SPORTING INTELLIGENCE.

Montreal Hunt Club Races.

The second day's meet of the Fall gathering of the Montreal Hunt Club was a decided success, the attendance being unusually large, and including a large number of prominent citizens and lovers of the hunt.

THE HUNT CUP RACE.

For a piece of plate, value three hundred dollars. For horses that have been fairly and regularly hunted with the Montreal Hunt during the current season and have not started for any race except a hunter's race within 12 months, and bona fide the property of members of the Montreal Hunt on or before the 15th September, 1883.

The race was, from the first, between Pilot and Ingomar, who took the lead from the start. Pilot coming in the winner by a couple of lengths after a good race, with Ingomar a good second. The race was, indeed, a very fine one from the start. The next race was

MCGILL COLLEGE VS. BRITANNIA—VICTORY FOR THE BRITANNIAS.

The appearance of rain on Saturday had a most depressing effect upon all lovers of this game, but notwithstanding the unfavorable weather quite a large number of spectators assembled upon the McGill Grounds, a few of the fair sex braving the elements to watch the contest and encourage their respective friends.

Rarely has a game of football been played in Montreal where so little of that unfortunate habit of disputing was indulged in, and where such a spirit of good humor was displayed, each of the players wearing a most fascinating smile, even when a No. 14 boot was placed with a delightful precision upon the shin of some unfortunate player. The discussions were very few in number, the offices of the umpires only being called upon twice during the match.

Having won the toss, Hamilton for McGill kicked off, the ball being returned to mid-field by Young and Elder catching it was carried some yards before being tackled by Myles. The kick failing to cross the bar Hamilton sent the leather up into side touch; on being thrown out it was taken by Rodgers and passed to Elder, who made a pretty run down the field, but was tackled by McLeod. SECOND HALF.

Goals having been changed, Blacklock kicked off, and the forwards, following up quickly, the ball was forced down, taken through the scrimmage by McLaren and falling into McLeod's hands he made a brilliant sprint and secured another try but again the kick failed. The McGill men now set to work with a will and forced the Britannias forwards back, Elder, Rodgers, Haythorne and Smith doing some effective dribbling. Being kicked by Murray down near the Britannia goals, the ball was punted out by a back and was caught by Johnson and a free kick obtained. McGill, the veteran captain of McGill, managed to give a magnificent kick from the place, and scored a goal for his side. The ball was kicked off again from centre field and rushed up towards the McGill goals by Munn, Prevost and Stewart, coming out of the scrimmage to McLeod, who managed to elude his opponents, and secure another touch-down, from which Kinghorn kicked it neatly over the bar, scoring a goal for the Britannians. Hamilton sent the ball into play, and from this out the play on both sides was quick and sharp. Smith, Johnson and Hyslop doing good work for McGill, while for the Britannians Arnton, Myles and Patterson were equally successful. Just before time was called, the ball was passed out of side touch to Myles, who passed to Arnton, and running in behind the goal line scored a touch, the try from this resulted in a failure, leaving the Blue Jerseys the victors by three touch-downs.

Cricket.

THE SEASON IN SCOTLAND.

The cricket season just closed in Scotland has been but an indifferent one, unfavorable weather in many cases being the cause of a long array of unfinished matches. The most important feature of the season were the matches between Edinburgh and Glasgow, and the Gentlemen and Players—the Glasgow men winning for the first time after a long string of defeats. In the other match the Players won by 24 runs.

Several good games were witnessed in the inter-collegiate contests, and these near Merchiston Castle is at the head of the list. The most successful Scotch club turns up in DrumPELLIER, which has only been beaten once this season, and that, too, by Lasswade by a single run.

It has played seventeen matches, of which a dozen have been won one lost, three drawn, and one (with the Grange) ended in a tie. The Grange record is a dozen wins, six losses, eight draws, and one tie, over 26 matches; Lasswade, out of the long list of 43 matches, has won 32, lost four, and drawn seven; the West of Scotland has played 24 matches with a record of eight wins, eight drawing five; the Clydesdale has four wins, four losses, and five draws; Greenock has five wins, two losses, and seven draws; Brunswick 10 victories, five defeats, and one draw; the R.U.S.F.P. eight wins, the same number of losses, and five draws.

Of the county clubs, which include Perthshire, Stirlingshire, Dumfriesshire and Aberdeenshire, the best two are Perthshire and Stirlingshire.

THE DOMINION ASSOCIATION.

The quoting season in Canada as well as in Scotland has been a most exciting one. Matches have been played all over both countries, and the champions have been repeatedly changed hands. In Scotland a noticeable feature has been the close nature of most of the matches, only a shot or two often serving to carry off a victory which had been closely watched by hundreds. In Canada we have had a slinging of the wooden bat, and the "rules" issued under its auspices have been accepted as a standard by the best players of the continent, although of course they are capable here and there of improvement. In the United States the game does not flourish as it deserves, probably through the want of some central authority to give it direction. At nearly all the Canadian games quots form one of the competitions, but such arrangements are never made as might serve to give a popular interest to it. There are a few really good players, notably at Newark, N.J., and Cleveland, Ohio, but their skill is like "sweetness wasted on the desert air," as they seem unable to get fomen worthy of their steel with whom an afternoon's practice might be indulged.

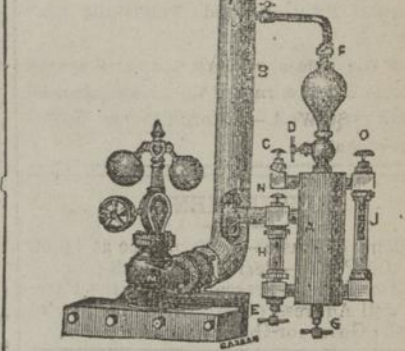

The first annual report of the Commissioner of Railways for the Province of Quebec has just been issued, although it deals only with the fiscal year 1881-82.

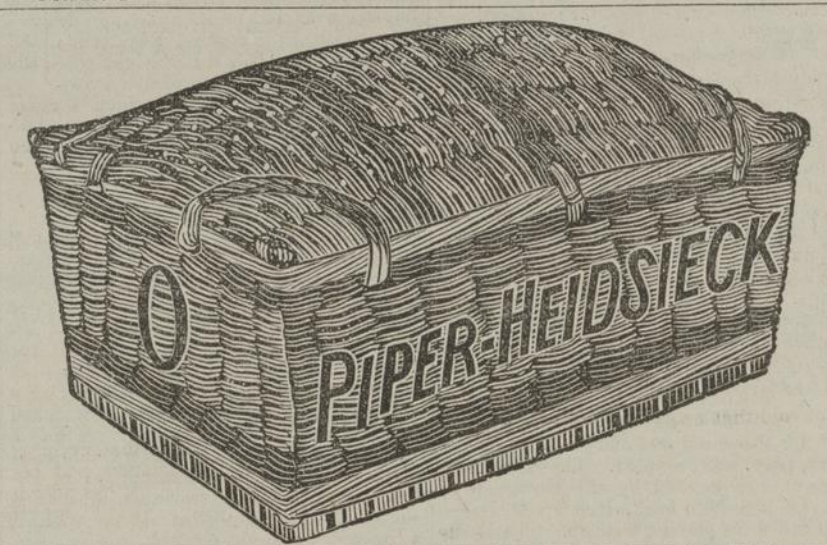

CORRESPONDENCE

The Ontario Boundary.

M.D. DAWSON VS. M.D. DAWSON. To the Editor of the Herald: I notice in a recent number of the Witness a long report, professing to be taken from the Winnipeg Times, of an interview between a reporter from the office of that journal and Mr. W. McD. Dawson. The Witness drew attention to the "interview with a Winnipeg reporter" in his editorial columns, remarking that it is, "we presume, a fair summary of the argument against the claims of Ontario." I confess that I read the report with no little surprise, feeling assured that it was identical both as to question and answer with a report of an interview between the same Mr. Dawson and a reporter for the Constitution, of Three Rivers, published in August last. I have only been able to lay my hands on the Three Rivers journal today, and have satisfied myself that the reports are identical. It seems not a little strange that the Winnipeg reporter should have put precisely the same questions to Mr. Dawson as the functionary in Three Rivers, and I am therefore led to suspect that there was no reporter in the case at all, and, moreover, to entertain a doubt whether Mr. Dawson was really interviewed at Winnipeg, and whether the report in the Times may not have been sent from Three Rivers direct. I propose to offer a few comments which seemed to me unnecessary so long as the report was merely printed in English in a French newspaper, especially while it was unnoticed by any English newspaper. I have already written so much on the boundary question that on this occasion I shall do little more than let Mr. Dawson answer himself. In June, 1857, Mr. McD. Dawson was examined before a committee of the Parliament of Canada, and stated, "I have made this subject a particular object of study for many years, and have omitted no opportunity of acquiring information on it." He then proceeded to give evidence which I shall have occasion to refer to, and which is the highest Colonial court has never been reversed or reversed, and having so existed since 1818 must, I conceive under our system of jurisprudence, in which precedent holds so high a place, be now held to be the absolute law of the land "until in some way set aside by competent authority." Now I shall show that in 1857 Mr. Dawson held a very different opinion, and that in his evidence before the select committee of 1880 he gave still another antagonistic opinion. On the first occasion, in 1857, Mr. Dawson did not forget, as he did recently, to notice a ruling of the Chief Justice of the Queen's Bench in the case of the Quebec case of May, 1818. The other case was tried in York, now Toronto, in October, 1818, and, after giving the ruling of the court, Mr. McD. Dawson made the following comment: "In other words the court could not affirm that Upper Canada had a western limit on the Pacific, and the court was right in its western limit, however, had been assigned and absolute evidence of the very nature, which the attorney-general (now Chief Justice Robinson), admitted would be proof upon the subject, existed so far as to prove that the western limit was beyond the Lake of the Woods without determining how far beyond." Again, with reference to what is known as the "due North line," regarding which the extract from the late report, gives Mr. Dawson's opinion in August last, he said in 1857, "I have a study of many years, and I hardly think that any surveyor, geographer, or delineator of boundaries of any experience or scientific attainments would concur in that decision." Again, criticizing the defence of Messrs. Stuart and Vallieres in the de Reinhard case, Mr. McD. Dawson said that there was an act of sovereign authority "distinctly describing that country to the west of the Lake of the Woods as attached to the Government of Canada and the court, by its own admission, must have been bound by it. Again, this same witness said, "I also remark that the decision of the court at Quebec would have made the westerly limit of Upper Canada a long way east of the United States boundary at Lake Superior, leaving out the shores of the lake (where we are now selling mining lands) and its western tributaries, and that, therefore, nothing in common with the boundary designated for us by the Hudson's Bay Company viz the water shed of the St. Lawrence, and for which there is no earthly authority except themselves." The italics are copied from the book of documents, and I desire to call special attention to their bearing on the Northern boundary, which I shall consider later. In his resolutions, seventeen in number, all to the same effect, Mr. Dawson declared in the last: "That by the treaty of Paris the Mississippi necessarily became the boundary of the then southern part of Canada in part of the United States, because France retained the west bank of that river from its source downwards; but the territory lying North of the source of the Mississippi, thence West, forming the northern boundary of Louisiana, previously possessed by France, and so ceded by the said treaty, this House claims (and in so far as it has since been relinquished to the United States) as an integral part of Canada without any treaty limit except the Pacific Ocean." Such was the result of Mr. McD. Dawson's study for many years. In 1857, He afterwards got a new light, as did his brother, Mr. Simon Dawson, whose conversion has been attributed to his desire that Algoma should be made a separate Province, and ill-natured people have even gone so far as to suggest that he thought that no Lieutenant-Governor would be so suitable for that Province as himself. Mr. Simon Dawson is reported in the Parliamentary companion of Mr. McIntosh, M.P., as having stated in the Legislature of Ontario, that "the great central region known as Algoma, extending from the 81st to the 93rd meridian, that is from French River to the Lake of the Woods, should be formed into a separate Province." Mr. Simon Dawson, however, was more modest in his aspirations than Mr. W. McD. He only proposed to carry old Canada to the White Earth River, at a point upwards of 450 miles west of the Lake of the Woods. Both brothers would have given Manitoba to Canada in 1857. In 1859 Mr. McD. Dawson was examined before the committee, of which his brother was chairman. When criticizing the award of the arbitrators, Mr. McD. Dawson said: "Had the British North American Act declared that the Province of Ontario should consist of Upper Canada, as it had existed for forty-seven years (from 1791 to 1838) instead of as it existed at the passing of that Act, it would thereby clearly have embraced all that it had originally possessed as the Western division of the former Province


of Quebec (i.e., either to the Pacific or the White Earth River, according to the two Messrs. Dawson) but its description having been changed by competent authority at the last named date it ceased to have any boundaries as before, and entered Confederation as it then existed." Now I have to remark, first, that Mr. Dawson's evidence in 1857, given above after years of study, was long subsequent to Lord Durham's commission in 1838, which he persisted in stating contrary to the pretensions of the present Dominion Government, and also of the Judges examined before the committee, curtailed the limits of Upper Canada, which by his own admission had been established long previously. Mr. Dawson abstains altogether from any reference to the cause of Lord Durham's commission having been framed as it was, and which it is notorious was owing to the impossibility of defining the boundary through Lake Superior until the termination of negotiations with the United States as to whether the boundary should be north or south of Isle Royal. Except the Dawson Brothers I know of no single authority that pretends that Ontario terminates at the entrance to Lake Superior. Before leaving this branch of my subject I must quote the last sentence of Mr. McD. Dawson's evidence before the committee in answer to a question from Mr. Robinson as to whether he had given any information for the arbitrators: "No. I must say it very often seems to be the habit of governments not to consult those who know most about the case that has to be dealt with. As a matter of fact all Mr. Dawson's views founded on his study for many years, also Mr. Simon Dawson's, were fully before the arbitrators although they had not the benefit of his latest hallucinations. I hardly know whether it is worth referring to the northern boundary. When Mr. Dawson gave his evidence in 1857, he was strongly against the Hudson's Bay Company's pretensions. In his evidence in 1880, he said that he thought the arbitrators correct in commencing their description at the shore of Hudson's Bay, and in his last reported interview with the main criticism of the award is that the arbitrators erred in not having in mind the north and south west and north east by a natural boundary in the absence of any but the most indefinite language in the Royal proclamation under the act of 1791. Mr. Dawson has never ventured since his declared opinion in 1857 to contend that the height of land is the northern boundary. I must protest against Mr. Dawson twisting the language of the orders in council to suit his purpose. The arbitrators were appointed "to determine the boundaries," and Mr. McD. Dawson states that they were appointed to "ascertain whether a boundary existed, and if so, where." That is not the true language of the order in council. I have to offer many apologies for thus trespassing on your space.

It was a happy thought which impelled you to call your town after Her Royal Highness. THE PRINCESS LOUISE. It was an acknowledgment of the sacrifice which our gracious sovereign made in separating herself for many years from her well-beloved daughter, in order to show her sympathy for Canada and keep up the cordial relations which for so long a period have not ceased to exist between the colony and the mother country. During the whole time when her health permitted, Her Royal Highness has assisted her husband in doing everything which could contribute to the development and prosperity of the country. She has been a patroness of the fine arts, and as a last souvenir she has presented to our national gallery a picture painted by herself, and has also given another present full of historic interest, a copy of the painting of the death of Wolfe on the Plains of Abraham, where was fought that battle which altered the destinies of our country. She has generously assisted her husband, His Excellency the Governor-General, in performing the difficult task which devolved upon him, that of filling the place of Lord Dufferin, with his amiable Countess, left, so many agreeable recollections. Like Lord Dufferin, the Marquis of Lorne fully understood the importance of the mission confided to him. They both applied themselves to learn the general character of the Canadian people; they both sought to ascertain for themselves the prodigious resources of this vast country, hardly known until a few years ago, and which promise so brilliant a future to this nation. To him who studies the history of THE GOVERNORS SENT BY ENGLAND to represent the Sovereign in this land, it is evident that no one has contributed in a greater degree to the knowledge of Canada known abroad than our present Governor-General, the Marquis of Lorne. In order to do so he had to visit the country, and quite recently he undertook, with his royal wife, a journey to the limits of the Province of British Columbia, whose shores are bathed by the Pacific Ocean, in order that they might ascertain for themselves what advantages could be offered to emigrants from the old countries of Europe. This careful solicitude which England has shown in sending us, as representative of the old world, a man whose name as those I have named, seems to be continued, as evidenced by the selection of Lord Lorne's successor. There is something very interesting to French Canada in the choice of Lord Lansdowne; there is a bond of union between England and the descendants of the old Frenchmen who opened up this continent to civilization and religion, for Lord Lansdowne's mother is of FRENCH ORIGIN. Distinguished as a statesman, Lord Lansdowne is also recommended to us by the sympathy and good-will expressed by those amongst whom he lives in Ireland, by his tenacity who have but praise to award for his good offices and those of his marchioness. This should secure him the sympathy of our friends and compatriots of Irish birth with whom, I am happy to say, we live, in this free Canada of ours, on as good terms as with those who come from other countries. If England continues to be represented by men as distinguished in every respect as the Governors-General whose names are so beloved by our population, it is very certain that the feeling of loyalty expressed in your address and of which you of Louisiana have given proof in calling your town after a prince of Louis, will always continue to exist amongst us. May I be permitted to express the hope that the prosperity of your town will be as great as the qualities of the Princess are brilliant and as great as will be the regret caused by her departure from our midst.

SPIRIT OF THE FRENCH PRESS.

La Patrie on the "Maison Bleue" at Ottawa and on King Alfonso—The Temps on Ministerial Reconstruction—The Etendard on Corruption in Laval.

The Patrie says:—"A new maison bleue will be opened at Ottawa during the session. Tories from the other provinces, who, it is expected, will enter into Mr. Senecal's plans, will be specially invited."

Referring to King Alfonso's reception at Paris the same paper remarks that "the Franco-Spanish incident would appear to be settled judging from the circumstance of the coming to power of Senor Moret, the leader of the Democrats. It is evident that Mr. Alfonso sought to regain popularity by endeavoring to make the Spanish people resent the feelings with which the people of Paris greeted the little Bourbon. No noble offspring of a noble mother to whom France even now extends the most liberal hospitality, you are not, you never were, and you never will be able to make faces at the French Republic. True Bourbon as you are, you are ready to sacrifice thousands of lives to gratify your own self love, but the Spaniards, as well as the French of the present day, will no longer engage in warfare, to win the favor of a King who is said to be more or less legitimate in every respect."

The Temps says:—"The rumors respecting the reconstruction of the Quebec government, current for some time past, are still receiving confirmation. The Ministerial press has not dared to deny them; some officious sheets have even admitted their correctness, while the recognized organs are silent. It was found, it appears, after the contest, that the clearly fought victory of the Prime Minister served only to compromise more than ever the position of his cabinet already ruined in public opinion. After having perpetrated the illegality of governing the province without legitimate mandate for thirteen months, Mr. Mousseau beholds himself threatened anew with a contestation, the prosecution of which, without either mercy or truce, would result in his being deprived of his political rights, in bringing to light the disgraceful means employed by him and by his satellites to deprive the electors of Jacques Cartier for the second time of their representation in the legislature. This disclosure will inevitably put an end to this unscrupulous politician's political career, and will take away from him the chance in the future to rise again. The perspective is alarming, and he, whom this strange condition threatens with the serious consequences which we have indicated, has not the courage to meet the danger, he prefers retreat to battle. On the other hand the friends who surround him and who have been weary for a year past of the ungrateful task of making amends for his blunders and hiding his inconceivable incapacity; these friends, whose devotion, were it not interested, would appear worthy of a better cause, refuse to carry so heavy a burden any further, they threaten to put him out of the ministerial palanquin, if he does not quickly get out of it. Thus Mr. Mousseau, the victim of his own incapacity, is about to fall with all the heaviness of his own weight upon the floor of the political arena never to rise again. But the intrigues through which he must pass in order to reach the desired result without attracting public attention too much, present enormous difficulties. In consequence of the mutual consent just pointed out, the Prime Minister's retreat is not what presents the greatest difficulty. It is not enough to initiate the Conservative party get rid of this compromising individual, but it must, under the risk of aggravating the situation, find a successor free from the responsibilities of the past and of sufficient ability to rally the scattered sections of the party. Up to the present the attempts have failed. The Castors have vowed the utter extermination of the Senecal-breed; they must not contradict themselves, from one day to another, by an alliance with this mischievous element. The Senecals appear no less decided to hunt the Castors to death; it would be enough to initiate them in the small matters of the clique. Under this discouraging alternative it was thought that Mr. Taillon might serve as an intermediary between the two elements, and that for extending his right hand to the Senecals and the left to the Castors, he would succeed. This was an illusion. Mr. Taillon, after making an unsuccessful approach to the dissenting section, renounced, we are told, the task of reconstructing the government, and the unfortunate conqueror of Jacques Cartier, while waiting for another attempt, remains prime-minister against his will and against the unanimous wish of the two sections of his party, who are agreed only in this respect. Such is the pitiable condition of disorganization in which our adversaries now find themselves, owing to their leaders' abuse of power. The Liberal party which has always condemned these abuses, and pointed out their lamentable consequences, has only to persevere with judgment and constancy in the straight way which it has adopted up to the present to conciliate all the sincere friends of the welfare by one hand and great effort to rescue the fortune and honor of our province."

DOMINION DESPATCHES.

FROM THE CAPITAL.

Addresses to Lord Lorne—Inland Revenue for September—Canada Gazette Notes—Personal.

OTTAWA, October 13.—Yesterday addresses were presented to His Excellency the Governor-General by the Ontario Medical Association and the Ottawa Art Society.

The Minister of Marine and Fisheries has permitted the name of the schooner Ceilin Cowen, of St. Andrews, N.B., to be changed to Melville A. Reid.

Yesterday Mr. Holt, of the Commercial Geographical Society of Paris, who has been in the city for several days, left for several days, left for Montreal.

Mr. Holt, while in Canada, made some extensive investments in North-West lands. While in Ottawa he had an interview with Sir Hector Langevin, to whom he expressed his delight at what he had seen of the Dominion.

QUEBEC.

Consult his Constituents—To be Contested—Action against the North-West—Drowned—To take the Veil—Wedding—Personal.

QUEBEC, October 13.—Mr. Provincial Secretary Blanchet has gone to Beauce to consult his electors about a Conservative candidate to replace him, so it is said.

It is said the recent heavy increase in tolls is illegal, and steps are being taken to contest the right of the Quebec turnpike trust to impose such tolls.

N. Pion and others have taken an action against the North Shore railway company for damages. The amount claimed is \$50,000.

A seaman of the bark Lizzie Durrell, lying at Point Levis, walked over the Corporation wharf into the river and was drowned last night. The body was recovered this morning.

Two daughters of the late Lieutenant-Governor Caron will take the veil on Tuesday and join the Religious Ladies of the General Hospital.

Daniel Colombe, of Levis, fell off Renaud's wharf into a bateau lying alongside this afternoon and received fatal injuries.

The wild verdicts rendered by the jurors at the present criminal term are beginning to cause comment, if not alarm, among the people.

Colonel Ross, of the Guards, Ottawa, is in town.

ONTARIO.

Toronto Rectory Case—A Decline in Federal Bank—The Tuke Fund—The Trouble on the Stock Exchange—Duty on Bonded Merchandise.

TORONTO, October 13.—The Rectory surplus case of Langtry vs. DuMontin was continued this morning. The motion for a non-suit was abandoned pending defendants evidence. The case was adjourned till the 10th December, owing to the absence of material witnesses. It is reported to-day that the plaintiffs have met and again offered a compromise to defendants counsel.

The fact that Federal Bank stock has dropped from 161 to 150 this week has caused an uneasy feeling here. Parties who held it on margin have suffered, and the anxiety of speculators holding stock as to the effect of the coming dividend caused them to throw it upon the market, which accounts in some measure for the decline.

The vital statistics registered here for this week are births 70, marriages 13, and deaths 31.

TORONTO, Oct. 14.—The bears on the stock exchange have succeeded in carrying to a successful issue their long contested battle for supremacy with the bulls. Taking advantage of a temporary scarcity in money they commenced to offer Federal Bank stock down to a point that exhausted the margins of some unlucky holders, whose shares being thrown on street accelerated the decline. One of the leading bears is credited with having cleared upward of \$25,000 yesterday. The market closed excited and weak and the opening of to-morrow's board is awaited with considerable anxiety.

Trouble has been brewing between the wholesale merchants and the Collector of Customs as to the duty on dried fruits and the matter in dispute has been referred by the latter to the Minister of Customs at Ottawa. The merchants contend that dried fruit shipped from Greece, etc., should be appraised at its market value in the country upon the exportation fees at the port of entry being added to the market prices and duty levied upon the whole amount. A large quantity of goods is lying in suffrance in warehouse pending the decision.

HAMILTON, October 13.—Messrs. R. Fair and H. Hodgkins, officers of the Tuke Society of England, which is engaged in sending immigrants to this continent, were in the city to-day. They have been looking after the immigrants the Society has sent to the North-West and reports them as doing well. The Society is to continue its work next season.

THE MARITIME PROVINCES.

Criminal Trials at Halifax—Movements of Warships—The Westmorland Election.

ST. JOHN, N. B. Oct. 13.—The election took place in Westmorland county to-day to fill the seat in the Local Legislature, vacated by Mr. P. A. Landry. Returns so far as received give Mr. Killam a majority of 274 over Mr. Wells. Both candidates are Liberal-Conservatives, but

Mr. Killam supports the Local Government, while Mr. Wells is opposed to it, and was supported by the county Liberal-Conservative Association.

HALIFAX, N.S., Oct. 13.—Criminal trials in the Supreme Court began to-day, before Judge Thompson, with the case of Hughes and McDonald, for manslaughter, in the death of James Kennedy on Lower Water street, in this city. The Hon. Attorney-General and Mr. Weeks, Q.C., appeared for the Crown, and Mr. Mottom, Q.C., and Longley for the defence.

HALIFAX, October 14.—H.M. warship Tenedos arrived from Newfoundland. McDonald and Hughes, the two men charged with manslaughter in the case of Jos. Kennedy on Lower Water street, several months ago, were tried in the Supreme Court yesterday and the jury returned a verdict of "not guilty."

LORE AND THE MILITIA.

A Farewell Address.

OTTAWA, Oct. 13.—The Governor-General has issued the following address to the militia of the Dominion:—

His Excellency the Governor-General cannot leave Canada without expressing to the militia force of the Dominion the gratification he has experienced during his visits to the many different portions of this great country in witnessing the efforts made and the military spirit shown in the performance of the duties to which the militia are called. He assures them that their future welfare will always be a matter of deep interest to himself and Her Royal Highness, and he trusts that they will continue to keep up the discipline and foster that military spirit which now pervades all ranks. Although they may never be called out to defend their country these will be the best safeguards for peace and security both at home and abroad. (Signed,) LORNE.

A LAKE STEAMER ASHORE.

The Beauty Line Ontario-Around. PORT ELGIN, Oct. 13.—On Friday, October 12th, the steamer Ontario, of the Beauty Line, which left on Thursday night with about three hundred tons of freight, one hundred deck and forty or fifty cabin passengers for Duluth and intermediate ports west, went head ground about 3 p.m. during a heavy fog about half a mile from shore eight miles south-west of Port Elgin. After ineffectual efforts to extricate her from her rocky bed, and fearing the effects of the approaching storm, Capt. Jas. McLaughlin and his staff decided to land the ladies and children, which was successfully carried out, although a heavy sea was running at the time. This morning the balance of the passengers were also safely put ashore, and are camped in a woods on the beach, every care and attention being paid to their wants by the officers of the steamer. The steamer is awaiting the arrival of a steam tug, when it is hoped that she will be got safely off without injury if the weather remains favorable. She is resting on the bottom in about eleven feet of water, her hold being filled with water, to steady her. No damage is believed to have been done to her bottom up to the present time. Great praise is due the captain, officers and crew for their good conduct. The following from the cabin passengers speaks for itself:—We, the undersigned, passengers on board the steamer Ontario, of the Beauty Line, from Sarnia to Duluth, leaving the former port on Thursday, October 11th, which ran aground off Port Elgin, under a very heavy fog on Friday, October 12th, being distressed by very high and the chances of safer landing were becoming fewer. They erected the camps on land and made everything as comfortable as possible. To-day all the passengers were brought into town and are quartered at the Arlington House.

INTERNATIONAL SOCIALISTS.

The Pittsburgh Convention a Fizzle. PITTSBURGH, October 14.—The first meeting of the first national congress of the International Socialistic Workingmen's Association was held today, and little interest was manifested by the workmen of the city. Only thirty-eight persons were present. Meng of Chicago, was elected president. This afternoon a "mass" meeting was held, and three hundred persons attended. The speakers included Hermt, August Spiek, Messrs. Parsons and Drury. There was no enthusiasm, and before the meeting concluded the hall was pretty well thinned out. The convention has been a failure so far as public interest or proselytism is concerned.

THE ST. ALBANS FAILURE.

ST. ALBANS, Vt., October 14.—Eight more writs have been issued on behalf of the depositors against Lawrence Brainard, President of the St. Albans Trust Company. They are based upon charges of misappropriating funds.

ARRIVAL OF THE JERSEY LILY.

NEW YORK, October 14.—Mrs. Langtry, accompanied by her mother, to-day arrived on the steamer Oregon. Mrs. Cornwallis West was not a passenger. Her brother is a member of Mrs. Langtry's company, and she went aboard the steamer before it sailed to bid him good-bye, but had no intention of coming to this country.

THE DEWEY CASE.

SAN FRANCISCO, October 13.—Dewey, the alleged forger, says he is confident he will be able to clear himself. He implies that if any forgeries were committed they were done by his partner, McBean. Dewey had seventeen hundred dollars when arrested.

A KIND ACT.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—John Carroll, watchman at the Treasury Department, dying from consumption, was recently dropped from the roll. Yesterday he crawled to the Treasury saying his family was destitute. Secretary Folger immediately ordered his reinstatement.

TELEGRAPHIC SPORTING NEWS.

ST. JOHN, N.B., October 13.—The Ross crew of Carleton has been matched to row the Logan crew of Portland a three mile race on Thursday next for \$200 a side. In the regatta on Tuesday last the Carleton crew defeated the Portland crew.

FRANCE AND SPAIN.

The New Cabinet. MADRID, Oct. 13.—It is stated the following Cabinet has been formed: Posado Herrera, President of Council; Ruiz Gomez, Minister of Foreign Affairs; Gallosterio, Minister of Finance; Morral, Minister of Interior; Lenares Rivas, Minister of Justice; Sardoal, Minister of Commerce; Lopez Domiguez, Minister of War; Beranger, Minister of Marine; Suarez Inclan, Minister of Colonies. The Cabinet has been formed as announced, except that Valcarlos will probably be Minister of Marine. The appointment of Valcarlos as Minister of Marine has been confirmed, despite the efforts of Sagasta.

MADRID, October 13.—It is doubtful whether the majority of the members of the Cortes will unconditionally support the new cabinet, especially in its policy on questions of universal suffrage and constitutional reform.

Speech by M. Ferry.

PARIS, October 13.—M. Ferry, speaking at a banquet at Rouen this evening, alluded to the Bismarck affair. He said M. Ferry had shown with some majesty the chief of the republic can repair the errors of an unthinking crowd. He dwelt upon the advantages enjoyed by a practical, sensible and prudent but not blustering republic.

Opinion of The Temps.

PARIS, October 14.—The Temps commenting on the speech at Rouen yesterday, comes to ask the public whether it intends to act with or against the Irreconcilables.

Friendly Inclined.

MADRID, October 14.—The general inclination of the new Cabinet is to maintain good relations with the French.

M. Ferry at Havre.

HAVRE, October 14.—Prime Minister Ferry and Raval, Minister of Public Works, arrived to-day, and were welcomed by an immense crowd, who shouted "Republic and occasionally for the government of the Republic." M. Ferry cordially greeted the Spanish Consul, who had received special instructions to attend the reception. At the banquet this evening M. Ferry said it was necessary to pursue more vigorously than ever the policy of Republican union. Within a few months a gulf had opened between the government and the republicans and the Irreconcilables, owing to a campaign of insults and calumnies the Radicals had conducted against the former. The country must choose between two parties. The speech was applauded.

LORE LOHNE'S SUCCESSOR.

The New Governor-General and Party Sail for Canada. LONDON, October 12.—Lord Lansdowne, the Marquis of Lorne's successor in the Governor-Generalship of Canada, with Lady Lansdowne and Lord Charles and Lady Evelyn Fitzmaurice with suite, embarked on board the Circassian, of the Allan line, at Moville this afternoon. They were accompanied to the vessel by the Marquis of Aberdeen, Lord Claude Hamilton, and a distinguished party of visitors. A lunch was served on board the vessel and partaken of by the company, after which Lord and Lady Lansdowne and party were bade a regretful farewell, and the visitors returned to shore. The embarkation took place under the happiest auspices. The weather was brilliant. Special arrangements have been made for the comfort of the Governor-General and party during the voyage, and a pleasant trip across is anticipated. Mr. Andrew Allan, chief of the Allan line of steamers, is also aboard the Circassian.

THE CHINESE TROUBLES.

Address to Marquis Tseng. FOLESTON, October 13.—The municipal authorities to-day presented an address of welcome to the Marquis Tseng, the Chinese ambassador. The Marquis said he earnestly desired that the dispute between France and China would end peacefully.

The Marquis Tseng, in replying to the address at Folkestone, said the Chinese did not fear contact or wish to avoid it, but he believed the immensity of the present task is a natural result of her inaction. Franco-Chinese merchants asserted that France has only two courses to fall back on, the Bontree treaty or prepare to march to Peking. The riot at Foo Chow was caused by the French Consul objecting to the burial of a Chinaman who died of cholera in ground adjoining the foreign concession. The temper of China at all the treaty ports is dangerous.

Outbreaks Against Foreigners.

HONG KONG, Oct. 14.—Placards have been posted on the Island of Hainan threatening the Mandarins and foreigners with death. Naval protection is necessary. There has been serious rioting at Foo Chow, but a renewal of the disturbance is prevented by the French consul.

JAPANESE NEWS.

Death in High Places—Effects of the Earthquake. YOKOHAMA, Sept. 23.—Two daughters of the Mikado died within forty-eight hours of each other and out of ten children but one survived.

The disastrous eruption igniting the Strait of Sunda is connected here with the peculiar appearance of the sun which from noon on August 30th to the evening of September 1st, resembled a full moon, the atmosphere being obscured with dust and laden with smoke emitted from the five hundred miles by the southern monsoon.

A CLEVER SWINDLE.

Pool Sellers Fleeced by Sharpers. NEW YORK, October 14.—The last day of the fall meeting of the American Jockey Club, which closes the racing season in this part of the country, was marked by the successful accomplishment of an extensive swindling of the pool sellers. The wife of the Western Union Telegraph Company, which alone has a line to Jerome Park, was tapped, and false despatches substituted for the genuine ones. The fraud was not discovered until the return to the city of persons who had witnessed the racing. Long before that the pool sellers all over the country had paid the tickets on what they supposed were the winning horses. The amount of losses has not been ascertained, but it is estimated to be about \$75,000. From despatches received it was learned that pool sellers in Boston, Philadelphia, St. Louis, Chicago, Louisville and St. Louis were heavy losers.
