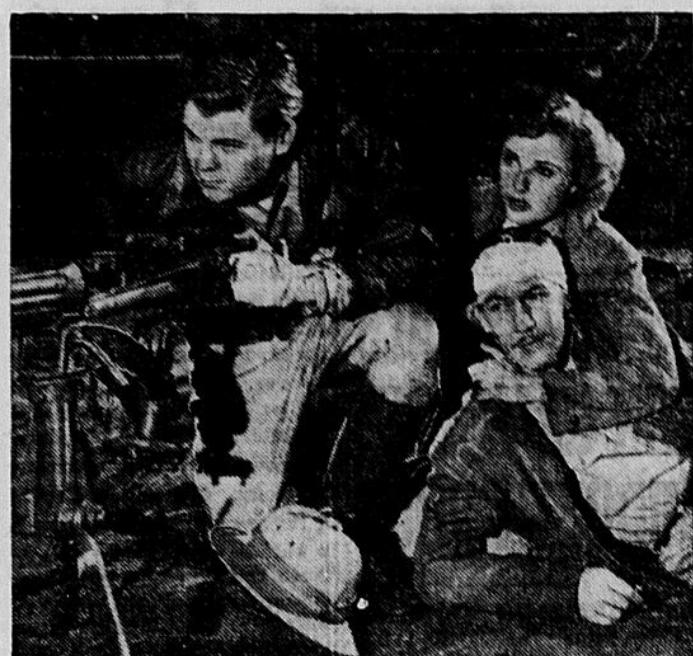

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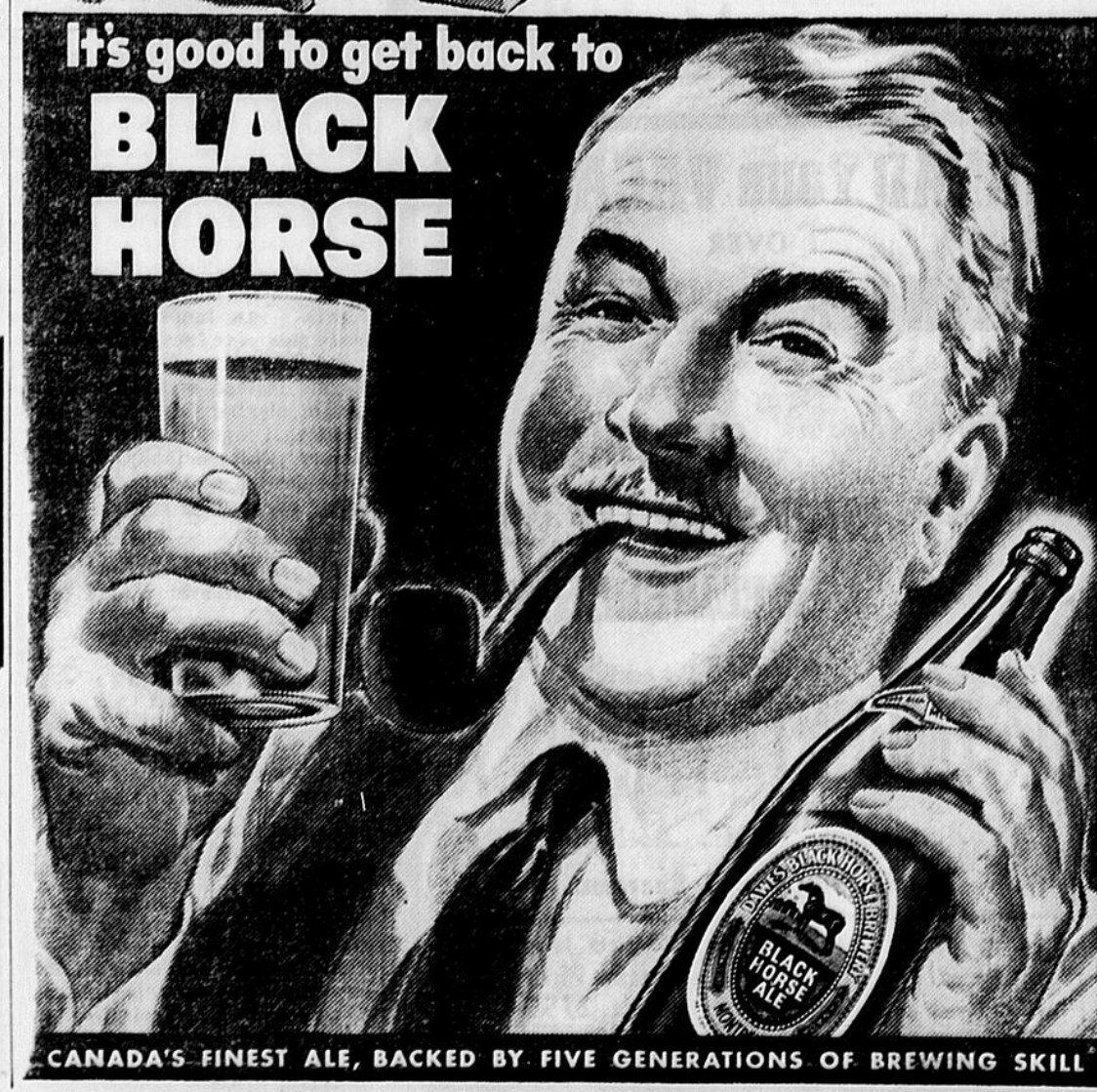

Physical Fitness Through Exercise And Diet

This is another in a series of health articles by P. M. McFarlane, Physical Director at the Westmount Y.M.C.A.

The abdominal muscles are more discussed by the layman than any other muscles, and anyone who wishes to keep his body in good condition is alarmed when his abdominal wall begins to sag. He has every reason to be a bit worried because once the four pairs of muscles in the abdominal wall begin to lose their natural tone, the weight of the internal organs cannot be supported by the meshwork of tissue surrounding the organs, with the result that the organs become displaced, and only add to the weight forcing down on the abdominal muscles. Unless an effort is made to improve the tone of the abdominal walls, this stretching of the abdominal wall and displacement of the internal organs will result in a greatly decreased efficiency of the body. The entire circulation of the body is hindered, the heart is called upon to do additional work, the digestive processes are slowed up, and the respiratory muscles and diaphragm lose their normal tone. The lack of suitable muscular tension in the abdominal wall has also another effect—it leads to dilatation of blood vessels in the digestive organs, favoring inflammatory conditions and favoring also a rapid deposit of fat. When more fat is deposited, the extra weight only makes matters worse because additional sagging takes place. It has been estimated that 90 per cent of all sickness has its origin in the abdominal region.

The following exercises, if performed daily, will aid in the building up and maintenance of a strong abdominal wall.

1. Lying on the back with the knees bent and drawn up to the chest, extend the legs with toes pointing to the roof at right angles to the floor. Return and repeat ten times.

2. On back with legs extended at right angles to the floor. Separate legs ten times. Keep knees straight.

3. Start as in (2), alternately swing legs back and forth twenty times. Keep back flat on the floor.

4. With knees bent, soles of the feet flat on the floor, placing tips of fingers back of the head, raise the head and shoulders off the floor, keeping the elbows wide. Repeat ten times.

5. Lying on the back with arms and legs extended toward the roof, at right angles to the floor. Extended as high as possible and hold for one minute.

In all these exercises the knees should be perfectly straight in all extended positions. The spine should be kept flat, with the abdomen contracted. On the initial trial, relax between each exercise. As strength is gained, attempt to do the entire routine without a break for best results.
