THE SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF QUEBEC. THE BISHOP'S CHARGE. The Synod of the Diocese met in biennial session yesterday, a large number of clergy and lay delegates being present.

The Synod was opened in the morning by a service in the Cathedral at 9.30. There was a good congregation and a large number of communicants. The altar and pulpit were beautifully decorated with flowers and there was a large floral cross behind the altar.

The members of the Synod then entered the Church Hall, where the session was really opened. The first item of business, after the reading of the minutes of the last session, was the election of officers.

Well, from this diary, my brethren, it appears that during the past two years, besides preaching many sermons and taking part in religious services, I have been engaged in lectures on the History of the English Church and other subjects, I have been permitted by the mercy of God to hold 138 Catechetical classes.

Compulsory Education. Nova Scotia now stands prominently in advance of every other American State or Province in her compulsory school laws. By an act of the recent Legislative session the compulsory age is from six to 19, and the minimum days attendance is 120. At the age of 12 a pupil may pass an examination in Grade VII and be exempt. At 13 he may work the rest of the year if he attends for 60 consecutive days. From 14 to 16 he must attend school, unless he is at work with the approval of his parents. This law is compulsory in Halifax, and in several of the town councils. It has been adopted in Dartmouth, and has worked to the satisfaction of everyone. It is a case upon those who were promulgated wrote letters to the council, thanking them for the interest taken in making education universal.—Edinburgh Review.
