Subsequently as Chief Engineer in the construction of the Intercolonial, and as Government Engineer on the surveys for the Canadian Pacific, Mr. Fleming acquired considerable prestige, and was the first to draw the attention of the commercial world to the wonderful shortening of distance between Great Britain and Japan which would result from the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

AN AFFLICTED EDITOR. Mr. W. E. JONES, of the Richmond Guardian, the well-known veteran publisher, of the Eastern Townships, is one of the victims of the late Richmond fire, as recorded at the time in the CHRONICLE's telegraphic and editorial columns. The splendid ocean steamer "Canada," which arrived here yesterday morning at 11.25, has made the fastest passage on record from Liverpool to Quebec, being the first steamer to leave Liverpool on Thursday and arrive here on the following Thursday. The actual time of the passage was six days, twenty-three hours and twenty-five minutes. Her greatest run in 24 hours was 414 knots, and was from Belle Isle to Heath Point, being at the rate of 17 1/2 knots an hour. This is a good indication of what we might expect from vessels running 20 and 21 knots per hour.

From Ottawa come words of congratulation for what the Provincial Government of Quebec has already done in the matter of fish and game protection. The Journal of that city recently said—"In the matter of game preservation the present Government in Quebec has taken some salutary steps. The establishment of a game preserve has already had a good effect, and, in his recent report, Comte PUYVALON recommends that the entire basin of Lake Kippewa at least or better still, the entire region between that lake on the south, Lake des Quinze on the north, Temiscamieue on the west, and Grand Lake Victoria and the River du Moine on the east be converted into a great game preserve. Such a preserve, well protected, as a 'sanctuary' for the animals of the forest world, in course of time, be productive directly and indirectly, of revenue for the Province."

Not the least interesting of the notes recently furnished to L'Evenement by the Comte de PUYVALON, respecting his late journey of exploration in the region of the Upper Ottawa, on behalf of the Local Government, has reference to the fish and game found there. As a game country it presents remarkable features. Its remoteness makes it a natural home for the wild animals, driven back by the advance of settlement, and seeking a region in which they can exist unmolested. The big game is very numerous, and, in the space of a couple of months, the explorer counted the tracks of no fewer than six hundred moose and deer, and had he continued to do so he states they would have run up into a much greater count. One especially noteworthy feature of the report in this connection is the statement that the Count saw many tracks of the great Canadian Elk, a specimen of animal life supposed by many to be extinct, east of the Rockies, and, in addition to these evidences of the presence of this noble animal, he was privileged to see one for himself, besides obtaining the information that one of his canoe men had killed two of them not long ago. The waters abound with fish which he states may become a source of Provincial revenue in the future.

The new attempt to colonize Anticosti continues to excite wide attention. Referring to the ownership of Anticosti by the French chocolate king, M. MENIER, the New York Mail and Express says:—"Thus has France regained a foothold upon the western hemisphere for the first time since the tricolor went down in defeat on the Plains of Abraham. Anticosti is sure to be a point of peculiar interest as it develops under the touch of the enterprising French capitalist. M. MENIER is thoroughly impressed with the value of his great purchase, and is about to develop it. He has already sent out from France shipments of steel rails and cars, with the intention of building a railroad entirely around the Island. A telegraph line is to be built, following the line of railway. Dwelling houses, stores, churches and manufactories have been built at English Bay, the principal harbor, and fresh attempts of colonization will be made, with the idea of developing the grazing and agricultural lands of the interior. Villages and towns are also expected to grow up along the line of the railroad, near the shore. A fine steamer, the 'Savoie,' has been bought by M. MENIER to make trips to Quebec, 430 miles distant, as well as to other points, in the new colonization scheme is successful." M. MENIER's enterprise is entirely a personal one, however, as we have already frequently explained, and they do him an injustice, who, like the Mail and Express in the paragraph above quoted, make it appear that France has anything to do with the matter, or that the enter-
